LONDON, August 23.

It has been computed by those who are good Judges in West-Indian Affairs, that by cramping the Trade with the Spaniards in America, we have already been Sufferers in the Sum of 100,000 hard Pistoles.

We can assure the Public, that the most vigorous Measures are taking for obtaining immediate Satisfaction and Redress for the late Outrage at Turk's Island.

On Monday Evening a Messenger was sent from the Secretary of State's Office to the Earl of Hertford, his Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, with Dispatches of Importance.

Numbers of the Nobility and Gentry, who were not expected in Town till the Meeting of Parliament, are daily arriving from their Country Seats, by which it is conjectured that something important is on the Carpet. Thirty-two have arrived this Week.

Extract of a Letter from Hamburg, August 1.

"A new Scene of Horror has stained the Annals of Russia, and furnished Occasion to many Reflections, which Prudence obliges me to pass over in Silence until the Circumstances and Causes of this strange Event are laid open before the Public. The Event itself is as follows: One Mierenhoff, a Lieutenant in the Regiment of Smolensko, came with a Detachment of about 30 Men, by Night, the 15th of last Month, to the Fortress of Stutzelburg, where the young Prince Ivan, or John, was removed some Time ago, by the Order of the Empress, from the Place of Confinement that has long been allotted to his unfortunate Family. This Lieutenant presented to the Governor of the Fortress a forged Order from the Empress, to the following Purpose: 'That her Majesty had formed the Resolution of resigning the Imperial Crown of Russia, and of putting it on the Head of Prince Ivan, whom, in Conscience, she was obliged to acknowledge as the lawful Heir and Sovereign of Russia, and that she therefore commanded the Governor to set the Prince at Liberty.' The Governor, looking upon this Declaration as an Imposition, refused to comply with it, shut the Gates upon Mierenhoff, and ordered his Men to Arms. Mierenhoff, on the other Hand, seemed to make Preparations for forcing the Governor to a Compliance, upon which the latter entered the Apartment of the young Prince, whom he murdered in his Bed with the most unrelenting Barbarity. The first Blow was but slight, and only served to awaken the unfortunate Prince, who struggled some Time for his Life, and even broke the Governor's Sword in the Scuffle; but Assistance was called for, and another bloody Assassin appeared, who finished the horrid Work. When the unhappy Ivan had expired in the Hands of these execrable Russians, the Governor opened the Gates of the Fortress, exposed the dead Body, stabbed in above ten Places, to the View of Mierenhoff and his Company, and said, in a taunting and insolent Manner, 'There is your Emperor—let him now Head you—he will undoubtedly make a fine Figure on the Imperial Throne.' Mierenhoff seemed to shew less Surprise and Indignation at the Conduct of the barbarous Governor, than might have been expected from a Person, who had espoused sincerely the Interests of the massacred Prince. He took off his Sash, and gave himself up tamely Prisoner to the Governor, saying, with more Calmness than suited such a horrid Catastrophe, 'That, since his Master was dead, it was in vain to make any farther Resistance!'—This unhappy Prince was about 24 Years old. He was the eldest Son of Anthony Ulric, second Brother to the reigning Duke of Brunswick, and of Anne, Daughter of Charles Leopold, Duke of Mecklenburg Schwerin, and Grand-Daughter of Czar Peter the Great. He was a Prince of great Spirit, nor had the Hardships of a perpetual State of Confinement extinguished that Vigour of Mind, and those happy Talents, which so eminently characterize the illustrious House of Brunswick. It is true, the bare Fate of his Family had something in it peculiarly afflicting to a generous Mind; and lighter Calamities have been known to impair the Understandings of Men, that were far from being destitute of Courage and Resolution. It has also been alleged, that this was, in a certain Degree, the Case of the late unhappy Victim of Russian Barbarity; but this is a Mistake, and perhaps his untimely End will be considered by many as, at least, a presumptive

Evidence, that he was no Idiot. Few, indeed, have had Access to this Prince, and few therefore can testify either for or against his Abilities; but Truth, like Fame, will often force its Way through the best guarded Passages so far, at least, as that some of its Reports will reach the Ears of the Public; and according to these Reports, the unfortunate Ivan, whose Fate the Voice of Nations will deplore, was a Prince whose Sentiments and Understanding rendered him much more worthy of a Crown, than many even of those who have worn one with Reputation. Be that as it may, Humanity will drop a Tear upon his Grave, and contemplate with a Sigh the Uncertainty of human Grandeur. It will also look with the most painful Feelings of Anxiety and Distress, towards those inhospitable Walls, that still contain a noble Prince, whose Happiness it will be to remain in Ignorance of his Son's tragical End, and four youthful and illustrious Captives, who have the Misfortune to descend from PETER the Great."

August 25. A Courier arrived here Yesterday Morning from Spain, with Dispatches to our Court.

On Thursday Night died at Tunbridge Wells, where he went for the Recovery of his Health, the Right Hon. Henry Bilson Legge, Esq; Uncle to the Earl of Dartmouth, some Time Chancellor of the Exchequer, Member for the County of Southampton, and Fellow of the Royal Society.

All the English Settlements in the Channel of Bahama, are ordered to be put in a thorough State of Defence.

It is now said, that our Naval Strength in the West-Indies is to be augmented with all Expedition by fifteen Ships of the Line, to be manned chiefly with turn-overs from other Ships daily paying off at Portsmouth, Plymouth and Chatham.

The Guard-Ships at Portsmouth have Orders to augment each Ship with 30 Men.

On board the Manilla Ship, the Sante Trinidad, bound from thence for Aquapulco, and brought to England by some of Admiral Cornish's Squadron, there are 85,112 Pair of Silk Stockings, 20,000 Pieces of India Handkerchiefs, Silk thrown and raw, China Ware a large Quantity, India Piece Goods of all Sorts, silk and white Cloth, a great Quantity of Mullins of all Sorts, Drugs, Spices, &c.

The Naturalization of Three foreign Personages of high Distinction, we are informed, is now resolved upon.

It is now said the late Dismissal of some Persons from their Employments is like to be a Fund for much political Altercation in the ensuing Sessions.

It is said the Re-settlement of the Island of Rattan in the Bay of Honduras, is now upon the Carpet: This Place will not only be very advantageous in the Logwood Trade, but also be a rendezvous for our Shipping on the Musquito Shore, and very advantageously situated for Commerce with the Spaniards.—A Scheme of this kind was undertaken six and twenty Years ago, by Major Caulfield, in the Litchfield Man of War from Jamaica, but came to nothing.

August 30. Monday last was the Day fixed for the Election of a King of Poland, in a large Field near Warsaw; when it is imagined, from several concurring Circumstances mentioned in Letters from Poland, that Count Poniatowski was chosen.

Some foreign Advices seem to intimate, that the late extraordinary Preparations of the French and Spaniards in their Marine, were resolved upon, in Consequence of undoubted Intelligence received from their Agents in this Kingdom, that a Change in the English Ministry would assuredly take Place before Christmas.

It is said a Quantity of Ordnance, and three Companies of Foot, will shortly embark, for the better Protection of the English Settlements on Black River, Musketo Shore.

The Shipwrights and Caulkers in his Majesty's Yard at Plymouth, now work a Day and one Tide, for the more speedily completing the Men of War ordered to be fitted out for foreign Service.

September 1. It is said our Ambassador at Paris, on presenting the Memorial on the Behaviour of the French at Turk's Island, received but a very evasive and unsatisfactory Answer; having been told, according to the Quibbling of that Court, that it should be enquired into, but required Time.

It is now said, should the French persist in their Design of sending Troops to Corsica, an English Fleet may possibly visit the Mediterranean in a little Time.

This Week arrived in Town very strong Remonstrances from the Northern Colonies, with Respect to their cramped Trade, by Means of some late Regulations in America:—As did also several Petitions from the British Islands in the West Indies: All which are preparing, by their respective Agents, to be laid before the ensuing Parliament.

At some late Sales of American Furrs, great Quantities have been bought up by French Agents, at so high a Price as 1 l. 17 s. per lb the best Beaver: So greatly are they pinched to carry on this valuable Manufactory, since the Cession of Canada to Great-Britain.

In Consequence of the late Regulations in the Marine, there are now few Ports of any Note, either in the Adriatick, Mediterranean, or Coasts of Italy, where regular Contracts are not entered into, for the occasional future Supply of his Majesty's Ships and Transports with every Requisite both in War, Victualling, and Furniture. And the same Precaution has also been taken in the Baltic.

Three new 74 Gun Ships are ordered to be built in Greenland Dock with all Expedition, in the Room of some old Men of War of that Rate to be laid up.

Sept. 4. On Friday Night, at Ten o'Clock, his Royal Highness the Duke of York landed at Dover from Calais, where his Royal Highness lay that Night, and on Saturday at Noon he arrived in good Health at his House in Pall-Mall; he afterwards waited on the Princess Dowager of Wales at Carlton-House, and at Five o'Clock set out for Richmond, to visit their Majesties, who received him very affectionately.

Yesterday his Royal Highness was at Court, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and foreign Ministers, on his safe Arrival in England.

Saturday some Sailors were employed in pasting up, in all the public Places, printed Bills, to encourage all able-bodied Seamen to enter on board his Majesty's Ships of War, now lying at Portsmouth.

Three rendezvous Houses are actually opened in Wapping, to enter 1500 Men to Man the Guard-ships, and three Ships of War, which are going out on an Expedition.

We are credibly informed, that a certain patriotic Member of an august Assembly, strenuously advised the securing the Salt Islands in the West-Indies at all Events, and from every Insult, if we tendered our Fishery or the Dignity of the British Name in Europe; it having been fully proved, that two of these Places are intirely English Property.

A Transport in the River is now taking on board several Artillery Stores, Fire-arms, and Bayonets, for Bermuda.

It is said a very considerable Duty will be laid next Sessions on the Exportation of Furrs and Beaver to France, in order to prevent our being rivalled by any other Nation in this Manufactory.

They write from Bristol, that the principal Merchants of that City intend to support with all their Interest the independent free Trade of the North American Colonies, the late unnatural Restraint upon which, from their large Connections with England, has already occasioned some Alarms, that if not timely removed, may be attended with very melancholy Consequences, with regard to the Credit of North-America.

An Account of the Election of the King of Poland is expected to arrive here, by a Courier, on Thursday next.

Sept. 6. All the Ships that are sitting out for Sea, both at Chatham and Sheerness, are ordered to be victualled and manned with all Expedition.

The Event of the Election of a King of Poland is hourly expected. These Elections are held near Warsaw in an open Field, surrounded with Ditches, and covered over with Boards; the Poles call it the Szopa, or Cola: On the Day fixed for opening the Dyet, the Senators and Nuncios are present at the Celebration of a Mass of the Holy Ghost in the Cathedral Church of St. John at Warsaw; after which they repair to the Cola; and when they have elected a Marshal of the Nuncios, they

form a Confederation or Treaty, by which the Members of the Dyet take an Oath, not to separate till they have elected a King, and not to acknowledge any Candidate, if he has not been chosen by their unanimous Approbation, nor render him any Act of Obedience, till he has sworn to observe the Pacta Conventa, and the other Laws of the Kingdom.

It is currently reported, that some considerable Removals will soon take place by Consent of both Parties, in consequence of a certain Scheme of Mediation, offered by a great Personage, whose good Offices the Heads of either will find it their Account to accept, in order to restore the public Tranquility.

Monday Night Orders came down to his Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, to fit out immediately the Thunderer Man of War, Captain Hood, for Sea.

