Articles of Association OF THE UNION BANK OF MARYLAND.

ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME,
OR IN ANYWISE CONCERN.

BE IT KNOWN and made manifest, that we, the subscribers, have formed a company or limited partnership, and do hereby associate and agree with each other, to conduct business in the manner herein after specified and described; by and under the name and style of "The President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland;" and we do hereby mutually covenant and agree, that the following are and shall be the fundamental articles of this our association and agreement with each other, by which we, and all persons who at any time hereafter may contract business with the said company, shall be bound and concluded.

ARTICLE 1. The capital stock of the said company shall consist of THREE MILLIONS of DOLLARS, money of the United States; five hundred thousand dollars of the said stock shall be reserved until the legislature may incorporate the company, and may be subscribed for by the state, if desired by the legislature thereof; this reservation, however, shall not continue for more than five years from the election of directors. The said capital stock shall be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each; twenty dollars on each share to be paid to the commissioners at the time of subscribing, thirty dollars to the directors in Baltimore, in ninety days thereafter, at which time it is expected the bank will commence its operation, and the remainder in such portions and at such times as the directors may appoint, under pain of forfeiting to the said company said share or shares, and all previous payments thereon: but no further payment shall be required without first giving six weeks notice in at least two newspapers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagerstown, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton. At Snow-Hill, for Worcester county, for five hundred shares, under the direction of Zadock Sturgis, John Williams, Ephraim K. Wilson and Stephen Purnell.

And the commissioners aforesaid, or any two of them in the respective counties, shall open the subscription books, at ten o'clock, A. M. and they shall continue open until four o'clock, P. M. and shall remain open between those hours for one day, at least, and for the term of three days, unless sooner filled: And if it should so happen, that more than the stipulated number of shares should be subscribed on the first day, then the commissioners aforesaid are to apportion them among the subscribers, by deducting from the highest subscriptions, until they are reduced to the proper number; or, if more persons subscribe than there are shares, then the commissioners are to cast lots to decide to whom they shall belong: But, if the shares should not be all subscribed in three days, then the commissioners in the different counties, and the city of Annapolis, are to return the remainder, together with the books, and what monies they may have received at the time of subscribing, unto the directors in Baltimore, within twenty days. And the commissioners will, on deciding to whom the shares may belong, issue receipts to the different stockholders for the monies received by them at the time of subscribing; these receipts, with the original subscription, shall be deemed good evidence of the quantity of stock to which each subscriber shall be entitled in this company. But no citizen of Baltimore, or other person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be permitted to subscribe on the first day on which the books are opened at Baltimore for more than twenty shares; and if the stock be not subscribed on the first day, the books are to remain open on the second day, on the same terms as on the first; but if they are not filled on the second day, then the commissioners may permit any person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, to subscribe for any number of shares, until the whole number is complete.

ARTICLE 2. The affairs of the company shall be conducted by sixteen directors and a president, whose place, if chosen from among their number, shall be supplied by that body; and eight of the directors and the president shall form a board or quorum for transacting all the business of the company: ordinary discounts may be done by the president and any five of the directors. In case of his sickness or necessary absence, his place may be supplied by any director whom he, by writing under his hand, may nominate for that purpose: And the directors, who may be appointed at the first election, shall hold their seats until the first Monday in July, one thousand eight hundred and five, the directors, from and after that period, shall be elected for one year by the stockholders for the time being; and each director shall be a stockholder at the time of his election, and shall cease to be a director if he should cease to be a stockholder: and no director of any other bank shall, at the same time, be a director of this bank. And the number of votes to which each stockholder shall be entitled shall be in proportion to the stock he may hold, as follows: For one share, and not exceeding two shares, one vote each; for every two shares above two, and not exceeding ten, one vote; for every four shares above ten, and not exceeding thirty, one vote; for every six shares above thirty, and not exceeding sixty, one vote; for every eight shares above sixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above that number, one vote: but no person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be entitled to more than sixty votes; and no stockholder shall be permitted to vote, (except at the first election,) who has not held his stock four calendar months prior to the election: And all stockholders shall vote at elections by ballot, in

person or by proxy, which, in all elections after the first, is to be made in such form as the board of directors may appoint.

ARTICLE 3. A general meeting of the stockholders of the company shall be holden on the first Monday in July, in every year, (except the present,) at such place as the board of directors shall appoint, by giving six weeks notice, to be published in three of the news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of electing directors for the ensuing year; who shall take their seats at the board the succeeding day, and immediately proceed to elect the president: But for the present year, for the more immediate organization of the business of the company, the election shall be holden on the third Monday in April, under the direction of the commissioners appointed to receive subscriptions in the city of Baltimore.

