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Dance Company Slates Fall Concert

The FSU Dance
Company will present
its fall, 1999 Dance
Concert on Friday
and Saturday, Nov.
5 and 6, at 8 p.m.
and Sunday, Nov. 7, at
2 p.m. in the Performing Arts
Center Drama Theatre.

The concert will showcase eight works by Dr. Barry Fischer that illustrate a diversity of themes from jazz to modern dance. It will also offer a retrospective of Fischer's work during his past four years as artistic director of the FSU Dance Company.

Included in the program are five group dances and three solos set to music by Bernard Herman, Sylvester, Zap Mama, Songs of the Auvergen, Ennio Morricone, Peggy Lee, Patsy Cline and a musical collage premiere for a dance for children of all ages.

The 1997 American College Dance Festival award-winning choreography of "Lamenting Echo," a solo based on the loss of colleagues and friends who have died from AIDS, and "Fever" will be performed by guest artist and FSU alumna Connie Fink, Class of '98.

A guest artist from New York City will perform the solo "You Belong To Me," set to the music of Patsy Cline.

Past highlights of the FSU Dance Company featured in the program include the dramatic "Hands From The Cauldron," based on Lady Macbeth's struggle with her act of murder, and "Carpe Diem." Fun and lighter works include "Runaway," "Seduction of the Gypsy Sparrows" (1999 ACDF Awardee) and "In Boots and Shoes."

Game time is 1 p.m.



FSU Observes Kristallnacht



Kristallnacht, or "the Night of Broken Glass," occurred Nov. 9 and 10, 1938, when German rioters, encouraged by Nazi government officials, destroyed Jewish businesses throughout Germany and burned 275 synagogues. The glass from this destruction littered streets everywhere, and more than 100 Jews were killed, most beaten to death by mobs as police passively watched. In the following days, 25,000 Jews were sent to concentration camps. The dispossession of Jewish businesses and wealth was then set to occur by the new year.

Because the actions of the government during Kristallnacht made very clear the Nazi intent (despite widespread international protest) to eradicate
Jewish property and influence throughout greater Germany, this date marks the beginning of the Shoah, the Holocaust.
Eventually, the governmental goals expanded to include the total annihilation not only of Jewish culture but of Jewish life itself.

The commemoration of Kristallnacht at FSU will include Tishler's memories of her family's experiences during the Shoah, of being herself a hidden child in Nazi-occupied Europe, and of being in displaced persons' camps after the war.

The program will include a candlelighting ceremony for the victims of genocide, organized by Hillel students.

Under the direction of Dr. Karen Soderberg, Collegium Musicum will perform "A Child's Journey" by Michael Horvitt and "Tsen Brider" by Joshua Jacobsen, with text by Martin Rosenberg. "A Child's Journey," based on three poems by Yaakov Barilai, reflects the amazement of children who couldn't fully comprehend nor understand the horrors they faced.



New Master's in Applied Computer Science Set

FSU has created the Master's Degree in Applied Computer Science, a flexible program designed to accommodate a variety of academic backgrounds and levels of computer skill.

Aimed not only at computer science graduates, but also at career changers, the program is flexible enough to bring up to speed those whose undergraduate degrees weren't computer-related but who have gravitated toward computers in the course of their careers.

The application process not only takes into account undergraduate and graduate computer courses and related subjects, but also computer subjects applicants may have taught themselves or learned through seminars and continuing education classes, as well as on-the-job computer experience. Applications will be reviewed and the appropriate courses, up to about 18

credits worth, will be recommended to qualify for the master of science program. These may include such courses as program languages and hardware background courses.

The 30-credit graduate program is offered on either a full- or part-time basis. It is designed to work around the schedule of most working people. Most classes will be in the late afternoon or evening or on Saturdays. A degree typically can be earned in one and a half to two years.

The program will offer two specialization areas, database management systems and a general concentration.
