Mr. GREEN,

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HAPPENED the other Day to go to a Public House, where were two Gentlemen who have been several Years Factors, and bought a great deal of Tobacco for their Employers (who relide in Great Britain), and fome Planters, talking about the Inspection

As I was known to the Company, I fat down with them, and foon became furprized, when I heard those Gentlemen expressing their Dislike of that Law, and wishing it was expired; and I was the more so, because I had myself, before then, often heard them declare it to be, in their Opinion, a very advantageous one for the Country.

I spoke what I could in it's Favour, and begged they would give fome Reasons for the Change of their Sentiments, and was candidly answered, "That the late Prices they, and others, had given for Tobacco, was owing to the Law, and if that " ceased, they could buy it as cheap, as they used to do, before the making of it."

I was firuck with this Auswer; and as I have

had no better an Education than what this Country afforded, a great many Years ago, I left off discouring on a Subject I did not think myfelf able to defend against those Gentlemen.

But, Mr. Green, altho' I can't talk, I can think; But, Mr. Green, altho' I can't talk, I can think; and therefore, on my going home, and reflecting on what passed, I determined to put my Thoughts in Writing, and by your Means lay them before my Countrymen, the People of Maryland; the Subject being as I think, the most interesting they can have their Considered, and found. That all the Expences and Hardships attending the Execution of a new Law, were borne and overcome; and the great Difficulties, which we imagined would attend

great Difficulties, which we imagined would attend it, removed; and that now every Planter knew how to order his Tobacco, fo that it would certainly pass Inspection I looked over my Sherist's Accounts, compared them with what I used for merly to pay, and found my prefent Difbursement far short of what I was wont to pay for the County Lovy; and as this is true in my Cafe, it must be so in the of every Master of a Family in Maryland. I observed, in particular, that I saved Two hundred Pounds of Tobacco each Year in my Payment to the Minister of the Parish; for I have yearly paid for twenty Taxables; and that for what Lawyers Fees I have been charged with, in-flead of paying One hundred Pounds of Tobacco, I have paid but Seventy two; and that in the same Proportion I have discharged the Clerk, Sheriffs, and several other Officers, the Fees which they

had a Right to demand of me.

These I think considerable Savings, and worthy to be looked on as such, by every Man among us. I then confidered the Advantage of having Tobacco Notes in my Pocket, as giving me Credit for the Quantity mentioned in them wherever I went, and that I was thereby at large to dispose of them when, to whom, and where I pleafed; whereas, before this Ad; my Credit could not be expected to go beyond my own Neighbourhood, or, at fartheft, where I might be known. And, on looking into the Ad. I found (which greatly pleafed me) that the Legislature had taken a particular Care of the poorest Peeple among us, by allowing the Commission General no Fees on small Estates; and whereas, by the old Act, none but these under Ten Pounds were deemed small Estates, yer, at present, by the Inspection Law, every one under Thirty Pounds is looked on as such, and that the Deputy Commission, instead of being restrained from pas-fing Accounts, as they then were, without a spe-cial Commission if the Estate exceeded Sifty Pounds,

they may now pass them without such Commission, if they do not exceed One hundred and fifty.

These surely are great Benefits derived to those Person, whom every Country should particularly favour, the Widow and the Orphan.

These Advantages are evident to me, and it will be observed quite distinct from any Relation to the Motive which influenced the Merchants; but when Motive which influenced the Merchants; but when I came to confider the Reafons they gave, then it was the Utility, and even Neceffity, of that Law, appeared in a yet stronger Light; for, altho' it should be true, that the Prices for which Tobacco has lately fold be not wholly owing to the Inspection Law, yet if that has been one Cause of it (and that it has been the principal one is, I think, evident to all, but especially to those who live near to, or are conversant in Victimia; because in the to, or are conversant in Virginia; because in the feveral Years our Law has been in Force, the Price for their Tobacco has not, but for ours has advanced; a Demonstration that the Peace did not procure it; for if it had, it must have risen as well there as here), ought it not, when added to the other already mentioned, to make it eligible to us: And if the Merchants, when it is expired, buy it cheaper (and that they will, I fear we shall most fadly feel) than they can if it continues, Pray who must the Loss fall upon? Must it not be on us Planters? And do we not know, is it not plain, that the greatest Loss of all must be borne by the Poorest, altho' every one must inevitably suffer in fome Proportion ?

For my own Part, I have fixteen Negro Taxa-bles, and a Tract of good Land on Potowmack River, and, happen what will, can live; but, Mr. Green, what will, what mult become of the honest Property; and the no less honest, but more poor and laborious one, who rests Land, and may have only himself, a Wife, and small Children, to work? What, I say, must become of those, who, to be sure, make a great Part of our People! Why, I will home that to mayour to die. will hope, that to prevent fo dire a Calamity to them and us, their and our worthy Representatives, at the very next Meeting, will do their utmost, in their Legislative Capacity, to extend the Time of must say again, that if the Merchants can buy To-bacco cheaper without, than with, the Law, they, and we, and all, must work for as much less as we lofe by the Fall of Tobacco; and with this cruel Addition, that we must pay much more for the feveral Services before mentioned, than at prefent can be taken from us; for, every Body must know, that Tobacco was fold cheaper before the Quality and Convenience were regulated, than it has been fince the Law which does regulate them has operated; Must not the same Cause ever produce the same Effect? Will it not be so again? It is evident the Tobacco Buyers wish and defire it : Pray let me ask, is that for their own, or our Sakes ? I fear not for ours; therefore, let us do all in our Power to keep it up. Before the making the Law, it is certain, and well knows, that some Merchants obliged the Planters to carry the Tobacco they a-greed with them for, to Places where they kept Weights and Scales, and would not receive it 'til it had been examined by a Receiver, and weighed in the Scales ; this Fact cannot be denied ; and pray confider, did not each Tobacco Buyer, who did fo, make for himself an Inspection Law I and did any good Consequence to the Planter follow

Did those who took all this Trouble get any more for their Tobacco ! I don't know one who did; if there were any, let them fpeak: This Manner of paying did not indeed relate to the Cler-Manner of paying did not indeed relate to the Clergy. Officers, Lawyers, Public, or County Levies; but then the paying those Gentlemen so much as we then did, caused that those, who thus carried their Tobacco, pad less to sell even on those Terms. Have the People more Trouble now, than to carry their Tobacco as those did ? No: But since they have been compelled to carry it, they have the many Profits I have already mentioned; all which, when that Compulsion ceases, we shall certainly be without.

