ANNAPOLIS, October 6.

ON Tuesday last the General Assembly of this Province met here, when the Session was opened with

The SPEECH of his Excellency HORATIO SHARPE, Esq; Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of MARYLAND, to Both Houses of Assembly:

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,

THE unexampled Successes with which his Majesty's vigorous Measures were blessed, during the Course of the late War, having, since I had last an Opportunity of Addressing myself to you in your Legislative Capacity, enabled Him to restore Peace to his People, on Terms of Glory and great Advantage; Terms particularly calculated for the future Security and Prosperity of these Colonies, I cannot open this Session without Congratulating you on that happy Event, as well as on the auspicious Birth of a Prince of Wales, under whom your Posterity may enjoy the innumerable Blessings. We, in common, with the Rest of his Majesty's Subjects, at this Period, derive from the propitious Reign of the Best of Sovereigns.

I have been induced, Gentlemen, to convene you at this Time, by an Opinion that you would be glad to have an Opportunity, before the Expiration of our Inspection Law, of considering what farther Amendments to that Act it might be expedient to make for the better Advancement of our Staple, and by what other Means, consistent with the Laws of Great-Britain, the whole Trade of this Province might be Encouraged and Promoted. You will also, I presume, think it your Duty to examine at this Time into the State of our public Funds; and, if necessary, to provide for any Deficiencies which may have arisen from the long Continuance of the War, or other Accidents; and if you should now have Leisure to consider the Claims which those of the Militia, whom the Necessity of the Times obliged me to order into actual Service, and many other Persons have on the Public, I am in Hopes you will both adjust such Accounts, and make the necessary Provision for Payment.

Interested, Gentlemen, as you are in the Prosperity and Welfare of this Province, you come together, I flatter myself, at this Time, with a proper Disposition and Temper to advance it, and with a Resolution to avoid every Measure that can tend to interrupt the Harmony which ought to subsist between those whose true Interests are the same, and which alone can render your Meetings of any real Benefit or Utility to your Country.

LONDON, July 4.

ON Saturday Sen'night about Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon, a terrible Fire happened at Offord-Clay in Huntingdonshire, by Means of heating an Oven, some Wood and Thatch lying too near the Crown of it, and in about two Hours Time consumed the greatest Part of the Town, to the Number of 22 Farm and other Dwelling-Houses. There was a strong Wind at South-West, which drove the Fire into the thickest Part of the Town, so that the greatest Part of the Damage was done before the Engines of Godmanchester, Huntingdon,

and St. Neot's, arrived. The next Morning the Bishop of Lincoln sent Provisions and Drink to the Distressed; and the same Morning the Mayor and principal Gentlemen of Huntingdon sent Bread, Cheese, and some Barrels of Beer, for their immediate Relief, and are making a general Collection from House to House; and we hear that most of the Towns in the Country will send in their Benefactions without any Application from the Sufferers.

The following is an Account of the Robbery for which Thomas, alias W. Dawson, was committed to Newgate, on Thursday Night last; and also a Narrative of the Manner of his being apprehended. About five Weeks ago the said Usher (that being his real Name) hired himself to Mr. James, Master of the Bath and Bristol Waggon, as a Clerk, by the Name of William Dawson; on Saturday Morning, June 25, Capt. Thomas, Capt. of a Vessel bound from Cork to Bristol, who had on board 1800 l. in Portugal Money consigned to several Merchants in London, applied to Mr. James's House in order to have it forwarded to London, and accordingly in Mr. James's Absence, Mr. Jones, another Clerk of the said Mr. James, received the said Cash, giving the Captain a Receipt for it: Soon after which Usher applied to the Capt. and informed him, that he was Mr. James's head Clerk, and must therefore give a Receipt for the Money, for that Mr. Jones's Receipt was good for nothing; the Capt. accordingly accepted the said Usher's Receipt for the same; and this Step taken by Usher, was in order to give a Colour of Trust, and thereby to take off the Crime of Felony. The same Night, however, Usher disappeared, with the Money which he took out of his Master's Warehouse, and the Rout he had taken was not discovered till the Monday following. Notice of which was sent Express from Bristol to Sir John Fielding, but the Information sent by the Express not containing any Particulars as to the Manner Usher travelled, all Pursuits proved ineffectual till Wednesday last at two o'Clock, (when Mr. James, having come home to Bristol and found that not only the said Sum 1800 l. was missing, but also 200 l. of his own Cash, and two Watches belonging to his Servants) had traced Usher himself to the Oxford Arms in Oxford-Road, where he was taken out of a Post-Chaise and four Horses, the preceding Day about twelve o'Clock, by an un-known Hackney Coach; which Intelligence being communicated to Sir John Fielding, Hand-Bills were immediately dispersed to all the Coach Stands, &c. in London, promising the Coachman two Guineas on his giving Notice where he set down his Fare, which had its desired Effect; and it appeared that Usher had paid the Coachman extraordinary to carry him along the New-Road, round by Islington, &c. but that he had set him down at the Black Bull in Whitechapel. This Intelligence was pursued by the Justice in Person, with proper Officers, and a Clerk of Mr. James's; and by the Behaviour of Mr. Palmer, (the Landlord of the Black Bull) and the Assistance he gave on the Occasion, he was soon discovered, and was pursued and apprehended at two o'Clock the next Morning, in Hertfordshire, most of the Portugal Money being first found on searching the Lodgings of his Wife in Whitechapel; and on a more particular Search on Friday last, near 100 l. more was found concealed in the said Lodgings, and one of the above Watches; which Usher, on his Examination, confessed to be Part of the Money and the Watch he had taken out of his Master's House: A Letter was also found wrote to his Wife on his Arrival in Town, wherein he desires her to meet him at Fairfax's on Epping Forest, and to invite her Brother and Sister to come along with her, having got joyful News to them, no less (says he) than 1000 l. in the Lottery, which I have got about me.

The above William Dawson was discovered by Means of the Hackney Coachman, who shewed to Mr. James's Brother, and other Persons, on Wednesday, the House where he set Dawson down in Whitechapel; in which House they found upwards of 1700 l. which he had left there, and where also they discovered his Retreat at Sabridgeworth in Hertfordshire.

BOSTON, September 15.

We hear that the Heirs of Thomas Greene, Esq; in Compliance with a Design he had often mentioned in his Time of Health, and repeated on his Death Bed, have generously offered the Sum of 500 l. Sterling to Trinity Church in this Town, to be a Fund (together with such Addition as could be obtained) for the perpetual Maintenance of an Assistant Minister to the Episcopal Churches in and about Boston, especially to Trinity Church (to which the Deceased and his Heirs more particularly belong) when they may be by any Means vacant: And accordingly said Church have already made a considerable Subscription, and expect in a short Time to compleat an equal Sum to that Donation, the Interest of the whole to be applied to the said Use. So that by the worthy Design of the said Deceased, with the Concurrence of the generous Heirs and Subscribers, the Episcopal Churches in these Parts will soon have a Supply in Time of Need, that has hitherto been greatly wanted.

By a Vessel from Halifax we are informed, That a considerable Number of Indians had assembled together in Nova-Scotia, but with what Design we have not yet learned.

