THE House taking into their Consideration the present unhappy State of the public Affairs of this Province, came to the following Resolutions, viz.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it is the Opinion of this House, that the Proprietaries of this Province, after having delegated their Powers of Government, can be justly or legally considered in no other Light than as private Owners of Property, without the least Share or constitutional Power of Legislature whatsoever.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Obstructions and Delays the Measures of the Crown have so repeatedly met with in this Province, during the late War, were solely owing to Proprietary Instructions, respecting the private Interest of the Proprietaries.

Resolved, N. C. D. That all the Mischief in this Province which the Governor mentions in his late Messages, as occasioned by those Obstructions, are therefore chargeable wholly to the Proprietaries.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it is high Presumption in any Subject to interfere between the Crown and the People; and by his private Instructions to a Deputy-Governor, enforced by penal Bonds, prevent the Crown's Receiving, and the People's Granting, the Supplies required, and necessary for the Defence of this His Majesty's Province.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it has appeared fully to the Assemblies of this Province, on due Enquiry made, that no Injustice has been done the Proprietaries in the Taxation of their Estates, and that not the least Cause has been given them to apprehend any such Injustice.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Assemblies of Pennsylvania have in many Instances, and for a long Course of Years, shown their affectionate Regard for the Proprietary Family; that Family and its Deputies having received, from the mere Benevolence of the People, within these last Forty Years, near Four-score Thousand Pounds.

Resolved, N. C. D. That in Return for this Goodness of the People of Pennsylvania, the present Proprietaries have, ever since their Accession, been endeavouring to diminish and annihilate the Privileges granted by their honourable Father to encourage the Settlement of the Province.

Resolved, N. C. D. That from an Attachment to Proprietary Interest, and to increase the Revenue of their Deputies arising from Licences, the Benevolence of the People in granting the same has been grossly abused, and Public Houses and Dram Shops have been increased to an enormous Degree, to the great Corruption of Morals in the Populace, and Scandal of the Government; and that from the same Causes, reasonable Bills presented to Proprietary Governors, for restraining or preventing this Evil, have been from time to time refused.

Resolved, N. C. D. That after Indian Purchases made by the Proprietaries, their causing to be located and surveyed the best Tracts of Land for themselves and their Dependants, to lie waste in great Quantities for a future Market, is the Cause that our Frontiers are so thinly and scatteringly settled, whereby the poor Inhabitants there have been rendered less able to defend themselves, and became a more easy Prey to the small skulking Parties of the Enemy.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Proprietaries having a Monopoly of the Lands of this Province, has enabled them to hold up the vacant unlocated lands at exorbitant Prices, and the more as they pay no Quitrent but a small Acknowledgment only to the Crown, pay no Taxes for those Lands, and are under no Obligation of settling them in any limited Time.

