


UT Explores Dada in 'Out to Lunch'

Concert Features Student, Faculty Work

The dance program at FSU will highlight the talents of faculty and students, celebrate the diverse styles and expressions of dance, and bring a noted performer to Frostburg during its annual winter 2006 concert, with three evening performances at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 30, Dec. 1 and 2 in the Drama Theatre of FSU's Performing Arts Center.

Featuring guest artist Blakeley White-McGuire from the Martha Graham Dance Co., the concert will include both historic works and innovative, new choreography, including a debut work by White-McGuire, and several pieces by students and new lecturers in the FSU dance program. To honor and welcome FSU's new president, Dr. Jonathan Gibralter, and foster the continued success of dance students at FSU, the concert Saturday, Dec. 2, will be a gala benefit performance, followed by a reception in the Performing Arts Center lobby.

"Through the decades, modern dance has evolved, whereby choreographers use dance as a weapon to communicate social commentaries, comic expressions and articulate personal experiences," said Dr. Barry Fischer, associate professor of dance. "This concert is an opportunity to see Martha Graham's 1930s works and new works from the 21st century by students and professionals."

White-McGuire will present three different works during the concert: "Harmonica Breakdown," a 1936 solo work by noted choreographer Jane Dudley set to harmonica and washboard music; Martha Graham's "Satyric Festival Song," a frenetic piece from the 1930s that consists of lively steps, jumps and wiggles; and a new original work by White-McGuire herself.

The concert will also include performances by students that were choreographed by Fischer and several selections created by new lecturers in the dance department. Cathy Paine, a noted choreographer who joined FSU in fall 2006, will present a 10-person work featuring members of the FSU Dance Co. Beryl Cole, another new lecturer whose expertise includes the art of Middle Eastern dance, will present a short demonstration by members of her Belly I dance class, a new course offered at FSU that focuses on belly dancing.

Additionally, the concert will debut selected works choreographed by FSU students and dance program alumni. Jamie McGreevey, Amy Griffith and Lori Cannon, local professionals who graduated from the FSU dance program, will

perform a new work together.

The gala fund-raiser Dec. 2 will offer the public an opportunity to meet President Gibralter and support the FSU dance program. All tickets sold for the Dec. 2 performance are \$15, with partial proceeds going toward funding dance program needs and toward Fischer's organization, Dance Aid, which donates funds to selected organizations. The reception follows the concert and will be held in the PAC lobby.



Winter Weather Calls for Precautions

The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) realizes the difficulty of driving during the harsh conditions of winter weather. Here are some winter driving tips from SHA:

- · For highway conditions during winter storms, call SHA's 24-hour hotline, 1-800-327-3125. For conditions of specific roads during winter storms, call 1-800-323-6742 between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m.
- · Be sure to remove all snow and ice from your vehicle before going out on the road. Buckle up and require your passengers to do the same. When a snow emergency is declared, make every effort to avoid driving or allow extra time to get where you are going. When roadways are icy or snow-covered, you should never expect to drive as you would during clear weather or on dry road surfaces. Keep more than half a tank of fuel during winter weather
- Increase your following distance between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. Packed snow and ice can create a smooth, glass-like surface beneath your tires making it difficult to control your vehicle. If your car begins to skid, don't panic or slam on the brakes. Take your foot off the gas pedal and immediately steer in the direction of the skid.
- Never pass a snowplow or salt truck, especially a plow train. Plow trains are groups of trucks that form a line across the lanes to clear snow. Operators may not see you or your car may get caught on a snow-covered plow edge. In addition, driving will be much easier if you stay at least 25 feet or three car lengths behind the snow emergency vehicles.
- Have a survival kit in your vehicle that contains the following items: flashlight and extra batteries; matches and candles; extra dry/warm clothing; blanket; jumper cables, shovel; flares; neon distress flags; tow chair or strap; a small bag of sand or gravel; bottled water; high energy food; basic tool kit.
