The Iraq War, Consequences **Closer to Home**

McGovern Offers **New Perspective** on War Debate

"You will know the Truth, and the Truth shall set you free." So reads the marble entrance to the headquarters of the United States' Central Intelligence Agency and the truth is what Ray McGovern, former high-level CIA analyst for 27 years, sought to give to his large audience last Thursday evening.

McGovern was invited as a guest speaker to address the Iraq War in a forum named "Iraq: Stay the Course or Withdraw?" The event was sponsored by several organizations, some of which include: the College Republicans, the College Democrats, Frostburg State University. Allegany College of Maryland, and West Virginia University.

As a high ranking intelligence analyst and former Army Infantry Intelligence Officer in the Vietnam War, McGovern was able to work at very senior levels within the Agency. He was also actively engaged in the writing the intelligence briefs for the president from the John F. Kennedy to the George H. W. Bush administrations. Because he was so intimately involved with the intelligence community, McGovern brought a valuable perspective to the Iraq debate, with which many students were unfamiliar.



"Hello Krispy Kreme!" Lecturer Michelle Garb joked as she began her presentation on eating disorders last Thursday night in the Armah.

Michelle, a comedienne and recovered anorexic, told her life story to the crowd and inspired many to reevaluate their food choices.

"I like how she was honest," said sophomore Jamie Fuhrer. "She told us that instead of eating she became whore-ish and compensated for food

by using men." Michelle described the various types of eating disorders - Anorexia, Bulimia, and Compulsive Overeating - and how each of these diseases are all about control.

Usually a person becomes affected by an eating disorder when they lose control of an area of their life,' said Garb. "People can control their food, so they shift their will-power to meal times, instead of focusing on a problematic area of their life."

Michelle also pointed out what a lot of people already knew about the media influence on eating disorders.

She talked about how celebrities are publicizing the fact that they are so thin, and in essence they are glorifying eating disorders.

Alycia Lewis was upset. "People like Nicole Richie starve themselves for perfection and its ridiculous!" she said


Senior Levi Frost agreed.

Since 1984 the likelihood of a college student taking up a part time job has increased by 8%, while the likelihood of a student taking a full time job has increased from 366,000 to 828,000 from 1985 to 2000. Today, more than half of students have jobs.

The average hours a student will work per week is around 25 hours. A quarter of students will work 35 hours, and another quarter will work under 15 hours per week.

Some students find it hard to balance both heavy school and work schedules.

"It's extremely stressful" said Sarah Llewellyn, an FSU student. "If you work over 25 hours you don't have enough time to do anything. If you do work 25 hours or more you are exhausted by the end of the day."

The average working student earns \$7.50 an hour. Three quarters will earn less than \$8, and a third will earn within \$1 of the minimum wage of \$6.15.

While working full time it becomes more difficult to balance work and school. Scheduling classes around work schedules becomes limiting when it comes to the choices of classes that can be taken, the number of classes you can take, and the scheduling of classes. Because of these difficulties it can take longer for a full time working student to earn the credits needed to graduate.

For students who work more than 20 hours a week, the drop out rate increases by 3.2%. There is a 10% difference between part and full time workers and graduating, favoring positively the part time workers.

FSU Biology Department Welcomes Additional Faculty

This year, Frostburg State University is proud to announce that there are two new professors in the biology department, Dr. Dana Ghioca and Dr. Rachel Collins.

Dr. Ghioca received her Bachelor of Science and Masters at University of Bucharest, in Romania. She specialized in Ecology and Environmental Protection/Management. She then earned her PhD in Wildlife Science from the Department of Range, Wildlife, and Fisheries Management at Texas Tech University, working on larval amphibians in playa wetlands.

She has worked on two post doctoral projects, the first at Texas Tech with the Institute for Environmental and Human Health, investigating larval amphibians. The second project focused on identifying vegetation

indicators for the Great Lakes's coastal wetland condition and on investigating the use of high resolution satellite images for mapping and characterizing coastal wetland vegetation.