The St. Alban's Man of War of 64 Guns, lately launched at Blackwall, is fitting for Sea at Woolwich with all Expedition.

Sept. 8. A Vessel lately arrived at Rouen, and that touched in her Passage at Gibraltar, reports, that she saw an English Frigate bring in there a Sallee Rover, of considerable Force.

We can assure the Public, that the Answer of the Court of France to the Memorial presented by his Majesty's Ambassador there, complaining of what had lately passed at Turk's Island, contains as strong a Disavowal of the Violence committed there by the Count d'Estaing, and as explicit Assurances of their Resolution to cultivate the Continuance of the Public Tranquility as Words can convey; and that upon the first Rumour of this Transaction, even previous to their receiving our Representations, they had dispatched a Corvette with Orders to Count d'Estaing, requiring an Account of the Motives of his Conduct.

Several Private Letters from Berlin, which arrived Yesterday by the Dutch Mails, bring Advice, that Count Poniatowski was elected King of Poland, in the usual Form, on the 27th ult. under the Name of Stanislaus the Second. These Letters add, that the Election Tent was 20 Fathoms long, and eight wide, lined with red Cloth, with a Wall behind, and a Bank on each side; and that the Regalia, which was brought to Warsaw by the Bishop of Culm on the 22d from Cracow, consisted of Five Crowns, Four Scepters, a Globe, Three Gold Chains, and a Sable richly ornamented.

There are some Advices by the last French Mail, which mention, that the Court of Spain have determined to effect a Settlement somewhere on the Coast of Guiney, for the better supplying their extensive American Dominions with Slaves, without being obliged to purchase them with such vast Sums from Foreigners.—Three Men of War sailed the 18th ult. for this Purpose.

ANNAPOLIS, November 1.

We are assured, that the General Assembly of this Province, which now stands Prorogued to the 17th Instant, will not Then meet; but that a Proclamation of a Dissolution, and Writs for a General Election, will Issue, before that Time.

Last Friday Evening, about VII o'Clock, when it was very Cold and Windy, the Town was Alarm'd with the Cry of FIRE. It proved to be in the Chimney of a House, near the Public Buildings, formerly the Residence of Governor CALVERT: The Chimney was extreme Dirty, and burnt near an Hour, and the House, which is high, old, and built of Wood, catch'd in many Places; but by the extraordinary Vigilance and Activity of the Inhabitants, with the Assistance of the Engine, the Fire was happily extinguish'd. Had that House burnt down, at that Time, in all Probability, many of the Buildings at the Head of the Dock would likewise have been reduced to Ashes, and the Destruction very great. [It may not be amiss to remind our Neighbours, that they ought to keep their Chimneys clean, which would be but a trifling Expence, rather than by Neglect to expose not only their own Substance, but that of Others, perhaps their All, to that destroying Element.]

One Day last Week, the Dwelling-House of Mr. THOMAS REYNOLDS, on the Cliffs in Calvert County, one of the best Buildings in it, together with a Quantity of Rum, Wine, English Goods, and 4 or 5 Feather Beds, was destroy'd by Fire: The Damage said to be at least 2000 l. It was occasion'd by an adjacent Quarter accidentally taking Fire, which communicated itself to the Roof of the Brick Dwelling; and not having much Help at Hand, it burnt with such Fury, that they had Time only to save Part of the Household Goods.

It is currently reported, that some considerable Removals will soon take place by Consent of both Parties, in consequence of a certain Scheme of Mediation, offered by a great Personage, whose good Offices the Heads of either will find it their Account to accept, in order to restore the public Tranquillity.

Monday Night Orders came down to his Majesty's Dock Yard at Portsmouth, to fit out immediately the Thunderer Man of War, Captain Hood, for Sea.

The St. Alban's Man of War of 64 Guns, lately launched at Blackwall, is fitting for Sea at Woolwich with all Expedition.

Sept. 8. A Vessel lately arrived at Rouen, and that touched in her Passage at Gibraltar, reports, that she saw an English Frigate bring in there a Sallee Rover, of considerable Force.

We can assure the Public, that the Answer of the Court of France to the Memorial presented by his Majesty's Ambassador there, complaining of what had lately passed at Turk's Island, contains as strong a Disavowal of the Violence committed there by the Count d'Estaing, and as explicit Assurances of their Resolution to cultivate the Continuance of the Public Tranquillity as Words can convey; and that upon the first Rumour of this Transaction, even previous to their receiving our Representations, they had dispatched a Corvette with Orders to Count d'Estaing, requiring an Account of the Motives of his Conduct.

Several Private Letters from Berlin, which arrived Yesterday by the Dutch Mails, bring Advice, that Count Poniatowski was elected King of Poland, in the usual Form, on the 27th ult. under the Name of Stanislaus the Second. These Letters add, that the Election Tent was 20 Fathoms long, and eight wide, lined with red Cloth, with a Wall behind, and a Bank on each side; and that the Regalia, which was brought to Warsaw by the Bishop of Culm on the 22d from Cracow, consisted of Five Crowns, Four Scepters, a Globe, Three Gold Chains, and a Sable richly ornamented.

There are some Advices by the last French Mail, which mention, that the Court of Spain have determined to effect a Settlement somewhere on the Coast of Guiney, for the better supplying their extensive American Dominions with Slaves, without being obliged to purchase them with such vast Sums from Foreigners.—Three Men of War failed the 18th ult. for this Purpose.

ANNAPOLIS, November 1.

We are assured, that the General Assembly of this Province, which now stands Prorogued to the 17th Instant, will not Then meet; but that a Proclamation of a Dissolution, and Writs for a General Election, will issue, before that Time.

Last Friday Evening, about VII o'Clock, when it was very Cold and Windy, the Town was Alarm'd with the Cry of FIRE. It proved to be in the Chimney of a House, near the Public Buildings, formerly the Residence of Governor CALVERT: The Chimney was extreme Dirty, and Burnt near an Hour, and the House, which is high, old, and built of Wood, catch'd in many Places; but by the extraordinary Vigilance and Activity of the Inhabitants, with the Assistance of the Engine, the Fire was happily extinguish'd. Had that House burnt down, at that Time, in all Probability, many of the Buildings at the Head of the Dock would likewise have been reduced to Ashes, and the Destruction very great. [It may not be amiss to remind our Neighbours, that they ought to keep their Chimneys clean, which would be but a trifling Expence, rather than by Neglect to expose not only their own Substance, but that of Others, perhaps their All, to that destroying Element.]

One Day last Week, the Dwelling-House of Mr. THOMAS REYNOLDS, on the Cliffs in Calvert County, one of the best Buildings in it, together with a Quantity of Rum, Wine, English Goods, and 4 or 5 Feather Beds, was destroy'd by Fire: The Damage said to be at least 2000 l. It was occasion'd by an adjacent Quarter accidentally taking Fire, which communicated itself to the Roof of the Brick Dwelling; and not having much Help at Hand, it burnt with such Fury, that they had Time only to save Part of the Household Goods.

PHILADELPHIA, November 1.

ON Wednesday, the 24th Instant, ISAAC NORRIS, Esq; Speaker of the Assembly, having signified to the House his Inability to attend that Service, from the present State of his Health, the House unanimously chose JOSEPH FOX, Esq; Speaker in his Stead.

And on Friday last the House adjourned to the 7th of January, having appointed BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, Esq; to embark immediately for Great-Britain, to join with, and assist, the present Agent in transacting the Affairs of this Province, for the ensuing Year.

From the PENNSYLVANIA JOURNAL.

Mr. BRADFORD.

The Subscribers, at the Close of the late Debate in Assembly, concerning the sending Mr. Franklin to England as an Assistant to our Agent there, having offered a PROTEST against that Measure, which was refused to be entered on the Minutes, it is now thought proper to take this Method, of laying before the Public the Reasons on which their Dissent was founded.

WE whose Names are hereunto subscribed, do object and Protest against the Appointment of the Person proposed as an Agent of this Province, for the following Reasons.

First. Because we believe him to be the Chief Author of the Measures pursued by the late Assembly, which have occasioned such Uneasiness and Distraction among the good People of this Province.

Secondly. Because we believe his fixed enmity to the Proprietors will preclude all Accommodation of our Disputes with them, even on just and reasonable Terms. So that for these two Reasons, we are filled with the most affecting Apprehensions, that the Petitions lately transmitted to England, will be made use of to produce a Change of our Government, contrary to the Intention of the Petitioners; the greatest part of whom; we are persuaded, only designed thereby to obtain a Compliance with some equitable Demands. And thus, by such an Appointment; we, and a vast Number of our most worthy Constituents, are deprived of all Hopes of ever seeing an End put to the fatal Difficulties of our Country; it being our firm Opinion, that any further Prosecution of the Measures for a Change of our Government at this Time, will lay the Foundations of unceasing Feuds, and all the Miseries of Confusion, among the People we represent, and their Posterity. This step gives us the more lively Affliction, as it is taken at the very Moment, when we are informed by a Member of this House, that the Governor has assured him of his having received Instructions from the Proprietors, on their hearing of our late Dispute, to give his Assent to the Taxation of their Estates in the same manner that the Estates of other Persons are to be taxed, and also to confirm, for the Public use, the several Squares, formerly claimed by the City. On which Subjects, we make no doubt, the Governor would have sent a Message to the House, if this had been the usual Time of doing Business, and he had not been necessarily absent to meet the Assembly of the Lower Counties. And therefore we cannot but anxiously regret, that, at a Time when the Proprietors have shown such a Disposition, this House should not endeavour to cultivate the same, and obtain from them every reasonable De-

mand that can be made on the part of the People; in vigorously insisting on which, we would most earnestly unite with the rest of this House.

Thirdly. Because the Gentleman proposed, as we are informed, is very unfavourably thought of by several of his Majesty's Ministers; and we are humbly of Opinion, that it will be disrespectful to our most gracious Sovereign, and disadvantageous to ourselves and our constituents, to employ such a Person as our Agent.

Fourthly. Because the Proposal of the Person mentioned, is so extremely disagreeable to a very great Number of the most serious and reputable Inhabitants of this Province of all Denominations and Societies (one Proof of which is, his having been rejected, both by this City and County at the last Election, though he had represented the former in Assembly for 14 Years) that we are convinced no Measure this House can adopt, will tend so much to inflame the Resentments and im bitter the Divisions of the good People of this Province, as his Appointment to be our Agent. And we cannot but sincerely lament, that the Peace and Happiness of Pennsylvania should be sacrificed for the Promotion of a Man, who cannot be advanced but by the Convulsions of his Country.

Fifthly. Because the unnecessary haste with which this House has acted in proceeding to this Appointment (without making a small Adjournment, tho' requested by many Members, to consult our Constituents on the Matters to be decided; and) even before their Speaker has been presented to the King's Representative, tho' we are informed that the Governor will be in Town the Beginning of next Week; may subject us to the Censures and very heavy Displeasure of our most gracious Sovereign and his Ministers.

Sixthly. Because the Gentleman proposed, has heretofore ventured, contrary to an Act of Assembly, to place the Public Money in the Stocks, whereby this Province suffered a loss of £16000; and that sum added to £5000 granted for his Expences, makes the whole Cost of his former Voyage to England, amount to ELEVEN THOUSAND POUNDS; which expensive kind of Agency we do not chuse to imitate, and burden the Public with unnecessary loads of Debt. For these and other Reasons we should think ourselves guilty of betraying the Rights of Pennsylvania, if we should presumptuously commit them to the Discretion of a Man, against whom so many and just Objections present themselves.

