An ACT for the better Preventing of clandestine MARRIAGES.

HEREAS great Mifchiefs and Inconveniencies have arisen from clandeftine Marriages : For Preventing thereof for the fu

Be it Enaded, by the KING's most Excellent MATESTY, by and with the Advice and Con-lent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament affembled, and by the Authority of the Same, That from and after the First Day of January, in the Year of our Lord One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty four, all Banns of Matrimony shall be published, in an au-dible Manner, in the Parish Church, or in some public Chapel, in which public Chapel Banns of Marrimony have been usually published for the Space of Twenty Years last past, of or belonging to such Parish or Chapelry wherein the Persons to be married shall have dwelt for the Space of One Month next before the Publication thereof, according to the Form of Words prescribed by the Ru. bric prefixed to the Office of Matrimony in the Book of Common Prayer, upon Three Sundays preceding the Solemnization of Marriage, during the Time of Morning Service, or of Evening Service, if there he no Morning Service in such Church or Chapel upon any of those Sundays, immediately after the Second Lesson: And whenfoever it shall happen, that the Persons to be married fhall dwell in divers Parishes or Chapelries, the Banns shall, in like manner, be published in the Church or Chapel belonging to such Parish or Chapelry wherein each of the faid Persons shall have dwelt for the Space of One Month, as aforelaid: And where both or either of the Persons to be married shall dwell in any Extraparochial Place, having no Church or Chapel wherein Banns have been usually published, as aforesaid, then the Banns shall, in like manner, be published in the Parish-Church or Chapel belonging to fome Parith or Chapelry adjoining to such Extraparochial Place: And, where Banns shall be published in any Church or Chapel belonging to any Parish adjoining to such Extraparochial Place, the Parion, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, publishing such Banus, shall, in Writing under his Hand, certify the Publication thereof in fuch manner, as if either of the Persons to be married had dwelt in fuch adjoining Parish for the Space of One Month, as aforefaid; and that all other the Rules prescribed by the said Ru-bic concerning the Publication of Banns, and the Selempization of Matrimony, and not hereby al-tered, thall be duly observed; and that the Publi cation of such Banns shall be entered and registred in the Register Book of such Parish or Chapelry wherein Martiages are usually entered and regi-fired, by the Parlon, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, who published the same; and shar; in all Cases where Banns shall have been published, the Marriage shall be solemnized in One of the Parish-

rage that be folemnized in One of the Parith-Churches or Chapels where such Banns have been published, and in no other Place whatsoever.

Previded always, and it is bereig further Enalled, That no Parson, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, shall be obliged to publish the Banns of Matrimony between any Persons whatsoever, unless the Persons to be married shall, Seven Days at the least before the Time required for the First Publication of such Banns, deliver to such Parson, Vicar, assister, or Curate, a Notice, in Writing, of their true Chris-Curate, a Notice, in Writing, of their true Chri-fisa and Surnames, and of the Houte or Houles of their respective Abodes within such Parish, Cha-pelry, or Extraperochial Place, as aforesaid, and of the Time during which they have dwelt, inha-bited, or lodged, in such House or Houses re-spectively. spectively.

And it is bereby fur ther Enaded, That no Li !! cence of Marriage shall, from and after the faid First Day of January in the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty four, be granted by any Archbishop, Bishop, or other Ordinary, or Person having Authority to grant such Licences, to solemnize any Marriage in any other Church or Chapel than in the Parish Church or public Chapel of or belonging to the Parish or Chapelry, within which One of the Persons to be married thall have dwelt for the Space of One Month immediately before the Granting of such Licence; or, where both or either of the Parties to be mar ried shall dwell in any Extraparochial Place, hav iag no Church or Chapel wherein Banns have been usually published, as aforesaid, then in the Parish-Church or Chapel belonging to some Parish or Chapelry adjoining to fuch Extraparochial Place, and is no other Place whatfoever