She joined the Department of Biology at Frostburg State University in the position of Herpetologist and Ecotoxicologist primarily because of two reasons. She said "I will get to teach and educate students in addition to carrying out research on what I love most: amphibians and reptiles. Also, the Department of Biology offers a Masters program so that gives me greater opportunities of interacting with motivated and interested students. I should also mention that I enjoy living in Frostburg because I missed exploring mountains and forests for a long time."

Dr. Rachel J. Collins earned her Ph.D. in Ecology and Evolution, Department of Biological Sciences, University of Pittsburgh. She got her Master's degree in Ecology, Department of Zoology, at Miami University. She got her Bachelor of Science degree in Wildlife and Fisheries Science, Department of Zoology, North Carolina State University, Raleigh, NC, with a minor in English. She graduated cum laude in 1989.

Dr. Collins was a participant in the West Virginia Department of Forestry, Wildlands Fire Training Course where she studied prescribed fire management techniques, fire behavior, incident command structure and practiced fire-fighting methods. She was also a field assistant for mammals, insects, and the maintenance of diversity in tropical forest ecosystems in Panama and surveyed vegetation. Dr. Collins was also a technician for a Black Bear Research Project. She worked on this project with the Department of Zoology at North Carolina State University. There they established and monitored trap lines, assisted in handling captured bears, and used radio telemetry to locate bears.

Some of her special skills include prescribed fire training, trapping and banding vertebrates, radio telemetry, parametric and resampling statistics, and experimental design.

"I am thrilled that we were able to hire Dr. Collins and Dr. Ghioca," said Dr. William Seddon, chair of the FSU Biology Department. "Dr. Collins fills a gap that was created last year when our former forest ecologist took a position at another university. Dr. Ghioca, our new herpetologist, fills a position that has been open for four years. Both positions are essential for our Wildlife and Fisheries programs and we all look forward to working with these two new faculty members over the coming years."

"Artists are generally quite solitary when they work, and have full control of the creative process" explained group spokesper. son Donazetti. "When working collaboratively, these general rules are shattered. That's why we titled our show 'In Violation of ... " In addition to five individual works from each artist, the show features several large pieces done in a group fashion. "We used different collaborative techniques, mostly out of necessity because we aren't all located in the immediate area anymore." said Donazetti, noting that several of the artists were Western Maryland residents who have now moved on to other parts of the country.

One large 15-foot canvas in the exhibition was painted "round-robin" style, circulating to each of the artists in turn. "We had no previous agreement about what the subject of the painting would be, who would do what to it ... no rules at all. That's a tricky way to create a painting," Donazetti said.

Instead of emphasizing the international aspect of the Iraq War, McGovern chose to call attention to the circumstances under which President Bush entered Iraq, and to the domestic consequences which are now reverberating throughout the United States as a result.

McGovern made a point to explain the role played in presidential decision making of the CIA and the role that the CIA played in presidential making.

ber 11th. He noted that, on July 29, 2001, Condoleezza Rice had stated that they were so far successful in keeping weapons from Saddam Hussein and that he was not a threat, even to his immediate neighbors.

"So we were being asked to believe that, whereas Saddam Hussein had no weapons of mass destruction before 9-11, after 9-11, weapons of mass destruction descended from the heavens...for a soft landing on the sands of Iraq. It doesn't happen that way folks, just doesn't happen that *i* military service as an infantry way, and you don't have to be a crackerjack intelligence analyst to smell something fishy here," McGovern said. "That was an early clue, as we watched the use of intelligence, during 2002 and on until the war started; we became very upset because, in our view, we could see it being twisted to justify a decision for war." he said.

of Congress and the Supreme Court are diminishing. McGovern cited the President's willful disregard of the Geneva Conventions with his signing statements, the new powers that were granted to him to allow FISA wiretaps, and the manner in which the President failed to get Congress' direct approval for the war.

"As many of you might surmise, working for 27 years in the intelligence apparatus of this government and for two years in officer, I kind of have a thing about the constitution, and...my colleagues watched with me, as this evidence was being twisted, not only to persuade our elected representatives in congress to go to war, but really to mislead them in that way" said McGovern. "...[T]here is a Constitutional crisis here: the executive branch is deliberately misleading the congress out of their constitutional prerogative to declare authorized war."

extreme to a few, most students, seemed to acknowledge that he had a point in asking that Americans remember history and what the constitution stands for.