Lastly. We being extremely desirous to avert the Mischiefs apprehended from the intended Appointment, and as much as in us lies to promote Peace and Unanimity among us and our Constituents, do humbly propose to the House, that if they will agree regularly to appoint any Gentleman of Integrity, Abilities, and Knowledge in England, to assist Mr. Jackson as our Agent, under a Restriction not to present the Petitions for a Change of our Government, or any of them, to the King or his Ministers, unless an express Order for that Purpose be hereafter given by the Assembly of this Province; we will not give it any Opposition: But if such an Appointment should be made we must insist (as we cannot think it a neces-

sary one) that our Constituents, already labouring under heavy Debts, be not burthened with fresh Impositions on that Account; and therefore, in Condescension to the Members, who think another Agent necessary, we will concur with them, if they approve of this Proposal, in paying such Agent at our own Expence.

NAPLES, July 24.

FROM the beginning of the epidemical Distemper, to the last Day of June, it is computed that 572,000 Persons have died in this Kingdom.

Lisbon, Aug. 18. A Swedish Vessel arrived here Yesterday from Algiers, and has brought home the Consul, who sailed there on the Part of this Dutty, in Consequence of a Declaration of War by the Bey of Algiers against the Emperor, Grand Duke of Tuscany. This sudden Departure is said to be occasioned by a Vessel under Tuscan Colours, which was taken by the Algerines, and released on the Representation of our Consul; but was afterwards found to be a Neapolitan.

Genoa, Aug. 14. Paolo continued to knock up St. Vincent both by Sea and Land. Sickly, Scarcity, and Distress weaken the Place daily.

Algiers, Aug. 11. A Genoese Polacca, under English Colours and Passports, with 24 Men on board, arrived here a few Days ago to buy Corn. The Day, informed of the Fraud, immediately sold the Vessel and Crew. The Captain of this Genoese Polacca, a Greek by Birth, has informed the Day that there are now at Sea 25 Genoese Vessels, all furnished with the Passports and Flags of Great Britain. As many Ships take Advantage also of the Colours and Passports of Denmark, the Day, we are assured, is on the Point of declaring War against the Dey, as he has just done against Tuscany.

LONDON, Aug. 8.

The celebrated Morgan, the Highwayman, has had four narrow Escapes for his later Rigs, he had like to have been burned at the late Fire in Newgate; Secondly, he escaped Hanging by receiving his Majesty's Clemency. Thirdly, he was near Drowning in his Voyage from New-York to Philadelphia; Fourthly, and lastly, he has again escaped Hanging, for a Time, by breaking out of Newgate on Tuesday Morning last.

A Laugh is now circulating universally (a Correspondent informs us) in Dublin, at the Expense of a Dublinian on a little Remarkable for the Delicacy of his Disposition. Stepping one Day, about Noon, to the Lodgings of Miss C., the young Woman who was last Summer at Mr. C.'s, and finding the Street Door open, his Lordship walked up to Miss C.'s Bed Chamber, who had not yet arising, and began to walk her feet for him so long in Bed. And on Friday last the House adjourned to the 7th of January, having appointed BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, Esq; to embark immediately for Great-Britain, to join with, and assist, the present Agent in transacting the Affairs of this Province, for the ensuing Year.

From the PENNSYLVANIA JOURNAL.

Mr. BRADFORD,

The Subscribers, at the Close of the late Debate in Assembly, concerning the sending Mr. Franklin to England as an Assistant to our Agent there; having offered a PROTEST against that Measure, which was refused to be entered on the Minutes, it is now thought proper to take this Method, of laying before the Public the Reasons on which their Dissent was founded.

WE whose Names are hereunto subscribed, do object and Protest against the Appointment of the Person proposed as an Agent of this Province, for the following Reasons.

First: Because we believe him to be the Chief Author of the Measures pursued by the late Assembly, which have occasioned such Uneasiness and Distraction among the good People of this Province.

Secondly. Because we believe his fixed enmity to the Proprietors will preclude all Accommodation of our Disputes with them, even on just and reasonable Terms;—So that for these two Reasons, we are filled with the most affecting Apprehensions, that the Petitions lately transmitted to England, will be made use of to produce a Change of our Government, contrary to the Intention of the Petitioners; the greatest part of whom, we are persuaded, only designed thereby to obtain a Compliance with some equitable Demands.—And thus, by such an Appointment; we, and a vast Number of our most worthy Constituents, are deprived of all Hopes of ever seeing an End put to the fatal Dissentions of our Country; it being our firm Opinion, that any further Prosecution of the Measures for a Change of our Government at this Time, will lay the Foundations of unceasing Feuds, and all the Miseries of Confusion, among the People we represent, and their Posterity.—This step gives us the more lively Affliction, as it is taken at the very Moment, when we are informed by a Member of this House, that the Governor has assured him of his having received Instructions from the Proprietors, on their hearing of our late Dispute, to give his Assent to the Taxation of their Estates in the same manner that the Estates of other Persons are to be taxed, and also to confirm, for the Public use, the several Squares, formerly claimed by the City;—On which Subjects, we make no doubt, the Governor would have sent a Message to the House, if this had been the usual Time of doing Business, and he had not been necessarily absent to meet the Assembly of the Lower Counties.

And therefore we cannot but anxiously regret, that, at a Time when the Proprietors have shown such a Disposition, this House should not endeavour to cultivate the same, and obtain from them every reasonable De-

mand that can be made on the part of the People; in vigorously insisting on which, we would most earnestly unite with the rest of this House.

Thirdly. Because the Gentleman proposed, as we are informed, is very unfavourably thought of by several of his Majesty's Ministers; and we are humbly of Opinion, that it will be disrespectful to our most gracious Sovereign, and disadvantageous to ourselves and our constituents, to employ such a Person as our Agent.

Fourthly. Because the Proposal of the Person mentioned, is so extremely disagreeable to a very great Number of the most serious and reputable Inhabitants of this Province of all Denominations and Societies (one Proof of which is, his having been rejected, both by this City and County at the last Election, though he had represented the former in Assembly for 14 Years) that we are convinced no Measure this House can adopt, will tend so much to inflame the Resentments and imbecility the Divisions of the good People of this Province, as his Appointment to be our Agent.—And we cannot but sincerely lament, that the Peace and Happiness of Pennsylvania should be sacrificed for the Promotion of a Man, who cannot be advanced but by the Convulsions of his Country.

Fifthly. Because the unnecessary haste with which this House has acted in proceeding to this Appointment (without making a small Adjournment, tho' requested by many Members, to consult our Constituents on the Matters to be decided; and) even before their Speaker has been presented to the King's Representative, tho' we are informed that the Governor will be in Town the Beginning of next Week;—may subject us to the Censures and very heavy Displeasure of our most gracious Sovereign and his Ministers.

Sixthly. Because the Gentleman proposed; has heretofore ventured, contrary to an Act of Assembly, to place the Public Money in the Stocks, whereby this Province suffered a loss of £.6000; and that sum added to £.5000 granted for his Expences, makes the whole Cost of his former Voyage to England, amount to ELEVEN THOUSAND POUNDS; which expensive kind of Agency we do not chuse to imitate, and burden the Public with unnecessary loads of Debt. For these and other Reasons we should think ourselves guilty of betraying the Rights of Pennsylvania, if we should presumptuously commit them to the Discretion of a Man, against whom so many and just Objections present themselves.

Lastly. We being extremely desirous to avert the Mischiefs apprehended from the intended Appointment, and as much as in us lies to promote Peace and Unanimity among us and our Constituents, do humbly propose to the House, that if they will agree regularly to appoint any Gentleman of Integrity, Abilities, and Knowledge in England, to assist Mr. Jackson as our Agent, under a Restriction not to present the Petitions for a Change of our Government, or any of them, to the King or his Ministers, unless an express Order for that Purpose be hereafter given by the Assembly of this Province; we will not give it any Opposition: But if such an Appointment should be made we must insist (as we cannot think it a neces-

The Captain of this Genoese Polacre, a Greek by Birth, has informed the Day that there are now at Sea 25 Genoese Vessels, all furnished with the Passports and Flags of Great-Britain. As many Ships take Advantage also of the Colours and Passports of Denmark, the Day, we are assured, is on the Point of declaring War against the Danes, as he has just done against Tuscany.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 16.

THE Charges of the Feast which was given on the 5th Inst. by the Grand Vizir on Occasion of the Circumcision of his two Sons, were defrayed by the Sultan, who was present at it incognito. For this Purpose 250 Purfes have been delivered from his private Treasury, amounting to 120,000 German Florins.

Naples, Aug. 14. During the late dreadful Scarcity of Provisions in this Metropolis, one Clara Pignitelli, a Widow, who had two Children, the eldest not above eight Years old, and the other just turned of six, being almost three Days utterly destitute of Food either for her unhappy little Orphans or herself, formed the incredible Resolution of preserving their Lives, tho' at the Expence of her own; for this Purpose she actually proceeded to cut off some Pieces of her Flesh, and had made an Incision into one of her Thighs, when a Relation, who suspected her Circumstances to be desperate, entered the House with a Supply both of Money and Provision, and found her bleeding on the Floor, with the two Children nearly exhausted thro' Hunger, lying drenched in Tears by her Side, but entirely unable either to prevent the Execution of her Design, or to call for the least Assistance or Relief: By proper Care she and her Children are now in perfect Health, and Providence has made this astonishing Instance of maternal affection such a Source of good Fortune to the poor Woman, that several of the Nobility have subscribed pretty handsomely to her Relief, and raised her a Capital of Two Hundred Pounds.

August 21. We cannot express our Joy at seeing a Decrease of the Distempers that have so long afflicted this City: Such as are yet seized with them easily recover. This Mortality did put us in the greatest Consternation; for in passing through the Streets, scarce any Thing was to be seen but People in Mourning, almost all Families having, more or less, lost some of their Relations. Arts, Manufactures and Commerce, have greatly suffered by this Calamity; but they now begin to revive.

L O N D O N, August 23.

It is now said, that for the greater Encouragement of Seamen to enter into his Majesty's Service in case of any future War, that the very high Bounty for Informing and Entrance Money, will be converted into another Channel, by raising the Wages of an able Seaman from Two and Twenty and Six-pence to Thirty Shillings a Month. This, with some beneficial Alterations in the future Distribution of Prize-Money, in which a Commander will not be rated as worth Twenty Thousand Men in the Article of Sharing, it is thought, will induce the brave Tar to voluntarily serve their King and Country without the Government's being under the disagreeable necessity of having Recourse to the unconstitutional Method of Pressing.

August 28. At Denton, near Siltou, in Huntingdonshire, a common Field Pea was sown in the Garden of Mr. Samuel Hoppers of that place, from whence have sprung this Year 23 Branches, on which were 249 Pods, that produced a full Winchester Quart of Peas when shelled.

We are credibly informed, that for several months past scarce a smuggling cutter has gone over to France, without carrying some English sheep; for the transporting of which they are paid a bounty per head. In a pasture near Rowen in Normandy there are near 200, for the benefit of the great woollen manufactory carried on at that Place, and to keep up the breed, the climate of Normandy agreeing nearly with that of England.

August 30. The following story is handed to us as Matter of fact: An old Fellow, well known in the Neighbourhood of Rotherhithe, who goes by the nick Name of Balaam, from his going about with an Ass, and carrying Greens, being irritated by some People playing Tricks with his Ass, was carried before a Magistrate, and fined 15 s. for swearing so many Oaths. Balaam some Days after passing along the Street, and hearing the same Magistrate swear at his Workmen, immediately went before another Magistrate, and laid his information against him for four Oaths, which, as a Magistrate, being 5 l. an Oath, amounted to 20 l. and was paid accordingly.