Knowing this, can Tobacco Planters be enough infatuated, to confent themselves to the expiring of

a Law, whereby fo much Tobacco is faved, and the rest fold for a higher Price ?

You, my Friends, who live on or near Potow-mack, know well how useful such a Law has a long. Time been to the Colony of Virginia; it is wishble to you all, how much they have increased in Wealth fince they enacted one; and, altho' at first many, very many of the Inhabitants there were utterly averse to it, yet how have the Profits arising by it reconciled them to it? Yes, it has so much, that you can scarce find a Man among them, who will not freely own that he looks on it's Continuance as necessary, not only for his own, but his Country's Well-Being; and this, notwithstanding our Law, for the last four Years, has clearly given a better Market than they have had; and shall we ourselves play the Game into their Hands, and uso those very Means to make them Rich, whereby only we can become Poor? I will not suppose we can act thus prepofteroufly.

If our Law cestes, must it not be certain that they will have the first Market? For it must be allowed prudent for every Purchaser to go to a Place

where he is fure to get a good Commodity.

Can there be falle Packing, falle Tare, and De-lay (by Tobacco not being rolled to certain Hou-

fes), to their Flats, in lading there?
May there not, will there not, be all these here? And are not those material and great Discourage ments to Trade? And, if we permit a Possibility of fuch here, can we ought we to expect an equal Share of the Trade? It is impossible we should have it; and if we have not, are we not in worke Circumstances than they? And when it is considered, that we are made fo by our own Act, the Reflection must furely rather aggravate the Misfortune than confole us under it.

It, is the Influence which fome may have over the engaged, the weak, unwary, but honest, Plan-ters, which I fear: For, should they become indifferent, or not earnest, for it's Continuance, our Representatives may apprehend that Indifference to proceed from Diffike, and therefore be less follicitous for it's Continuance, but I will oppose to that Fear, this Hope, that there can't be many of those we have delegated to ferve us in Affembly, who, after the Experience which has been had of the Benefit of this Law, and knowing it's Enemies, need be excited to espouse a Bill giving it a longer

I wish I had Words capable of expressing the woeful Distress we must all be under, by a Conduct so injurious to the Country's Interest, as that will be, which suffers the Inspection Law to determine at it's present Period.

I write not for my own Sake; my Circumstances are as I have told, and I have, by my Situation, this great Advantage over many, that if that Law does determine, I can at any Time carry my Tobacco to Virginia, where I shall be fore it will pass Inspection, and thereby share the Price there

I don't fay I shall, I heartily wish I may not be forced to do so; but, since it will then be in my Power, give me Leave to mention it as a certain Truth, that Tobacco being carried hence thisher, must be greatly hurtful to this Province.

Every Hogshead which goes from hence must enlarge their, and leffen our, Quantity of good Tobacco (for none other will be carried over); and what Effect that must have on our Market, every one may easily see; but althor this Practice will be attended with fuch a Confequence, I cannot fay that I am fure I shall be able to refist the Tempta-

tion, if, by doing fo, I can certainly get five and twenty per Cent by it.

This will be confessed to be such a Temptation, as I incline to believe some of those who may read this, no more than myfelf, might have Self-denial enough to overcome; but I most fincerely hope the Occasion will not be given, for if it should, the Way will also thereby be opened for such Pobacco to come from thence, as will not pass their In-

spection, such as is indeed unfit for any Market, but yet will go from hence as Maryland Tobacco; and the very sad Effects those Practices may be attended with, not the weakest Man among us but must know, and not one of us all ought to be unconcerned at.

These, these, my Countrymen, are but some of the melancholy Consequences infallibly arising from the Discontinuance of our Law; and can we be without the greatest Dread of such an Event? Ought they not to awaken each to use his utmost Efforts to prevent one so satal? Shall Tobacco-Buyers say, "We wish the Act may cease:" Why? "Because if it happens, we can purchase it "cheaper:" From whom? Why, from us the Planters, who make it, and shall not we contribute our utmost for it's Continuance? Yes, Prudence, as well as Interest, will determine us to wish, and, if it be necessary, dutifully to petition the Legisla ture, that they would, for the universal Welfare of the People of Maryland, extend the Continuance of it to such a Time as they, in their superior Wisdom, shall think sit.

I could enlarge, but if what I have wrote is without Effect, I am fure nothing I can fay will have any; but, as I know I am writing to realonable People, I will hope it may be duly confidered, and therefore shall conclude with assuring them, if the Experience of the Advantages which have arisen to ourselves, and our Neighbours in Virgi-

mia, by such a Law can be of any Weight.

If the Abatement in the paying the Public and County Levy, the Clergy, Lawyers, and all other Officers Fees, be a real Saving:—if the keeping all our own good, and not receiving a great deal of Virginia bad Tobacco, be a solid Advantage;—if the selling none but good merchantable Tobacco be not only our Duty, as honest Men but for our own Interest;—and if the hindering a Quantity, almost inshite, of trash bad Tobacco, which in many Places has been kept up for the last four or five Years, with a Design, when it could be legally done, to be sent home, can be useful to us:—if these be important Considerations to the People of Maryland, then, what is here published will not only be seriously adverted to, but kindly received:—Whether it be or no, I have done my Duty, as a Member of the Community, and shall always have the Satisfaction arising therefrom.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Officer 14. WE have just had a new Scene presented here, WW which might have been attended with dan-gerous Confequences, tho' with fewer than in other Countries," An artful Impoltor, who had put on a Mask of extraordinary Sanctity, gave Occasion to it. A Greek Monk of the Congregation of Mount Athos, which on account of the Number of Convents and the Devotion of the Monks, is called by the modern Name of Monte Santo, had long amused our Greek Schismatics with his pious Frauds; and his Reputation being established in fe veral Provinces, Fame brought it to Conftantinople, where it was no difficult Matter for him to engage the Attention and win the Confidence of a credu lous Nation, as fend of Novelty at prefent in the Depth of Slavery, as formerly in the best Days of their Grandeur. The Monk did some extraordinary Things which were cried up as Miracles. Embolden'd by his Success, he was so negligent in concealing the Fraud, that the Greek Patriarch, afraid of the Jealousy of the Turks, and their Readiness to feize every Opportunity to harrafs his Country-men, fent him to a distant Province. The Banishment of the Monk raifed a general Compassion.