"I found the program to be really relevant, especially since I'm ex-Air Force and Army now and since I will probably be going back to the desert. I especially loved the part when he mentioned the Constitution and when he reminded me that, yeah. we swore an oath to protect the Constitution, not the president," said Edward Spellman, a visiting student. "I'm going to remember that from here on out!"

After explaining how the CIA was supposed to work with straight intelligence, he lamented the misuse of intelligence information, in regards to Iraq after the terrorist attacks on Septem-

The program was not as much a debate about what to do in Iraq, so much as a forum meant to call attention to the effects the war is having on America, including the power that the president is accumulating, while the powers

He also drew parallels from Hitler's Germany to the changes the government is undergoing today. Though it seemed

One freshman, Andy Peterson, agreed: "I just like how he used actual paper references; he had the data to support what he said."

The program was largely philosophical, but it was a great success in its way nonetheless. McGovern called upon his audience to remember history, to stand up for their rights, to champion the Constitution, to not discount the "virtue of anger" and to remember that, as citizens, "there is such a thing as being too late.'

The Devil Comes 'a Calling

The huge fan of Isaac Voltage Gate Asimov's since I was a teenager. For those who don't know who I'm talking

about, Asimov was a biochemist and a prolific author who started his career writing for his school newspaper (the man wrote professionally on just about everything starting in the 1940's, from the Bible and politics to science and science fiction, over 400 books in his lifetime). He is considered one of the great popularizers of science and one of the most legendary science fiction writers.

Asimov is almost single-handedly responsible for all of the science fiction that we read in books and watch in the movie theaters, especially the works of fiction dealing with robots. I. Robot was the first of these books, exploring a world where man constructed robots that abided by three basic rules of functioning, the Three Laws of Robotics:

-A robot may not injure a human being, or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm.

-A robot must obey the orders given it by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the First Law.

-A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second

Asimov fleshed out this future world and crafted stories that dealt with the ins and outs of these laws, which sometimes meant the logical circumvention of them.

At this point, you're probably wondering what exactly this has to do with the myth of the mad scientist.

Two years ago, Twentieth Century Fox released a film "based loosely" on Asimov's I, Robot. If by based loosely they meant only the name of the film and the book is identical, I suppose that fits.

The novel I, Robot had a purpose: one much deeper than might be comprehended at first glance. It was written after Asimov-a sci-fi reader as much as writer-had grown tired of the mad Dr. Frankenstein stories that had become fashionable after the scientific horrors of World War I. Human plays God, God punishes human. Human creations turn on creator, usually in the form of robots this time around. Asimov

believed in a world where man had the power to control technology utterly. without any divine power struggle or demon contracts (modernism). I, Robot the novel was the creative construction of this world.

"Never, never was one of my robots to turn stupidly on his creator," says

Asimov in a foreword to *Eight Stories* with these stories. In *The Matrix*, the from the Rest of the Robots. "My robots were machines designed by engineers, not pseudo-men created by blasphemers."

I, Robot the movie was the direct antithesis of the modernist world. What happened in the film? Human creates machine. Machine turns on human, trying to control him/her. The movie was basically another rehash of the Frankenstein story.

Our pop culture in America is rife

creations of humans betray their creators, causing a great rift that destroyed the world and plunged humans into a post-modernist nightmare. The Termi-

> nator, sent by his human-hating robo-superiors, travels through time to destroy a temporal cog in the human lineage during another such war between creator and creation. In Star Wars, Darth Vader is Luke Skywalker's machine-more-than-man (twisted and evil) shadow self. Skywalker must resist the Dark Side that Vader has embraced so easily through his lack of physical being, his disconnect with life

These stories are dubbed "Faustian," which refers to a very old story of a man playing God (Faust) and selling his soul to the devil (Mephistopheles) for power. They are archetypal, stories tied deep to our psyche and our inherent fear of the power of science, and therefore the power of knowledge.

They are also unfounded and philosophically unsound.

As a society we are frightened of science and the scientist because of what he/she might uncover. It is okay when science finds new ways to produce an abundance of food or more efficient fuels or time saving appliances.

Knowledge is simultaneously our friend and bitter enemy, perfectly illustrated by the Biblical story of the Garden of Eden.