Tuesday evening died, at his house at Clapham in Surry, in the 81st year of his age, that great and worthy patriot Sir John Barnard Knt. In the year 1722 he was chosen one of the city's representatives in Parliament, in which important trust he, to the universal satisfaction of the whole city, continued in every parliament until the year 1761, when upon account of his age and infirmities, he, to his fellow citizens great regret, was obliged to decline. In the year 1727 he was chosen Alderman of Dowgate Ward, in the room of John Crawley, Esq; deceased, who enjoyed that office but a few Months. In 1736 Sir John served with his brother in law, Sir Robert Goodschall, Knt. Alderman of Bishoppgate Ward, the office of Sheriff of this city and county of Middlesex; and in 1738 he served the high office of Lord Mayor. In this year he had the misfortune to lose his Lady, who was buried in a very grand manner at Clapham church; the children belonging to Christ's Hospital, of which he was many years President, attending the funeral through the city. Upon the death of Sir John Thompson, Knt. in 1749, he removed, pursuant to act of Common Council, and took upon him the office of Alderman of Bridge Ward Without, and then became the real Father of the City; and in July 1758 he, to the regret of his Brother aldermen, resigned his gown. The great character of Sir John Barnard, as a steady, wife, and uncorrupt Senator, an able vigilant Magistrate, and a faithful and understanding Citizen; having been so long fully known and established, and having also received numberless repeated testimonies of approbation; any encomiums, that could be here offered, as they would be quite needless, so would they fall infinitely short in representing the noble inflexible conduct he invariably pursued, to promote the true welfare and happiness of his King and Country; and particularly respecting those important trusts he was, for so considerable a period, repeatedly called upon and solicited to undertake by the united entreaties of his grateful Fellow Citizens.

Monday last the Wife of a poor Man in Old-street bought an old Stuff Chair of a Broker near that Place, for 8d. When she carried it home, her husband abused her for making so miserable a Purchase, and a Scuffle ensued; on moving the Chair, something was heard to jingle, and the Seat being cut open, they found 150 Guineas, which had been concealed there; which terminated the Scuffle to their mutual Satisfaction.

Sept. 4. Yesterday died, at the Royal Observatory in Greenwich Park, after a tedious indisposition, greatly lamented, the Rev. Mr. Nathaniel Bliss, M. A. and fellow of the Royal Society. He succeeded, more than 20 years since, the late eminent Dr. Halley, as Civilian Professor of Geometry at Oxford; and about 3 years, the no less eminent Dr. Bradley, as Regius Professor of Astronomy. In Mr. Bliss the world has lost an able and experienced Astronomer and Mathematician, his disconsolate widow one of the best of husbands, and his large family a tender and affectionate parent.

They write from Scotland, that they have had the finest harvest in all the parts of that Kingdom, this year, that has been remembered for 40 years past.

From several parts of the kingdom we have received advice, that the harvest was mostly got in, and every where there was great abundance.

His Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, has appointed Lieut. Colonel William Amherst Deputy Governor of Sandgate-Castle, near Hythe, in the room of his brother Sir Jefferey Amherst, who has resigned.

The Court of Portugal have strictly prohibited, under severe penalties, all ship-masters or others, from carrying over any Jesuits, or other suspected persons, without first obtaining a special licence for so doing, from his Majesty's principal Secretary of State.

Extract of a Letter from Paris.

"Mons. Van Robais, who carries on a very extensive woollen manufactory at Abbeville, has lately received a premium of 2000 livres for the fabricating a piece of broadcloth, pronounced by good judges to come the nearest to that of England, both in fineness, texture, and dye, to any hitherto

made in France: It is computed he has near 60 tons of Irish wool in his warehouses for the purposes of carrying on this beneficial manufacture."

Sept. 6. The French King has issued a declaration for the apprehending of all vagabonds and people who have no visible way of livelihood, in the different provinces of this kingdom. Children under the age of 16, are to be sent to the Charity-Hospitals or Work Houses, and there instructed and supported, and not to be permitted to quit them but by the King's order. All in general who are able, both men and women, old and young, are to be made for the future to earn their subsistence.

Sept. 13. We are assured, that the important Question, relating to the Legality of General Warrants, on which the Liberty of this Country so essentially depends, will certainly come on before an august Assembly, immediately after their meeting.

PROVIDENCE, N. E. October 27.

Monday morning last a very tragical Affair happened in the Town of Attleborough, about nine Miles from this Place, of which the following is the most authentic Account that can as yet be collected, viz. One Jonathan Shepherdson, junr. of that Place, being suspected of having an unlawful correspondence with a young Woman who he had for some time entertained in his House, tho' a married Man, a number of Men, who lived near him and were acquainted with his Way of Life, formed a Resolution of punishing him for his domestic Misdemeanours; and as the most suitable Method to render his Behaviour contemptible, they concluded to mount him upon a Wooden Horse, and ride him *Shimmington*, as a Mark of Indignity; they accordingly assembled for that Purpose about ten Days ago, disguis'd in such a Manner as to prevent a Discovery, but Shepherdson being resolutely bent on Defence, and charging his Gun with a Design to shoot any who should dare to molest him, they thought proper to desist from their Enterprize 'til a more convenient Opportunity. The Party being considerably augmented, they renewed their Attempts, which gave Birth to the melancholy Consequences which followed; for about Sunrise on Monday last Shepherdson went into a Pasture not far from his House, in order to drive home his Cows, but not finding them readily, took up an Arm-full of Wood, to carry back to his House, and as he was returning thither, he was suddenly rush'd upon and surrounded by a Party of between thirty and 40 Men, with their Faces black'd and otherways disguised, who had concealed themselves there for effecting the Scheme that had been premeditated. A warm Dispute immediately arose, and Shepherdson, still determined to defend himself, drew a long sharp Knife from a Sheath he had fixed in the Inside of his Coat, and warn'd them on their Peril to keep their distance: But all this was unregarded, and in a few Minutes one Benjamin Hyde, junr. advanced and seized upon him, followed by several others, when Shepherdson instantly cut him across one of his Arms to the Bone, and then, while clench'd together, gave the Knife a violent Thrust into his Side, which enter'd his Kidneys; this obliged him to quit his hold, and he retreated a few Rods distance, into the Highway, where he expired in less than fifteen Minutes, without being able to speak but a few Words, (which he did to a Person who happened to be there present) signifying who had done the fatal Deed. Another of the Company, who attempted to assist Hyde, received a bad Cut, and a Third came up and swore he would lose his Life but he would take away the bloody Weapon, and being a stout Fellow, he actually got it away, but was so terribly wounded in the Contest that his Life is despair'd of. The whole Mischief was done, in a Manner, instantaneously, and did not admit of a Prevention from this riotous Company, who, perhaps, not dreading any bad Consequences, were exulting on the Prospect of gratifying their Resentment; for Regardless of the wounded Men, it appears, they persisted in their first Design, and seized Shepherdson, and carried him some Distance on a Rail, 'til the sad Tidings of Hyde's Death reach'd them, which greatly intimidated them, and they immediately dispers'd and fled, left a Discovery who they were

Should involve them in the Difficulties their Conduct had subjected them to. Shepherdson being now left at Liberty, judg'd it the most prudent Measure to repair to a Magistrate and surrender himself, which he did accordingly. A Jury of Inquest was summon'd on Monday Afternoon, on the Body of the deceased, who brought in a Verdict, "That Benjamin Hyde, junr. was slain by "Jonathan Shepherdson, junr. after a violent "Manner." Shepherdson is committed to Taunton Goal. The deceased was about 36 Years of Age, had a Wife and several Children, and was esteem'd a Person of an irreproachable Life.

WILLIAMSBURG, November 2.

About 8 Days ago a Topfail Vessel was seen in the Bay, by some Gentlemen on the Eastern Shore, on Fire, the Wind blowing very hard at N. W. As no Person from on board the Vessel has been heard of, it is thought the Crew must have perished. A good many Hogheads of Tobacco, supposed to belong to this Vessel, have since drove ashore.

On Tuesday last the General Assembly of this Colony met at the Capitol in this City, when his Honour the Governor was pleased to open the Session with the following Speech:

Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

YOU are now met in General Assembly, after a long Recede, to consider of and go through the Business of the Country, and such other Points as may be offered for your Deliberation. In the Course of this Session many Matters of Importance will come under your Consideration; and by the long previous Notice you have had of the Time of your assembling, I hope I now meet you prepared to undergo with Patience and Cheerfulness the Fatigue which a long Session unavoidably brings with it.

Besides the ordinary Business of the Session, I have it in Charge to lay before you, and earnestly recommend to your most serious Attention, a Proposition made by the Merchants of Great-Britain trading to this Colony to the Right Honourable the Board of Trade, relating to their having their Sterling Debts secured to them by a Payment in Sterling Money: This is reasonable on the Face of it; and the Lords of Trade have left it to you to provide for it yourselves, by any Means you shall think most expedient to effect that Purpose, before they referred the Complaints of the Merchants to the British Parliament. This Lenity of their Lordships demands a suitable Return from you; and that you may be the better enabled to answer their Expectations, I shall immediately lay before you a Minute of the Proceedings of that Right Honourable Board, and the Letter their Lordships have sent to me on that Head. By a new long Experience, I have always found you disposed to do Justice to all Men; and I hope this Disposition will induce you to give that Justice to the Merchants which shall be satisfactory, not only to his Majesty and his Ministers, but to the Merchants themselves. This Letter I have long since received; but being unwilling to give you an additional Trouble, and create an unnecessary Expence to the Country, I did not immediately convene you, but postponed it to this Time, when it was thought proper you should meet, as I judg'd this would answer the Purpose intended: But then, Gentlemen, I undertook to answer for you that you should enter upon this Matter immediately on your Meeting, that I might be enabled to transmit to their Lordships your Acts, in Consequence of the Proposition offered you, Time enough for their Lordships to make that Use of them which they shall think proper. That I may perform this Engagement, which I have entered into on your Account, I make no doubt but that you will, without delay, proceed on this Business; and that the Result of your Deliberations will do Honour to yourselves, Justice to the Merchants, and give Satisfaction to the Ministry.

I shall also lay before you a Letter I have very lately received from the Earl of Halifax, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, relative to the Establishment of Ferries, and other Articles for the Convenience of the Post which is designed to be carried on with great Regularity through the vast Continent of North America; which, by our late glorious Successes, is now become Part of his Majesty's Dominions. The Usefulness of a regular Post to a Commercial People is so great, and so well known, that I flatter myself the bare mentioning it, and the laying the Letter before you, will be sufficient, without my saying more on the Subject, to induce you to enter heartily into that Measure.

I have received seven Acts of Parliament passed in the last Session, in which all his Majesty's Colonies are concerned; which I have deposited in the Council Office, as the most proper Place to be ready at Hand for your Inspection, at all Times when you shall have Occasion to look into them.

The Disturbances which the Incursions of the Indians have occasioned in our back Settlements, during the Course of the last Summer, have made it unsafe for me wholly to disband the Militia; but by the Consent, and Advice, of his Majesty's Council, I have repeatedly reduced them as low as the Security of the Inhabitants of the Frontiers would permit: But still I fear the Expences will be found great; though the Bounty of the British Parliament has enabled you to discharge a large Part of it, and thereby reduced the Levies to be laid on the People, to defray these unhappy, though necessary Expences. But,

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

There will still remain a Part to be raised on the Inhabitants, which it is your Duty to provide for, in the doing which I have no Reason to doubt of your Tenderness to the People; whose Duty it is, on their Part, to submit with Cheerfulness to Expences originally undertaken for their own Defence.