Resolved, N. C. D. That their exorbitant Demands in the Price of Lands, have driven many thousands of Families out of this Province into Maryland, Virginia, North and South Carolina, where Lands are to be had reasonably; the Frontiers of all those Provinces being chiefly settled with People from Pennsylvania, who likewise carried away with them great Sums of Money, and thereby this Province has been doubly weakened, the Loss of People to defend it, and of Substance and Improvements taxable towards its Defence.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it was therefore the more unreasonable in the Proprietaries, to contend, as they have done, first that they should not be taxed at all; then that their Quitrents should not be taxed; then that their located uncultivated Lands should be exempted; and put the Province to great Expence in getting those Points decided against them at home; while their Estate was equally to be defended with others, and the Province, on whom they would throw the Burthen, was at the same time so greatly weakened by Proprietary Avarice only.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the present Proprietary Demand of having the best and most valuable of their located uncultivated Lands rated and assessed no higher than the worst and least valuable of the located uncultivated Lands belonging to the Inhabitants, is equally unreasonable and unjust with any of their former Claims.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Proprietaries taking Advantage of Times of Public Calamity, to extort Privileges from the People, or enforce Claims against them, with the Knife of Savages at their Throat, not permitting them to raise Money for their Defence, unless the Proprietary arbitrary Will and Pleasure is complied with, is a Practice dishonourable, unjust, tyrannical and inhuman.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Proprietaries contending for the Power of appointing Judges, during their Pleasure, who are to determine in all Causes between the Proprietaries and their Tenants the Inhabitants of the Province, is unjust, renders the Liberties and Properties of the Subject precarious and dependent on the Proprietary Will and Pleasure, and is by no Colour of Reason supportable.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the bad Light this Province unhappily stands in with our gracious Sovereign and His Ministers, has been owing to Proprietary Misrepresentations and Calumnies.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it is the Opinion of this House, that the late Militia Bill offered to the Governor, was equal and just with regard to the Freeman of the Province, and sufficient for all good Purposes. And that the sole Appointment of the Officers, insisted on by the Governor, however willing the House might be to comply with the same under a Royal Government, would be an Addition to the Proprietary Power, that by no Means can be safely trusted by the People in their Hands.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Fines proposed by the Governor for Offences in the Militia, are enormously high, and calculated to enslave the good People of this Province.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the Power insisted on by the Governor, of marching any Number of the Militia to any Part of the Province, and keeping them there during any time, at Pleasure, without the Advice and Consent of the Commissioners, who are to pay them, is a Power that may be used so as greatly and unnecessarily to harass the Freeman of the Province, and cannot safely be trusted in the Hands of a Proprietary Governor.

Resolved, N. C. D. That Courts-martial proposed in the Governor's Amendments to the Militia Bill, to be held by Officers of the sole Appointment of a Proprietary Governor, with Power of Life and Death over the Inhabitants of the Province, may be used greatly to their Prejudice, as a destructive Engine of Proprietary Power.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the House, in the present Supply Bill, from a dutiful Respect to the Judgment of their Lordships of the Privy Council, and an earnest Desire of promoting His Majesty's Measures, wisely concerted for the Protection of this Province, have fully complied with the same. And that the Sense in which some of the Articles of their Lordships Report is understood and explained by the Governor, is inconsistent with Reason and Justice, and what therefore their Lordships cannot be supposed ever to have meant or intended.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it is the Opinion of this House, that the Governor's Rejecting the said Bill does not arise from its not being conformable to that Report, but because it is not formed agreeable to Proprietary Instructions.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the House having fully

complied with their Duty to His Majesty, and the good People of this Province, in offering an equitable Supply-Bill to the Governor for his Assent, all the Distresses and Mischief that shall happen on the Failure of the said Bill, are justly imputable to an undue Influence of the Proprietary Interest and Instructions on the Governor.

Resolved, N. C. D. That the sole executive Powers of Government, being in the Hands of the Proprietaries, together with the very extensive and growing Power arising naturally from their vast and daily increasing Property, must in future times, according to the natural Course of human Affairs, render them absolute, and become as dangerous to the Prerogatives and Government of the Crown, as to the Liberties of the People.

Resolved, N. C. D. That it is therefore the Opinion of this House, that the Powers of Government ought in all good Policy to be separated from the Power attending that immense Property, and lodged, where only it can be properly and safely lodged, in the Hands of the Crown.

And, as all Hope of any Degree of Happiness under the Proprietary Government, is, in our Opinion, now at an End,

Resolved, N. C. D. That this House will adjourn, in order to consult their Constituents, whether an humble Address should be drawn up, and transmitted to His Majesty, praying that he would be graciously pleased to take the People of this Province under His immediate Protection and Government; by completing the Agreement heretofore made with the first Proprietor for the Sale of the Government to the Crown, or otherwise as to His Wisdom and Goodness shall seem meet.

Ordered, That the foregoing Resolves be made public.