Adam and Eve were evicted from the Garden not because they disobeyed God, but because they could not exist in a place that they knew did not exist. The knowledge from the apple showed them the world as it was, and they could no longer live in ignorance. Once you know something, you can never un-know it.

This inherent desire for ignorance in our culture is not justifiable. Stem cell research, cloning and gene therapy are the Faustian blasphemies of modern times, but the scientist investigating the benefits of such research is not mad Dr. Frankenstein. She/he is a member of a progressive scientific community. seeking to know human beings inside and out, and to use that knowledge to our benefit.

It comes down to this: Knowledge can be dangerous, especially if it is in the wrong hands, but what are the alternatives? Asimov can only answer with more questions:

"[Is] the response to be a retreat from knowledge? Are we prepared to [...] return to the ape and forfeit the very essence of humanity? Or is knowledge to be used as itself a barrier against the danger it brings?"




There's lots I could write about this week (September is National Campus Safety Awareness month, the Walk for Civility was a good first step, the University Police have been awarded the Governor's Crime Prevention Award again), but since time is passing, and we are still in the "Red Zone" for sexual assaults, let me concentrate on date rape drugs. It is not believed that date rape drugs are prevalent in this area. Several of the suspected cases I am familiar with boiled down eventually to just too much alcohol, sometimes in the presence of anti-depressants or other drugs that the victim was legally tak ing. But that does not mean that prevention should be taken lightly. You should never drink from a punchbowl, or accept a drink that someone else has poured for you. You should only drink from a factory-sealed bottle or can that you have opened. Even a bartender could adulterate your beverage, especially someone who is not a professional bartender but is only working casually. Never leave your beverage unattended, while you dance, go the to the restroom, or even for the briefest moment. Of course, if you are under 21, the beverages I am talking about are non-alcoholic! There are several substances loosely characterized as date-rape drugs. If you are a victim, you should get to a hospital as soon as possible. Depending on the drug, it can be detected for up to 24 hours in your blood, and up to 96 hours in your urine. The University Police are here to help you, and we will not charge a sexual assault victim with an underage drinking offense, so you should never hesitate to call us.

Power & Knowledge

No Gods No Masters Donovan Martin

It is convenient that we have first looked at a historical period so far removed from our own because with it we can more easily assume some form of neutrality. Now, as we turn to our own

culture and times, the analytical knife cuts closer as it were and we become more squeamish under it.

The contrast also serves to reveal both the dynamism and universality of cultures. Things change and stay the same just as a river appears constant and yet every moment brings new waters downstream.

Last week, following the advice of Michel Foucault, I had begun to analyze power "as something which circulates, or rather as something which only functions in the form of a chain." In a very brief sketch of the growth of American society out of colonial mercantilism it was discovered that two dominant forces did and do flow throw society to form Foucault's requisite chain. These are resource and information.

Over two thousand years ago Plato gave us the sound insight often translated, "let us create in idea a State; and yet the true creator is necessity, who is the mother of our invention."

People are always searching for the means by which they can take care of the necessities and thus ease the circumstances of their existence. Resources are the means that they use for these ends. This much is obvious but worth stating in that it really clarifies the fundamental nature of this inquiry.

Water, forestry products, animal products including food to raise them on, agriculture, mining, the conversion of these raw materials into commodities via industry, all these are the result of humans creating the means to satisfy their basic needs. Granted this capacity can, and has at different times throughout history, be stretched to the point of absurdity. Once the true necessities are met the tendency is to push for the maximization of comfort or luxury.

It was also Plato who said, "we must go beyond the necessities of which I was at first speaking, such as houses, and clothes, and shoes: the art of the painter and the embroiderer will have to be set in motion and gold and ivory and all sorts of materials must be procured." We must consider these things because they are the symptoms of our times. We live in a world in which some enjoy vast luxuries unmatched in history while others fail to meet even those basic necessities to survive.

In light of this inequality, it must be clear why resources are an adequate vehicle for power and used to control social systems under Foucault's model of power analysis. Resources form an easily traceable chain as they travel from raw material into commodities and finally to waste and looking at the manipulation of these resources can show definite causal relations to the living circumstances of citizen living in society.

