Class '45



The summer of 1945 found a large number of in-service teachers from many parts of Maryland on the State Teachers College Campus. The majority remained for two weeks attending the Workshop in which they concentrated on the needs of their professional work and left better prepared to effectively discharge their duties. A smaller group remained to carry academic subjects, to extend their certificates or acquire credits toward a degree.

The group represented the thousands of teachers in our state and nation who—in war or peace—are performing a great civic job.

As teachers they represent a group of workers who have seen first-hand the effects of war upon American children—not the effects of horror or deprivation—but the effects of relaxing parental guidance, of broken homes, of puzzling situations. It is they who have dealt with these problems of the children in their care with great resourcefulness, understanding and faith.

Many of these same teachers will return to the Campus next year—others will come with them—for, who is better able to realize the need for well-trained school personnel than those teachers who are now in the service?
