Five Track and Field All-Americans

The Frostburg State College men's track team concluded the highly successful 1981 season with "All-American" performances by five Bobcats at the NCAA Division III National Championships in Cleveland. Senior Ted Suttmeier placed fourth in the NCAA Javelin with a throw of 219'6" and the 400-meter relay team of freshmen James Robinson, sophomore Gary Alston, sophomore Allan Pleasants, and senior Wayne Cottman also placed fourth in a Frostburg State College record time of 41.77. Sixteen Frostburg State trackmen have been recognized as NAIA and NCAA All-Americans since 1978.

Other top FSC performances in the NCAA meet were recorded by sophomore Jack Kiley, who was a finalist in the 1500-meter run; Robinson, a finalist in the long jump; and Cottman, a finalist in the 100-meter dash. Fourteen Bobcats had qualified for the Nationals.

Season highlights for 1981 included winning the Mason-Dixon Conference Championships for the fourth consecutive year, defeating West Virginia University 101-66, recording another undefeated season in dual meets (fourth straight), and winning the Towson State Invitational for the third time in a row. Coach Robert Lewis said that one indicator of the team's talent was the fact that

15 new college records were established during the 1981 indoor and outdoor campaigns.

Coach Lewis also stated that the Bobcat track and field athletes who finished their FSC careers after the 1981 season will definitely be missed, but that there are plenty of returning and new trackmen on campus who should guarantee another strong team in 1982. He wished to express his thanks to the following former athletes:

John Blankfield, one of the college's most consistent and determined distance runners. Great cross country competitor.

John Casadonte, 1980 Mason-Dixon champion in long jump.

Wayne Cottman, holder of all FSC sprint records and winner of numerous Mason-Dixon titles. Member of five FSC record-holding relay teams.

Mike Spinnler, holder of the college's 3000-Meter steeplechase mark.

Ted Suttmeier, one of FSC's all-time top javelin throwers. Won 1981 Davidson Relays crown, placed third in 1981 Penn Relays, and captured three Mason-Dixon first places during his career.

Mike Taylor, 1980 NCAA All-American in triple jump. FSC's best-ever doubler in long jump and triple jump. Won many Mason-Dixon firsts. Also a very valuable hurdler.

Introducing ... New Faculty

Acting President Jablon has announced the appointment of six new full-time faculty members and one administrator. They are Judith A. Dieruf, instructor of art; Charles W. Fletcher, instructor of mathematics; Dr. James K. Good, instructor of geography; William J. Hanlon, assistant professor of computer science; Dr. Joseph M. Hoffman, instructor of physics; Ann B. Raynsford, instructor of art; and William D. Dick, assistant director of admissions.

Ms. Dieruf comes to Frostburg from Minot State College in North Dakota where she was a member of the art faculty for the past four years. She was graduated from Montana State University in 1962 and earned a BFA degree at the University of Washington in 1972. She completed her MFA degree at Montana State in June of this year.

Mr. Fletcher is currently completing work for a Ph.D. degree at the University of Maryland. He was graduated from Purdue University in 1969, and earned a Master of Arts in Teaching degree from Jacksonville University in 1976. He also holds

master's degrees in mathematics from the University of Florida and the University of Maryland. He taught in the Mathematics and Engineering department of Prince George's Community College for the past two years.

Dr. Good was a member of the faculty at Delta State University last academic year. He has also taught at the University of Central Arkansas, Indiana University-Purdue University at Fort Wayne, and Indiana State University. He is a 1972 graduate of Emporia State University and earned his advanced degrees at Indiana State University in 1974 and 1978.

Mr. Hanlon comes to Frostburg State College from the S.C.M. Corporation where he was a senior systems analyst. Previous positions held include systems analyst for Central National Bank, instructor at Cuyahoga Community College, systems designer for Chase Brass and Copper, senior scientific programmer at Carnegie-Mellon University of Pittsburgh, holds a M.B.A. degree from Cleveland University and has C.D.P. certification.