We hear, that about a Month ago, a Sloop bound from Halifax to Annapolis Royal with Stores, was cast away on a Ledge in Meeche's Bay, the Sloop and Cargo entirely lost, and two Passengers drowned.

NEW-YORK, September 26.

We hear that one of our Vessels on Lake Erie, was lately cast away on her Voyage from Niagara to Detroit, loaded with Provisions.

We are credibly informed, that the Merchants of this City expect, in a few Weeks, from Ireland, about 6000 Firkins of the best Irish Butter; on the Arrival of which 'tis not impossible the Country People, who used to supply our Markets, may be obliged to purchase large Quantities of Salt.

PHILADELPHIA, September 29.

Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, Sept. 20, 1763.

"Of late we have had no Disturbance on this Frontier from our savage Neighbours; which is, by no Means, I apprehend, to be accounted for from any Change in their Dispositions, but from their Time being taken up in removing their Families, and putting themselves into a better Situation to accomplish their bloody Designs. I was last Week through the upper end of this County, where the People are, at present, following their Labour as usual, and will, unless prevented by fresh Troubles, have in a large Fall Crop. A considerable Number of the Inhabitants of both Counties were then gone home, and designed to put in some Grain, for the future Support of their Families. Many of the Inhabitants had likewise returned to the Canalloways, but on fresh Alarms from the Virginia Frontier, were, as I was informed, come back to Fort Frederick. Through all the late Scene of Troubles, one Man, and his Wife, kept their Place in the Little Cove, though entirely by themselves.

which, I sent to a Gentleman of Note near Patowmack, who was gone from Home; but his Wife informed the Messenger, that her Husband had received Letters from Virginia, advising, that some Time of the Week before last, a large Party of Indians came down on the Frontier of Augusta County, designing, as was supposed, to strike a small Town there; but being discovered by some Men, who were out hunting Horses, the Inhabitants were alarmed of their Approach, and turned out, in a large Body, to meet them, which they accordingly did, and an obstinate Engagement ensued; wherein, though the White People lost a considerable Number, yet they kept the Field, and brought off with them 15 Indian Scalps, and a considerable Quantity of Plunder.

"The Messenger was also informed, that a Party of the Virginia Rangers having, the same Week, come on some Tracks of Indians going out from the Inhabitants, followed them till Evening; when, sending some of their Party to the Top of a Hill, they discovered the Indian Fire, and made towards it: And that as they went along, they heard the Enemy fire 15 Guns, which they supposed was the Party emptying their Pieces, as the Day had been wet, in order to clean them; upon which they halted up, and immediately fired on the Savages, as they sat round the Fire, and killed three of them; the rest fled, leaving behind 13 Guns, and a Number of Moccasins.

"I was also informed, that on Thursday Night, the 8th Instant, a large Party of Indians were discovered dancing round their Fire on Patterson's Creek, which empties into the South Branch of Patowmack; but that the Persons who saw them, being but three or four, did not discover themselves, but went and alarmed the Neighbourhood.

"It is certain that they have had on that Frontier frequent Alarms, and several Skirmishes with the Indians, in which the white People always beat the Enemy. And it is worth remarking, that since this War broke out, there has not been one Engagement in which the Indians got the better of our People, on any Part of the Frontier, that I can recollect.

"On Tuesday, the 13th Instant, a small Party of Indians were chased, in the Little Cove, by a Party of the Maryland Scouts. The Inhabitants of Path Valley, and a Number of Shearman's, will, I expect, have in Crops sufficient for next Year's Support, if no new Troubles come upon us, and a Guard be continued; but ranging Parties, and a Reward for Scalps, are the Means which, under GOD, would most likely answer the End."

LONDON, July 2.

SATURDAY last one Anne Alderton, a
Girl about Sixteen Years of Age, Ser-
vant to Mr. Day, in Littleport Fen, was
committed by Henry Morley, Esq; to Ely
Goal, on Suspicion of robbing her Master's
House, and afterwards setting it on Fire,
which was burnt to the Ground. We hear
that Mr. Day and his Wife, being obliged
to go out on some Business, left the Servant
to take Care of the House; but previous to
this, Mrs. Day had wrapped up what Cash
there was in the House, put it into a Sack,
and secreted it among some others, in the
Presence of the Girl, lest any Body should
rob the House in their Absence. Soon after,
the Girl took the Money, and hid it in a
Hole in the Ground, and then set fire to the
House, in order to burn the Sacks, and pre-
vent a Discovery. The Money was after-
wards found by the Direction of the Girl.

July 8. On Wednesday Morning a Fellow
attacked, near the Monument on Land-
down, two Persons, whom he robbed of
some small Sums; and afterwards coming to
the Turnpike on this Side of the Down, he
found there a Man paying for passing through;
on which he ordered the Turnpikeman to go
into his House and shut the Door, and said,
I'll recover the Gentleman's Money; and accord-
ingly robbed the Person of a considerable
Sum. He then came on to a little Alehouse
on the Cross Road, where he put up his Horse,
and staid Half an Hour; and having drank
himself, and fed his Horse, he told the Land-
lord he should set off for Terbury. Upon
the Road, near Petty France, he robbed a

Gentleman's Servant of Eight Guineas; and soon after meeting with a Man returning from Terbury Market, he demanded his Money. The Man, who had a little Boy before him, told the Villain that he had no Money. He then demanded his Watch, and endeavoured to pull it out of his Pocket by the String, which in the Struggle broke; and the Man refusing to give it to him, he said, *Do you contest with me?* and immediately putting his Pistol over the Boy's Shoulder, fired it, and lodged three Slugs in the poor Man's Breast, of which he died soon after. The Villain was immediately pursued by some People, but got clear off.

WILLIAMSBURG, Sept. 23.

To morrow his Honour our Governor sets out by Water for Charlestown in South-Carolina, to be present at the Congress appointed to be held the 15th of next Month, at Augusta, in that Province, between the Governors of the Southern Colonies and the Headmen of the several Tribes of Indians in those Parts.

Sept. 30. The present Disorder among the Horned Cattle, of which Numbers have died, appears, from some Observations, to be a malignant Fever; and the following, when timely applied, has been found an Antidote against the Distemper: Bleed plentifully, and put a Rowel in the Dewlap, which keep open a Fortnight, or three Weeks; give an Ounce of Saltpetre every Day, for 10 or 12 Days; if they dung too hard, give half a Pint of Molasses, which may be repeated occasionally; and it is necessary to keep them from ranging about as much as possible.

ANNAPOLIS, October 13.

We have a Report from the Northward, which we fear is True, that several Detachments of the King's Troops, with a Convoy of Provisions, Ammunition, &c. marching to the Relief of Fort Detroit, have fell in with a large Body of Indians, among whom it is said were many of the Senecas, who, having drawn them into an Ambuscade, fell upon our advanced Party, after placing near 300 of their Number between them and the second Division: That upon their first Fire they killed the chief Officer in Command, and in a small Time his two Seconds, upon which our Troops fell into Disorder, and the Indians rushing in, cut the most of them to Pieces: That the second Division, on hearing the Firing, advanced to their Relief, and fell into the Ambush laid for them, who treated them in the same Manner; after which the united Body of the Indians attacked and took the Convoy, after a Total Defeat of the Troops who remained with the Waggon, and carried off every Thing except two Waggon and some Arms: That about 28 Men had fled from the Action, and got into the Fort at Niagara, and that on their Arrival there, the Commanding-Officer marched out with a Party of the Garrison to the Place of the Action, and after burying the Dead, brought off the two remaining Waggon, with some few other Things they had left.

