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PERFORMER BIOGRAPHIES

Nathan Buckner

Nathan Buckner has appeared throughout the United States as well as in Europe, Asia and Latin-America as a soloist and chamber musician. Solo performances include recitals at Alice Tully Hall (New York) and the Kennedy Center (Washington); chamber collaborations include DaCapo Chamber Players (Merkin Hall, New York), Contemporary Music Forum (Corcoran Gallery, Washington), Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts (Chicago) and Abbey Bach Festival (Mount Angel, Oregon). Buckner's editions of the piano works of 19th century American composer Philip Antony Corri are published by Kallisti Music Press of Philadelphia, and his article on the composer appears in the New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians. Buckner is Professor of Piano at University of Nebraska at Kearney. He holds the B.M. from The Juilliard School, an M.M. from Indiana University and a D.M.A. from University of Maryland. He studied piano with Edward Auer, Shoshana Cohen, Olegna Fuschi, Thomas Schumacher and Beveridge Webster, and early keyboard practice with Albert Fuller.

Geneque Garrison

Geneque Garrison was born in Salisbury, MD, where she began her piano studies at the age of 8 as a homeschooled student. Completing her A.A. in general studies in 2017, she graduated from Wor-Wic Community College with honors as an elected officer of the Alpha Nu Omicron chapter of Phi Theta Kappa National Honors Society, receiving an award for excellence in leadership. Currently, she is a junior at Salisbury University where she is pursuing a degree in music in the education and music technology tracks, and studying piano with Dr. Linda Cockey. She is very active in the Salisbury community teaching music lessons, accompanying, and performing in various recitals for Salisbury University's Department of Music, Theatre, and Dance. Also, she is currently a student piano instructor for Salisbury University's PRESTO program.

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Sungryung Kim

Sungryung Kim was born in Seoul, South Korea, where she began her piano studies at the age of 7. In 2008, she received the award of excellence in a youth piano competition in Korea. Since coming to the U.S. in 2011, she has been active accompanying area high schools in concerts and festivals. Currently, she is a sophomore at SU where she is pursuing a degree in music - performance and studying with Dr. Linda Cockey. She is very active accompanying choirs and performing on various recitals in the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance.

Sachiho Murasugi

SachihoMurasugi has performed extensively as a professional orchestral and chamber musician throughout the U.S., Mexico and Spain. She has been a member of the Louisiana Philharmonic and West Virginia Symphony and performed regularly with the Omaha Symphony and the Dayton Philharmonic. Sachi holds performance degrees from Manhattan School of Music and the Ohio State University where she received her D.M.A. Previous teachers include the famed Russian American pedagogue Raphael Bronstein, as well as Daniel Phillips and violist Catharine Carroll. Currently, she is concertmaster for the Salisbury Symphony Orchestra and a full-time lecturer at SU. Additionally, she performs regularly with regional professional orchestras such as Annapolis Symphony, is treasurer of the American String Teachers' Association MD/DC Chapter and pursues her interest in Japanese traditional music.

Jeffrey Schoyen

Conductor and music director of the Salisbury Symphony and the Salisbury Youth Orchestra, Schoyen teaches cello and bass, and is Professor of Music at SU. He has given concerts throughout the United States, Germany, Mexico, Spain and Ecuador. He has been a recipient of the Frank Huntington Beebe Grant to study in London with William Pleeth and also the Tanglewood Gustav Golden Award. Schoyen is a graduate of the New England Conservatory and holds a D.M.A. from SUNY - Stony Brook where he was a student of Timothy Eddy.