ARTICLE 4. The board of directors are hereby fully empowered to make, revise, alter or annul, all such rules, orders, by-laws and regulations for the government of the company and that of their officers, servants and affairs, as they, or a majority of them, shall, from time to time, think expedient; not inconsistent with law or these articles of association: and to use, employ and dispose of, the joint stock, funds or property of the said company (subject only to the restrictions herein after mentioned) as to them, or a majority of them, may seem expedient.

ARTICLE 5. All bills, bonds, notes, and every contract and engagement on behalf of the company, shall be signed by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company: and the funds of the company shall in no case be held responsible for any contract or engagement whatever, unless the same shall be so signed and countersigned or attested as aforesaid.

ARTICLE 6. The books, papers, correspondence and funds of the company, shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the directors.

ARTICLE 7. The said board of directors shall have power to appoint a cashier, and all other officers and servants for executing the business of the company; and to establish the compensation to be paid to the president and all other officers and servants of the company respectively; all which, together with all other necessary expences, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

ARTICLE 8. A majority of the directors shall have power to call a general meeting of the stockholders for the purposes relative to the concerns of the company, giving at least six weeks notice in two or more news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagerstown, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, and specifying in such notice the object or objects of such meeting.

ARTICLE 9. The shares of capital stock at any time owned by any individual stockholder, shall be transferable on the books of the company, according to such rules, as conformably to law may be established in that behalf by the board of directors; but all debts actually due or payable to the company, (days of grace for payment being past,) by a stockholder, requesting a transfer, must be satisfied before such a transfer shall be made, unless the board of directors shall direct to the contrary.

ARTICLE 10. No transfer of stock in this company shall be considered as binding upon the company, unless made in a book or books to be kept for that purpose by the company. And it is hereby further expressly agreed and declared, that any stockholder who shall transfer in manner aforesaid, all his stock or shares in this company, to any other person or persons whatever, shall, ipso facto, cease to be a member of this company; and that any person or persons whatever who shall accept a transfer of any stock or share in this company, shall, ipso facto, become and be a member of this company, according to these articles of association.

ARTICLE 11. It is hereby expressly and explicitly declared to be the object and intention of the persons who associate under the style or firm of the President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland, that the joint stock or property of the said company, (exclusive of dividends to be made in the manner herein after mentioned,) shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the said company. And that no person who shall or may deal with this company, or to whom they shall or may become in any wise indebted, shall, on any pretence whatever, have recourse against the separate property of any present or future member of this company, or against their persons, further than may be necessary to secure the faithful application of the funds thereof to the purposes to which, by these presents, they are liable: But all persons accepting any bond, bill or note, or other contract of this company, signed by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company, for the time being, or dealing with it in any other manner whatsoever, thereby respectively

And it is hereby further expressly agreed and declared, that any stockholder who shall transfer in manner aforesaid, all his stock or shares in this company, to any other person or persons whatever, shall, ipso facto, cease to be a member of this company; and that any person or persons whatever who shall accept a transfer of any stock or share in this company, shall, ipso facto, become and be a member of this company, according to these articles of association.

ARTICLE 11. It is hereby expressly and explicitly declared to be the object and intention of the persons who associate under the style or firm of the President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland, that the joint stock or property of the said company, (exclusive of dividends to be made in the manner herein after mentioned,) shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the said company. And that no person who shall or may deal with this company, or to whom they shall or may become in anywise indebted, shall, on any pretence whatever, have recourse against the separate property of any present or future member of this company, or against their persons, further than may be necessary to secure the faithful application of the funds thereof to the purposes to which, by these presents, they are liable: But all persons accepting any bond, bill or note, or

other contract of this company, signed by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company, for the time being, or dealing with it in any other manner whatsoever, thereby respectively give credit to the said joint stock or property of the said company, and thereby respectively disavow having recourse, on any pretence whatever, to the person or separate property of any present or future member of this company, except as above mentioned. And all suits to be brought against this company, (if any shall be,) shall be brought against the president for the time being, and in case of his death or removal from office, pending any such suit against him, measures shall be taken, at the expense of the company, for substituting his successor in office, as a defendant; so that persons having demands upon the company may not be prejudiced or delayed by that event: Or, if the person suing, shall go on against the person first named as defendant (notwithstanding his death or removal from office) this company shall take no advantage, by writ of error or otherwise, of such proceeding on that account; and all recoveries, had in manner aforesaid, shall be conclusive upon the company, so far as to render the company's said joint stock or property liable thereby, and no further; and the company shall immediately pay the amount of such recovery out of their joint stock, but not otherwise. These articles of agreement shall be published in at least two newspapers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagar's-town, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, for one month; and for the further information of all persons, who may transact business with, or in any manner give credit to, this company, every bond, bill, note or other instrument or contract, by the effect or terms of which the company may be charged or held liable for the payment of money, shall specially declare, in such form as the board of directors shall prescribe, that payment shall be made out of the joint funds of "The United Bank of Maryland," according to the present articles of association, and not otherwise; a copy of the eleventh article of this association, shall be inserted in the bank book of every person, depositing money or other valuable property with the company for safe custody; or a printed copy shall be delivered to every such person before any such deposit: shall be received from him. And it is hereby expressly declared, that no engagement can be legally made in the name of the said company, unless it contain a limitation or restriction to the effect above recited. And the company hereby expressly disavow all responsibility for any debt or engagement, which may be made in their name, not containing a limitation or restriction to the effect aforesaid.

