Articles of Affociation OF THE

UNION BANK OF MARTLAND.

ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, OR IN ANYWISE CONCERN.

E IT KNOWN and made manifelt, that we, the fubscribers, have formed a company or li-ted partnership, and do hereby affociate and agree a each other, to conduct business in the manner an after specified and described, by and under the ac and style of "The President and Directors of Union Bank of Maryland;" and we do hereby ally covenant and agree, that the following are hall be the fundamental articles of this our affor ion and agreement with each other, by which we, all persons who at any time hereafter may at befiness with the faid company, shall be and and concluded.

ARTICLE I. The capital flock of the faid compa-full confift of THREE MILLIONS of DOL-RS, money of the United States; five hundred the legislature may incorporate the company, may be sunscribed for by the state, if delired by legislature thereof; this reservation, however, and continue for more than five years from the stedion of directors. And the commissioners aforesaid, or any two of them in the respective counties, shall open the subfeription books, at ten o'clock, A. M. and they shall continue open until four o'clock, P. M. and shall remain open between those hours for one day, at least, and for the term of three days, unlets fooner filled : And if it should so happen, that more than the stipulated number of shares should be subscribed on the first day, then the commissioners aforesaid are to apportion them among the subscribers, by deducting from the highest subscriptions, until they are reduced to the proper number; or, if more persons subscribe than there are shares, then the commissioners are to cast lots to decide to whom they shall belong: But, if the shares should not be all subscribed in three days, then the commissioners in the different counties, and the city of Annapolis, are to return the remainder, together with the books, and what monies they may have received at the time of fubfcribing, unto the directors in Baltimore, within twenty days. And the commissioners will, on deciding to whom the shares may belong, iffue receipts to the different stockholders for the monies received by them at the time of fubfcribing; these receipts, with the original subscripti-tion, shall be deemed good evidence of the quantity of stock to which each subscriber shall be entitled in this company. But no citizen of Baltimore, or other person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be permitted to subscribe on the first day on which the books are opened at Baltimore for more than twenty shares; and if the flock be not subscribed on the first day, the books are to remain open on the second day, on the fame terms as on the first; but if they are not filled on the fecond day, then the commissioners may permit any person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, to subscribe for any number of shares, until the whole number is complete.

ARTICLE 2. The affairs of the company shall be conducted by fixteen directors and a prefident, whole place, if chosen from among their number, shall be supplied by that body; and eight of the directors and the prelident shall form a board or quorum for transacting all the business of the company : ordinary difcounts may be done by the prefident and any five of the directors. In case of his fickness or necessary abfence, his place may be supplied by any director whom he, by writing under his hand, may nominate for that purpole: And the directors, who may be appointed at the first election, shall hold their seats untif the first Monday in July, one thousand eight hundred and five, the directors, from and after that period, shall be elected for one year by the stockholders for the time being; and each director shall be a flockholder at the time of his election, and shall cease to be a director if he should cease to be a flockholder: and no director of any other bank shall, at the same time, be a director of this bank. And the number of votes to which each flockholder shall be entitled shall be in proportion to the stock he may hold, as follows: For one there, and not exceeding two shares, one vote each; for every two shares above two, and not exceeding ten, one vote; for every four shares above ten, and not exceeding thirty, one vote; for every fix theres above thirty, and not exceeding fixty, one vote; for every eight shares above fixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above that number, one vote; but no person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be entitled to more than fixty votes; and no stockholder shall be permitted to vote, (except at the first election,) who has not held his Rook four calender months prior to the election : And all Rookholders shall vote at elections by ballot, in

person or by proxy, which, in all elections after the first, is to be made in such form as the board of

directors may appoint.

ARTICLE 3. A general meeting of the flockholders of the company shall be holden on the first Monday in July, in every year, (except the prefent,) at fuch place as the board of directors shall appoint, by giving fix weeks notice, to be published in three of the news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of electing directors for the ensuing year; who shall take their seats at the board the succeeding day, and immediately proceed to elect the prefident : But for the present year, for the more immediate or-ganization of the business of the company, the elec-tion shall be holden on the third Monday in April, under the direction of the commissioners appointed to

ARTICLE 4. The board of directors are hereby fully empowered to make, revise, alter or annul, all such rules, orders, by-laws and regulations for the government of the company and that of their officers, fervants and affairs, as they, or a majority of them, shall, from time to time, think expedient; not inconfiftent with law or thefe articles of affociation : and to use, employ and dispose of, the joint stock, funds or property of the said company (subject only to the restrictions herein after mentioned) as to them, or a

majority of them, may feem expedient.

