*Bondage is Ignorance, and be that fact,
Needs no direct Cure for that Disease;
Knowledge and Liberty, go Hand in Hand,
Fools only will obey, when Knaves command.
The sordid Yoke no longer can be borne,
If then once he sees, he must the Grievance scorn.*

It is well observed by an ingenious political Writer, That the first Article of Safety, in Princes and States, lies in avoiding all Councils, or Designs of Innovation, in ancient and established Forms and Laws, especially those concerning LIBERTY, PROPERTY and RELIGION; which are the Possessions Men will never have most at Heart, and be most tenacious of retaining: By avoiding which Designs of Innovation, they will leave the Channel of known and common Justice clear and undisturbed.

The next Thing wherein that Safety consists, is, pursuing the true and common Interests of the Nation, or People they Govern; without espousing those of any Party or Faction; or, if these are so formed in a State, that they must incline to one or other, then to chuse or favour that which is most popular, or wherein the greatest or strongest Part of the People appear to be engaged. For as the End of Government appears to be *salus populi*, so the Strength of the Government is the Consent of the People: From whence arose the Maxim of *Vox populi, Vox Dei*: That is, the Governors who are but few, will ever be forced to follow the Strength of the Governed, who are many, let them be either People or Armies, by which they Govern.—The People are the Bulk of Mankind, for whose Sake, it is not amiss to believe, that Government was originally erected.

These very just and pertinent Observations, must naturally lead us into some Reflections on the present unhappy Situation of Affairs in the Northern Colonies. The People inhabiting the several Governments in North-America, are generally true and loyal Subjects to the KING, and have for a long Time enjoyed the Privileges of British Subjects, and tasted the Sweets of English Liberty. It is no Wonder then, that the most distant Approaches of Arbitrary Power should spread a general Consternation among them. The Notices of the STAMP-ACT in particular, have raised the Alarm, and transmitted it thro' the whole Continent, and it is generally considered, as an Encroachment, unprecedented and unconstitutional, pregnant of innumerable Woes and Calamities, to the oppressed People. An Act, which, when it takes place, the Evils of it will perhaps be more sensibly felt, than at present can easily be imagined. The best that can now be said of it is, that it must be considered as an entering Wedge, or Introduction to future Oppressions and Impositions. It is generally thought (and that not without good Reason) that this Trojan Horse, this Engine, big with exorbitant Mischief, was projected and framed in one of the principal Northern Governments. And if any of the Sons of New-England, descended from worthy Ancestors, were concerned in its Formation, with a View to Lucrative Posts and Employments, how can they hold up their Heads, amidst the Reproaches and Execrations of a justly enraged People? Can they think to escape the Scourge of Tongues? Or that they will not be hurled, and palqued in every News-Paper, and lampoon'd by every Pamphleteer? But not to dwell upon this disagreeable Subject any longer, we shall only recommend to such Gentlemen a serious Perusal of those most apposite Lines in Addison's Case.—

*O PORCUPUS, is there not some chosen Curse,
Some hidden Thunder in the Stores of Heaven,
Red with uncommon Wrath, to blast the Man
Who owes his Greatness to his Country's Ruin?*

At a Town-Meeting of the Town of Providence, in the Colony of Rhode-Island, on the 13th Day of August, 1765.

It is Voted and Resolved, That the following Instructions be given to the Gentlemen, who represent this Corporation in General Assembly.

As a full and free Enjoyment of British Liberty, and of our particular Rights as Colonists,

long since precisely known and ascertained by uninterrupted Practice and Usage from the first Settlement of this Country down to this Time, is of unspeakable Value, and strenuously to be contended for by the dutiful Subjects of the best Frame of Government in the World, any Attempts to deprive them thereof must be very alarming, and ought to be opposed, although in a decent Manner, yet with the utmost Firmness.—We conceive that some late Resolutions of the Parliament of Great-Britain, for taxing us without our own Consent, have a Tendency to divest us of our most valuable Privileges as Englishmen; and that the Measures adopted by the Ministry and the Parliament in this Behalf, if carried into Execution, will be a manifest Infraction of our inherent Rights, as Members of the British Government, and unspeakably injurious in the present distressed and involved State of the Colony.

The Ministry, in Justification of this Encroachment upon the incontestible Rights of his Majesty's liege Subjects in these Parts of the World, have pretended that the Colonies are represented in Parliament by the British Members. The contrary is so evident, that a bare Denial of the Position is sufficient to refute it.

The Refusal of the Parliament to hear the humble Petitions of the Colonies against the Stamp-Act, the Enlargement of the Admiralty Jurisdiction, and the burdening Trade, we look upon as a great Grievance, and directly against our Rights as Subjects.

With the utmost Concern and Dread we consider the Extension of the Powers of the Court of Admiralty; and must freely declare to the whole World, that we look upon our natural Rights to be diminished in the same Proportion as the Powers of that Court are extended: And in this Particular we are unhappily distinguished from our Fellow-Subjects in Britain.

We then think it needful, in this critical Conjunction, to give unto you, who are our Deputies, some Instructions to be by you observed in your Representation of us in General Assembly.

In the first Place, we recommend it to you, in the most express Manner, to use your utmost Endeavours, that Commissioners be appointed by the Assembly to meet with the Commissioners from the other Colonies on the Continent, at New-York, on the first Day of October next, agreeable to the Proposal and Request of the Province of the Massachusetts-Bay, signified to this Colony, in order to unite in a Petition to the King, for Relief from the Stamp-Act, and other Grievances.

In the Choice of these Commissioners, we are assured, from our Knowledge of your Virtue, that you will pay more Attention to Merit, Skill in public Business, and a Zeal for the Welfare of the Colonies, than to any other Consideration.

We likewise request you to do all in your Power, consistent with our Relation to Great-Britain, towards postponing the Introduction of the Stamp-Act into this Colony, until the Colonies may have Opportunity to be heard in Defence of such just Rights, as they will be deprived of by an Execution of it. And to this End, that you endeavour to procure our essential Rights and Privileges to be asserted in General Assembly, by Votes or Resolves to the following Effect, viz.

1. That the first Adventurers, Settlers of this his Majesty's Colony and Dominion of Rhode-Island, and Providence Plantations, brought with them, and transmitted to their Posterity, and all other his Majesty's Subjects since inhabiting in this his Majesty's Colony, all the Privileges and Immunities, that have at any Time been held, enjoyed, and possessed by the People of Great-Britain.

2. That by a Charter, granted by King Charles the Second, in the fifteenth Year of his Reign, it is declared and granted unto the Governor and Company of this Colony, and their Successors, that all and every the Subjects of his said Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, which were then planted within the said Colony, or which should thereafter go to inhabit within the said Colony, and all and every of their Children which had been born there, or which should afterwards be born there, or on the Seas going thither, or returning from thence, should have and enjoy all Liberties and Immunities

of free and natural Subjects within any of the Dominions of his said Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, to all Intents, Constructions, and Purposes whatsoever, as if they and every of them were born within the Realm of England.

