King Arthur or *The British Worthy* is a semi-opera in five acts based on the battles between King Arthur's Britons and the Saxons. The libretto is by John Dryden. Known as a Restoration spectacular or machine play with its elaborate sets, ornate costumes and special effects, the work is acclaimed for the Frost Scene in Act 3, which contains "The Cold Song," sung by the character Cold Genius.

Based on a libretto by Aaron Hill and Giacomo Rossi, the opera *Rinaldo* takes place in 1099. In this Act I aria, Argante (King of Jerusalem) exits from the city in a triumphal chariot pulled by horses. He is followed by a great number of guards on foot and men on horses, and he descends in a solemn cortège to approach Goffredo, leader of the First Crusade, who has agreed to meet him.

MUSICIAN BIOGRAPHIES

Jeremiah Copeland, tenor, is a native of Salisbury, MD. A junior pursuing degrees in music and theatre, he is the 2018 first place and 2019 second place winner of the MD-DC NATS Student Auditions (Men's Lower and Upper College Musical Theatre Categories). During his time at SU, he has played the roles of Nick Bottom in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, Seaweed in *Hairspray* and, most recently, Judas in *Jesus Christ Superstar*. Copeland was runner-up and winner of a \$500 Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship awarded at the Kennedy Center America College Theatre Festival in 2018. He also received the award for Vocal Excellence given by the Voice and Speech Trainers Association.

Kara Dahl Russell is a working professional interdisciplinary artist. Russell is adjunct professor of applied harp at SU, the pre-concert lecturer for Mid-Atlantic Symphony Orchestra and the director for the Summer Children's Theatre Academy at the Mar-Va Theatre. As a classical music radio host, Russell achieved the rare recognition of three Associated Press Awards for Classical Music Education Series. Russell is in demand for solo and chamber work, teaches private harp lessons, and regularly presents recitals and touring performance programs as harpist and singer.

Jeffrey Todd, baritone, is a senior music - vocal performance major and native of Salisbury, MD. He has garnered numerous awards, including first place wins at the state and regional NATS competitions in 2016, 2017 and 2019, and he was awarded second place at the National NATS Student Auditions held in Boulder, CO in summer 2017. He also had the privilege of being a recipient of the Nettie C. Bentley Music Scholarship in the spring semesters of 2017 and 2018. Todd has been seen in multiple performances at the University, including principal roles in the respective Music Theater and Opera Theater workshop ensembles, most recently having portrayed the role of Pilate in *Jesus Christ Superstar*. In addition to theatre, Todd has been a soloist for the Salisbury University Chorale and was featured as a soloist in the SU Percussion Ensemble's performance of George Crumb's *Songs, Drones and Refrains of Death*. Todd was a student participant in an international cast of young artists in the acclaimed *OperaWorks* program in Northridge, CA, and was recently selected as a scholarship participant for the Mostly Modern Festival in Saratoga Springs, NY, for summer 2019.

June Rose Todd, music director and pianist, graduated from West Chester University with a Bachelor of Science in music education. She has been director of music at Atlantic United Methodist Church in Ocean City, MD, since 1962 and organist at Temple Bat Yam since 1998. Todd is also the founder of the Pine Tones Chorus and has acted as music director for 35 years. She is so pleased and proud that her grandson Jeffrey Todd has decided to pursue a career in music.

Veronica Tomanek, music director and pianist, is on the music faculty of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore in the Department of Fine Arts. She is also pianist/coach for the Wright vocal studio in the Music Program at Salisbury University, and she serves as the music director at St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Salisbury. Tomanek has taught at the University of Connecticut, Wesleyan University and Brookdale Community College in Lincroft, NJ. She frequently performs throughout the mid-Atlantic and New England as a chamber musician, piano and organ soloist, choral director, music director, and keyboard player for musical theatre productions. She has also performed with the Eastern Connecticut Symphony Orchestra, the United States Coast Guard Band and Chamber Players, the Silver Bay Quartet, and with many other instrumentalists, vocalists and choral groups. She has a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies in Music Education from Boston University, a Master of Music in piano performance from the University of Connecticut and a diploma in piano performance from the Rouen Conservatory, Rouen, France. She lives in Salisbury, MD.