The following is the Substance of some Advices received from Carlisle since our last, viz. "That on Monday, the Nineteenth Instant, the Indians carried off five of our People from within nine Miles of Shippensburg, and shot one Man through the Body: That the Number of the Enemy was not certainly known, but Eleven were seen at the House the People were taken from, said to be one Adam Sims's: That about 100 Men went immediately out in Pursuit of the Savages, and had returned without overtaking them, but that a Party of 30 Men, was still after them from the Path Valley: That the Houses of John Stewart, Adam Sims, James M'Cammon, William Baird, James Kelly, Stephen Caldwell, and John Boyd, were burnt.—And it is said that all those People had threshed out their Grain, and put it up in their Houses, in order to send further down among the Inhabitants, in case of Danger, but was all lost.—The Person that brought the above Intelligence to Carlisle, we are informed, had seven Shot fired at him, one of which lodged in his Horse's Shoulder!"

N E W - Y O R K, March 26.
Yesterday Afternoon came to Town, under a proper Guard, Fourteen of the Indians lately taken by the Party sent out by Sir William Johnson, as lately mentioned in our Paper.—They were as properly taken Care of by being lodged, and closely confined in separate Apartments in our New Goal, with Iron (instead of Leather) Moccasins at their Heels; at which they gave a very sneering and insulting Cast of the Features.—The most Famous Capt. Bull (Tidyusung's Son) is one among the Tribe of Yellow Boys. He has confessed the killing and scalping Abundance of our back Inhabitants.

Last week Mr. Thomas Brunton, his Wife, and three or four more of his Family, in this City, were like to have been poisoned by eating the Root of Poake instead of Horse Raddish; but by having immediate Recourse to a Physician, they are now all recovered.

Saturday last Capt. Loe, arrived here from Bermuda, being beat off this Coast in January last; with him came Passenger, Capt. Prince, late of the Snow Lamb, of this Port, by whom we have the following Account of the Loss of the said Vessel, viz. That he sailed from this Place the 17th Day of January last, bound for the Island of Cayenne, and that at 6 o'Clock P. M. of the same Day, upon trying his Pumps, he perceived his

Vessel had made much Water, which he imagined was by Reason of her not being pumped for some Time before; and that the next Day he was obliged to pump every Half Hour, having then good Weather; but on the 21st following, having a fresh Gale, he was obliged to keep one Pump constantly going; and on the 25th, having a very hard Gale, he was forced to lay to, and by the Violence of the Sea and Wind, lost two Mainmasts, and one Sea carried away his Boat and one of his Ruff-Trees, when he expected every Moment to founder, both Pumps being constantly at Work; and they getting choak'd with Coals, there was often three Feet Water in the Hold. On the 27th, he saw two Sail, and soon came up with one of them, which proved to be a Snow from South-Carolina, bound for Cowes, but she having been in the said Gale, and received considerable Damage therein, could give Captain Prince no Assistance. The 29th, in Lat. 35, 50, Lon. 59, 16, in a violent Gale of Wind, one of his Pumps being broke, and the other choaked with Coals, he cut away his Masts and Bow-sprit, in Order to make a Raft (his Boat being gone) if possible, to save his Life and that of his Crew; but on the 7th of February, at 6 P. M. he had the good Fortune to fall in with a Sloop from South Carolina, Ing-ham, Master, bound for Bermuda, who took him with all his People, (but one that died with the Fatigue) on board, and carried them safe to the said Island. The Vessel when Captain Prince left her, had 4 Feet Water in her Hold, and he imagined she could not swim many Hours longer.

ANNAPOLIS, April 5.

We are informed by Mr. Michael Cresap, from Frederick County, that on Monday the 26th of March, George Dobson was Shot and Scalp'd in Sight of Fort Bedford, and Three other Men are Missing, and suppos'd to be Kill'd or Taken. An Express going from Fort Loudoun to Fort Bedford, with Orders from the General, was pursued by Indians on Horse-back, who fir'd at him Twice, and had almost overtaken him, but he quitted his Horse and Gun, and got safe to the Fort, being favor'd with the Night.

Tuesday last arrived here from Cork, after a long Passage, the Snow Peace, Capt. Pearson.

We had here Yesterday about Two o'Clock, a remarkable hard Shower of Hail, which continued about 12 Minutes; the Hail-Stones being in general about the Size of large Hazle-Nuts.