Gentlemen of the Council, and of the House of Burgesses, My Regard for the Welfare of this Colony is, I hope, too well known at this Day to admit of a Doubt: All I ask in return is that you should all of you collectively, and every one particularly, engage earnestly in the Work before you; and with serious Attention, cool Deliberation, zealous Affection to his Majesty, and a salutary Unanimity, go through the important Points recommended to you, and all other Matters which shall occasionally offer themselves for your Determination.

To the Hon. FRANCIS FAULKNER, Esq; His Majesty's Lieutenant-Governor, and Commander in Chief of the Colony and Dominion of VIRGINIA.

The Humble ADDRESS of the COUNCIL.

WE his Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Council of Virginia, now met in General Assembly, beg Leave to return your Honour our sincere Thanks for your very kind Speech at the Opening of this Session.

Highly sensible of the Importance of the Business recommended to our Consideration, we shall most cheerfully concur in such Measures as we shall judge conducive to maintain the Honour of the Crown, and promote the Prosperity of this Country.

Your Regard for the Welfare of the Colony is too well known to admit of a Doubt: Therefore permit us, Sir, to express our grateful Sense of your just Administration, and to assure your Honour of our Readiness to render it easy and agreeable.

To which his HONOUR was pleased to return the following ANSWER.

Gentlemen of the Council,

I RETURN you Thanks for your very affectionate Address. You may rely on my Endeavours to render my Administration just and equitable; and nothing can more effectually contribute to make it easy to me than your hearty Concurrence in Measures calculated to promote the Honour of the Crown, and the Prosperity of the Colony; both of which I have much at Heart.

NEW-YORK, November 1.

We hear from New-Jersey, that on Wednesday, the 24th ultimo, a Boy, about 12 Years of Age, Son of Mr. Samuel Marsh of Woodbridge, being on the fore Horse of a Team with a loaded Waggon, descending a Hill, the Horse fell, and threw him, and before he could recover himself the Waggon went over his Breast, and crush'd him to Death instantly. The same Afternoon three other Boys nearly of the same Age, each with a Team, hearing of the Accident, call'd in at Mr. Marsh's House to look at the Deceased as he lay dead in the House. After they went away, one of the Boys said to the other, that the Deceased must have been foolish, else that after the Horse fell he might have got out of the Way of the Waggon. Some time after on the Road, the Boy who had made this Observation, fell from his Cart, the Wheel of which went over him, he got up and run a little Way, and then fell and immediately expired.

PHILADELPHIA, November 8.

Yesterday BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, Esq; appointed an Agent for this Province at the Court of Great Britain, set out for Chester, in order to embark on board the King of Prussia, Capt. Robinson, for London; when he was accompanied by a great Number of the reputable Inhabitants, from both City and County.

Saturday the 27th of last Month, about Noon, a Fire broke out in the Court-House in Perth-Amboy, which entirely consumed all the Wooden Work of it. The Fire first began in the Cupola, to which it was supposed to have been carried by the high Wind from a Spark out of one of the Chimnies; and tho' it was discovered before it got to any Height, yet so: Want of an Engine, and by the Steepness of the Roof, all Endeavours to extinguish it were ineffectual.

The same Night departed this Life, at Perth-Amboy, after a lingering Illness, the Honourable SAMUEL NEVILL, Esq; Second Judge of the Supreme Court of the Province of New-Jersey: He was turn'd of 66 Years of Age, and had long sustained the Office of a Judge with unblemish'd Integrity and Honour: He was also a Proprietor of the Eastern Division; and was many Years one of the Representatives in Assembly, in which Station he often fill'd the Speaker's Chair with Dignity and Applause: And the City of Perth-Amboy lose in him their Mayor. In all his Offices he was a faithful Friend and Servant to the Publick, and his Death in that Province is universally regretted.

Tuesday Morning last a melancholy Sight was discovered in the House of one William Peterkop, a Skinner, in Wood-street, in the Northern Liberties of this City, himself and two Children lying dead on the Bed, and his Wife in a speechless Condition. The Coroner's Inquest found the Cause of their Death to be Suffocation by a Pot of Charcoal in the Room, which was close. They all appeared to have been vomiting, or striving to vomit; the Woman is since dead.

On Monday last his Excellency our Governor was pleased to issue his Proclamation for Dissolving the General Assembly of this Province.

On Tuesday Evening last Week, a horrid Murder was committed in Prince-George's County, by

a young Negro Fellow of Mr. Gantt's, on Mr. Thomas Soper, an Overseer of Mr. Cook's, a Man of a good Character, Sober, Honest and Industrious, and who had a Wife and two or three Children. We cannot learn that there had been any Provocation, and Mr. Soper was never able to speak after he was stab'd. The Negro is in Jail, and has confessed the Fact.

Last Week, Mr. DARBY LUX, of Barbados, Merchant, was Married, in Baltimore County to Miss RACHEL RIDGELY, a very amiable young Lady, with a Fortune of £. 2000 Sterling.

PHILADELPHIA.

REMARKS on a late PROTEST against the Appointment of Mr. FRANKLIN an Agent for this Province.

I HAVE generally passed over, with a silent Disregard, the nameless abusive Pieces that have been written against me; and tho' this Paper, called a PROTEST, is signed by some respectable Names, I was, nevertheless, inclined to treat it with the same Indifference; but as the Assembly is therein reflected on upon my Account, it is thought more my Duty to make some Remarks upon it.

I would first observe then, that this Mode of *Protesting* by the Minority, with a String of Reasons against the Proceedings of the Majority of the House of Assembly, is quite new among us; the present is the second we have had of the kind, and both within a few Months. It is unknown to the Practice of the House of Commons, or of any House of Representatives in America, that I have heard of; and seems an affected Imitation of the Lords in Parliament, which can by no Means become Assembly-men of America. Hence appears the Absurdity of the Complaint, that the House refused the Protest an Entry on their Minutes. The Protesters know that they are not, by any Custom or Usage, intitled to such an Entry, and that the Practice here is not only useless in itself, but would be highly inconvenient to the House, since it would probably be thought necessary for the Majority also to enter their Reasons, to justify themselves to their Constituents, whereby the Minutes would be incumbered, and the Public Business obstructed. More especially will it be found inconvenient, if such Protests are made use of as a new Form of Libelling, as the Vehicles of personal Malice, and as Means of giving to private Abuse the Appearance of a Sanction, as public Acts. Your Protest, Gentlemen, was therefore properly refused; and since it is no Part of the Proceedings of Assembly, one may with the more Freedom examine it.

Your first Reason against my Appointment, is, that you believe me to be the chief Author of the Measures pursued by the late Assembly, which have occasioned such Unrest and Disaffection among the good People of this Province. I shall not dispute my Share in those Measures; I hope they are such as will in time do Honour to all that were concerned in them. But you seem mistaken in the Order of Time: It was the Unrest and Disaffection among the good People of the Province that occasioned the Measures; the Province was in Confusion before they were taken, and they were pursued in order to prevent such Unrest and Disaffection for the future. Make one Step farther back, and you will find Proprietary Injustice, supported by Proprietary Minions and Creatures, the original Cause of all our Unrest and Disaffections.

Another of your Reasons is, "that I am, as you are informed, very unfavourably thought of by several of His Majesty's Ministers." I apprehend, Gentlemen, that your Informer is mistaken. He indeed has taken great Pains to give unfavourable Impressions of me, and perhaps may flatter himself, that it is impossible for much true Industry should be totally without Effect. His long Success in making or murthering all the Reputations that stand in his Way, which has been the dearest Delight and constant Employment of his Life, may likewise have given him some just Ground for Confidence that he has, as they call it, *done for me*, among the rest. But, as I said before, I believe he is mistaken. For what have I done that they should think unfavourably of me? It cannot be my constantly and uniformly promoting the Measures of the Crown, ever since I had any Influence in the Province. It cannot, surely, be my promoting the Change from a Proprietary to a Royal Government. If indeed I had, by Speeches and Writings, endeavoured to make His Majesty's Government universally odious in the Province. If I had harangued by the Week, to all Corners and Cores, on the pretended Injustice and Oppressions of Royal Government, and the Slavery of the People under it. If I had written traitorous Papers to this Purpose, and got them translated into other Languages, to give His Majesty's foreign Subjects here those horrible Ideas of it. If I had declared, written and printed, that "the King's little Finger was should find heavier than the Proprietor's whole Loins," with regard to our Liberties; then indeed might the Ministers be supposed to think unfavourably of me. But these are not Exports for a Man who holds a profitable Office under the Crown, and can expect to hold it no longer than he behaves with Fidelity and Duty that becomes every good Subject. They are only for Officers of Proprietary Appointment, who hold their Commissions during his, and not the King's, Pleasure; and who, by dividing among themselves, and their Relations, Offices of many Thousands a Year, enjoyed by Proprietary Favour, feel where to place their Loyalty. I wish they were as good Subjects to His Majesty;—and perhaps they may be so, when the Proprietary Interests are no longer.

Another of your Reasons is, "that the Proposal of me for an Agent is extremely disagreeable to a very great Number of the most serious and reputable Inhabitants of the Province; and the Proof is, my having been rejected at the last Election, tho' I had represented the City in Assembly for 14 Years."

And do those of you, Gentlemen, reproach me with this, who among near Four Thousand Voters, had scarcely a Score more than I had? It seems then, that your *Rejections* were very near being *Rejections*, and thereby furnishing the same Proof in your Case that you produce in mine, of your being likewise extremely disagreeable to a very great Number of the most serious and reputable People. Do you, honourable Sir, reproach me with this, who for almost twice 14 Years have been rejected (if not being chosen is to be rejected) by the same People, and unable, with all your Wealth and Connections, and the Influence they give you, to obtain an

Election in the County where you reside, and the City where you were born, and are best known, have been obliged to accept a Seat from one of the out Counties, the remotest of the Province!—It is known, Sir, to the Persons who proposed me, that I was first chosen against my Inclination, and against my Entreaties that I might be suffered to remain a private Man. In none of the 14 Elections you mention did I ever appear as a Candidate. I never did, directly or indirectly solicit any Man's Vote. For six of the Years in which I was annually chosen, I was absent, residing in England; during all which Time, your secret and open Attacks upon my Character and Reputation were incessant; and yet you gained no Ground. And can you really, Gentlemen, find Matter of Triumph in this *Rejection* as you call it? A Moment's Reflection on the Means by which it was obtained, must make you ashamed of it.

Not only my Duty to the Crown, in carrying the Post-Office Act more duly into Execution, was made use of to exasperate the Ignorant, as if I was encroaching my own Profits, by picking their Pockets; but my very Zeal in opposing the Murderers, and supporting the Authority of Government, and even my Humanity, with regard to the innocent Indians under our Protection, were misused among my Opponents, to stir up against me those religious Bigots, who are of all Savages the most brutish. Add to this the numberless falsehoods propagated as Truths, and the many Perjuries procured among the wretched Rabble brought to swear themselves intitled to a Vote; and yet to *peer a Superiority* obtained at all this Expence of Honour and Conscience! Can this, Gentlemen, be Matter of Triumph! Enjoy it then. Your Exultation, however, was short.—Your Artifices did not prevail every where; nor your double Tickets, and whole Boxes of forged Votes. A great Majority of the new chosen Assembly were of the old Members, and remain uncorrupted. They still stand firm for the People, and will obtain Justice from the Proprietaries. But what does that avail to you who are in the Proprietary Interest? And what Comfort can it afford you, when by the Assembly's Choice of an Agent, it appears that the same, to you obnoxious, Man, (notwithstanding all your venomous Invektives against him) still retains to great a Share of the public Confidence?