The following ACT, passed the last Session of Parliament, is published here for the Information of the Public.

Anno Regni tertio GEORGE III. REGIS.

An Act for the further Improvement of his Majesty's Revenue of Customs; and for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures; and for the Prevention of the clandestine Running of Goods into any Part of his Majesty's Dominions.

reamble, reciting Clause in Act 24 George I.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, *An Act for the Improvement of his Majesty's Revenues of Customs, Excise, and Inland Duties*, the Commissioners of those Revenues are respectively empowered and directed to cause all Tea, Coffee, Foreign Brandy, Rum, or other Foreign exciseable Liquors, which shall be seized by any Officers of the Customs or Excise, after Condemnation, to be publicly sold to the best Bidder, at such Places as the said Commissioners shall think proper; and to allow the Officers making such Seizures, for their Encouragement, One Third Part of the full Sum arising from the Public Sale of all such Tea, Coffee, Foreign Brandy, Rum, or other exciseable Liquors, free from all Charges of Condemnation and Sale; and to cause the remaining Part of the Produce of such Sales, after paying the Reward to the Officer, and the Charges of Condemnation and Sale for such Seizures, to be paid into the Receipt of his Majesty's Exchequer, in Lieu of his Majesty's Moiety, as was then practised: And whereas by several subsequent Acts of Parliament, One Moiety of all Fines, Penalties and Forfeitures, imposed by any Act relating to the Duties of Excise, or any other Duty under the Management of the Commissioners of that Revenue, is given to his Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, and the other Moiety to him or them who shall discover, inform, or sue for the same; in Pursuance of which Laws the Officers of Excise seizing any of the Commodities herein before enumerated, have been allowed a Moiety thereof; but the Provisions in those subsequent Laws, not extending to such Seizures when made by Officers of the Customs, they have hitherto been allowed only One Third of the Produce thereof, pursuant to the Directions of the before-cited Act of the Twelfth of George the First: And whereas the Power given by the said recited Act to the respective Commissioners of the Customs and Excise, to cause the Goods therein enumerated to be publicly sold, has been found very advantageous to the Revenue; and if the like Power was extended in general to all Sorts of Goods, it would prevent many Frauds, and illicit Combinations practised by Bidders, in the Court of Exchequer, to the great Detriment of the Public Revenue and the fair Trader: And whereas, it is highly reasonable and just, as well as of public Utility, that the Officers of the Customs and Excise should have equal Encouragement to be vigilant in the Exertion of their Duty, to suppress the pernicious Practice of Smuggling; to which End, May it therefore please your Majesty, that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three, it shall and may be lawful to and for the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, to cause all Ships, Vessels, and Boats, and all Goods of what Kind soever they may be (excepting only such Vessels, Boats, and Goods, as are by Law liable to be burnt) which shall be seized by any Officers of the Customs, for unlawful Importation, or for Non-payment of Duties, or for any other Cause of Forfeiture, and condemned according to Law, to be sold publicly to the best Bidder, at such Places as the said Commissioners shall think proper; and all and every Officer who shall seize such Goods, shall, for his and their Encouragement be allowed by the said Commissioners, One Moiety of the nett Produce arising by the Sale of such Seizure, after deducting the Charges of Condemnation and Sale from the Whole; and the said Commissioners shall cause the other Moiety thereof to be paid into the Receipt of his Majesty's Exchequer, in Lieu of his Majesty's Share thereof (excepting in those Cases which are otherwise provided for by this Act) any Law, Custom, or Usage, to the contrary notwithstanding.

els or Goods seized by the Officers of the Customs to be publicly sold after condemnation, the best Bidder at such Places as the Commissioners of the Customs shall think proper.

Moiety of Produce to be paid into the Exchequer; and the other Moiety to be paid to the Officer who shall make the Seizure.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared and enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That after deducting the Charges of Condemnation and Sale from the gross Produce of all wrought Silks, Bengals, and Stuffs, mixed with Silk or Herbs of the Manufacture of Persia, China, or East-India, and all Callicoes, painted, dyed, printed, or stained there, which shall be seized and condemned in pursuance of an Act passed in the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of the Reign of the late King William the Third, (intituled, *An Act for the more effectual employing the Poor, by encouraging the Manufactures of this Kingdom*) the said Commissioners of the Customs shall allow to the Officer or Officers who shall seize the same, Two Third Parts of such nett Produce, and cause the remaining Third Part thereof to be paid into the Receipt of his Majesty's Exchequer; and that for all Wool, and any other of the Species of Goods enumerated in an Act passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second (intituled, *An Act for taking off the Duties upon Woollen and Bay Yarn imported from Ireland to England, and for the more effectual preventing the Exportation of Wool from Great-Britain, and of Wool, and Wool manufactured, from Ireland to Foreign Parts*, after deducting the Charges of Condemnation and Sale, the Remainder of the Produce shall be paid to the Officer who shall seize the same, in such Manner as by the said Act is directed; and that for all Tobacco, Tobacco Stalks, and Snuff, which shall be burnt or destroyed in pursuance of an Act passed in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second (intituled, *An Act for the more effectual securing the Duties upon Tobacco*) the Officer or Officers seizing the same, shall be paid, in the Manner directed by that Act, Three Pence for every Pound Weight of such Tobacco and Snuff, and One Penny for every Pound Weight of Tobacco Stalks; and that for such Tea as shall be burnt or otherwise destroyed by Order of the respective Commissioners of the Customs or Excise, pursuant to the Laws now in being, the Officers making the Seizure, shall be rewarded in such Manner as the said Commissioners shall think proper, such Reward not exceeding Two Shillings and Six Pence for each Pound Weight of such Tea, in Lieu of all other Allowances; any Thing in this or any other Act to the contrary notwithstanding.

Provided also, and it is hereby further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if the Produce of any particular Seizure, sold in pursuance of this Act, shall not be sufficient to answer the Expences of Condemnation and Sale; or if upon the Trial of any Seizure, a Verdict shall be given for the Claimant, and the Ship or Goods shall not be condemned; in either of those Cases, it shall and may be lawful for the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, to order the Charges attending the seizing and prosecuting such Ship or Goods, to be paid out of any Branch of the Revenue of the Customs which is by Law applicable to the Payment of Incidents; any Thing in this or any other Act of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, it may be necessary to employ several of the Ships and Vessels of War belonging to his Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, on the Coasts of Great-Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great-Britain; therefore for the better Encouragement of all the Officers and Seamen employed in such Service to do their Duty therein; be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That it shall and may be lawful to and for his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, to direct and appoint the Moiety herein before mentioned, or any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by such Officers or Seamen respectively, so employed as aforesaid, to be divided amongst all such Officers and Seamen of such Ship or Vessel of War, who shall make any such Seizure as aforesaid, in such Proportions, and in such Manner, as his Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be made or issued, from Time to Time, for that Purpose; and such Moiety, or other Part of the said Seizure or Seizures, shall be so paid and divided to and amongst all the Officers and Seamen of such Ship or Vessel of War accordingly.

