

17 Veterans To Return To Team

Kenn Babcock's Bobcat booters will open their 1950 season at home on Saturday, September 30. The local games for this season, adding to their schedule Penn State Frosh and dropping Penn State Jay Vees and Lockhaven. Pa.

The 1949 Bobcat's soccer team was the best aggregation that State has placed on the field in some ten years. Although every team on their schedule (with the exception of Salisbury) came from a school at least twice as large as F. S. T. C., the Bobcats closed their season with three wins, three ties, and three defeats.

The contests with Slippery Rock, Westminster, Pa., and Maryland University Frosh ended with Frostburg showing the greatest total of balls placed through the goal posts. The local men handed Slippery Rock their only defeat in 1949, which was a commendale accomplishment in view of the fact that Slippery Rock is a school of some 900 students and is noted for its physical education department.

In the games with Towson, Salisbury, and Penn State Jay Vees, the points scored column balanced with Frostburg equally the number of points kicked through by opponents.

Lockhaven, the University of Virginia, and Carnegie Tech teams proved to be factors in putting the Bobcats in the red by handing them their three defeats of the past season.

The 1950 squad shows possibilities of improving the '49 record, with seventeen veterans returning. John Frank will be back at the goal while William Leonard will be competing

for the same position. Frank made many spectacular saves in the past season to help the Bobcats in tough spots. Leonard has proven his ability and probably will see a lot of action next year.

William Pugh, William Sonnenberg, and Walter Sonnenberg will be back at fullback. These three men gave the opposing lines a lot of trouble last year. They will be a decided offset to Frostburg defense strategy.

The hard running, long kicking, halfback line of '49 will be in the lineup next year in the personages of Bob "Bush" Thomas, "Rock" Layman and William Best. Also competing for these positions will be William Buser and Jack Biggs.

The hard driving line of last year will add to the offensive strategy with wings Roy Pepper, Bill Kildow, Sam Lisanti and Allan Williams returning. Inside men Dave Lewis and Bill Inskeep will also be back in there fighting. Red Ralston will be back at center forward position.