Provided always, That nothing herein before contained shall be construed to extend to deprive the Archbishop of Canterbury, and his Successors, and his and their proper Officers, of the Right which hath hitherto been used, in virtue of a certain Statute, made in the Twenty fifth Year of the Reign of the late King Henry the Eighth, intituled, An Att concerning Peter Pence and Dispensations, of granting Special Licences to marry at any conve-

nient Time or Place. And aubereas many Persons do solemnize Matri mony in Prisons, and other Places, without Publi cation of Banns, or Licence of Marriage first had and obtained; Therefore, for the Prevention there of, Be it Enaterd, That if any Person shall, from and after the said First Day of January in the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty-four, folemnize Matrimony within any Prison, or the Rules thereof, or in any other Place, without Publication of Banns in fuch Church or public Chapel, as aforefaid, or without fuch Licence of Marriage, as aforefaid, first had and obtained from fome Per fon or Persons having Authority to grant the same; every Person, knowingly and wilfully so offending, and being lawfully convicted thereof, shall be deemed and adjudged to be guilty of Felony; and shall be transported to some of his Majesty's Plantations in America, for the Space of Fourteen Years, according to the Laws in Force for Tranf portation of Felons: And all Marriages, fo had and folemnized without Publication of Banns in fuch Church or public Chapel, as aforefaid, or without such Licence of Marriage first had and obtained, as aforelaid, shall, from and after the faid First Day of January in the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty-four, be null and void. to all Intents and Purpoles whatfoever-

Provided, That all Profecutions for any Offence of Felony, in folemoizing Matrimony without Publication of Banns, or without fuch Licence, as aforefuld, shall be commenced within the Space of One Year after the Offence committed.

And it is bereby further Enacted, That, from and after the faid First Day of January in the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty four, all Marriages had by Licences, and without fuch Publication of Banns, as aforefaid, where either of the Parties shall be under the Age of Twenty one Years, which shall be had without the Confent of the Father of foch of the Parties fo under Age (if then living) in Writing first had and obtained under his Hand, attested by I've credible Witnesses, or, if dead, of the Guardian or Guardians of the Perfon of the Party to under Age lawfully appointed, had and obtained in the fame manner, in Writing under his, her, or their tiand or Hands, autefied as aforefaid, in Case any Quardian or Guardians (hall be appointed, otherwise of the Mother (it then living) under her Hand, and attested as aforefaid, in the Year One thou-sing) under her Hand, and attested as aforefaid, finall be absolutely null and void, to all Intents and Purposes whatsoever: And that such Consent, attested as aforefaid, shall be entered and registered in the fame Book or Register swherein the Marriage of such Parties shall be registered and entered, by

the Parlon, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, by w.om fuch Persons are married.

And it is bereby further Enatted, That, from and after the faid First Day of January in the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty-four, all matrimonial Contracts, where either of the Parties shall be under the Age of Twenty one Years, which shall be entered into either per werba de præsenti, or per verba de futuro, without such Confent of the Father, Guardian or Guardians, or Mother, of the Party fo under Age, had and obtained in Writing under their Hands, and attefted, as aforefaid, in the respective Cases before specified, shall be absolutely null and void, to all Intents and Purpoles whatfoever.

Provided always, That nothing in this Act con-tained shall extend to the Marriage of any Person under Age, as aforefaid, whose Father or Mother shall be Non compos mentis, or shall be in Parts beyoud the Seas at the Time of fuch Marriage.

And whereas it may happen, that the Guardian or Guardians of the Parties to be married, or One of them, so under Age as aforesaid, may be Non compos mentis, or may be in Parts beyond the Seas, or may be induced unreasonably, and by undue Motives, to abuse the Trust reposed in him, her, or them, by refusing or withholding his, her, or their Confent to a proper and advantageous Marriage ; Be it therefore Enadled, That in cafe uny fuch Guardian or Guardians, or any of them, whose Confent is made necessary, as aforesaid, shall be Non compos mentis, or in Parts beyond the Seas, or shall refuse or withhold his, her, or their Confest to the Marriage of any Person under his, her, or their Guardianship, it shall and may be lawful for any Person desirous of marrying, in any of the before mentioned Cases, to apply, by Peti-tion, to the Lord Chancellor, Lord Keeper, or the Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal of Great Britain for the Time being, who is and are here. by impowered to proceed upon such Petition in a fummary Way, and to confider the Marriage proposed, and all Circumstances relating thereto; and in case the same shall, upon Examination, appear to be proper and unexceptionable, the said Lord Chancellor, Lord Keeper, or Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal, for the Time being, shall judicially declare the fame to be fo, by an Order of Court; and fuch Order shall be deemed and taken to be as good and effectual, to all Intents and Purpoles, as if the Guardian or Guardians of the Perfons fo petitioning had confented to fuch Marriage.