ARTICLE 15. The company shall in no case be owners of any ships or vessels, or directly or indirectly be concerned in trade or the importation or exportation, purchase or sale of any goods, wares or merchandise whatever, (bills of exchange and bullion only excepted,) and except such ships, vessels, goods, wares or merchandise, as shall be truly pledged to them by way of security for debts due, owing or growing due to the said company, or purchased by them to secure such debts so due to the said company.

ARTICLE 16. If a vacancy shall at any time happen among the directors, by death, resignation, or otherwise, the residue of the directors, for the time being, shall elect a director to fill the vacancy, if they shall deem it necessary, until the next election of directors.

PHILADELPHIA, March 1.

We are told that the unfortunate and mysterious Miss McDowell, whose misfortune has excited so much public solicitude, is now in this city, under the protection of several worthy members of the Society of Friends.

CHARLESTON, February 13.

Yesterday morning about six o'clock, the southern double range of brick stores on Roper's wharf, in this city, was discovered to be on fire. The flames had got to so considerable a height before they were discovered, that it was impossible to get them under before the whole of the range was burnt or pulled down. That wharf and its stores are in the possession of Messrs. Waring and Smith, factors; the stores contained near a thousand barrels of rice, and upwards of seven hundred bales of long staple cotton; of the former it is supposed upwards of four hundred barrels are destroyed, and nearly four hundred bales of the latter. This property belonged to different planters and merchants: the eastern end of the range was occupied by Messrs. Waring and Smith, Mr. Thomas Ball and Messrs. Alexander and John Corrie, as counting houses; nothing was saved out of these but their papers and books. We have no information to say positively to what this unfortunate circumstance is owing, however, there is no reason to believe it was done designedly.

NORFOLK, February 21.

Yesterday arrived the ship Favourite, captain Goodrich, in 79 days from London; by which arrival we received a regular file of papers to the first of December, their contents are by no means interesting. We conversed with captain Goodrich, he says that trade is very brisk in the river Thames, that the idea of a French invasion is every day subsiding, and that the general opinion in England was, that Buonaparte kept up the appearance of an invasion, merely to ruin the United Kingdom, with a load of expenses, which they must certainly labour under from the vast preparations made and every day making to repel the enemy.

LONDON, November 29.

Letters from Venice and Trieste still insist upon our having landed troops in Egypt. They say, that an English fleet of five sail of the line, besides frigates, cutters and transports, arrived before Alexandria a fortnight after the capture of the place by the Mamelukes.

"The English landed 4000 men, who are destined to occupy the ports and maritime places of Egypt. This Squadron is the same that was collected at Malta, as it was said, to make an attack upon the island of Elba. The English had an understanding with the beys, or Mamelukes, whom they secretly supplied with arms, artillery and ammunition. It is a proof that general Stuart made a convention with the beys, in consequence of which they agreed to surrender the principal places, in case of their success, and that it is in virtue of this treaty that the English have been allowed to make a landing in Egypt."

Vienna, according to the Paris papers which arrived last night, is the centre of important negotiations between Austria, Russia and Prussia. It should

seem as if the emperor Alexander had at last been routed by the daring designs of Buonaparte. Count Warcov is to be recalled; and it is evident, that he abstained from going to the consular levees for the last month, in consequence of a coolness between the two cabinets, not from any motives personal to himself. However an ambassador may dislike the posture to whom he is sent, he must still observe the etiquette usual between nations at peace with each other. Whether count Warcov will be replaced by any other ambassador we know not; but we insert the substance of a letter we received this morning.

Extract of a letter from Hamburg, to a gentleman in Glasgow, dated 8th Nov.

"Our senate has agreed to the French demand of a loan of two millions of livres; prompt two millions in a short period, and 300,000 monthly, while they are our neighbours. They now set upon Lubek and Bremen for something, and it is said, they ask of Mecklenburg four millions of dollars and of Saxony three millions—only until they approach us. Another report is that Russian troops are coming down the Baltic, and that already war is declared against France."

Another letter, of date the 11th, says, "Lubek has agreed; of course, the trade to Hamburg remains uninterrupted."

December 1.

Dispatches have been received by government from the Squadron of admiral Cornwallis, which state, that the French force in the outer harbour of Brest has been lately increased by the addition of three ships of the line, making in all ten. The inner harbour is said to be crowded with transports and other vessels of craft. The British ships suffered considerably in the masts and rigging during the late gale; some of them lost their anchors.