Dr. Hoffman was member of the faculty at Shenandoah College for the past three years. He also held teaching positions at Lord Fairfax Community College and the University of Colorado. A 1969 graduate of the Pennsylvania State University, he earned advanced degrees in astro-geophysics at the University of Colorado in 1974 and 1977.

Ms. Raynsford completed a MFA degree at Washington University in St. Louis earlier this year. She obtained her BFA degree at Syracuse University in 1979 and B.A. degree from the State University of New York at Potsdam in 1971. She taught art in the Munnsville, New York schools from 1975 to 1979 and was employed by the Craft Alliance last year.

Mr. Dick was graduated from Allegany Community College in 1980 and received his B.A. degree from Frostburg State College this summer. Prior to joining the FSC staff, he was employed by the Department of Community Development in Cumberland in 1978-79. From 1973 to 1978, he served in the U.S. Marine Corps.

Editorial

This summer the students of Frostburg State College received a letter which informed them of a change in the College Judicial System. In concluding, the letter referred the reader to the Pathfinder for a complete description of the new system. Upon reading the full description in the Pathfinder I noticed a serious error, or oversight, which should be brought to the attention of students and administrators alike.

Among other things, the new Judicial System sets up mandatory sanctions, or punishments, for specific offenses. One of these mandatory sanctions is suspension or expulsion for the assault of college personnel, or student workers. The assault of another student carries no mandatory sanction.

While I can agree with the idea of having mandatory sanctions—hopefully they will have the desired effect on the rate of offenses—I think this sanction only goes halfway. The sanction should be imposed because of the offense and not because of the victims position or job status. Assault is assault, regardless of the victim. Come on Judicial Board, change the mandatory sanction to treat the offense and not the victims position.

Annual Competition For Overseas Study

The Institute of International Education has announced the official opening of the 1982-83 competition for grants for graduate study or research abroad in academic fields and for professional training in the creative and performing arts. It is expected that approximately 516 awards to 50 countries will be available for the 1982-83 academic year.

The purpose of these grants is to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and other countries through the exchange of persons, knowledge and skills. They are provided under the terms of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (Fulbright-Hays Act) and by foreign governments, universities and private donors.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application,

who will generally hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, will be proficient in the language of the host country. Except for certain specific awards, candidates may not hold the Ph.D. at the time of application. Candidates for 1982-83 are ineligible for a grant to a country if they have been doing graduate work or conducting research in that country for six months or more during the academic year 1981-82.

Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree but they must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Social work applicants must have at least two years of professional experience after the Master of Social Work degree; candidates in medicine must

have an M.D. at the time of application.

Application forms and further information for students currently enrolled at Frostburg State College may be obtained from the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Administration Building 238. The deadline for filing applications on this campus is OCTOBER 9, 1981.

Sculptor Lectures On Artwork

Mr. Andrew Leicester, sculptor, will present a slide lecture on his own work in Lane Center Room 201 on Friday, September 11th at 8:00 p.m. The Library is sponsoring this event because Mr. Leicester has been selected to create a work of art at Frostburg State College. The budget of \$35,000 was appropriated by the Maryland State Legislature and National Endowment for the Arts.

"The Artistic Vision of Andrew Leicester" should interest the FSC community because his installation will become a permanent part of our campus life. Among his other work is the Minnesota Highway Project, a series of six earthworks along a 30 mile section of U.S. Highway 52. The project was completed in 1975. It consists of shallow earth cuts lined with white limestone and appears as a number of disconnected marks that become a simple geometric form only when viewed from a single predetermined point.

Leicester's latest work is called "Floating Mesa," a 310 foot long steel wall circling Goat Mountain Mesa in Amarillo, Texas. Another earthwork project was constructed at Artpark in Lewiston, NY in 1978. Leicester created with "Diamond" a seemingly regular two dimensional image in a warped, three dimensional space. This wooden structure is meant to be viewed from a parkway 1,000 feet from the project site. When the nine separate ramps and walls are seen from a moving vehicle, the elements appear to coalesce into a diamond configuration. Seconds later the form separates into its component parts as the fragments fall into different planes.