And it is bereby further Enacted, That he Mar-riage heretofore lawfully folemnized, or which shall at any time hereaster be lawfully solemnized, shall be defeated, or made void, or declared to be fo, by any Sentence or Decree in any Ecclefiaffical Court, by reason of any Pre contract of Matrimony made with any other Person or Persons before the faid Marriage, by either or both the Perfons fo married; but the faid Marriage shall be, and shall be deemed and taken to be, valid, to all Intents and Purpofes, in like manner, as if no fuch Pre contract had been made ; and that, in no Cafe whatfoever, fhall any Proceeding be had in any Reclefiaftical Court, in order to compel a Celebration of Martiage in facie Ecclefie, by reason of any Pre contract of Matrimony; any Law or Ulage to

Provided, That nothing herein contained shall extend to any Suit, for the Purposes aforefaid, commenced in any Ecclefiastical Court whatsoever, before the Nineteenth Day of March in the Year One thouland Seven hundred and Fifty three.

les-firees; moderate s for Conlemnization of any Marriage, or of any other Matter or Thing relating to fach Confent, Publication, or Marriage, knowing the fame to be fo, to clude the Force of this Act; or if any Petfon shall fally make, alter, forge, or counterfeit, or cause or procure to be fa'fly made, altered, forged, or counterfeited, or shall knowingly act or affift in fally making, altering, forging, or counterfeiting, any fuch Entry in the Register, of fuch Confent, Publication of Banes, or Solemnization of Mar riage, or any fuch Licence of Marriage, as afore faid, to elude the Porce of this Act; or shall utter or publish as true, any fuch falle, altered, forged, or counterfeit Register, as aforesaid, or any Copy thereof, or any luch falle, altered, forged, or counterfeit Licence of Marriage, to elude the Force of this Act, knowing fuch Register or Licence of Marriage, respectively, to be salse, altered, for ged, or counterfeited; or if any Person shall, from ard after the faid First Day of January, wilfully deftroy, or cause or procure to be destroyed, any Register Book of Marriages, or any Part of fuch Register-Book, with Intent to avoid any Marriage, or to subject any Person to any of the Penalties of this Act; every Person so offending, and being thereof lawfully convicted, thall be deemed and a judged to be guilty of Felony, and shall suffer Death as a Felon, without Benefit of Clergy.

Provided always, That this Act, or any thing herein contained, shall not extend to the Marriages

of any of the Royal Family.

Provided likewife, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend to that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, nor to any Marriages amongst the People called Quakers, or amongst the Persons profelling the Jewish Religion, where both the Parties to any fuch Marriage thall be of the People called Quakers, or Perfons professing the Jewish Religion,

respectively.

And be it further Enacted, by the Authority afore faid, That this Act shall be publicly read in all Parish Churches and public Chapels, by the Par fon, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, of the respective Parishes or Chapelries, on some Sunday, immediate ly after Morning Prayer, or immediately after Evening Prayer, if the e shall be no Morning Service on that Day, in each of the Months of Sep tember, Odober, November, and December, in the Year of our Lord One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty-three, and afterwards at the fame times on Four feveral Sundays in each Year; that is to fay, The Sundays next before the Twenty fifth Day of March, Twenty-fourth Day of June, Twenty ninth Day of September, and Twenty fifth Day of December, respectively, for Two Years, to be computed from and immediately after the faid First Day of January in the laid Year One thoufand Seven hundred and Fifty four.

P A R 1 S, Odober 12.