Officers to be allowed after all Charges deducted, a Third Part of the Produce of the Produce upon wrought Silks, Bengals, Stuffs mixed with Silk or Herbs, of Persia or East-Indian Manufacture, and Callicoes, seized and condemned in Pursuance of Act 11, 12, Will. III. the other Third to be paid into the Exchequer;

and upon Wool, and other Goods enumerated Act 12 Geo. the Produce after Charges;

and upon Tobacco and Snuff burnt, &c. pursuant to Act 24 Geo. II. 3 d. lb.

and for Tobacco Stalks, 1 d. per lb.

and for Tea

not exceeding 2 s. 6 d. per lb.

Where the Produce of any Seizure shall not answer the Expences of Condemnation and Sale, or a Verdict be given for the Claimant, the Charges to be paid out of any Branch of the Revenue applicable to Incidents.

The King to direct, by Order of Council, or Proclamation, how the Share of such Seizures as shall be made by Vessels in his Service, shall be divided amongst the Officers and Men.

ON Friday last the Albany Post came to Town, in Manner of an Express, bringing the Mail, and riding extraordinary on the following doleful Occasion, viz.

Copy of a Letter from a Gentleman at Niagara, dated Sept. 16. S. I. R.

I HAVE just Time to tell you we arrived safe at Niagara 13th Inst. delay'd much on Lake Ontario, by hard Gales and Storms of Rain. Next Day had an Express from Little Niagara (a Post above the Falls) that our Convoy, with the Teams employed in carrying Provisions to Lake Erie, was attacked; we sent off from our Fort a Reinforcement of a Major, and about 70 Men, which was followed by a Capt. and 50 more, an Hour after, to support them: The Whole of the Indians, by the best Accounts, amount to about 300, divided into two Bodies, one of which (i. e.) the most considerable was that which attacked the Convoy, the other lay in Ambush about 2 or 3 Miles higher our Post, near the Carrying-Place, and possessed themselves of a most advantageous Piece of rising Ground near the Road, to intercept our Succours; on the first hearing of the Firing by the Convoy, Capt. Johnston, and three Subalterns, marched with about 30 Men, mostly of Gage's Light Infantry, who were in a little Camp adjacent; they had scarce Time to form when the Indians appeared at the above Pass; our People fired briskly on them, but was instantly surrounded, and the Capt. who commanded mortally wounded the first Fire; the 3 Subalterns also were soon after killed, on which a general Confusion ensued: The Indians rushed in on all Sides, and cut about 60 or 70 Men in Pieces, including the Convoy: Ten of our Men are all we can yet learn have made their Escape; they came here through the Woods Yesterday. From many Circumstances, it is believed the Senecas have a chief Hand in this Affair.

I wish our Affairs at Detroit may not suffer by this, as all the Oxen and Teams on the Carrying-place are destroyed, and the Horses missing, which 'tis believed are drove off by the Indians: Our Reinforcement came up too late to save them or the People, so returned that Night, and next Day marched and buried all they could; most of those who came in are wounded. We shall be in an ugly Situation, having a weak sickly Garrison, if Detroit should fall (which God forbid) to stand the Fury of those rascally Indians; but dare say our wife General will provide against the worst, and will in Time send such a Force as will be able to chastise those Savages so effectually, that they will dread the Name of an Englishman to latest Posterity.

Our People too, had a Bruh at the Wreck in Lake Erie, with a small Body of the Indians, and beat them off, but lost four or five Men; they promised when Reinforcements should join them they would pay us another Visit there; but we have little to fear from that Quarter, as we have 170 Men there, strongly entrenched, to guard the Provisions saved from the Wreck.

Extract of another Letter from Niagara, dated Sept. 17, 1763.

Wednesday the 14th Inst. a large Body of Indians, some say 300, others 4 or 500, came down upon the Carrying-Place, attacked the Waggon Escort, which consisted of a Sergeant and 24 Men; this small Body immediately became a Sacrifice, only two Waggons escaped. Two Companies of Light Infantry (the General's and La Hont's) that were encamped at the Lower Landing, hearing the Fire, instantly rushed out to their Relief, headed by Lieuts. George Campbell, and Frazier, Lieutenant Rocco, of the Artillery, and Lieutenant Deaton, of the Provincials; this Party had not marched above a Mile and Half when they were attacked, surrounded, and almost every Man cut to Pieces; the Officers were all killed, it is reported, on the Enemy's first Fire; the Savages rushed down upon them in three Columns.

The Officers being killed, the Men fell into Confusion: Of both our Parties only 24 are come in, Waggons included, eight of whom are wounded. Lieuts. Campbell, Frazier, Rocco and Deaton, killed, and about 75 Rank and File killed: Capt. Johnston, of the Jersey Blues, who was coming down on some Business with the Waggon Escort, killed. The Savages killed 16 Oxen on the Spot, and destroyed most of the Carriages: The Horses, in Number 20, they have carried off, loaded with their Plunder. As soon as the Alarm reached this Post, Major Wilkings marched out with the main Part of this Garrison to the Lower Landing, but Night coming on, were obliged to return back; the next Day he marched out again to the Place of Action, buried the Dead, which were every one scalped, and stripped naked, brought off 4 or 5 Waggons, and 3 Firelocks, the Enemy having carried off all the rest of the Arms, Cartouch Boxes, &c. The Bodies were so mangled, they could not discover either Rocco or Deaton; we don't imagine here they carried off any Prisoners. The Consequence of this Blow is better imagined than described; 'tis what we have long been apprehensive of: This, together with the Loss of the Sloop on Lake Erie, will render it very difficult to support Detroit this Winter, unless a large Reinforcement is soon sent up.

October 30. By the Success, Capt. Painé, in 7 Weeks from Teneriffe, we hear that a Misunderstanding has for some Time been growing between the Court of Great Britain and the Emperor of Morocco, who had refused or slighted the Presents sent him from England, where also his Ambassador was treated with Coldness; the English Consul, Joseph Popham, Esq; was recalled, and actually arrived at Gibraltar, and by a Vessel just arrived from Cadiz, Advice was brought that the Emperor Sade Mohamed had declared War against England, and 9 Gallies from Sally, Tetuan and Tangier, were already out cruising against us. England is now at War only with Savages and Barbarians, we hope they will be overcome by Humanity, and taught to practise it.

Detroit, Sept. 9, 1763.

Since my last to you we have had several Skirmishes with small Parties of the Enemy, in taking Possession of three Houses about 500 Yards up the River, which prevents the Indians coming so near the Fort to discover our Motions. The 4th Inst. about Half after 3 o'Clock in the Evening, 3 or 400 Indians, in Canoes, went off to attack our Schooner, that was coming up the River from Niagara, with Provisions. They met her becalmed about 9 Miles from the Fort, with only 12 Hands on board, who defended themselves bravely, that the Indians, after attacking with great Resolution on all Sides, were obliged to retire with the Loss of many killed and wounded, 7 of which are since dead of their Wounds. The Indians attempted to enter the Schooner by the Cabin Windows, but were obliged to fall astern, and

several were killed by endeavouring to board by the Boltshot. The Number of Indians killed on the Spot is uncertain; some say 10; but they have been very busy for several Days past fishing and searching for dead Bodies. Mr. Horly, Master of the Schooner, and one Man, was killed, three wounded, and another burnt by the bursting of a Cannon Cartridge.