We have received Dutch papers to the 17th inst. From what they are allowed to make public, we can infer the deranged state of the Dutch finances. Indeed they make no secret of the deficiency being great, and it is intimated that vigorous measures will speedily be resorted to, to extort the money wanted for the execution of the projects of France.

DEPLORABLE AND DISTRESSING FIRE.

On Wednesday night, about eleven o'clock, the inhabitants were roused from their beds with the repeated cry of FIRE! which was perceived issuing from the warehouse of Mr. Dunlap, on Market wharf, and which raged and spread with such force, that the only exertion which could be made by the activity of the citizens to arrest its progress, was the blowing up of several houses, or it is probable that the house in the borough would have escaped destruction. It has laid waste the most commercial part of the town, having totally destroyed every building on Campbell's wharf, Maxwell's, Mariden's, Reddy's, Commerce-street, Warren's and Woodside's wharves, and progressed up the Market Square, to the Main street, and continued its ravages along the Main street to Mr. Whitehead's new buildings, reducing every house in Wide and Little Water-streets. We are not for the exertions of a few who manfully met the flames, and prevented Mr. Taylor's warehouse adjoining Woodside's wharf from taking fire, the whole of the valuable buildings on Town-point would have been laid waste.

Some lives were lost, and many persons badly wounded by the blowing up of the houses. The market-house was partly cut down, which prevented a communication of the flames to the north side of the Main street, which luckily escaped. Upwards of 260 houses are totally destroyed, and the estimate of general loss, is, on a moderate calculation, supposed to exceed one million of dollars. Numbers of lighters, owing to their being overloaded, and the tide being remarkably low, were burnt in the docks. Several vessels at the wharfs took fire, and from this state drifted to Portsmouth, when it commenced and destroyed some others—indeed, at one period it appeared as if Portsmouth was on fire.

The raging of the flames, the columns of smoke, the blowing up of houses, the rainy night, the property exposed for safety in the streets, the cries of those who were seated by their little property, and only by the canopy of Heaven—the ships on fire drifting in the harbour, together with the probability of the whole town being destroyed, exhibited a dreadful picture. Thousands must have been deprived of a resting place, as it was the most populous part of the borough.

What adds to the above melancholy narrative is that a snow and very severe frost came on, and many an unfortunate family could find shelter under their wearied limbs. We are happy to learn that the corporation have allotted money for the immediate relief of the needy sufferers, who will receive assistance on application at the office of John Esquire. Handbills to this effect appeared in different parts of the town, those happy benefactors, whom Providence has blessed with fluence, have now a fine opportunity to exhibit benevolence, by adding their liberality to that of the corporate body; and, we have no doubt, the same will be cheerfully received at the above office and with equal satisfaction distributed.

The inhabitants of all descriptions showed activity; but it is to be lamented, that there were so few buckets and axes, and that the engines were not kept in better order, as they were of little use.

And the number of votes to which each stockholder shall be entitled shall be in proportion to the stock he may hold, as follows: For one share, and not exceeding two shares, one vote each; for every two shares above two, and not exceeding ten, one vote; for every four shares above ten, and not exceeding thirty, one vote; for every six shares above thirty, and not exceeding sixty, one vote; for every eight shares above sixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above that number, one vote; but no person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be entitled to more than sixty

But no person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be permitted to subscribe on the first day on which the books are opened at Baltimore for more than twenty shares; and if the stock be not subscribed on the first day, the books are to remain open on the second day, on the same terms as on the first; but if they are not filled on the second day, then the commissioners may permit any person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, to subscribe for any number of shares, until the whole number is complete.

ARTICLE 2. The affairs of the company shall be conducted by sixteen directors and a president, whose place, if chosen from among their number, shall be supplied by that body; and eight of the directors and the president shall form a board or quorum for transacting all the business of the company: ordinary dis-counts may be done by the president and any five of the directors. In case of his sickness or necessary absence, his place may be supplied by any director whom he, by writing under his hand, may nominate for that purpose: And the directors, who may be appointed at the first election, shall hold their seats until the first Monday in July, one thousand eight hundred and five, the directors, from and after that period, shall be elected for one year by the stockholders for the time being; and each director shall be a stockholder at the time of his election, and shall cease to be a director if he should cease to be a stockholder: and no director of any other bank shall, at the same time, be a director of this bank. And the number of votes to which each stockholder shall be entitled shall be in proportion to the stock he may hold, as follows: For one share, and not exceeding two shares, one vote each; for every two shares above two, and not exceeding ten, one vote; for every four shares above ten, and not exceeding thirty, one vote; for every six shares above thirty, and not exceeding sixty, one vote; for every eight shares above sixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above that number, one vote: but no person or persons, bodies corporate or otherwise, shall be entitled to more than sixty

votes; and no stockholder shall be permitted to vote, (except at the first election,) who has not held his stock four calendar months prior to the election: And all stockholders shall vote at elections by ballot, in person or by proxy, which, in all elections after the first, is to be made in such form as the board of directors may appoint.