The Women sirred up the Men against the cruel
Patriarch; and the Men, ever led by the Woman,
assembled together, dragged the Head of their Religion before the supreme Tribunal of the Porte, and petitioned that he might be deposed. These Degradations are so common, that they are little minded; but this is the first Time that the Greeks carried the Head of their Church before such a pro-fane Areopagus. The Porte, who knows how to diffemble, seemed to consent readily to their sediti-ous Petition. The Patriarch was deposed, and the Person recommended by the Riotera immediately put in his Place. The Condescention appealed the Tumult. But the Severity of a despotic Govern-ment followed close upon this Appearance of a Do-cility unknown in this Country. Next Day two Greeks were hanged up before the House of the deposed Patriarch, and some more. 'its expected. arried the friend of their Church before fuch a prodepoied Patriarch, and fome more, 'tis experted, will undergo the fame Fats. It remains to be feen

which of the two Pattiarchs will maintain himfelf on the Throne. It will certainly be he who has most Money. This necessary Simony is very convenient for the Grand Vizir and some of the other

Ministers.

Peterfurg, New. 14. Her Imperial Majesty has given Orders that a sufficient Quantity of Wood be surnished, at her Expence, to the Inhabitants of Casan, to enable them to rebuild their Houses which were burnt down by the late great Fires. The Waters of the River Neva are not as yet confined to their natural Channel, but continue to overslow its Banks, by which Means Part of the City is still under Water; and a great Quantity of Merchandize, that we had not Time to remove out of the Warehouses, is absolutely spoiled.

Genea, Nov. 15. Our Ministry see with great Calmness, and with some Sort of Compassion, the Ferment of Affairs in Corsica. This Agitation doth not at all surprize them; because they expected new Confusions to arise, when those Islanders should attempt to establish a regular Form of Government among themselves. Whatever may be the Islue, the Republic knows the Part she has to act, and rests on the Guaranty of those Powers who have engaged to maintain her in Possession of Corsica.

Stockholm, Now. 21. We have received Advice from Helfingfors, and Louisa (the Name given to the Town of Debergy when the King, was lately in Finland), that on the 5th Instant the Sea was so swelled by a violent S. W. Wind, accompanied by Hurricanes, that it arose the Height of twenty Feet, broke in upon those two Towns, laid most of the Houses under Water, washed away some, and broke all the Bridges. The Dock Yarda and Vessels in the Harbour suffered much. The Salt in the Cesses was quite dissolved, the Corn in the Grainaries entirely spoiled, and two Wind Mills lately crecked at Helsingsors thrown down by the Hurricane; but happily no Lives were lost.

By an authentic List of the Vessels that go from Liverpool to Africa, their Number amounts to 88, which Trade for 25,720 Slaves yearly. The Company of Merchants belonging to Liverpool, who trade to Africa, (established by Act of Parliament) consists of 50s. There are 135 Merchants free of the African Company in London, and 157 in Brist tol; yet their Trade is not so extensive as that of the Merchants of Liverpool. There are 106 Vessels in that Town, employ'd in the West India and American Trade; 28 that commonly take Freight from Liverpool for different Parts of Eu-

rope; 122 that use the Co fling and Irish Trade; and upwards of 80 River Sloops, employed in the River Trade, &c. Burthen from 40 to 70 Tons.

The Commerce of Liverpool has increased within these sew Years more than that of any Port is Great Britain. By the late War it was a considerable Gainer; the Harbour being fituated so near the Mouth of the North Channel, between Ireland and Scotland, (a Passage very little known or frequented by the Enemy) afforced many Conveniences to the Merchants of Liverpool, denied to those of other Ports; which invited Numbers of Strangers from d fferent Parts to settle there. Since the Peace their Trade has not been so brisk as sormerly; but it appears by the Cultom House Books to be much revived.

Dec. 11. Some Advices from Spain, by Way of Holland, inform us, that the Chain of Spanish Troops stationed near Gibraltar has lately been considerably augmented; the Spainards fancying that in some Places of Barbary, with which Gibraltar has Communication, the Plague has not entirely dispensed.

HE Damage done by the late Inun-dation is greater than what we fuffer-ed in the Years 1721 and 1726. The Waters have washed away most of the Houses and Keys near the River. The Gardens of Petershoff and Strelina Muysa have alfo been greatly damaged, as well as a great Num-ber of Country Houses and Gardens belonging to private Persons. The Island of Wasili Offrow has likewise been the worse for this Inundation : Count Bestuchest, the Great Chancellor, has a very fine Beflucheff, the Great Chancellor, has a very not House in that Island, and 'ris reckoned that the Damage done to it by the Overslowing of the Neva, amounts to upwards of 15000 Rubles. A Bastion of the Admiralty, with the Cannon mounted thereon, was removed seven Feet from the Bo dy of the Work. The Batteries of Cronftadt and Wyburg have not fuffered less Damage. A Ship that lay in the Road of Cronstadt, bound to Dantzick, was lost with all her Cargo, among which there were Chinese Damasks to the Value of 4000 Rubles, which Baron Pretlack, Embassador from Rubles, which Baron Pretlack, Embaffador from the Court of Vienna, had purchafed at Gottenburg, in order to be fent thither. Count Colloredo, who is going to that Court, has loft by the fame Accident his Library, which he had put on board that Ship. In the Storm of the 2d Instant, a Lubeck Vessel, that lay at Anchor in the Road of Susterbeck, was carried by the Wind and Floods into an adjacent Wood. The Exposition of the Moives, &cc. to often mentic private Representations made to the British Court in the King's Name, by Mr. Mitchell, Secretary to his Majesty's Embassy at that Court, to the following Purpose: "That as the Laws of Justice ought to be equally observed between the two Nations, an Englishman might expect the same Protection from the Courts of Justice at Berlin, as a Prussian from those at London, whenever either Party found himself aggrieved: That upon this Principle description and Commerce, not Principle depends the Credit and Commerce, not only between their People, but also between the whole trading Part of Europe: That all Nations hold thefe Bonds of Juffice facred and inviolable,