Students and faculty are invited to see and hear "The Artistic Vision of Andrew Leicester." The artist will describe his work with words and color slides, as well as answer questions from the audience. Don't miss this chance to learn about the creative process which will result in a yet-to-be-designed permanent art work for FSC.

CONSTITUTION STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION FROSTBURG STATE COLLEGE FROSTBURG, MARYLAND 21532

PREAMBLE

We, the students of Frostburg State College at Frostburg, Maryland, in order to provide an effective means of self-government through definition and execution of our rights and obligations, to provide for the coordination between students and student organizations and to perpetuate the ideals for which Frostburg State College stands, hereby submit to be governed by the following constitution.

ARTICLE I — Name

The name of this association shall be the STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION OF FROSTBURG STATE COLLEGE

ARTICLE II — Branches of Government

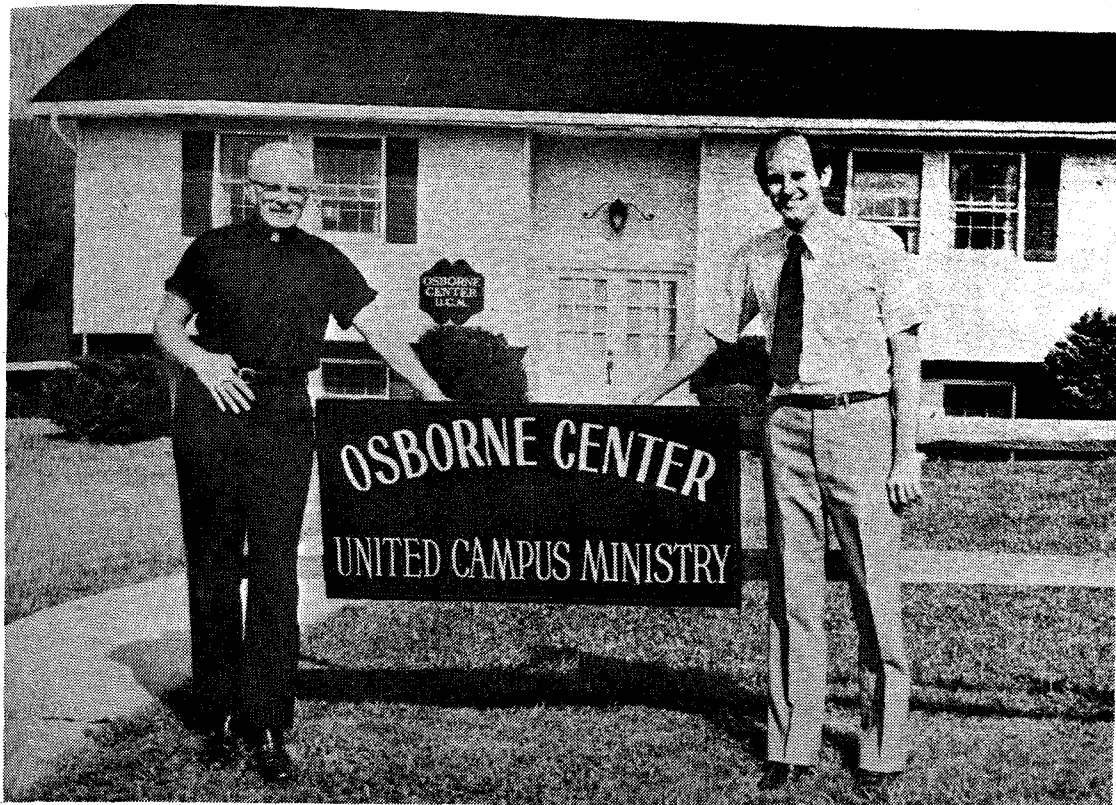
The branches of government of this Association shall be the Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch and the College Center Board.

