FSU First Stop on Alzheimer's Foundation's Raise Your Voice For Care College Tour

The Alzheimer's Foundation of America Raise Your Voice For Care College Tour will kick off its national campaign at FSU on **Wednesday, Nov. 5**, in the Lane University Center. The day-long event will include a Healthzone Health Fair with free memory and blood pressure screenings, educational sessions, giveaways, brain games and music.

Sessions on healthy living and care issues will occur throughout the day, beginning at noon. "Introduction to Alzheimer's" at noon and 4 p.m. will explore the illness and its effects on individuals, family and caregivers; a "Caregiver Panel" from noon to 1 p.m. will offer insight from multigenerational caregivers; and a "Quilt to Remember" from noon to 4 p.m. will pay tribute to all those who have passed or are living with dementia and their families.

At 1 p.m., there will be a session on "Music Therapy," which includes a Q&A about songwriting and the healing power of music with musician Michael Pearsall of the band Honor By August. Later, from 2 to 3 p.m., "Career and Service Opportunities" will explore health-related career fields, service-learning and volunteer opportunities.

To top off the day, Honor By August will take the stage at 7:30 p.m. (See below for more info.)

Participants at the event will include FSU's Brady Health Center and Activities for Life, PharmaCare and the Western Maryland Health System.

AFA was founded by a consortium of organizations to provide optimal care and services to individuals confronting dementia, and to their caregivers and families through member organizations dedicated to improving quality of life.

Raise Your Voice For Care is an initiative of AFA's On Campus division, created to raise awareness and engage and empower the younger generation of advocates and champions for the cause on a nationwide campus level.

Department of Music to Present Vocal Studio Recitals

The FSU Department of Music will present Vocal Studio Recitals on **Sunday, Nov. 9**, the first recital at 3 p.m. and the second at 7 p.m.

Students studying under **Dr. Karen Sarnaker**, **Dr. Mariana Mihai-Zoeter** and **Dr. Stephen Soebbing** will perform one to two pieces each. These performances will cover a wide range of composers, styles and periods. The vocalist performances will be accompanied by pianists **Dr. Jay DeWire** and **Dr. Sean Beachy**.

Dr. Brent Weber and FSU Faculty to Perform Recital

Dr. Brent Weber, performing bassoon and saxophone, and FSU faculty artists will perform a recital titled “Some of My Best Friends Are …,” on **Thursday, Nov. 13**, at 7:30 p.m. The title of the recital reflects the collaboration between several of the instruments. It is free and open to the public.

Trombonist **Huai-en Tsai** will accompany Weber’s performance of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart’s three-movement piece “Sonata in B-flat Major, K. 292.” Willson Osborne’s “Rhapsody for Bassoon,” one of the most widely performed solo works for the bassoon, will next be performed by Weber. Following that is Francis Poulenc’s “Sonata for Clarinet and Bassoon” that is dedicated to the memory of the composer’s old friend; there is a fast-slow-fast pattern, which gives a sense of grieving. **Dr. Mark Gallagher** will accompany the performance on the clarinet.

Following a brief intermission, Weber and **Gary Phillips** on the marimba will play Akira Yuyama’s “Divertimento for Marimba and Alto Saxophone,” which has a fast-paced tempo. The performance of Paul Hayden’s “Janus for Flute and Alto Saxophone” will include a solo by **Dr. Keith Hanlon** on the flute. Weber will conclude the recital with a performance of Jakob ter Veldhuis’ “Billie,” which was written for saxophone and boom box.

Coming to MCTA – Davis & Elkins College Appalachian Ensemble



Mountain City Traditional Arts, at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg, will host the Davis & Elkins College Appalachian Ensemble on **Friday, Nov. 14**, and **Saturday, Nov 15**, for a weekend of performances and workshops featuring the region’s traditional music and dance. Supported in part by an artist exchange grant from the Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation, all performances and workshops are free and open to the public.

The ensemble was named the “People’s Choice for Entertainment” for its performance at the 2013 and 2014 Ramps and Rails Festival in Elkins, W.Va. The group has performed at the FSU

Appalachian Festival, Berea Celebration of Traditional Music, Pocahontas County Opera House, Tamarack and many others.