3. That his Majesty's liege People of this Colony have enjoyed the Right of being governed by their own Assembly, in the Article of Taxes and internal Police; and that the same hath never been forfeited, or any other Way yielded up, but hath been constantly recognized by the King and People of Britain.

4. That therefore his Majesty, or his Substitutes, together with the General Assembly of this Colony, have, in their representative Capacity, the only exclusive Right to lay Taxes and Impositions upon the Inhabitants of this Colony; and that every Attempt to vest such Power in any Person or Persons whatever, other than the General Assembly aforeaid, is unconstitutional, and hath a manifest Tendency to destroy British, as well as American Liberty.

5. That his Majesty's liege People, the Inhabitants of this Colony, are not bound to yield Obedience to any Law or Ordinance, designed to impose any internal Taxation whatsoever upon them, other than the Laws and Ordinances of the General Assembly aforeaid.

And inasmuch as it hath lately been drawn into Question, how far the People of this his Majesty's Dominion of Rhode-Island have the Right of being tried by Juries, we earnestly recommend it to you to procure an Act to be passed, if it may be done, declaring that the Courts of Common Law only, and not any Court of Admiralty, have, and ought to have Jurisdiction in all Causes growing and arising in this Colony, on Account of levying or collecting any internal Taxes, or of any Matters relating thereto: And that such Process and Way of Trial shall hereafter be had and used in such Matters, as have been usual and accustomed Time out of Mind. And further, that no Decree of any Court of Admiralty, respecting these Matters, shall be executed in this Colony.

We think that an Address of Thanks ought to be voted by the General Assembly to those Gentlemen, who distinguished themselves at the last Session of Parliament, in Defence of Liberty and the Colonies; in particular to General Conway, and Colonel Isaac Barré.

As to other Matters, not of such general Concernment as the foregoing, we leave their Management to your Prudence and Judgment, in which we put the greatest Confidence.

LONDON, June 22.

ON the 15th at Night a dreadful Fire broke out at Wapping, which destroyed Thirty-one Dwelling-Houses, besides Ware and Out-Houses. Some Vessels took Fire, but were saved; most of the Inhabitants lost their All, several had their Arms and Legs broke, in endeavouring to save their Children from the Flames. It is suspected this Calamity was occasioned by some wicked Incendiaries.

206 It is added, that George Onflow, Esq; will be made a Lord of the Treasury, and also that a new Receiver General of the Land Tax for London and Middlesex will be appointed, the Receiver of that Office for the current Year not commencing till after Michaelmas: And it is likewise said, considerable Alterations will be made in the Admiralty Board, and many of these Changes are expected To-morrow.

It is reported that a Patent is preparing for creating Sir Charles Pratt a Peer; and that he will be appointed Lord High Chancellor—Also that the Honourable Sir Charles York, will be appointed to a high Office.

On Friday last, the new Seals of his present Majesty were delivered to the Great Officers of State.

B O S T O N, August 19.

Last Wednesday Morning, to the Surprise and Joy of the Public, was exhibited on the Great Trees in the High street of this Town, the Effigies of a DISTRIBUTOR OF THE STAMPS, pendant, behind whom hung a Boot, newly soiled with a GREENVILLE Soal, out of which proceeded the Devil. This Spectacle continued the whole Day without the least Opposition, tho' visited by Multitudes.—About Evening a Number of reputable People assembled, cut down the said Effigies, placed it on a Bier, and covering it with a Sheet, they proceeded in a regular and solemn Manner amidst the Acclamations of the Populace thro' the Town, till they arrived at the Court-House, which, after a short Pause, they passed, and proceeding down King-street, soon reached a certain Edifice then building for the Reception of Stamps, which they quickly levelled with the Ground it stood on, and with the wooden Remains thereof, marched to Fort-Hill, where kindling a noble Fire therewith, they made a Burnt-offering of the Effigies for those Sins of the People which had caused such heavy Judgments as the STAMP ACT, &c. to be laid upon them.—Unfortunately for the Gentleman (for so I must now call him, he having the next Day honourably resigned that invidious Employment) who was to have been the Distributor of Stamps, his House stood near the aforesaid Hill, and by that Means it received from the Populace some small Insults, such as breaking a few Panes of Glass in the Windows of his Kitchen, as they passed his House, which would have ended there, had not some Indiscretions, to say the least, been committed by his Friends within, which so enraged the People, that they were not to be restrained, tho' hitherto no Violence had been offered to any Person, and the utmost Decorum had been preserved. But it is remarkable, tho' they entered the lower Part of the House in Multitudes, yet the Damage done to it was not so great as might have been expected, and not one Thing missing. Next Day the Resignation before mentioned taking Place, the Minds of the People were much satisfied; but there being a Rumour that a certain honourable Gentleman in high Posts, had forwarded the Stamp Act, by recommending it as an easy Method of gulling the People of their Liberty and Property; many of the Inhabitants again assembled in the Evening, and paying their Thanks to the Gentleman who resigned, by Huzza's, &c. they proceeded to the honourable Gentleman's House aforesaid, in order to enquire about the Truth of that Rumour; but not finding him at Home, and being assured by some reputable Gentlemen there was no Foundation for the Report, they quietly dispersed; and God grant they may never have Occasion to meet again.

The Public is assured, from Authority, that the Hon. Gentleman, who on Thursday last resigned the Employment of Distributor of Stamps, has wrote Home to the Lords Commissioners, &c.—That he cannot execute the Stamp Act, and that it is his Opinion it will be impracticable for any other Person to do it.

A N N A P O L I S, September 5.

Wednesday, last Week, a Number of reputable Persons assembled together at Baltimore-town, and diverted themselves with Carting, Whipping, Hanging, and Burning the Effigies of a Distributor of Stamps.

On Thursday, the same happened at Elk-Ridge; and on Monday, at Frederick-Town, in Frederick County: Exhibitions of this Sort being now very common in this Province, as well as other Parts.

Monday Night last, a Number of People unknown, assembled in this Town, and pulled down a House lately Rented by a certain unwelcome Officer.

This Town is quite clear of the Small-Pox.

AN infamous Report is going about here, and I am informed is spreading all over the Province, That the Person appointed to the OBVIOUS OFFICE of DISTRIBUTOR OF STAMPS for MARYLAND, said, when he arrived, and found himself very coldly received, That "the People need not think much of his Appointment to that Office, for that one of their Assemblymen, as well as several Others, applied for it, but could not succeed: That Mr. FRANKLIN not only solicited the Office for me, but offered, some say, he said, "One Thousand," others, "Three Thousand Guineas for it, on my Account."