ORD Albemarle, the British Minister, has presented a Memorial to the Court, containing Representations on the State of the Port of Dun kirk, and the Works carrying on there, contrary to the Tenor of the Treaties, particularly those of Utrecht and Aix la Chapelle. He has also had two Conferences with the Marquis de St. Contest, Secretary of State for foreign Affairs, and our Miniller at London informs the Court, that the Barl of Holderness had made Representations to h m on the same Subject. The Marquis de St. Contest has affured the Earl of Albemarle, " That the King's Intention being punctually to observe Treaties, par ticularly the last fign'd at Aix la Chapelle, his Ma jefty would give Orders for examining the Foundation of his Britannic Majesty's Complaints, and for remedying them, in Cafe it appeared that any Thing was doing at Dunkirk contrary to the Dif polition of the Treaties mentioning the Condition wherein that Port was to remain."

L O N D O N.

Officer 12. The Bombay Castle, belonging to the East India Company, who is arrived from Bengal, has brought Letters whose Contents do not in-form us of any Dispositions towards restoring Peace on the Coast of Coromandel; but, on the Contrary, advife, that the English, at the Instances of the Na-bobs in Alliance with them, were making Preparations for a new Expedition against the Nabobs in the French Interest; and that Mr. Dupleix, Governor of Pondicherry, was likewife preparing to support his Allies; so that from the Measures taken on both Sides, we may expect the News of another Battle in those Parts; and perhaps the two Companies may Battle on fo long, that they may teach the Natives to drive them both out at last. Extract of a Letter from Cadiz, September 18.

A Boat with Pyrates want into the River of Huelva, and landed about twenty Men at Mo-

guer in that River, to furprize and feize a Vef. tel there, that was built in the laft War for a Privateer; five remained in the Boat, who were taken, and afterwards most of their Companions.
There Villains confess to have murdered Capt.
Heron, and all his Crew, who was Commander of the Christopher Brigantine, bound from Malaga to Dublin, and was lately met at Sea, and carried into Faro. These Wretches consist of a Medley of Nations, and have been guilty of va. rious Crimes.'

Odober 24. They write from Stockholm, that on the 8 h Instant the Queen of Sweden was fafely deliver'd of a Princes; and that the 10th Instant was fix'd for the Ceremony of baptizing the young

The Queen of Denmark was brought to Bed of a Prince on the 11th of this Month, and her Majefty and the young Prince were both likely to do well. He was to be baptiz'd on the 13th by the Name of Frederick.

We hear that there is a new Treaty on the Car pet between our Court and those of Vienna and Ruffia, in order to fix the Succours which they are to furnish his Britannic Majesty and his Electorate,

in the Cases to be therein specified.

BOSTON.

December 18. We have Advice, That Capt. Broaders in a Ship belonging to this Place, having lest Newcastle the 28th of September laft, and coming North about, bound hither, met with very tempeltuous Weather near the Orkneys, whereby both the Vessel and Cargo were lost; and it was with the greatest Difficulty the Men fav'd their Lives by getting ashore in the Long Boat, which was loon after stove in Pieces.

We hear from Connecticut, That the beginning of last Week, fix Men passing across the River, with a Boat loaded with Wood near Middleton, the Wind being fresh, caus'd a ripling Sea, that wash'd into and fill'd her, so that she sunk down,

and all the Men were drowned.

We hear, by the Way of New-London, That Capt. Sears, of Lyme in Connecticut, being bound to New-York in a Sloop from Middleton, was cast away at or near the Place call'd Hell Gate, a few Days ago, and the Veffel and Cargo loft, with all the People, being four in Number.

Provided always, and be it bereby Declared, That this Ordinance, or any Thing therein con tained, shall not extend, or be construed to extend, to any Person or Persons, bringing Fish, or Oyfters, brought by Water to the faid City.

A Supplementary BYE LAW, to the Bye-Law entituled, A BYE-LAW to prevent Acci dents by Fire.

WHEREAS this City is liable to many Accidents by Fire, to prevent which, Be it Efablished and Ordained, by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council, That all Persons, Inhabitants of this City, letting, or enioy. ing Houses therein, shall be obliged to provide for each Dwelling House, or separate Cenement within this Ciry, within eighteen Calendar Months from the passing of this Law, Two good sufficient Lea-ther Fire Buckets, to be hung up in the Passage or Entrance of such Dwelling House or Tenement, on Failure whereof such Persons shall forseit the Sam of Forty Shillings Current Money, and the fame for every Three Months Neglect, to be reco. vered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, Information, Presentment, or Indictment, before the Mayor's Court the one half to the Use of the Informer, the other half to the Use of the Corporation, or, if by Indictment, the whole to the Corporation.

