The 122nd commencement ceremonies of FSU will be held Saturday, May 24, in the Harold J. Cordts Center Main Arena.

Two exercises will be held during the day. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will present degrees beginning at 10 a.m. and the College of Business and the College of Education ceremonies will start at 2 p.m. FSU President Catherine R. Gira will confer graduate and undergraduate degrees at both events.

The featured speaker this semester will be FSU alum The Honorable *W. Dennis Thomas* (Class of 1965), former Assistant to U.S. President Ronald Reagan. Student speakers at the spring commencement include *Angela D. Burns*, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences; *Aaron Deeb*, College of Education, and *Ian G. Iliff*, College of Business.

Burns is a wildlife and fisheries major with a minor in biology. She served as president of the FSU student chapter of the Wildlife Society. Angela has participated in several research projects, including serving as an aquaculture technician and assisting with surveys for river otters in Pennsylvania.

According to his faculty nominator, Deeb, an elementary/middle school education major, is "an extremely dedicated and professional student, whose positive attitude and work ethic have been a model for his peers." Aaron has brought his specialty in language arts to the classroom by generating lesson plans and developing related activities for grades 3 through 8.


Senior Send-off

\$140,000 Unrestricted Goal Met by Annual Fund

The 2002-2003 FSU Annual Fund Campaign has reached its initial goal of \$140,000 in gifts and payments of pledges, according to Chris Harmon, director of annual giving. The 2003 fiscal year was a very ambitious campaign that had to overcome many obstacles due to the aftermath of 9/11 and the Iraq War. The Annual Fund



Campaign is a targeted appeal beginning in early fall directed to alumni, parents, businesses, faculty, staff and friends for unrestricted support of FSU. Major efforts

include direct mail, two aggressive phonathon campaigns, parents' campaign, faculty-staff campaign and the Senior Appeal.

Contacts were made to over 19,000 constituents, which resulted in over 2,800 pledges and gifts. A special campaign was developed to allow contributors of \$1,000 or more to have a named unrestricted scholarship to incoming freshman. This first-year effort has generated 18 new named Annual Fund Scholarships.

Proceeds for the Annual Fund are used to support a variety of FSU programs including the Alumni Association; scholarships; faculty/staff/alumni Achievement Awards; faculty, staff and student development; student leadership programs; student work programs; Homecoming; reunions; and the Golden Anniversary Program.

Special Education Institute Planned

A summer institute dealing with current issues in special education will be held at FSU during the week of June 23 to 27. The institute is free of charge and open to area teachers and the general public.

Events include a workshop conducted by Dr. Richard Villa from San Marcos, Calif., dealing with instructional strategies designed to promote success for students of all ages with learning difficulties; workshops on instructional and communication assistance for individuals with autism, including a teleconference with Dr. Temple Grandin, an expert in the subject; a presentation by the lead educational consultant for the brain trauma unit of Walter Reed Army Hospital; assistive technology and adapted physical education forums and panel discussions featuring college instructors.

Points of Pride



English professor *Dr. Barbara Hurd* has been awarded a second year of the Wilson H. Elkins Professorship from the University System of Maryland, which will allow her time to work on the third book in her series of environmental essays.

The first \$80,000 Elkins Professorship allowed Hurd more time to complete the research, writing and revision of her second collection of essays, *Entering the Stone: On Caves and Feeling Through the Dark.* The second \$75,000 award will allow her to research and write essays for her third collection, tentatively titled *The Wrack Line*, named for the line of debris left on a beach after the tide goes out.

As a requirement of the Elkins award, Hurd will present three lectures at FSU during the coming year. The first is scheduled for Sept. 9.

Entering the Stone will be published by Houghton Mifflin Co. in August.

On May 14, *Shivaji Prasad* (Geography) and *Keith Klemm* (an undergraduate student in Geography) participated in Appalachian Remote Sensing Conference at West Virginia University in Morgantown. There, Prasad presented a research paper titled "Relative Efficiency of Adaptive Filters in Suppressing and Preserving Sharpness of Feature Boundaries in Multi-Spectral Satellite Images." This is part of his on-going project on satellite image classification techniques for coastal waters.

Jacquelynne McLellan and Bill Anderson have had a paper accepted by the American Journal of Economics and Sociology, to be published in a forthcoming edition. The paper is entitled: "Newspaper Liberal Bias or 'Statist Quo'? The Acid (Rain)Test."

How many of these Fairy Tales have you told?

"I don't need a safety belt when I'm traveling at low speeds or going on a short trip."

The truth is that all driving can be dangerous. More than 80 percent of all crashes occur at speeds less than 40 mph. And three out of four crashes causing death occur within 25 miles of home.

"I might be saved if I'm thrown clear of the car in a crash."

The fact is that your chances of being killed are almost 25 times greater if you're thrown from the vehicle. The forces in a collision can be enough to throw you as much as 150 feet – about 15 car lengths.

"Our vehicle has air bags so we don't need to use our safety belts."

The combined use of safety belts and air bags provides the best protection. Safety belts keep you correctly held in place inside the vehicle to protect you in all kinds of crashes.

"It takes too much time and trouble to fasten my safety belt."

In reality, fastening your safety belt may take a little time and effort—but it's worth it! In fact, buckling up takes only about 30 seconds. That much time and trouble you can live with – if you want to live.

"When I have a shoulder belt on, I don't need to fasten my lap belt."

During a crash, a shoulder belt keeps your head and chest from hitting the steering wheel, dashboard, and windshield. The lap belt must be fastened to prevent you from "submarining" in a crash. The combination of a lap and shoulder belt offers you the maximum amount of safety in the event of a crash.

"If I wear a safety belt, I might be trapped in a burning or submerged car!"

Forget about it! Less than one-half of 1 percent of all injury-producing crashes involve fire or submersion. You are better off wearing a safety belt at all times in a vehicle. With safety belts, you are more likely to be unhurt, alert, and able to escape quickly. If you are unbelted, then you might be knocked unconscious by striking the interior of your vehicle and then your chances of getting out would be far less.

"Fairy Tales will live forever. You won't. So do all you can to live longer."

Buckling Up is a primary law in Maryland. Drivers and front-seat passengers must be secured by seat belts, all children younger than 16 must be buckled in appropriate child safety seats or seat belts, children younger than 16 must not ride in the open bed of a pickup truck, and citations with fines are issued for these violations. Most police officers hate to spend their time looking for people who are unrestrained in vehicles. But they would rather do this than find those people dead or injured because of a motor vehicle crash. Wear your safety belt every trip, every time!