I hope, Sir, my Conduct has been such, both in a private and public Station, as to induce a general Belief, that I have the FEELINGS of HUMANITY, am a FRIEND to LIBERTY, and LOVE my COUNTRY; and I should be extremely sorry, by an Act so truly contemptible, to have afforded Room for a contrary Opinion. I therefore beg the Liberty, through your Paper, publicly to declare, That if Mr. FRANKLIN did even ask the Office for me, it was so far from being at my Request, that it was without my Privity: That no Consideration should have induced me to have had any Hand in the Execution of a Law, tending to the Subversion of our dearest RIGHTS as FREE BORN SUBJECTS of ENGLAND, and to the Suppression of the FREEDOM of the PRESS: That I never had the most remote Intention of applying for that Office; and also that I think it extremely improbable, if Mr. FRANKLIN had any Inclination to apply for me unsolicited, that he should not have given me some Information of it, which I also declare he has not done, either directly or indirectly; nor have I received a Line from him upon any Subject whatever since he went last to ENGLAND.

BOSTON, August 26.

CAPTAIN DAVENSON in a Ship from London, is hourly expected to arrive here. 'Tis said she has the STAMP PAPER on board, for this and the other New-England Governments, which we hear exceeds Forty Tons.

Wednesday last a Ship arrived here from Leith, in North-Britain, in 9 Weeks Passage. At the Sight of this Ship, great Numbers of People were assembled on the Long Wharf, in Expectation of it's being DAVENSON from London, with the Stamp'd Paper on board.

Since the Resignation of the Stamp Officer, a Question has been thrown out—How shall we carry on Trade without the Stamp'd Papers?—Carry on no Trade at all, say some, for who would desire to increase his Property, at the Expence of LIBERTY.—Others say, That in Case there shall be no Officer to distribute the Stamp'd Papers after the first of November, a regular Protest will justify any of his Majesty's Subjects, in any Court of Justice, who shall carry on Business without them.

Some very judicious Persons are of Opinion, that the Wisdom of the British Parliament will never order any Measures to enforce an Act, utterly irreconcilable to the Friends, not of a Part only, as was the Case of the Cyder Act in England, but the WHOLE PEOPLE of America.

To attempt the Enforcement of an Act on the Colonies by Military Strength, would tend to destroy their Usefulness to the Mother Country.—Commercial Intercourse must in a great Measure, if not totally, cease.—And besides, a Colony of Soldiers is in Effect no Colony at all.

Should the Colonies cease to take off the Manufactures of Great-Britain, as they will be under a Necessity of doing very soon, unless she alters her Measures, Thousands of her useful Labourers and their Families must starve—so great a Dependence has the Mother upon her Children.

By a Gentleman who came to Town last Friday from Connecticut, we are informed, That the STAMP MAN for that Colony had appointed his Deputies, one of which, living at Windham, received a Letter from him, desiring him to come to New-Haven, and receive a Commission for that important Trust; but the good People of that Town soon had Knowledge of the Letter, surrounded his House, and demanded it of him, and then advised him not to have any Thing to do with that Office, lest it should cost him dear upon which he thought prudent to write his Master by the same Post, that he might reserve the Commission for another Person, for he would have nothing to do with it.

NEWPORT, August 26.

We hear from New-London, that about Four o'Clock last Thursday Afternoon, was exhibited, in the most public Part of the Town, the Effigies of a Distributor of Stamps, with a Boot on one of the Shoulders, and the Devil represented as looking out of the same. They were suspended in the Air, on a Gibbet, between 20 and 30 Feet from the Ground; and after being exposed about an Hour, were taken down, and carried through the Town, attended by the principal Part of the Inhabitants. The Cannon of the Fort were repeatedly discharged during the Time of Exhibition. Between Ten and Eleven the Effigies were consumed, amidst the Acclamations of the People. NEW-YORK, September 2.

We congratulate our Countrymen upon the late Resignations of the Stamp-Officers—and especially the Friends and Well-wishers of the Gentleman appointed to that Office in this City. The Number of his Friends and Well-wishers, which was considerable before, is greatly increased by this Resignation; which has entirely cleared his Character from the Imputation of joining in the Design to Enslave his Country; for we are well assured, as his Appointment was without his Solicitation or Knowledge, so his Resignation was voluntary, and not the Effect of any Menace or Disturbance, nothing of which has yet appeared in this Place.

We are informed by a Gentleman from New-Haven, that the House of the Stamp Officer there was last Week surrounded by a Multitude, who desired to know whether he intended to act in that Office or Resign. His Answer was, that having accepted the Office in Person, he did not think he had Power to Resign.—They next demanded whether he would promise to deliver the Stamp Materials, as soon as they arrived, to them, in order to make a Bonfire—or to have his House pulled down.

He endeavoured to evade the Answer, desiring them to wait till the Meeting of the Assembly; and several other Pretences,—but none of them availing, he promised that when they arrived, he would either re-ship them to be sent back, or that when they were in his House, his Doors should be open, and they would then act as they thought proper, on which they dispersed.

L O N D O N, June 24.
SATURDAY Morning his Majesty came to Town from Richmond to the Queen's Palace; and about the same Time the Right Hon. William Pitt arrived in Town from Hayes; who afterwards had the Honour of a long Conference with his Majesty at the Queen's Palace.

Some approaching Changes in certain civil and military Departments, in North-America, are confidently talked of at the West End of the Town.

It is reported, that provided a certain great Patriot should be employed in a high Post under the Government, several Regulations and Alterations will take Place; and particularly, 1. A Dissolution of the present Parliament, and a future Establishment of triennial Parliaments. 2. A Renewal of the former Treaty with our late magnanimous Ally the King of Prussia, who will in that Case be allowed a particular Stipulation, said to be due to him by a former Treaty, which it is said are his Expenses from the Time of our making Peace, to that of his Conclusion of Peace. 3. A Declaration, that general Warrants, to seize and apprehend all Persons indiscriminately, at the Will of certain Persons, be declared illegal. 4. That the late Cyder Act, so far as it subjects the Makers to the Hardship of Excise Laws, be totally repealed.

June 27. On Tuesday Evening an Express was dispatched from Richmond to Mr. Pitt, at Hayes, to attend at the Queen's Palace Yesterday Morning; and after the King returned from the Review, Mr. Pitt had the Honour of another private Conference with his Majesty. Mr. Pitt afterwards stopt, for a short Time, at Lord Temple's House in Pall Mall, and then returned to Hayes.

Yesterday the Hon. General Conway was at his Majesty's Levee.

The Privy Council Yesterday was the fullest known for some Years past.

Yesterday there was a great Board of Treasury at the Cockpit, Whitehall.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, Lord Temple, the Right Hon. Mr. Pitt, and the Right Hon. Mr. Grenville, had a long Conference together on Wednesday last.

July 5. This Day a Council is summoned to meet at St. James's, which is said to be relative to some intended Change in the Ministry.

Saturday Morning his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland had a Conference with his Majesty at Richmond.

Sunday Afternoon his Royal Highness had a Conference with the Duke of Newcastle, at Windsor Lodge.

And on Monday Morning again with his Majesty at Richmond.

