MADRID, March 25.

HE court has received letters by an advice-ship, arrived at Cadiz from the Havanna, importing, that admiral Reggio was preparing to sail for Europe immediately after the arrival of the ships he expected from Vera Cruz, which have a vast quantity of gold and silver on board, besides the products of the West Indies.

Vienna, April 2. No time is yet fixed for the several encampments lately mentioned; but it is certain that orders are issued for tracing a camp at Hohen, the command of which will be given to general count Schulemberg. The court has issued fresh orders for continuing the new levies with all possible diligence, and the colonels are enjoined to bring the muster-rolls to the empress herself, when their regiments are completed.

April 5. Last week ten deputies from the Protestants of Hungary came up to court, to lay before the empress queen several new grievances, and solicit redress.

The 27th of last month an extraordinary conference was held at court, on the memorial presented by the French minister at London, relating to the dispositions of his most Christian majesty, with respect to the affairs of the North, and the consequences thereof. As it appears by this memorial, that the king of France's intention is to prevent troubles in that part of Europe, or to perform his engagements in case his endeavours to preserve peace prove fruitless, the empress queen's ministry have given Mr. Keith, the British minister, to understand, that her Imperial majesty is precisely in the same temper, and earnestly wishes to see the good offices of those powers crowned with success, who shall endeavour to blow away the storm that is gathering in the North.

M. Marhal is set out for Paris, in order to reduce there the empress sends an ambassador extraordinary to the French court. M. Blondel is expected here forthwith, in quality of resident from his most Christian majesty. It is said that these two ministers are charged with instructions about some articles mentioned in the definitive treaty, which neither party has yet been able to define or decide; that private conferences are to be held on this subject, and that commissioners will be forthwith appointed on both sides for the purpose.

Berlin, April 8. It has been remarked here, that, on occasion of the orders given to the king's troops to be in readiness to march in case of need, two distinct pieces have been inserted in some foreign Gazettes, the one being styled an *Exposition*, and the other going under the title of a *Notification*, to his majesty's ministers at foreign courts. Now, it is proper to inform the public, that the last piece only is to be deemed authentic: The other, which is drawn up in a stile favouring of a manifesto, far from being owned by the court, ought to be looked upon only as an amplification of some news writer, or other persons, who should however have considered, that it does not become them to alter the terms in which respectable courts think fit to explain their intentions.

All is very quiet here: The reports that were spread, as if diverse camps were to be speedily formed, are not confirmed; at least, we don't see any dispositions making for those purposes; so that we begin to hope the tranquillity of the North may be preserved, notwithstanding any appearances to the contrary. The buying up of horses for remounting the king's cavalry has been countermanded or suspended.

Hamburg, April 8. A great number of seamen are gone from hence, as also from Lubek, and other neighbouring ports, to Sweden, in order to be employed on board the men of war and gallees lying out in that kingdom.

Dusseldorf, April 7. The Prussian troops in garrison at Wesel, Bielefeld, Herfort, and other places, did receive orders some time since to hold themselves in readiness to march on the

first notice, and were actually preparing to depart; but we have just received advice, that fresh orders are arrived from his Prussian majesty, provisionally suspending the march of the said troops.

Paris, April 7. A courier set out a few days ago for Stockholm, with dispatches for the marquis de Launay, the king's ambassador there, charging him to declare absest to the Swedish court, That his majesty would be very glad if some expedient could be found to prevent a war in the North; but that if it should unfortunately happen otherwise, and there be a necessity for performing his engagements, he will do it with all the punctuality requisite in the observance of treaties.

The duke of Modena having resolved to make a voyage to England, before he returns to his dominions, is accordingly preparing to set out for London in a few days.

The marquis de Valori, our envoy extraordinary at the Prussian court, is set out on his return thither, with new instructions for composing the differences which seem to threaten the North with a war.

Hague, April 15. The States General took, on Saturday last, a resolution to appoint M. William de Haren, to be their envoy extraordinary at the court of Sweden. The deputies of the East-India company are returned to this place, in order to present to the prince stadtholder the diploma of his new office of supreme director and governor-general of that company.

Dresden, April 13. M. Stierberg, the Austrian envoy, arrived here last night. Count Betschkeff, the Russian envoy at this court, who is now appointed ambassador from the court of Petersburg to that of Vienna, was married here to the countess of Hauritz. Count de Bene, the Spanish envoy at this court, set out yesterday on his return to Madrid.

Hague, April 18. A solemn deputation from the East-India company, composed of 32 deputies, waited the day before yesterday on the prince stadtholder, and delivered to his serene highness the diploma of his office of supreme director and governor-general of their company.

Dantzick, April 2. The Russian troops that are traversing Poland, sometimes make forced marches, that they may reach the frontiers of Courland by the end of this month, where they are to halt 'til they receive fresh orders from Petersburg. In the mean time, large magazines are erecting at Riga for their subsistence.

The Prussian regiments, actually in Prussia, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march, that they may observe the motions of the Russian troops when these arrive on the frontiers of Courland. There is much talk of a camp which the Prussians are to form near Koningsberg, but as yet there is nothing decided on this head.

Two thousand men are daily employed in repairing and augmenting the fortifications of this city. The republic's commissaries in Courland confer now and then with the deputies of the noblesse and the states, about the election of a new duke, as it is said.

Warsaw, April 5. The three columns of the Russian troops under general Lieven, have actually passed the Vistula, and continue their march with all possible diligence, resting but one day in the week, and sometimes two, according to the nature of the ground or place they are in. We are assured that the republic has sent orders into Lithuania, for keeping the troops in that duchy in readiness to march, that they may go and reinforce those that have actually already entered the duchy of Courland.

Vienna, April 12. The troops that are to form the intended camps only wait for the last order to begin their march; and it is still given out, that those camps are only designed for introducing a new exercise among the troops.

The deputies of the Protestants of Hungary have received a favourable answer to their memorial, the empress queen having assured

assured them, that she had already issued various orders for redressing religious grievances in that kingdom; that she wished for nothing more than to see a good harmony between her subjects of the two communions; and that she would cause the affairs of the churches taken from the Protestants to be strictly enquired into, in order to it's being decided according to justice and equity.

L O N D O N.

April 6. Yesterday the Right Hon. Sir William Calvert, knight, lord mayor of this city, with the aldermen, sheriffs, &c. went in procession from Guildhall to Leicester-house, to compliment the prince and princess of Wales on the birth of a young princess; when Richard Adams, Esq; the recorder, made a polite and learned speech, to which their royal highnesses returned a suitable answer, and they all had the honour of kissing their royal highnesses hands.