Here is where information, particularly as it is conveyed through language, becomes the key to understanding both social development and the means by which it can be controlled. In Critique of the Gotha Program Marx concludes, "The distribution of the means of consumption at any time is only a consequence of the distribution of the conditions of production themselves." The conditions of production dictate the use of resource. They dictate the use of resource through the assimilation of information throughout the society.

In my previous article it was noted that information regarding the availability of resources in the New World was the most valuable thing brought back to Britain from those lands. It is because this knowledge opens up new options for the satisfying of needs. If circumstances in Europe were not adequate, perhaps this newly discovered land would prove more prosperous.

This is an easy relationship to see and once seen can be translated into the modern day without any effort. Think for a moment how the spread of information is used to widen people's options in today's advertising industry. At any time there are a multitude of varieties of just one kind of product and the competition between these brands is waged with multi-million dollar budgets, just to get the word out.

When an idea is related to a person, they become a vehicle for that idea and become able to act upon it. It is reasonable to stipulate that a person cannot act on an idea until they are aware of it, and so idea can be catalysts to action. Once knowledge is cemented in the consciousness a person can make any number of decisions based on that knowledge.

So it is knowledge that will ultimately restrict a person's methods of fulfilling their needs. If the person is unaware of this particular option it is beyond their power to choose it. Language becomes the means by which a person's actions can be controlled because it is through language, language as symbols, that information is spread from person to person.

"The individual is the effect of power, and at the same time, or precisely to the extent to which it is that effect, it is the element of its articulation." Next week we will delve into this relationship and examine the social power of language.



I looked out of the bus window to



This is a response to President Gibralter's "New Policy Concerning Alcohol Abuse" from the September 13th issue of the Bottom Line. While I applaud the President for addressing this serious issue, portions of his message deeply concerned me and others in the FSU community.

Alcohol abuse is not a new phenomenon, and recently we've been painfully reminded of this fact. For those who are unaware, early in September there was an incident outside an off campus house in which an FSU student (apparently under the influence of alcohol) pushed a 45-year-old local man. The man fell, hit his head on the pavement, and was hospitalized in critical condition. Although this is a tragic incident, we should learn the whole story before we haphazardly make drastic changes to FSU policy.

This situation and others prompted President Gibralter to address the issue and announce a new "zero tolerance" policy, under which violators on and off campus will be subject to the University judicial process and be granted "no leniency." While I was pondering this whole ordeal many questions raced through mind. Why was the man assaulted? Was there a previous altercation between him and the student? How intoxicated was the student? These and other questions need to be addressed in a rational, logical way before the University starts harpooning responsible student drinkers with buzzwords like "zero tolerance". What exactly is zero tolerance anyway? Does it

mean there will be an army of state troopers patrolling our streets like there has been recently? Does it mean that the freshman who gets caught with a beer is going to get suspended? I fail to see how this new policy is going to solve the problem. The problem is not alcohol; the problem is students who drink irresponsibly. And no stern proclamations or buzzwords are going to fix that.

My final question is, do the actions of one or a few irresponsible students give the University a license to slam its gavel down on all students who drink alcohol? I say no. And my "no" becomes fierce when I'm off campus. Personally, I don't think the University has any right to question me about what I do off campus, let alone judge me. If I'm on-campus and I violate the alcohol policy, FSU has every right to punish me. But if I'm drinking at my house off campus and I walk across the street to my neighbor's with a beer in my hand and "Johnny Good Cop" protects and serves me with an alcohol citation then that's my business-not my RA's, or my professor's, or President Gibralter's, or FSU's. And I resent the University paternally monitoring me like I'm a child. I pay my tuition, I go to class, and I make the grades. When I'm on campus, FSU is in charge. But, except in a few rare cases, what I do when I step off campus is my business and FSU has no place telling me otherwise.

The Trouble with the U.N.

During the build-up to World War Two, there were many who felt that the League of Nations, the international body founded in 1919 to preserve world peace, had been an utter failure. They were right of course. The League failed miserably to protect Abyssinia from Italian invasion, and did not act during the Spanish Civil War or Hitler's rise to power. The League did little or nothing to prevent the Second World War. It was a failure, and so, according to many today is the United Nations, the body set up to replace the League.

