Curriculum Conterence Held

This particular conference of the combined faculties of Maryland State Teachers Colleges was the third in a series of state-wide meetings held respectively on June the 13th, July the 20th, and finally October the 31st. The last meeting was held at Coppin State Teachers College, a negro school in Baltimore, where approximately 100 faculty members were present.

It was an all-day affair, beginning at ten o'clock with an address by Dr. Earle Armstrong of the U. S. Office of Education. Dr. Armstrong's topic was "Trends in State Teachers Colleges Curricula Across the Nation." After the speech and lunch, the various departments, such as the science, social studies, English, etc., met in their respective rooms and discussed the following questions:

A. What are the factors which should be considered in revising the curriculum?

B. What are the competencies which should be stressed in preparing young people for effective teaching careers?

C. What should be included in the program of general education required by all students?

After the departmental discussions, the groups met in a general session and expressed their views on the questions.