A. The Executive Branch — The Executive Branch is composed of the Executive Council which is subject to the following:

1. Members — The Executive Council shall be composed of the Student Government Association President, who shall serve as chairman; the Student Government Association Vice President; the Student Government Association Secretary; the Student Government Association Treasurer; the Student Government Association Parliamentarian; and the President of the College Center Board. All powers duties of Student Government Association Officers can be found in the Bylaws of the Executive Branch.
2. Responsibilities
 - a. The Executive Council shall act as a steering committee of the Student Government Association, in the determination, institution, implementation and administration of Student Government Association policies; hence forth known as SGA.
 - b. The Executive Council shall implement the budget of

the SGA as previously approved by the Legislature.

- c. The Executive Council shall act as a liaison between the College Administration, the College Forum, the SGA Legislative Branch, the College Center Board and the students.
 - d. The Executive Council shall determine the nature of the SGA's advisory system, and shall have the sole power to appoint SGA Advisors.
- B. The Legislative Branch — The Legislative Branch is composed of the Student House of Representatives and its standing committees, the Student Senate, which are subject to the following:
1. Members — The Student House of Representatives shall contain:
 - a. One member from each standard class making;
 - b. One graduate studies student appointed by recommendation of graduate studies program each September by the President of the SGA.
 - c. One person from each dorm per 150 residents. Each dorm must have at least one representative;
 - d. Nine undergraduate students who do not live in a dormitory.
 2. Members of the Student Senate — The Student Senate shall be composed of eight students, Vice President and the President of the Student Government Association.
 3. Responsibilities
 - a. The Student House of Representatives shall review, approve and/or modify the budget of the SGA as presented by the Treasurer in accordance with the House Finance Committee.
 - b. The Student House of Representatives shall receive and initiate referendum and recall for the purpose of gathering student opinion;
 - c. The Student House of Representatives shall have the sole responsibility of impeachment or removal of SGA members from office;
 - d. The Student House of Representatives shall have the responsibility of establishing, authorizing, coordinating and dissolving committees conducive in any manner to student interests;
 - e. The Student House of Representatives shall grant organizational charters and shall have the responsibility to enforce the provision in which it was granted.
- C. Implementation:
1. The majority of those students who vote in the September, 1981 elections will rule if this Constitution shall pass.

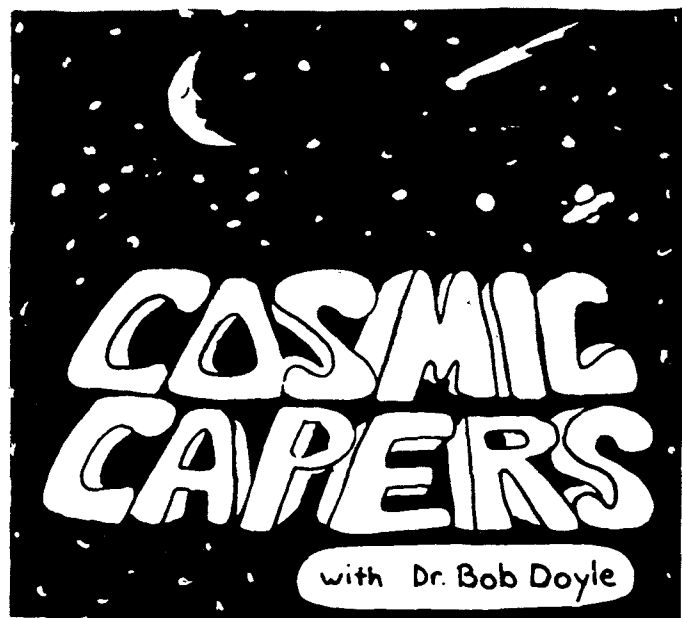
Campus Ministry Make Us Of It

Did you know that there are two full-time chaplains available for service at FSC? Yes, there are! Everyone, certainly freshmen, ought to be aware that Rev. Larry Neumark is the Protestant Chaplain and Fr. Kieran Fergus is the Catholic Chaplain. Both are very anxious to meet students, especially new ones.

