

PROGRAM NOTES

Warren Benson's *Three Dances for Solo Snare Drum* is an exciting and energetic piece, considered a standard in concert snare drum literature. This piece contains three stylistically different movements, or dances. The Cretan Dance utilizes stick clicks and has the snares turned off in order to create a folky sound. Fox Trot uses brushes to produce a jazz tone. The final dance, Fandango, is a showy, march-like finale

Etude for a Quiet Hall was the first prize recipient of the 1982 Percussive Arts Society Composition Competition and dedicated to J. Massie Johnson. Christopher Deane, composer of this piece, recently passed away in October 2021. This piece explores the use of silence, sustain and soft dynamic ranges, as well as the technical capabilities of the performer. The more subdued outer sections of the piece contain a variety of characters created by the sustaining of a soft single note played against moving lines in counterpoint. The middle part of the piece is a virtuosic and fastmoving run section, which contrasts and complements the others brilliantly.

Morris Dance is a multi-percussion solo that requires a bass drum, field drum and a snare drum. Morris dancing is a form of English folk dance accompanied by music. It is based on rhythmic stepping and the execution of choreographed figures by a group of dancers, usually wearing bell pads on their shins. Kraft's *Morris Dance* is a reflection of this English tradition. Performers of this piece have the option of wearing an ankle sleigh bell to further add to the theme. Composer William Kraft recently passed away in February 2022.

Hall of Mirrors is a vibraphone duet that aims to showcase the unique capabilities and colors of the instrument. The piece is constructed of several patterns, with each performer constantly mirroring the other. The resulting sound is delicate and mesmerizing. The piece also calls for each player to bow the vibraphone, often while playing with a mallet in the other hand, creating an ambient effect.

Prelude No. 1: For Four Timpani by Christopher Deane is a challenging piece for solo timpani. This is considered a companion piece to *Etude for a Quiet Hall*.

Blake Tyson's *A Cricket Sang and Set the Sun* takes its title from the opening lines of a poem by Emily Dickinson, capturing the beauty of a slowly shifting sunset. Tyson captures the sense of fascination, inspiration and beauty that these opening lines produce, creating a flowing and lyrical solo marimba piece.

Alexa Letourneau's *When Shall We Three Meet Again* is a unique experiment in the world of percussion, exploring the many sounds that percussion instruments can create. The title is a reference to Shakespeare's *Macbeth* and the meeting of the three witches. When writing this piece, Letourneau strived to create an experience that was fun for the players to play and also enjoyable for the listeners to hear. Letourneau's piece takes its audience on a journey. As you listen, pay attention to the growth throughout the piece and how the beginning meets the end. The first movement, *In Thunder*, is an experiment with timbre for one instrument with each performer playing on it. The second movement, *Or In Rain*, plays with the concept of sustain with the use of bowing and rolls. The final movement, *Lightning*, grows with intensity, with the return of elements from previous movements, resulting in a dramatic and explosive finale.