From whence, and other Circumstances, the Report of a Change of Ministers has been revived within these few Days. And the Changes which have been talked of are as follow:

The Duke of Newcastle President of the Council.
The Earl of Winchelsea First Lord of the Admiralty.

Marquis of Rockingham First Commissioner of the Treasury.

Mr. Dowdeswell, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The Duke of Grafton and Earl of Egmont, Secretaries of State.

General Conway Secretary at War.

Lord Albemarle, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

And some say,

Chief Justice Pratt will be created a Peer, and his Son have the Reversion of a Tellership of the Exchequer;—but this is premature.

It is said that the Reason of so many Negotiations having been set on Foot for a Change of Ministers, is, the Storm that threatens us from abroad; and therefore it is found to be of the last Importance to these Kingdoms, that Men of the first-rate Abilities should be immediately employed to prepare against it. But the Misfortune is, that while the Favourite and his Faction hold their absolute Power behind the Curtain, those who are both able and willing to serve their Country, will not hazard their Reputation under an Influence so detested and dangerous.

It is remarked, that so few and so small are the Orders from America for our Manufactures and

Goods, that the Ships lately failed thither, have not had half their lading. And it is the universal Complaint throughout the Kingdom, that Trade in general is manifestly upon the Decline.—*To what is this owing?*

July 6. This Week Robert Charles, Esq; Agent for the City and Province of New-York, received particular Dispatches from the Assembly of that Province, which, we hear, are to be laid in the Nature of an Appeal before the next Committee of the Lords of the Treasury.

It is said that Lady Chatham, Consort to the Right Hon. Mr. Pitt, will be created a Countess in her own Right, with Remainder to her Issue by that celebrated Patriot.

It was Yesterday rumoured, that Mr. Pitt and Lord Temple, had only declined accepting a Share in the Administration conditionally; but that such a String of Exceptions were made, as to these Gentlemen proposed Colleagues, in Power, as hitherto greatly disconcert the general Plan of Accommodation. However it was said, a Medium has at last been proposed, through the Influence of two great Personages, to effect a Coalition, highly necessary at this Juncture, for giving Weight to our national Character, both at Home and Abroad.

B O S T O N, September 2.

About Twilight last Monday, a small Bonfire appeared to be kindled in King-Street, and surrounded only by a few Boys and Children; but one of the Fire-Wards perceiving it to rise to a dangerous Height, interposed and used his Endeavours to extinguish or at least to diminish it; in which salutary Attempt, after several Whispers from a Person unknown, warning him of Danger, he received a Blow, and such Tokens of Insult and Outrage, as obliged him to desist and take his Departure.

Soon after this, Day-light being scarce in, the Fire gradually decaying, a peculiar Whoop and Whistle was observed to be sounded from various Quarters, which instantaneously drew together a great Number of disguised Ruffians (for this Appellation we hope not improperly applied) armed with Clubs, Staves, &c. No sooner were they assembled, than Attack was made on the Dwelling-House of William Story, Esq; opposite the North Side of the Court-House; the lower Part of which, being his Office as Deputy-Register of the Court of Vice-Admiralty, was in a few Minutes laid open: The public Files and Records of that Court, Mr. Story's private Papers, Books of Account, &c. exposed to Ravage and Destruction, and improved as Fuel to revive the expiring Flames: Little more than Half an Hour sufficed them here, for it seems much greater Exploits, were reserved for the Heroism of the Night.

Boisterous and Intrepid, from this first Object of their Rage, they rushed onward, increasing still in Number and Fury, to the new and elegantly finished Building of Benjamin Halliwell, junior, Esq; where, after tearing down the Fences, breaking the Windows, &c. they at length entered the House, and in the most savage and destructive Manner broke and abused his Furniture, Chairs, Tables, Desks, Glasses, China, and in short every Thing they could lay their Hands on; at the same Time purloining his Money, and dispersing his private Books and Papers, until by the Effect of Wine and the other Stores of his Cellar, they ripened in Ebriety and Madness, and became fit for the next, more desolating and barbarous Operation.

Towards Ten o'Clock they were traced by the Noise and Tumult of a numerous and confused Rabble to the Mansion-House of his Honour the Lieutenant Governor. This seemed to be reserved for the utmost Violence of their diabolical Phrenzy; for immediately on the Word given, that large and stately Edifice became a Prey to the Iron Hand of Outrage and Robbery; a few Hours and the House was a mere Skeleton, and deprived of Furniture, even Wainscot and Partition, broke, hacked and mangled: And the Whole, by Break of Day, at once a sad Spectacle of Indignation and Wonder!

In this violent and extraordinary Desolation, besides the House and its Furniture of very considerable Value, his Honour and his Family sustained,

the Loss of between Eight and Nine Hundred Pounds Sterling in Cash, all his Plate, Wearing Apparel, a valuable and costly Library, a great Number of private as well as curious and scarce Papers and Manuscripts, and besides these, large Files and Records, occasionally in his Honour's Possession, relating to the Claims and Title of this Province; all dispersed, stolen, and defaced, so that the Damage in its Consequences may be esteemed publicly as well as privately injurious.

To bear one's own Misfortune with Firmness, and to feel for others (the Words on the Occasion of an honourable and worthy Gentleman, who has lately taken his Residence among us) is the Part of true Philosophy; who then can blush, or be ashamed of Sympathy with those who have so severely felt the Resentment of a misguided and merciless Rabble.

The Sufferings of the other Gentlemen, tho' truly grievous, seems to be absorbed in the greater Misfortune of his Honour and his Family, their Loss being computed at near Twenty-five Hundred Pounds Sterling, exclusive of the Building.

The Peace and good Order of the Town has been ever since preserved by a military Watch, which we hope in Time will have a Tendency to allay the present strange and tumultuous Spirit; tho' we would not be understood, not to distinguish this, from the truly noble Opposition to the Imposition of internal Taxes, without the Intervention of the respective Legislatures of the Colonies, or an equal Representation, which seems to be not only of this Province, but the united Voice of the whole British Continent.

At a Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the Town of Boston, on Tuesday the 27th of August 1765.

THE Town having an utter Detestation of the extraordinary and violent Proceedings of a Number of Persons unknown, against some of the Inhabitants of the same the last Night,

VOLED Unanimously, That the Select-men and Magistrates of the Town be desired to use their utmost Endeavours, agreeable to Law, to suppress the like Disorders for the future, and that the Freeholders and other Inhabitants will do every Thing in their Power to assist them therein.

N E W P O R T, Sept. 2.

Mr. Johnston has been obliged to appease the Mob, and for the Safety of his Life to issue a printed Resignation, subscribed by an Oath, that he will not execute the Stamp-Office, which is as follows:

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newport.

GENTLEMEN,

AS I find my being appointed the Stamp-Officer of this Colony, has irritated the People of this Town against me, though the Office was bestowed on me unasked, and unthought of: And being willing, as far as in my Power, to restore Tranquility to the Town, do engage, upon my Honour, that I will not accept of said Office, upon any Terms, unless I have your Consent for the same.