The Indians were so roughly handled, that they have declared they never will attempt to attack the English by Water any more; and they having heard the Captain of the Schooner say to his Men, in the Action, *Stand by, my brave Fellows, to the last, and then blow up the Vessel*; which was answered by the Crew with three CHEERS, the Indians imagined they would neither give nor take Quarters, left the Schooner in the greatest Confusion, and two Canoes were overset by our Shot. By the Blood on the Spears and Lances on board the Schooner, and the Spirits of the Indians being much flagged since, they must certainly have met with a considerable Loss; but as we are surrounded with a Parcel of Rascals who never bring us any News to the Disadvantage of the Enemy, 'tis impossible to know what Mischief we have done them.

Immediately after the Action, which was short and smart, 4 armed Battos, with a Four-pounder in each, and two Officers, and 24 Men, were ordered on board the Schooner, who brought her safe here the 6th Instant.

The Indians confess they had 10 killed at the Attack with Capt. Dalgell. Five Indians, belonging to the Six Nations, came up in the Schooner, and went on Shore in the Morning, when the Vessel was attacked in the Evening; it is therefore not impossible but that they either intended to betray the Vessel, or else were compelled by the Ottawas to discover our Strength on board the Schooner, on which they attacked her, as it was afterwards told us.

PHILADELPHIA, October 13.

On Sunday Night last an Express arrived from Northampton County, with the following melancholy Account, viz. "That on the Morning before the House of John Stinton, about eight Miles from Bethlehem, was attacked by the Indians as follows. Captain Wetherholt, with a Party, belonging to Fort Allen, being at that House, and intending early for the Fort, ordered a Servant out to get his Horse ready, who was immediately shot down by the Enemy; upon which the Captain going to the Door, was also fired at, and mortally Wounded: That then a Sergeant attempted to pull in the Captain, and to shut the Door, but he was likewise dangerously wounded: That the Lieutenant next advanced, when an Indian jumped upon the Bodies of the two others, and presented a Pistol to his Breast, which he put a little aside, and it went off over his Shoulder, whereby he got the Indian out of the House, and shut the Door: That the Indians after this went round to a Window, and as Stinton was getting out of Bed, shot him, but not dead, and he breaking out of the House, ran about a Mile, where he dropt and died: That his Wife, and 2 Children, ran down into the Cellar, where they were shot at three Times, but escaped: That Captain Wetherholt, finding himself growing very weak, crawled to a Window, and shot an Indian dead, it was thought, as he was setting Fire to the House with a Match: And that upon this the other Indians carried him away with them, and went off. Captain Wetherholt died soon after.

Extract of a Letter from Bethlehem, October 9.

Early this Morning came Nicholas Marks, of Whitehall Township, and brought the following Account, viz. That Yesterday, just after Dinner, as he opened his Door, he saw an Indian standing about two Poles from the House, who endeavoured to shoot at him; but Marks shutting the Door immediately, the Fellow slipped into a Cellar, close by the House. After this said Marks went out of the House, with his Wife, and an Apprentice Boy, in order to make their Escape, and saw another Indian standing behind a Tree, who also tried to shoot at them, but his Gun missed Fire. They then saw a third Indian running through the Orchard; upon which they made the best of their Way, about two Miles off, to one Adam Tashler's, where about 20 Men in Arms were assembled, who went first to the House of Jacob Mekly, where they found a Boy and Girl lying dead, and the Girl scalped. From thence they went to Hance Snieder's, and said Marks's Plantations, and found both the Houses on Fire, and a Horse tied to the Bushes. They also found said Snieder, his Wife, and three Children, dead in the Field, the Man and Woman Scalped, but not the Children. On going further, they found three Girls, one dead, the other two wounded, one of which scalped. After this they returned, with the 2 wounded Girls, to Adam Tashler's, and saw a Woman, Jacob Al-mong's Wife, with a Child, lying dead in the Road, and scalped. The Number of the Indians, they think, was between Fifteen and Twenty.

I cannot describe the deplorable Condition this poor Country is in; most of the Inhabitants of Allen's Town, and other Places, are fled from their Habitations. Many are in Bethlehem, and other Places of the Brethren, and others farther down the Country. I cannot ascertain the Number killed, but think it exceeds Twenty. The

People at Nazareth, and the other Places belonging to the Brethren, have put themselves in the best Posture of Defence they can; they keep a strong Watch every Night, and hope, by the Blessing of God, if they are attacked to make a good Stand.

In a Letter from the same County, of the Tenth Instant, the Number killed is said to be Twenty-three, besides a great many dangerously wounded that the Inhabitants are in the utmost Distress and Confusion, flying from their Places. Some of them with hardly sufficient to cover them; and that it was to be feared there were many Houses, &c. burnt, and Lives lost, that were not then known. And by a Gentleman from the same Quarter we are informed, that it was reported, when he came away, that Yoff's Mill, about eleven Miles from Bethlehem, was destroyed, and all the People that belonged to it, excepting one young Man, cut off.

It is with Pleasure that we publish the following Extract, as it exhibits an Instance of public Spirit that reflects Honour on our Country, and will, it is hoped, have no small Influence in animating Numbers on our Frontiers to imitate so laudable an Example.

Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, October 3.

As I am just returned from Aughwick, where went to attend the Rendezvous, and see our Army, under Colonel Armstrong, begin the March for the Great Island, I am thereby enabled to inform you, That on Friday, the 30th ult. about Ten o'Clock, the Colonel, and the Men under his Direction, designed against said Island, the Number of above 300, began their March, high Spirits, from Fort Shirley, on Aughwick, and expected to reach, on the Monday Night following, so near the Place, as to make the Attack the next Morning. Amongst those gone out on the Occasion, are the following Volunteer Companies, viz. Captain Laughlin, of Big Spring, and 3 Men, all raised in Twenty-four Hours. Captain Patterson, jun. and Captain Bedford, with Thirty Men each (these two Companies chiefly from about and below Carlisle) Captain Crawford, from the upper Part of the County, with Nineteen Men, and Captain Sharp, from above Shippensburg, with Fourteen Men; besides several others that joined under commissioned Captains, as being better acquainted with them. And it may, with great Justice, be said, that the Flower of Cumberland County are gone out on this Expedition. In the next I hope to give you some Account of the event of this Undertaking; and, whatever it may be, yet it must be confessed the Design is good, and may be attended with Consequences of great Advantage. I am extremely sorry we can, even yet, have no Premium for the Scalps of the murdering Rascals. The Inhabitants in general shew a noble Spirit, and are daily providing themselves with Arms for their Defence.

Extract of another Letter from Carlisle, October 9. I greatly fear the Communication between Pitt and Ligonier is cut off again, as the Indians have been seen about Ligonier, and have killed one Man, and done some other Damage. It is now upwards of five Weeks since any Account from thence.

ANNAPOLIS, October 20.

We have a melancholy Account brought Town, that a short Time since, Thirty-six, of a Party of Sixty brave Fellows, who went on the Frontier of Virginia, against the Indians were Killed, but we have not the Particulars.

On Saturday next, at Two o'Clock Afternoon Will be Sold, at the House of Capt. Reith, the Dock in this City, pursuant to a Decree of the Court of Vice-Admiralty of this Province.