ARTICLE 5. All bills, bonds, notes, and every contract and engagement on behalf of the company, shall be figured by the president and counterfigured or attested by the cashier of the company; and the funds of the company shall in no case he held responfible for any contract or engagement whatever, unless the fame shall be so signed and countersigned or attefted as aforefaid.

Anator 6. The books, papers, correspondence to the inspection of the directors.

ARTICLE 7. The faid board of directors shall have power to appoint a cashier, and all other officers and fervants for executing the business of the company; and to establish the compensation to be paid to the prefident and all other officers and fervants of the company respectively; all which, together with all other necessary expences, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

ARTICLE 8. A majority of the directors shall have power to call a general meeting of the stockholders for the purpoles relative to the concerns of the company, giving at leaft fix weeks notice in two or more news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagar's-town, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, and specifying in fuch notice the object or objects of fuch meet-

ARTICLE 9. The shares of capital stock at any time owned by any individual flockholder, shall be transferrable on the books of the company, according to such rules, as conformably to law may be established in that behalf by the board of directors; but all debts actually due or payable to the company, (days of grace for payment being past,) by a stockholder, requesting a transfer, must be satisfied before such a transer shall be made, unless the board of directors

fhall direct to the contrary.

ARTICLE 10. No transfer of flock in this comany shall be considered as binding upon the company, unless made in a book or books to be kept for that purpose by the company. And it is hereby further expressly agreed and declared, that any stockholder who shall transfer in manner aforefaid, all his stock or shares in this company, to any other person or perfons whatever, shall, ip of facto, cease to be a member of this company; and that any person or persons whatever who shall accept a transfer of any stock or share in this company, shall, ip of facto, become and be a member of this company, according to these articles of affociation.

ARTICLE 11. It is hereby expressly and explicitly declared to be the object and intention of the persons who affociate under the style or firm of the President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland, that the joint stock or property of the faid company, (conclusive of dividends to be made in the manner berein after mentioned,) shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the said company. And that no person who shall or way deal with this company, or to whom they shall or may become in any-wife indebted, shall, on any pretence whatever, have wife indebted, shall, on any pretence whatever, have recourse against the separate property of any present or suture member of this company, or against their persons, further than may be necessary to secure the faithful application of the funds thereof to the purposes to which, by these presents, they are liable: But all persons accepting any bond, bill or note, or other contract of this company, figured by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company, for the time being, or dealing with it in any other manner whatsoever, thereby respectively give credit to the faid joint flock or property of the faid company, and thereby respectively disavow having recourfe, on any pretence whatever, to the person or feparate property of any present or future member of this company, except as above mentioned. And all fuits to be brought against this company, (if any shall be,) shall be brought against the president for the time being, and in case of his death or removal from office, pending any fuch fuit against him, measures shall be taken, at the expence of the company, for fubilituting his fuccessor in office, as a defendant; fo that persons having demands upon the company may not be prejudiced or delayed by that event: Or, if the person suing, shall go on against the person first named as defendant (notwithstanding his death or removal from office) this company shall take no advantage, by writ of error or otherwife, of fuch proceeding on that account; and all recoveries, had in manner aforefaid, shall be conclusive upon the company, fo far as to render the company's faid joint Rock or property liable thereby, and no further; and the company shall immediately pay the amount of such recovery out of their joint flock, but not otherwise. And in case of any suit at law, the president shall fign his appearance upon the writ, or file common bail thereto; it being expressly understood and declared that all persons, dealing with the said company, agree to these terms, and are to be bound thereby.

ARTICLE 12. Dividends of the profits of the company, or of fo much of the faid profits as shall be deemed expedient and proper, shall be declared halfyearly, during the months of June and December, and be paid in the months of July and January, in every year; and shall, from time to time, be determined by a majority of the faid directors, at a meeting to be held for that purpose; and shall in no case exceed the amount of the net profits actually acquired by the company; fo that the capital flock of the company shall never be impaired by dividends: and at the expiration of every three years, a dividend of furplus profits shall be made: But the directors shall be at liberty to retain at least one per cent, upon the capital, as a fund for future contingencies.