N E W - Y O R K, Sept. 5.

By a Letter of the 11th of July, we are informed that the Ministry was just then settled; but only a few Particulars were known: We are assured that the following may be depended on:

The Duke of Grafton and Mr. Pitt to be Secretaries of State, for the Southern Division; Sir George Saville Secretary at War. That none of the Grenville Family are admitted into the new Administration, but that the Hon. George Grenville is hereafter



to be in a capital Post; and that the utmost Care is taken to render this Change agreeable to all Parties.

Many very respectable Names are mentioned besides the above, but we cannot give them a Place in this Paper, until they are better authenticated.

In Consequence of the Address to the King, and Remonstrances to the Hon. Houses of Parliament, from the Province of Virginia, the utmost Resentment appeared, but the Resolves that succeeded them, were not known in England.

There have been more Disturbances by the Weavers, at Tiverton, in Devonshire; they rose and destroyed the House and Manufactories of one of the most eminent Persons in the West of England; in short, the whole Kingdom was in a very convulsed State, when the last Advices came away.

By a Gentleman just arrived from Newport, in Rhode-Island, who was present at the late Disturbances in that Town, we have the following circumstantial Account, viz. That Mr. Johnston, the appointed Stamp Officer, having, contrary to the Inclination and Advice of his Acquaintance, and the whole Body of the People, declared that he was determined to act in that Office; and Mr. Martin Howard, a Lawyer of some Eminence, and Dr. Moffat, who had made themselves busy in defending the Stamp Act, and were the supposed Authors of several paucity Pieces in Favour of the Right of the Parliament of Great-Britain to Tax the Colonies, and particularly in Opposition to a Pamphlet, entitled, The Rights of Colonies, &c. On Tuesday Morning, the 27th ult. three Figures were exhibited, representing the above three Persons, and made extremely like them, with the same Kind of Clothes and Drefs in all Respects, that they have of late most commonly appeared in—the same Morning early a Gallows, about 20 Feet high, had been erected in the main Street, just before the Town House. About 10 o'Clock the Figures were put into a Cart, with Ropes round their Necks, and conveyed through the Town, amidst a vast Concurrence of People, to the said Gallows, and there hanged, Johnston in the Middle between the other two; in his right Hand he held a Stamp, and on his Breast a Label, I AM THE STAMP MAN. The other two Figures had many Labels pinned on different Parts of them—after hanging till about 4 o'Clock, several Tar Barrels, and other Combustibles, were brought under the Gallows, and the Whole consumed together—after which the Mob dispersed, and all was quiet—The three Persons expecting Mischief, had removed most of their Effects, but finding all quiet, they expected the Affair was over, appeared abroad, and replaced their Goods; but the next Evening, about 8 o'Clock, a prodigious Multitude suddenly assembled, and proceeding with loud Huzzas to the House of Martin Howard, first entirely demolished the Windows, then shattered the Doors to Pieces, broke all the Looking Glasses, Chairs, Tables, Desks, Book-Cases, and entirely destroyed every Article of Furniture, and scattered them about the Streets, together with all the Books and Papers, broke open all the Chests, Trunks, &c. took out all the Clothes they could find, tore them into small Pieces, so as to be useless, and scattered them abroad, tore down all the Partitions, Wainscoting, Stair Cases, Tops of the Chimneys, and, in short, after destroying every thing valuable in the House, reduced it to a Ruin. They next proceeded to the House of Doctor Moffat, which they served in the same Manner, destroying every Thing, and emptying his Cellars of a large Quantity of fine old Wine. They were then making to the House of Mr. Johnston, but as it was the Property of another Man, who was somewhat Popular, at his Intercession they agreed to spare the House till next Day, provided he would use his Interest with Johnston, to get him to resign, which he promised, and they declared, that if Johnston did not the next Day give them full Assurance, that he never would act in the Stamp Office, or do any Thing in Favour of it, that his House and Effects would be treated as those of the other two; the Mob then proceeded to the House of the Collector of the Customs, who had likewise been busy in the Affair, and had otherwise incensed them—Him they determined to put to Death, and surrounded the House where he boarded; but he apprehending the Danger, had got on board a Man of War in the Harbour—they did no Manner of Mischief to the House, nor to any other Persons, but suddenly dispersed, and all was quiet—none of the People were in the least disguised.

ANNAPOLIS, September 19.

By the late Papers we learn, That Gentlemen are Appointed by the several Assemblies of SOUTH, and NORTH CAROLINA, RHODE-ISLAND,

and PENNSYLVANIA, to meet at the CONGRESS to be Holden at New-York, on the First of October, for Remonstrating against the late unconstitutional and insupportable Burthens laid on the Colonies by Act of Parliament.

In Virginia, the Assembly is not to Meet till the middle of October. At New-Hampshire they are Prorogued to the middle of November.

The General Assembly of this Province is to meet here on Monday next: And it is supposed a Committee from hence will be likewise Appointed for the same Purpose.

Rates of Postage, and for amending, explaining, and en-
larging several Provisions in the Act of the Ninth of
Queen Anne, and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;"

It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,
That all Letters between London and any Port within the
British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majesty's
West-India Islands are included) which are carried in His
Majesty's Mails by the Packet Boats that now are or here-
after may be established, shall pay Single One Shilling, Dou-
ble Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Quatre Four
Shillings.

That Letters by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port
within the said Dominions, carried by such Packets as before
mentioned, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight
Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and
Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Post-Office
in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding
Sixty Miles from such Chief Post-Office, or from the Office
where such Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may
be put in, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence,
Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four
Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding
One Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay
Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling
and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being up-
wards of One Hundred, and not exceeding Two Hundred
Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Eight
Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two
Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And
for every Distance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above
such Two Hundred, and for every such further Distance
within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Two Pence,
Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight
Pence.

That no Vessel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make
Entry in any Port within the British Dominions, where Posts
are or may be established, until all Letters on board are deliv-
ered to the Postmaster of such Port (he paying the Brings One
Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their
respective Directions, except such as are excepted by the Act
of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and such as may be brought
by Vessels liable to Quarantine, which left are to be delivered
to the Persons superintending the Quarantine, for proper Care,
before they are forwarded by the Post. And that all Masters,
Mariners, Passengers, &c. neglecting to deliver the Letters
as aforesaid shall for every Neglect forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Postmaster shall take for every Letter brought by
such Vessel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny,
above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the
same.

That Letters conveyed in Great-Britain and Ireland, not ex-
ceeding one Stage, shall pay Single One Penny, Double Two
Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And
in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single
Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the
Ounce Eight Pence; but these Rates are not to affect the
Penny-Post.

That Letters passing between England and Ireland, through
Carlisle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donaghadee, shall pay
the same Rates of English, Scotch, Irish, and Packet Postage,
according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are con-
veyed in each Kingdom, as are settled by the Act of the
Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces
shall be sent by the Penny-Post; unless coming from, or
passing thereby to the General-Post.