THE Schooner *Ross*, now lying in the Dock with all her Tackle and Furniture: Also, some tight empty Casks, 31 Barrels of Flour, Barrels of Herrings, 9 Barrels of Tar, 6 Barrels of Apples, 16 Casks of Nails, a Parcel choice Floghead Staves, about 2 or 3000 Feet Inch Plank, and Three Horses.

AND whereas the Laws already made to prevent the clandestine importing and landing of Foreign Brandy, Rum, Strong Waters, or other Spirits, Tea, Tobacco, Tobacco Stalks, and Snuff, in small Vessels, which hover upon the Coasts of this Kingdom, have been found insufficient for that Purpose; be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That from and after the first Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three, if any Foreign Brandy, Arrack, Rum, Strong Waters, or Spirits of any Kind whatsoever, shall be imported or brought into Great-Britain, or into any Port, Harbour, Haven, or Creek, thereof, in any Ship, Vessel or Boat, of the Burthen of 50 Tons, or under (except only for the Use of the Seamen then belonging to and on Board such Ship, Vessel or Boat, not exceeding Two Gallons for every such Seaman) every such Ship, Vessel or Boat, with all her Tackle, Furniture and Apparel, and also all such Brandy, Arrack, Rum, Strong Waters, or Spirits or the Value thereof, shall be forfeited and lost; and where any Brandy, Arrack, Rum, Strong Waters, or other Spirits, or any Tea, Tobacco, Tobacco Stalks or Stems stript from the Leaf, or Snuff, is or are liable to Forfeiture, by virtue of an Act made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, *An Act for indemnifying Persons who have been guilty of Offences against the Laws made for securing the Revenue of Customs and Excise, and for enforcing those Laws for the future*; and by another Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of his said late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, *An Act for the more effectual securing the Duties upon Tobacco*; or either of them, for being found on Board any such Ship or Vessel at Anchor, or hovering within the Limits of any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or within Two Leagues of the Shore, as is particularly expressed in those Acts: It is hereby further enacted, that in every such Case the Ship or Vessel on Board of which such Goods shall be so found, with all her Tackle, Furniture, and Apparel, shall also be forfeited and lost, provided such Ship or Vessel doth not exceed the Burthen of Fifty Tons.

And it is hereby further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That every Ship or Vessel forfeited by this Act, shall be seized and prosecuted, and after Condemnation be burnt, destroyed, or used in his Majesty's Service by the Officers of the Customs or Excise, and the Tackle, Furniture, and Apparel, disposed of and divided, and the Tonnage, ascertained in the same Manner as is directed by the Laws now in Force, with respect to Vessels of Forty Tons or under forfeited for importing Foreign Brandy or other Spirits.

And it is also further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Writ of Delivery shall be granted out of the Court of Exchequer, for any Ship, Vessel or Boat, that is liable to be burnt, destroyed, or used in his Majesty's Service by virtue of this Act, or any other Act relating to the Customs or Excise, unless the Officer seizing the same shall delay proceeding to the Trial and Condemnation thereof for the Space of Three Terms; and in that Case, not without good Security being given in Double the appraised Value of such Ship, Vessel or Boat, to return the same upon Condemnation, in order to be burnt, destroyed, or used in his Majesty's Service according to Law.

And whereas by an Act passed in the Eighth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, for granting to her Majesty new Duties of Excise, and upon several imported Commodities, and by another Act passed in the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, for further regulating the Plantation Trade, and several other Purposes; it is amongst other Things enacted, That every Person, upon Entry of any Claim in the Court where any prohibited or uncustomed Goods, or any Ship, Vessel or Boat, shall be prosecuted, shall be obliged to give Security, in the Penalty of Thirty Pounds, to answer and pay the Costs occasioned by such Claim; and in Default of giving such Security within the Time limited by the Course of that Court for entering such Claim, such Goods, Ships, Vessels, or Boats shall be recovered: And whereas many Persons have, from the Smallness of the Penalty, been induced to enter groundless Claims in fictitious Names, with a View to put the Officers of the Revenue to vexa-

tious Trouble and Delay, as well as to deter them from prosecuting Seizures legally made, by putting them to an extraordinary Expence, oftentimes more than the Value of the Goods seized, which tends very much to the Prejudice of the publick Revenue, and to the Discouragement of the Officers thereof in the Execution of their Duty: To remedy therefore this Inconvenience for the future, be it enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That from and after the First Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three, every Person, upon Entry of any Claim in the Court where any Goods, Ships, Vessels, or Boats, shall be prosecuted, shall be obliged to give Security, in the Penalty of Sixty Pounds, to answer and pay the Costs occasioned by such Claim; and in Default of giving such Security within the Time limited by the Course of that Court for entering Claims, such Goods, Ships, Vessels, or Boats, shall be adjudged to be forfeited, and shall be condemned; any Thing in the before recited Acts, or any other Act of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas, by certain Clauses in an Act made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, *An Act against clandestine Running of uncustomed Goods, and for the more effectual preventing of Frauds relating to the Customs*; (which Clauses have been continued by several subsequent Acts) it was declared and enacted, That where any Ship or Vessel of the Burthen of Fifty Tons, or under, laden with customable or prohibited Goods, should be found hovering on the Coasts of this Kingdom within the Limits of any Port, and not proceeding on her Voyage for foreign Parts, or to some other Port of this Kingdom, Wind and Weather permitting, it should and might be lawful to and for any Officer or Officers of his Majesty's Customs, to go on board every such Ship or Vessel, and to take an Account of the Lading, and to demand and take Security from the Master, or other Person having or taking the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel in that Voyage, by his own Bond by him to be entered into unto his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, in such Sum or Sums of Money, as should be Treble the Value of such Foreign Goods then on Board, with Condition that such Ship or Vessel, as soon as Wind and Weather, and the State and Condition of such Ship or Vessel permitted, should and would proceed regularly on such Voyage, and should land such Foreign Goods in and at some Foreign Port or Ports; and if such Master, or other Person having or taking the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, should, upon such Demand, refuse to enter into such Bond, or, having entered into such Bond, should not depart or proceed regularly on such Voyage as soon as Wind and Weather and the State and Condition of such Ship or Vessel should permit, unless otherwise suffered to make a longer Stay by the Collector, or other principal Officer in his Absence, of such Port where such Ship or Vessel should be, not exceeding Twenty Days, then, and in either of the said Cases, all the Foreign Goods so on board such Ship or Vessel, should and might, by any Officer or Officers of the Customs, by Direction of the Collector, or other principal Officer as aforesaid, be taken out of and from such Ship or Vessel, and forthwith brought on shore and secured; and in case the said Goods were customable, the Customs and other Duties should be paid for the same: And as concerning Wool, or any prohibited Goods, or other Goods liable to Forfeiture, which might be found on board such Ships or Vessels at the Time of their unlading as aforesaid, the same were thereby declared to be subject to Forfeiture, and the Officers of the Customs should and might prosecute the same, as also the Ship or Vessel, in case she should be liable to Condemnation, as in the Manner therein after mentioned; and that after such Goods were so taken out of such Ship or Vessel, and brought on shore and secured by such Officer or Officers, such Bonds so to be given as aforesaid, should be void and delivered up, without any Fee or Reward for taking or delivering up the same; and such Bond, not being otherwise discharged, should, on a proper Certificate, returned under the Common Seal of the chief Magistrate in any Place or Places beyond the Seas, or under the Hands and Seals of Two known British Merchants upon the Place, that such Goods were there landed, or upon Proof by credible Persons, that such Goods were taken by Enemies, or perished in the Seas (the Examination and Proof thereof

Claimant, upon entering his Claim to give Security in 60*l*. to pay Costs;

and in Default thereof, the Goods and Vessels to be condemned.