ARTICLE 13. If the faid directors shall, at any time, wilfully and knowingly make or declare any dividend which shall impair the said capital stock, all the directors present at the making or declaring such dividend, and confenting thereto, shall be liable in their individual capacities to the company, for the amount or proportion of the faid capital flock to divided by the faid directors: And each director who shall be present at the making or declaring of such dividend, shall be deemed to have consented thereto, unless he shall immediately enter, in writing, his diffent on the minutes of the proceedings of the board, and give public notice to the stockholders that such dividend has been declared.

ARTICLE 14. These articles of agreement shall be published in at least two news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagar's-town, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, for one month; and for the further information of all persons, who may transact business with, or in any manner give credit to, this company, every bond, bill, note or other instrument or contract, by the effect or terms of which the company may be charged or held liable for the payment of money, shall fpecially declare, in fuch form as the board of directors shall prescribe, that payment shall be made out of the joint funds of " The United Bank of Maryland," according to the prefent articles of affociation, and not otherwise; a copy of the eleventh article of this affociation, shall be inserted in the bank book of every person, depositing money or other valuable property with the company for fafe custody; or a printed copy shall be delivered to every such person before any fuch deposit shall be received from him. And it is hereby expressly declared, that no engagement can be legally made in the name of the faid compa contain a limitation or refriction to the effect above recited. And the company hereby expressly difavow all responsibility for any debt or engagement, which may be made in their name, not containing a limitation or restriction to the effect aforesaid.

ARTICLE 15. The company shall in no case be owners of any thips or vellels, or directly or indirectly be concerned in trade or the importation or exportation, purchase or fale of any goods, wares or merchandife whatever, (bills of exchange and bullion only excepted,) and except fuch thips, veffels, goods, wares or merchandifes, as shall be truly pledged to them by way of fecurity for debts due, owing or growing due to the faid company, or purchased by them to secure such debts so due to the said company.

ARTICLE 16. If a vacancy shall at any time happen among the directors, by death, refignation, or otherwise, the residue of the directors, for the time being, shall elect a director to fill the vacancy, if they shall deem it necessary, until the next election directors.

ARTICLE 17. This affociation thall continue until the first Monday of July, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, unless a charter is sooner obtained: But the proprietors of two thirds of the capital flock of the company, may, by their concurring votes, at a general meeting, to be called for that express purpole, dissolve the same, at any prior period, provided that notice of such meeting, and of its object, shall be published in two or more news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagar's-town, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, for at least fix months previous to the ARTICLE 18. The company shall not purchase or

hold any lands, tenements, or other real effate, other than what may be necessary for the convenient trans-

action of its bufinels, unless fuch lands, tene-ments, and real estates, shall have been, bona fide, mortgaged to the company by way of fecurity, or conveyed to it in fatisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its dealings, or purchased to secure debts contracted with, or due to, the faid company t and in every instance in which the company may become owners or claimants of lands, tenements, or real effates, the board of directors are empowered to fell or dispose of the same in such manner as they may deem beneficial for the company.

ARTICLE 19. A number of flockholders, not lefa than fifty, who together shall be proprietors of one thousand shares, may for any purpose relative to the institution, at any time, apply to the president and directors to call a general meeting of the flockholders; and if by them refused, the faid number of stockholders, proprietors of not less than that number of fhares, shall have power to call a general meeting of the stockholders, giving at least fixty days notice in two public news-papers in the place where the bank is kept, specifying in such notice the object or objects of fuch call.

ARTICLE 20. Immediately on the diffolution of this affociation, effectual measures shall be taken by the directors then existing, for closing all the con-cerns of the company, and for dividing the capital and profits which may remain among the stockholders, in proportion to their respective interests.

NEW-ORLEANS, January 9.

On Wednesday last the volunteer companies of militia from the Mississippi Territory were discharged by gen. Wilkinson, commander of the American troops. It is with peculiar pleasure we add that the greatest satisfaction prevailed among them. These worthy citizens who have patriotically left their homes, and their pursuits, and submitted to the fatigues of this expedition, deferve and will receive the grateful plaudits of their countrymen: the pecuniary allowance of the public to them is of no confideration; many of the privates are men of the first respectability and property.

BOSTON, February 13. Our commercial friends will please take notice, that owing to the fcarcity of money, the recent refulal of the bank to receive foreign bills, and a variety of other causes, few purchases or sales are made of magnitude, and our price current exhibits, with regard to many articles, merely a nominal price.