That Letters passing between London and Hamburgh, shall
pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Ger-
many, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings,
Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office secreting or destroying
any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank
Note, Bill, or other Paper, Writing, or Order for the Pay-
ment of Money; or stealing out of any Letter any such
Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall suffer Death as
a Felon.

That any Person robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any
Manner whatsoever, although it may not appear that any one
was put in fear by such Robbery, shall, on Conviction,
suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrusted to take in
Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the
Money received, or destroying the Letters; or any Officer
advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the
advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of
Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under
his Care, deserting the same before his Arrival at the next
Stage; or suffering any other Person to ride on the Horse he
Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not,
in all possible Cases, conveying the Mail according to his
Agreement, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the
Peace, be sent to the House of Correction for any time not
exceeding One Month, nor less than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, singly, or in Combination with others,
unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or causing the
same to be unlawfully conveyed, shall, on Conviction, before
one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid
to the Informer, for every Letter so unlawfully collected,
conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not imme-
diately paid, shall be sent to the House of Correction, for
any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor less than One
Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned
in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great-Britain.

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters
between London and Hamburgh; and the Limitation of the
Weight of Packets to be sent by the Penny-Post, commencing
from the Fifth of July last. All other Regulations, Rules or
Postage, Fines, Penalties, and Forfeitures before-mentioned,
commence from the Tenth Day of October next.

L O N D O N, July 11.

We hear another Attempt will soon be made to find out the North-west Passage, under the Direction of an Admiral well known for his Skill in Navigation.

Yesterday Mr. Williams, Bookseller in Fleet-Street, whose Six Months Confinement in the King's Bench Prison, for republishing N^o 45 of the North Briton, is expired, was brought to the Court of King's Bench, Guildhall, and discharged, on his giving Security for his good Behaviour for 7 Years, by two Sureties, bound in 500 l. each.

Yesterday was tried at Guildhall, before Lord Mansfield, a Cause, wherein Messrs. Carr, Ibbetson, and Comp. Mercers on Ludgate-Hill, were Plaintiffs, against several Revenue Officers, Defendants, for entering and searching the House of the Plaintiffs, under Pretence of their having a large Quantity of prohibited Goods in their Possession: When it appearing that the Officers had not the least Foundation for such Search, the Jury, which consisted of Merchants, found a Verdict against the Officers for 100 l. Damages, with Costs of Suit.

Yesterday the grand Match at Newmarket, between Lord Bolingbroke's Gimcrack, and Sir James Lowther's Alcham, was won by the former. The Betts which depended on the Match, were said to have exceeded 100,000 l.

July 15. His Majesty has appointed the Earl of Scarborough to be Cofferer of the Household, in the Room of the Earl of Thomond.

The Earl of Ashburnham to be Keeper of the Great Wardrobe, in the Room of Lord Le Despencer.

The Earl of Bessborough and Lord Grantham to be Post-Masters General in the Room of Lord Hyde and Lord Trevor.

And they have appointed Henry Potts, Esq; Secretary, and Samuel Potts, Esq; Comptroller of the Post-Office.

On Wednesday the Right Hon. Mr. Pitt set out from his Seat at Hayes, on a Visit to Earl Temple at Stowe. The Firmness and unalterable Union of these two illustrious Patriots, shews, stronger than any Words can, the Rectitude of each other's Conduct; while their known Integrity, Abilities, and Love for their Country, make every honest Man sincerely wish they were restored to their proper Places in the Administration; which, however, cannot be accomplished, until secret Influence is totally removed; an Happiness that is not only most ardently looked for, but hoped to be not far distant.

On Thursday the 4th Instant, was tried at Guildhall, before Lord Mansfield, an Action upon a Policy of Insurance, against an Underwriter on Goods shipped in a general Ship at Montserrat, for London; when, it appearing that the Ship was not Sea-worthy to undertake the Voyage, the Cause was determined in Favour of the Insurer. By this Determination it appears, that when a Ship is insufficient to proceed upon the insured Voyage, all Policies of Insurance (whether on the Ship or Goods) are discharged; and that Shippers of Goods must resort to the Owners of Ships for a Satisfaction for the Injury they sustain by Losses occasioned from the Insufficiency of Ships.

When Mr. Williams entered Guildhall, on Wednesday, he had a Roll of Paper under his Arm, and being asked what it contained, he informed the Enquirer it was one of his Sureties, and immediately produced a Print of Mr. Wilkes, with the Cap of Liberty by his Side.

It is now hoped, that Vigour and Unanimity will once more resume their Seats in our Councils.

July 16. Yesterday, and not before, Lord John Cavendish, George Onslow, and Thomas Townshend, Esqrs. kissed his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Commissioners of the Treasury.

Yesterday Lord Villiers kissed his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Vice-Chamberlain of the Household.

The following Resignations have been made, and Alterations taken Place, since our last.

On Sunday the Duke of Marlborough resigned the Office of Privy Seal; Earl Powis that of Treasurer; and Lord Charles Spencer that of Comptroller of the King's Household.

Yesterday there was a Council at St. James's, when the Duke of Newcastle was sworn in Lord Privy Seal, in the Room of the Duke of Marlborough; and took his Place, and received the Seal accordingly.

Yesterday his Majesty was pleased to create the Right Hon. Sir Charles Pratt, Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, a Peer of Great-Britain, by the Title of Baron Camden, of Chislehurst in Kent.

We are informed, a Scheme is on Foot for each of the North-American Colonies to furnish their own armed Ships in the Nature of Guard-de-costas; as is intended to be done by the Province of New-England; and for which they will be allowed an adequate Sum; his Majesty's Ships of War are to be recalled, in order to lessen this Expence of Government.

With Hearts filled with Loyalty and Affection to his Majesty, and inviolably attached to Great-Britain, the Inhabitants of this Colony cheerfully complied with every Requisition made by the Crown during the late long and bloody War; and exerted themselves in it with a Spirit far exceeding their Ability. They were happy in receiving the Approbation of his Majesty and the Parliament; and with great Reason flattered themselves, that the same Favours and Indulgence, which had been always shewn them by their Mother Country, would have been continued to them: That their ruined Commerce would revive: That, being freed from the heavy Expences of the War, they should find Means in Time to discharge the enormous Debt accumulated by it: And that, together with the Blessings of Peace, they should enjoy inviolate the inestimable Liberties and Privileges which they received from their Ancestors, and wished to transmit to their latest Posterity.

Instead of these parental Favours, by some of the late Acts of the British Parliament, the Channels of our Commerce are obstructed, our Property subjected to the arbitrary Decisions of the Courts of Admiralty, and an internal Tax levied upon us without our Consent.

Trials by Juries, and the being Taxed by none but their own Representatives, are the inherent Rights of the Inhabitants of this Colony: They have been confirmed by a ROYAL CHARTER: They were never contested, but have always been recognized by the KING and PARLIAMENT of Great-Britain.

