FSU's Lane Center Earns LEED Gold Certification for Sustainability Efforts

FSU's renovated Lane University Center has been awarded LEED® Gold certification established by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) and verified by the Green Building Certification Institute (GBCI). LEED is the nation's preeminent program for the design, construction and operation of high-performance green buildings.

"Obtaining LEED Gold status for the Lane Center renovation is very rewarding," said John Brewer, FSU's assistant director of facilities, who helped spearhead the certification efforts. "At Frostburg State University, we always try to be a regional leader in everything we do. It is no different when dealing with facilities. Having a LEED Gold building on our campus shows that we are leaders committed to the fight against climate change."

"This is an important milestone in FSU's ongoing sustainability efforts and our commitment to creating a more sustainable campus," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "I'm very grateful to FSU for seeing this process from start to finish by working with USGBC and GBCI."



FSU's Lane Center achieved LEED certification for energy use, lighting, water and material use as well as incorporating a variety of other sustainable strategies into its redesign. A number of green design and construction features were incorporated to positively impact the project itself and the broader community. These features include:

- A white reflective roof that doesn't absorb heat, reducing the building temperatures in the summer months and reducing the use of air conditioning
- Native plants and shrubs, which require less water and do not require an irrigation system

- Low-flow toilets and faucets, to reduce water use
- Low VOC (volatile organic compound) materials such as paint, adhesives and sealants, which reduce harmful emissions
- Energy-efficient heating, cooling and lighting systems and green cleaning products and equipment

By using less energy and water, LEED-certified buildings save money for families, businesses and taxpayers; reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and contribute to a healthier environment for residents, workers and the larger community.

"With each new LEED-certified building, we get one step closer to USGBC's vision of a sustainable built environment within a generation," said Rick Fedrizzi, president, CEO and founding chair of the U.S. Green Building Council. "As the newest member of the LEED family of green buildings, Frostburg State University's Lane Center is an important addition to the growing strength of the green building movement."

FSU Named Military Friendly for Second Straight Year



Victory Media, Inc., which provides publications for military personnel transitioning into civilian life, has recognized FSU for the second straight year as a Military Friendly School. The 2013 Military Friendly Schools list honors the top 15 percent of colleges, universities and trade schools that are doing the most to embrace America's military service members, veterans and spouses as students and ensure their success on campus.

"Inclusion on the 2013 list of Military Friendly Schools shows Frostburg State University's commitment to providing a supportive environment for military students," said Sean Collins, director for G.I. Jobs and vice president at Victory Media.

"I am very pleased that Victory Media has recognized FSU as a Military Friendly School. Our service members deserve no less," said President Jonathan Gibralter. In May, Gibralter was invited to testify on behalf of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) and FSU before the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs' Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity in May, as the subcommittee was reviewing President Obama's Executive Order on Veterans Education, designed to improve delivery of higher education opportunities to veterans and providing them with better consumer protection.

FSU Presents One-Act Play Festival

The top three winners of the 2012 national One-Act Playwriting Competition will debut their brand new plays as part of the third annual One-Act Play Festival presented by FSU's Center for Creative Writing. The Festival, which will showcase three never-before-seen one-act plays, will take place Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29, at 7:30 p.m. each night at the Palace Theater on Main Street in Frostburg. Doors open at 7 p.m. A discussion with the playwrights will follow the show.

The first-place play is "Delicious," by Roger Strauss of Moretown, Vt. In "Delicious," Adam, Eve, Snake and God come back to deconstruct and reconstruct the classic myth that got us all to where we are today. Strauss has written several plays that are contest winners, including "Caring," which won the new play contest of the Tennessee Theatre Company in

Knoxville in 2005, and "The Lessons of History," which was awarded Honorable Mention at the FirstStageLA One-Act Play Contest in 2006. Strauss is also a founding member of the Vermont Playwrights Circle.

Lawrence Joseph's "The Color in the Bathroom," a play in which partners Martin and Louis discuss colors, relationships, Vegas, Aunt Polly and more, won second place. Joseph is a long-time actor who moved from the Denver area to Fort Worth, Texas. The third-place winner, "The Next Move," about an elderly couple who uncover some disturbing things while bickering their way through a Sunday afternoon, is by New Yorker William Fowkes. Fowkes is an award-winning playwright and published fiction writer.

Seminar on Estate Planning

Five local charitable foundations – the Allegany College of Maryland Foundation, the Community Trust Foundation, the FSU Foundation, the Garrett College Foundation and the Western Maryland Health System Foundation – have joined forces with ACM Professional Development to present "Traps and Pitfalls in Estate Planning" **Thursday, Oct. 4**, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Cumberland Country Club.

This course will assist the professional in understanding the most common pitfalls, errors and mistakes made by clients and professionals in the estate-planning process. Topics will include the need to properly coordinate the efforts of different advisors, how to distinguish and understand life and death planning issues as well as tax and non-tax planning issues, the proper use and funding of trusts, mistakes made in
