
Members! We hope you enjoyed the September issue of *Shoreline*, which had as its theme "Woven of Many Strands: The Heritage of

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
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Upcoming Events at the Nabb Research Center

Researching the Land Workshop Tuesdays, January 11, 18 and 25

Dr. Edward Otter presents a course designed to give participants instructions on how to research land records. The three-day workshop deals with various aspects of land research, including some of the problems that might arise when examining land records. Researching Family Genealogy Workshop Revisited Saturday, January 22

The Nabb Research Center hosts a genealogy event with Dr. Ray Thompson of the SU History Department. The workshop focuses on researching Delmarva families and includes general information about genealogical research. Dr. Thompson covers various aspects of genealogical research including how to start your family research, what sources to examine for genealogical study and the value of oral history. The workshop will also include a hands-on session focused on the interpretation of Colonial writing and a handbook will be provided highlighting research methods and sources. Cost is \$50

with a \$5 discount to students and Nabb Research Center members. The workshop will run from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. and time will be provided for a lunch break.