Clauses in Act 5 Geo. I.

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thereof being left to the Judgment of the Commissioners of the Customs) should be vacated and discharged: And whereas the extending of the said Clauses to the rest of his Majesty's Dominions, may be a Means of preventing illicit Trade; be it therefore enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That from and after the First Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three, the said Clauses, and every Part of them, shall be extended to all Ships and Vessels of the Burthen of Fifty Tons, or under, which shall be found hovering on the Coasts of Ireland, or any other of his Majesty's Dominions or Territories belonging to the Crown of Great-Britain; and shall be of equal Force in every Respect, in regard to all such Ships and Vessels found hovering on any of the Coasts aforesaid, as such Clauses now are, or shall be construed to be, in regard to any Ships or Vessels hovering on the Coasts of this Kingdom; and all Offences which shall be committed against the said Clauses, or any Part of them, on the Coasts of Ireland, shall be tried, and the Penalties and Forfeitures thereby incurred shall be prosecuted for and recovered, in any

of his Majesty's Courts of Record in Dublin in the said Kingdom; and all Offences which shall be committed against the said Clauses, or any Part of them, on the Coasts of any other of his Majesty's Dominions or Territories (except this Kingdom) shall be tried, and the Penalties and Forfeitures thereby incurred shall be prosecuted for and recovered, in any Court of Admiralty, in the Dominion or Territory on the Coast whereof such Offence shall be committed (which Court of Admiralty is hereby authorized, empowered and required to proceed to, hear, and determine, the same) or in any Court of Record in such Dominion or Territory, at the Election of the Informer or Prosecutor, according to the Course and Method used and practised there in Prosecutions for Offences against penal Laws relating to the Customs or Excise; and such Penalties and Forfeitures so recovered there, shall be divided and applied in such and the same Manner as Penalties and Forfeitures recovered in Great-Britain for the like Offences are, or in pursuance of this Act may be, directed to be divided and applied.

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P A R I S, August 5.

OUR Ministry have constantly in View the Re-establishment of the Marine. There is a prodigious Number of Workmen employed in all the Dock-Yards of the Kingdom. We reckon 3000 in the single Port of Marseilles, 4000 at Brest and Toulon, and as many in proportion in the other Ports of the Kingdom. The Court of Madrid labour with the same View, being determined at all Events to render her Marine formidable, though at the same Time without any Prejudice to the last Treaty of Peace, which is observed by Spain as well as France with all the Good Faith possible.

L O N D O N, July 19.

Some letters from France say, that we shall soon see the Marine of that Kingdom upon a more respectable Footing than ever; and that for this End the King will discharge all Persons belonging to it, and dissolve it for 24 Hours, that he may give it an entire new Form, and nominate Officers purely on Account of their Merit, without regard to Birth.

July 21. Letters from Berlin still say, that a treaty of alliance, and of commerce, between that Court and the Court of Petersburg, is on the carpet; and that it was reported, that the King of Prussia had resolved to trace out a camp for 70 or 80,000 Men in Silesia, and to make a considerable augmentation in his Troops; for which end he was enlisting men even in Westphalia, and on the Lower Rhine.

Letters from Hamburg pretend to say, that his Prussian Majesty is displeased that England should put off the payment of the arrears of the subsidy she engaged to pay him during the war; and that he had lately expressed his dissatisfaction on this head.

These letters from Hamburg add as follow: "All our Accounts from Berlin announce, that the King of Prussia is going to augment his Troops, and that it is supposed there are great Projects in Agitation. Our Letters from Vienna hold the same Language; they positively assert that a resolution has been taken in Council not to disband any Part of their Forces; but that, on the contrary, Orders are given for raising four or five new Regiments."

They write from the Hague, that a Camp is to be traced in the Plain of Maestricht for 20,000 Dutch Troops; and that they are preparing the Field Equipages of the Prince Stadtholder, who will set up his Tent in this Camp.

Letters from Paris, by the way of Holland, advise, that a Camp is actually marking out in the Plain of Lancy, between Orras and Lisle, for 60,000 French Troops.

The same Advices add, that since the Conclusion of the Peace, Thirty new Ships and Frigates have been launched in France; six of which are to carry 130 Guns, and some others from 70 to 100 Guns.

Letters from Hamburg advise, that it was the general Opinion there, that the Court of Vienna would soon be involved in new Broils: That the principal Foundation, however, for this Opinion, was, that the Empress-Queen was levying Men with as much Diligence, as if she were actually at War; and, that it was reported, that Officers would soon arrive both at Hamburg and at Altena, to raise Men for the Austrian Service.

A treaty between the Kings of France, Spain and Sardinia, has lately been signed at Paris; by which the King of Sardinia relinquishes, in Favour of Don Philip, the claim he has by Art. VII. of the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle in 1748, to the Duchy of Placentia, in Consideration of an Annuity from France of 328,000 Livres (14,350 l. Sterl.) for securing the Payment of which, the Capital of that sum is to be lodged at Turin.

Brigadier Murray is appointed Governor of Canada. Col. James Grant, of East Florida. George Johnson, Esq; of West Florida. And Colonel Melville, of Grenada, and the Neutral Islands.

August 4. Lord Baltimore, Proprietary of Maryland, and Messieurs Penn, Proprietaries of Pennsylvania, have appointed Mr. Mason, and Mr. Dickson, two eminent Mathematicians, to settle the Bounds of their respective Settlements in those colonies, and put a final issue to a dispute, which has subsisted on that head ever since 1693.

August 6. The Bank of England resolved Yesterday to lend Money at 4 per Cent. on the Receipts of the last Loan to the Government.

It is certain there will be a Fleet of Observation fitted-out in a short Time, and that Admiral Tyrrel and Sir William Burnaby will set out in Ten Days at farthest.

They write from the Hague, that Copies of a remarkable Letter from the King of Prussia to the Empress-Queen are handed about there. The Monarch (say they) begins his Letter with avowing, that he accounts his Reconciliation with her Imperial Majesty as the happiest Hour of his Life. He declares that he desires nothing more ardently than to make the Peace durable; and that if contrary to all Expectations, any thing disagreeable to her Imperial Majesty should

happen, he entreats her not to listen or rely immediately on the Opinion of her Confidants, but to write to him about it directly; and that upon the Receipt of the Letter, he will give the most precise Orders for Settling every thing to the Satisfaction of her Imperial Majesty. Then the King makes the Empress-Queen observe, that during the last War there was a reciprocal Trial of Skill and Strength for all the Mischief that could possibly be done: That it is now Time it should be succeeded by an Eagerness to do each other as much good as possible: That he expected this from her Imperial Majesty, and assures her that he is now intent upon giving her the most striking Proof of his Regard for her Interest.

