



## SHORT SERMON

SUNDAY HALF-HOUR

By Rev. Dr. Wilson.

What Do We Know of God?

For when God made promise to Abraham, because he could swear by no greater, he swore by Himself .cebrews v. 13.

No man ever had more opportunty of seeing God in nature and hisory than you and I have. God was no nearer to our fathers than to us Nay, our growing knowelge of God's work has brought us nearer to Him. He has let us into some of His secrets. If there is a veil that hides and in Nature from us, it is in our eyes, over our minds, and not in Nature. The Christian thought, then, of God, first and foremost, is that God is one-that there is some one Purpose, Mind, Personality, immeasurable, inconceivable; and that we ourselves, like all we see, are a part of the expression of this Being which we call by the name of God; the unknown origin and sustainer of matter and life and mind and soul. We think of Him best as the Father; that is our creed. . . We are very slowly learning by experience—that best of teachers, who charges very high for what she teaches-the lesson that the Jews had part!y learnt, that God rules the world of men in righteousness; that injustice, greed, lust, extravagance and ambition bring misery all round; and we are very slowly acquiring that Godlike and brotherly love of men and sympathy in their sorrow and sin, which make perfect happiness impossible for men till sorrow and sin are fought and conquered. We are learning that the only path to pro-

gress is progress in goodness.

But we learn about God in a second way. There is that marvelous figure in world history, Jesus Christ to whom the eyes of men have turned for centuries, as they have turned to no cne else; on Whom they now rest with ever-growing intensity of hore. What of Him? Have we any warrant besides the words of Christ H mseli, reported in St. John's Gosre', for believing that it is God Whom Christ reveals? Our Lord Himself makes answer: "If I bear witness of myself, my witness is not t.ue. There is another that beareth witness of me." The answer is 'Yes." Christ reveals God to us. Just as Nature compels the recognition of a cause behind it and we name the Cause God, so Christ compels us to think how He came to be. We can know much of Christ, and the world has learned by experience that He is-the Teacher, the Inspirer, the Healer of Sorrows, the Saviour from the Radiator of Love Knowing all this and that there is none like Him, we can say, from our own exerionce that it can be nothing less than God Himself which is manifested in Christ. God is our name for the highest we can conceive, and this is what Christ manifests. The more we know of Christ the more certain we are that it is God and nothing less than God whom Christ reveals. His first disciples learned who He was in just the same way. They lived with Him, talked with Him for years, and at last came the irresistible conc'usion. Not till the end of His days on earth did He teach them by direct words. He let them see Him. and they learnt the lesson. "He that hath seen Christ hath seen the Father"-that is, hath seen all that

the Father can so man'fest. . . . Nature tells us something of God. but leaves, untold all that we most want to know. The life and spirit of Christ tells us far more, and that is why His first followers hailed Him. as the revelation of God; in Christ Whom we see, is shown someth ng of the God we cannot see. When St. Paul tells us that God was in Christ, like that of a God in Nature, is nearer and clearer to us than it was to any previous generation. Christ stands out to-day in firmer outline. less obscured by theological scaffolding than ever before. We see Him in the sublimity of what He realy was. Trinity Sunday comes year by year to remind us that God was in Christ, and that without this revelaton our knowledge of God is quite 'incompiete\_

Statisticians contend that a few more centuries will see the extincdon of the vast quantities of coal stored beneath the earth's surface inventors will then be confronted with the problem of supplying other fuel for manufacturing and other purposes. As far as providing power for manufacturing there need be no fear, as the waterways of the world afford a means of furnishing unlimited power. A very simple example of utilizing water for generating power is shown here. This is a submerged power plant, which is located within a space covered and protected by a dam. A feed pipe or conduit leads from the upstream side of the dam into the lower plant, the water flowing through the pipe and



escaping through a suitable outlet. The water in its course through the power plant can obviously be utilized by the use of proper machinery to furnish electrical power.

Members of British Government, All told, the government of England consists of only forty-six persons, and the transfer of political control from one party to another directly affects only these forty-six persons and a few great functionaries of state, whose duties are purely ornamental.

In all, not one hundred persons are concerned by a change of administration. Postmasters, government employes of every class, from messengers to ambassadors and colonial administrators, are not disturbed by the transfer of power. Clearly no political party in England can count

upon patronage as a political asset. The principle on which the parliamentary system of England is founded is the rule of the majority, and the majority elects to surrender its power to one man-the premier. The power of the majority is so strictly recognized that the rules of the House of Commons deprive the minority of all power to initiate or shape legislation.

When a majority of the electorate of the kingdom has sanctioned a policy represented by a political party, that party is given free hand to put its policy into operation. In all legislatures the power of the majority is the control which it exertheir money. See then how absolute is the power of the prime minister in his command of the treasury .-Appleton's Magazine.

American and English Advertising. The Englishman is too ready to look upon advertising as a mere adjunct to his business, and therefore to treat it with scant attention: the American realizes that it is an essential, either making himself a master of its arts or employing the best expert advice that he can buy. Says the Fortnightly Review. The Englishman believes that he can obtain the service of a first class advertising man for the salary of a chief clerk; the American will pay a price which would be startling if offered to the manager of a business in this country. The Englishman is slipshod; the American spends time, thought and money over every detail. The Englishman aims at what he thinks will prove good enough; the American is not content with anything that he believes can be bettered. The American leaves no stone unturned in order to spend his advertising allotment to the best a dvantage; he means to make every cent tell. The Englishman too frequently works at haphazard, many pounds of his expenditure fails the blame being laid by him on advertising instead of on the advertisements. The American is ever seeking to discover new ways of applying old means, new methods of making his advertisements more attractive and more compelling.

To Measure Natural Gas. When natural gas was first brought into use in America there seemed to be a general idea that the supply was inexhaustible. It was sold at low rates and usually without measure ment. This method encouraged waste in the consumption of gas, and was shortly abandoned by the larger companies. To-day nearly all consumption is sold by measurement. It is believed that the time has now come when it is possible to procure statistics of the quantity of gas consumed, and next year this will be undertaken. The method will give such figures in the future that a more direct knowledge will be obtained of the capacity of gas areas to maintain a commercial supply of gas for a certain number of years.-Iron Age.

OPEN AIR PARLIAMENTS.

They still Meet Yearly in Switzerland on a Sunday,

The open air parliament is an old custom which still survives in some of the Swiss cantons. Appenzell has two such bodies, one in the Roman Catholic part of the canton, the other in the Protestant end. Both meet on the last Sunday in April. The President is escorted into the

open square facing the Rathaus or town hall. In front of the platform where he takes his place the burghers stand bareheaded. They take an cath to vote "for the good of the land and the avoidance of evil." The members of the cantonal go-

vernment are elected by a show of hands. Then follow discussions about roads and various new regulations. The proceedings are orderly and dignified, not unworthy the set-ting of the picture, which is made by the encircling mountains.

The Glarner parliament meets

annually on the first Sunday in May. Canton Glarus, too, has had its religious wars. But in this district the two religions did not separate as in other places. It was agreed by contract in 1623 that each denomination should have a separate government, but with a common open air parliament.

Perhaps in no town in the world. says the Review of Reviews, do Protestants and Catholics get on so well together as in little Glarus. There is but one church, belonging to both Protestant and Catholic parishes, and services are held for both every Sunday morning, one after the other. At 10 o'clock on the morning of the first Sunday in May a detachment of smart infantry and a brass band accompany the President and the members of his government from the Town Hall to the mediaeval square by the schoolhouse.

