This past week CCB, College Center Board, conducted a phone survey on student activities and preferences. The sample used was a representative sample chosen from all students (on-campus, off-campus and commuters). The participants were asked a variety of questions with some of the results discussed here. First, when asked

what type of activities students would be most interested in attending, movies were the numberone choice, followed by a hypnotist/mentalist contemporary music. When asked what type of music performances they would prefer, the responses were 92% rock and roll, 80% contemporary/pop,

FSC Names New Basketball Coach

ident of Frostburg State College, announced today that the Men's Basketball Team will have a new head coach beginning with the 1984-85 season. The new head coach will be Dr. Kenneth Kutler, the College's athletic director and soccer coach. Kurt Wolfe, who has coached the Frostburg team for 14 years, will assume full-time teaching responsibilities in the College's Health and Physical Education Department.

POPE LISTS THEME FOR PACIFIC TRIP

Pope John Paul II has chosen reconciliation as the theme of his 11-day tour of South Korea, Thailand and the South Pacific starting Wednesday. "In war-divided Korea and the center of Indochina, the holy father will try to drive home a strong message of peace and reconciliation," said a top Vatican official who will accompany John Paul on his 21st overseas trip as pontiff. On the first leg of his second pilgrimage to the Pacific, the pope will confer Wednesday in Fairbanks, Alaska, with President Reagan, who is headed home from a visit to China.

SENATE KILLS NEW DEFICIT CUT PROPOSAL

The Senate Tuesday defeated a deficit reduction plan that would have frozen most spending for a year, including Social Security, but still allowed a 4 percent increase in military expenditures. The plan, offered by Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., was the first of several budget "freeze" proposals set to come up in the Senate as it continued its second week of debate on deficit reduction. It was defeated on a 38 to 57 vote.

REAGAN EBULLIENT OVER CHINA TRIP


President Reagan, ebullient over his six-day pilgrimage to China, flew home Tuesday and declared the journey had led to "a new level of understanding" with Peking despite lingering differences. Back on American soil for just nine hours, Reagan reported on his first official trip to a communist country. "We went to China to advance the prospects for stability and peace throughout the world," Reagan said in prepared remarks. "We went to illustrate, by our presence, our sincere desire for good relations."

JACKSON WINS D.C. PRIMARY

The Reverend Jesse Jackson won his first Democratic presidential primary Tuesday, outdistancing Walter F. Mondale and Gary Hart in the District of Columbia. Fifteen delegates were at stake in the district race.

SEVEN MISSING FOUND DEAD IN MINE SHAFT

One of six people who had gone out for a joyride in the woods of Pennsylvania's coal country was found dead Tuesday night in a car that had plummeted more than 70 feet into a collapsed mine, a rescue official said. Five other bodies remained underground, he said. After working all day to get heavy equipment into position to reach the four-wheel-drive Chevrolet Blazer, rescue workers pulled a body out of the hole on a stretcher at 7:30 p.m.

How Do I Act with That Person with a Disability?

Interaction with a person with a disability is determined not only by knowledge of the person and the disability but also by one's prevailing attitude about "people with disabilities." If you see yourself as subscribing to any of the following attitudes, consider whether you are enhancing the disabled person's integration into "temporarily able-bodied society" or posing a barrier achievement equality.

Robert B. Nathanson's chapter "Campus Interactions: Attitudes and Behaviors" (in Hourihan [ed]. Disability: The College's Challenge) describes nine syndromes common to perand sons communities which include individuals with physical disabilities. Syndrome 1: All that matters is your label. A person's physique is perceived as spreading to other aspects of the person. Evaluation of the person is determined by one physical characteristic. The case of the student with cerebral palsy who visits a college's residence life office and is told, "Of course we'll be able to provide you with an attendant to help you in your needs," despite the student's statement that she has difficulties with no personal care, exemplifies syndrome. The resithe dence life director perceived the student only as a "cerebral palsied" student, just like other cerebral palsied students who had happened to require personal care.

Characteristic of this syndrome are words and phrases such as THE deaf, para, cp's, crippled, THE

handicapped . . victim, sick, quads and THE

Syndrome 2: I feel sorry for you. Feelings communicated about the disabled student are: "If it happened to me I'd fall apart," "I don't know how he manages to go on," It's such a pity," "It's a tragedy" and "What a shame."

In this syndrome, the focus is on the perceived pain in a student's life. The disabled person is believed to be fragile and hopeless, a victim of tragedy. This is the syndrome which sometimes accounts for disabled students being given "easy breaks" because they are seen as having had "enough misfortune."

Syndrome 3: Don't worry, I'll save you. This

syndrome is closely related to Syndrome 2. The person with a disability is viewed as being in need of help, incapable of managing personal affairs, incapable of handling frustrations, and inadequate. Rather than seeing disabled persons struggle, it seems easier to "save" them.

Common expressions include: "I'll do it for you,"
"It's too difficult for you"
and "Don't worry about a
thing."

Syndrome 4: You present too many problems for us to handle. The student is seen as an added responsibility requiring additional time, work and energy. The feeling is that the student would be "better off somewhere else," or "at least

not at this college." "What markable," "Overcame so if?" questions abound -"What if there's a fire?" "What if she can't . . .?" This syndrome excludes the student from even attempting to plan his involvement in any activity.

Syndrome 5: I know what's best for you. In this syndrome, friends, relatives or teachers typically react negatively to disabled persons' aspirations. This is often true in the college setting. A student may be advised to avoid particularly challenging courses or majors because, "it's just not right for you." This. syndrome is frequently evidenced during vocational planning by phrases such as "You shouldn't," "You'll never," "Unrealistic," "I've been doing this for 20 years," "Dreamer," "Listen to me."

Syndrome 6: If I'm lucky we won't see each other today. This syndrome is characterized by a feeling of revulsion and the conscious or unconscious rejection of the disabled person. These feelings are transmitted by impatience and avoidance. The student may be kept waiting, transactions may be cut short or a greeting or handshake may be absent.

Statements associated with this syndrome include: "I'd love to transfer the case," "Why does she have to join us?" "Why did he have to register for my course?"

Syndrome 7: I'm amazed by your courage. Because the disabled person is perceived as inferior, his/her actual accomplishments are over-valued. Comments such as "Courageous," "Re-

many obstacles," "Miraculous" and "Brave" prevail in this syndrome. Many times these are said in the condescending tone which belies the actual limited perceptions of the disabled person's ability.

Syndrome 8: Who's more anxious, you or I?

Because of uncertainty of proper "protocol" with disabled individuals, natural interaction between ablebodied and disabled may be inhibited. Interactions may terminated sooner, smiling behavior may increase or decrease, when compared to behaviors with non-disabled persons. may result from increased awareness of mortality or susceptibility to illness or injury. It may also result from feeling overwhelmed at the severity of the student's disability or embarrassment for not being able to help "adequately." Friends/colleagues may hesitate to discuss sports, dating, sexuality and physical appearance around friends with disabil-Disabled students ities. may be referred to the "disabled students' advisor" at the slightest provocation, rather than directly working things out with the student.

Syndrome 9: You want to be just like everyone else, but I won't let you. Examples of this include the professor who encourages a student to present a discussion about his disability; the overly helpful friend who continually asks if assistance is needed and the teacher who, during the first class period, asks that disabled students identify themselves (both to instructor and class). This syndrome results in a person
