

STUDENT ASSOCIATION ELECTIONS for President

Four candidates registered themselves for the race for the position of President of the Student Association. The candidates, at the close of petitioning were Ed Newman, Gary Thrift, Walter

Moore, and Dave Willey. Mr. Moore has since removed his name from the ballot. Mr. Willey's candidacy was unknown to **State-to-Date** at the time of the interview of the candidates and Mr. Willey was not present at the meeting held in Lane Center on Friday at 4:00 p.m.

Dave Willey was not interviewed, but he did submit a resume to **State-to-Date**—see column three.

The remaining candidates have been interviewed and here is the result of that meeting.

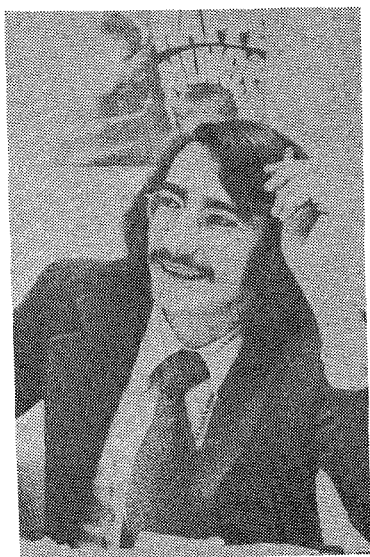
Mr. Thrift, an advanced Junior in the History and Political Science fields, is presently the President of the Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity on the FSC campus, a member of the resident judicial board, a Greek Council representative and member of the program committee of Westminster Hall. In the past, Mr. Thrift has been the assistant secretary of TKE and a dormitory Floor Representative. His goals as President of SA are to improve the image of that organization and to delegate more power to the House and Senate.

Mr. Newman is also an advanced Junior, with majors in Economics and Political Science Departments. Newman is presently the Vice-President of the CCB, Chairman of the Lane Center Policy Board, Chairman of the Judicial Monitoring Committee, and maintains membership in several campus organizations including SA Executive Council, the House of Representatives, the House Budget Committee, and the College Forum. He was formerly news editor and associate editor of the **State-to-Date**. His main issues are

to reorganize the SA and its constitution, improve the

student evaluation of faculty members, help the establishment of a United Publications Board, and to insure adequate and effective student representation in all college assemblies.

The candidates were asked their opinions on the question of salaries for the heads of certain student organizations. Mr. Thrift suggested that the Presidents of the SA and CCB should receive nominal financial payments in return for the time they spend on their duties. Mr. Thrift said that the figure for such payment should be around \$100. He also said that assurances would have to be made that the people who ran for the offices should not simply be trying to get the money. Mr. Newman was of the opinion that the Vice-President of SA and CCB and the heads of the various publications should also receive some remuneration for their work. Newman also said that the payment need not be in money, and instead could be in college Credits. Mr. Thrift thought that the question of money or credits should be left as an option for the individual.

Mr. Newman stated that his new drive with this year's candidacy would be toward a more political posture in the affairs of the campus, and that he was progressing from the planning to the implementation oriented positions within the system.

Concerning his inexperience with the College governmental systems, Mr. Thrift stated that he was attempting in his candidacy to reenter the mainstream of the College.

Both candidates felt a need for continuing efforts to revise the Judicial System on campus and further study on

Facing the nation and the college in these swirling days of controversy is the drastic shortage of energy and power which is necessary to operate an institution such as ours. I am not a novice to college student government. While attending Montgomery College in Takoma Park, Md., I served as a student senator for one year and Student Association President for another. During this time, I took the student's case to the Board of Trustees or anywhere else that I deemed necessary to properly represent my fellow students.

4. To emphasize the student's rights in the use of student activity fees
5. To put the student back into the CCB

Ms. Freiburger has a seven point system of goals as follows:

1. To continue to improve the quality of films and show-cases presented by the CCB
2. To increase cooperative efforts on the part of campus organizations and the CCB in such things as the band dance on December 8 which will feature "Wizard" and is co-sponsored by the CCB, the SA, and the Psychology Club.
3. To get a program of outdoor activities rolling which will include such activities as hiking, camping, and skiing
4. To improve correspondence with nearby colleges for the purpose of block-bookings of big-name entertainment
5. To push for the booking of such entertainers as: the Doobie Brothers, Johnny Winters, Edgar Winters, Dr. John, The Beach Boys, Dr. Hook and his Medicine Show, and the Guess Who
6. Implementation of a coffee house on campus using campus and local talent
7. To work with the people of the campus, specifically of the CCB, to achieve a team effort.

