By Gary White When George Mikan retired from pro basketball with 11,764 points, it seemed to be a record that would stand like Babe Ruth's 714 home runs. Then Dolph Schayer came into focus.

Schayer, who stands 6 ft. 8 in. and weighs 220, came on to break Mikan's record and now every point he scores ups his own record. For nine seasons Schaver had been going along almost unnoticed by the fans but the defensive ball player knew he was there. Schayer hadn't been a flashy player like Cousy but he had been a consistent one.

Dolph has never led the league in scoring but has always ranked near the top. For the past eight seasons he has been named to the All-American squad which is a record.

Last year was Dolph's best season since he went to Syracuse from New York University. He was third in the league in scoring and sank a record number of 625 foul shots. He was also third in rebounds and led everybody in minutes played. He even topped his own team in assists. Only one other team high scorer has accomplished the latter and that was Bob Cousy.

It seems strange when you read these things about Schayer that his coach told him to stay away from pro basketball. His coach. Howard Cann, didn't think Dolph was aggressive enough or big enough. Dolph had the height, 6 ft. 7 in., but when he graduated he weighed only 190. However he was only 20 and soon added an inch plus 20 pounds.

Schayer is truly one of the alltime greats of basketball. He had to get that distinction the hard way. He had to break Minkan's record to make people realize he was around.