Who then can see those glorious Bulwarks of Liberty, TRIALS BY JURIES, AND THE RIGHTS OF TAXATION, shocked to their Foundations, and not feel for his Country? Who is there that can feel, and suppress his Concern?

The Inhabitants of the other Colonies, affected with their present Distresses, and animated with the noble Spirit of Liberty, have proposed a Meeting of Commissioners from all the Colonies, to be held at New-York, to consult upon, and join in such Measures as shall be thought necessary for the Removal of these Grievances.

Inspired with the same Sentiments, we expect that you will give your utmost Attention to those important Objects, the Courts of Admiralty, and the Act for Levying Stamp Duties: That while you express the greatest Affection and Loyalty to our Sovereign, and all proper Regard to that august Assembly, the British Parliament, you assert our Rights with a becoming Firmness.

That you will use your utmost Endeavours, that the General Assembly of this Colony appoint Commissioners, to meet those who are or shall be appointed by the other Colonies, upon this most interesting Occasion; and, in general, to join and co-operate with them in every reasonable and probable Measure for the Preservation of our Liberties.

It is for LIBERTY!—That LIBERTY, for which our Fathers bled!—That LIBERTY, which is dearer to a generous Mind than Life itself, that we now contend!—The Cause is vast and important; and if the Efforts of his Majesty's loyal Subjects in North-America be but equal to its Importance, we have the highest Reason to think, that, notwithstanding the Disregard shewn to the separate Remonstrances of the Colonies, their united Endeavours will be crowned with Success.

BOSTON,

We hear from Haverhill, that last Week a Number of Men were enlisted there, at Eight Dollars Bounty; they are said to be intended for an Independent Company, but what Service they are to be employed in is only as yet conjectured; however, the People at that Place, to the Number of upwards of 300, were so dissatisfied, that they waited upon the enlisting Officer in a Body, to enquire the Reason of this Proceeding; but not receiving a satisfactory Answer, they peremptorily informed him, that not one Person who was so enlisted should be carried out of the Place.

The Public have been greatly alarmed the Week past, with Rumours that Castle William was to be turned into a Stamp-Office, that new Works for Defence were adding to that Fortress, and that several Guarda Costas, not Spanish, but English, were arrived, for the Protection and Defence of Stamp Papers and Stampmen.—As also the Independent Companies were to be raised, and one Col. Saltonstall, and Mr. Miller, a regular Officer, were commissioned to raise the Men about the Country, the Preference to be given to Foreigners, and Monies had been drawn from the Province Treasury towards the Expence.—As to the first of these Reports, the Governor's Speech to the Council will explain it; but as to the latter, we are still in the Dark,—some say it is really a Fact, and that a—advised to it, in order to prevent Lord Colville and General Gage being wrote to for Troops; but we cannot credit a Report of this Nature, which must so greatly affect the Concerned: Neither can we think but that the Charge of raising these Men, if true, must be at a private Expence, as no Provision of this Sort has been made by the House of Representatives, and we must not conclude any other Branch or Branches of the Legislature would take upon themselves to do it, especially at a Time when all the American Provinces are loudly complaining of the Hardship of a Parliament in which they are not actually represented. It would certainly tend to quiet the Minds of the good People of this Town and Province, to be informed by Authority, that these Reports are without any Foundation.

LEBANON (in Connecticut) Aug. 27.

Yesterday was held in this Town a special Court, for the Trial of a certain Criminal, late A—t for this Colony: He made his Appearance at the Bar of said Court, in the Person of his VIRTUAL Representative, and was denied none of the Just RIGHTS of Englishmen, being allowed the Sacred Privileges of a Trial by his Peers, &c. After a full Hearing, he was sentenced to be taken from the Tribunal of Justice, placed in a Cart, with a Halter about his Neck, carried in Procession thro' the Streets of the Town, to expose him to just Ignominy and Contempt, and then to be drawn to the Place of Execution, and hanged by the Neck till dead, and afterwards to be committed to the Flames, that, if possible, he might be purified by Fire; which Sentence was immediately executed amidst a vast Concourse of Spectators, exulting in the Prospect of LIBERTY. On the right Hand of the Prisoner stood the grand Seducer of Mankind, offering him a Purse, and hissing this Proposal, *Accept this Office, and Enslave your Country, and 400l. per Annum, shall be your Reward.* His injured Country, represented by a Lady dressed in Sable, with Chains rattling at her Feet, was placed on the other Side, thus pleading with her base, unnatural Child:—*My Son! remember that I have treated you with the utmost Tenderness, and bestowed on you my highest Honours, pity your Country, and put not on me those Chains.* To which her ungrateful, degenerate Son, replied, in a Label proceeding from his Mouth: *Perish my Country, so that I get that Reward: Upon the Utterance of which, such indignant Wrath swelled the Bosom of this venerable Matron, that her Power of Speech failed; yet the Sentiments of her Heart appeared glowing in Capital Characters upon her Breast, in the following Words:*

*Heaven crush those Vipers,
Who, singled out by a Community,
To guard her Rights shall, for a grasp of Ore,
Or Paltry Office, sell them to the Fox.*

Which awful, prophetic and parental Curse, presently took Place; for, as soon as this Representative was exhibited sufficiently to excite a mere Abhorrence and Detestation of his Crimes, being protected by a strong Guard, from the Rage of the Populace, during the whole Procession; and, after hanging 'til he was dead, was cut down, and delivered into the Power of his false Friend and Seducer, who according to his usual Practice, changed from a Tempter to a Tormentor; plunged his Prisoner headlong in a huge Pyramid of Fire,

with his mighty Paws barring fast the Gates of this habitable Habitation: Meant while the Heavens resounding with Acclamations and loud Huzzas: Nor did a weeping-Eye or relenting Heart hinder or allay any Demonstration of Joy, which an ardent Love of LIBERTY could inspire in the Breasts of her most virtuous Sons.

ANNAPOLIS, September 26.

Monday last the General Assembly of this Province met here, when the Hon^{ble} the Lower House unanimously made Choice of Robert Lloyd, Esq; a Member for Queen Anne's County, to be their Speaker, of which Election his Excellency the Governor gave his Approbation, and opened the Session with the following SPEECH:

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,

HAVING Reason to think, it would be very agreeable to you, to be convened, as soon as the unlucky Cause, which made me decline meeting you last Spring, was removed, I have called you together, before the Day, to which the Assembly stood prorogued, hoping, that my doing so, will convince you of my Desire to gratify you, and afford you an Opportunity, of promoting the true Interest of your Country.

You will, I presume, Gentlemen, during this Session, not only, have the Paper Money that hath been paid into the Loan Office, burnt agreeable to the Act, and the Books Ballanced, but also, by paying off the Public Debt, bring into Circulation, at this Time when the Want of it is much felt, the Specie that is at present lock'd up in that Office, and such Money, as having been remitted to England, by Virtue of several Acts of Assembly, still remains there unappropriated.