And be it further Established and Ordained, That every Person renting a House within this City, the Owner whereof is a Non Refident within the faid City, shall, and is hereby declared, to be under the like Obligation of providing Fire Buckets, according to the Directions aforelaid, and under the like Penalties, upon Non-Compliance therewith, as the Owners of Houses that are Residents in this City are, as aforementioned, to be recovered as aforefaid. And the better to afcertain, who shall be deemed Tenants and Landlords, within the Purview of this Bye Law, and the Bye Law to which this is a Sapplement, be it bereby Declared, That all Perions are liable to provide Fire Buckets, and Ladders, as Landlords, except such Tenants as Rent from Year to Year, or for fhorter Terms, whose Landlords are Residents.

And be it further Oranined, to prevent Disputes, That the Chaile in the Bye-Law to which this is Supplement, running thus, " Beit declared, That " all Persons are liable to provide Ladders as "Landlords, except fuch Tenants as Rent from "Year to Year, or for fhorter Terms, except also "where the Landlords are Non Refidents," be, and is hereby repealed.

Paris, October 15. M. Lestevenon de Berken rode, Ambassidor from the States General, seconded the Earl of Albemarle in the Representations he lately made to the King about the Works car-rying on at Dunkirk; to which he was answered, "That the Works in Question only relate to the Fortifications on the Land-fide, and are done in Order to clean the Bason and the Fosse, which is absolutely necessary to preserve the Health of the Inhabitants and the Troops in Garrison; that nothing has been done to the Harbour, and that therefore there was no just Reason to complain of any Breach of Treaty."

Amfterdam Gazette. London. Orders have been fent to the Spanish Governors in the West Indies to pay immediately the Value of the illegal Cap tures made by the Guarda Coftas fince the Conclu fion of the Peace. The fudden Change of the Weather which we had on Monday laft, between the Hours of Twelva and One, was no less extraordinary than the Goodnels of the Weather was, which we had for forme Days before, at that Time of the Year. Tis fuppos'd that at the Time the Gale began, which was at North West, there was near One Hundred Battoes and Petinugers on the Offer Beds in our Bay, and it blowing extreme hard oblig'd the feveral Crews to cut Cable, and make to Bedloe's land, where they were obliged to remain 'till Tuelday with little or no Provisions, the Sens running too high for them to cross in their small Crast over to ais City, a Number of which were at the fame Time loft: Others who could not reach the Island were forc'd to run away before the Wind, and with Difficulty landed on the West End of Long Island, from whence they traveli'd round to Town, after fuffering with many others fome of the Difficulties which arose from the Extremity of the Weather. One of the Battoes running before the Wind, fill'd and furk, when three of the Perfons in her were drowned, and the fo rih fwam ashore.

And from Newtown we are acquainted, that a Number of their Inhabitants being out a Clam-ming in Jamaica Bay, on Monday 1-st, were like-wife caught in the above North Wetter: Eight Persons were missing until Friday, when a Petti-auger was observ'd froze up in the Middle of the Bay; and People going upon the Ice to it, found froze to Death, v.z. William Salyar, Amos Roberts, Samuel Leveridge and Thomas Morrel, airas Salyar, the others are fill miffing. One Daniel Smith was likewise frozen to Death before he could reach Jamaica on Monday Evening.