The United Campus Ministry (UCM) building, the Osborne Center, is located on Loop Road, across from the back of the Fine Arts Building. Although it looks like a private house, it is very much a public place—and you should have no fear or reservations about coming over just to look around. There is no need to ring the bell or knock on the door. Just come in! It is open virtually all the time. (Father Fergus has living quarters on the second floor.) You can relax in the lounge, listen to the stereo or watch television, study in the library or even make a snack in the kitchen.

The two chaplains provide the thrust of UCM. Larry Neumark is a United Methodist minister and Father Fergus is a Dominican priest. Both are experienced counselors, ecumenical in spirit and involved in various dimensions of campus life. An advisory board for UCM is composed of students, faculty, administrators, local clergy and town people and they meet once a month to plan goals and evaluate directions.

There is a UCM Student Group meeting once a week in the Osborne Center—Thursday evenings at 8:00 p.m. Programs include films, special speakers, Bible sharing and parties. Furthermore, Student Sharing Groups meet on a weekly basis.



Week of Sept. 7th-13th

This week the moon grows from half illuminated to full, passing in front of the star groups Ophiuchus (Serpent Bearer), Sagittarius, Capricornus, and Aquarius. By the end of this week the planets Jupiter and Saturn, whose triple encounter was the year's celestial spectacle, are swallowed in the glare of the western dusk; these two giant planets will reappear in the eastern pre-dawn skies around Halloween.

There's been much publicity about the supposed line-up of planets in 1982. Unfortunately for the pulp magazines and doomsayers, the planets will not be in a line but will be spread out over 5 zodiac groups in the March 1982 skies. Interestingly enough, this week offers a closer grouping of the planets than the much ballyhooed 1982 planetary clustering. Low in the western sky at dusk appear seven of the eight other planets. Dim Neptune is in Ophiuchus, Uranus is in Libra, and the planets Venus, Pluto, Mercury, Jupiter, and Saturn are situated in Virgo. So if California is to drop into the Pacific due to earthquakes induced by planetary tides, then it'll more likely happen in the next few weeks rather than in 1982.

Featured at the Frostburg State College Planetarium is "Sky Watchers of Ancient Mexico," a panoramic view of three thousand years of Mesoamerican history. In sky obser-

ving and architecture, the Mayans and other peoples were far ahead of their European counterparts. "Sky Watchers of Ancient Mexico" has free public showings at 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoons and on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. The Planetarium is in the front lobby of Tawes Hall, in the middle of the Frostburg State Campus.

Week of Sept. 14th-21st

This is the week of the Harvest Moon, the full moon that lingers longest in the early evening sky. The Harvest Moon is caused by the moon's orbit making its smallest angle with the eastern horizon, minimizing the delay in moonrise from night to night. The name Harvest Moon comes from the fact that this full moon occurs near the first day of fall, the time when farmers work into the night harvesting their crops. Early in the week, the Harvest Moon will appear before 9:00 p.m. while the weekend won't see the moon until late in the evening.

"Sky Watchers of Ancient Mexico" continues at the FSC Planetarium with free public showings on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 and on Sunday afternoons at 1:30 and 2:30. This program, sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities, reviews the wonders of the Maya, including their prediction of eclipses and their extremely accurate Venus calendar.

Other activities include a fall and spring retreat, a College Friends (Big Brother) program, a Seder Feast, worship services and special ecumenical worship services.

If you have questions, or just want to meet the chaplains, stop by the Osborne Center or call 689-5041. If both chaplains are out, just write a note on the message board (just inside the front door on your left) leaving your name and phone number. They will contact you as soon as possible.

Last season will be a tough act to follow for Frostburg State's 1981 women's field hockey team, but head coach Christine Lottes is confident her team can repeat as Maryland State Champions and Regional qualifiers.

"Getting to Regionals really helped us last year," noted Lottes, "It showed our players what they can do outside of our area."

What Frostburg did was lose to Glassboro State, 1-0, in the opening round at Regionals to finish at 9-5-1, setting a team record for most wins.

This year the Bobcats return with a young but experienced squad. Coach Lottes' team will have five seniors, one junior, 12 sophomores and 14 newcomers.

