

STUDENT BODY ELECTS CAMPUS LEADERS

Enrollment for Second Semester Totals 322

The enrollment at STC this semester totals 302 full-time students and 20 part-time students studying under teacher education and junior college curricula. Two hundred and forty-seven of these students are enrolled in the teacher training program. The remaining fifty-five are in the transfer program.

As it was last semester, the women still outnumber the men; there are 177 women and 125 men. The freshmen have the largest class, numbering 112; sophomores, 79; juniors, 53; and seniors, 58.

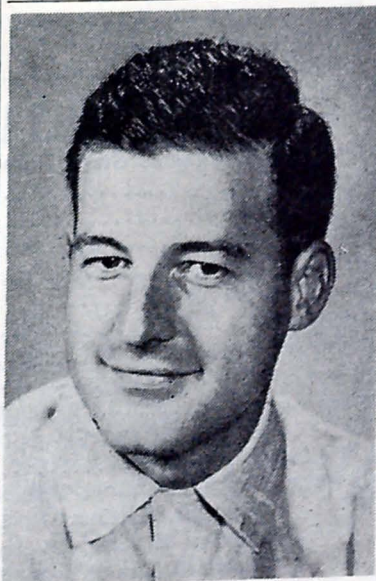

Wicomico High Chorus Presented Concert Here

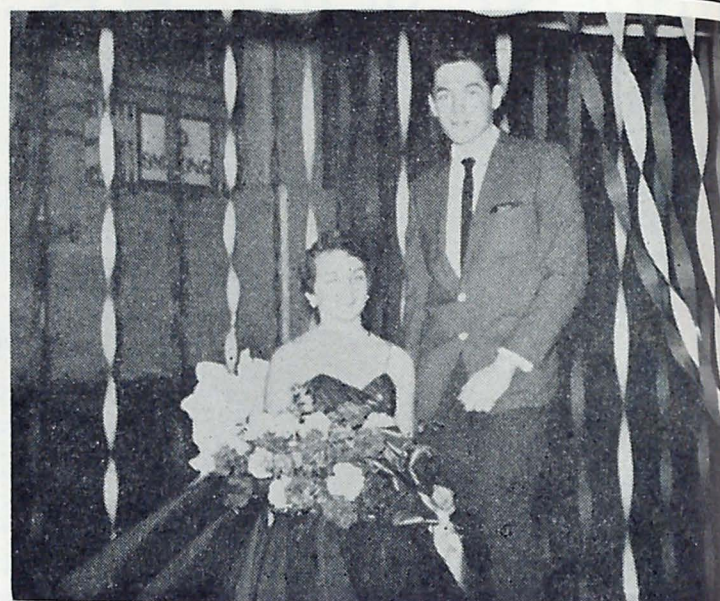
On Tuesday, February 18, at 1:45 P.M., in the college auditorium, the Wicomico Senior High School chorus presented a concert.

SGA Will Send Five Delegates to New York

The Salisbury Student Government Association has received an invitation to attend the Twelfth Annual Intercollegiate Conference sponsored by Barnard College of Columbia University in New York City. The conference is to be held on Saturday, March 8. Students from twelve states will attend this conference to study and discuss

"A Re-evaluation of American Democratic Society."

The morning session of this conference will be opened by the Keynote Address delivered by Max Lerner, the noted columnist and author of "America As a Civilization." Following this noted authorities on American Civilization will conduct discussion groups on the question of "What Are Our American Democratic Ideals?"

After a luncheon "The Influence and Effect of Democratic Ideals on Contemporary American Life" will be discussed in five different categories and panels. These are Politics and Government, Education, Religion, The Arts, and Economics. Following a final summarizing session, the conference will be closed with a coffee hour.

The five delegates to be sent from STC (one delegate for each panel session) have been selected by the Executive Committee of the SGA. Criteria for selection was as follows:

1. Background and interest in one of discussion groups.
2. Ability to express oneself in a discussion.
3. Ability to report back to the student body of STC.
4. Member of the Junior or Senior class.

The delegates to make this trip are: Delores Gardner, Politics and Government; Louise Holbrook, Education; Bill Livingston, Economics; Jack Weise, Religion; Paul Butler, The Arts. Dr. William Wroten will accompany the group as their faculty advisor.

Expenses of the group will be paid by the SGA as set up by that organization at the beginning of the school year. That is; the SGA will pay transportation to and from the convention and hotel expenses for one night. All other expenses will be met by the delegates.

Sport Beat

When George Mikan retired from pro basketball with 11,764 points, it seemed to be a record that would stand like Babe Ruth's 714 home runs. Then Dolph Schayer came into focus.

Schayer, who stands 6 ft. 8 in. and weighs 220, came on to break Mikan's record and now every point he scores ups his own record. For nine seasons Schayer had been going along almost unnoticed by the fans but the defensive ball player knew he was there. Schayer hadn't been a flashy player like Cousy but he had been a consistent one.

Dolph has never led the league in scoring but has always ranked near the top. For the past eight seasons he has been named to the All-American squad which is a record.

Last year was Dolph's best season since he went to Syracuse from New York University. He was third in the league in scoring and sank a record number of 625 foul shots. He was also third in rebounds and led everybody in minutes played. He even topped his own team in assists. Only one other team high scorer has accomplished the latter and that was Bob Cousy.

It seems strange when you read these things about Schayer that his coach told him to stay away from pro basketball. His coach, Howard Cann, didn't think Dolph was aggressive enough or big enough. Dolph had the height, 6 ft. 7 in., but when he graduated he weighed only 190. However he was only 20 and soon added an inch plus 20 pounds.

Schayer is truly one of the all-time greats of basketball. He had to get that distinction the hard way. He had to break Mikan's record to make people realize he was around.