Here the President, Chief Justice and two secretaries take their places on the platform which the villagers have erected in the centre of a huge circle marked by tiers of benches. The background of quaint old houses, towering precipices, and beyond the snowy ramps of the Alps, is magnificently picturesque.

### Dangers of Hypnotism.

In a class lecture on pyschology delivered at Harvard University not long ago, Professor Munsterberg warned his students against making any hypnotic experiments. "Hypnotism practised as a parlor amusement is accompanied with grave dangers to the physical and moral health of the subject and is nothing less than a crime," he said. "While I recognize hypnotism as a valuable aid to the methodical study of psychology, I do not believe that hypnotism should be practiced for experimental purposes. The only time there can be a legitimate use of hypnotism is when it is used by an authorized physician to benefit the health of a patient, when the patient has given his consent. It should be used under no other circumstances. Not that there is anything mysterious about it. It is nothing more than a strong manifestation of what we call attention, and is to be studied by the psychologist under that head. The mechanism of hypnotism lies in the suppression of certain ideas, feelings or emotions, that are antagonistic to those suggested to the subject. His mind is not a blank; the only ideas suppressed are those that are antagonistic to the suggestion that has been given him. There is nothing about it that is any more strange than the condition of sleep or the power of attention. It is merely a working on the imagination in a certain direction, and has nothing to



AN ORDINANCE to provide for a Tax on Dogs and Bitches, and the manner of collecting said Tax, and for killing of Dogs and Bitches on which said tax is not paid.

Section I. Be it enacted by the Mayor and The Forty-Second Year Opens Council of Salisbury; That all Dogs and Bitches within the corporate limits of Salisbury. Maryland, shall be subject to a tax of One Dollar [\$1,00] for each and every Dog, and Two Dollars [\$2.00] for each and every Bitch. payable to the Mayor and Council of Salisbury or the Police thereof, on or before the First day of August in each and every year. Section II. And be it further enacted and

ordained: That upon the payment of said tax as set forth in section I of this ordinance, by the owner or owners of any Dog or Bitch. that the said Mayor and Council of Salisbury. or the Police thereof shall deliver to the said owner or owners so paying said tax, a metal tag stamped with the year for which it is is sued, and said owner or owners of said dog or bitch on which said tax has been paid, shall cause said tag so furnished them to be affixed around the neck of each dog or bitch by the means of a string or collar; and any dog or bitch found running at large upon any of the streets or highways of the city of Salishury without such tag affixed around its neck as Rev. T. H. Lewis, D. D., LL. D., President. aforesaid shall be killed by the Mayor and Council of Salisbury or its authorized agent, r the Policemen of said city of Salisbury, Section III. And be it further enacted and

ordained: That any person or persons owning dog or bitch in said city of Salisbury and re fusing or neglecting to pay the tax as provi ded in Section I of this Ordinance within twenty days after notice thereof by the Mayor and Council of Salisbury, or its agent, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and on onviction before a Justice of the Peace of said city be fined not less than one dollar, no more than ten dollars, and stand committee to the County Jail until fine and costs are paid. Section IV. And be it further enacted and rdained: That this Ordinance shall take ef fect from the date of its passage.

And be it further enacted and ordained: That each and every dog or bitch (when not on, or in its owners enclosure or cossession) running at large in the City o Salisbury shall have securely put on, a good substantial and strong wire basket muzzle inclosing the whole mouth of said dog or bitch so as to effectually prevent said dog or bitch from biting or snapping, and the Mayor and Council of Salisbury, or its duly authorized agent, or the Policemen of said City of Sails bury, shall be judges as to whether said muz zie is safe and effectual, and the decision of either shall be final and conclusive,

Section III. And be it further enacted and ordained: That if any dog or bitch be found running at large in the City of Salisbury without being muzzled as provided in Section 11 of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Poicemen of the City of Salisbury, or any duly authorized agent of the mayor and Council of Salisbury to kill said dog or bitch.

Section IV. And be it further enacted and ordained: That any owner or owners of any dog or bitch who shall suffer said dog or bitch to run at large in the City of Salisbury, without being muzzled as provided in Section II of this ordinance, shall on conviction before Justice of the Peace in the City of Salisbury be fined not more than ten dollars and stand committed to the county jail until said fine and costs are paid.

Section V. And be it further enacted and ordained: That this ordinance shall take effect the 25th day of July, 1908. The above ordinance was passed by the Council of Salisbury at its meeting July 14th.

One horse can pull as much over roads thus treated, as two horses can over roads filled with sand as ours is. Here then is the saving of fifty per cent in horse flesh. And there is a like saving in point of time; one can get over a good road twice as fast as they can over a poor road. Now my suggestion is this. Let us as an experiment, take a mile of our worst road and cover the track with pine shats. How many farmers who are compelled to use this road, are willing to contribute one cart load of shats, and at some given time before fodder saving comes on, will haul this load and spread it upon the road? It is thought that a cart load will go den's Pants : \$5.98 Pants, \$4; at least twenty feet. This is a feasible and comparatively inexpensive thing. 

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



AGRICULTURE FOR WOMEN.

The Countess of Warwick Propounded the Practical Scheme.

Some nine or ten years ago I propounded my scheme for the teaching and training of women in the "lighter branches of agriculture." Before going any further, let us see what these branches are. Horticulture (always the favorite), dairy work, poultry farming, market gardening, fruit bottling, jam-making, and bee-keeping are the principal ones. At first the press and the public were unanimous in crying down the projected scheme, the old cries of "taking the men's places," "work not fit for women," etc. ad. lib., were heard on all sides; but to all this Lady Warwick turned a deaf ear. Having "put her hand to the plough," she had no intention of turning back. Just nine years ago she opened her campaign by establishing a hostel for women students in connection with the Agricultural College at Reading, the practical work being done in the grounds of the hostel, the theoretical part at the college. So successful was the venture that although several other houses were added, in became very clear that larger accommodations were needed, and at the present day the large Agricultural College at Studley, in Warwickshire, is the outcome of that small beginning. Here women are taught the various subjects they take up, from the very rudiments to the ligest point of efficiency.

In horticuture, botany, chemistry, entomology, and book-keeping are taught. In dairy work, agriculture, chemistry, and bacteriology are added to the botany, and so on through

all the subjects. Other colleges and chools have sprung up entirely for women, e. g., Swanley Agricultural College, Miss Wolseley's School of Gardening at Glynde, and Miss Crooke's School at Bredon's Norton. Here then is enough to show that there is every facility for women to fit themselves for this work by training at one or other of these colleges. I say training advisedly, for in horticulture, above all the "lighter branches." a real preparation is necess ary, for it is difficult for us to realize how very limited in variety were the plants, fruits, and vegetables which the old English gardener had to choose from. Now, however the tra-ditional and haphazard methods of cultivation have been superseded by a reasonable scheme of observation and research, e.g., rotation of crops and application of scientific principles of manuring, and so much knowledge and attention has been brought to bear upon even the primitive fruits and vegetables that their size, fertility, and edible qualities have been improved out of all recognition while the great principles of hybridisation, selection, and re-selection have entirely revolutionized

the culture of flowers. The work of gardening for women certainly offers exceptional advantages, for it is carried on in the pure open country, under the most healthy conditions, instead of in the closely- confined offices in our towns and cities, where so many women workers are found. At the present time the value of "fresh air" is being more and more demonstrated by those interested in the hygenic aspect of life. For girls whom lack of occupation has produced "nerves" here is a calling where "nerves" are unknown, where early rising, and steady, regular, and interesting work soon put all such ideas to the rightabout, for in that strenuous life, which strives by the courageous facing of all difficulties, to wrest from Mother Earth her glorious and beautiful dencies" have no place.