There are a lot of people in the United States who would like to see the UN scrapped, or at the very least have the USA withdraw from an organisation that is deemed flawed, corrupt and a threat to America's sovereignty. One is reminded of a quote from a British diplomat upon the demise of the League of Nations; "The League of Nations has not been tried and found wanting, it has been found inconvenient and not tried." And so it has been with the UN.

The UN was set up to promote cooperation in international law, international security, economic development, and social equity. Fundamentally it was an organization devised to peace and global co-operation. This was a noble goal. And yet at every turn its most prominent members have failed to live up to their commitments.

International law is a concept rejected by the current US government, and by others in the past. The idea of civilised nations gathering together to promote justice and pursue criminals who are a threat to world peace, law and order seems an appealing one. However, the US withdrew from compulsory adherence to the International Court of Justice in 1986, and rejected the International Criminal Court outright during the Clinton administration. Without US support, there can be no international law.

Peace is the desire of all civilized people across the globe. This may seem true but it doesn't quite match the reality of the situation. The five permanent members of the United Nations security council are the US, the UK, France, Russia and China. World peace depends on these nations. The total amount of armaments sold by these nations each year, in US dollars, is roughly \$30billion.

A fair distribution of the world's wealth, and the promotion of economic development also seems like an agreeable thing. The UN should support free and fair trading standards for all nations. The reality is different. Africa has some of the largest deposits of oil, diamonds and gold in the world, and yet in the the UN Human Development Report of 2003, the bottom 25 ranked nations (i.e. the 25 poorest nations),out of 176, were all in Africa. The G8 nations (US, Canada, UK, France, Russia, Germany, Italy, Japan) control 65% of the world's wealth. Huge amounts of aid are pumped into Africa each year, but power on the continent in many cases rests in the hands of tinpot dictators and corrupt elites. The ordinary decent people are

the ones left to rot in poverty.

The environment fares little better. The USA dealt a body blow to global environmental protection when it refused to sign the Kyoto Accord. However the nations who did sign it have largely failed to live by its rules and the Accord never included India and China, two of the world's most rapidly developing countries, and indeed two of its largest pollutors. The fact is that few nations have any real interest in protecting our environment.

And no matter how much our leaders bleat on about democracy and human rights, the fact is that the world's most powerful nations could care less about human rights. The US has good trading and diplomatic relations with nations like Saudi Arabia; which has an appaling human rights record. The US and my own country, the Republic of Ireland, have strong trade links with China, another serial human rights abuser. Countries, and companies, put monetary gain ahead of human rights and social justice every time.

The truth is there can never be peace, or prosperity or justice for all. There is more profit in war than in peace. The strong will always clamber to stand upon the shoulders of the weak. The UN was designed to foster good relations between all the world's nations through dialogue and cooperation. We cannot have a better world until people respect, love and forgive one another. And we cannot hope for that unless we talk to one another. Sadly that is just too inconvenient.

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
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Academic Scheduling & **Religious** Observances

Bob Dylan is now the oldest living artist to ever claim the #1 spot with his new album, Modern Times. I cannot truly compare Modern Times to any other recent work of Dylan's because I haven't heard it. What bands had inspiring live performances when you were younger?



Volleyball Loses to Seton Hill, 3-0

Seton Hill defeated Frostburg State in volleyball action, 3-0, Wednesday evening at Bobcat Arena.

Seton Hill (4-7) earned the win with game scores of 30-18, 30-21 and 34-32.

The Griffins opened the first game with a 5-3 lead and extended that lead to 9-5. After a timeout, FSU (5-10) narrowed the gap to 10-8, but SHU rallied off six-straight points to push its advantge to 16-8.

The Griffins would take their largest lead of the game, 28-15, before closing out out the game with a 30-18 win.

In game two, Frostburg State opened an early lead of 5-2 and later held a 7-3 lead before Seton Hill rebounded with sevenstraight points to take a 10-7 edge.


The visitors continued the pressure building a 19-12 cushion before the Bobcats battled back for a 20-17 score. SHU would again pull away holding leads of 23-17 and 28-20 before going on for the win, 30-21.