ARTICLE 3. A general meeting of the stockholders of the company shall be holden on the first Monday in July, in every year, (except the present,) at such place as the board of directors shall appoint, by giving six weeks notice, to be published in three of the news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of electing directors for the ensuing year; who shall take their seats at the board the succeeding day, and immediately proceed to elect the president: But for the present year, for the more immediate organization of the business of the company, the election shall be holden on the third Monday in April, under the direction of the commissioners appointed to receive subscriptions in the city of Baltimore.

ARTICLE 4. The board of directors are hereby fully empowered to make, revise, alter or annul, all such rules, orders, by-laws and regulations for the government of the company and that of their officers, servants and affairs, as they, or a majority of them, shall, from time to time, think expedient; not inconsistent with law or these articles of association: and to use, employ and dispose of, the joint stock, funds or property of the said company (subject only to the restrictions herein after mentioned) as to them, or a majority of them, may seem expedient.

ARTICLE 5. All bills, bonds, notes, and every contract and engagement on behalf of the company, shall be signed by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company: and the funds of the company shall in no case be held responsible for any contract or engagement whatever, unless the same shall be so signed and countersigned or attested as aforesaid.

ARTICLE 6. The books, papers, correspondence and funds of the company, shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the directors.

ARTICLE 7. The said board of directors shall have power to appoint a cashier, and all other officers and servants for executing the business of the company; and to establish the compensation to be paid to the president and all other officers and servants of the company respectively; all which, together with all other necessary expences, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

ARTICLE 8. A majority of the directors shall have power to call a general meeting of the stockholders for the purposes relative to the concerns of the company, giving at least six weeks notice in two or more news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in Frederick-town, one in Hagar's-town, one in the city of Annapolis, and one in Easton, and specifying in such notice the object or objects of such meeting.

ARTICLE 9. The shares of capital stock at any time owned by any individual stockholder, shall be transferrable on the books of the company, according to such rules, as conformably to law may be established in that behalf by the board of directors; but all debts actually due or payable to the company, (days of grace for payment being past,) by a stockholder, requesting a transfer, must be satisfied before such a transfer shall be made, unless the board of directors shall direct to the contrary.

ARTICLE 10. No transfer of stock in this company shall be considered as binding upon the company, unless made in a book or books to be kept for that purpose by the company. And it is hereby further expressly agreed and declared, that any stockholder who shall transfer in manner aforesaid, all his stock or shares in this company, to any other person or persons whatever, shall, ipso facto, cease to be a member of this company; and that any person or persons whatever who shall accept a transfer of any stock or share in this company, shall, ipso facto, become and be a member of this company, according to these articles of association.

ARTICLE 11. It is hereby expressly and explicitly declared to be the object and intention of the persons who associate under the style or firm of the President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland, that the joint stock or property of the said company, (exclusive of dividends to be made in the manner herein after mentioned,) shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the said company. From motives of humanity, government offered Dwyer, the rebel, a passage, free of expence, for himself and followers, besides a handsome sum, to remove to America; which he refused, and he is now to be transported to Botany Bay.

NEW-YORK, March 8.

Buonaparte's marine guards.

The first consul's intention of heading the grand invading expedition in person, does not appear to be abandoned. The sailors of the consular guard, are stated to have appeared in Paris on the grand parade fully equipped, in jackets and trousers, with their cutlasses, canteens, &c. and with pistols in their belts. They are described as active, vigorous, and determined men. The first consul's brother, Louis Buonaparte, is stated to have left Paris to take command of a brigade of cavalry, to form part of the invading army.

A London paper of December 14, mentions, that a gentleman arrived from France, had communicated to the ministers much of the enemy's projects. He stated that from his own knowledge 100,000 men were ready to embark. He brought with him a large packet of papers, among which were correct plans and charts of the coast, and drafts of many forts belonging to the nobility and gentry, which had been distributed among the officers of the army. These drafts were stated to have been distributed by the minister of war by order of Buonaparte.

A letter from Cronstadt to a gentleman in Edinburgh, inserted in one of our late London prints, states, that "Russia is vigorously preparing for war, that both Sweden and Denmark will join against France, as it is the intention of Buonaparte to take possession of the entrance of the Sound, to prevent Great-Britain from trading to the Baltic."

WASHINGTON, March 8.

Much vague rumour prevailing respecting some recent occurrences at New-Orleans, by which important circumstances are magnified so as to present in unpleasant aspect, we conceive it our duty to state them as correctly as letters from that place enable us to do.