" Mr. Washington, the Ambaffader, fent to the Indian Country, is return'd, which affords us new Conversation. It is undoubtedly affirm'd for Truth, that the French have settled and fix'd several Forts near the Ohio Tract, especially one upon French River, which Mr. Washington was at, and that proper Officers, and Five Hundred Men, are in each Fort, chiefly French, and that they have twelve Cannon mounted on each of them, and great Numbers of French and Indians close at Hand, to affift at a fmall Warning. Our Tea Trade is long fince loft, and is likely to be followed by that for Spirits and Tobacco, Such Quantities being daily run from the Isle of Man, that if the Commissioners do not soon find some Means of effectually preventing it, the fair Trader must be obliged either to fall in with the Practice, or be ruined. It is computed, that his Majefly's Revenue fuffers at least 10,000 l. per Annum, by such clan destine Dealings in those Parts, as this illicit Trade is now mostly in the Hands of Persons of Property; fo that the Dealers all around are supplied at home on much eafter Terms than they can be from the fair Trader bere. One great Encouragement is, the Freight being paid down on shipping the Goods, and the Wherries, if taken, not only Suffered to escape, but the Boatmen rewarded with a few Anchors, to induce them not to be over diligent in getting away another Time: So that, when a Barge is not in Sight, they holdly make their Port in open Day, and thus find their Account in this deftruttive Commerce, their Freight being two English Shillings for an Anchor of 10 Gallons, which is almost equal to that for Goods imported from the Well Indies. Nor are the Smugglers here less daring than numerous; for Notice being lately fent by them to the Coaft Officers, that at fuch a Day they intended to carry a confiderable Quantity of run Goods from the neighbouring Mountains, the Officers and their Affiftants, on coming to prevent it found near 65 Persons mounted and in Arms, who divided into Parties, and the Officers doing the like, and by this Means being prevented from affifting each other, they attacked, difarmed, and grofily abused them. One of the Officers bawing in the Engagement fired among them, and Shatter'd a Man's Leg; Examinations bave been fworn against bim, and all bis Companions, to take off their Evidence, who must now undergo a Trial, for ba wing endeawoured to discharge their Duty. Extral of a Letter from Lifbon, dated Sept. 8. " A Difference that happened between the Nues of the Royal Abbey of Odivello, and the Bernardin Monks who receive their Rents, has gi ven Rife to a very extraordinary Adventure. The Nurs being diffatisfied with the Management of their Revenues by the Monks, wanted to take it from them, and give it to the Officers of the Car dinal Patriarch; and their Parience worn out, they dere mined to leave the Cloifter, and shake off a Yoke which appeared to them unsupportable. The Doors of the Abbey were fet open, and the young Ladies marched out, with a Cross carried before them, leaving only some Sisters, whose ad vanced Age would not fuffer them to take Part in an Enterprize of this Nature. They took the Road to the City, interding to throw themselves at the King's Feet, to implore his Protection, and the Juffice they thought due to them. They had two good Leagues to walk, and as most of them were young Ladies of good Families, feveral were un able to proceed any farther than the Marquis de Valence's Country House, and asked to be ad mitt.d into it to refresh themselves after their Faigue. They were immediately received, whilft the others, confulting only the Remains of their Courige, continued their March to St Sebastian de Pedreira, a Suborb of this Capital. The News of their leaving their Cloiker having reached the Archbishop of Lacedemo n, Vicar General of the Cardinal Patriarch, he haftened to the Suburb, and commanded them to go no farther on Pain of Excommunication. They were then ordered to march into the Parish Church, where they passed the Night. Next Morning they had all Sorts of Refreshments sent from Court; and, the King assuring them he would give them proper Redrefs, they were carried back to their Nunnery in Coaches fent for that Purpole, escorted by a Body of Horse and Foot: And left they should think of making a fecond Tour to this City, a Guard is placed round the Abbey, and Garden, which are above a League in Extent.

A certain Nation in particular, who, by Reafon of its hereditary Antipathy, is too near our Coalts, affords us the most striking Example of the Almighte's Way of dealing with People that cast off the Yoke of Faith. It's Separation from the Sovereign Pontiff being once completed, Religion and the State were from thenceforth indiscriminate ly toffed about in an Ocean of Troubles and Ca-lamities, All the new Sects were collected there, however opposite they might be to each other; the Spirit of Faction and Party got the upper hand; nothing remained fixed in divine and human Laws; and amidft the thick Darknels which arole on e-

very Side, all Things feemed to become uncertain or, indefferent, except the facrilegious Dogma of Supremacy in Spirituals attributed to the feemler

