
Nemacolin, a Delaware Indian, was asked by Thomas Cresap, the first white settler in Western Maryland and founder of Cresaptown, to blaze a trail westward from Cumberland. This trail, known as "Nemacolin's Path," became U.S. Route 40, the first major road to connect the East and West. Frostburg State College was founded on this trail, and thus, the yearbook assumed the Indian name




Step Back

The Foreigner




John Wayne Meyers and Tyron Di Martino

Cited as the best new American play and best off-Broadway production, this 'inspired comic romp" enjoyed a long New York run. Based on what Clive Barnes of the New York Post described as a "devilishly clever idea," the play demonstrates what can happen when a group of devious characters must deal with a character who (they think) knows no English. The scene is a fishing lodge in rural Georgia often visited by "Froggy" LeSeuer, a British demolition expert who occasionally runs training sessions at a nearby army base. This time "Foggy" has brought along a friend, a pathologically shy young man named Charlie who is overcome with fear at the thought of making conversation with strangers. So "Froggy", before departing, tells all assembled that Charlie is from an exotic foreign country and speaks no English. Once alone the fun really begins, as Charlie overhears more than he should—the evil plans of a sinster, two-faced minister and his redneck associate; the fact that the minister's pretty financee is pregnant; and many other damaging revelations made with the thought that Charlie doesn't understand a word of what is being said. Then what he does fuels the nonstop hilarity of the play and sets up the wildly funny climax in which things go uproariously awry for the "bad guys" and "good guys" emerge triumphant.





A MIDSUMMERS NIGHT'S DREAM

A Romantic Comedy by William Shakespeare. Presented Dec. 4, 5, and 6. Quince, Bottom, Oberon, Titania, and Peck—all are well-known characters associated with this favorite of plays. The occasion for this comedy is the planned wedding of Theseus, Duke of Athens, and Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons. At the same time, four young people at Athens are not so happy with the state of their love lives and escape into the woods outside the city. Here, in the same woods on Midsummer Eve, are others outside the city. A Midsummer Night's Dream, comments editor Madeleine Doran, "is called a dream because the improbable events of the story seem to the participants when they are over like something dreamed, true yet not true—such a dream of crossed loves, futile quarrels, and frustrated searches, of fairy spells and strange transformations as belongs to Midsummer Eve."


























A classic of the modern theatre, "Waiting For Godot", in the words of Brooks Atkinson, "is puzzling and convincing at the same time." On Broadway, the play roused audiences to demonstrations of enthusiasm and anger. Many become so intensely devoted to Beckett's work that they returned to see it again and again. Two dilapidated bums fill their days as painlessly as they can. They wait for Godot, a personage who will explain their interminable insignificance, or put an end to it. They are resourceful, with quarrels and their dependence on each other, as children are. They pass the time 'which would have passed away.' A brutal man of means comes by, leading a weakling slave who does his bidding like a mechanical doll. Every day a child comes from the unknown Godot, and evasively puts the big arrival off until tomorrow It is a tragic view. Yet, in performance, most of it is brilliant, bitter comedy. It is a portrait of the dogged resilience of a man's spirit in the face of little hope."














Shindig II






Alpha Kappa Alpha


The Football team had a disapointing season, but with the hiring of new Head Coach Dennis Riccio, the team hopes to come back stronger than ever next year.

This season was a time of change for the Bobcats. John Miller became the new defensive coordinator and brought a new philosophy to the defense. For the first time, in many years, there was a tremendous turnout at pre-season practice which included many upper classmen as well as new freshmen. Coach Peterson was highly optimistic about the upcoming season. The coaching staff believed an excellent year was to come despite the loss of key player Bill Bagley who had previously broken a number of school records and been named Kodack All-American. The only potential problem was the tough schedule the Bobcats faced.

Frostburg's schedule was one of the toughest in Division III football. The Bobcats played a number of teams ranked among the top twenty in the division. These teams ranged from the likes of the University of Dayton, to the University of Buffalo, and to state rival Salisbury State College.

The Bobcats won the first game of the year. The defense held the West Liberty College Hilltoppers to just 93 yards. The defense also set up the first touchdown with Scott McElfish throwing to freshman wide receiver James Talbott in the endzone to seal the victory.


After this game, the Bobcats suffered a series of disappointing losses. Many of these defeats were by very small margins. These losses were so upsetting because the scores were so close, but they just couldn't pull off the wins. Other losses were not so close, but they provided excellent learning experiences for the team. However, Frostburg was able

to win two more games during the lack-luster season. In these two games, the Bobcats brought it all together and showed what a team effort could produce—results in terms of wins.

There was also very good performances during the 1986 season. Several of the players received special recognitions. There were three players who received ECAC Honers, Tony Harrington against West Liberty, Dale Piper against Newport News, and Marcus Wooley against Buffalo. Also, Bill Nolan was named ECAC Defensive Player of the week against Waynesburg College. The biggest personal award of the year was Marcus Wooley being named to the Kodak All-American team. Wooley broke the FSC single season tackle record with 141 tackles. He also had 10 sacks this season and 15 tackles for loses that totaled 110 yards. Over his three year career, he has accumulated a total of 341 tackles, 65 for losses of 460 yards and 47 quarterback sacks. Not only did Marcus break records but so did the defense. They set a single season record for fumbles recovered at 31 and they also set the game record at seven. The total turnovers collected was set this season at 10 in one game. This past season has been a very big learning experience. With all the returning players, the Bobcats should be able to set many more records and also return to winning
