

The Nabb Research Center was pleased to receive an addition to its ever-growing postcard collection. Dr. Patricia Emerson donated a wonderful array of postcards, from the early 1900s, along with a unique wooden family toy that has been with her family for over two generations. The slightly tattered wooden figure has been a treasured item for Emerson and her family. She wanted the Nabb Center to preserve the toy, as it is representative of early United States material culture.

The postcards that she donated are exceptional representations of our 20th century history as well. The majority were made and printed in Germany. The decorations vary from embossed flowers and velvet appliqués to a uniquely embroidered floral design. Embroidered postcards are incredibly rare. The quality of these cards is unmatched by present-day postcards. Before the days of telephones and e-mails, people depended on material modes of communication; even simple one-line messages were sent through the mail.

The Nabb Center has received many antique items from Emerson. She has contributed clocks, ceramic jugs and crocks, coverlets and even furniture. The Nabb Center hopes to have all of its material culture donations on display for the public to see. These items are a way to expand our knowledge and continued understanding of Delmarva's past.


African-American Family History Workshop Saturday, January 17, 2004

Family Genealogy Workshop Saturday, February 7, 2004

Dr. Ray Thompson of Salisbury University will present a workshop on the genealogical research of Delmarva families. Thompson will tell of the significance of oral histo-



ry and the intricacies involved in deciphering Colonial handwriting and jargon. He will demonstrate how to use the best sources available in a "hands-on" manner and will provide a handbook on research methods and sources.