Latest from Europe. Arrived here yesterday, the brig Seaslower, captain Glover, in 62 days from Amsterdam. By this arrival we have received Dutch papers to the 9th December, which, although feveral days later than our previous accounts from Europe, contain no intelligence of any particular importance. The invalion of England was fill talked of and anxiously expected; but every thing which related to the manner in which it was to be conducted, was merely conjectural. Captain Glover informs, that on the 9th December all the lighters and other craft, in the harbour of Amsterdam, e pressed by order of government, for of transporting troops to the Texel, where they were to be embarked on board of a large fleet of transports, prepared for that purpole, and which dropped down in company with captain G. to the number of about 20 thips of confiderable burthen, befides a great number of other veffels. Captain G. further informs, that an immediate embarkation of the troops was expected, and from every appearance he judged that some important step was about to be disclosed.

> NEW-YORK, February 17. Fever in England.

It appears from our late London papers, that a fever of a deadly and malignant nature, rages in the town of New-Castle, (Eng.) The victim is seized with a violent pain in the forehead, which is quickly followed by a stupor, and in a short time he is reduced to a very weak condition. It had become fo alarming that the magistrates had taken notice of it, and had ordered out the fire engines, with instructions to wash every lane and alley on the Quay side, completely clean.

February 20. By the schooner Hector, we have received Jamai-ca papers to the 19th ult. but they contain nothing but a few marine articles.

Mr. M'Douell, who came home in the Hector informs, that an embargo was laid on all vessels at Barracoa about the 12th ultimo, in consequence of an expedition that was on the eve of failing against the island of New Providence. This enterprize was to be conducted by the French who were lately sobliged to leave St. Domingo. It was faid the force to be employed confifted of 3000 men, part of which was to come from St. Jago de Cuba. A number of privateers were also fitting out at Barracoa.

We understand, there now is preferted, for the confideration of the legislature, an excellent plan for removing the local causes of the epidemic. It contains nine provisions. If doctor Smith's conjecture, are well founded, it will supercede, in a great manufact, the necessity of the flight of the inhabitum during the season of the fever. The doctor, it faid, ftrongly recommends the planting of hops, in the back yards of every house in the city.

And that no person who shall or may deal with this company, or to whom they shall or may become in anywise indebted, shall, on any pretence whatever, have recourse against the separate property of any present or suture member of this company, or against their arrions, surther than may be necessary to leave the faithful application of the funds thereof to the surposes to which, by these presents, they are liables. But all persons accepting any bond, bill or note, or

other contract of this company, figned by the prefident and counterfigued or attefted by the cathier of the company, for the time being, or dealing with it in any other manner whatfoever, thereby respectively give credit to the faid joint flock or property of the faid company, and thereby respectively difavow having recourfe, on any pretence whatever, to the person or separate property of any present or future member of this company, except as above mentioned. We are told that the unfortunate and mysterious Miss M'Dowell, whose missortune has excited so much public folicitude, is now in this city, under the protection of feveral worthy members of the fociety of Friends.

CHARLESTON, February 13.

Yesterday morning about fix o'clock, the fouthern double range of brick stores on Roper's wharf, in this city, was discovered to be on fire. The stames had got to so considerable a height before they were discovered, that it was impossible to get them under before the whole of the range was burnt or pulled down. That wharf and its stores are in the possession of Messrs. Waring and Smith, factors; the stores contained near a thousand barrels of, rice, and upwards of feven hundred bales of long staple cotton; of the former it is supposed upwards of four hundred barrels are destroyed, and nearly four hundred bales of the latter. This property belonged to different planters and merchants: the eastern end of the range was occupied by Messrs. Waring and Smith, Mr. Thomas Ball and Meffrs. Alexander and John Corrie, as counting houses; nothing was faved out of these but their papers and books. We have no information to fay politively to what this unfortunate circumstance is owing, however, there is no reason to believe it was done defignedly.

NORFOLK, February 21.

Yesterday arrived the ship Favourite, captain Goodrich, in 79 days from London; by which arrival we received a regular file of papers to the first of December, their contents are by no means interesting. We conversed with captain Goodrich, he fays that trade is very brisk in the river Thames, that the idea of a French invation is every day fubfiding, and that the general opinion in England was, that Buonaparte kept up the appearance of an invalion, merely to ruin the United Kingdom, with a load of expences, which they must certainly labour under from the valt preparations made and every day making to repel the enemy.