Regular assemblies are periodically held at New-Orleans, under the direction of the municipal officers. According to rules fixed by them, which existed previous to the cession of the country, the dances were arranged, in the following order: first, the cotillions; next, a country dance for twelve couple, and lastly, the Waltz.

At an assembly held, on the 6th of January, some slight misunderstanding arose between the Americans and French, the causes of which, though not distinctly known, were generally considered as connected with some erroneous statement of the feelings of the French citizens on the cession of the American in the room of the French flag when the first celebration of the cession took place. This misunderstanding was apparently hurried, when on the 23d of January another assembly was held. According to the above rules the dancing commenced with cotillions, followed by a country dance of twelve couple; the music, having received instructions in consonance with this arrangement, ceased to play the one appropriate to the country dance, as soon as the twelve couple had led down the dance. In the meantime six additional couple, composed of Americans, placed themselves at the end of the dance. As soon as the music ceased, the Americans required a continuation of it and of the country dance; while the French citizens called for the Waltz, a dance, in which it is understood, as many of the company as were participants.

The music declining to play a continuation of this one, an American citizen broke the violin of one of the band with his cane, which likewise being broken, exposed a sword. Some tumult ensued, during which a French officer left the room and returned with a broad sword. In the mean-time, to appease the disorder, governor Claiborne and general Wilkinson addressed the company, and inquired what were the wishes of the dissatisfied. The French officer replied, "we want the Waltz." This reply from one made in French, not being understood by the Americans, but, on the contrary, being interpreted to a menace, increased the disorder. Gen. Wilkinson was inducing, in an amicable way, the officer to retire, when some American citizens met the general, and gave advice which he repelled. This likewise being misunderstood, was erroneously considered as an act of violence offered by the French officer to the general, and increased the tumult. Swords were drawn, but no lives lost or bodily injury done. The officer was arrested, and required to appear before the civil authority the ensuing day, when he was released.

After the arrest, the American commissioners, we understand, received a letter from Mr. L'Aussat, protesting against the exercise of authority, on the part of the United States, in relation to French officers alleging that under the treaty of cession, three months having been allowed for the evacuation of the place by the French troops, previous to the expiration of that period French officers were under his con-

trol. The liberation of the officer having previously taken place superseded any further act on the part of the civil authority.

It will appear from this minute statement of facts, for which our sole apology is to be found in the sensibility of the public mind to whatever relates to our new acquisition, that the transaction is of an ordinary nature, and one which does not justify the mistatement or alarm which has gone abroad.

BALTIMORE, March 8.

From the Philadelphia Evening Post.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT.

A confidential correspondent has communicated to us the substance of a letter just received from Germany, stating that country to be in a state of extreme inquietude, from great fermentations and intestine divisions having lately taken place, which promise some important event. Whether these divisions have been produced by the intrigues of France, or by some imprudent step of the Austrian government, is not yet known; this much, however, we can say, that four violent parties have lately broke out, and have much disturbed the social harmony among the citizens of the first class. The first party, which is denominated the Imperial, is most actively employed in supporting the plans and furthering the operations of the court, which tend to threaten the Ottoman empire. The second party, which is called the Prussian, is supposed to aim at the aggrandizement of the successor of Frederick the Great, by making him a partner in the empire, and even claiming for him the right of being elected to the Imperial throne in succession. A third party, no less troublesome, is called the Republican, who are equally averse to conquest and to monarchy. The fourth party, which seems to rule over the old institutions and former opinions, is that of France, or Buonaparte. Those under the influence of this party, will justify no particular measures, which are not in concert with France. The distressing effects of these internal contentions and divisions have already reached the Imperial cabinet, from which one or two ministers have been removed. The public funds have also felt the shock, and have decreased to an alarming degree. The notes of the bank of Vienna have fallen 65 per cent. and notwithstanding such ruinous discredit, the government insists upon discharging their obligations with this depreciated paper, which must be received by the creditors of the empire, at full value. It is expected that many thousands will be ruined by this procedure.

The above comes from so respectable a source, that its truth cannot be doubted.

Articles of Association

OF THE
UNION BANK OF MARYLAND.ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME,
OR IN ANYWISE CONCERN.

BE IT KNOWN and made manifest, that we, the subscribers, have formed a company or limited partnership, and do hereby associate and agree with each other, to conduct business in the manner after specified and described, by and under the name and style of "The President and Directors of Union Bank of Maryland;" and we do hereby mutually covenant and agree, that the following are to be the fundamental articles of this our association and agreement with each other, by which we, all persons who at any time hereafter may be admitted to business with the said company, shall be bound and concluded.

ARTICLE 1. The capital stock of the said company shall consist of THREE MILLIONS of DOLLARS, money of the United States; five hundred thousand dollars of the said stock shall be reserved for the legislature may incorporate the company, may be subscribed for by the state, if desired by the legislature thereof; this reservation, however, shall not continue for more than five years from the election of directors. votes; and no stockholder shall be permitted to vote, (except at the first election,) who has not held his stock four calendar months prior to the election: And all stockholders shall vote at elections by ballot, in person or by proxy, which, in all elections after the first, is to be made in such form as the board of directors may appoint.