and observe them at home, in order to reap the Benefit of them among their Neighbours: That from a Nation so replete with noble and generous Sentiments as the English, his Majesty could not doubt to obtain, without any Difficulty, the Satisfaction due to his Subjects: That his Intentions being pure, he was willing faithfully to comply with his Engagements with that Nation, but at the same Time to afford his Subjects the Protection due to them: to afford his Subjects the Protection due to them : That in order not to act precipitately in an Affair of this Nature, and to give the English Government Time for Reflection, he continued to discharge the Debt upon Silesia 'til the Time appointed for the last Payment; but when he saw that neither the Equity of his Demands, Time, Reafons, nor repeated Solicitations, could produce any thing in Favour of the Prussian Merchants, he thought himself obliged to have Recourse to the only Means left him, which was to deduct out of the Money due to the English the Sum which his Subjects demanded to repair their Damages: That the same Law which obliges us to act honestly to-wards our Creditors, authorizes us to require the same Behaviour from our Debtors; it would be a very fingular kind of Law that should fettle every Thing in Favour of one, and nothing in Favour of the other: That the Affair in Question does not only comprehend what is due from the English to only comprehend what is due from the English to the Prussians, but likewise what is withheld from the latter by Force: That in short, it is just to discharge one's Debts, it is still more so to repair the Damage occasioned by one's own Fault, and by a premediated Design: That his Majesty having appointed a Commission to enquire impartially into the Pretensions of the Prussian Merchants, placed at the Head of it a Man, whose Name alone was sufficient to remove any Doubt that could be entertained concerning the Equity of the Proceedings, and this was the Great Chancellor de Coccejii, with whom were joined three Midiflers of State and feveral Judges : That this Commission, after having examin'd the Pretentions of the Merchants, and upon a just Computation, valued them at 239840 Crowns, adjudged them only 159486 Crowns for their Capital, and 33285 Crowns for their Interest, at 6 per Cent. HAMLET. Whiteball, January 6. Letters from Fort St. George, in the East Indies, dated July 5, 1752, having brought Advice, that the Prefident and Council of Fort St. George, having received Information fome Time ago that the Chunda Saib, and his Allies, were endeavouring to harrass us in our own Diffricts, sent for a Reinforcement from Bengal, and also sent Capt. Clive to Madrass, who having collected our Forces, and taken the Field, found the Enemy strongly encamped at Vandeloor, a Place 15 Miles off. The Enemy decamped in the Night and took the Routof Arcot, and were purfued by the Nabob's Forces; they gained Covereepaute, about 60 Miles off, which Place was appointed for their Rendezvous, their Intention having been to furprize Arcot. Here an Engagement enfued, in which most of their European Forces were killed, and taken Prisoners, and their Cannon and their Baggage were also taken. Upon this Advice Capt. Clive was immediately ordered to march; he took St. David in his Way, and whilft he was there, the Ship Dorrington arrived, with Major Lawrence, who, at his own Request, had the Command of the Forces given him, and he fet out on the 17th of March from Fort St. David, at the Head of a Party of 400 Europeans, and 1000 Scepoys, and took under Convoy a large Quantity of Stores and Ammunition for Trichenapali, and proceeded, without Molestation, 'til he came with his Forces near Coiladdy, on the 28th, when the Enemy frove to take Advantage of his Situation, a firong Detachment of French from Chunda Saib's Army having thrown up an Entrenchment in the

Way he was to march, cannonaded him from reand endeavoured to interrupt his Passage, which induced Major Lawrence, on the Nabob's Parr, to-return it, and occasioned the Loss of some Men on both Sides; but the Enemy not advancing, he went on the next Day for Trichenapali, about 16 Miles distant, and as the Road was in Sight of the Encmy's Camp, they came out with their whole Force to oppose him. Major Lawrence in order to secure the Baggage, marched to meet them; this brought on a Cannonading from them, which did him but little Damage; but his Guns galled the Enemy very much, and forced them to retreat into a hollow Way; upon this Major Lawrence drew off his Men, and joined the Army that Night. In this Action the Enemy loft about 300 Horfe, belides Allam Cawn a Man of great Interest in the Country. Chundah was foon obliged to raife the Siege of Trichenapali and collect his Forces in Syringham, a neighbouring Island; and the English Forces having possess'd themselves of all the strong Posts quite round it, they so effectually prevented Provisions from coming to the Enemy, that Chundah's great Army of above 30,000 Men, were differfed in less than two Months, and himself, with the French, and a few Seepoys, who held out, were in a miferable Condition for want of Sustenance. Upon this the Nabob fummoned them to furrender Prisoners; and after they had fent Chundah in the Night Time to Monacjee, they delivered up the Island of Syringham on the 3d of June, on Condition that the French Officers should have leave to go to Pondi. cherry on their Parole, never to ferve against the Nabob or his Allies; and the Soldiers to be sent to Europe by the first Opportunity, but in the mean Time to be kept Priloners. As the Allies could not agree who should keep Chundah, who was ta-ken at Monacjee, by the Tanjore Ally, to end the Dispute, his Head was cut off. The whole Businels was done in a few Sieges and some Skirmishes; in feveral of which not a Man of our Forces was loft, fo that in reducing the Blacks to the Nabob's Obedience, and making thirty Officers, and near 1000 European Soldiers Prisoners, we had not 50 Men killed. 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The SPEECH of Lawyer BRIEF against Tedioufness and Prolixity.