" The Enemies of Episcopacy having prevailed in these unhappy Times, the true Religion was utterly annihilated, and the regal Dignity expired ig-nominiously. Then it was, that for the first Time the World faw revolted Subjects forcibly feizing and dragging to Prison, a King, whole Crime was having borne too patiently their first Act of Se-cition: A Parliament, shaking off the Yoke of all superior Authority, with one Hand striking at Bithops, and lifting the other against the Head of their Sovereign; indecently accusing him, impudently flandering him, us justly condemning him. leading him to the Scaffuld like wild Beafts of Prey, furiously executing him, and the People astonished and givdy at this execrable Parricide, drink. ing large Draughts of the inchriating Principles of Fanatacism and Independence, running like Madmen after a Phantom of Liberty, whilst like Slaves they pay to a Tyrant that Obedience which they refused to their lawful King. What a horrid Series of Crimes! Here a King murdered in his Bed; there another tumbled from his Throne, all the Royal Family banished, the Crown set upon a toreign Head, and always tottering, notwithflanding the Blood spile to secure it, &c. "

Hague, Nov. 2. The Courts of London and Berlin have lately delivered reciprocal Declarations touching the Pruffian Prizes taken by the English during the late War, and the reimburting the re-maining Part of the Capital of the Silena Loan, which his Pruffian Majefly took upon himself by the Treaty of Breslaw. The Manner in which the two Courts explain themselves, shews that both would be glad to fee this Affair amicably determi ed; but of this there is not the least Appearance, fince the Proposa's which they have mutually made to each other are incompat b'e with the reciprocal Honour and Interest of the two Crowns. France, indeed, has interpoled in this Affair ; but her Decisions being too partial in favour of the Court of Berlin, it was not possible for that of London to accept of the Mediation.

Paris, Nov. 3. The Indifcretion of the Bishop of Montauban, in reflecting on the Affairs of a neighbouring Nation, in his Mandate on the Birth of the Duke of Aquitaine, is univerfally difap-proved. In a late Council of State held at Fon-tainbleau on the present Posture of Affairs, at which several Princes of the Blood, and some Peers affifted, his Majefty was very attentive, and could not help letting fl p fome Expressions, that show'd a very tender Concern for the Welfare of his Sub-jects. The new Chamber goes on with as much Vigour as ever, notwithstanding a uniform and univerfal Opposition, countenanced by the filent

Regret of People of all Ranks.

November 9. The Algerine Corfairs begin to renew Hostilities against the Portuguese, 7 of whom taking Advantage of the Absence of the Guard-Ships who were on a Convoy, have continued for fome Time past to block up, as it were, the Mouth of the Tagus, where they have pck'd up two Coaffing Ships laden with Merchandize, five or fix Fishing Boats, and an Advice Boat dispatch'd from the Governor of Brafil. But notwithstanding these trifling Interruptions, the Riches that flow into this Kingdom are immense. The Fleet which lately arriv'd at Lifbon from the Bay of All Saints is faid to have on Board upwards of four Million of Cru fades in Specie, besides a vast Quantity of rich Merchandize. Coast of Guiney. November 10. According to the Amsterdam Gazette, the Convention which M. Duvelar, Commiffary of the French East India Company, has concluded with ours, has been presented to the Ministers of their Britannic and most Christian Ma jeffies, and has met with their Approbation. By virtue of this Convention the two Companies mult reciprocally reftore the Territories taken by their respective Troops since the Year 1748, except cer tain Diffricts, the Property of which the English Company referves to itself, as being favourable fi tuated for the Safety of its Settlements. Neither Company is to concern itself with the Quarrels that may happen between the Indian Princes. The two Nabobs let up by the Influence and Arms of each Party, are acknowledged in that Quality by both Companies. By Means of this Regulation, which will be figned in a few Days, if not already figned, it is expected that the Commerce of the two Companies in the East Indies will meet with

mo Obstructions while Peace remains in Europe.