Festivities kick off Friday at 6 p.m. with a presentation by the ensemble’s dance director, Becky Hill. Hill will share segments from the documentary “Reel ‘Em Boys, Reel ‘Em” she produced, which documents Appalachian dance and traditions in communities throughout West Virginia. At 8 p.m., the ensemble will perform a showcase of music and dance from the Appalachian region and beyond, focusing on the intersections of different American vernacular forms and their roots, including old-time music, flatfooting jazz, tap dance, Irish sean nós dance and numerous traditional American styles of harmony singing.

Saturday begins with a Harmony Singing workshop at 11 a.m. exploring the intricacies of harmony and encouraging community collaboration. At 2 p.m., the group will offer a workshop for musicians focusing on playing for dancers.

An Appalachian clogging and flatfooting workshop at 3 p.m. will start with the clogging basics and gradually build, giving participants the tools to create their own steps. All levels are welcome.

The weekend concludes with an event from 6 to 8 p.m. pulling together all elements of the weekend and ending with a participatory community dance. The segment will include a brief student showcase, a few ensemble pieces and a community square dance.

Frostburg’s Center for Creative Writing will present Stephen Dunn on **Saturday, Nov. 1**, from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Lyric Theatre at 20 E. Main St. in Frostburg. This event is free and open to the public.

Dunn is the author of 16 books, including “Lines of Defense,” “The Insistence of Beauty,” “Everything Else in the World,” “What Goes On: Selected and New Poems,” “Here and Now: Poems” and “Different Hours,” which won the 2001 Pulitzer Prize for poetry.

He received an Academy Award in Literature from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, three National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowships and fellowships from the Guggenheim and Rockefeller foundations.

Since 1974, he has taught at Richard Stockton College of New Jersey, where he is the Distinguished Professor of Creative Writing. He’s also been a visiting professor at the University of Washington, NYU, Columbia and the University of Michigan.

His work has appeared in The Atlantic, The Nation, New Republic, New Yorker, The Georgia Review and American Poetry Review.

FSU Homecoming Court Raises More Than \$4,600 for Charities

FSU’s 2014 Homecoming Court, representing eight on-campus organizations, raised more than \$4,600 for local and national charities. These students upheld the 10-year fundraising tradition that accompanies Homecoming by raising \$4,615.46, which is \$1,200 more than last year. **Keith Smith** and **Ly-Anh McCoy** were named Homecoming King and Queen.

McCoy’s organization supported the Pantry Partners, a collaborative program between Frostburg Rotary and Foundation for Frostburg to support the Frostburg Area Interfaith Food Pantry.

McCoy is a member of the Delta Zeta sorority, which raised \$459.71. She is also Greek Council president.

Smith’s organization raised \$75 to support the Big Brothers, Big Sisters charity, a youth mentoring organization. Smith represents the Omega Psi Phi fraternity and plays on the FSU football team as a safety.

Lauren Grady, Alpha Sigma Tau sorority member, won the recognition for the most money raised. Grady raised \$1,510 toward Ovarian Cancer Research in memory of her mother, who passed away from the disease this May.

The Homecoming Court included **Sadie Bolyard** representing the Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority, which raised \$1,215 for Baltimore Adapted Recreation and Sports; **Bianca Shields** representing the Delta Sigma Theta sorority, which raised \$577.75 for the Family Crisis Resource Center; **Pernell Parents** representing the Iota Phi Theta fraternity, which raised \$453 for St. Jude’s Children’s Hospital; **Zachary Sparber** representing the Phi Mu Delta fraternity, which raised \$275 for Garrett Habitat for Humanity; and **Jeremy Marshall** representing the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, which raised \$50 for the Allegany County Animal Shelter Management Foundation.

Participants spent a three-week period raising money for their selected charity. Candidates required sponsorship from a University organization, needed to raise at least \$50 and wrote a short essay, which accompanied their name on the ballot. Homecoming King and Queen were chosen by popular vote that took place the week of homecoming.

The winners were crowned on Thursday, Oct. 16, during the pep rally and presented during half time of the football game on Saturday, Oct. 18.