My Lord, and Gentlemen of the Jury,

HERE are a Set of Men in the World of such a tedious, tiresome, irksome, trissing, troublesome thabitude, Temper, and Disposition of Mind, that they consuse, perplex, consound, intangle, and puzzle, every Circumstance in every Cause which they undertake, protect, defend, justify, or engage in. Instead of coming to the Point, Thing, Matter, Bufiness, or Debate, they deviate, vary, waver, fly off, therefrom. When we expett Truth, Satisfattion, Conviction, and Decision, we find, perceive, observe, and remark, nothing but Uncertainty, Ambiguity, Doubtfulness, and Difficulty. This, my Lord, I bumbly apprehend, conceive, think, presume, and furmife, is owing to Tediousness and Prolixity; the Nature, Genius, and Extent, of which, I Shall consider, weigh, examine, expiscate, and scrutinize. In the first Place then I shall show, prove, and demonstrate, the Nature of Tediousness and Prolixity, by showing, proving, and demonstrating, that there is nothing so unnatural; for the Business of a Tongue, Utterance, Speech, or Language, is to come to the Point, Argument, Contemplation, Question, at once point blank, stap dash, and concisely, without any Prevarication, Equivocation, Retardation, or any Circumbendibus what soever. — And now in the second, succeeding, following Place, Point, and Preliminary, I come to promulgate the Genius of Tediousness and Prolixity, which is done, effected, per-form'd, and brought about, by manifesting that they have no Genius at all; and, so fur from any Men of Genius making use of them, none but your egregious, absurd, ridiculous Dolts, Dunderhead, and Blockbeads, ever admit, receive, or embrace, any fucb Notions, Ideas, Maxims, Principles, or Tenets. -Thirdly,-My Lord, I beg Leave, according to Order, Form, Series, and Succession, to animadvert upon the Extent of Tediousness and Prolixity; and this managed by demonstrating that it is infinite and without Bounds, and consequently can have no Extens at all. — And now, my Lord, I will open the Cause, Spring, Origin, Fountain, Rife, and Foun dation, of these Vices, which is Tautology, which is the telling, Speaking, saying, delivering, uttering, pronouncing, divulging, declaring, remarking, obferwing, repeating, or expressing, the same identical, individual I bing, an bundred, and an bundred, bundred bundred Times over. And now, my Lord, I beg Leave, Pardon, Permiffion, and Sufferance, to lay down only fix and fifty Par-ticulars; every Particular, my Lord, shall confist of only Seventy two Divisions; every Division shall comprehend, contain, and confift of only eighty two Subdivisions; every Subdivision shall be concluded with the fix and fortieth Article; and every Artiele fall consume, expend, and coft, no more than an Hour and a balf.

[Here the Court was out of all manner of Patience; and the Judge, with great Indignation, put a Period to a Discourse, which, if the Lawyer's Tongue had been immortal, might have lasted to all Eternity.]

HOW quick are the Advances of Time! The Day is gone, almost as soon as dawned! The filent Moments flip away infentibly! No Thief

fteals more unperceived from the pillaged House. Wherever we are, however employed, Time purfues his incessant Course. Though we are listless and dilatory, the great Measurer of our Days pres-fes on; still presses on, in his unwearied Career, and whirls our Weeks, and Months, and Years away. Is it not, then, furprizingly strange to hear People complain of the Tediousness of their Time, and how heavy it hangs upon their Hands? To fee them contriving a Variety of amufing Artifices to accelerate it's Flight, and get rid of it's Burden? Why, thoughtles Mortals! need you urge the headlong Torrent? Your Days are swifter than a Post, which, carrying Dispatches of the utmost Importance, with unremitted Speed scours the Road. They pass away like the nimble Ships, which have Wind in their Wings, and skim along the watery Plain. They haften to their deftined Period with the Rapidity of an Eagle, which leaves the stormy Blast behind her, while she cleaves the Air, and darts upon her Prey.

And, when it is gone, how short it appears! When the fond Eye beheld it in Perspective, it feemed an extensive Plan; but, on a retrospective View, how wonderfully is the Scene altered! The Landscape, large and spacious which a warm Fancy drew, brought to the Test of cool Experience, shrinks into a Span; just as the Shores vanish, and Mountains dwindle to a Spot, when the Sailor, furrounded by Skies and Ocean, throws his last

Look on his native Land. Shall we, then, be industrious to shorten what is no longer than a Span, or to quicken the Pace of what is ever on the Wing? Shall we squander away what is unutterably important, while it lasts; and, when once departed, is altogether irrecoverable? Forbear the Folly, forbear the desperate Extravagance. Shall we chide, as a Loiterer, the Arrow that boundeth from the String; or sweep away Diamonds, as the Refuse of our Houses? How parfimonious should we be of our Days; how carefully husband our precious Hours! They go indistolubly connected with Happiness, or Mifery. Improved, they are a fure Pledge of ever-lasting Glory; wasted, they are a sad Presace to never ending Consuston and Anguish. On these, therefore, our eternal All depends. And will an Affair of such unspeakable Weight admit of a Moment's Delay, or confist with the least Remissness? -Especially since much of our appointed Time is already elapsed, and the Remainder is all Uncertainty.—But, suppose we had made a Covenant with the Grave, and were assured of reaching the Age of Methuselab, how foon would even such a Lease expire! Let it be extended yet farther, and made co existent with Nature itself; yet, how speedily will the Confummation of all Things commence! For, yet a little while, and the commissioned Archangel will lift up his Hand to Heaven, and swear by the Almighty Name, That Time shall be no longer. Then abused Opportunities will ne ver return, and new Opportunities will never more be offered. Then, should negligent Mortals wish, ever so passionately, for a few Moments only to be thrown back from the opening Eternity, thou fands of Worlds would not be able to procure the

What inexpressible Consternation must overwhelm unthinking Mortals, who have foundered their Time in Vice, when the general Conflagration commences! That dreadful Day will foon approach, in which the Heavens shall pass away with a great Noise, and the Elements shall melt with servent Heat; the Earth also, and all the Works that are therein, shall be burnt up. That mighty Hand, which once opened the Windows from an high, and broke with English and the windows from an high, and broke up the Fountains of the great Deep, will then unlock all the Magazines of Fire, and pour a fecond Deluge upon the Earth. The vengeful Flames, kindled by the Breath of the Almighty, will fpread themselves from the Center to the Circumference; nothing will withstand their Impetuofity, nothing escape their Rage. Magnifi

cent Palaces and folemn Temples will be laid in Ashes: Spacious Cities and impregnable Towers buried in one smoaking Mass. Not only the Pro-ductions of human Art, but the Works of Almigh-ty Power, will be Fuel for the devouring Element. The everlafting Mountains will melt, like the Snows which cover their Summits; and even the vast Oceans ferve only to augment the inconceivable Ra-

pidity and Fury of the Blaze.

These are Events, the Greatness of which no-thing finite can measure. Such, as will cause whatever is confiderable, or momentous, in the Annals of all Generations, to fink into Littleness and Nothing. Events, big with the everlasting Fates of all the Living and all the Dead.—We must see the Graves cleaving, the Sea teeming, and Swarms unsuspected, Crowds unnumbered, yea, Multitudes of thronging Nations rifing from both-We must see the World in Flames; must stand at the Diffolution of all terrestrial Things, and be Attendants on the Burial of Nature.—We must fee the vast Expanse of Sky wrapped up like a Scroll, and the incarnate God iffuing from Light inaccessible, with Ten Thousand Times Ten Thoufand Angels, to judge both Men and Devils .-We must fee the Curtain of Time drop, fee all Eternity disclosed to View, and enter upon a State of Being that will never have an End.

