Feminist Leader Eleanor Smeal to Visit

Eleanor Smeal, president and co-founder of the Feminist Majority Foundation and past president of NOW, will be on campus Thursday, Dec. 2. Smeal will speak at 2 p.m. in Lane Center 201 on "Forging Feminism and Fighting the Backlash."

This event is free and open to the public.

Smeal is a renowned leader in the feminist and civil rights movements. She was also the longest-standing president of the National Organization for Women and a key leader in the campaign to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.

She is trained as a political scientist and was the first to identify the "gender gap" - the difference in the way women and men vote. She is the author of How and Why Women Will Elect the Next President (Harper and Row, 1984). Smeal is known as a "political analyst, strategist and grassroots organizer."

The presentation will be followed by questions and answers and an informal reception. The event is funded by a Faculty Development Speakers Grant.

AbsoluteWooze

The impaired driving program Nov. 11 in the Lane Center Lobby was a great success. The program was put on by Center Stage, Officer Winters of University Police and the Western Maryland Safe Communities Director, Jennifer Drees.

The program had three stations, the first was a coordination station by having participants attempting to toss a ball into a trash can; the second was the walk and turn test, which is used as an actual impaired driving test, testing divided attention; and the third test was the driving simulation test.

All participants had difficulty with the various tests. After the stations were completed, some of the participants were asked what they thought about drinking and driving. Some stated that the program really opened their eyes to how impaired they really were at the various levels (as provided by the fatal vision goggles .07-.20 BAC levels). Some participants didn't even realize that they had difficulty following simple directions, as in the walk and

turn test, until they were told what they did wrong (keep in mind only their vision was impaired).

The presenters explained to several of the participants that the reason they felt like the fatal vision goggles were not realistic was because they were having difficulty "seeing" a line, trash can or road through impaired eyes while they were sober. Participants could not comprehend that when a person is impaired they are mentally impaired, also. The fatal vision goggles only represent impairment and do not actually make the participant impaired.

Hopefully, the 202 people who participated will think twice about driving under the influence after this demonstration. For those of you who could not or did not participate we hope that you will join us next fall for Absolute Wooze II.