LONDON, November 29. Letters from Venice and Triefte still infist upon our having landed troops in Egypt. They fay, that an English sleet of five fail of the line, besides frigates, cutters and transports, arrived before Alexandria a fortnight after the capture of the place by the Mamelukes.

" The English landed 4000 men, who are destined to occupy the ports and maritime places of Egypt. This fquadron is the fame that was collected at Malta, as it was faid, to make an attack upon the island of Elba. The English had an understanding with the beys, or Mamelukes, whom they fecretly supplied with arms, artillery and ammunition. It is a proof that general Stuart made a convention with the beys, in consequence of which they agreed to surrender the principal places, in case of their success, and that it is in virtue of this treaty that the English have been

allowed to make a landing in Egypt."

ARTICLE 20. Immediately on the diffolution of this affociation, effectual measures shall be taken by the directors then existing, for closing all the conand profits which may remain among the flockholders, in proportion to their respective interests.

L E I P S I C, December 20.

The necessary magazines for the Russian troops, that are affembling on the frontiers of Poland, are now preparing.

The emperor of Russia has made representations to the French government for the evacuation of the Hanoverian states, and at the same time infisted that the king of Sardinia should at last receive an indemnification for what he has doft, at least to the amount of a third of his former states, and that this indemnity thould be given upon the continent of Italy. The court of Vienna, on the application of that of Peterfburg, appears to have supported these demands. Buonaparte, on the other hand, is faid to have decidedly declared, that he could not confent to the evacuation of the Hanoverian flates till the restoration of peace; and that the indemnification of the king of Sardinia, even if it were agreed to, could not be carried into effect before peace with England.

The question of the quality of votes in the college of princes, still continues to be the object of negotiation among the different princes of the German powers; and it is faid, that if this dispute is not peedily fettled, France will interfere publicly as mediator. For the reft, it is confirmed, that various states of the empire, in different applications relative to the luccels of the deputation of the empire, depend on the support of the first conful. People talk of a very important French official note, which will foon be presented to the diet of Ratisbon. Sieyes has frequent conferences with the first conful.

VIENNA, December 17.

According to fome accounts diffurbances have broke out at Constantinople. Between this place, Paris, and St. Petersburg, there

a continual interchange of couriers. The prince of Castel Franco, the Spanish ambassador, and the chevalier Miranda, the Portuguese ambaffador, have notified the neutrality of their respec-

RATISBON, December 19.

> BALTIMORE, March 8. From the Philadelphia Evening Post. HIGHLY IMPORTANT.

A confidential correspondent has communicated to us the substance of a letter just received from Germany, stating that country to be in a state of extreme inquietude, from great fermentations and intestine divisions having lately taken place, which promise some important event. Whether these divisions have been produced by the intrigues of France, or by some imprudent step of the Austrian government, is not yet known; this much, however, we can fay, that four violent parties have lately broke out, and have much diffurbed the focial harmony among the citizens of the first class. The first party, which is denominated the Imperial, is most actively employed in supporting the plans and furthering the operations of the court, which tend to threaten the Ottoman empire. The fecond party, which is called the Prussian, is supposed to aim at the aggrandizement of the successor of Frederick the Great, by making him a partner in the empire, and even claiming for him the right of being elected to the Imperial throne in succession. A third party, no less troublesome, is called the Republican, who are equally averfe to conquest and to monarchy. The fourth party, which feems to rule over the old institutions and former opinions, is that of France, or Buonaparte. Those under the influence of this party, will justify no particular measures, which are not in concert with France. The distressing effects of these internal contentions and divisions have already reached the Imperial cabinet, from which one or two ministers have been removed. The public funds have also felt the shock, and have decreased to an alarming degree. The notes of the bank of Vienna have fallen 6,5 per cent. and notwithstanding such ruinous discredit, the government infif upon discharging their obligations with this depreciated paper, which must be received by the creditors of the empire, at full value. It is expected that many thousands will be ruined by this procedure.

The above comes from fo respectable a source, that its truth cannot be doubted.

SALEM, March 8. BAD NEWS.