"It will be a more mature team," added Lottes, "we'll have a stronger nucleus of experienced players."

FSC lost its leading scorer Barb Kinman to graduation and will rely on sophomores Barb Barrett and Shari Mantini along with senior Kim Flickinger to supply the scoring punch.

At goalie will be senior Jean Goldsborough, who last

year recorded five shutouts and on five other occasions gave up only one goal. Goldsborough has been helped by the outstanding defensive play of senior Theresa Furnari and sophomores Maureen Beck and Kelly Hyde.

Frostburg will play 12 regularly scheduled games and defend its title at the State Tournament. Added to the schedule is Elizabethtown, ranked fifth in the nation a year ago.

"Our goal will be to try and qualify for a regional berth again for post-season play," said Lottes.

Football Outlook

First-year head coach Dean Peterson carries an aura of reserved optimism, one that is justified after three years of coaching at Dean Junior College (MA) where he posted a 20-4 record.

"One of the advantages you have as a new coach is that nothing I've said or done hasn't worked yet. I'm still in that honeymoon period," noted Peterson. "Also, the people that held down starting positions in the past will want to prove again that they are the best at their position, and those that haven't been starters will want to prove that they should be starting. As a result, all the players will have a tendency to work harder."

Last year FSC finished with a 4-5 record, somewhat of a disappointment after a 6-4 record two seasons ago. This year the Bobcats will be unpredictable with a new head coach and an

even tougher schedule.

Since ten starters return on offense and only three on defense, Peterson's first priorities will be to regroup his defense and to look for players who will be able to step into the vacant positions.

Directing the offense will be senior quarterback Keith Shelly, who has started every game the past two seasons. In addition to Shelly, Frostburg returns with junior running back Rich Prather who rushed for a school record 250 yards in the Bobcats final game last year and on the year averaged 5.0 yards per carry. Prather should be able to run to plenty of daylight behind a veteran offensive line led by senior All-American candidate Bill Ridge (6-3, 262).

The defense is a question mark, but returns senior co-capt Kevin Burnett, who last year was FSC's second leading tackler

(89) while playing nose-guard. Burnett will probably move into the middle linebacker position.

The key to the 1981 season is to get off to a good start. The Bobcats open at home

against NAIA Division I power Shepherd College and then face four road games in a row. The final game of that road stint is against the University of Dayton, the 1980 NCAA Division III National Champions. Frostburg will then return home for three games before closing out the nine-game schedule at Duquesne University.

"Another advantage of being a new coach," added Peterson, "is that the opposing teams won't know what to expect." No one really knows what to expect for FSC in 1981, but new head coach Peterson hopes to give the Bobcats the first of many winning seasons.

Cross Country Outlook

Coming off its most successful season ever, the 1981 Frostburg State men's cross country team must complement its youth with its experience in order to equal or better its 11th place finish at the NCAA Division III nationals a year ago.

Head coach Bob Lewis, who has been FSC's only cross country coach since its start as a varsity sport 11 years ago, has directed the Bobcats to the NCAA national competition the last two seasons. His dual meet record is 61-21, a .744 winning percentage.

Frostburg will field a young squad, as Rich Hoffman will

be the only senior. Hoffman, who finished 49th at nationals, shared the team MVP with Dan Quinn who graduated. Also gone due to graduation are Mike Spinnler and John Blankenfield.

Top returnees for the Bobcats include juniors Jack Kiley, Bob Rimkis and Bob Herring along with sophomores John Arias and John Wheeler.

"The three that we lost to graduation will be hard to replace," noted Lewis, "but this is a very enthusiastic group who enjoy their running. We'll be shooting for nationals for the third year in a row."

The schedule for 1981 in-

cludes only one dual meet and six invitationals before the Mason-Dixon Conference Championships, which the Bobcats won

last year. Then, if qualified, FSC will head to the Mid-East Regionals before the NCAA Division III playoffs.

"We're very optimistic about the upcoming season," noted Lewis, "we have a lot of young runners who are going to have to develop and assume a lot of responsibility."