By Liberal Education Aids to Reclaim Youths

SECURE WORK FOR THEM

Achieved—Boys Become Efficient

Workmen and Give Satisfaction to Their Employers.

The Borstal system owes its inception to a report of the British Committee on Prisons in 1895, which stated that "under the present system numbers of young prisoners came out of prison in a condition as bad, or worse, than that in which they came," and to the fact that the suggestions of reform then proposed were carried into effect in 1902 at Borstal prison, near Rochester, Kent, in the neart of the "Dickens Country." It deals es-sentially with the reclamation of the wayward boy and girl, young offenders, technically known as "juvenile adults." Under the British governmental prison administration certain selected cases, in which the offender's age is between 16 and 21, whose sentence reaches twelve months is sent to Borstal prison.

The object of the Borstal system is to save the young from a career of crime by combining deterrent effect with a radical cure, and as a primary step the prisoner is given an indus-trial and educational training to fit him for earning his living honestly on his release from prison.

It may be described as an advanced reformatory, 16 being, in English law, the age of "criminal majority," where prisoners can no longer be placed in the state reformatory schools. Upon his arrival at Borstal the

prisoner has a bath and is medically examined. He is then taken before the governor, who explains to him the operation of the system and the benefits which he may gain by good conduct. The prisoner is taught field work, or carpentry, or blacksmithing, or tinsmithing, or cooking and bakery. He begins in the ordinary grade, is adjudged satisfactory, he is promoted to the special grade, in which

he wears a blue dress. His day is arranged as follows: He rises at 6 o'clock, washes, dresses, makes his fed, sweeps his cell and cleans his tinware and utensils; 6:30, breakfast, consistingt of a loaf of wholemeal bread, butter, and a pint of gruel; 7:30, chapel; after chapel, parade for physical drill; after drill, working parties are allotted to their various industries; 11:30, parade, when those who wish to see the governor or the medical officer fall out. nen dinner, consisting of haricots. potatoes, and meat and soup alter-

Between dinner and 1:15 the prisoner may read books supplied by the library, or knit. Every lad is taught to knit. At 1:15 work begins again, and ends at 5:30, when a supper of bread and cocoa is served. After sup-per, until 8, the ordinary grade may read or knit; the special grade are given, two or three times a week, an hour's recreation in the schoolroom, under the supervision of the chaplain. Prisoners whose educational attainment does not reach the third standard have two hours instruction, and those who have passed that standard one hour. Personal cleanliness is rigidly enforced. One bath a week is compulsory and an extra bath is optional.

The necessary adjunct of the Borstal system is provided by the voluntary effort of the Borstal Association. is the business of the association to take charge of prisoners upon their discharge. But its work begins in the prison itself, where the lads are visited, their private circumstances are ascertained, and arrangements are set on foot to provide them with employment upon their release. On their arrival from prison, lodgings are found for them, unless they have a good home to which they may go, and arrangements for their employment are concluded. The lads are then constantly visited by the agent of the

The association points out that the uccess of the system must depend in the last resort upon the willing employers to engage these lads, and that their engagement is the of valuable service to the state and appears to employers of labor enroll themselves as honorary members of the association. Mr Jackson's famous interview given to the Baltimore News is still fresh in the minds of all and in view of that acknowledgement of use of money in elections, and past charges, a smile of incredulity lights up the face of many when they hear of his running on an Anti-Bribery platform. There is hope in the minds of many however, that the platform is not intended as a mere blind, and its only intention being to cater in empty, meaning phrases to the strong public sentiment that has been aroused upon this subject; but that the promises made will be kept. If Mr. Jackson sits on the "Barrel" himself and refuses to be "tapped" but little money will be spent.

### Famous Pocketbook Found.

A pooket book which once held the writ on which the notorious Patty Cannon was arrested and brought to the Maryland and Delaware line before her committment to the Georgetown jail, where she committed suicide by taking poison, has come to tight. The pocketbook is in the possession of Jacob N. Wilson, who lives near Eldorado, Md., a few miles west of this town, and was the property of his father, the late Jacob

Wilson, who died in 1861. Jacob Wilson was the constable who arrested Patty and escorted her to the line between the states, where she came over to the Delaware people. The pocketbook, however, has not remained all the time in the possession of the Wilson family. Two hours after Mr. Wilson, the leder, died in 1861 it disappeared, and with it went \$350 which it contained. Mrs. Wilson offered a reward of \$25 for its return on recovery, but the reward was not a attractive as its contents and it came not back, nor was it heard of until a few days ago, when its present owner was notified by the son of a gentleman who recently died that he had the pocketbook and that this I father had requested that it be returned to Mr. Wilson. Mr. Wilson was further notified that the pockketbook would be at the Federalsburg. Md. bank at a certain time, and promptly at the time named he found it there.

The pocketbook is in excellent condition and shows how substantial were the materials used and the work manship of those early days. Written on the interior in a strong legible hand is the name, Jacob Wilson, and the date, February 9, 1828.



## SHORT SERMON

SUNDAY HALF-HOUR By Theo. L. Cuyler, D. D. [Brooklyn, N. Y.]

Holding fast the faithful word as hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and convince the gainsayers .-Titus, 1, 9.

Tighten the Buckles.

It is related that a cavaly officer, with a small number of followers ves pursued by an enemy who were in large force. He discovered that his saddle-girth was becoming loose: his comrades were urging h m to greater speed, but he dismounted, tightened the loose buckle, and then rode on, amid the shouts of his companions. The broken buckle would nave cost him his safety-perhaps his life. His wise delay ensured his salety.

This incident suggests several spiritual lessons. A very obvious one !s that the Christian who is in such haste to rush off to his business in the morning that he does not spare any time for his Bible or for pracer. is quite likely to "ride for a fall" before sundown. One of the most endnent Christian merchants of New York told me that he never met his family at the breakfast table und he had had a refreshing intervie with his God over his Bible and his knees. His family worship afterward was not only a tightening the buckle for himself, but was gracious means of safety for in household

One of the greatest dangers the days is that too many children are growing up even in nominal Christian families-with sadly lax sentiments in many vital directions. They have loose ideas-about God's day and Cod's Book, and very loose practices Es to attendance upon God's wors'ity They start off in life with a broken buck e and when the stress of temptation comes, they are easly thrown to the ground. Fathers and mothers owe to their children as well, as to themselves the duty of tightening the saddle-girth. Not only do familles suffer from laxity in parental government and godly parental training, but I fear that so ne congregations suffer from laxity in the teachings of their ministers. No church is very likely to rise higher than its own pulpit. If the shepherd of the nock holds loose doctrines; if he is so "liberal" that he gives away, or throws away, vital truths; if he lets down too many bars that the Bible wisely puts un, then it is no wonder that the flock wanders off into the ways of worldliness. There is no danger in these days of excessive strictness or of "Puritanical" principals or practices The danger is just from the opposit direction. Would it not be a w thing if some pastors who see to: their churches are being overtaken and demoralled by worldly temptations, should call a hait and tighten

The incident at the head of this brief article has a very close application to the maintenance of a vigorous happy and useful Christian !! [9 The very word "religion" is de rived from a Latin word that signifles "to bind fast." True religio: means the being bound fast to the Lord Jesus Christ in constant dependence on Him and obedience to Him. How to keep up a health spiritual life is the daily problem with every Christian. The parable of the buckle gives a hint. Trie plety is never self-sustaining. We only can "do all things through Christ that strengthened us." Will out Him, nothing; with Him everything. Therefore it is that our Bible exhorts us with prodigious emphasis to "pray without cessing. When we relax in this vitally imports ant duty, the enemies will soon over take us, and overmatch us, and least us in the dust. Brethren and and ters, tighten the prayer buckle.