Tuesday night, about 8 o'clock, as Mr. Delaporte of St. Martin's lane, was returning from Cambridge, he was attacked by three footpads and a man on horseback, in the road leading to Islington, near Canbury house, who knock'd him off his horse into a ditch, then took him across the road over a gate into a field, and robb'd him of a gold watch, a diamond ring, a gold ring, 13 guineas, some silver, and several other things of value.

Yesterday the Lapwing sloop of war was launch'd at Woolwich, and the command given to capt. Liloyd; late lieutenant of the Bedford.

The same day the lords of the admiralty gave orders for the Prince Edward man of war to be fitted out with all expedition for the island of Barbadoes, with dispatches of the last importance relating to that island.

April 7. It is very remarkable, that the first man that robbed Mr. Delaporte, as mentioned yesterday, when he got him over the gate, separate from the rest, told him he'd shoot him, if he told either of his accomplices he had taken any gold from him; which put him under the necessity of saying to the others (as they each ask'd him) *That he had no gold at all.* A plain proof what villains they are, even to one another. It is supposed by several circumstances, that they are the same persons who robbed and murder'd Mr. Scott about three weeks ago, and have committed many robberies since about the same place.

Yesterday a sermon was preached by the right reverend father in God, John lord bishop of Lincoln, at St. Lawrence's church near Guildhall, before his grace the duke of Richmond, president, and the rest of the governors of the London infirmaries; there were present the lord archbishop of Canterbury, her grace the duchess of Richmond, the earls of Sandwich, Shaftsbury, &c. the right hon. the lord viscount Windsor, and a great number of the nobility and gentry; who proceeded afterwards to Merchant Taylor's hall, where an elegant entertainment was provided for them. The collection for the above-mentioned charity was thirteen thousand pounds, besides the two hundred pounds, the legacy of Mr. Peck, deceased, then paid in to the treasurers by Sir Robert Ladbrooke.

April 8. Thursday night last about 9 o'clock, seven villains broke into the house at Tyler's Ferry, near Hackney Marsh, bound the man of the house, his servant and child, took from him 15 l. in money, all he had in the world; after which they bound up and carried off all the household goods they could conveniently remove.

Wednesday night a man well dress'd was decoyed into a house in Bowl-yard, St. Giles's, where he was found the next morning robb'd and murder'd.

April 13. Yesterday morning a great number of soldiers, sailors, artificers, husbandmen, &c. attended on the right honourable the lords commissioners of trade and plantations, at Whitehall, and received orders for their being admitted, with their families and effects, into the transports, which are to sail in a few days for the new intended settlement at Nova Scotia.

April 14. In a few days the royal regiment of artillery, consisting of four companies, with the bombardiers, miners, and gunners, will march from Woolwich to Hyde-Park, where we hear they are to encamp, and that his majesty will review them.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, April 18, N. S.

"We still talk of marshal count Saxe's journey to Germany, on occasion of the affairs of the North, and the approaching election of a duke of Courland; this general having resolved, as we are assured, to make good his claim to that duchy, of which he was formerly elected duke. — Notwithstanding

the great reform made in the king's troops seems to promise us a lasting peace, the public is not a little apprehensive that it will not continue long, as they see measures taken to augment the marine of this kingdom, the court having within these few days sent down fresh orders to the sea ports relative thereto. — We are assured that the marriage of one of the princesses, the king's daughters, will be speedily declared. The marquis d'Avrincourt, who is gone to London to execute a secret commission, will forthwith repair from thence to the Hague. It is confirmed that the Pretender's eldest son marries the princess of Radziwil, the richest heiress in Poland; at which the court seems not a little pleased, as he will want the less cash from us in case he finds an opportunity for playing any new pranks beyond sea. — The court has received some important dispatches from M. Durand, the king's minister at London, the principal object of which is the settlement which some of the inhabitants of Martinico have undertaken to make in the island of Tobago. The ministry are now employed in poring over treaties, and looking into other papers, in order to find out by what title this crown may lay claim to the Caribbee islands, that so they may afterwards decide the difference about Tobago in particular."

A hundred pieces of fine polish'd brass cannon are ordered to be brought from the tower by water to Whitehall, and from thence to the camp; and the night the fireworks are play'd off they are to be placed in the Green Park, on the top of Constitution hill.

The honourable the artillery company having offered to attend the right honourable the lord mayor to St. Pauls cathedral, on the thanksgiving day, his lordship accepted the compliment, and desired them to be ready by eleven o'clock in the morning.

April 22. Thursday was held at Merchant Taylor's hall the feast of the sons of the clergy, at which were present his grace the lord archbishop of Canterbury, president of the corporation, the right reverend the bishops of Rochester, Gloucester, Worcester, Bristol, Lincoln, Chichester, St. David's, Carlisle, Peterborough, Bangor, and St. Asaph; the right honourable the lord mayor, and fourteen aldermen. The collection on the rehearsal at St. Paul's, and on Thursday, and at the hall, amounted in all to 977 l. 1 s. 6 d. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Sir Gilbert Williams, Bart.

Yesterday there was a numerous concourse of the nobility, gentry, &c. at Spring Gardens, Vaux hall, to hear the music which is to be performed during the playing off the fireworks rehearsed; which occasioned such a stoppage on London-bridge, as no carriage could go over for near three hours, a thing not known before in the memory of man.

We have an account from Stockholm, by a letter dated April 1, of a very strange murder lately committed not far from Acpfal. A woman that got her bread by driving a kind of peddling trade about the countries, having taken up her lodging in a farm house belonging to a widow, the son of her landlady form'd a design of murdering her; and knowing she was to lie with his mother, came in the night to put his intention into execution: But the stranger finding herself ill, had risen to go and seat herself in the chimney, over the embers, and the assassin, by mistake, cut his mother's throat; for which he has been condemned to be hanged, after first losing his right hand.

B O S T O N, June 19.

