With direction by guest artist Greg Schuh, "Our Town" warmly depicts the small-town daily life of Grover's Corners, N.H., "just over the line from Massachusetts." Through an on-stage narrator, it tells the story of the Webb and Gibbs children as they fall in love, marry and eventually face one of life's darkest moments. Filled with humor and humanity, and described by famous playwright Edward Albee as "the greatest American play ever written," "Our Town" beautifully conveys that "there is something eternal in each of us."

CES Presents the Paul Taylor Dance Company

The masterful choreography of an American legend comes to FSU when FSU's Cultural Events Series presents the Paul Taylor Dance Company on **Tuesday, Oct. 11**, at 7:30 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre. Ticket holders will also have the opportunity to interact

with company members in a postperformance discussion.

The 16-member company will perform three works from the Taylor repertory. "Oh, You Kid!" is an exuberant throwback to the days of vaudeville set to the music of the Paragon Ragtime Ensemble. "Mercuric Tidings" is an energetically joyful work set to the music of Schubert, while the darkly beautiful "Lines of Loss," featuring the music of six composers, sets a more sorrowful mood.

Taylor, one of the most revered American choreographers of the 20th and 21st centuries, helped to forge America's indigenous art form: modern dance. At age 81, Taylor continues to win praise for the vitality of his recent works as well as his classics. Since its inception over 50 years ago, the Paul Taylor Dance Company has become a celebrated and prominent member of the international dance community.

In support of the public performance, a free Arts for Enrichment event will be offered to community members. On Monday, Oct. 10, students of dance will have the opportunity to take a master class with one of the Paul Taylor company members. The class in modern dance technique is suitable for late beginner or early intermediate-level dance students. Space is limited and reservations are required. Free Bio-medical Screenings!

FSU's popular student health and wellness initiative is hosting another round of annual bio-medical screenings this fall. Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles (CHILL) will ask students to participant in their biomedical screenings **Thursday**, **Oct. 13**, from 8 a.m. to noon each day. Students will be able to have their blood pressure, body mass index, body composition, blood sugar and cholesterol levels checked at no cost, all while earning CHILL prizes.

To complete the screening, students will need to refrain from eating or drinking anything but water for at least eight hours before the screening. The screenings involve having a vial of blood drawn to check the blood sugar and cholesterol levels.

Each student screened will be eligible to receive follow-up care at Brady Health Center, including free consultations with nursing staff and the CHILL dietician.

In exchange for the student's time, each participant will receive a complimentary breakfast and a free CHILL T-shirt, and will be entered in drawings for other free CHILL prizes. The first 25 students in line each morning for the screenings will also receive a special bonus CHILL prize.

To be eligible for the screening, students must be at least 18 and not have any previous diagnosis concerning their blood sugar or heart health. Students who do not qualify for this screening are encouraged to contact Brady Health Center to make an appointment to have the screening performed at a later date.