The Griffins came out with the momentum in game three taking an early 3-1 lead. The teams would swap points before Seton Hill built a 7-3 advantage.

After FSU scored a point to cut the deficit to 7-4, but SHU would score three-straight points for a 10-4 lead. Freshman Brooke Winterling (Glenelg, Md./Glenelg) helped the Bobcats battle back, posting three kills as FSU narrowed the gap to 13-12.

The game would remain close from then on as neither team would hold more than a three-point edge. Frostburg State would later take its first lead of the game at 20-19.

SHU countered to move ahead 26-23 but the Bobcats tallied four-straight points for a 28-26 advantage. The game would





later be tied at 29-29 and 32-32 before the Griffins would go on for a 34-32 victory.

Winterling led the charge with 11 kills, 10 digs and two blocks followed by sophomore Caryn Wright (Pikesville, Md./Western Tech) with six kills and four blocks.

Senior Amanda Hernandez (Crofton, Md./Arundel) had 22 assists and sophomore Jennifer Wheaton (Ashburn, Va./Stone Bridge) posted 16 digs.

FSU is back in action on Saturday when it travels to Medaille to open Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference action at 11:00 am.



FSU Bobcats give up 14 points in second half, lose the game

The Frostburg State football team suffered another setback Saturday with a 22-0 loss to SUNY Brockport. Not only did Brockport dominate every phase of the game the quarterback position was once again a problem for the team.

Frostburg was able to keep the game close for most of the game until they imploded in the second half. The halftime score was only 7-0 against a very good Brockport team but Frostburg couldn't finish off any of their drives with a score.

Brockport was able to torch the Frostburg defense for 342 yards on 54 carries in the running game. Frostburg could not find a way to stop the opposing offense and could not find a way to get their offense going.

The Bobcats gained only 214 total yards in the game and only 129 yards in the rushing game with Shanorm Young leading the way with 73 yards on 12 carries. But it was the passing game again that forced the team to be one dimensional. Junior quarterback Josh Hager threw 2 interceptions in his first game at the helm and was only able to complete 8 of 21 passes for 87 yards. Turnovers again cost the team valuable points as they came at the most inopportune times, one coming at the Brockport 11-yard line after a 60 yard drive.

The special teams improved their performance with punter Nicholas Payne pinning Brockport inside their 20-yard line twice. But the ball had to be punted eight times as the Bobcat offense was unable to mount many serious drives.

The defense did not play a great game but they did enough to keep their team in the game for the most part. Junior cornerback Derek Schrader led the team in tackles with 10 and senior linebacker Lathon Romaine added 9 tackles, a

sack, and a forced fumble.

But ultimately the power of the Brockport running game controlled the game and buried the Bobcats in a hole they could not get out of. The team showed a lack of discipline with 9 penalties for 63 yards, but only being able to convert 2 of 11 third downs also hurt.

The Bobcats have a much needed bye this week as they look to prepare for 7th ranked Wesley on October 7th at 1:00 pm. The Bobcats have a lot to work on before the next game if they look to salvage the season.

PAINESVILLE, Ohio. — Freshman Lauren Lentine (Princeton, N.J./WWP North) scored three goals to lead the Bobcats to a 7-1 victory over Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference opponent Lake Erie, Saturday afternoon.

Frostburg State dominated the contest, scoring the game's first six goals before LEC could get on the scoreboard.

FSU scored it's first goal of the match in the 21st minute when Lentine scored on an assist from Tricia Richardson (Gibson Island, Md./St. Mary's). Lentine would then score her second goal of the game, in the 28th minute. The Bobcats continued to score, getting back-to-back goals from senior Lindsay Hoffman (Frederick, Md./Thomas Johnson). Hoffman scored the third goal of the game in the 40th minute when she received the ball, turned to face the goal, and placed it in the upper other.

The fourth goal of the game was a spectatular individual effort from Hoffman. She attacked the endline, beat several Lake Erie defenders, and then snuck the ball between the near post and goalkeeper Heather McElwain.

The Bobcats went into halftime leading by a commanding 4-0.

Two and a half minutes into the second half, Lentine scored her third goal of the match. She headed in a cross from freshman Katie Emminger (Baltimore, Md./Perry Hall).
