Frostburg Invitational Gymnastic Tournament

The Frostburg State women's gymnastic team will open its season this Sunday with the first annual Frostburg State Invitational to begin at 1:00 p.m.

Joining Frostburg will be Georgetown University, Keene State College, Ursinus College, Pitt-Johnstown, Indiana (PA) University, Lock Haven State College, and Wilson College.

The Frostburg State women's gymnastic team will have not only its largest squad ever but its most talented for the 1981-82 campaign.

In addition to five new freshmen, head coach Margie Schae-

ffer welcomes back eight veteran performers from a year ago.

"In our favor this year is the year of experience earned by our returning gymnasts and the sound, strong experience of our freshmen recruits," noted Schaeffer.

Gone from last year's squad, that finished 6-8, is Diana Sippel, who was a national qualifier the past two years. Sippel has joined the coaching staff as a graduate assistant.

Leading the returnees is senior Becky Sharp, who has also qualified for nationals the past two years, finishing 41st and

42nd in the all-around. Sharp holds the school record on the balance beam (8.75) and in the floor exercise (8.55) and was named FSC's most valuable gymnast in 1980 and most improved gymnast in 1981.

Joining veteran Sharp are junior Tammy Young along with sophomores Debbie Bonilla, Juli Brode, Colleen Buck, Linda Koelliker, Mary Leary, and Mary Lee Putnam.

The top freshman recruits include Stephanie Reindollar, a four-year gymnast in high school and Angie Stanbery, who has 10 years of gymnastic experience.

SHOWBOAT OPENS!

The Department of Speech & Theatre at FSC will give a production of SHOW BOAT, the popular musical by Oscar Hammerstein II and Jerome Kern on December 3, 4, 5, & 6th. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m., in Compton Auditorium.

The Show is directed by Dr. David R. Press, and the designer and technical director is Edward Thompson.

Reservations for the show can be made by telephoning 689-4145 between the hours of 1:00 and 4:00 p.m. Tickets are \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for students.

The action of this musical begins in the 1880's during the heyday of the traveling showboats. The Cotton Blossom docks in Natchez, where the captain's daughter, Magnolia, falls in love with a dashing riverboat gambler, Gaylord Ravenal. They at first cannot admit their feelings but profess a willingness to "Make Believe." The events that

follow give focus to the romantic relationship between Magnolia and Ravenal over a period of years. Other figures also provide unforgettable moments in this great musical. Joe, a black workhand, is seen singing about "Ol' Man River," and Julie, an alcoholic entertainer, is found rehearsing her evening's number "Bill."

Based on Edna Ferber's novel SHOW BOAT was an outstanding commercial success and artistic triumph in New York and has survived as one of the masterpieces of our lyric stage.

The Dept of Speech Communication and Theatre also announces that the the Lane College Center will offer a wine and cheese pre-holiday social before the opening night performances. The social is scheduled at the LaneCenter on Thursday, December 3rd. Tickets for the pre-theatre social and for SHOW BOAT may be purchased in the Lane Center.

Foundation Loans Available

Thanks to a generous gift by Frostburg alumni Wilbur and Helen Hoopengardner, the Education Department is now accepting applications for three non-interest bearing loans for students completing their student teaching internship during the Spring, 1982 semester. Loans will be granted in the amount of \$200. Each loan is interest-free and is to be repaid to the FSC Foundation within one year of the recipient's graduation. Although the basic criterion for awarding the loans will be student need, applicants

are asked to submit one letter of recommendation from a Phase II faculty member. Applications are now available in the Office of Field Experiences, Frampton Hall 203; completed applications, including the letter of recommendation, must be returned to the same office by Friday, December 4th, 1981.

The Student Personnel Committee of the Education Dept., consisting of Joyce Azzi, Roger Dow, David Fell, and Betty Roemmelmeyer, will review the applications and announce the awards by December 18, 1981.

Bobcat Classic Opens Friday

The Frostburg State College Men's Basketball team will host the fifth annual Bobcat Classic on Friday and Saturday.

On Friday, John Jay College meets Salisbury State in the opener at 6:00 p.m. while Frostburg battles Lehman College in the nightcap, at 8:00 p.m. The consolation and finals continue on Saturday at 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. respectively.

The Bobcats have been in the finals all four previous years and won the tournament in 1978 and 1979. In 1977, FSC lost to Point Park, 71-60; in 1978 the Bobcats beat Marycrest, 74-59;

in 1979 Frostburg beat Shepherd, 96-88 and last year FSC lost to Pitt-Johnstown, in overtime, 84-81.

The Bobcats, who posted a 1-1 record going into yesterday's game with St. Vincent, lost their opener to Davis & Elkins, 68-60, before defeating Wilmington College, 71-63.

Leading Frostburg in scoring is senior Steve Liller with 19.5 points per game. Also scoring in double figures are senior guard Mike McLister with a 15.0 average and senior forward Dave Porter at an 11.5 clip. Liller leads the team with ten assists.

