Teachers Sponsor Student Loan Fund

The administration of funds to be lent to students is now in the hands of a Student Loan Fund Committee composed of Miss Brady, Miss Hamilton, and Mr. Rissler. This means that students need no longer work through the bank. In addition, the new notes being issued are such that they no longer need be renewed every three years, as was the case with the old notes.

The general working of the Fund is about the same as it was previously. Money is available to be loaned to students in need of financial assistance on the following schedule: students who have not completed two years of college can borow up to \$100; those who have completed two but three years of work can borrow up to \$200; students who have completed more than three years of college can borow up to \$300.

In every case the loan is to be repaid within three years after graduation. No interest is charged on loans until one year after graduation; after this time a charge of 6% is made on the unpaid balance. Charges on these loans are made in this fashion to encourage repayment within the first year after graduation; thus the money in the Fund is made available to a maximum number of students without imposing undue hardship on any borrower. There is no limit on the number of loans any one student can make; the only limit imposed is the total value of loans to any one person.

Students desiring further information or applications for a loan from the Student Loan Fund should contact Mr. Rissler, treasurer, Student Loan Fund Committee.






