Winter Commencement Ceremonies Set for Dec. 22

The 119th commencement ceremonies of FSU will be held Saturday, Dec. 22, in the Harold J. Cordts Center Main Arena on the FSU campus.

Two exercises will be held during the day. The College of Business and the College of Education will present degrees beginning at 10 a.m. and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences ceremonies will start at 2 p.m. FSU President Catherine R. Gira will confer graduate and undergraduate degrees at both events.

The featured speaker this semester will be John R. Kirby, Jr. the deputy director of the Department of Economic Development for Allegany County. Kirby has been with the department since October 1985, serving a variety of senior positions, including a five-year tenure as director. A native of Allegany County, Kirby is a second-generation alumnus of FSU (Class of '79) where he received a bachelor's degree in geography.

Student speakers at the winter commencement include Brett A. Siefers for the College of Business, Sara Peoples for the College of Education and Jessica D. Walbert for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

Siefers will graduate with a double major in economics and accounting and a minor in business administration. A resident of Cumberland, Brett received practical experience with a



Points of Pride



The project produced by the *first batch* of *FSU/U-Md*. *Mechanical-Engineering* students was positioned in the fourth place in the Student Paper Competition at this year's International Mechanical Engineering Congress and Exposition of the ASME (American Society of Mechanical Engineers). They received an honorable mention for their project at the convention. Five of the six students, *Tom McGrath, Dan Butler, Jason Latgis, Laurie Zink and Russell King*, graduated in May 2001. The sixth, *Dan Matthews*, will graduate in this month.

FSU Hagerstown Center enrollments jumped to 410 students this fall, an increase of 23 students or 6 percent over fall enrollments a year ago, and the fourth highest fall total in the Center's history.

The combined enrollments of 565 students at the Hagerstown and Frederick centers represent 11 percent of the University's total enrollments.

Leading the increases were the master's programs in Education, which grew by 45 students to a total of 149, thereby helping to offset a decline of 65 students in the combined Frederick/ Hagerstown MBA programs, which nonetheless led all programs with a Frederick/Hagerstown total of 263.

Dr. Chandra Thamire, Mechanical

Engineering, presented two papers at the 54th Annual Conference of the Division of Fluid Dynamics, American Physical Society, in November. There were "Convection and Diffusion in Microcirculation" and "Natural Convection in Spherical Annular Enclosures."

Dr. Terry Tannacito, professional writing instructor in the English Department, has an article in the current issue of Kairos, an online journal for "teachers of writing in webbed environments." On July 1, Dr. James Hagen, associate professor of history, presented a paper at the annual international, World History Association Conference at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah. The paper was titled "Biology and Monotheism: An Approach to Teaching the History of Human Separation from Nonhuman Nature." This was the first public presentation of Hagen's work on using the biological notion of "biophilia" as a working hypothesis in world history topics. Hagen also organized and chaired a separate panel at the conference on the topic of "Systems of Education in World History."

Study Down Under: Australia, New Zealand

FSU is affiliated with AustraLearn, an organization that provides unique opportunities to study at universities in Australia and New Zealand. AustraLearn arranges cheap flights, orientation on the Great Barrier Reef, pre-registration and transcript evaluation. Students may choose from a broad range of courses in beautiful and exotic surroundings. Scholarships are available from both FSU and AustraLearn.

Study in Newcastle, England

Students interested in studying at the University of Northumbria in Newcastle, England, should visit the CIE. Newcastle is one of the liveliest cities in the UK, just across the Channel from Amsterdam and three hours north of London (one hour south of Edinburgh) by train. The cost is about the same as one semester at FSU and all financial aid will transfer.

Do Your Student Teaching in Copenhagen

Education majors who would like to

earn a semester of FSU credits while studying in Denmark should check with the CIE about the exchange program with the KDAS School of Teacher Training in Copenhagen. Students complete projects and spend several weeks in Danish schools practicing teaching skills. All courses are in English. Financial aid transfers and scholarships are available.

Octoberfest or Mayfest in Germany

FSU students who would like to take part in UMUC's semester programs in Schwabisch Gmund in southern Germany are advised to apply to the CIE. The campus is part of the University of Maryland system, and all credits transfer back to FSU. Live in a beautiful medieval village and study on a campus with students from over 100 countries. All teaching is in English, and German instruction is offered as well. Scholarships are available from both FSU and UMUC. Students may apply for fall or spring.

Study in Limerick, Ireland

Students interested in taking part in the Ireland Exchange Program in Limerick should come by the CIE for information about the spring 2003 program. Participants study at Mary Immaculate College and take one FSU class and three MIC classes. All financial aid will transfer and scholarships are available.

Semester Overseas for Same Price as FSU

The International Student Exchange Program allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of over 200 locations. Students may take financial aid with them and may apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in either English or other languages.