The brig Augusta, capt. Abraham Williams, arrived at Gloucester on Tuesday last in the short pasfage of 32 days from Cadiz. Capt. Williams brings the difagreeable intelligence of the capture of the Philadelphia Frigate, of 44 guns, commanded by capt. Bainbridge. She had chased a cruiser into the bay of Tripoli, and in beating out, got aground, when the was captured by gun boats, cruifers, &c. and her whole crew put into flavery. Dispatches to the American government, of this difagreeable event, had been forwarded 20 days before capt. W. failed, by capt. Lambert, bound to Boston. After the capture the Tripolitans got the frigate off.

Since writing the above, we learn, by a Cape Anne pilot, who came in with the ship Brutus from Bourdeaux, that the officers of the Philadelphia were on their parole at Tripoli, under the protection of the British conful-and that commodore Preble had purchased two vessels, and armed them, at Gibraltar, for the purpole of retaking or destroying the captured frigate.

BOSTON, March 8.
Loss of the U.S. frigate Philadelphia, capt. Bainbridge.-We are forry to fay that the above mentioned frigate has been loft on the coast of Tripoli, and the officers and ciew, we fear, condemned to flavery. The following are the particulars which have reached us, respecting this unpleasant affair. From the London Courier, J.

" Italy, Dec. 25 .- The American ship Philadelphia, capt. Bainbridge, of 44 guns, which blockaded the harbour of Tripoli, pursuing a Tripolitan xebeck too far, ran aground, and the crew, confifting of 350 men, were all made prisoners by the Tripolitans."

Extract of a letter from Gibraltar bay, Jan. 10. "You have undoubtedly heard of the lofs of the Philadelphia. She struck on a rock, while in chase of a Tripolitan cruifer, off Tripoli, and after four hours refiftance, to no purpole, was obliged to firike to the gun boats. She has fince been got off, and carried into port. Her officers and crew are all prifoners, if not flaves. The officers are faid to be treated with humanity; but it is faid the crew were ftript immediately on their landing, even to a fingle fhirt, and that they are on very short allowance. This most unfortunate occurrence, I expect, has entirely deranged the commodore's plans."

" On the last day of January, four English men war and a schooner, viz. two ships of the line and frigates, came off the harbour at 8 o'clock in the orning, without the leaft expectation by the Dutch. hey fent in a flag of truce, and demanded the fur-

immediately bore down, attacked and took the fort Piscadary, and landed their troops. From the best information I could get, they consisted of fix or seven hundred men; they marched up and took poffeffion of the hill where the French built their fort when they attacked the island, and mounted a field piece, with which they threw shot into the forts in town for the first day; but Fort George, and a fort the French have built on the hill below Fort George, annoyed them to much, that they left it, and built a fort below the hill, fo that Fort George nor the French fort, can do them no injury. For three days previous to my leaving the island, they were continu-ally firing from the English fort into the town, with three or four heavy guns, almost every shot going through some house; the government house I suppose had received fifty; it is entirely deserted, as is almost every house in town. The Dutch troops have had two skirmishes with the English, in the first of which they took four prisoners they found straggling in Lothro Banda; the last time the English drove them in as fall as their legs could carry them. The Dutch appeared to be low spirited, but entertained hopes that the British would go away. The two frigates lie to windward of the harbour, the two line of battle ships to leeward, and the schooner at anchor at Piscadary; they have taken several vessels, and fent them to leeward, but what they were know not. The Dutch have haled a large thip athwart the harbour's mouth, with the intention of finking her should they be attacked from the sea; they have haled another vessel alongside the frigate, to prevent the shot from injuring her. The day I left port, the Lutheran church in Lothro Banda, was burnt, but I expect by some villains for the sake of plunder. I left the island the 6th February, at 8 o'clock at night, after endeavouring four or five days to get out; I took advantage (feeing both the fhips to leeward tack close in with the shore, and stand off) I ran down within piftol fhot of the British fort, but shewed no light, so that they did not discover me." The question was then taken by yeas and nays on concurring in the report of the committee, and the first resolution carried, ayes 73-noes 32. The second was agreed to unanimously.

Mesirs. J. Randolph and Early were, on motion, appointed a committee, to appear before the fenate, and impeach, in the name of the house of representatives, Samuel Chase of high crimes and misdemeanors, which was done on the following day, and a committee of five appointed to frame articles of impeachment, with power to fend for persons and papers.

removing us; and come when he may, he will find us ready to give him the reception he merits. That every effort is making to render the hostile preparations still more formidable than they are at present, we have every reason to believe, and know, indeed, that some time since orders were issued by the first consulfor the building, with all possible dispatch, of several hundred strong armed vessels, of a description similar to those lately captured by two of our frigates off La Hogue, and that near siye hundred of them are already completed in the different ports of the republic. To collect these at any given point will necessarily require some time, and if any further delay takes place it will, we are persuaded, arise from this circumstance alone. Of the military movements in Holland, the following statement is given in an article from the Hague, of the 25th ult.

