Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

Nov. 1, 1970

I completely support Bill No. 1085 that would make student activities fees optional in state colleges. As the "customer" of this institution, I would like to the right to spend my money the way I see fit. I do not see the college as a social or political institution, and I think those who do are naive. "The sweetheart of Sigma Chi" and the clenched fist are not symbols of an aware academic community.

I can INDEED imagine SSC without the yearbook (shades of high school) and the newspaper (shades of my mother's high school). I would, in fact, advocate the abolition of these "sacred" institutions on the grounds that they are irrevelant and non-intellectual. Journalism is not taught here, so we haven't the necessary background to make them decent. We can't justify their existence from an educational tool standpoint or as a communication tool; the campus newsletter very efficiently conveys news.

The literary magazine is original, creative, and an asset to the school. It provides students with an opportunity to publish their work, and is dedicated to the aims of academic excellence. I will be happy to SUBSCRIBE to it, or BUY a copy should the bill be passed. It's worth the money.

I will be happy to pay for events at the door as I do when attending events in the 'outside world'. If most students did, their parents would have less initial financial outlay, and the students would have more financial responsibility. He would have to rely on his own judgement; make choices; possibly even resort to using his own initiative to organize events that DO NOT COST MONEY.

Let's stop penalizing the guy who doesn't need or desire these social, athletic, and political activities and publications. It could be that he'd like to see the money spent on improved academic programs or research. It could be he's right.