Since our last arrived in Patuxent from London, the Ship Elisabeth, Capt. John Johnson, having had a very good Passage; but we have not yet been so fortunate as to procure any of the English Papers brought in by him, except THE LONDON EVENING-POST of the 26th and 28th of January, which we have just receiv'd. By them we find, that his Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, was Married to her Royal Highness the Princess AUGUSTA, and that they soon after left England. In those Papers there is no mention of the Expulsion of Mr. Wilkes; but there is an Account, that on the 24th of January, ANTHONY BACON, Esq; a Virginia Merchant, was Chosen a Member of Parliament for the Borough of Aylesbury, in the Room of John Wilkes, Esq; without Opposition.

We have not yet been able to obtain a List of the Arrivals brought by Capt. Johnson, but shall have it in our next.

WHITEHALL, January 14.

HIS most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh, having sailed from Helvoetsluys, on board his Majesty's Yacht the Princess Augusta, on Tuesday last, the 10th Inst. landed at Harwich the 12th, in the Morning, and arrived last Night at Somerset House.

St. James's. This Day his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh waited on their Majesties and the rest of the Royal Family.

Lord Chamberlain's Office. The Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta, with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh, is appointed to be solemnized at St. James's, on Monday next, the 16th Inst. at 7 o'Clock in the Evening; at which time none but Peers and Peeresses, Peers eldest Sons and Peers Daughters, Privy Counsellors, and their Wives, and Foreign Ministers, are to be admitted.

St. James's, Jan. 16. This Evening the Ceremony of the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick-Lunenburgh, was performed in the Great Council Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury.

After the Ceremony of the Nuptials, their Serene and Royal Highnesses remained at St. James's till Nine, and then repaired to Leicester House, where a grand supper was prepared; at which were present their Majesties, the Princess Dowager, Princesses William and Henry, and the Rest of the Royal Family. Their Majesties went away about XII.

Jan. 17. Their Serene and Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Brunswick received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry at Saville-House, Leicester Fields, on account of their Nuptials; where they reside during their stay in England. The Servants remain at Somerset House. At Night there was a grand Ball at St. James's, on Account of the happy Marriage.

LONDON, January 19. In the Evening the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick paid a Visit to the Royal Society, of which he had been elected a Member.

His Serene Highness, during his Stay, also visited the British Museum, St. Paul's, the Tower, Westminster Abbey, &c. &c. and the Duke of Cumberland, Mr. Pitt, the Duke of Newcastle, and many Others of the Nobility and Gentry, being generally attended by the Marquis of Granby. Mr. Wilkes's Friends have received Letters from him by yesterday's Mail, acquainting them, that he was confined to his Room, and incapable of setting out on his Return the 13th Instant, as he intended; and that he has at over a Certificate of his ill State of Health in a Letter a Person of Distinction.

We hear some Memorials of great Consequence, tending clear up certain mysterious Affairs heretofore transacted in America, are now preparing for the Press, and will speedily be published at the Desire of a great Man lately returned from that Part of the World.

Jan. 21. The Crowd was so great at the Opera-house, to see the Hereditary Prince, that the Coaches of the Quality could not come near the Door, which obliged the Ladies to go out and walk to the House. Four Parts in Five of the number of genteel Persons were obliged to go back again, on being in the most imminent Danger of being crushed to death. During the Time of the Crowd, there were Quarrels, and Swords drawn by the Gentlemen, who endeavoured to get up; the Shrieks of the Ladies were very pitiful; a great many Caps, Ruffles, Handkerchiefs, Ear-Rings, Awns and Cloaks, were lost, and great Numbers of People were hurt.

An Express was Yesterday dispatched to Paris, to acquaint Mr. Wilkes with his Fate.

Yesterday appeared in the Daily Advertiser the following Notice: "All Persons who have any Claims or Demands on John Wilkes, Esq; of Great George-Street, Westminster, are desired to send their Accounts (sealed up) to Mr. Beaton Wilkes in St. John's-Square, Clerkenwell."