Ought we not, therefore, to husband well every Moment of our Time, and take Heed to our Ways? Is there an Enquiry, is there a Care of greater, of equal, of comparable Importance? -For, otherwise, how shall we stand with Boldness. when the Stars of Heaven fall from their Orbs? -How shall we look up with Joy, and see our Salvation drawing nigh, when the Hearts of Mil-

lions fail for Fear?

RULES against SLANDER.

I. SET a Watch upon your Words, and never fpeak without Deliberation, than which nothing in human Life can procure you a greater

II. Pursue your own Affairs with Diligence. and, concern yourfelf as little as possible with those

III. Take Care always to have fo much Bufinefa upon your Hands, that you may not, for Want of necessary Employment, be led, against your Inclination, to fpeak Evil of others.

IV. Never take a Pleasure in hearing others re-viled; but accustom yourself to have Compassion on their Infirmities, rather than rejoice at them.

V. If you hear a Person slander'd, and know any Good of him, reveal it: Which may at leaft counterballance the Detraction, and fo far preferve his Reputation.

VI. Let it always be a Maxim with you, that it coft you nothing, and that it is the smallest Favour you can shew your Neighbour to speak well, or, at leaft, not evil of him.
VII. Confider what Esteem you yourself have

for those People, who make it their Business to fully the Reputation of others, by Defamation, and let them be a Warning to you, not to fall under the fame hateful Character.
VIII. When you find the least Inclination in

yourfelf to defame another, lay your Hand upon your Heart, and ask yourself whether you have not merited the fame, or a worse Reprehen

IX. Examine your Mind, how you have been able to bear with Aspersions cast on you by others: And though you may have the Resolution to despife them, consider another may not. It may

fpife them, confider another may not. It may perhaps be an Affliction to him, and this Affliction may be attended with other evil Circumstances.

X. Enquire narrowly into the Certainty of what you intend to fay of another, Whether you can affirm the Truth of it of your own Knowlege, or only by Hearfay? If the latter, it may be gro lefs, and you may draw upon yourfelf the racter of a wicked Defamer; if the former,

confider, whether it may not be as friendly an Office to conceal it, as to relieve a Neighbour un-

XI. Look back into former Times, and recollect your Memory, whether the Person in Question has ever wrong'd you? If not, you are about to act a Piece of Cruelty; and if he have, your Slander is, at best, but the Fruits of Revenge and Ma-

XII. Recollect likewise, whether that Person has never done you a Favour, if he have, you add to this Vice the Sin of Ingratitude; and if not, may he not have an Opportunity of doing it for the future? — May the Time not come when, by the Instability of Things of this Life, his good Will may be of Service to you?

XIII. Think as far forward as possible and re flect upon the various Consequences, which may arise from Detraction. Though at first they may be little regarded; the greater may be the Danger hereafter. A Slanderer always finds his Match, who pays him in his own Coin. He is hated by all Men; is liable to be involv'd in Law Suits, and falls imperceptibly into Broils and Quarrels, which are often not to be ended but by Bloodshed.

XIV. Lastly consider, that though the various Underminings of Detraction, are not punishable in this World; yet they are a direct Breach of the ninth Commandment, and incur eternal Punishment

in the World to come.

According to our Advices from Constantinople, the Liberalities of the Grand Signior and his Prime Minister have not made the expected Im. pression on the Minds of the Janizaries, who begin again to murmur fo loudly, that if fome Method be not speedily found to appeale them, a grand Re-volution at the Ottoman Porte is to be apprehended.

Prague, Jan. 20. A Soldier of our Garrison coming home drunk last Night, and his Wife beginning to expostulate with him, the unnatural Brute ran his Sword through her Body, and killed her on the Spot. He was immediately feized, and this Day broke alive on the Wheel.

Paril, Jan. 27. Instructions having been fent to the Duke de Mirepoix, to complain to the Mi-nistry of the Behaviour of the English to the French in the East Indies, particularly in the Affair that happened last June, which was a manifest Violation of the Peace subfifting between the two Nations: The last Dispatches from his Excellency brought Advice, that the Secretary of State had made Anfwer to his Complaint, that the English had copied after the French: These having taken Part with the King of Golconda their Ally, the English, as Allies of the Mogul, were obliged to affift him, and did nothing but as Auxiliaries : Confequently their

Behaviour needed no Apology.

Hague, Feb. 2. The Negotiation between the Empress Queen and the Elector Palatine having met new and unexpected Obstacles, which are ascribed to a certain Prince, who feems not disposed to change his System, and whose military Preparations cannot fail to give some Anxiety to the Allied Courts who are interested in the Success of the E. lection of a King of the Romans; to disconcert his Defigns, a Treaty, we hear, is on the Carpet, be-tween the Courts of Vienna, Petersburg, and Lon-don: It's chief Object will be the Accomplishment of this Election, by uniting the Forces of the three Powers (whose Contingents will be stipulated) to repel any Attempts to traverse, and diffurb the Peace of Germany.

Extrad of a Letter from Dunkirk, dated January

25, 1753.

" On the 2d of December last died, at the Sign of the Burgundy Cross in Furnes, a Town belong-ing to the Queen of Hungary, about 15 English Miles East of this Place, Capt. William Henry Cranstoun, aged 46. His Illness did not continue above nine Days, but the last three his Pains were fo very great, and he was swelled to such a Degree, that it was thought by the Physician and Apothecary that attended him, that he would have burft, and by the great Agonies he expired in, he was thought to be raving mad. As he had just before his Death embraced the Roman Catholic Religion, he was buried in great Solemnity, the Corporation, attending the Funeral, and a grand Mais faid over the Corpfe in the Cathedral Church, which was fine ly illuminated, and in which he was buried. Some little Time before he died he made a Will, which was sealed up in the Presence of one Mrs. Ross (whose Maiden Name was Dunbar, and which Name he went by), and two other Persons who were also his Acquaintance. The Will he figned with his own Name, and gave all his Fortune which was in his Brother's Hands, to his Child, who is now living at Hexham in Northumberland, with her Mother, to whom he had so villainously denied being married, and for which he often faid, a Curse attended him for injuring the Character of so good a Wife. When he was asked concerning Mr. Blandy's Murder, he often reflected on himself greatly, yet faid, that Miss Blandy ought not to have blamed him to much as the did, but that the Particulars of which, he faid, should never be known til his Death; and for that Purpose he has left an Account, fealed up, with a Friend. He first made his Escape out of England the latter End of last February to Bologne, but as foon as he was known to be there, was obliged to be kept con-cealed by Mrs. Rofs, some Relation of his Wife's threatning Revenge for his base Usage to her; so that Mrs. Ross and he were obliged at last to fly from Bologue by Night, which was on the 26th of July last, and lived in Furnes from that Time.