We learn that the new governor of Canada has lately wrote a very haughty and insolent letter to the governor of Nova Scotia, and our governor, in which Monsieur claims the big part of Nova Scotia, and part of this province, blaming the governor of Nova Scotia for exacting any authority over the French inhabitants and Indians in that province; also insisting on Col. Gorham's being hindered from using any means by force or otherways to draw said inhabitants from their allegiance to the king of France, and laying many complaints against Mr. Gorham: We also learn the aforesaid inhabitants were rejoiced to hear peace lately proclaimed there, but were chagrin'd to hear the English were going to settle in said province, which they have been made to believe all along by the French, that this province was to be given up as well as Louisbourg. The schooner Anf n sailed for Annapolis last monday, on board of which was Col. Gorham.

WEDNESDAY, July 12, 1749.

PARIS, April 15.

OUR ministers seem to be no less persuaded, than those of other courts, that the North is going in its turn to be the theatre of war: But, notwithstanding what may happen, we are fully convinced that his most Christian majesty will take no other part in it than as mediator; and this is what we are told the marquis de Launay has just notified to his Swedish majesty in very express terms, and that he added, that the intention of the king his master, was to give some rest to his poor subjects, a great number of whom had perished in the late war; and those who remained were greatly exhausted, by having been obliged to furnish very great sums of money to support the expences of it: That his majesty would nevertheless let no opportunity slip of demonstrating to his allies his religious observation of the treaties he had concluded with them; as well by using his good offices in employing all his credit for maintaining, if it was possible, tranquillity between them and the other powers with whom they were upon the point of quarrelling, or to succour them by an augmentation of subsidies, the circumstances of the present conjuncture not permitting him to do it by sending them a body of troops.

Madrid, April 1. In the conferences that Mr. Keene had with Don Joseph de Carvajal, prime minister, and the marquis de l'Ensenada, secretary of state, he proposed to them the plan of a new convention between this court and that of Great Britain, for terminating by a definitive regulation all the differences relating to commerce and navigation in the West Indies. The affairs of the South sea company are to be adjusted in this convention. Mr. Keene spares no pains to bring his negotiation to a happy issue.

Stockholm, April 9. The construction of the galleys, and the raising of the two new regiments, have all the success that could be desired; several foreign officers of merit, who have proposed to bring hither a number of fine men from foreign countries, will be admitted into these regiments.

Berlin, April 15. It is confirmed that the march of the king's troops that are in Westphalia, is suspended. The regiments of Bredow and prince Ferdinand, and some others, that were to go out of their quarters, are also countermanded.

Vienna, April 12. On the 10th instant, all the court and the nobility took their leave of prince Charles of Lorraine; and his royal highness having afterwards taken his leave in form of their majesties, and all the Imperial family, set out for Brussels about 4 in the afternoon; the emperor himself and the princess Charlotte having accompanied him as far as Buckersdorf, where he changed horses for the first stage, and pursued his intended journey as far as the convent of Melk, where he lay the same night.

We are still under very great uneasiness about the situation of things in Hungary, where the Protestants have lost, in one district only, a hundred and five churches, the depriving them of which was attended with some bloodshed: Besides which, the dominant party have published a decree, obliging all the Protestant youth to assist at every solemn procession, on pain of forfeiting a crown; as also to resort to mass four times a year on the like penalty upon each omission. But as the deputies from the Protestants have already received assurances from her Imperial majesty, that she will speedily appoint commissioners to make enquiry into their grievances; we flatter ourselves that all these violences will be stopped. Her Imperial majesty has also promised, that the severity complained of in the execution of the new regulation shall be examined and suppressed.

Dresden, April 13. Orders have been sent to general Subitzki in Poland, to have the light horse, of whom he is the commander, in readiness to march on the first notice; and 'tis conjectured that a camp is to be formed at Warsaw, to subvert during pleasure, in his Polish majesty shall think proper to return

thither, in order to settle and establish the affairs of the kingdom, pursuant to his royal promise with them, very shortly for that purpose.

Ratisbon, April 15. On the 13th instant, about two in the afternoon, duke Charles of Lorraine, arrived at this city post from Vienna; and was saluted here by a discharge of all our cannon from the ramparts.

Bastia, April 3. At this juncture things are here in the strangest condition imaginable; signor Matra has given the strongest assurances imaginable to the French general, of his having no intention to disturb the peace of the island of Corsica, 'til his most Christian majesty's resolutions shall be fully known. The French troops are in a manner masters of every place of any strength; and of every pass of any consequence in this island. But as there are still some Corsicans to submit implicitly to terms with which they are acquainted, the marquis de Cursay has persuaded such as have submitted to think it advantageous to their interests, and consistent with their honour, to act with the greatest severity against those people, to whom they have given the title of rebels; but it is believed, that if they are not speedily reduced, they will grow into a considerable body, and will then give us a great deal of trouble.

Hamburg, April 22. The affairs of the North seem to be still in the same critical situation, both sides continuing to fortify in Finland, but we hear no more of the march of the Prussian troops. Those of Saxony, it is said, begin to assemble in Lusatia, to watch the motions of the neighbouring states.

Brussels, April 24. Prince Charles of Lorraine, governor-general of the Austrian Netherlands, arrived here yesterday in the afternoon from Vienna.

Those on the stage, or in the boxes, may come in masked habits (if agreeable to them), and the performer (if desired) will inform them who they are.

Stage 7: 6d. Boxes 5s. Pit 3s. Gallery 2s.

To begin at half an hour after six o'clock.

Tickets to be had at the Theatre.

The performance continues about two hours and a half.

N.B. If any gentlemen or ladies, after the above performances, (either singly or in company, in or out of masks), are desirous of seeing a representation of any deceased person, such as husband or wife, sister or brother, or any intimate friend of either sex (upon making a gratuity to the performer,) shall be gratified, by seeing and conversing with them for some minutes, as if alive. Likewise (if desired) he will tell you your most secret thoughts in your past life; and give you a full

full view of persons who have injured you, whether dead or alive.

For those gentlemen and ladies who are desirous of seeing this last part, there is a private room provided.

These performances have been seen by most of the crown'd heads of *Asia*, *Africa*, and *Europe*, and never appear'd public any where but once; but will wait on any at their houses, and perform as above, for five pounds each time.

There will be a proper guard, to keep the house in due decorum.

This other Advertisement was also published at the same Time, which, one would have thought, was sufficient to prevent the former's having any Effect.

LATELY ARRIVED FROM ITALY,

Signor *Capitello Jampedo*, a surprizing dwarf, no taller than a common tavern tobacco pipe; who can perform many wonderful equilibres, on the slack or tight rope: Likewise he will transform his body in above ten thousand different shapes and postures; and after he has diverted the spectators two hours and a half, he will open his mouth wide, and jump down his own throat. He being the most wonderfull't wonder of wonders as ever the world wonder'd at, would be willing to join in performance with that surprizing musician on Monday next in the Haymarket.