Mr. Wilkes's Physician and Surgeon declare, that he did acquaint them with his Design of going to France; that said he was only going to the Country for a few Days, and that he would take with him Four or Five Dressings for his Wound; that at the Time he set out, his Wound did by no means permit him to take a Journey to Paris; but that had he said in England, he would probably have been able to attend the House of Commons on the Day appointed for his Appearance there.

It is said that the King made her Royal Highness a Present of a Diamond Necklace worth 30,000 l. the Queen, of a Watch of exquisite Workmanship, set with Diamonds. The Princess Dowager of a rich Diamond Stomacher; The Princess Amelia of a Cassock of Jewels worth 30,000 l. and Duke of Cumberland; of a Set of Jewels for the Hair worth 10,000 l. Value.]

A prodigious Storm of Wind did irreparable Damage on the Sea Coast; and the Rise of the Waters in most of the considerable Rivers, was no less ruinous in the inland Parts. A Number of Ships have been driven ashore and wrecked, as never were known before in one Season; the Insurers are suffering to the Amount of vast Sums; and many Merchants and Owners of Ships in various Nations are ruined by the Hand of Providence.

In England, Part of the Banks of the River between London and Ranelagh, in Yorkshire, are broken down, and the adjacent Country overflowed. The River Ouse broke its Banks, and overflowed the Country from Selby to Beilston to an almost incredible Height. Yarm has undergone a second Inundation, and the Current has demolished every Wall that stood in its Way. The Country adjoining the River Hull is under Water for many Miles, and a melancholy Prospect cannot be described. In the

Neighbourhood of Spalding a Hare was taken upon a Sheep's Back, on the first rise of the Inundation in that Neighbourhood. The River Stockferry so over-topt its Banks, that it became a perfect Cascade, roaring Night and Day. In Ely several Thousand Acres are overflowed, and in Norfolk the Nare has done the same. The North Stone Bridge at Oundle is broke in three Places; and the great Bridge at Ternsford blown up. The famous Ruin at Godslow is blown down. Thorney Bank is broken down, and more than 20,000 Acres of Land laid under Water between Wisbech and Peterborough. The noted Stone Mill, formerly a Prison, at Yaxley, is blown down. By the Waters being so long out, the Church at Newbury has sunk two Feet deep. The Thames has overflowed its Banks, so that the West Country Barges can bring no Meal or Malt to London. The Inundations have been so general in England, that Room is wanting to enumerate the Damages done by them, nor have they been less general or less fatal abroad. At Hamburg the Elbe rose 12 Feet above high Water Mark. Great Part of Guelderland, Overijssel, Cleves, the district of Berawe, and almost all South Holland, is overflowed. Fourteen Mills on the Rhine have all been carried away by the Floods. The Villages of Moes and Zell are laid under Water, and the Cattle and Corn, and the Fruits of the Earth lost. The Damage done at Frankfurt, by the Waters, is computed at 40,000 l. 72 Villages in the Neighbourhood of Munster are overflowed, and it is said 12,000 Souls have perished.

During the Violence of the Storm, a Fire broke out at Hyde-Park Corner, but was happily extinguished with less Damage than could have been expected.

A Gentleman gave on Monday last, at the Star and Garter in Pall-mall, 100 Guineas, to receive 2 l. a Day till Mr. Wilkes's public Arrival in England.

We are informed, that a noble Earl sent Mr. Wilkes a Thousand Pound Bank Note the Evening before his Departure for France.

Extract of a Letter received on Monday by Mr. Wilkes of Clerkenwell from his Brother.

Paris, Hotel de Saxe, January 15, 1764.

"I am too ill at present to be sure of any fixed Time for my Return, and I had better keep my Room (as I am forced to do) here, than on the Road to Calais, which would be the infallible Consequence of my setting out."

"I wrote to the Speaker last Post, and inclosed, I believe, an unexceptionable Certificate of my ill State of Health. My eager Desire is to return to my native Country, to vindicate myself from a Charge brought against me."

We hear that as soon as Mr. Wilkes lands in England, he will be taken into Custody of the Gentleman Officer of the Black Rod; for a Breach of Privilege of the House of Peers in affixing the Name of a learned Gentleman to a blasphemous Performance, intitled, An Essay on Woman.