SELLING SHOES IN BRITAIN,

American Salesman Tells of the Multiple Stores System. The method selling shoes in Great

Betain has been improved to such un extent within recent years that they are just a little bit shead of us now,' said the foreign representative of one of the largest shoe manufacturers in this country. "The shoe business there is a good deal like the clear business here, and the benefits to the public are many

"The big English shoe stores are called multiple shops, and are managed from a central depot, which is always located in a great shoe manufacturing town, such as Lelcester... because the head of the multiple store wants to be in close touch with the manufacturer. An order from the multiple is naturally large, and the head of it, who always has cash to settle his order in full, is often able to squeeze the manufacturer below the cost price.

"Sometimes the manufacturer fails for that reason, but the only one to Co., only, and for sale by all leading drug- auffer is the leather man. The multiple store man has made a good bargain, the people buy their shoes cheaper and they are not inclined to \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* waste any sympathy on the manufacturer or the tanner.

> "The stores are well managed, but from an American point of view the managers are poorly paid. These stores have worked wonders with the British style of dressing shoe store windows.

> "Not long ago it was common to see the old brass rods with men's and women's shoes placed side by side soldier fashion, each bearing a plain ticket. To-day the shoe shop windows rank with the millinery stores in the matter of displays,

It is interesting to note also that in spite of British conservatism American styles are now being widely imitated. At a recent gathering of shoe men in London a man who is at the head of one of the biggest shoe distributing concerns openly said that America now led the (ashlen in shoes as France does in millinery. At present the modified form of the bulldog toe is worn by all young bloods, and the newest season's samples all appear to have been made on lasts copied from American models.

"I am not surprised at the success of the multiple shoe stores in Britain. Before they went into business the average shoe store was a dark, dismal, evil smelling hole, and the storekeeper was in keeping with his business. The quantity of stock was insufficient for the cus'omer's demands and the smart fittings of today for the various sizes of shoes was unknown

"That is all changed now, and although many a small retailer has been squeezed out of business it has improved the trade, and now there is intense competition between the big concerns themselves."

Old Cannon a Clock Weight, The most unique clock weight in Maine is that of the Baptist Church at Cherryfield, an old smooth bore cannon. The cannon was one of the old smooth bore type and was brought by Gleason R. Campbell from Boston on one of the return trips of lumber vessels. It was brought salutes as the stirring days of the civil war were at hand. After announcing many Union victories during the war, at the surrender of Lee in 1865, it was taken out for a final and great salute. Robert I. For 30 years it did clock duty, until 1903, when it once more received a baptism of fire and fell in the ruins of the church conflagration that December. When the new clock was installed in the new church building ir 1906, once more the old cannon mounted the tower to do clock duty.

ordained: That upon the payment of said tax as set forth in section I of this ordinance, by the owner or owners of any Dog or Bitch that the said Mayor and Council of Se or the Police thereof shall deliver to the said owner or owners so paying said tax, a metal tag stamped with the year for which it is is sued, and said owner or owners of said dog or bitch on which said tax has been paid, shall cause said tag so furnished them to be affixed around the neck of each dog or bitch by the neans of a string or collar; and any dog or bitch found running at large upon any of the streets or highways of the city of Salisbury rithout such tag affixed around its neck as aforesaid shall be killed by the Mayor and Council of Salisbury or its authorized agent, r the Policemen of said city of Salisbury, Section III. ordained: That any owner or owners of any log or bitch who shall suffer said dog or bitch o run at large in the City of Salisbury, without being muzzled as provided in Section II of this ordinance, shall on conviction before Justice of the Peace in the City of Salisbury be fined not more than ten dollars and stand ommitted to the county jail until said fine and costs are paid. 

Many Experiments With the New Anaesthesia.

FIVE YEARS

en Luduc, of France-Gone Far Along the Path of Experimentation-Luduc Twice Applied the Current to Himself.

Important experiments in the use of electricity as an anaesthetic have been made recently before the Soc ety of Chemical Surgery in the laboratory of experimental surgery in connection with the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Columbla University.

The work here has been inspired by Dr. Stephane Leduc of the College of Medicine, Nantes, France, who has gone far along the path of experimentation having twice aplied the current to himself.

The current which produces the "electric sleep" as the French call it, is different from any pre-lously known. There is a special apparstus for its application, the principal feature of which is an interrupter by means of which a maximum of more than 6,000 interruptions a minute may be given. The current is of low tension and constant direction—that is to say, a current which acts for a time, ceases, recommences and so on by regular inter-

As soon as the interruptions cease the return to consciousness is immediate, and this return has no relation whatever in appearance or sensation to the return from unconsciousness induced by present anaes-

Electric sleep comes almost immediately within a minute or two after the current is turned on, while those who have witnessed the administration of chloroform, ether or ethyl chloride know that it is a process sometimes taking half an hour or more, dependent upon the resisting power and general condition of the nationt. Experiments for local anaesthesia

by means of this interrupting current, which have formed part of the experiments at Columbia, were completely successful. It was shown that by placing an electrode over the medium nerve in the wrist the whole body fed by that nerve was affected. The return to the "norm" of impaired circulation. Dogs were used in these experiments, rather than cats, rabbits or squirrels, for the reason that the dog's nervous system closely resembles the human, and its intelligence is of help in that it would show some resentment if it suffered and would run away from a further experimenting. Some of the dogs have been on the operating table five or six times, and do not apparently mind it in the least. So far the one weak link in the

chain of successful experimenting has been in the matter of respiration, the interrupting current when applied with too great intensity, leaving the heart action perfectly free, but paralyzing the breathing an effect which has to be met by producing an artificial respiration, which is done by the application of another electric current.

All of the physicians at the labor. atory agree that a new era in surgery is at hand when the old time horrors of the operating table will be Do more.

"There is no branch of medicine and surgery that it will not reach," they say. "The insomnia that comes from excessive pain, the terrible Leuralgic spasms, the pangs of child-tirth even—the attendant pains of which have always been one of the reproaches of medical science-all these and more will be relieved. When the anaesthetic properties of chloroform were announced, its discoverer was looked upon as a savior, and at his death a tablet was erected to his memory in Westminster Abbey; but just as we look back now with horror at the idea that the old time palliative to pain could be offered, so shortly we will look back with the same horror at the idea of using any of the present anaesthetics and drugs that are employed."