Letters to the Editor

Mr. Editor;

I am a transfer student at FSC with junior status. This is my first semester at Frostburg and I am already aware of many of the good and bad points of this campus. Both the faculty and the selection of courses are good for a small college. Sporting and student activities events are well planned and executed.

However, I am concerned and somewhat puzzled by the exceedingly stringent alcohol policy on campus. I know that in years past Frostburg had (and to some extent still has) a bad reputation as a heavy-duty party school. Understandably, the administration wanted to crack down on this image. Certainly the ban of beer kegs on campus for personal use in the dorms makes sense considering the possible damage of school property. But the recent ban of the new 3 gallon plastic kegs makes no sense to me since one case of 16 ounce cans also adds up to 3 gallons. It's a known fact that most college students don't have a lot of money at any one time. Anything that saves money should be encouraged.

What really concerns me is the effect that the alcohol policy has on social gatherings in the dorms. We all know that beer and other alcoholic beverages are part of the college social life. Currently all drinks must stay within the confines of the rooms. The dorm room (especially Cambridge) can only hold a small number of people. Because of size limitation, even a small party of 20 is impossible.

Now I'm not suggesting that the college should permit hall parties; that only imposes on the people that do not wish to be at that party. But is the idea of a cluster party that outrageous? I think not. As a resident of Cambridge Hall, I think the cluster study areas are excellent locations for small parties. Some of the clusters in Frederick Hall would be good for multiple room gatherings. But as current policy is written cluster parties are not allowed. I feel that this is unreasonable. If all the residents of a particular cluster agree to give a party and the participants stay within that cluster I see no problem whatsoever. Also, because T.V.s are in public areas, no one is allowed to have a beer during a football game or, for that matter, during any program. Now I'm not saying that drinking a beer while watching football is some sort of inalienable right but there's nothing wrong with it either.

If I sound like an alcoholic to you, let me assure you that I'm not. In fact, I hardly drink at all. But I do like meeting people, showing my friends a good time, and saving money. Dorm parties help with all these. If the administration relaxes the current alcohol policy and sets down new rules banning alcohol in specific areas (such as main hallways and outside), I think the staff would be surprised by student cooperation. MOST students don't want a campus beer-bash. They just want a little more freedom.

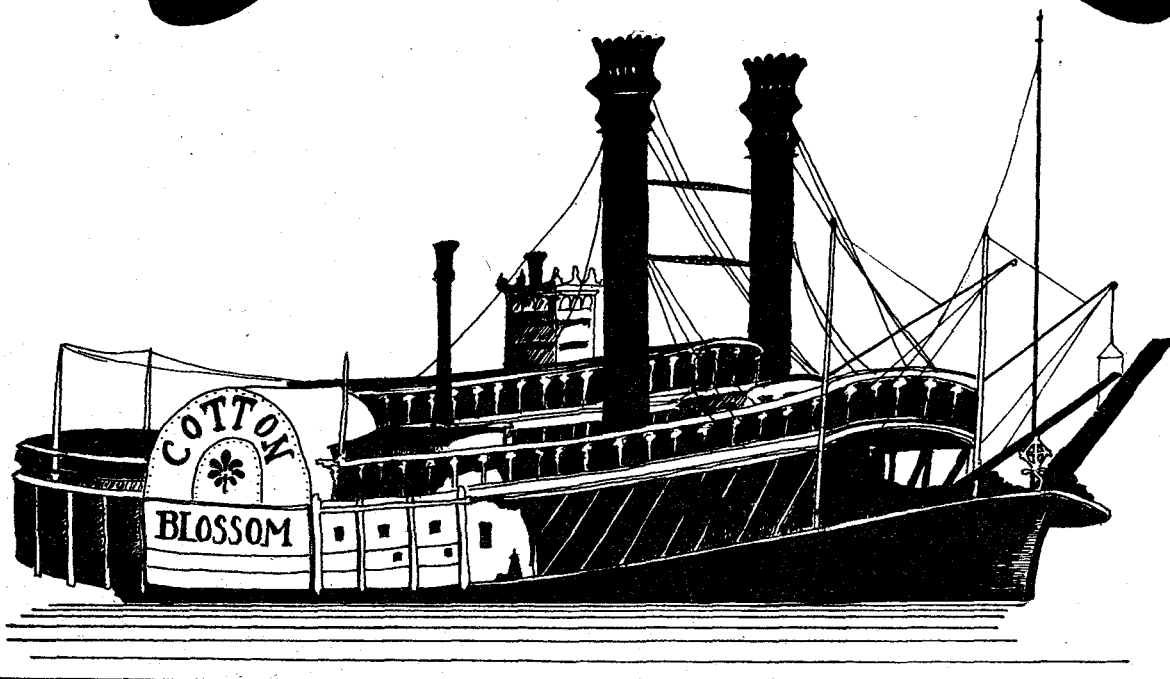