The Fortune in his Brother's Hands, which he has left to his Child by his Will, is 1500 l. his Patrimony, which he formerly received Five per Cent for; but on his being cast before the Lords of Sel sions of Scotland, in the Cause concerning the Validity of his Marriage, which was confirmed, 501. out of the 75 l. was ordered by their Lordships to be paid to his Wife annually, for the Support of her and the Child, which she received, and has lived ever fince with fome of her own Relations in Hexham afore mentioned."

The Ferdi nand, a Spanish Man of War, arrived here last Friday from Cadiz, having brought the Value of 2,00,000 of Piastres in Silver Bullion, to be coined into Money here, for the Use of his Catholic Ma-

Turin, Jan. 3. Last Month feveral Expresses arrived here from Vienna and Madrid, in relation to a Negotiation that is fet on Foot for engaging the King of Saidinia to renounce all Pretentions to the Duchies of Parma and Placentia, for a valuable Confideration; upon the Arrival of which Expresses, feveral Conferences were held; but the

Refult of them is at prefent a Secret.

Vienna, Dec. 16. The Fire mentioned last Post to have happened at the Spanish Hospital, was followed by a much more terrible one, the Particulars of which are as follow: This Morning, at Nine o'Clock, a Fire broke out in the Laboratory of the Saltpetre House, which is fituated between the Baltion of the Augustines, and the Gate of Carinthia. The Gunpowder and other Combustibles which were there, in a short Time blew up the greatest Part of the Building, and the Vaults un derneath it. Large Stones, and other Materials of a prodigious Weight, were thrown a very great Diffance; and the Fire communicating at the same Time to a great Number of loaded Bombs and Grenadoes, the Mischief and Terror occasion'd by their Discharge is nor to be expres'd. The Work. men employed in the House were most of them killed, wounded, or buried in the Ruins. The Force of the Shock was to great that a Centry Box, with a Soldier in it, was carried a confiderable Way beyond the Ramparts, and the Body of the poor Man entirely dashed to Pieces. Several other Persons were killed and wounded by the Fall of the Stones which were blown up.

Hanover, Jan. 2. Orders are come from Eng land to compleat all the Regiments of this Electo rate, to putall the Fores and fortified Places in good Repair, to fill the Arfenals and Magazines with Arms and Ammunition, and to make all other neceffary Dispositions for the Security of this Country.

Extract of a better from the Hague, January 6.

"The Humour more than ordinarily at this Time, prevails among all the Powers of Europe to promote Commerce in their respective Dominions, by introducing, protecting, and encouraging Manufactures in them : At the fame who have noy Communication with the Sea, are putting their Marine on a respectable Footing, even the King of Naples talks of putting a Number of Men of War upon the Stocks. The Marine of France has not only repaired the Loffes it foliaised during the late War, but has augmented it's Naval Force fo greatly as to give Umbrage and Jealoufy to it's Neighbours. His Catholic Majeffy has not been behind hand with any Body in this Particular, who, without making much Noife, has caufed fince the Peace, twenty Men of War of the Line to behind helidar formers. The King of Portunt to be built, bendes Frigates. The King of Portu-

gal, in order to make a Figure among the reft, has directed twelve Ships to be built by Way of Beginning. The Powers in the North are in the same Disposition: In Sweden, Norway, and Den mark, they are building Men of War, and it is not without fome Reason that the King of Den mark has forbidden Wood fit for Masts to be fent out of Norway. In short there is no Power that is possessed of a Sea Port, excepting the States General, but what talks of improving it's Marine; and indeed their High Mightinesses behave as if their Navy was in as good a Condition as it was in 1682, when we were able to dispute the Empire of the Sea with the English, and that we even had the Boldness to make Head against them, tho' they were united with France. But, alas! we have now no Van Trumps, nor De Ruyters, fo for what should we keep up a Navy? only to rot in our Ports. We, besides all this, have in such Manner cultivated the Spirit of Peace, that one would imagine we had nothing to fear from our Enemies. As to those who envy us, we are putting ourselves in such a Situation, as not to be the Objects of Envy. However, it cannot be faid, that our Admiralties are affeep; their Colleges regularly affemble, and their Deputies are continually either travelling, or at the Hague; and this is really the Cause of their Finances being exhausted. Since the Re establishment of the Stadtholdership; these Deputies, who are largely paid, have almost always met at this Place, and what have they done? At first nothing at all, and fince the Proposition of making a Free Port, they have contradicted and opposed it. At length, indeed, they confented to but not 'til they promifed it should be a limited Free Port; which will be pretty much the fame as if there had been none at all "

Paris, Jan. 19. The Court has fent an Express to the Commissaries of the Marine at the Western Ports, with Orders to work Day and Night, in order to fit out ten Ships of the Line, five of which are of 80 Guns, one of 70, and four of 60: These Ships are to be ready to put to Sea the latter End of this Month, and are to have a great Number of Troops on board, together with great Supplies of Provisions and Stores; and it is thought they are

to be fent to our American Colonies.