Optics in Painting. In order to avoid undesirable chemical mixtures, a few painters nowadays resort to the rather interesting expedient of putting little dabs of different colors alongside of other (instead of combining them) in such a way as to produce the requisite optical effect when the picture is viewed from a distance. In other words, reliance is had in the principle of optics, the tints being fused by the eye.

Incidentally to the scientific exami-

nation of a vauable picture, resort is sometimes had nowadays to the expedient of cutting from one of its edges a tiny strip about a millimeter in width and a couple of inches ter in width and a couple of inches long, which is thereupon divided into a number of smaller pieces for microscopie examination. When one of these pieces is placed beneath the microscope it may be observed in cross section, the touches made by the painter appear in parallal bands laid on in chronological order. HOW ANARCHISTS MAKE BOMBS.

Manufacture Them Out of All Sorts of Articles and Utensils.

The bombs employed by anarchiste nowadays are very simple contrivances, as compared with the elaborate "infernal machines" of thirty or forty years ago.

That this is so is largely due to Herr Most, who, in his "Scient'fic Revolutionary Warfare," taught his disciples how to manufacture bombs out of all sorts of articles and utensils in everyday use, from saucepans to sardine tins.

The grenade that exploded prematurely recently at the unemployed demonstration in New York, for instance, was constructed by Silberstein out of one of the brass balls which were screwed on to the posts of his bedstead. Morral's bomb, which slew twenty

three people and injured nearly 100 others at the Spanish King's wedding two years ago, was merely an ordinary glass water bottle. It was, Lowever, filled with nitroglycerin, the most powerful explosive known to science, and the basis of dynamite.

The French Anarchist Vaillant utilized a small kettle wherewith to manufacture the bomb that he afterward exploded with terrible effect in the chamber of deputies at Paris. A saucepan filled with blasting gelatin sufficed Emile Henry, Vaillant's chosen comrade, who by its aid suc-.ceeded in simultaneously blowing to pieces six unfortunate policemen.

Ravachol used upon one occasion a metal fuse-box filled with fulminate of mercury, and upon another a glass ink bottle with a screw top, in order to destroy life. The bomb which Bourdin carried to Greenwich Para in 1894, intending to blow up the observatory there, but which exploded prematurely and killed him, was just an ordinary piece of iron piping, with a couple of roughly made caps screwed on at either end.

### An Elephant's Shoe.

Kartoom, the young male Soudan elephant in New York city's wild animal preserve in the Bronx, is a much puzzled pachyderm just now. AB a matter of fact Kartoom ought to be very proud, but he isn't. Shoes may be all right for some elephants, but Kartoom is a "close-to-nature" pachyderm and is clearly opposed to all modern improvements. In the heart of the African jungle he found no need for shoes, and doesn't sce any more reason for pinching his 'tootsy-wootsies" with them now

Notwithstanding his objections, however, Kartoom now has securely affixed to his right hind foot a large leather and metal shoe, the second elephant's shoe on record since the beginning of history, so far as known. Some time ago, Dr. Blair, the animal's family doctor, found Congo, the pigmy elephant, toeing in badly and invented a shoe which cured him of the habit. Recently the Bronx Park M. D., found that Kartoom, as a result of long lack of exercise was developing a weak ankle and gave a rush order to the Zoo blacksmith, for a special shoe for the Soudan elephant also.

The shoe instead of causing Kartoom any pride or delight, only excited his disgust and anger. He stayed awake all night industriously trying to dislodge the newfangled contraption with his trunk, but the soological bootmakers had done their work well and at sun up Kartoom

## WE HAVE 150 RELIGIONS

Varieties of Christian Worship in America.

INTERESTING CUSTOMS.

Gains-Episcopalians Early Established-Congregationalists and Edu-

In Americal there are 150 different denominations of the Christian religion. The diversity of thought runs the gamut from the Mormons, who believe in plural marriages, to the Shakers, who do not believe in marriage at all: from the Episcopalians tive Baptists, who will not use an organ or other instrument in their services: from the elaborate masses of the Catholics to the silent meetings of the Quakers; to the high salaried ministers of the Unitarians.

The Presbyterians have had long and honorable association with America. The historian Bancroft says: The first voice publicly raised in America to dissolve all connection with England came not from the Puritans of New England, nor from the Dutch of New York, nor the Planters of Virginia, but from the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians."

The only clergyman in the Continental Congress was the Rev. John Witherspoon, a Presbyterian minister and signer of the Declaration of Independence. The battle of King's Mountain was won by Presbyterians, led by Colonel Campbell. At present there are more than

9,000 Presbyterian churches in the United States, with nearly 1,200,000 communicants. The Christian Scientist Church is remarkable in more ways than one. Its founder, Mary Baker G. Eddy, was already an old women when she gathered around her a few followers in a little room in New England.

At first the adherents of the sew faith pledged \$10 a week for the support of their leader. Without considering the merits of Christian Actence, it must be said that the sect has had a phenominal growth. More than 400,000 copies of Mrs. Eddy's text book are in circulation. According to the last estimate there are about 1,000 different organizations in the country, with a total membership of about 100,000.

The Congregational Church was born in England in 1606, when a handful of people met at the home of one William Brewster to discuss freedom of thought. They agreed to leave England and came to America in 1620. These people were the famous Pilgrims of American history.

The first foreign missionary society in this country was founded by Congregational minister, and by 1647 they had a school in every township in Masachusetts that had as many as fifty families. And they have kept the lead in educational matters in the United States from that time to


Unitarianism was brought to America by the Pilgrims and the Puritans. The great leader of this faith in America was Channing, and Edward Everett Hale, chaplain of the Senate, is doubtless the most prominent present day adherent. Unitarians are somewhat indifferent

to numerical strength and have never taken a census of their followerrs. It may be said in general that there are about 500 churches in affiliation with the national Unitarian conference, and about 100,000 people more or less actively connected with the faith in this country. The majority of their churches are

in large cities, and they are said to pay higher salaries for ministerial talent than any other denomination in America, unless it be the Reformed Jews. Members of this faith say they believe the Unitarians are gathering adherents more rapidly than any other sect in the United States, excepting possibly the Christian Scien-



### TEMPERANCE TOPICS.

An Appalling Whiskey Record.

A Pittsburg daily paper recently published the following awful indictment: King Alcohol wielded his power over many thousand inhabitants of Allegheny county during the past year, causing depredations, crime and poverty unprecedent-

"Statistics from the Allegheny county jail, the workhouse and charitable institutions show that the intemperate use of alcoholic beverage is on a marked increase in Pittsburg and vicinity. The number of cases of insanity due to the drink curse during the past twelve months have, caused an addition to be placed to the asylums; new wings for the care to several local hospitals and both city and county homes are caring for more insane persons and paupers, whose condition is due to alcoholism, than at any time in their history.

"What shall be dene to aid the drunkard and establish sobriety in hundreds of homes, is the question paramount in the minds of prisonkeepers, philanthropists and others whol direct the work of charity. Scientific methods have been used at the jail, at the almshouse, the Allegheny City Home and the hospitals ddress, Binghamton, N. Y., on every to unfetter slaves from the power of lcohol, but reports from these institutions show no headway.

The report of Warden W. J. Lewis, of the county jail, shows that over .000 persons were committed to the institution last year for drunkenness and offenses committed through alcoholic influence.