"A remarkable buftle and movement has within these few days been observed among the Batavian land forces intended to take a part in the expedition against the British islands. Of the 16 battalions of infantry which are destined for the expedition, and which had already been stationed at a greater or less distance around the Texel, seven of them are on their march, in order to draw nearer to that central point, two of them are in motion from Medemblicks and Hoorn to the Helder. One proceeds from Enkhizen to Scagerburg; one from Mulden to Schagen; one from Amsterdam, and two from Harderwick for

Fresh disturbances have broke out in Egypt, which, to all appearance, have been the effect of French intrigue. The Arnauts and Arabs are stated to have rifen in rebellion, and taken possession of Alexandria; in confequence of which, all the foreign agents, except the French commercial commissioner, have left the place. The latter circumstance alone affords sufficient ground of suspicion with respect to the part which the agents of France are now acting in that unhappy country; while the movements in Lower Italy, and on the shores of the Adriatic, leave but little doubt of the perfidious intentions of Buonaparte with regard to the Turkish empire. We entertain a confident hope, however, that any attempts which the enemy may be induced to make, will be effectually frustrated by the indefatigable vigilance of our fquadron in that direction.

From Hanover we learn that the French general not only continues, but almost daily increases his oppressive exactions in that country. A new requisition of 1000 horses, and a quantity of great coats has been made, and an additional sum of 1,600,000 francs has been demanded for the use of the troops. The enemy are besides carrying off all the cannon from the different fortresses; and the whole country labours under the severest distress. Russia, as we have already stated, is by no means an inattentive observer of these and other similar proceedings in the north. An immense military force is certainly collected on the frontiers of that empire, and the number of troops now ready to act, in case of necessity, is stated to

At a late hour last night, we received a variety of extracts from the Paris journals to the 26th ult. We find by these, that the minister of marine has returned to Paris from the coast, which he appears to have very minutely inspected. It was reported that the first consul proposed to set out once more from the capital on the 25th, while other accounts said that his departure would be further delayed for two or three weeks. On the 22d a deputation of the legislative body did homage to Buonaparte and his lady, after which the consul reviewed the troops, and presented colours to some Italian and other regiments. Some of the former have marched for the coasts for the purpose of being employed in the expedition against England. From Brest and the other ports, there is no news worthy of notice.

Dispatches were yesterday received at the admiraltyoffice from admiral Cornwallis, off Brest, dated the
8th instant, at which time he had just been joined by
the Manoraur, of 74 guns, and the San Joseff, of
112 guns, all well.

A letter from a naval officer belonging to one of our cruifers off the Dutch coast states, that on Sunday last a hundred and fifty sail of gun boats were distinctly counted in the port of Flushing; and that, according to the information derived from some fishermen, the troops in the neighbourhood of that place amounted to about 50,000, numbers of whom daily embarked on board the boats and transports by way of exercise; but in these manœuvres the flotilla never ventured beyond the reach of the land batteries. Several of the Dutch towns are crowded with Frenchmen, who are employed as spies upon the conduct of the unfortunate inhabitants: and other advices which reached town yesterday, state, that the latter are obliged to purchase permission to pass certain prescribed boundaries, while the former are under no restraint whatever.

We are happy to fay, the report of the prince of Wales's health yesterday was, "his royal highness is perfectly recovered."

Mr. Fox, we understand, has been with the prince of Wales every day fince Monday last.

A general opinion feems to prevail, that when Buonaparte hears of the calamity with which this country is afflicted in the ferious indisposition of its revered monarch, he will judge it a proper time to make his long threatened attempt at invasion. The conjecture is certainly not an improbable one; but if he does make the attempt of this we are confident that every man in the kingdom will feel an additional ftimulus, if one were necessary, from the very circumstance of our common calamity, to unite hand and heart in the national defence. Every volunteer would be found at his post, and every man capable of bearing arms would rush forward in defence of a beloved sovereign, endeared to his people by every tie and every feeling that can touch and interest the hu-