A general meeting of the stockholders of the company shall be holden on the first Monday in July, in every year, (except the present,) at such place as the board of directors shall appoint, by giving six weeks notice, to be published in three of the news-papers printed in the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of electing directors for the ensuing year; who shall take their seats at the board the succeeding day, and immediately proceed to elect the president: But for the present year, for the more immediate organization of the business of the company, the election shall be holden on the third Monday in April, under the direction of the commissioners appointed to receive subscriptions in the city of Baltimore.

ARTICLE 4. The board of directors are hereby fully empowered to make, revise, alter or annul, all such rules, orders, by-laws and regulations for the government of the company and that of their officers, servants and affairs, as they, or a majority of them, shall, from time to time, think expedient; not inconsistent with law or these articles of association: and to use, employ and dispose of, the joint stock, funds or property of the said company (subject only to the restrictions herein after mentioned) as to them, or a majority of them, may seem expedient.

ARTICLE 5. All bills, bonds, notes, and every contract and engagement on behalf of the company, shall be signed by the president and countersigned or attested by the cashier of the company: and the funds of the company shall in no case be held responsible for any contract or engagement whatever, unless the same shall be so signed and countersigned or attested as aforesaid.

ARTICLE 6. The books, papers, correspondence and funds of the company, shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the directors.

ARTICLE 7. The said board of directors shall have power to appoint a cashier, and all other officers and servants for executing the business of the company; and to establish the compensation to be paid to the president and all other officers and servants of the company respectively; all which, together with all other necessary expenses, shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

The shares of capital stock at any time owned by any individual stockholder, shall be transferrable on the books of the company, according to such rules, as conformably to law may be established in that behalf by the board of directors; but all debts actually due or payable to the company, (days of grace for payment being past,) by a stockholder, requesting a transfer, must be satisfied before such a transfer shall be made, unless the board of directors shall direct to the contrary.

BALTIMORE, March 13.
Arrived, brig Alliance, capt. Carlson, 34 days from
Curacao. Captain Carlson furnishes the follow
ing account of an attack by the British upon Cur
acao.

"On the last day of January, four English men
of war and a schooner, viz. two ships of the line and
two frigates, came off the harbour at 8 o'clock in the
morning, without the least expectation by the Dutch.
They sent in a flag of truce, and demanded the sur
render of the island, which the Dutch refused; they
immediately bore down, attacked and took the fort
Piscadary, and landed their troops. From the best
information I could get, they consisted of six or se
ven hundred men; they marched up and took posses
sion of the hill where the French built their fort
when they attacked the island, and mounted a field
piece, with which they threw shot into the forts in
town for the first day; but Fort George, and a fort
the French have built on the hill below Fort George,
annoyed them so much, that they left it, and built a
fort below the hill, so that Fort George nor the
French fort, can do them no injury. For three days
previous to my leaving the island, they were contin
ually firing from the English fort into the town, with
three or four heavy guns, almost every shot going
through some house; the government house I sup
pose had received fifty; it is entirely deserted, as is
almost every house in town. The Dutch troops have
had two skirmishes with the English, in the first of
which they took four prisoners they found straggling
in Lothro Banda; the last time the English drove
them in as fast as their legs could carry them. The
Dutch appeared to be low spirited, but entertained
hopes that the British would go away. The two fri
gates lie to windward of the harbour, the two line
of battle ships to leeward, and the schooner at anchor at
Piscadary; they have taken several vessels, and sent
them to leeward, but what they were I know not.
The Dutch have haled a large ship adward the har
bour's mouth, with the intention of sinking her
should they be attacked from the sea; they have haled
another vessel alongside the frigate, to prevent the
shot from injuring her. The day I left port, the
Lutheran church in Lothro Banda, was burnt, but I
expect by some villains for the sake of plunder. I left
the island the 6th February, at 8 o'clock at night,
after endeavouring four or five days to get out; I
took advantage (seeing both the ships to leeward tack
close in with the shore, and stand off) I ran down
within pistol shot of the British fort, but shewed no
light, so that they did not discover me."

The house immediately took the report of the com
mittee into consideration, (Some remarks were made
by Messrs. Elliott, R. Grifwold, J. Randolph and
Huger.)

The question was then taken by yeas and nays on
concurring in the report of the committee, and the
first resolution carried, ayes 73—noes 32. The se
cond was agreed to unanimously.

Messrs. J. Randolph and Early were, on motion,
appointed a committee, to appear before the senate,
and impeach, in the name of the house of representa
tives, Samuel Chase of high crimes and misdemeanors,
which was done on the following day, and a commit
tee of five appointed to frame articles of impeachment,
with power to send for persons and papers.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

London papers, to the evening of February 18, received at the office of the Philadelphia Gazette, by the Pigou, Collet, from London.]

