REV. CHARLES WOLFE.

Among his favorite airs was that deeply mournful one of Grammudore! He was dissatisfied with all the words which had been written for it, even those two verses of Moore's, beginning, "The harp that once through Tum's halls" and said that they all appeared to him to want individuality. At the request of a friend, he gave his own conceptions of tenderness, pathos, and individuality in an eminent degree. The first authentic notice of tea, an article of commerce in England, appears in an act of Parliament, 1650. About 1650, says Macpherson, the East India Company received from Bengal two Cunders containing 143 lbs. of tea, and this is believed to have been the first importation of tea.

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On the 23rd of the year 1660, a duty of 8 pence a pound was exacted for sale of tea, chocolate, and coffee, for sumptuous persons, charged on all. Thus it is certain that tea was then used in England, but did the use of it was new, and its name being general, appears from the following curious memorandum in the diary of Mr. Pepys, the Secretary of the Admiralty: "See, 26th, 1661. I sent to a case of tea, a Chinese drumb, of which I never before drunk."

PERSEVERANCE AND LOVE OF

LEARNING.

The meeting of the Union Lyceum, on the evening of the 3d inst., was favored with an address from W. H. MAYNARD, Esq. on the importance of such associations. He spoke particularly on education as the business of a man's life, and related some interesting facts which had come within his own observation, illustrating the successful attainment of knowledge. One of these he related. Mr. M. gave it with diffidence, but having been requested by a member of the Lyceum to relate it, it was too good to be withheld from motives of personal delusion.

In England, the duties or tax, and the impositions of it, were, in consequence of the 1699 act, by which time the East India Company had through due diligence worth then attention a branch of trade, in a few years the average imposition amounted to 600,000 pounds per annum, the average price of tea, per hundred weight, being 100 pounds, or imported extra-duty, including a duty of 100 pounds, and ever since the imposition and consumption of tea, in that country, all that could be got, which cost them 400 a pound.

Particulars—July 1, 1837.

In compliance with the promise I made in my last I now sit down to give you a few lines to let you know how I am getting along in Old England, though for a traveller I must say I have very few travel stories to tell. *** There is nothing that I can perceive to advise in Parliament except their Militia, it bring the principal Naval Dept. in the kingdom, and are highly armed and garrisoned town, but little else.

In the construction of a code for these desirable purposes the undersigned has acted in obedience to the following considerations:

The public system of this republic embodies not only the constitution and laws of the Federal Government, but the institutions of the component States, and that THE PEOPLE ARE PARAMOUNT TO ALL.

That the mere keeping of the Public Treasuries impairs a beneficial privi-

lege.

That the credit of its circulation is capital of great value.

That the benefits of each and every other prerogative, whether positive or negative, are to be applied to the people, and they cannot be held in a part with out derogating from the equal rights of those to whom such benefits are not extended.

From repeated manifestations of the public sentiment it seems that the people are not disposed to accept any plan purposing to hinder the regulation of the currency and exchanges, nor the depreciation of the distribution of the public money which should be under the control of COMPTROLLER OF THE FEDERAL RESERVE in the executive office of the Government, while a pending invention imperiously demands that SOMETHING SHALL BE DONE.

Under circumstances so peculiar, and so impressive, it becomes a dictate of patriotism to devise an adequate system without the objections to which previous essayed projects have been obnoxious. And if such a system can be constructed, and shall demand itself, then he

CONSTITUTIONAL EXPEDIENT PRACTICABLE, EFFICIENT, AND CONGENIAL TO THE GENIUS AND SPIRIT OF OUR INSTITUTIONS, as well as by other hearings and relations, calculated to promote the GENERAL WELFARE AND PROSPERITY, it may be well assumed that a general & sufficient government will promptly provide the requisite enactments for adoption and operations.