But "this Step, you say, gives you the more lively Affliction, as it is taken at the very Moment when you were informed by a Member of the House, that the Governor had assured him of his having received Instructions from the Proprietaries, to give his Assent to the Taxation of the Estates, in the same Manner that the Estates of other Persons are to be taxed; and also to confirm, for the public Use, the several Squares formerly claimed by the City." O the Force of Friendship! the Power of Interest! What Politeness they infuse into a Writer, and what delicate Expressions they produce! The Dispute between the Proprietaries and us was about the *Quintessence*, the Rate of their Taxation, and not about the *Manner*; but now, when all the World condemns them for requiring a partial Exemption of their Estates, and they are forced to submit to an honest Equality, 'tis called "assenting to be taxed in the same Manner with the People."—Their *Refutation* of five public Squares in the Plan of the City, which they had near 40 Years unjustly and dishonourably seized and detained from us, directing their Surveyor to map the Streets over them (in order to turn them into Lots) and their Officers to sell a Part of them; this their *Disgorging* is softly called *confirming* them for the public Use; and instead of the plain Words *formerly given* to the City, by the first Proprietary their Father, we have the cautious pretty Expression of "formerly claimed by the City."—Yes, not only *formerly* but *always* claimed, ever since they were *granted* and *given* to encourage the Settlers, and ever will be claimed, till we are put to actual Possession of them. 'Tis pleasant, however, to see how lightly and tenderly you trip over these Matters, as if you trod upon Eggs.—But that "very Moment," that precious Moment! why was it so long delayed? Why were those healing Instructions so long withheld and concealed from the People? They were, it seems, brought over by Mr. Allen. Intelligence was received by various Hands from London, that Orders were sent by the Proprietaries, from which great Hopes were entertained of an Accommodation. Why was the Bringing and the Delivery of such Orders so long denied? The Reason is easily understood. Messieurs Barclays, Friends to both Proprietaries and People, wished for that Gentleman's happy Arrival, hoping his Influence, added to the Power and Commission the Proprietaries had vested him with, might prove effectual in restoring Harmony and Tranquillity among us;—but he, it seems, hoped his Influence might do the Business, without those Additions.—There appeared on his Arrival some Prospect, from sundry Circumstances, of a Change to be made in the House by the approaching Election. The Proprietary Friends and Creatures knew the Heart of their Master, and how extremely disagreeable to him that *equal Taxation*, that *Refutation*, and the other *Concessions* to be made for the Sake of a Reconciliation, must necessarily be. They hoped therefore to spare him all those Mortifications, and thereby secure a greater Portion of his Favour. Hence the Instructions were not produced to the last Assembly, though

they arrived before the September Sitting, when the Governor was in Town, and actually did Business with the House. Nor to the new Assembly were they mentioned, till the "very Moment," the fatal Moment, when the House were on the Point of choosing that wicked Adversary of the Proprietary to be an Agent for the Province in England.

But I have, you say, a "fixed Enmity to the Proprietaries," and "you believe it will preclude all Accommodation of our Disputes with them, even on just and reasonable Terms."—And why do you think I have a fixed Enmity to the Proprietaries?—I have never had any personal Difference with them. I am no Land-Jobber and therefore have never had any Thing to do with their Land-Office or Officers;—if I had, probably, like others, I might have been obliged to truckle to their Measures, or have had like Causes of Complaint.—But our private Interests never clashed, and all their Resentment against me, and mine to them, has been on the public Account. Let them do Justice to the People of Pennsylvania, act honourably by the Citizens of Philadelphia, and become honest Men; my Enmity, if that's of any Consequence, ceases from the "very Moment;" and, as soon as I possibly can, I promise to love, honour and respect them.—In the mean Time, why do you "believe it will preclude all Accommodation with them on just and reasonable Terms?" Do you not boast that their gracious Condescensions are in the Hands of the Governor, and that "if this had been the usual Time for Business," his Honour would have sent them down in a Message to "the House." How then can my going to England prevent this Accommodation? The Governor can call the House when he pleases, and one would think, that, at least in your Opinion, my being out of the Way, would be a favourable Circumstance. For then, by "cultivating the Disposition shown by the Proprietaries, every reasonable Demand that can be made on the Part of the People might be obtained;" in vigorously insisting on which, you promise to unite with "earnestly with the rest of the House."—It seems then we have, "reasonable Demands" to make, and as you call them a little higher, *equitable Demands*. This is much for Proprietary Minions to say;—but you are all growing better, in Imitation of your Master, which is indeed very commendable. And if the Accommodation here should fail, I hope that though you dislike the Person a Majority of two to one in the House have thought fit to appoint an Agent, you will nevertheless, in Duty to your Country, continue the noble Resolution of uniting with the rest of the House, in vigorously insisting on that *Equity and Justice*, which such an Union will undoubtedly obtain for us.

I pass over the trivial Charge against the Assembly, that they "acted with unnecessary Hastiness in proceeding to this Appointment, without making a small Adjournment." &c. and your affected Apprehensions of Danger from that Hastiness. The Necessity of Expedition on this Occasion is as obvious to every one out of Doors, as it was to those within; and the Fears you mention are not, I fancy, considerable enough to break your Rest.—I come then to your high Charge against me, "That I heretofore ventured, contrary to an Act of Assembly, to place the Public Money in the Stocks, whereby this Province suffered a Loss of 6000*l*. and that Sum added to the 4000*l*. granted for my Expenses, makes the whole Cost of my former Voyage to England amount to ELEVEN THOUSAND POUNDS!"—How wisely was that Form in our Laws contrived, which when a Man is arraigned for his Life, requires the Evidence to speak the Truth, the whole Truth, and nothing but the Truth! The Reason is manifest. A Falshood may destroy the Innocent; in many Parts of a Truth without the whole; and a Mixture of Truth and Falshood may be full as pernicious. You, Mr. Chief Justice, and the other Justices among the Protesters, and you, Sir, who are a Counsellor at Law, must all of you be well acquainted with this excellent Form; and when you arraign'd my Reputation (dearer to me than Life) before the Assembly, and now at the respectable Tribunal of the Public, would it not have well become your Honours to have had some small Regard at least to the Spirit of that Form? You might have mentioned, That the Disposition of the Act to lodge the Money in the Bank, subject to the Drafts of the Trustees of the Loan-Office here, was impracticable; That the Bank refused to receive it on those Terms, it being contrary to their settled Rules to take Charge of Money subject to the Orders of unknown People, living in distant Countries.—You might have mentioned, That the House being informed of this, and having no immediate Call for the Money, did themselves adopt the Measure of placing it in the Stocks, which then were low; when it might on a Peace produce a considerable Profit, and in the mean time accumulate an Interest: That they even passed a Bill, directing the subsequent Sums granted by Parliament, to be placed with the former; That the Measure was prudent and safe; and, That the Loss arose not from placing the Money in the Stocks, but from the imprudent and unnecessary drawing it out at the very Time when they were lowest, on some slight uncertain Rumours of a Peace concluded: That if the Assembly had let it remain another Year, instead of losing they would have gained Six Thousand Pounds; and that after all, since the Exchange at which they sold their Bills, was near Twenty per Cent. higher when they drew, than when the Stocks were purchased, the Loss was far from being so great as you represent it. All these Things you might have said, for they are, and you know them to be, Part of the *Whole Truth*;—but they would have spoiled your Accusation. The late Speaker of your honourable House, Mr. Norris, who has, I suppose, all my Letters to him, and Copies of his own to me, relating to that Transaction, can testify with how much Integrity and Candour I managed the whole Affair.—All the House were sensible of it, being from time to time fully acquainted with the Facts. If I had gone to Gaming in the Stocks with the Public Money, and through my Fault a

"We were much with William Allen's happy Arrival on your Side, when you gave his Instructions, added to the Powers and Commissions the Proprietaries have invested him with, may prove effectual, in restoring Harmony and Tranquillity among you, so much to be desired by every Well-wisher to your Province. Pray be assured of our sincere and best Wishes for the Success of this salutary Work, and that nothing is so Power, to contribute thereto, will ever be wanting."

Sum was lost, as your Protest would insinuate, why was I not censured and punished for it when I returned? You, honorable Sir (my Enemy of seven Years Standing) was then in the House. You were appointed on the Committee for examining my Accounts; you reported that you found them just, and signed that Report. I never solicited the Employ of Agent: I made no Bargain for my future Service, when I was ordered to England by the Assembly; nor did they vote me any Salary. I lived there near six Years at my own Expence, and I made no Charge or Demand when I came home. You, Sir, of all others, was the very Member that proposed (for the Honour and Justice of the House) a Compensation to be made me of the Five Thousand Pounds you mentioned. Was it with an Intent to reproach me thus publicly for accepting it? I thanked the House for it then, and I thank you now for proposing it; Tho' you, who have lived in England, can easily conceive, that besides the Prejudice to my private Affairs by my Absence, a Thousand Pounds more would not have reimbursed me. The Money voted was immediately paid me. But, if I had occasioned the Loss of Six Thousand Pounds to the Province, here was a fair Opportunity of securing easily the greatest Part of it; why was not the Five Thousand Pounds deducted, and the Remainder called for?—The Reason is, This Accusation was not then invented.—Permit me to add, that supposing the whole Eleven Thousand Pounds an Expence occasioned by my Voyage to England, yet the Taxation of the Proprietary Estate now established, will, when valued by Years Purchase, be found in time an Advantage to the Public, far exceeding that Expence. And if the Expence is at present a Burthen, the Odium of it ought to lie on those who, by their Injustice, made the Voyage necessary, and not on me, who only submitted to the Orders of the House, in undertaking it.

I am now to take Leave (perhaps a last Leave) of the Country I love, and in which I have spent the greatest Part of my Life.—ESTO PERPETUA.—I wish every kind of Prosperity to my Friends,—and I forgive my Enemies.

LONDON, September 14.

AT the late Hunting-match between the Elec-
tors of Mentz and Palatine, besides other
Game, there were no less than One Hundred and
Four Stags killed within the Space of about three
Hours.

Letters from Florence, dated August 16, say,
in all Appearance all Communication will be stop-
ped between the Ports of Leghorn and Naples.
They deliver no more Letters which come from
the latter, although they have submitted to all the
Precautions used in the Lazaret.

They write from Bress, that 300 Families em-
barked the 24th of August last, for the French Set-
tlements of Cayenne in the West-Indies: A con-
siderable Number were also to be shipped off from
Port L'Orient in a few Days for the same Place.

It is now said the Benefit accruing to the Re-
venue from only entering on the Customs and Excise
Books the large Quantity of seizable Goods now
on the Life of Man, will amount to a Sum little
short of One Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling.

The Demand of Woollens for the Spanish Trade
has, for some Weeks past, been considerably in-
creased—a happy Preface that our Staple Manu-
factures, when properly encouraged, cannot be

equalled by any other Nation, notwithstanding the
most treacherous Practices of France and Hol-
land.

We hear that a Parliamentary Enquiry will be
made next Session into the State of the inferior
Clergy, and of those who hold Pluralities, with
the View of redressing the Hardships the former
labour under.

Sept. 17. Letters from Italy, by Saturday's
Mails, say, that a Sovereign of that Country (who
is not named) is going immediately to abdicate
his Dominions in favour of his Son.