He is to be spoke with at the Black Raven in Golden lane, every Day from Seven 'til Twelve, and from Twelve all Day long.

Nevertheless, the Contrivance took, and the Playhouse was crowded with Dukes, Duchesses, Lords, Ladies, &c. the Consequence of which will appear from the following Paragraph.

Last night [Monday the 16th] the much expected drama of the Bottle-Conjurer of the New Theatre in the Haymarket ended in the tragi-comical manner following: Curiosity had drawn together prodigious numbers: About 7 the theatre being lighted up, but without so much as a single fiddle to keep the audience in good humour, many grew impatient. Immediately followed a chorus of catcalls, heighten'd by loud vociferations and beating with sticks; when a fellow came from behind the curtain, and bowing, said, that if the performer did not appear, the money should be return'd. At the same time a wag crying out from the pit; That if the ladies and gentlemen would give double prices, the conjurer would get into a pint-bottle; presently a young gentleman in one of the boxes seized a lighted candle, and threw it on the stage. This serv'd as the charge for sounding to battle. Upon this the greatest part of the audience made the best of their way out of the theatre; some losing a cloak, others a hat, others a wig, and others hat, wig and sword afo. One party however staid in the house, in order to demolish the infice, when the mob breaking in, they tore tip the benches, broke to pieces the scenes, pull'd down the boxes, in short dismantled the theatre entirely, carrying away the particulars abovementioned into the street, where they made a mighty bonfire; the curtain being hoisted on a pole by way of flag. A large party of guards were sent for, but came time enough only to warm themselves round the fire. We hear of no other disaster, than a young nobleman's chin being hurt, occasioned by his fall into the pit with part of one of the boxes, which he had forced out with his foot. 'Tis thought the conjurer vanisht away with the bank. Many enemies to a late celebrated book, concerning the ceasing of miracles, are greatly disappointed by the conjurer's nonappearance in the bottle; they imagining, that his jumping into it would have been the most convincing proof possible, that miracles are not yet ceased.

Several Advertisements were printed afterwards, some serious others comical, relating to this whimsical affair; among the rest, was the following, which we hope, may be a Means of curing this Humour for the future.

This is to inform the PUBLIC,

That notwithstanding the great abuse that has been put upon the gentry, there is now in town a man, who instead of creeping into a quart or pint bottle, will change himself into a Rattle, which he hopes will please both young and old. If this person meets with encouragement to this advertisement, he will then acquaint the gentry when and where he performs.

The Reason assigned, in another humorous Advertisement, of the Conjurer's not going into the Quart Bottle, was, that after searching all the Taverns, not one could be found.

On the above Action in the Haymarket, it is thought that the N Conjurers the Quality can bubble, And get their Gold with very little Trouble,

*By putting giddy Lies in public Papers,—
As jumping in Quart Bottles,—such like Vapours;
And further yet, if we the Matter strain,
Would pipe a Tune upon a Walking-Cane;
Nay, more surprizing Tricks! he swore he'd show
Grannums who dy'd a hundred Years ago.
'Tis whimsical enough; what think ye, Sirs?
The Quality can ne'er be Conjurers:—
The De'il a bit;—no, let me speak in brief,
The Audience Fools, the Conjurer a Thief.*

L O N D O N.

March 25. Sir Edward Hawk is appointed to command the Squadron destin'd to convey the transports to Nova Scotia, where he is to continue some time to cover that infant colony; and very speedily that admiral will hoist his flag on board the Rippon, of sixty guns, at Portsmouth.

On Friday the lords of the admiralty put the Albany sloop of war into commission, and gave the command to Capt. John Rouse; the said sloop sails with admiral Hawk to Annapolis-Royal in Nova-Scotia.

There is an account that three French East India ships are arrived at Port l'Orient, richly laden with bale and other goods; which occasioned the actions to rise to 1,493. It's said that they have brought intelligence of great importance to the French nation.

April 8. By the Elizabeth sloop, Capt. Grantham, arrived express from the governor of Barbados, a number of letters were brought to very eminent merchants, many of which contain copies of a declaration, published by the governor of Maricao, concerning the establishing and peopling the Island of Tobago, &c. express'd in the most extraordinary terms.—Such as have greatly surprized all those concern'd in the West-India trade.

We hear two twenty gun ships are ordered to be fitted out with all expedition for Cape-Breton, on important affairs.

On Saturday last the young princess, daughter of their royal highnesses the prince and princess of Wales, was baptized at Leicester house, by the name of Louisa Anne, the prince of Hesse, the princess of Orange, and the queen of Denmark, were sponsors.

April 10. Last Friday evening there was a numerous meeting of the most eminent merchants of this city, when a letter from his grace the duke of Bedford was laid before them, to the following purport, that as soon as the declaration of the governor of St Domingo was known, relating to the settling of the Island of Tobago, a courier was dispatched to Versailles relating thereto, which was return'd, and brought a declaration of the same court, which utterly denies having any knowledge of the abovemention'd governor's proceeding, and had dispatched orders to the said governor to desist from such proceedings; upon this it was unanimously agreed to appoint a committee to return their thanks to his grace for his wise and prudent conduct in this important affair.

April 17. The king has been pleased to assign a salary of 1000 l. a year to lieutenant Col. Cornwallis, who commands in chief the land forces destin'd for Nova Scotia, and also to confer on him the rank of Colonel.

N E W Y O R K, June 26.

Capt. Phoenix who arrived here last Friday evening from Turks Island, informs us, that while he was there, he had notice given to beware of a schooner near the Bahama Islands, for that such a one belonging to Boston was turn'd pirate, and was cruising thereabouts.

By Capt. Jauncey from Madeira, we have the melancholy news, that the ship *Venus*, Capt. Alexander Klane-moth, of this port sailed from Madeira the 5th of November last, bound home, having four Portuguese sailors on board, who on the 27th following, in lat. 27, about 10 o'clock at night, told upon the ship's company, and barbarously murder'd the captain, mate, and two English seamen, reserving only the second mate and another man, to assist them in navigating the vessel; they then ordered the second mate to carry the vessel to the Western Islands; off of which they arrived the 17th of December, the four villains all the while rioting and destroying the cargo, and daily threatening the lives of the two remaining Englishmen; the next day, being in sight of St. Mary's they hoisted out their boat, then scuttled the ship, and went ashore, telling the people they had lost their vessel at sea: But the day after, the second mate getting an opportunity to acquaint a proper authority, the four villains were immediately apprehended

headed, and put in Irons; and we hear they are to be sent home to Lisbon to take their trial, and 'tis hoped will there receive the just reward of their demerits: The names of the persons kill'd, besides the Captain, are John Carr, mate; John Welch and William Dudley, seamen.