We are assured that the Parliament of Toulouse has issued an Arret which condemns the Mandate of the Bishop of Montauban to be torn and burnt by the Hands of the common Hangman. It is also said, that the Earl of Albemarle, Embassador from the King of Great Britain, has complained to the Court about the same Mandate, as there are some Resections in it concerning the British Assairs, which are either very unguarded, or inconsistent with the Peace and Friendship substituting between the two Crowns, and quite unbecoming a Dignitary of the Gallican Church

On Saturday the 27th Inst. died in the 74th Year of his Age, Mr. George Grierson his Majesty's Printer : His private and domestic Virtues those best can tell, who felt their Influence; but his unwearied Afficuity and Zeal during a Course of fifty Years to serve the Public in his Profession deserve in Return from it that particular Regard to his Memory, which all Ages and Countries have agreed to pay to the Inventors or Improvers of useful Arts; in which truly honour able Class that he had a Right to claim a Place, will be readily acknowledged by all who know the History of Printing in this Kingdom: Before his Arrival our highest Attempt in that Way was a Pfalter, and that most meanly printed, so that Mr. Grierson may in some Measure be it led the Introducer of that noble Art into this Kingdom, and to what a Pitch of Perfection he brought it, let his correct and elegant Editions of Facitus, Horace, Juvenal, &c. witness. Animated by his Example we now rival England in the Beauty of our Impreffions, and fave to the Nation great Sums of Money which were formerly drawn from it for Books. In his Profession he bath fer, in two Points principally, an Example worthy of the Imitation of his Brethren, but which it is to be feared, will always be more admired than followed; the first that he was fo ferupulously just, that he never once intrenched upon the Property of another, or to use, the Bookseller's Phrase, printed their Copies; the fecond was yet of a higher Nature, that he never contributed to propagate Vice or Diffention, by publishing Book of a licentious or factious Tendency; he confidered it as the greatest Debasement and Profitution of an Art calculated to diffule Knowledge, and its Attendant Virtue, amongst Men, thus to be made the Tool of Vice or Party, and the Accomplice in Corruption; and it was his fixed and invariable Principle, that no presented Ignorance of the Nature or Contents of such Books, could excuse the injuring Society in so important a Point. In fine, That Love to Mankind, which was the governing Principle of all his Actions, was the most fincere and indisputable Proof of his real and unaffected Piety and Love of God, for ac cording to the Saying of the Apostle's, which the Deceased had often in his Mouth, and more in his Heart, ' If a Man fay, I love God, and bateth his Brother, he is a Liar; for he that loveth not his Brother whom he hath feen, how can he love God whom he hath not feen? And this Commandment h ve we from him, that he who loveth God love his Brother allo.

There is nothing more easy to be observed, than that great Numbers of Copper Peoce, or English Half pence, are crowding in upon us, and many of them Counterfeits, by which some must sooner or later suffer Loss, in Proportion to the Number they poffeft. There bas lately been great Stir and Tumuit in New York (where they wied to go at a Penny a piece) on the crying them down to fourteen for a shilling of those which were Good; the wast Quan. tities which they had there passing among them, chillinging them to make use of Wheelbarrous and Carts in carrying Payments. And, without any great Spi. rit of Prophecy, it is easy to foretell, that in this Province we shall be under the like Inconveniency, if a flop is not foon put to their present imaginary Worth, beside our being drain'd of good Meney, in Proportion to the Quantity which is or may be brought among us. To render this Inconveniency, Fraud, Ini. quity, or whatever the Reader Shall think proper to call it, plain and obvious to the meanest Capacity, we shall only instance in One Shilling Sterling, which paffer for Eighteen Pence Curtency: With Eighteen Pence Currency, or One Shilling Sterling, we can buy Four Dozen and Six Eggs, at Four Pence a Dozen their common Price; and, with Eighteen Coppers, which at best is but Nine Pence Sterling, we can purchase the like Quantity; a ma-nifest Loss somewhere of Twenty five per Cent, w Three Pence in a Shilling. As it is much better and eafter to prevent than to cure, it is fubmitted to the Public, Whether NOW is not the Time, before we have greater Numbers palm'd upon us, One and All, to pay and receive good English Halfpence at Fifteen for a Shilling; but as for the bad Ones they are not worth Three Pence a Dozen, if any Thing at all. In New York, where Halfpener now pass Fourteen for a Shilling, a Pistele passes for Twenty Eight Shillings, and a Piece of Eight for Eight Shillings; here every Body knows they past for lefs.