In answer to the question, "Why are you running?" the candidates made the following responses:

Freiburger said, "Because I can do the work that the presidential office requires

(the current CCB President, Joel Shoup, has been training me), I have all the qualifications, I can do the work efficiently, I will enjoy doing the presidency, and because I enjoy CCB already, I know I'll do a fine job."

Corley responded, "To get involved. All I've heard for 2½ years at Frostburg is for the students to start 'giving a damn.' After an extensive period on the outside, I want in. I feel that I can benefit (sic) from this type of experience, and I hope that others can benefit from my leadership."

Trisha McLain, a sophomore and an elementary education major, informed the **State-to-Date** that she is running for the Office of Secretary of the College Center Board.

Trisha is currently aide to the present secretary of CCB and is on the Program Board of CCB. She had been secretary of many clubs in high school. She seeks a more active role in CCB.

Rick Johnson, a junior who majors in business administration, seeks the Office of Vice-President of CCB.

Rick has been a member of CCB for two years, a member of the Program Board, Co-Chairman of this year's Homecoming Off-Campus Dance, and had attended the 1973 ACU-I Region 4 Convention (Association of College Unions-International).

He wants to involve the college community more with CCB and to involve FSC with other colleges and their entertainment through an entertainment circuit.

The Candidates

Vice-President

Information has been submitted to **State-to-Date** in regard to candidacy for the position of Student Association Vice-President. These candidates are Rena Mignosa, an elementary education major, and Kathy Rosmarin, who majors in mathematics. Both are juniors.

Rena has had experience as the Alpha Xi Delta Quill Chairman, has been active in the SA House and Forum, and as the Programs Committee Chairman. She has been the Parent's Weekend Committee Chairman for two years, attended the Leadership Conference, and is on the Who's Who Committee.

The goal Rena hopes to accomplish as Vice-President of SA is to organize the House of Representatives for effective action by appointing students who are willing to work with the faculty, the administration, and with each other to "make FSC what we want it to be."

Kathy Rosmarin has had experience as the Director of Curriculum Improvement, Senate Vice-President, a Forum and a House of Representatives member and has been on the Senate Academic Planning Committee, House Budgetary Committee, Curriculum Committee sub-committee on General Studies, Senate Planning Committee, and the Health Center monitoring board.

If elected, Kathy's goals are to restructure the House of Representatives to insure that members are well-informed, to form a good teacher evaluation, to rectify the parking situation if possible, to sponsor an off-campus housing list readily available to students, and to look into the need for a paid treasurer.

Kathy feels that a person holding the office of SA Vice-President should consider her

position "more important than any other activities she is involved in" and should be willing to work long hours "in this capacity."

Richard Grove is also a candidate for this office, however, at the time of publication **State-to-Date** has no knowledge of this candidate, his qualifications or his aim if elected. We regret our being unable to contact him in time.

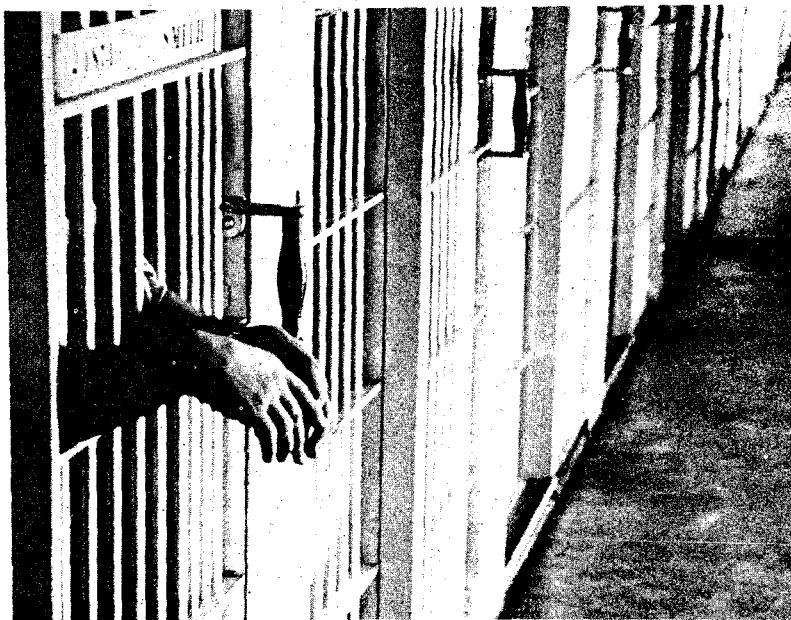