We have advice from New Brunswick, that on Monday morning last abundance of dead fish appeared floating down Raritan river, which increased till next day, when numbers of them were drove ashore, and began to putrify; and 'tis imagin'd, that if the inhabitants don't speedily take measures, either to burn or bury them, they may cause such a stench as may produce diseases:—'Tis conjectur'd that the excessive hot weather of the day before, has occasioned their destruction, as we have since heard, that many died at the same time in Elizabeth-Town Creek.

ANNAPOLIS.

On Monday Evening last we had here a great deal of Rain, accompanied with Lightning and Thunder. A Chimney in Town was split by the Lightning, from the Top down to the Chamber-Floor; the Room was fill'd with a strong Smell of Sulphur; and a young Child stunn'd for a while, without any other Hurt.

MADRID, March 29.

Three great affairs that, since the conclusion of the peace, have in a manner entirely occupied the attention of our ministers, one is very highly executed; another is said to be absolutely settled; and the third is in a very fair train.

The first was the great scheme of consolidating the royal houses; that is to say, uniting the king and queen's households, which have been hitherto always separate, and consequently a double charge, at least, to the government. The plan for this regulation was secretly and successively adjusted before the design became public, and few or no obstacles have been met with in reducing it to practice. All the great officers of the household that were double, are now single; and as for inferior servants, every thing is better performed, and with far less confusion, tho' at present there is not retained the full half. Besides this, the great article of coaches to all the superior officers is taken away, as well as some other perquisites; and tho' the families are numerous enough that are affected by this reform, yet the saving is so great, that all disinterested persons consider it as an excellent thing, and quite agreeable to the king's maxim, to pay punctually all that are employed, and to employ no more than are necessary.

The next thing is the scheme for reducing Algiers, for the accomplishment of which his majesty of Portugal is willing to join his forces, or to be at any proportion of expence that shall be thought necessary; all the Italian powers, except one, are perfectly well inclined to contribute also; and perhaps before the thing is executed, that one may be as forward as any of the rest. In the mean time it is very certain, that orders are given for assembling a sufficient number of transports for the service of this African expedition, as well as for augmenting the marine.

The last and most mysterious of all these capital points is, the treaty with Great-Britain, which is of vast consequence with regard to the commerce both of Europe and America; and yet scarce fell under consideration at Aix la Chapelle. We are assured that every thing goes on, very well, and that a definitive treaty will be signed between the two courts, without mediators, and without the interposition of any power whatsoever. But in the midst of these assurances, we hear of very high demands, observe a certain minister to wear an unusual chagrin in his looks, and find the choice of an ambassador extraordinary postponed from one council to another. But after the arrival of the plate fleet from America, we are pretty certain of being let into the secret, at least of our own court's intention, which will enable us to guess at the rest.

Hague, April 6. Our last advices from Venice intimate, that the surprize of fort Perera by the garrison of Dulcigno, and the fatal catastrophe of the brave M. Minutti at Constantinople, make a great noise throughout that republic, where nothing is talked of, since the arrival of that melancholy news, but military preparations by land as well as by sea; and indeed there is great reason to believe, that the regency will not suffer these two events to pass over, without doing itself justice by making reprisals; unless the court of Vienna, which would be obliged to succour the republic, and whose interest it is to live in good intelligence with the Porte, does not find out some means of preventing a storm which seems to be gathering.

Leghorn, April 4. Our deputies, who in consequence of the new treaties with the regency of Barbary, carried no less than 64 Turkish slaves to Algiers, have not been able to bring home one Christian in their room; the Dey having found out various sly and pretences, at first for delaying, and at last for refusing them, when he had once got the Turks into his hands. As this is the first instance of the fidelity of these people to treaties, so we expect the like punctuality in regard to all the other articles. Two of the ships belonging to our East-India com-

pany, that lately arrived here, are sailed to Trieste in order to take in their ladings, and will then proceed to the Indies directly. Both these ships were bought in England, together with a third which is not yet arrived. We form to ourselves vast expectations of the success of this new trade, tho' some people suspect that it will give umbrage to certain powers.

Stockholm, April 7. The court has accepted of the proposal which was made by some officers, to raise men in foreign countries for the service of Sweden. A commission has been lately appointed, consisting of three senators, and three other persons of distinction, who are to take care that the magazine which are established for the subsistence of the troops, may be well stored with every thing necessary. All the king's bakers have been employed for some time past in baking great quantities of bread for the army. All the officers, whose regiments are in Finland, are setting out successively for that province.

Madrid, April 7. The marquis de Tabernaiga arrived here from England on the 3d instant, and is this morning to be introduced to their Catholic majesty's and the royal family.

Paris, April 11. It is ascertained that the king has conferred the dignity of a marquis upon M. Duplex, governor of Pondicherry, as a reward for the gallant defence which he made when that place was besieged. The remainder of our prisoners that were in England, landed last week at Calais.

Tho' trade seems to recover on one hand, it receives great shocks on the other, by the frequent bankruptcies of our most considerable merchants, one of whom has lately failed at Marseilles for 900,000 livres. We learn from Cadix, that three register ships were entering that bay from La Vera Cruz, with nine millions of piastres on board.

Vienna, April 12. The Protestants of Hungary having represented in their memorial, that they have been dispossessed of 105 churches, the empress has ordered an exact account to be laid before her, of the proceedings upon that occasion, and the motives which occasioned this dispossession. The British and Prussian ministers, and the envoy extraordinary from the states General, act in concert in favour of the Protestants. All those who interest themselves in the public welfare, wish to have a reconciliation with the Protestants, in order to prevent any disturbances in Hungary, as has happened lately at Dobrézin, where there was an insurrection, which cost the lives of several persons, and was carried so far, that a priest was shot at the altar as he was performing divine service.

Hamburg, April 11. We have advice from Stockholm, that the king was seized with another severe fit of the gravel on the 27th ult. and continued very ill when the post came away. It is reported that there has been a rencounter between the Russian and Swedish troops in Finland, to the disadvantage of the former.