The Duke of York, when he was last at Genoa,
made a Present of a superb Chariot (built at Lon-
don) to Miss Angelica Durazzo, with the Arms
of that Lady painted thereon; in Return for the
very great Attention paid to his Royal Highness
by the Durazzo Family.

We are assured that 10,000 Seamen will forth-
with be raised, in order to man the Fleet that is
now getting ready with all Expedition.

Saturday, about eleven o'Clock, the different
Proprietors of the new invented Preservatives a-
gainst drowning, met at Black-Friars, to convince
the Public of the Utility of their Inventions, and
after settling some Disputes it was agreed to try
them at London-Bridge, at which Time there was
a considerable Fall; accordingly, two Men with
Cork-Jackets went through erect without using
their Arms or Legs, one of them having a drawn
Cutlass in his Hand; then two Men and a Wo-
man with a Mob-cap on and red Ribbands, dres-
sed in air Jackets, went likewise through, and
were followed by two Men with the marine Collar
and Belt: They continued dancing in the Eddy a
considerable Time, to the up small Diversion of
Thousands of Spectators, who surrounded them in
Boats. One of the Men in an air Jacket presented
the Ladies with Apples, regaled himself with
Bread and Cheese, and after which he fired a Pis-
tol: These Things were contained in his Cap
made on purpose. Upon the whole it was a Droll
and not Indecent Sight, they all being in Flannel
Shifts and Linen Breeches.

Extract of a Letter from Scarborough, Sept. 11.

"On the 6th Inst. the Freedom of the ancient
Corporation of Scarborough was presented to the
Rt. Hon. the Marquis of Granby in a Gold Box,
as a Proof of their Sense of his glorious Exploits
in Germany during the last War; and of their un-
merited Obligations to his Lordship for his par-
ticular Attachment to that Place. His Lordship,
with his accustomed Generosity, gave a grand and
splendid Entertainment at Browne's Room, to the
Bailiffs and the rest of the Corporation, this Day,
at which likewise were present several of the No-
bility and Gentry that were at the Spa, to the
Number, in all, of about Seventy."

A few Days ago a dead Body was landed at
Cadiz, inclosed in a long Skin, nearly resembling
that of a Bear. It was found, with several others
of the same Kind, in some Caverns in the Canary
Islands, where they are supposed to have been bu-
ried before the Conquest of those Islands by John
Betancourt, a Norman, in 1417, and by Peter de
Vera, a Spaniard, in 1483. The Flesh of this
Body, though dried, is nevertheless preserved, and
is not flexible, but hard as Wood, so that, upon
touching the Body, it seems petrified, though it is
not. The Features of the Face are very perfect,
and appear to be those of a young Man; nor is
that, or any other Part of the Body decayed: The
Body is no more shrank than if the Person had not
been dead above two or three Days, only the Skin
appears a little shrivelled. This Body is sent to
Madrid to be deposited in the Royal Surgery.
The Case in which this Body was placed, had a-
nother small Case within it, containing two or
three Vases, and a Hand-mill, which were found
in the same Cavern; from which it is supposed
that it was customary with the old Inhabitants of
the Canary Islands to place the Vases in their Bu-
rial Places.

CHARLES-TOWN, (South-Carolina,) November 2.

The Snow Eagle, James Hutton, Master, that
sailed from this Port 22d August last for Antigua,
with a Cargo of Lumber, and 71 Barrels of Rice,
overfet in the Night of September 8th, in Lat. 28°
44' N. and Long. 65° 30'. The People were 12
Hours on the Bottom of the Vessel before the
Boat came up, on board of which they all got.
On the 3d Day the Carpenter died, whose Body
they eat, after taking out the Entrails. On the
9th Day they cast Lots in the Boat which of them
should be killed, for the Sustainance of the Rest,
and as they were going to lay hold of the wretched
Victim, in order to put him to Death, they ob-
served a Vessel becalmed, which they made for,
and found to be a Schooner from South-Key, in

North-Carolina, which carried them into St.
Christopher's, September 20th.

ANNAPOLIS, November 21.

Some few Weeks since sail'd from hence, for
London, the Brigantine Brothers, Capt. Morrison,
who struck on the Middle Ground going down
the Bay, about VIII o'Clock in an Evening, in
bad Weather, and next Morning she beat to
Pieces, but the People were all saved.

Copy of a LETTER from JOHN HICKS, Esq; to the Committee of Merchants in Boston.
Woburn, St. Martin's Lane, 24 August, 1764.

GENTLEMEN,
 I March I was favoured with a Letter from you, as a Committee of the Merchants at Boston, dated the 10th of February last, accompanied with a State of the Trade of your Province, and a request that I might use my interest and influence in obtaining some favourable alterations in the renewal, if attempted, of the then expiring sugar act. The regard due to so respectable a body of Merchants, the importance of the subject, and the particular esteem I entertain for each of you, to whom I have the happiness of being personally known, must have commanded an immediate acknowledgment of the honour you did me, had not an opposition to a bill then depending in the House of Commons, which affected your Trade, Navigation and Commerce in several essential points, exclusive of what you wrote on, so engaged my attention, as to make that mark of civility incompatible with your real interest.

The bill being past, I resolv'd on replying to your favor, but finding on reflection greater difficulty in conveying an adequate idea of what had been oppos'd, and what had been propos'd than I first apprehended, I determin'd on postponing my answer, that it might be accompanied with a little tract, which I flatter'd myself, would have explain'd to you, and all the British colonies on the continent of America, the steps which ought to have been taken for the mutual interest of Great-Britain and her Colonies; and from the omission of which, what has been done must prove ineffectual for the service of both.

Unforeseen accidents have hitherto impeded this publication, and it is now thought advisable to defer it, to the approaching meeting of parliament; when I doubt not, but an opportunity will offer of convincing you that the Impachment of my conduct, so industriously publish'd in all the American News Papers, was false, malicious, and infamous; in the interim I must beg leave to refer you to our worthy friend, — for the exculpation of my public behaviour, who heard what pass'd in the House of Commons: He has also seen the tract mentioned, and can give you a clear and circumstantial detail of the whole. But as to my private conduct, you will, I am persuaded, indulge me in laying before you a few anecdotes, and attribute the recital of them to the necessity of my vindication, not the vanity of affecting consequences.

From my arrival in England to this day, I have done every thing that the narrow compass of my abilities and connections would admit of, to alter the act complain'd of by the merchants of Boston, so as to make it answer their wishes, upon the principal of such change being for the interest of the whole empire: and to procure other regulations respecting several branches of American trade, &c. which labour under injudicious and destructive impositions and restrictions, and which no power but the legislative one of this country can accomplish. Hitherto my endeavours have proved either abortive, or of little effect: But last Autumn having heard that the ministry had form'd a plan of revenue to be rais'd in America, sufficient to defray Great-Britain's expence for that country, which was to be laid before Parliament the ensuing session, and in which, among other things I could get no account of, there was a Stamp Duty, and one of four pence per gallon on foreign Molasses: I judg'd it a proper time to renew my application for the adoption of a plan I had drawn up several Years ago, and is now intended to be printed with observations on the late act, and to be sent to you. Accordingly I waited on the Secretaries of State, to whom I had the honour of being known, and exhibited it to them: It was sent by one of them to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, with whom I had not the least acquaintance, and by the sender I was afterwards introduced to him. Several conferences with this minister ensued, in which I endeavour'd, tho' ineffectually to prevail on him to postpone the Stamp duty, until the opinion of the colonies upon the subject might be known: Nor could I obtain his consent to the reduction of the duty on Molasses to lower than three pence per gallon. This was all I knew of the intentions of government, previous to the introduction of the plan into the House of Commons.

When the committee of the house had agreed to the Resolutions moved by the Chancellor, I had several more interviews with him, but fruitless as to the obtaining any alteration in the act. I then not only refus'd furnishing him with an effectual remedy against Smuggling in America, but continu'd as opposition to his plan from no other motive and with no other views than that of serving the mother country and her colonies.

The act pass'd in consequence of those resolutions, and the other measures taken by Government, relative to the trade and revenue of America, are likely to produce very little more than disgust, trouble and oppression to the colonies; which when administration is convinc'd of by experience, and it cannot be long before this happens, the affairs of the colonies may perhaps, be then put upon a wise and solid foundation, for the reciprocal interest of Great-Britain and them: 'till then various reasons not becoming me to mention, induce me to believe that all efforts for an alteration must be in a manner useless. However, neither the difficulty of accomplishing this desirable end, nor the opposition that I am likely to meet with, shall discourage me from the prosecution of the arduous task I am striving to accomplish, in settling the interests of the colonies and mother country on their true basis, separately providing for each, yet reconciling them so, that the one may grow and flourish under the protection and superintendency of the other.

Altho' my private attempts to delay the introduction of the Stamp duty was ineffectual, yet my public one succeeded: But as the consideration of this, as well as the act

which pass'd last session, will be resumed next winter in parliament, I must request of the merchants of Boston to convey me their objections to the late act, and to furnish me with such new lights relative to the affairs of sugar and molasses as have of late occur'd, and they may rest assur'd that I shall make the best use of them for their interest, that my ability will enable me to do. As to the Stamp, I am to presume that the General Court of the Province will take that into consideration, and give every necessary instruction to their Agent on that head: Yet for my particular information, I shall be oblig'd to you if you will instruct me why the provincial Stamp did not succeed with you and Mr. New-York: and if you will furnish me with every reason you can assign against the establishment of a general Stamp duty throughout America, you may do a most essential piece of service to your country. They will be all wanted here, as many plausible ones are urg'd in favour of this tax, deduc'd from the utility of the like one in this country, but there may be local circumstances that may make it impracticable or not beneficial to the revenue to a country so thinly inhabited and discontinuously settled as America is at present.

The necessity in the opinion of administration of establishing either the Stamp Duty, or some other inland Tax seems partly to arise from the indistinct conversation of some Americans, who deny the rights of Kings, Lords and Commons, to impose such a tax on America; and to facilitate the measure, it was observable that the motion for the Stamp, was introduced to the committee of the whole house, by a declaration of the minister that such doctrine had been urg'd to him! As I had never, in the 14 years I resided in America, nor in any conversation I have since had with the Gentlemen from that country, heard such an impetuous and dangerous opinion, I was, I confess, much astonished. It was not without great difficulty that I remov'd the prejudices conceiv'd against the northern colonies from such erroneous and alarming doctrine; and altho' the reasons urg'd by me for postponing the Stamp duty until the next year prevail'd, yet I must observe to you, that the minister agreed reluctantly to it, and being intreated, declar'd his resolution of convincing the colonies next session that they are as subject to an inland tax, which the Post-Office erected by an act of the 9th of Queen Anne was, as any other impos'd by the Legislature of Great-Britain.

This being a fact of public notoriety, I should presume when it comes to be truly known amongst you, that the accounts which celebrate throughout America, the principal author and abettor of this mushroom policy, as the person to whom the colonies are indebted for the postponing of the Stamp duty, must be despis'd; when it is plain, that if it be impos'd, they with greater propriety ought to impute it to him, and the other undiscerning Americans he has drawn into the adoption of his sentiments: Equally ridiculous is the conduct of those who labour to persuade the colonies into a reverence for another Gentleman, as their honestest, ablest, firmest, and most successful friend, when the magnify'd services he has render'd them is still a secret, even to us on the spot; unless the proposing of this very Stamp duty to the minister, of which he has the reputation, may be estimated in that light.