The exact number of persons who had sentences at the jail for drunk-The purchaser can secure contract of the persons committed on charges of disorderly conduct were under the influence of liquor when arrested. Warden Lewis said that fully 90 per cent of the summary conviction cases received at the jail last year owed their downfall to drunkenness. The jail is now overcrowded with prisoners serving light sentences for drunknness. Some of these persons are confined to padded cells and a few wear straight jackets.



The struggle of the ages has been between the industrial and the military armies: the one to shake off, the other to hold down.

Does the Bible give us no choice between these? Has it no counse which may not be balanced by other counse, to enable us to decide? Is it a matter of indifference in the Scriptures whether the weapon shall be forged into the tool or the tool beaten out into the weapon?

There can be but one answer to these questions. In the first place. If we balance text against text, we learn that the preponderance of authority is in favor of the survival of the tool, for the word of Micah is repeated by Isalah in substantially identical language, while Joel stands alone. Therefore the weight of evicence, even in the Old Testament, is as two to one.

Joel probably was the first of the prophets; Micah and Isalah came afterward. They represent higher states of spiritual development therefore, if we are to postulate the operation of the law of progress in divine revelation as in everything else. And the estimation in which the two are held ma be shown, if in no other way, by the citations in the New Testament from these two ancient writers. There is little quoted from Joel that bears upon Christ; there is much from Mican, and much more still from Isaiah. So that the unconscious spirit of Him who included peacemaking as one of the cardinai works of His religion is more accuracely set forth and typined in the newer prophets than in the older one. "The Dairy cow may be considered as an animated machine that has for her mission the conversion of feed into milk and butter fat." says Prof. D. H. Otis of the department of a imal nutrition of the University of Wisconsin. His studies of a large number of herds and of individual cows shows that her is a great difference in the efficiency of cow machines. One erd may produce from three five times as much profit per cow as nother herd in the same community. In the ame herd one good cow not infrequently produces as much profit to the dairy farmer above the cost of feed and care as eight or ten poor cows.



Ripening Cream. It is very essential in cream ripening to agitate the cream frequently to insure uniform ripening. When cream remains undisturbed for some time the fat rises in the same way that it does in milk, though in a less marked degree. The result is that the upper layers are richer than the lower and will sour less rapidly, since the action of the factic acid germs is greater in thin than in rich cream. This unevened ripening leads to a poor bodied cream. Instead of being smooth and glossy, it will appear coarse and curdy when poured from a dipper. The importance of stirring frequenty during ripening should therefore ot be underestimated. - Prot. John



### A SCIENTIFIC PROCESS

It is Quite Possible to Manufacture Diamonds-Much Roguery Taking Place in the Manufacture of Imitation Silver-Difficult to Detect Any of the Articles.

At the present time Sir Julius Wernher is prosecuting a Frenchman called Lemoine for alleged imposture, says the London Times. The Frenchman brought letters of introduction from two well-known London men of business, and said that he had discovered a method of making diamonds. In an initial experiment he produced a magnifi- eight years. cent diamond from the crucible.

The experiment was related to the Board of Directors of the De Beers Company, but they would have nothing to do with it. Sir Julius Wernher, however, advanced £60,000 to the Frenchmap, in order to build a diamond factory at Argeles near Pau. The building and factory have been erected close to a waterfall, but Sir Julius afterwards suspected that the man was a swindler. Lemoine declares that he possesses the secret of making diamonds artificially, but he refuses to divulge the operation or to perform any experiment before experts.

It has been said that there is more than a suspicion in Hattan Garden that large numbers of artificial diamonds are being placed on the market as real gems. It is quite possible to manufacture dlamonds. Indeed, a famous Frenchman of Science, Moissan, made very large numbers by means of his electric furnace. His process was to dissolve lumps of sugar in molten iron, subjecting the solution to enormous

Lump sugar may be said to consist simply of water and diamond. It is the case that the diamond is merely crystallized carbon. There are three kinds of carbon-plumbago, graphite and diamond, the composition of all of which is identical. When charcoal is dissolved in molten iron, graphite is formed.

All the diamonds found to Borneo Brazil, India, and South Africa, are made in much the same mannerthat is, by the action of great heat and enormous pressure of the earth's interior causing the beautifu white stone to crystallize out.

By means of apparatus used by men of science it is possible to obtain a heat exceeding 40,000 degrees centigrade, and a pressure largely exceeding 100 tons to the square inch; that is to say similar heat and pressure as is used by Nature in producing diamonds. There is danger, however, in using such apparatus, as was shown when a Frenchman of science, was blown to pieces in 1893. 



Potash for Muck Solls Muck soil that has been under cultivation for some time usually needs d copious supply of potash to replenish the original quantity of that soil essential which has been taken up by the first few chrops, or has

ashes and cinders, a very cheap and simple method for improving the fertility of swamp land is found 'y scattering these ashes broadcast and in general quantities over the surface of the reclaimed land. In the regions of large manufacturing plants or coal mines coal ashes and cinders can be gotten merely for the asking and removal. The low potash contents of these ashes necessitates adding a large amount per acre. From three to four tons of coal ash per acre ought to supply enough potash for about two crops of corn or potatoes,

The application to each acre of swamp land, of from 400 to 500 pounds of kainit, a mineral obtainable from almost any reliable dealer in fertilizers, will also supply a sufficient amount of potash for several

If muriate of potash is used, (and it is most commonly available) from 200 to 400 pounds per acre applied to the well prepared ground, just before planting or seeding, will prove very satisfactory.

Sulphate of potash may also be applied in the same quantity per acre as the muriate. Application of these different fertilizers of high potash content may be made either by hand broadcasting or when conditions permit, by drill. 

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Seized by Japan Before Consul Could Buy Them

DISPLAYED IN TOKIO

They Are the Standards of their Majesties the Czar and the Czarina,

Who Almost Had Them Back for the Sum of \$30,000 .- Now Held by Japan As Trophies of Victories.

Of the innumerable trophies acquired by Japan in the course of the war with Russia, the most jealously prized has but recently come to light, These mementoes of the nation's victories over the great northern Power are so common and so sought after by the public that almost every village of the empire, however insignificant, has been duly honored with its quota of relics, with a plentiful supply left over, and now offered for sale on the public market. Needless to say, this has caused an exciting rush among the more ambitious curio-hunters, and some interesting specimens have been secured. These relics of the war are often disposed of after the grab-bag method, the buyer not knowing the exact contents of his purchase until after the

It so happened that the more deli-

cate of the spoils taken during the siege of Port Arthur, and at the battle of the Japan Sea, were tled up in small packages and sent to the Sasebo Naval Station, as the nearest place of security adjacent to the zone of conflict. Not long ago one of these packages was bought by a man named Isozaki, who found himself in luck, as it proved to be a veritable mine of wealth and wonder. Upon opening the bundle, it was found to contain a remarkable variety of garments and fabrics, including what appeared to be a few old flags in rather a tattered condition. Among the latter were three specimens that struck the owner as being made of a particularly rich material; and they were covered with a heavily embroidered design in gold thread. Their very brilliant appearance at once caught the eye of Isozaki, and he set them; aside, with the hope that they might prove to be of more than ordinary importance.