Feb. 6. The Lapwing, Griffin, from East-India, is arrived at Falmouth Express, and brings Advice that one of the Nabobs had attacked Patna, near Calcutta, where the English had a Factory, in which the following Gentlemen were killed:

Messrs. Amyatt, Hay, Wollaston, Goring, Hutchinson, and Gulton.

Mr. Jones and Dr. Crook are supposed also to be among the Slain.

Mr. Amplet is taken Prisoner, and supposed to be murdered.

Governor Ellis, with 150 Europeans, are taken Prisoners, and also supposed to be murdered. Cassumbazar is likewise taken.

These are all the Particulars we can learn at present.

Feb. 7. We are told, that some English Troops had entered Dacca (for what Reason we cannot learn) when the Nabob fled from his Palace, which the English entered, and began to plunder; Information of which being sent to the Nabob, he took an Opportunity of falling upon them with his Forces, and entirely routed them, cutting most of them to Pieces, and being flushed with Success, he attacked two of the Company's Factories and took them.

It is reported, that General Lawrence has stopped all the Forces from coming to England, and had sent for General Draper's from Manilla, in order to draw the Forces in a Body.

It is said by some, that the Dutch were no ways concerned, but only the Nabob's Troops, who were defending their Country.

It is said there are many more Persons killed in the East-Indies, than have yet appeared in the Papers.

It is expected that the next Advices from thence will bring an Account of the Loss of Calcutta, if not Bengal.

This melancholy Breach is said to be chiefly owing to the Covetousness of some of our Great Men there, many of whom have lost their Lives on the Account.

It is said, the only Resource the English have now left is to support the Nabob they before deposed, in order to oppose the present one.

All the Expresses that were dispatched on Saturday last for Holland on the above Account, are detained at Harwich, having missed the Packet-Boat.

Cassumbazar, said to be taken from us in the East Indies, is an Island in the River Hugly, on which are Cutway Fort and Town, and which was taken in the Year 1757 by the Admirals Watson and Pocock, and Colonel Clive. It before that belonged to the French, and was then governed by M. Law. At that Time the Nabob, Suraja Dowla, was in the French Interest; over whose Army, consisting of 20,000 Men, Lord Clive gained a complete Victory, and made an amazing Booty. After this, Jaffier Ally Cawn was raised to the Nabob of that Province, at the Instance of the English; on which he agreed, that all the Country before belonging to the French should be the Property of the English, and the French never be permitted to settle there, which has since been ratified by the Treaty of Peace. Since the above Affair happened, our good Friends the Dutch made some Claims, and three Indiamen came to Blows with them, for their refusing to deliver up 5 or 6 English Vessels they had seized in the above River, which has caused several Memorials to pass between our Court and the Dutch; but what was the Issue, the Public knoweth not.—However there are People who think Jaffier Ally Cawn is at length become Dutch.

Near Patna (the other Place taken higher up the River) on Jan. 15, 1761, the Mogul's Troops, said to have consisted of 80,000 Men headed by Shah Zadda, and supported by a small Number of French Troops under M. Law, where totally defeated, by Major John Carnach, at the Head of 500 Europeans, 2500 Seapoys, and 20,000 black Troops, with 12 Pieces of Cannon. M. Law and most of the French were taken Prisoners.

It is said that a Person, who lately was an eminent Merchant of this City, was concerned in procuring a Ship to be fraudulently lost, on which Account he has absconded, and diligent Search is making after him, in order to bring him to Justice.

Feb. 7. It is said, a Squadron of small Ships of War will soon be sent out to cruise in the Mediterranean.

Feb. 9. The Trial of John Wilkes, Esq; as the supposed Author of N^o. 45 of the North Briton, will come on next Tuesday in the Court of King's Bench, Westminster.

Feb. 11. By the Dutch Mails we have the agreeable News, that the Prince and Princess of Brunswick arrived happily at Helvoetsluys on Thursday the 2d Instant, after having been four Days at Sea, which, during the whole Time, was very Tempestuous.