April 18. We are advised, that the Swedes are using the utmost diligence to get their fleet early to sea, having received intelligence that a combined squadron of English and Dutch men of war will appear in the Baltic next spring.

Hague, April 18. They write from London, that the court had received letters from Mr. Yorke, secretary to the embassy at the court of France, whereby he intimates, that he had had a conference with the marquis de Payfieu, which chiefly turned upon the present situation of affairs in the North; and wherein that lord declared to him, that if the court of Great-Britain had concluded a treaty of alliance with Russia against Sweden, his most Christian majesty should be obliged to succour with all his forces this last crown, by virtue of certain engagements previously contracted between the two crowns. He added, that in case of an open rupture, he believed the assistance which France would give to Sweden, would be more considerable than that which England would afford Russia; and that from the diligence which was used in re-establishing the marine, there was a likelihood that it would soon be superior to that of England.

Brussels,

Brussels, April 14. All the passengers arrived here from Lille report, that a body of 40,000 French troops are assembling in the neighbourhood of that city, whose destination was variously talk'd of; but the general opinion was, that they are intended as auxiliaries to his Prussian majesty; and the letters from that place unanimously assert, that the levying of troops, and other preparations of that nature, were carrying on with the greatest diligence.

From the Westminster Journal, April 15.

"There is now certain advice from Courlard, that two thousand soldiers are actually arrived near Mittaw, the capital of that province, and that more troops are upon their march to join them. It is expected that the Russian auxiliaries, who are crossing Poland in their return from Germany, will stop in the same country, and that a Prussian army will form upon it's frontiers.

The professions of pacific inclination, and great good will towards every neighbour, run as high as ever in all the courts that are busy in hostile preparations. At the same time there is a rumour that an action has already happened in Finland, between the Russians and Swedes, which proved to the disadvantage of the former: But of this we ought for the present to suspend our belief.

According to some advices, the courts of London and Versailles, so lately reconciled with each other, are to use their utmost efforts in conjunction, to preserve the peace among their Northern allies; But whether this mediation is to be carried on in the way of negotiation only, or by sending assistance to the two opposite parties, does not hitherto appear to be fully agreed upon.

Letters from the Netherlands mention the drawing together a large body of troops about Lille, which must have occasioned very strange conjectures, if they had not at the same time insinuated, that his most Christian majesty was going to assemble the 40,000 men, which he is bound by treaty, in case they are demanded, to furnish for the service of the king of Prussia.

It seems to be confirmed that the young pretender is actually gone to Poland, and that not merely to hunt after a fortune, but to receive a spouse already provided for him, of the house of Radzivil, one of the first families in that kingdom.

The count de Richetourt, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary from their Imperial majesties at the court of Turin, having received letters from Vienna, appointing him to go to London with that character, will soon have his audience of leave, in order to set out for that court. The trading part of the king of Sardinia's subjects, and the foreign merchants, express great satisfaction for the advantages and privileges which his majesty has granted for establishing a free port at Villafrauca, Nice, and St. Hospice, by which means we hope to see trade become more flourishing in this country.

L O N D O N.

April 10. On wednesday arrived at Spithead, rear admiral Forbes, in his majesty's ship the Superb, from the Mediterranean.

April 15. They write from the Sound, of the 13th instant, N. S. that Capt. Anderson of Dantzick, in his way to the Sound, saw two ships burning, one of which was consumed, and the other he left on fire, not being able to give them any assistance. He could not discover what country they were of, only one was a three-masted vessel.

Notwithstanding many have insinuated that the affair of Tobago, &c. would prove a bone of contention, to disturb the tranquillity intended by the present peace, we are well assured, that the French court hath declared, that all things, with regard to the islands of Tobago, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent, and Dominico, shall remain on the neutral plan agreed on in the year 1738, between the right hon. the earl of Waldegrave and the French ministry.

They write from Paris, that the earl of Suffex and lord Cathcart are preparing for their return to England. And that 'tis the princess of Saxe-Coburg, a Polish lady, niece to the queen, that has brought about the match between the young chevalier de St. George and the princess de Radzivil.

Yesterday 7 o'clock a fellow was walking along Bishopsgate street, dress'd like a countryman, with a box under his arm, and staring at the houses as if he had never seen one in his life, was attack'd by a lady, who ask'd him what he had to sell? To which he whisper'd, that he was a smuggler, and had a box of tea, which he would sell her cheap: Which the lady bought, and gave him a Guinea for. But when open'd, it

appear'd to be a dead cat nail'd therein; which was a pretty joke.—*This was not a raw countryman.*

April 16. We hear that the trade to Africa will be laid free and open to all his majesty's subjects whatsoever, without being taxed with any duties for the support of the forts and settlements; that all who trade thither will be united in an open company, under proper regulations, without any joint stock or power to trade as a corporation; and that the forts and settlements upon that coast will still be maintained, as marks of our possession in those parts, and be put under proper management and direction.

The lords of the admiralty have appointed his majesty's ship the Triton, now sitting out at Sheerness, for North Carolina, under the command of Capt. Marriot Arbuthnot, which will in a few days, sail for that station.

April 18. Yesterday morning, between one and two o'clock, came to the India house the purser of the Swallow Packet, Capt. Hutchenson, arrived in the Downs from Bengal in four months and some odd days, and brings an account that the Admiral Vernon, Capt. Cook, and the Hebrideote, Pierce, who were bound to China, hearing that seven sail of French men of war were cruising in the straits of Sunda, put back, and went to Bencoolen, and from thence to Batavia. Capt. Hutchenson left at the cape the Benjamin, Capt. Mead, from Bencoolen, homeward bound; and left St. Helena the 16th of February, where was the Essex, Capt. Jackson, from Mocha, homeward bound.

The True Brothers, and the Anna Maria, arrived at Bristol from Jamaica, bring advice that the Caesar, Capt. Sparks, from Bristol, bound to Jamaica, was taken and carried into Domingo: After being detained there some time, the French deliver'd her up, and the Captain proceeded on his voyage, after receiving 3000 pieces of eight, to make up the loss he had sustain'd.

April 20. By several private letters from France there is an account, that the marquis de Maurepas is disgraced, and his posts taken from him, and ordered to retire to his country seat; to the great surprize of all people who have heard it in that kingdom.—The reasons given for this extraordinary event, as 'tis said, is owing to his being the principal director of the settlement at Tobago, &c. without any direction from court; whereby the general tranquillity would have been disturbed.