I have not, for my Part, any Thing, Gentlemen, at this Time, to ask of you, and it would be unnecessary for me, to recommend to you, the Making such new Laws, as your own Experience, teaches you, the Province is in Want of, I shall, therefore only say, that I most sincerely wish, all your Deliberations, may tend to advance the Public Good, and that altho', you compose Two Houses, yet, since your Interest is the same, you may proceed, with the greatest Harmony, and, as is your Duty, be unanimous in your Endeavours, to promote the Welfare of your Country, which I also consider as my own.

May it please your Excellency,

TO accept the thankful Acknowledgments of his Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects the Upper House of Assembly, for your very kind Speech at the Opening of this Session.

Your Excellency's convening the General Assembly of the Province at this Juncture, hath, we are persuaded, given the People great Satisfaction, and is an Instance of your Excellency's affectionate Regard, for those over whom you happily preside.

Sensible how much it is at present wanted in the Province, we hope some Method will, during the Course of the Session, be fallen upon to bring into Circulation the Money your Excellency mentions: And we beg Leave to assure you, that we shall, on our Part, endeavour to cultivate the best Understanding with the Gentlemen who compose the other House, and flatter Ourselves, that as we are equally interested in the Welfare of our Country, there will be no other Contention between Us, than who shall endeavour most to promote it.

We hear from Haverhill, that last Week a Number of Men were enlisted there, at Eight Dollars Bounty; they are said to be intended for an Independent Company, but what Service they are to be employed in is only as yet conjectured; however, the People at that Place, to the Number of upwards of 300, were so dissatisfied, that they waited upon the enlisting Officer in a Body, to enquire the Reason of this Proceeding; but not receiving a satisfactory Answer, they peremptorily informed him, that not one Person who was so enlisted should be carried out of the Place.

The Public have been greatly alarmed the Week past, with Rumours that Castle William was to be turned into a Stamp-Office, that new Works for Defence were adding to that Fortress, and that several Guarda Costas, not Spanish, but English, were arrived, for the Protection and Defence of Stamp Papers and Stampmen.—As also the Independent Companies were to be raised, and one Col. Saltonstall, and Mr. Miller, a regular Officer, were commissioned to raise the Men about the Country, the Preference to be given to Foreigners, and Monies had been drawn from the Province Treasury towards the Expence.—As to the first of these Reports, the Governor's Speech to the Council will explain it; but as to the latter, we are still in the Dark.—Some say it is really a Fact, and that a—advised to it, in order to prevent Lord Colville and General Gage being wrote to for Troops; but we cannot credit a Report of this Nature, which must so greatly affect the Concerned: Neither can we think but that the Charge of raising these Men, if true, must be at a private Expence, as no Provision of this Sort has been made by the House of Representatives, and we must not conclude any other Branch or Branches of the Legislature would take upon themselves to do it, especially at a Time when all the American Provinces are loudly complaining of the Hardship of a Parliament in which they are not actually represented. It would certainly tend to quiet the Minds of the good People of this Town and Province, to be informed by Authority, that these Reports are without any Foundation.

LEBANON (in Connecticut) Aug. 27.

Yesterday was held in this Town a special Court, for the Trial of a certain Criminal, late A—t for this Colony: He made his Appearance at the Bar of said Court, in the Person of his VIRTUAL Representative, and was denied none of the just RIGHTS of Englishmen, being allowed the Sacred Privileges of a Trial by his Peers, &c. After a full Hearing, he was sentenced to be taken from the Tribunal of Justice, placed in a Cart, with a Halter about his Neck, carried in Procession thro' the Streets of the Town, to expose him to just Ignominy and Contempt, and then to be drawn to the Place of Execution, and hanged by the Neck till dead, and afterwards to be committed to the Flames, that, if possible, he might be purified by Fire; which Sentence was immediately executed amidst a vast Concourse of Spectators, exulting in the Prospect of LIBERTY. On the right Hand of the Prisoner stood the grand Seducer of Man kind, offering him a Purse, and hissing this Proposal, *Accept this Office, and Enslave your Country, and 400l. per Annum, shall be your Reward.* His injured Country, represented by a Lady dressed in Sable, with Chains rattling at her Feet, was placed on the other Side, thus pleading with her base, unnatural Child:—*My Son! remember that I have treated you with the utmost Tenderness, and bestowed on you my highest Honours, pity your Country, and put not on me those Chains.* To which her ungrateful, degenerate Son, replied, in a Label proceeding from his Mouth, *Perish my Country, so that I get that Reward:* Upon the Utterance of which, such indignant Wrath swelled the Bosom of this venerable Matron, that her Power of Speech failed; yet the Sentiments of her Heart appeared glowing in Capital Characters upon her Breast, in the following Words:

—Heaven crush those Vipers,

Who, singled out by a Community,

To guard her Rights, shall, for a grasp of Ore,
Or Paltry Office, sell them to the Foe.

Which awful, prophetic and parental Curse, presently took Place; for, as soon as this Representative was exhibited sufficiently to excite a mere Abhorrence and Detestation of his Crimes, being protected by a strong Guard, from the Rage of the Populace, during the whole Procession; and, after hanging 'til he was dead, was cut down, and delivered into the Power of his false Friend and Seducer, who according to his usual Practice changed from a Tempter to a Tormentor; plunged his Prisoner headlong in a huge Pyramid of Fire,

I have not, for my Part, any Thing, Gentlemen, at this Time, to ask of you, and it would be unnecessary for me, to recommend to you, the Making such new Laws, as your own Experience, teaches you, the Province is in Want of, I shall, therefore only say, that I most sincerely wish, all your Deliberations, may tend to advance the Public Good, and that altho', you compose Two Houses, yet, since your Interest is the same, you may proceed, with the greatest Harmony, and, as is your Duty, be unanimous in your Endeavours, to promote the Welfare of your Country, which I also consider as my own.

That all Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majesty's West-India Islands are included) which are carried in His Majesty's Mails by the Packet Boats that now are or hereafter may be established, shall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That Letters by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the said Dominions, carried by such Packets as before mentioned, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Post-Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from such Chief Post-Office, or from the Office where such Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may be put in; shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence; but these Rates are not to affect the Penny-Post.

That Letters passing between England and Ireland, through Carlisle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donaghadee, shall pay the same Rates of English, Scotch, Irish, and Packet Postage, according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are settled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That any Officer of the Post-Office secreting or destroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Writing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or stealing out of any Letter any such Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Person robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatsoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in fear by such Robbery, shall, on Conviction, suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or destroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deserting the same before his Arrival at the next Stage; or suffering any other Person to ride on the Horse or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not in all possible Cases, conveying the Mail according to his Agreement, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, be sent to the House of Correction for any time not exceeding One Month, nor less than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, singly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or causing the same to be unlawfully conveyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter so unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, shall be sent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor less than One Month.