Letters received in Holland from Barbary bring Advice, that the Algerines had concluded a Peace with the French.

Last Night the Jury for Mr. Wilkes's Trial, which comes on next Tuesday, was struck before the Master of the Crown Office.

The Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, have granted to Sieur J. H. C. de Stumpel, some Thousand Acres of Land on the River St. Juan, in Acadia, in Nova-Scotia, to settle, with four Thousand Families, the said Land.

Extract of a Letter from John Curling, junr. on board the Elizabeth, Capt. Macaulay, from Maryland.

"On the 6th of January 1764, we had the Misfortune to lose our Rudder, and the Ship lay at the Mercy of the Sea; have now made shift to make a kind of One, but am afraid it will be a long Time before we can get her home. We are in Latitude 42 N. and Longitude 34 from London, and shall make, for the first Port in Great Britain or elsewhere."

The Lords of the Admiralty have appointed the following Lieutenants to hold themselves in Readiness to go and take the Command of Schooners in North-America, viz. the Chaleur, Thomas Laugham; Gaspe, Thomas Allen; Magellan, Robert Dugdale; Hope, ———— Chandler; St. John, Thomas Hill; and St. Laurence, Ralph Dundas.

We can assure the Public, that last Night a Bill of Indictment, for no less an Offence than wilful

and corrupt Perjury, was found by the Grand Jury for the County of Middlesex, against a Person of some Consequence in Law and Politics, for a Testimony given in Behalf of a Defendant, in a late popular Trial at Westminster Hall.

Liverpool, Jan. 6 Last Friday Night the Brig Hannah, Capt. Cawson, of this Place, from Virginia, was drove on the Banks near Crosby Point, in Sight of that Town (having lost Part of her Rudder the Night before in a hard Gale of Wind.) She immediately went to Pieces, and every Soul perished except the Chief Mate, Robert Cawson (the Captain's Son) and one Boy, who saved themselves by sticking to Part of the Hull: There were 14 Hands on board, two of whom took to their Long Boat, but it immediately overfet; the Captain and Six of the Crew are since found. The Vessel had on board between 3 and 400 Hogheads of Tobacco, of which there are about 150 Hogheads saved, mostly spoiled.

Liverpool, Feb. 4. On Sunday last, a Box containing 460 Dollars, was found upon the Banks, near Crosby-point, by three Men, who with unparalleled Honesty brought it entire, tho' open'd, to one of the Officers of the Customs in this Town. The above appears to have been lost out of the Hannah, Capt. Cawson, from Virginia, wreck'd upon the said Banks about a Month ago.

NEW-YORK, April 2.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in London, to his Friend here, dated February 7, 1764.

"There is nothing new that is agreeable; but we have every Thing to fear that may hurt our Purse in the Line of Colonies. You'll soon have a Parcel of Marmadonian Ravens, who will feed upon and rip up your very Vitals, such as Officers of Stamp Duties, Appraisers of Lands, Houses, Furniture, &c. The Ministry are determined to make you pay for the Peace which you like so well; the People here find so much fault with it, that they are fearful to load them with any more Taxes.

"What is most unlucky for us, is, there is one Mr. Hufke, who understands America very well, and has lately got a Seat in the House of Commons; but instead of standing an Advocate for his injured Country (for he is an American born, and educated in Boston) he has officiously proposed in the House of Commons, to lay a Tax on the Colonies, which will amount to £. 500,000 per Ann Sterling, which he says they are well able to pay; and he was heard by the House with great Joy and Attention.

"There is a prodigious Stride made by the West-India Planters, to prohibit us trading to any of the foreign Islands; and how far they may succeed, we don't know, though it must be the utter Ruin of the little Trade we have left.

"There is a Gentleman, who is a Member of Parliament, and Agent for Connecticut and Pennsylvania, by the Recommendation of Mr. Ingerson and Mr. Franklin, that has great Weight with all the Ministry, and whose Honesty will prompt him to stand in our Interest: He has often been to the Board of Trade, and has succeeded so well, as to gain them over to our Interest, and the Lords of Trade will have great Influence over the House."

