The **Moscow Chamber Orchestra**, one of the world's greatest ensembles,





Latin American Women Focus of Exhibit, Lectures

FSU's Women Studies Program and Department of Visual Arts are joining forces to present an art exhibition and series of lectures on the topic of "Latin American Women as Subject/Object."



"Las (In)visibles: Women Artists of Uruguay" is an exhibition of paintings, photographs, watercolors and prints by 32 Uruguayan women artists working in the years 1965 to 1989, including in the years of military dictatorship, 1973 to 1984. The name Las (In)visibles refers to the artists' need to remain invisible during the dictatorship as well as to the limited opportunities available to Uruguayan women artists.

The exhibit will be at the Stephanie Ann Roper Fine Arts Gallery in the Fine Arts Building from Sept. 7 to 28.

The opening reception will be Friday, Sept. 3 at 7 p.m. in the Roper Gallery. Featured will be a guest lecture by Dr. Hiber Conteris of Arizona International College, University of Arizona titled "The Visibility of the Invisibles."

FSU faculty members will offer additional lectures throughout the duration of the exhibition, all in the Roper Gallery.

Dr. Randall Rhodes of the Department of Visual Arts will speak on "Chilean Skinscapes" Tuesday, Sept. 7, at 7 p.m.

Marilyn Moors of the Department of Sociology will speak Thursday, Sept. 9, at 7 p.m. on "Maya Women's Textile Cooperatives."

On Mexican Independence Day, Thursday, Sept. 16, the 7 p.m. lecture will feature Dr. Paul Charney of the Department of History speaking on "Frida Kahlo: Identity and the Body" and Dr. Karen Holbrook of the Department of Psychology speaking on "Children's Portrayals of Mexican Family Life."


Gallery hours are Sundays through Wednesdays from 1 to 4 p.m. All events are free and open to the public.

Social Work Reaccreditation

FSU is please to announce the reaffirmation of its undergraduate social work program by the Council on Social Work Education. Reaffirmation extends to 2007, at which time the program will undergo a thorough review by the Council's Commission on Accreditation.

In the decision, the Council cited the following strengths: 1) A competent, committed and respected faculty, 2) Social work courses that are thoughtfully constructed, substantive and which include well-developed assignments, 3) A curriculum that gives clear evidence of being the result of truly collaborative efforts, and 4) Research content tied to the real world of practice on both the micro and macro levels.

The FSU undergraduate social work program is fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. Graduates are eligible to take state licensing exams at the undergraduate level and are potentially eligible to apply for advanced standing in master's degree programs in social work. Advanced standing allows students to complete their Master of Social Work degrees in less time than it would otherwise take.

Faculty Notes:

Dr. Fred L. Yaffe has been named dean of FSU's newly formed College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. FSU recently merged the School of Natural and Social Sciences and the School of Arts and Humanities to create the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Yaffe oversaw a similar merger at his last school, Ashland University in Ashland, Ohio, where he has been Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences since 1997. Prior to his time at Ashland, Yaffe served for eight years as chair of the Department of Psychology at Eastern Illinois University. He received both his doctorate and master's degrees from Howard University in Experimental Psychology and his bachelor's degree is from the University of Maryland.

Diane M. Morea has assumed her duties as new director of athletics. Morea comes to FSU from Chowan College in Murfreesboro, N.C., where she had served as athletic director since October of 1997. She succeeds Loyal Park, who retired effective June 30, after 12 years at FSU. She becomes only the fifth director of athletics in the history of the school. Morea coached women's basketball, volleyball and track and field at Southwestern Michigan College. She was the head women's basketball coach at Michigan Technological University. She brings more than 20 years of experience in developing creative marketing and promotional strategies for collegiate athletic programs.

FSU faculty members **Dr. Rahim Ashkeboussi**, **Dr. Marci McClive** and **lecturer Donal Moran Rivera**, of the Master of Business Administration Department were among 43 in the University System of Maryland who have been named Distance Education Fellows by Chancellor Donald Langenberg. All are part of the Web Initiative in Teaching pilot project that began a year ago. The fellows work in teams to develop, pilot and evaluate Web-based courses delivered completely over the Internet. FSU's first course in the project will be offered this fall, a graduate-level management course called "Technology Tools for Managers," taught by Rivera.

Tom Serfass, assistant professor of Wildlife Ecology in the Department of Biology, presented a paper, "Fishermen's Attitudes Regarding River

Otter Reintroduction In Pennsylvania," at the North American Aquatic Furbearer Symposium hosted at Mississippi State University, May 23 to 27.

Serfass also attended the Welder Wildlife Foundation, Sinton, Texas, with Dr. Robert Brooks and Dr. Manuel Spinola, both of Penn State University. Serfass and Brooks co-advise the student who presented an update on his research associated with river otter reintroduction in western New York: "Spacing Strategy of Translocated River Otters in a Human Dominated Landscape."

In addition, Serfass continues to coordinate efforts to reintroduce rare mammals in Pennsylvania, specifically river otters and fishers. He recently co-authored the following papers with colleagues at Purdue and Penn State universities dealing with these reintroduction projects:

Dr. William Seddon, Department of Biology, published the manuscript "Non-Enzymatic Isolation and Culture of Channel Catfish Hepatocytes" in *Comparative Biochemistry and Physiology*.

Dave Treber, Director of Conferences and Events, has been chosen to present on "My Heart's in the Arts" at the 20th Annual Conference of the Association of Collegiate Conference and Events Directors - International (ACCED-I) in San Diego March 26-29, 2000. Annually, approximately 10 conference planners are chosen to lead special interest sessions at the conference. His background for this topic, in addition to hosting arts conferences at FSU, is working with the Cultural Events Series in 1998 and being on the Board of the Allegany Arts Council and the panel

that selects grant applications to the arts council. The session description explains that "devotion to the regional arts community reaps benefits to the college/university in prestige, community relations and revenue."


In Case of Fire

Fire alarm procedures for staff:

1. Be familiar with a primary and alternate evacuation route from each area in which you are assigned to work.
2. When an alarm sounds, proceed in a safe and orderly fashion to the nearest clear exit. In cold or inclement weather, take outer clothing
3. Use the secondary exit if there are smoke or flames between you and the primary exit.
4. If you are supervisor, be sure that employees react promptly to the alarm.
5. Use the stairs, not the elevator. Assist any disabled persons. If you can't help the disabled person out of the building, assist him/her to an enclosed stair tower, safe from smoke, flame and gases. If you leave anyone in a stair tower, be sure to notify fire personnel.
6. Instruct students or others to evacuate via the nearest clear exit.
7. Do not congregate near exits.
8. If, in your judgement, time and conditions permit, turn off all heat-generating appliances. Likewise, secure cash, valuables and sensitive data, and shut doors and windows.
9. Do not re-enter the building until University Police give the "all-clear."

Procedures for faculty:

1. Be familiar with a primary and alternate evacuation route from each area that you teach in. Evacuation route information (including instruction not to use elevators) should be shared with students during the first meeting of each class and each time a fire alarm sounds.
2. When an alarm sounds, release the class IMMEDIATELY, telling student to proceed in a safe and orderly fashion to the nearest clear exit. You should evacuate also.
3. Assist any disabled individuals out of the building or to an enclosed stair tower, where they will be protected from flame, smoke and gases. If a disabled person is left in a stair tower, fire