It was suggested to him that if he would take these flags to the Russlan consul at Nagasaki, he might realize considerable money on them. The Acting upon this advice, Isozaki dispatched an agent to Nagasaki to approach the Russian official on the subject. In the meantime, the military authorfties had got word of the excitement caused by Isozaki's find. and there was consternation in the official camp lest a valuable prize of the nation, had been overlooked and carelessly lost. But when Isozaki received the mandate to restore the purchase, the precious relics were alrady on the way to Nagasaki.

The Russian consul, being apprised of the object of the agent's received him with open arms, and breathless, to behold the treasure of which he had been informed. When the flags were unrolled and solemnly held up to his gaze, he immediately made a profound and reverential obelsance to them, to the astonishment of the Japanese, who was not yet aware of the real mature of the relics. For the flags proved to be nothing less than the Imperial standards of their Majesties, the Czarland Czarina of all the Russias. The consul has-

tened to agree upon a sum for the purchase of the Imperial standards, wich was finally set at no less a figure than \$30,000; but, just as the bargain was closed and the flags were about to be handed over, the Japanese, police appeared upon the scene and setzed the trophies as the property, of the Japanese Govern-

Isozaki has been obliged to yield possession of the captured standards to the nation, in which, to save his face as a patriot, he could do no more than amicably acquiesce; and Russia, by the merest chance, has lost the opportunity of regaining what she would certainly regard as one of beremost walued national ensigns

The Japanese Government, through Adminal Ursa, has taken these trophies of the nation's valor (of its possession of which until now it was in entire ignorance), and has carried them to the capitol, where they have been set up as the crown of all the prizes won in the war, and the perpetual, memorial of the nation's victories over a great antagonist.—The

> The County Commissioners were well represented headed by the President, W. M. Cooper, as was Mardela Springs, Quantico, Pittsville, Willards, Wango, Powellville, and citizens living along the various route. Mardela asked for the road to go from that point direct to Salisbury, ontting out Quantico as now proposed, while Quantico was before the board with a large delegation asking for the road to be made as laid out. It is understood an agreement was afterwards reached by these parties, and a recommendation made to the commission advocating the running of the road direct to Salisbury from Mardela by way of Spring Hill, and running a spur connecting Quantico with Salisbury.

The route connecting Wicomico County with Somerset via Allen was acceptable to all as far as could be learned no protest at all, being filed against this route.

The eastern section of the county was divided on the road question. The residents of Pittaville protested against the route as laid out and asked for one leading direct from Salisbury to Pittsville. 

If One Can't Sell You Some Stock, Perhaps Another Can-No Way of Stopping the Stream of Prospectuses Once a Man Nibbles-The Telegraph is Used Fiso

Getting on the sucker lists of some of the pedlers of cheap stocks in mining companies and electric air lines and the promoters of various unsuccessful inventions is so easy these days that a good many of the citizens of this town will be up against the necessity of getting larger mail boxes if the thing continues, says a writer in the New York Sun. They have also learned that once on one of these mailing lists it's a problem how to get

The man who has been unfortunate enough perhaps to nibble just a bit at some of the bait through reading advertisements has a pleasant surprise awaiting them. He generally finds that once his name has been secured by some alleged securities company pddling mining stock at 10 cents a throw it has a fashion of traveling all around the country, with apparently no end to the stream of literature which Uncle Sam thereafter delivers to him.

Furthermore, there appears to be no way of cutting off this stream. One man who happens to live in an apartment house got tired of cleaning out his mail box every morning after the pest had continued for a couple of weeks and all sorts of concerns with glittering prospectuses and-lovely-pictures of ore dumps had begged him to buy their stock before it went

Finally he got violent rings at the door bell, and dashing down four flights of stairs found that the letter carrier had brought a map and other literature too big to go in the

"See here," said the man on the sucker list, "I'm sick of this.. I don't want any more of this stuff and I want you to stop bringing it.'

The letter carrier grinned. "Can't help it," he said. "You're not the only one. It's addressed to you and I've got to deliver it."

"Guess there's no escape for you. Uncle Sam seems to be getting a lot of money from these people, and a lot of the fools that have bought stock don't seem to realize that their money is buying the postage samps.' By this time the better box of the

man who had got on the general list of comeons was turning out regularly every morning the literature of half a dozen or more concerns with a collection of postmarks that included New York Philadelphia, Boston and Chicago. After a while there was a little

break in the monotony of cleaning out the mail box. This time it came in the shape of a messenger boy with a night telegram, delivered just after "Kickapo stock advances to 30 cents

on Saturday. Wire reservation at our expense immediately," was the way the message read. It was from one of the concerns

wasn't it? Got to be delivered. You're not the only victim, either." The operator pointed to a stack of similar messages addressed to some

of the victim's neighbors. They had been coming all night. Then the victim fled like the poor. hunted thing he was. He decided it had come from his having nibbled

fust once at the balt thrown out by a concern selling stock in Philadelphia a year ago, when he had thoughtlessly asked some question about the stock. The sale of mailing lists is one of

the sources of income of some of the stock pedlers. The value of these lists depends chiefly upon how many times they have been worked. A list which consists largely of

fresh names commands a large price. After a victim has been worked by several concerns his name gets to be of less value and so on until he has had his dose.

Every concern engaged in getting the public's cash in exchange for stock certificates in some of these schemes to make you rich while you wait is after every name it can get. One concern which ran here for five or six years and sold stocks in fifty or more companies until it went broke recently and left its clients without any information as to what had become of their money boasted of having a mailing list of 250,000 names. The list was pruned from time to time, too.

What is peculiar about the whistling buoys is that when the waves are highest the louder they shriek. The gale may bellow deafenly and the waves crash thunderously-yet ing and clear, cannot be heard the warning whistle of the buoy.

Then, as the sea subsides, the crying of the great metal siren decreases in volume, and as it heaves on a calm and gentle sea it gives forth only a moan, faint and rather plain-

If you pass close by the buoy you will see a great metal pear-shaped object bobbing up and down in the water. At the end point of this metal hulb is an opening, which is connected to the base by a long steel tube. This tube is connected with the whistle by a smaller pipe. Two other pipes admit air to the tube through valves which are so arranged that the only egress for the air is through the whistle.

As the buoy floats on the water the water fills the tube to the level outside. As the waves lift the buoy on their crest, water, of course flows out of the tube and air rush es into it. As the buoy sinks back. water rushes into the tube forcing the air out through the whistle. Thus the more riotous the waves the greater the air compresion as the water rushes into the buoy, and consequent-

ly the louder the noise. To maintain the fine metallic sound the buove must be cleaned at least once a year, sometimes often-

er. This is not an easy task. To lift the buoys, anchored with great from sinkers, from the water is a difficult feat. Naturally, they are placed in dangerous and stormy water, and the calmest days possible must be selected to replace them. A new buoy, freshly painted and



Ormonde's Right, for instance, was meant for a topnotcher, but his disposition was always against him. He was a man eater from an early age and had to be muzzled. He had the conformation and the power to run fast and all day, but he turned cranky and mean and crafty early in

"Ordinarily he'd stand stock still at the barrier, or wheel when the barrier flew up, or if he got off he'd sulk if the boy tried to kick him a little to make him overtake his flying field, and then, just to show that he could do it if he wanted to, he'd take after the field and catch his horses easily, and then, having done that much, he'd pin his ears and chuck it as if somebody'd hit him behind the ear with a beer mal

"Another one of the unconscienable rogues was Blues, the really great horse owned by Frank Farrell. 