The French ambassador is expected at this court by the 10th of next month.

April 20. His majesty has been pleased, under the great seal, to recommend and authorize all his loving subjects within his majesty's kingdom, to advance, by way of Loan, to the States General of the united provinces, the sum of one hundred thousand ducats, and to appoint John Gore, and Gerard Van Neck, Esqrs; Trustees for taking the same; and for taking the security for payment of the principal and interest thereof.

B O S T O N, June 19.

We hear that the French are building a fort at St. John's, within the limits of Nova-Scotia, under the protection of three vessels of force, which if true, is a fine spot of work at this time when we are talking of a strong settlement in that province.

June 22. Yesterday arrived two vessels from Louisbourg, in one of which, came several officers of col. Shirley's regiment. We hear some of the French transports are come to Cape Breton, but none of the people, 'tis said, will be permitted to go on shore, until the French governor's arrival. A ship is also arrived from Newfoundland, which came from England with supplies of bread, &c. for the garrisons.

June 20. Last tuesday evening arrived at Nantasket, his majesty's sloop Vulcan, Capt. Smelt, from Portsmouth in England, but last from Louisbourg, as a packet; by which we learn, that the encouragement given to carry on the settlement of Nova-Scotia, extends to the two American regiments, and to that purpose governor Hobson had received orders to retain such of the said troops as are not disbanded at Louisbourg, till the arrival of the transports from England, and with them to proceed to Nova-Scotia, in order to settle there, if they see cause.

N E W Y O R K.

June 19. By a vessel last week from Corroga, we hear, the Spaniards on the Spanish main near Corroga, have lately made an insurrection against the Biscayniers, (who by patent from the king of Spain, have engrossed the trade of those parts) and drove all their companies vessels off, demanding and establishing to themselves a free and open trade.

We have advice, that the ship *Martha*, Capt. Stewart, of this port, bound for Belfast, was drove ashore about the 21st of March last, near Baltimore bay in Ireland: 'Twas thought the vessel would be got off again, tho' upwards of 400 hog-heads of Flaxseed was spoil'd.

Thursday next is the day appointed by his excellency's proclamation for a public thanksgiving throughout this province, for the late glorious peace.

PHILADELPHIA.

June 15. The beginning of this month, three natives of Greenland, two young men and a young woman, converted to the christian religion by the Moravian missionaries in that country, were in this city on a visit to the brethren here. They left their own country about two years since, in the ship belonging to that society, (which had carried a ready framed church to be erected there, Greenland affording no wood for building; this vessel sailed from this port a few days ago for Davis's Straights, with some of the Greenlanders on board) and have visited the brethren in several parts of Europe, as England, Holland and Germany. They were clad in seal skins, with the hair on, after the manner of their own country, their eyes and hair black, like our Indians, but their complexion somewhat lighter. The Moravians, it seems, have a mission also at Barbice, near Surinam, and two Indian converts from thence, with these Greenlanders, met lately at Bethlehem, in this province (a settlement of the Moravians) with some of the Delaware Indians, and some of the Mohickons, converts also of the Moravians: and tho' their native lands are so vastly remote, as the latitude of 5, 41, and 65 north, yet what they observ'd of each other's hair, eyes and complexion, confirm'd them that they were all of the same race. They could find however no kind of similitude in their several languages.

RATISBON, April 15.

On the 13th instant, about 2 in the afternoon, duke Charles of Lorraine arrived at this city, post from Vienna; and was saluted here by a discharge of all our cannon from the ramparts.

His royal highness alighted at the hotel of the prince de la Tour and Taxis, where the principal magistrate of the city sent a guard of grenadiers directly, upon the first news of his arrival, and went soon after in person to pay his compliments on that occasion, attended by all the ministers of the diet. In the evening, the principal Imperial commissary gave a very superb entertainment, and after it, a masquerade ball, which did not break up 'til the next morning. About 8 o'clock his royal highness took his leave of the company, in order to pursue his journey. Before he went, however, he made several valuable presents to the domestics of the prince de la Tour; and amongst many other things, he gave to the marshal baron de Richlieu a repeating watch richly embellished with brilliants; a golden snuff-box, worth about 600 florins, to Mr. de Hurst; to the valet de chambre, a gold medal; to the head cook, and the rest of the domestics, he left 200 ducats; and 50 more for the grenadiers, who were sent to attend him.

Paris, April 18. Some important dispatches have been received at Versailles, from M. Durand, the king's minister at London, relating principally to the settlement which some private persons at Martinico have undertaken to make in the island of Tobago. Our ministry is consulting what pretensions this crown can make to the Caribbee islands in general, in order to determine the right which it has in particular to that of Tobago. The envoys of London and Sweden have frequent conferences with our ministers, which makes it imagined that some important affair is on foot between those courts and that of France; and it is assured that the Northern powers demand the mediation of England and France. The marquis de Mirepoix, who is appointed ambassador at the British court, has agreed to lodge at London in the house of the earl of Albemarle, the English ambassador here; who will also lodge at that of the marquis de Mirepoix. The marquis d'Aurillacourt, who went to London to execute a secret commission, it is said, will set out soon for the Hague. It is assured, that the marriage of one of the mesdames de France will soon be declared at court.

We learn from Rochelle, that a ship from Bourdeaux, bound for the Cape, has been cast away near the island of Race. The cargo was 300,000 livres, out of which only 30,000 or 35,000 were saved; but all the crew, except ten men, was preserved.

Extrait of a Letter from Hamburg, April 1.

"The great difficulty of writing any thing with certainty from hence, has been the sole reason of that delay of which you complain; as the chief reason of my writing now is to remove that complaint, tho' I must confess it is not possible to answer, with any degree of certainty, so much as one of the questions that you have propoted. It is true that we are seated, as you express it, in the center of action, which however cannot entitle us to any extraordinary intelligence before any action is begun; but as to the advices you have received that things are much farther advanced than they were, you have certainly no reason to blame your correspondent, as the fact is undoubtedly true, not barely with respect to the remittances of money here and at Dantzick, but on the score also of the uses to which this money seems to be destined; and if any lights I can give you will contribute to explain what from other quarters you have received, I shall communicate all I know in as succinct a manner as I can, and shall be able in a post or two to write more copiously and clearly.