Thursday the Juno Frigate, Capt. O'Brien, arrived here from Portsmouth, in 5 Weeks and 4 Days, with 138 Chests of Silver, for the Pay of his Majesty's Forces in North America.

PHILADELPHIA, April 5.

Since our last we received what follows from Carlisle, viz.

"The Distresses of the Back Inhabitants are greater than can well be conceived. Two Hundred Miles of an extended Frontier are so exposed to the Incursions of Indians, that no Man can go to Sleep within 10 or 15 Miles of the Borders, without being in Danger of having his House burnt, and himself and Family scalped, or led into Captivity, before the next Morning. No Man can tell where the Indians will strike the next Blow, when they have begun their Murders and Devastations. On the 20th of last Month Agnes Davidson, and her Child, of an Year old; Andrew Sims, 14 Years old; Margaret Stephens, 12 Years old; and Joseph Mitchell, 3 Years old, were made Prisoners. Seven Houses were burnt down on the 21st, and a great Number of Horses, Cows, Sheep and Hogs were killed. On the 22d a Barn was burnt in the Patb Valley, a Horse was killed, and two taken away; about twelve Indians carried off the Captives, and seven or eight tarried behind, and did considerable Damage. The Captains Piper and Brady, with their Companies, did all that lay in their Power to protect the Inhabitants; and Lieutenant Chambers, and Ensign Ashy, pursued the Indians, to rescue the Prisoners, but without Success. Some Indians are suspected to be still lurking about Shippensburg, which seems the more probable, as Samuel Rippey's Barn, in the Town, was set on Fire, and believed to be done by these Enemies. These fresh Troubles greatly discourage the poor People, who intended to return early in the Spring to their deserted Habitations."

The following Paragraph of a Letter from a Gentleman in Carlisle, to his Friend in this City, may serve to give us some Idea of their Distresses, which bears Date March 26, 1764.

"Many of the Inhabitants of the Path and Shearman's Valleys, were purposing to adventure home, but this Affair has quite disconcerted their Measures, and the People along the North Mountain are moving further in, especially about Shippensburg, which is crowded with the Families of that Neighbourhood. Our Country has the Appearance of nothing but Confusion and Distress, which I fear will increase. What shall so many Families do, who have spent the Winter with us, chiefly supported by the Contributors of Philadelphia, in Hopes of returning to their Settlements in the Spring? Many of them have been forced to sell what few Cattle they saved, to support their Families; and others who, in the Fall, would not apply for a Share in the public Contributions, are obliged by want to apply now, when our Funds are almost spent. The above seven Families got nothing saved but their wearing Cloaths, so sudden was the Alarm; one poor Woman delivered of a Child, was obliged to remove in about two Hours Time after. Sir, I have but a melancholy Time of it, amidst such Calamity and Woes; I pray God may in Mercy shorten these Days of Misery."

VESSELS LOST.

The Ship Britannia, Capt. Tillet, from this Port for London, on the French Coast.—Prince of Wales, Tasker, bound to Cork from this Harbour, lost in the Shannon.—The Polly, Capt. Grant, from this Place, cast away at Fyall.—Capt. Patterson, belonging here, from Bourdeaux, lost near Ferrol.—And the Betty, Perkins, from North-Carolina for Virginia, cast away near the Capes of Virginia.

ANNAPOLIS, April 12.

This Day, his Excellency in Council, was pleased to Prorogue the General Assembly of this Province (which stood Prorog'd to the First of May) to Monday the Thirtieth of July next.

We have lately receiv'd some melancholy Accounts from the Westward, of several People being Kill'd and Taken by the Indians. We had an Account Yesterday, that on Saturday last Three Men were kill'd near the Warm-Springs in Virginia with Indian Arrows, and afterwards scalp'd. Fourteen Families have left their Settlements within a few Days.

Capt. Maynard, from London, in the Eagle, is arrived in Patuxent: By him we learn, that none of the Ships from this Province, were Missing. Capt. McLachlan (who lost his Rudder) had got into Falmouth.

Capt. John Lewis may be soon expected in Choptank.