This inversion of truth and justice should have pass'd unnoticed by me, had it been productive of no other consequence than a misapplication of praise to the favoured Gentleman; then I should have indulg'd them in the decorating themselves in borrow'd plumes, and remain'd content with the homefelt satisfaction of having endeavour'd to serve my country. — But as every man of delicate feelings wishes to stand unblemish'd in the estimation of his countrymen, and as the illiberal treatment I have receiv'd, has rous'd my resentment, you, Gentlemen, will, I flatter myself, not impute to vanity the claim I lay to your good opinion and remembrance of me, in thus assuring you that I was the person who prevail'd to put off the Stamp duty till we could hear what the colonies had to say upon it; and I alone oppos'd the late act in the house. It is true Mr. Jackson join'd me upon the Molasses clause, and spoke ably in favour of reducing the duty to two pence per gallon. This is all the assistance I had, for even the Agents for the northern colonies did not so much as petition to delay the Bill, until they could be instructed by their constituents on so new and extraordinary a measure, which the colonies have a right to, and which used to be done in similar cases, as well as to be heard at the bar of the house by their Agents, or by Council, having no representation in parliament.

Give me leave now Gentlemen, to acknowledge the great pleasure I received from your obliging favour to me, and the confidence you were pleas'd to place in me as one, at least, well dispos'd to serve my country; and to again assure you, forgiving and forgetting the injustice of the treatment I have receiv'd, I am determin'd to evince a firm attachment to and a warm zeal for the promotion of the honour and interest of the American colonies, so far as they can be made to coincide with those of the Mother Country, never entertaining a thought to serve one to the prejudice of the other. Should I however be so unfortunate as not to be able to render my native country any services, a sincere desire and an assiduous endeavour to do it, shall be my consolation against every misrepresentation that the most implacable of my enemies shall devise.

The reason we put it so high as two pence was, the French suffering our vessels to go to their Islands and to carry off Molasses without the expense of passports, or the rigour of laws. This having been lately establish'd by proclamation, you could afford two pence as well as the penny you were always willing to pay before this indulgence and security took place.

LONDON, September 1.

At the Seat of — Plumbtree, at Nunnington in Kent, Esq; there is now standing a large Oak, nick named the *Fruitful Oak*, which measures four Rods, or twenty-two Yards in Girth, reckoned the largest Oak that ever grew in England. [Whoever Doubts the Truth of this, may Repair to Mr. Plumbtree, and measure his Oak Tree.]

Sept. 4. Mr. Foote has had the good Fortune to die a Bon Mot, for which it is hard to say whether he is most admired or envied. — Mr. Foote happened lately to meet a Nobleman of his old and intimate Acquaintance, now in one of the highest Stations, among some of his jovial Companions over a Bottle; his Lordship deign'd to address his old Friend in his former Freedom, with, "What, F—c, are not you hanged yet?" To which Mr. F—c answer'd, "No, my Lord, I am not of Consequence enough to be of any Party." His Lordship replied, "What are the odds, F—c, whether you are Hanged or Foxed first? To which the Humourist, with equal Satire and Wit, rejoined, "My Lord, that will depend upon which I first Embrace, your Lordship's Principles or your Concubine." [Certainly this Mr. Foot has a queer Headpiece.]

Every Body knows, that when they go to Calais, or other Parts of France, they are obliged to give in their Names; and a Gentleman lately had the Curiosity to get an Account of the Number of Englishmen only at Calais since the Commencement of the Peace, and they amounted to upwards of 10,000. Now, as our People are, in these Journeys, remarkable for living in the highest Manner, according to their Abilities, the Sum expended must be very immense, and for ever lost to this Kingdom. It is therefore to be wished, that they were obliged to pay a certain Sum for the Liberty of going, unless upon real Business.

Sept. 7. It is said his Royal Highness the Duke of York will shortly sail to the Mediterranean, with a large Fleet of Observation, which will be Commanded by his Royal Highness.

We can but smile at the little Arts which are made Use of to keep up the Spirit of Party during the Intervals of Parliament. One while we are told, that the Minority is strengthened by an Addition of twelve Members: At another, that a certain Duke has acceded to the Number. Then again we are amused with the many patriotic Measures which they are resolv'd to push at the Meeting of Parliament. Such idle Stories may entertain a Set of shallow Quidnuncs; but Men of any Experience and Reflection have little Hopes that they will act otherwise than most Minorities have acted before them; that is, that they will, right or wrong, oppose the Administration in every Point, till themselves and Friends can get into Power, when they will pursue the very same Measures which they now affect to condemn.

It is reported that some unwarrantable Proceedings of the Spaniards at the Manillas, will occasion some English Men of War to visit those Seas early in the Spring.

It is said a Quantity of Ordnance, and three Companies of Foot, will shortly embark, for the better Protection of the English Settlement on Black River, Musquito Shore.

It is said that the Parliament will not meet for the Dispatch of public Business till after Christmas.

Sept. 13. A Sea Officer reading in some of the Papers, that a new Manoeuvre was going to be introduced on board our Ships of War, which it was tho't would be of great Service in Time of Action, said, "That he could see no Manner of Occasion for any new Manoeuvres, till the French and Spaniards had found out the Way of rendering our old Ones ineffectual;" which, if we may judge from the last War, they are not likely soon to do.

When the last Dutch Mail came away, a Rupture between England and the Family Compact was looked upon in Holland so unavoidable, that Orders were given to reinforce their several Settlements in the West-Indies, by the next Ships, not having forgot the Insults offered to the Dutch Flag by all the contending Powers in the late War.

We hear from York, that a certain Justice of the Peace has laid a considerable Wager with a Gentleman eminent on the Turf, that he will find

a Man that shall make more Bricks in one Day, than any other Man shall eat Pease in the same Time. It is said great Sums are depending.

We are credibly informed, that a certain patriotic Member of an august Assembly, strenuously advised the Securing the Salt Islands in the West-Indies at all Events, and from every Insult, if we tendered our Fishery, or the Dignity of the British Name in Europe; it having been fully proved, that two of these Places are entirely English Property.

B O S T O N, November 5.

We hear from the second Parish in Hingham, that one Mrs. Bourne of that Place (a Person peculiarly fond of Children) was on Monday Evening, to the great Joy of herself and Friends, safely delivered of three Male Children, after having lived upwards of Eleven Years in the connubial State without Offspring, with one of the kindest of Husbands. [Great Encouragement this, for some Folks, whose best Endeavours have hitherto proved fruitless.]

N E W Y O R K, November 5.

During the late Sessions of the General Assembly of this Colony, two Petitions were presented to the House, the first from Mr. Nicholas W. Stuyvesant, the other from Thomas William Moore, and Abraham Lynsen, requesting their Names may be inserted in the Bill then depending in the House, in Behalf of Samuel Bayard, as Vendue Master; There were also the Names of Stephen De-Lancey, Winter Fargie, and Teleman Cuyler, motion'd as to be inserted in the said Bill;—It was carried in the Affirmative. The Bill was afterwards proposed to be rejected, but it was carried in the Negative, the Bill passed, and sent up to the Council for Concurrence: But on the 19th ult. his Majesty's Council were pleased to reject the Bill, and Mr. Samuel Bayard remains as sole Vendue Master.

There were also during the said Sessions, a Representation and Petition to the King's Most Excellent Majesty: Another to the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled; and a third to the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, representing the Commons of Great Britain; presented by a Committee appointed for that Purpose, read, approved of, and signed by Mr. Speaker, with Orders to be forwarded immediately to Mr. Agent Charles, desiring him to use his utmost Diligence to obtain the Prayer thereof; and to call to his Assistance such Counsel, learned in the Law, as the Weight and Importance of the Matters, in them contained, require.

The principal Subject of the several Representations and Petitions, are, That of the Sugar Act:—of the Act restraining Paper Bills of Credit in the Colonies from being a legal Tender; and of the several other Acts of Parliament lately passed with Relation to the Trade of the Northern Colonies.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, November 15.

In a Letter from Stanton, in Virginia, dated October 26, it is said, that on the 29th of September the Indians killed one Crawford and his Wife, and burnt their House and Barn, with a great Quantity of Grain in it: And that on the First of October they burnt the House of William Patton, and carried off a Boy.

Our Advices from Carlisle are, that all is very quiet there; our People, in general, returning to their Places; and that Fifty or Sixty Volunteers, from the Frontiers marched with Colonel Bouquet from Pittsburgh against the Enemy.

Our Intelligence from Pittsburgh, of the 26th and 30th ult. is, that that Post enjoyed a perfect Calm, not an Indian being to be seen on the Communication, by which People with Loads of Butter, Cheese, &c. arrived there daily unmolested.

On Friday last an Express arrived here, in his Way to New-York, with Dispatches from Colonel BOUQUET to General GAGE, the Contents whereof we have not yet learnt; but from what the Messenger heard on the Road, and Hints we have had from some Gentlemen from the Westward, there is Reason to believe they relate to a Peace with the Shawanese and Delaware Indians; the Chiefs of whom, it is said, met the Colonel soon after he left Pittsburgh, and begged, in the most abject Manner, for Mercy and Forgiveness, endeavouring to throw the Blame on the other Western Indians, and their young Men; told him they were in a starving Condition, and had not an Ounce of Powder or Lead to hunt for Provisions, requesting a Supply for that Purpose from him. But that worthy and prudent Gentleman, we hear, refused their Request, being but too well acquainted with the horrid Barbarity, Ingratitude, Baseness and Treachery of these Nations in particular to

the English, with which we are informed; he most justly reproached them, telling them, his Army was to exterminate against them, that it was with the greatest Difficulty he could keep them from falling upon them, and extirpating them from off the Face of the Earth; but that notwithstanding all their Cruelties and ill Usage, they might still have Peace, provided they agreed to the Terms, and Security could be had for the Performance of them; letting them know at the same time, that before any Proposals were made to them, they must, and should, deliver up all the Prisoners they had, even the White Women that might have intermarried with them, and the Children born by them in their Country.—Soon after this (our Information runs) the Savages delivered up 17 or 18 Prisoners, and made Returns of 367 Captives they had in all, which they were quickly to bring in.—Thirty Six-Nation Indians, and two White Men, were said to have joined the Colonel, in order, it was thought, to help to settle Matters for the Delawares and Shawanese.

Nov. 22. Last Friday Evening, about 7 o'Clock, as Capt. Alexander Katter was returning Home, he was overtaken, in Second-street near the New-Market, by three Fellows who knock'd him down and tore off the left Skirt of his Coat, in the Pocket of which was about 30 Shillings; but on seeing some Persons coming towards them, they made off, not having Time to rifle his Pockets on the right Side, in which was his Pocket Book, Watch, &c. Capt. Katter was so bruised that he has ever since been confined to his Bed.

A N N A P O L I S, November 29.

Monday last came on the Election of two Representatives to serve in the next General Assembly of the Province for this City, when there were Three Candidates proposed by the Electors: The Election lasted till Evening, when the Poll was Closed, and stood thus,

and the Two first Named Gentlemen were Declared duly Elected.

Next Monday comes on the Election for Four Members for this County.

Our Informant last Week, gave us a wrong Day, with regard to the Adjournment (or REJOURNMENT, as some will call it) of Anne-Arundel County Court: It ought to have been the second (and not the first) Tuesday in December: Of which all concerned, may, if they please, take Notice.

Yesterday a Man, who formerly lived near this City, with Two of his Sons (a third having escaped) were Escorted to Town, all Iron'd, both Hands and Feet, by a number of Armed Men, and committed to Prison, on VERY STRONG Suspicion of having long Practiced the Business of BORROWING WITHOUT LEAVE, Horses, Mares, &c. and LEAVING them for CASH, or by Way of SWAP, at a Distance from Home. Perhaps it may be called HORSE-STEALING.