It looks like another successful year for coach Lewis' Bobcats.

Head Coach Ken Kutler thinks 1981 could be the year that the FSC soccer team receives its first-ever NCAA Tournament bid. "I think we should earn a berth in the NCAA playoffs," said Kutler. "That's our goal." Coming off a record setting year, that goal appears very realistic.

Last season, FSC finished 10-6-1 and was the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division III Champion. The Bobcats broke many records during the year, including most shutouts in a year (8), most con-

secutive shutouts (3), most goals scored (44), and tied the school record for most wins (10). In addition, 14 lettermen return from a year ago.

Heading the list of returning veterans is last year's team MVP, Noel Cyrus. Cyrus, only a junior, may be FSC's best ever sweeper-back and was selected to the first-team Division II and III Md All-State team. Also selected was senior Francisco Castro, who returns as the Bobcats' leading scorer over the past two years.

Other top returnees include junior Jerome Cordts, and soph-

more Daryl Williams, Lawrence Sagel, and Mark Weber. Weber was the key man at goalie last year when the Bobcats recorded eight shutouts.

The schedule includes home games against powerhouses West Virginia, Salisbury State, and Slippery Rock and tough road games with Indiana, UMBC, and Mt. St. Mary's College.

"We can't afford to slip more than once or twice in order to get that first-ever NCAA bid," added Kutler. For the FSC soccer team, 1981 looks like a very good year.

Women's Tennis

The combination of experience and some outstanding newcomers should make the 1981 Frostburg State women's tennis team much improved over a year ago.

"We should do better if everyone stays healthy," said head coach Nancy Crawley, now in her eleventh year as coach of women's varsity tennis.

Last year the Bobcats were 5-9, somewhat of a disappoint-

ment after a 9-3 record two years ago.

Returning are seniors Lea Pfluger, Erin Koogle, Joanne DiGregorio and Cindy Baldwin along with junior Jackie Folio and sophomore Tina Pinocci. Their experience should be complimented by the return of senior Leanne Holmes, who played here for three years before taking a leave of absence in Australia. And transfer Jane Gamble, the number one singles

player at Harford Community College last year should help considerably.

"Our number one goal is to get back on the winning track," added Crawley, "and since this is our first year of NCAA play, hopefully we'll get a post-season bit."

Frostburg should be competitive over its 11-meet schedule which includes Towson State and Salisbury State, two tough opponents at home.