Briftol, November 25. One of the Gent'emen recommended him to one, whom he thought a proper Person for this Parpose; who, on hearing his Story, ordered an Anchor for him, fent him to make his Protest, and provided him with Lodgings .- Soon after he came and defired fome Money, but the Merchant not being fatished with gave of himfelf, dec and told him, that he would fend down Me; Fox with him to Combe, and he should supply him with what was necessary He afterwards applied to the Person where he ledged, who also refu-fed him.—Next Morning early he went to Mr. Fox with the same Request, who lend him two Guineas, and went with him to a Silverinith's Shop, where he bought a Pair of Buckles; and on feeing a Watch he liked, defired Mr. Fox to pair his Word for it, which he did.—Every Thing being ready for their going down to Combe, they went to Dinner togather on the Back; At Dinner

the Captain could not eat, but while Mr. Fox finished his Dinner, he precented to go and get shaved, and immediately went off, leaving his Hat behind him. Mr. Fox imagis ing he was tricked, fearched feveral Houses for him that Evening, but without Effect. Next Morning being pursued by the proper Officers, he was taken about four Miles from this City, and committed to Bridewell. On Monday he was committed to Newgate, after Examination at the Council House, in order to receive a just Reward.

The Count de St. Marían, Minister from the King of Sardinia, has received an Express from Turin, with Dispatches relative to the Negotiation begun at his Sardinian Majesty's Court about the Revertion of the Dominions of the Infant Duke of Parma: Count Migazzi, the Imperial Minister Plen:potentiary, has lately had a Conference with the Spanish Ministry, about the Conditions proposed to the Imperial and Sardinian Courts, in order to make them defit from the Right which the Treaty of Aix La Chapelle gives them to that Reversion: A new Plan for terminating this Affair has made its Appearance in Public: It contains 12 Articles, of which the principal regards the Indemnification to be allowed of those two Courts, especially that of Sardinia; but as the Au-thenticity of this Plan is called in Question, they don't descend to Particulars; However, they tell as enough to shew, that the Brace of Italy is but precarious, after all the Bupgling these fear Years At to fecure it.

NEW.YORK.

April 9. Every Vessel that arrives here from the Bay of Honduras brings Advices of the repeat ed Depredations committed by the Spaniards on our Vessels, and not one goes there without run ning a greater Risk of being taken, than ever they did in the Time of War. By Captaln Green, and Captain Steel, who arrived here last Week from thence, we have an Account of Capt. Menzie, in a fine Brig, and Captain Swan in a Sloop, of and from this Port, being taken by the Spaniards as they were going in, the former the 28th of February, and the latter the first of March last, by a Brig of 14 Carriage, 20 Swivels, and 125 Men. A Gentleman on board Capt. Swan when taken, and now returned with Capt. Green, fays, that both the Vessels, with their Captains, were fent, he believes, to Port Mahoo, from which Place, the Spanish Captain told him, four Vessels of Force were fitting out, with a Design to cruize on the Musqueto Shore: Himself with others had a Boat given them by the Spaniards, in which they ar

We are further acquainted by the Captains Steel, and Green, that they came out in Company with Capt. Guilford, of this Port, bound hither, Capt Johnson in a large Bermudas Sloop, and a small Sloop belonging to some of the neighbouring Places: That the Evening after they failed they all had the Missortune to strike on a Reef, called Turniff, where Capt. Johnson left his Sloop, but the Cargo was likely to be faved; and that the other Vessels received little or no Damage: That a large Spanish Ship of 36 Guns, and another of 20, were expected from the Windward to cruize in the Bay: That they left in the Bay, the Captains Morsley,

Cooper, Serjeant, Wyatt, Davis, and Dickeson, all of this Port, a Ship and a Sloop belonging to Boston, Capt. Spurrier of Philadelphia, and two or three Rhode Island Vessels: That the Spanish small Craft were very troublesome in the Rivers; and that one of them being taken by some of the Eng-I.fh Veffels in the Bay, the Crew were put on board Capt. Clark, in a large Ship of Boston, who a few Days after very civilly dismised them in a Boat, after furnishing them with Arms and Ammunition, which they as civilly made use of against the English in one of the Rivers, in their Way home to Baccalio, marooning and otherways greatly diftreffing the Settlers.

April 16. We are informed by a Veffel in five Days from North Carolina, That a large Ship bound from Liverpool to Virginia, was on the 2d Inflant, cast away at the Entrance of Cape Hatteras Inlet, when both Vessel and Cargo were lost, and the People with the utmost Difficulty making a Raft, after being two Days on the Wreck, they providentially arrived fafe on Shore; one of their Boats stove to Pieces along fide the Ship foon after they hoisted her out, and the other got adrift.

Our Correspondent in London writes, of the 3d of February, via Philadelphia, That notwithstanding the 10,000 Seamen, mention'd under the London Head to be granted for the Services of the enfuing Year, 19,000 Land Forces were ordered to be got re dy early in the Spring: That 40 Men of War were actually put into Commission by the Lords of the Admiralty: That from thele Preparations to increase the British Marine, and the great Difgust the French have taken at the Victory lately obtained over them in the Balt Indies, together with the Resolution that the King of Prusha has assumed, to detain out of the Silesia Loan such a Sum as will repay the Losses his Subjects have suffered by Ships, &c. taken by English Vessels, tho' their Cargoes were contraband by Treaty; the People have great Reason to talk of a War, and which they look upon will certainly be the Issue: And, that from the late great Storms throughout Europe the Infurers of one Office only, have loft upwards of 700,000 l. in less than fifteen Days Time, 200,000 l. by one Spanish Ship; and that a private Office had lost 35,000 l. in the same Space of Time. 'Tis observed that in the Worst of War they did not suffer fo much in fo few Days.

This Letter Writer adds, That 'twas currently reported in London, that the Right Honourable William Shute, Lord Viscount Barrington, either was, or expected to be, appointed Governor of

the Province of New York.

Other Letters likewise received by Way of Phiadelphia from London, confirm the Lois of the Jipiter, Capt. French, of this Place, on the Coaft of France: And that the Master, Part of the Cargo, and Money, arrived at London the 2d of February, in three Vessels obtained for that Purpose.

We have an Account from Morris County in the Jerseys, That about a Fortnight ago, a poor Man and his Son about seven Years of Age, being burning some old Brush in a Swamp, found some Roots hat look'd like Parsnips, which they roasted, and eat : Soon after returning home they found themselves unwell, and died both together in a few Minutes, without any visible Tokens of Hurt.

By Letters from Bermudas dated the 31ft of March last, we are told, that a Day or two before, the Sloop of one Capt. Liborn, fuddenly departed from that Island without the Captain, supposed by the Generality on a pyratical Design: And, that they daily expected the Arrival of their Governor from Home.