'Nat" and His Brother John B. the Boat Builders

HOME AT BRISTOL

is a Wonderful Blind Man Whose Specialty Is Steam Craft-"Nat Is Tall, Reserved, and a Strict Disciplinarian. Some of His

"Nat" Herreshoff has done such nderful things in putting together ood and iron and canvas and hemp in its speedlest form that his name is known wherever a yacht floats in the waters of the Seven Seas. He has kept the Amelrca's cup so many it that he has come to be regarded on this side of the water as a sort of wizard, who can do anything in that line, and when challenges are accepted the work of meeting them is turned over to "Nat" as a matter of course.

When a man is called by an abpreviation of his first name, it is generally taken for granted that he is a "good fellow," a "mixer," a "democratic" person. "hustling." But "Nat" Herreshoff is none of He is a cold, reserved, thoughtful, distant man-polite enough, well-bred enough, but one of those persons whom one would expect to hear called Nathaniel Greene Herreshoff, Esq., rather than "Nat." Yet as "Nat" he is always spoken of just as his brother, the blind wizard, is always known as "John B." The Herreshoffs are a remarkable family, a family of geniuses, and the most remarkable of them are "Nat" and "John B." These two brothers are the active men of the Herreshoff Manufacturing Company of Bristol, and they are rich-nobody knows how rich, for the Herreshoffs are not given to a parade of wealth. They live quietly, comfortably, unostentatiously, and belong to the old families" of Bristol.

"Nat" first established the fame of the firm by the wonderful catboats he built and the wonderful way in which he sailed them. It Is Being Built Up in the Ozark Mountains, Mo.

### ONE HUNDRED THERE

Many More Are to Come From Their Home Land .- They Have Established Dairy Farms According to European Methods,-Cheese Making Their Specialty.

A sturdy company of colonists is building up a new Switzerland in the cubic centimetre, and at greater dis-Ozark Mountains of southwest Missourl. One hundred of these Swiss have bought land in the eastern part | est near the shore, providing a highof Howell county, near the town of ly nourishing hunting ground for Brandsville and are clearing away the marine organism, accounts for the dense timber, building substantial homes, planting orchards and truck gardens and carrying on dairy farming acording to improved European methods. Many others are to come from Switzerland. Six thousand acres of land have been reserved for the colony and an option is held on another tract of 8.000 acres.

The first Swiss colonists in Missouri arrived at Brandsville one year ago last April and they have been coming at intervals since. The colenists are from the north of Switserland and most of them speak the German language. A few speak French and Italian.

This thriving colony is the realisation of a dream of S. R. Fry, a Bwiss journalist, who was banished from his native land thirty years ago on account of his advanced ideas on cooperative communities. The exlle went to New York city and engaged in cigar manufacturing. He never ceased to give expression to his hopes. A few years ago he told his plans of W. R. Haight, an attorney in New York city. The lawyer had broken down in health and was already planning to come West.

Mr. Haight became interested in the Swiss colony idea and the two men went to St. Louis, where they were joined by the Swiss Consul. Many points in the Ozark Mountains were visited and finally it was decided to found the colony in the vicinity of Brandsville. The St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad aided the men in their project. The land was purchased and the settlement established. Mr. Fry is now in Switzerland directing his countrymen to the new colony in the "Alps omenon is respiratory exchange or

Mr. Haight, the New York attorney, has charge of the colony. He locates new arrivals on their land and is friend and adviser to the entire settlement. Some of the emigrants are as helpless as children when they arrive in this country. Mr. Haight tells the men how to be gin the work of clearing the timber and establishing a farm. The wo-

men too often seek his advice. The Swiss pay from \$6 to \$15 an acre for the and, with an average price of about \$12 an acre. Most of the land is sold in forty acre and eighty acre tracts. A tract of eighty acres is regarded as a larg farm by the Swiss, accustomed as they are to intensive methods of farming. The land is sold to the colonists on the partial payment plan, except in cases where they have enough money to pay cash down for a tract. Sometimes the Swiss families have only a few hundred dollars when they arrive, but they are at once assigned to a farm and given an opportunity to pay out on it. The timber in many cases when made into crossties, posts and mine props goes far toward paying for the land.

When the colonists are unable to build houses they are furnished tents by the colonization company, until they get a start. A log house in the Ozarks, however, is not expensive, and cost of the settlers build comfortable homes shortly after they

The land that the Swiss are buying is thickly timbered with oak and hickory. The soil is a brown loam, and in some places the surface is rant, "there is a great deal in having thickly covered with small rocks. This land is well adapted for fruit growing.

It is agreed that the art of cheese making has reached its highest perfection in Switzerland. More Swiss cheese is imported to America than and other kind. Many of the colonsits are expert dairymen. As soon as they arrive they begin making high grade butter and choose that find a ready market at Brandsville.

A creamery and a factory where Swiss cheese will be manufactured on a large scale are soon to be established in the colony. At the present time the farmers are making the cheese at their homes with practically no equipment.

### BACTERIA IN THE OCEAN. Number of Organisms Increase

At no particular spot has the sea been found to be free from organlams, although those isolated and recognized have proved to be harmless consisting of active motile rods and vibrios, cocci being less numerous, As might be expected, the number of organisms increase immensely as the shore is approached. Thus, about a mile from the shore something like 4,000 germs per cubic centimetre have been found, and this influence

Samples of sea water taken at some depths below the surface proved to contain only a few bacteria per cubic centimetre. Thus at half a mile below the surface only from eight to twelve bacteria were present. There is little doubt that even should pathogenic organisms gain access to the sea, as must be the case when sewers discharge raw sewage into it. their activity must sooner or later be

The sea is remarkable from a bacteriological point of view in containing phosphorescent bacteria, and it is probable that some of these are ease-producing, so far, at any rate as regards certain aquatic animals. Thus a bacterium has been successfully cultivated from a body of the luminous talitrus which is both pathogenic and luminous. This bacterium invades the abdominal cavity of this aquatic animal and all its organs with fatal issue. During the presence of the disease the victim shines with a green light, which is said to be visible nearly a dozen yards away, and which persists for some hours after the demise of the animal. It is not improbable that the luminosity of other marine animais may be due to the invasion of this light and disease-producing or-

ganism. The very beautiful phenomenon of the phosphorescence of the sea is caused by photo bacteria in part as well as by a variety of low forms of animal life. The eerie light is in no way connected with the element phosphorus, as is very commonly supposed. The cause of the phenphosphorescence is never witnessed in perfectly smooth water, while the brilliancy of the light when it is observed is always greatest upon the crest of the waves or where the water is in a violent stage of agitation, as in the wake of a steamer. Its occurrence, therefore, is evidence of active oxidization. Could again, the sea be sterilized, phospherescence

would cease. The presence of highly combustible matter increases the light. A very simple experiment proves this. If the flesh of a fresh haddock or herring be placed in a 3 per cent. salt solution and kept at a low temperaure, the liquid will rapidly deelop phosphoresence which becomes quite brilliant on adding a little glyerine or sugar, or what, in other words, is respirable material. It is curious that in marine life, disease and death should be associated with luminous phenomena.—Philadelphia Record.

He went to the vestment chest to get his robe, and as he unlocked the door the corpse placed there by the madman fell on him, and he sank down in a swoon. 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


### Gold in the North