As for the armaments in Sweden, they are visibly of such a nature as shew they are not made without assistance from some other country, or purely upon the score of self-defence; what

some people have published, and others have pretended to believe here, in reference to their troops in Finland, as if they were in no way capable of making head against the Russians; and that consequently to suspect the Swedes of acting offensively is an absurdity, will appear in quite another light when it shall be considered, that if the Swedes had ever so great an army, they could not, as things stand now, keep them in Finland in the winter for want of magazines; and on the other hand, there is nothing at present more out of question, than that how pacific soever their intentions may be, the very utmost force they are able to bring into the field, is without any noise put upon such a foot, as that in a month's time it may be actually able to enter it.

The states of the duchy of Courland are not to be accounted either hasty or dilatory in their preparations for an election; there is no doubt of their being quick enough, if they were absolutely left to their own choice, because their country suffers, as all countries must do from their not being under the direction of a proper constitution. In the present situation of things, they seem disposed to an election whenever pressed to it by the Poles, merely to avoid an union with that republic, in the same manner as the great duchy of Lithuania, with which they are every day threatened. But as to the election itself, it is equally impossible that they should be able to please every body, or to please themselves; the latter perhaps would be very imprudent, and as to the former, if they gratify one of their neighbours, it would offend the other; and if they oblige that other, their election will be considered as made under force; so that which ever way they move, a handle may be taken from their conduct to begin a war in the North, upon a plausible pretence.

Some there are who pretend that various schemes are in embryo, with reference to this election; and that to give time for fixing on some expedient which may pacify at least, if not satisfy, all parties, it will be put off 'til May, if not to June. Others, who have hitherto been esteemed persons of the deeper reach, look upon all this as discourse only fit to deceive some, and amuse many; for in their apprehension, this business of Courland, tho' a matter of great concern, yet is only one point out of several in which the old and new systems differ; and therefore unless all points are adjusted, it would be to no purpose to suggest any expedient as to this; and whenever they are adjusted, we may venture to assure, that an expedient of this nature may without any great difficulty be found. Taking it in this light, we still consider it as the crisis. If the states proceed immediately to an election, it is a sign that both parties are resolved to appeal to force; if it is delayed, we may conclude that the potentates whom it concerns are irresolute; but if there is so much as a tittle of truth in the rumour of a new candidate, we shall then expect to see the clouds disperse, the horizon grow clear, and the summer make as bright an appearance in the North, as it will be sure to do elsewhere.

Let me however conclude soberly and seriously, with assuring you, that tho' this last event is very possible, yet I am very far from thinking it probable, and that for a very odd reason; which is, that such as openly espouse the causes of the several parties in these disputes, are unanimous in their sentiments, that there will be no war, but that through the interposition of two powerful courts a negotiation will be set on foot for terminating all things amicably. Now if there was any thing of reality in these declarations, methinks that negotiation would have been already set on foot; and as it is very certain that neither of those courts have so much as a minister residing with the powers which it is presumed they must pacify, but on the contrary are known to be in a state of coldness with those courts themselves, it looks as if a previous negotiation was necessary to make way for that mediation from which this pacification is to be hoped; which, as April is now begun, and the troop,

troops every where in motion, has not a very promising aspect.

L O N D O N.

April 6. The honourable house of commons have deferred the call of that house 'till next tuesday se'night.

The latest advices from Berlin import, that the report of the Prussian troops forming several camps, was without foundation, every thing being very quiet there, and nothing to be observed that had the least tendency that way. The order for buying up horses to remount the Prussian cavalry, has also been countermanded.

On Friday the lords of the admiralty put the Albany sloop of war into commission, in order to sail with admiral Hawke to Nova Scotia.

By letters from Dusseldorp of the 11th, we have likewise advice, that the march of the Prussian troops in the dutchy of Cleves, Guelderland, &c. who have had orders for some time to hold themselves in readiness, was provisionally countermanded just when they were on the point of setting out.

W I L L I A M S B U R G.

July 13. His Majesty's ship the Hector, Capt. Maesterton, sail'd last week on a cruise to New-York; but on the passage, sprung her bowsprit, and is return'd to Hampton-road. They spoke with a vessel from Curaco, who inform'd them, that two pyrates were off this coast, one of which is a ship, the other a brigantine, who had chas'd him, but could not come up with him.

His honour, the governor, with his lady and family, intend to England in the ship Carteret, Capt. Robinson, who will be ready to sail next month.

This day the hon. John Robinson, Esq; president, and the rest of the gentlemen of the council, went all in coaches, to wait on the governor, and presented the following address:

To the Hon. Sir WILLIAM GOOCH, Bart. His Majesty's Lieutenant Governor, and Commander in Chief, of the Colony and Dominion of VIRGINIA,

The Humble ADDRESS of the Council.

S I R,

IT is with the deepest concern we now wait upon your honour, to take our leave of you, as you are soon to depart from this government, and to manifest that sincere regard we have always entertain'd for you.

The reflection upon the long course of your wise and steady administration, from whence so many benefits have flow'd to this colony, the lenity and moderation with which you have acted in your emirent station, raise in our minds the strongest image of human merit; and it is with hearts full of sorrow, we consider that we must shortly lose so good a pattern, as you have always prov'd, in promoting true religion, and the honour of god, and that we must be deprived of that influence which has frequently calm'd the face of public affairs; when ruffled, and appeas'd the resentment and animosities of private persons.

Power, which has turn'd the brains, and dazzled the eyes of so many, has by a prudent use been a means of distinguishing your character, and added a lustre to your private virtues; and his majesty, no doubt, is apprized how well you have perform'd your part, how exactly you have copied from his bright example, that whilst he was dispensing felicity to his subjects at home, you were making us the happiest colony of his dominions.

Be pleas'd therefore, Sir, to receive our most grateful acknowledgments, and the tender of our warmest affections; as the best return we can make for the happiness we have enjoy'd under your administration; and accept our sincerest wishes, that heaven may shed its choicest blessings upon you and your family.

June 15. At the court of Oyer and Terminer, this week, Thomas Seal, from Norfolk, was tried and convicted of robbing a House in that town, and was condemn'd to be hang'd. It appear'd upon his trial, that he was imprison'd on suspicion of a robbery, but found means to escape thro' the bars of the prison chimney, in the night, robb'd the house he was tried for, and cunningly got into prison again, to prevent his being suspected of the robbery.

Richard Sias, of Prince William, was tried and convicted of felony, and burnt in the hand.