August 9. The following is a List of the Sea Officers appointed to command his Majesty's Squadrons in the different Parts of the World, viz. Jamaica, and the Windward Islands, Sir William Burnaby, Knt. Rear Admiral of the Red. Barbados, and the Leeward Islands, Richard Tyrrell, Esq; Rear Admiral of the White. North-America, Right Honourable Lord Colville, Rear Admiral of the White. Mediterranean, Honourable Commodore Hervey. Coast of Africa, Commodore Cleveland.

The Plantations in the Grenades already sold on the Spot amount to 9,610,000 Livres, or 280,290 l. Sterling; exclusive of what has been sold in France, which may be of nearly equal Value.

The French Governor has declared St. Lucia a Free Port.

It is reported, that one Cause of our present Armament by Sea, is on Account that the French have already begun to infringe the articles of Peace, by some Proceedings at Newfoundland.

We hear that Sir George Colebrook, Bart. Banker in Threadneedle-street, has laid out upwards of 100,000 l. in purchasing Lands in the Conquered Islands in the West-Indies.

Extract of a Letter from Frankfurt, dated July 20.

"In my last I mentioned the King of Prussia's Officers seizing the English Magazines at Minden, &c. This was not done with any great Degree of politeness. When the Officers first took Possession of the Magazines, they promised they would not touch any Article contained in them, but only secure them under seal, till his Prussian Majesty's Subjects were paid the just Demands they had on the English Government. Counsellor Rosa, who furnished some of the Troops with Necessaries, has a Claim amounting to 84,000 Ducats, which was not liquidated when Comptroller P----- was in these Parts, because the Debt was contracted before his arrival. It was chiefly at Rosa's Requisition that the Magazines were seized. Though the Officers promised only to secure the Effects, they proceeded, however, when they were in their Power, to sell them to the best bidder; in one of them they found 12,000 Ducats in Specie, but being base Coin, such as was current during the War, it was of little Value."

Extract of a Letter from the Havannah, June 26.

"The Fleet from Vera Cruz to Old Spain, passed by, without calling, the 16th Instant. It had on board about Fourteen Millions of Dollars in Gold and Silver, and four Millions of Merchandise."

We hear that Twelve Merchants, Eight of whom are Jews, at Amsterdam, have lately failed. One Dutch House is said to have failed for no less than 800,000 l.

It is said that the Bankruptcies at Amsterdam were occasioned by Gaming in the English Funds.

There are 25 eminent Merchants who have broke at Amsterdam; but we have not yet heard of any Merchants in London being greatly affected thereby.

The Accounts received To-day from Holland are more favourable in Relation to the Failures that have happened there. Some of the Houses are going on again; and the others, it is thought, will soon be supported so as to be able to do the same. No English House is now talked of. Some great Houses at Hamburg are said to be affected for the present by these Failures.

We hear that the French are actually sitting out at Brest and Toulon, Thirty Ships of the Line of Battle, and are manning them with the greatest Expedition possible.

By letters from Hanover, by Yesterday's Mail, we learn, that a Resolution has been taken to keep on foot in that Electorate 12,000 Regular Troops, and 20,000 Militia, and that 6000 Men of the Train of Artillery, who had been discharged, are to be enlisted again.

They write from Paris, that Three new 60 Gun Ships are ready to be launched at Brest, and that they continue building Men of War in all the Ports of France.

Yesterday an Express arrived from General Yorke at the Hague, and we are informed that the Dutch Armaments will occasion some Questions to be asked, to which a categorical Answer will be insisted on.

It is said some disputes have arisen about the Ballance due

to this Nation for the Maintenance of the French Prisoners. Fourteen Men of War of the Line will be speedily, per Commission, and, it is said, will be stationed as Gun Ships.

Yesterday the Commissioners of the Navy contracted a Ship to carry Stores, &c. to Halifax.

It is said Orders are sent to Portsmouth for equipping a strong Squadron with the utmost Expedition, which is thought is intended for the East-Indies, to watch the Movements of the Dutch, who are going to send a large Reinforcement to that Part of the Globe. It is said that Admiral George Pococke will soon have the Command of this Squadron.

They are very busy at the Admiralty and War Office getting ready a Number of new Commissions for signing.

It is confidently reported, that some Advices of great importance were received on Saturday Night at St. James by way of Paris, which occasioned the summoning of Cabinet Council on Sunday, which sat so long as to detain his Majesty near an Hour and Half from going to Chapel.

We are assured that there are two Houses in London who remit Monthly, for the use of our English Nobility Gentry at Paris, 80,000 l.

We hear, that the French Fishermen and Ours, on Banks of Newfoundland, are already beginning to quarrel about the Limits, in which they should follow their respective Occupations. Which we suppose is owing to the possibility of setting up Land-Marks in the Sea.

We are credibly informed that the French have new Ships of the Line building in different Ports in the Baltic from 60 to 90 Guns each, which are by Contract to be completed before next May.

There are Letters in Town which mention, that a Conspiracy against the Empress of Russia had been discovered at Petersburg. They give no Particulars, only that the conspiring Persons in it are seized.

Private Letter from the Hague, August 9.

"They write from Amsterdam, that the Bankrupt Meff. Neuville continued to make the more Noise, as Apprehensions of its being followed by some others had ved but too true, no less than Eighteen Houses having lately failed since. It is whispered here, that the great dist Factory at Amsterdam, belonging to M. d G. is on the Point of giving way, and is privately making Books; if this should happen it will occasion above more Bankruptcies, that being one of the most considerable Houses in Holland."

"Our Letters by the last Post from Brandenburg add, that the King of Prussia has resolved to assemble an Army in the Neighbourhood of Berlin, Rupin, Potsdam, and Spandau, which he will review in Person in the beginning of October."

By an Express arrived from Holland on Saturday Evening we are informed, that Thirty-one Houses in Amsterdam and Fourteen at Hamburg, have failed; and it was expected many more would follow in Stockholm and other Cities on the Continent.

We are informed that several Men of War which are stationed in the Mediterranean are ordered round to the mouth by the latter End of this Week.

We hear that 40 Ships of the Line will shortly be per Commission.

A Person lately arrived from France, and who Dunkirk when the Works were begun to be demolished reports that they removed the Stones with the greatest Caution; and that they marked and numbered them as if it were intended sooner or later to replace them.

Letters from Newfoundland, by the William and Capt. Churchill, which arrived at Pool the 3th Inst, make no mention of any Difference there with the French but on the contrary they assert, that since the Peace English were carrying on the Fishery with good Success.

On account of the late Failures in Holland, and Application of the Merchants here, the Letters by the Dutch which arrived Yesterday about One, were delivered on Night about Five o'Clock.

We are informed, that the most considerable Messrs and Bankers at Hamburg have entered into a voluntary association, whereby they engage, by subscription, to each other under any Misfortune which the late Bankcies at Amsterdam may occasion, and to share the Loss common amongst them. Large sums have been subscribed for that Purpose, and 'tis hoped this Example will be followed by the Cities of Amsterdam and Berlin. In consequence of these Measures the Bank of Hamburg (which has shut up for some Time) was opened again.

This Morning, at Half an Hour after Ten, her Majesty was solemnly delivered of a PRINCE at her Palace in St. James's Park. Her Majesty and the young Prince are both well, as can be expected.