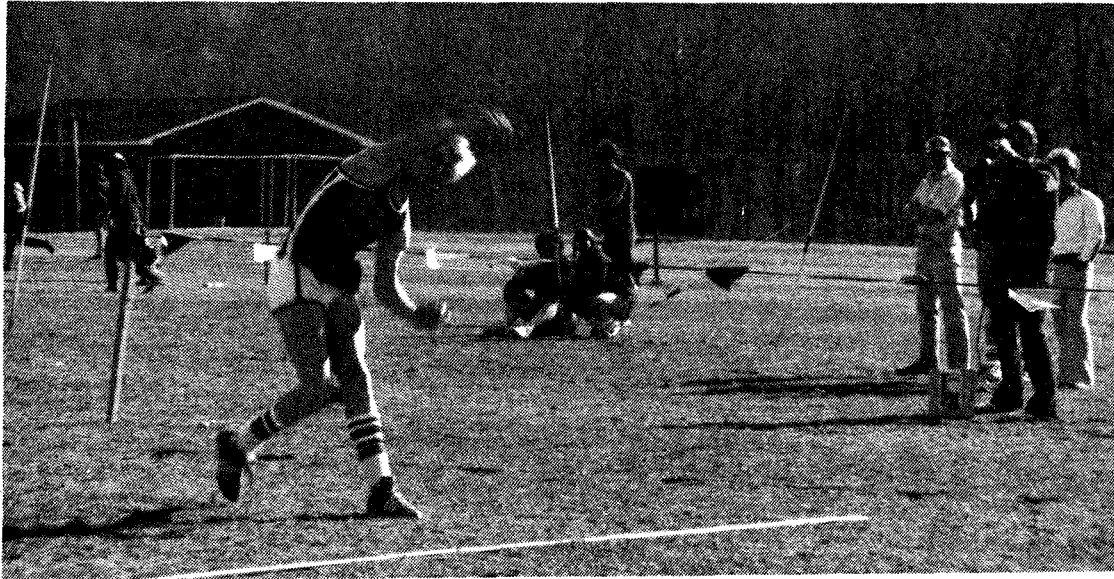

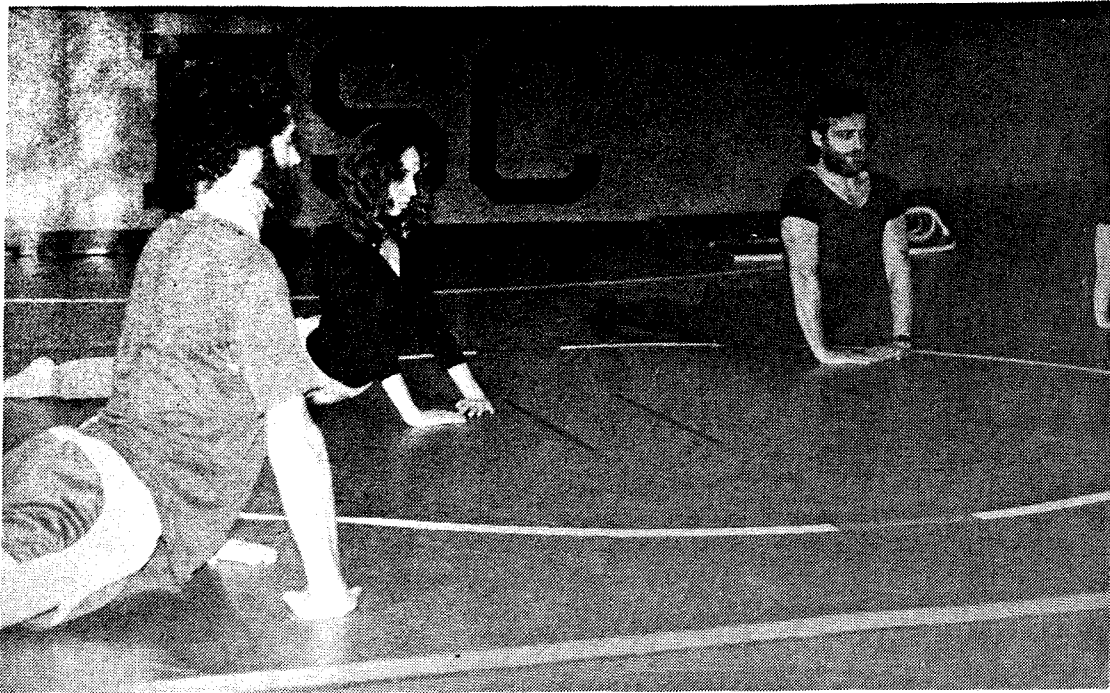

Young people have it. Old people have it. It can strike blacks as well as whites. Not only students, but professional people get it too. Some people have it for years and never get rid of it. Others decide to do something about it. What is "it"? "It" is math anxiety. Simply stated math anxiety is a fear of figuring, a fear of doing anything mathematical.

For some people math anxiety may consist of vague feelings of self-doubt concerning their math abilities. These people can arrive at correct answers to math problems. They lack confidence in their own abilities, however, and attribute their success to luck.

On the other hand, some math-anxious people panic at the sight of a math question. For these individuals math anxiety takes the form of great stress, confusion, and a sense of loss of control. This anxiety can prevent them from even taking the first step toward solving a math problem.

Studies and programs in math education have shown that succeeding with math problems is more often determined by one's attitude and feelings toward the subject than by any innate aptitude for math.

That is why "Controlling Math Workshops" will be available this semester. In these workshops students will be given an opportunity to examine why they have negative feelings toward math and what they can do to change those negative feelings into positive steps toward math confidence.