Drs. King, Allen and Ramspott Collaborate on New Project



During early October, Dr. Helen King, Department of Geography, Northumbria University, visited FSU to undertake primary fieldwork for a new project located near Dolly Sods, W.Va. The project is a collaboration with **Dr. Phil Allen** and **Dr. Matt Ramspott** from FSU's Department of Geography to develop and apply novel techniques examining boulder field dynamics using the developing field of unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV). The fieldwork was supported by FSU undergraduate **Brad Herget** (earth science) and graduate student **Jade Llewellyn** (applied ecology). Future sites were identified and two small boulder fields were surveyed. UAV flights are being planned for March 2015, when King will return.

FSU Music Faculty and Students Participate in MMEA Conference

Frostburg Bars Ace Spring Compliance Checks, Receive Modified Compliance Checks in Future

The Frostburg Community Coalition (FCC) is celebrating the results of compliance checks conducted to determine if Frostburg bars were serving underage patrons during spring 2014. Not a single violation was reported out of 103 checks performed at the local establishments that had signed FCC's Cooperating Alcohol Agreement.

In appreciation for their diligence in preventing underage drinking, a new program will be instituted that will use fewer law enforcement checks, but will add a Secret Shopper Program. This program will allow the businesses' managers the chance to correct issues with their staff members that resulted in a "fail to card" notice without the threat of fines or liquor license retraction that comes with checks conducted by law enforcement officers.

These programs are part of Frostburg Community Coalition's and the city of Frostburg's ongoing efforts to decrease underage drinking in the Frostburg community. Compliance checks of local bars are performed by Allegany County Sheriff's Office several times a semester. These compliance checks occur when an underage person, under surveillance, attempts to order alcohol from a bar.

The results of the checks, spanning from March 3 to May 28, show a significant decrease from the seven violations reported during the fall 2013 semester.

Three Frostburg businesses are newly signed members of the Cooperating Alcohol Agreement: Bar Monkey, Midland Sportsman Club and Byrnesies Bar. Ten establishments have renewed their Cooperating Alcohol Agreement, good from Aug. 26, 2014, until June 30, 2015: FBar, Dante's, Wild Things, Zen-Shi, the American Legion, Knights of Columbus, the Outback Lounge, Gladstones, Yamato Steakhouse and The Draft.

The agreement includes other incentives for establishments that sign on, including TIPS (Training for Intervention Procedures) for all employees and Card 101 training for managers paid for by the Frostburg Community Coalition. TIPS teaches bar staff how to responsibly handle the sale, service and consumption of alcohol, while Card 101 offers education in advanced carding techniques, doorman training and conflict resolution. Establishments that sign the agreement also receive resources for sponsorship of mutually agreed-on events that promote low-risk consumption of alcohol and the leasing of ID scanners and other ID detection tools for spotting fake IDs for special events.

FSU Students, Savage River Watershed to Launch Marcellus Shale Listening Project



FSU students are partnering with the Savage River Watershed Association to participate in "Marcellus Shale in Mountain Maryland: A Listening Project" to document local hopes and concerns regarding proposed unconventional natural gas extraction in Western Maryland. While there has been much debate about drilling in the area, little has been done to assess public opinion to assist state and local government officials and county planners.

Modeling their work after similar successful projects in Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania, students are scheduling community listening days in Frostburg, Mount Savage, Finzel, Lonaconing, Westernport and Grantsville and encourage area residents to stop by and share their opinions. Working in teams, students will also conduct a limited number of door-to-door interviews in some areas.

A full listing of community listening events and selected neighborhoods will be available on the project's blog at <http://fsumslp.blogspot.com> and updated regularly. Research results will be shared on the blog, along with a full report of the findings made available in May 2015. Plans are also under way to host a public event sharing the findings in late spring.

Two FSU classes will work on this project throughout the academic year – “Folklore in Appalachia” in fall 2014 and “Sociology of the Environment” in spring 2015. Both courses are taught by **Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas**, an associate professor in the Department of Sociology at FSU. Students are being trained to listen, record and respect a full range of opinions and attitudes, while avoiding imposing an agenda or opinion-based approach to the topic.

The project is one of a number of experiential learning projects in the Appalachian region supported by the Appalachian Regional Commission's Teaching Project administered through East Tennessee State University. In December, FSU students will join participants from more than 15 regional institutions to share their work with ARC representatives. In March, students will travel to Johnson City, Tenn., to present a summary of their findings at the annual meeting of the Appalachian Studies Association.