NEW MINISTRY.

The following arrangement for a new administration (from the London Sun, Feb. 17) is confidently believed about:

LONDON, February 7.

In the house of commons yesterday, Mr. Secretary Yorke, after a minute history of the volunteer system, and the inconveniences which had arisen therefrom, had leave to bring in a bill to consolidate and amend the provisions of the several acts now in force relating to the volunteer and yeomanry corps. [The volunteer corps, amounting to 500,000 men, have caused the British ministry much anxiety. Being composed of incongruous elements, they have been hard in discipline, and much harder to govern. The defects of the system appear to be, 1st, The want of claim of electing their officers. 2d, The want of resignation; and 3d, The system of the imputation and enforcement of fines. With respect to the first, the ministry contend, that as citizens, before they offered their services, they had a right to choose their officers; but when their services were accepted by government, and they had become soldiers, the right of supplying all vacancies was in the king. As the second point, the agreement being mutual between the corps and the government, it could not be altered without the consent of both parties.]

February 15.

It is with extreme regret we announce, that his majesty is again much indisposed. Yesterday morning it was found necessary to send for Sir Francis Manners, Dr. Heberden, of Pall-Mall, and Dr. Dundas, of Richmond, who continued with his majesty the greater part of the day. The dukes of Clarence, York, and Cambridge, went to the queen's house in the afternoon, where they continued till a late hour at night; and the prince of Wales, with the most becoming filial anxiety, sent several times to inquire into the state of his majesty's health. In the course of the day great numbers of the nobility left their cards of inquiry; and, with a commendable attention to public feeling, the following bulletin was issued to-morrow:

"His majesty is much indisposed to-day."

A mail from Hamburg arrived yesterday morning, the principal contents of which are given in another part of our paper. Respecting the preparations for the invasion of this country, we find little intelligence beyond that of which we were previously possessed. From the Hague it is stated, that some divisions of Batavian troops, under the command of generals Monceau, Cras, and Quatta, have received orders to march to the Texel, where a fleet of men of war transports is collected for their conveyance to the English coast; while letters from Amsterdam say, that the expedition will not sail before the end of March, owing to the length of time that is requisite to collect the several flotillas at Boulogne, which, when complete, will consist of not less than 1500 vessels of different descriptions. This statement of probable delay of the attempt may, however, be ended merely for the purpose of deception in order to put us off our guard; but if this be really the intention of our enemy, he will find himself completely disappointed in his object. We possess at present a good and commanding station, from which neither force nor the artifice of the enemy is capable of

removing us; and come when he may, he will find us ready to give him the reception he merits. That every effort is making to render the hostile preparations still more formidable than they are at present, we have every reason to believe, and know, indeed, that some time since orders were issued by the first consul for the building, with all possible dispatch, of several hundred strong armed vessels, of a description similar to those lately captured by two of our frigates off La Hogue, and that near five hundred of them are already completed in the different ports of the republic. To collect these at any given point will necessarily require some time, and if any further delay takes place it will, we are persuaded, arise from this circumstance alone. Of the military movements in Holland, the following statement is given in an article from the Hague, of the 25th ult.

"A remarkable bustle and movement has within these few days been observed among the Batavian land forces intended to take a part in the expedition against the British islands. Of the 16 battalions of infantry which are destined for the expedition, and which had already been stationed at a greater or less distance around the Texel, seven of them are on their march, in order to draw nearer to that central point; two of them are in motion from Medemblick and Hoorn to the Helder. One proceeds from Enkhizen to Scagerburg; one from Mulden to Schagen; one from Amsterdam, and two from Harderwick for Alkmaar."

Fresh disturbances have broke out in Egypt, which, to all appearance, have been the effect of French intrigue. The Arnauts and Arabs are stated to have risen in rebellion, and taken possession of Alexandria; in consequence of which, all the foreign agents, except the French commercial commissioner, have left the place. The latter circumstance alone affords sufficient ground of suspicion with respect to the part which the agents of France are now acting in that unhappy country; while the movements in Lower Italy, and on the shores of the Adriatic, leave but little doubt of the perfidious intentions of Buonaparte with regard to the Turkish empire. We entertain a confident hope, however, that any attempts which the enemy may be induced to make, will be effectually frustrated by the indefatigable vigilance of our squadron in that direction.

From Hanover we learn that the French general not only continues, but almost daily increases his oppressive exactions in that country. A new requisition of 1000 horses, and a quantity of great coats has been made, and an additional sum of 1,600,000 francs has been demanded for the use of the troops. The enemy are besides carrying off all the cannon from the different fortresses; and the whole country labours under the severest distress. Russia, as we have already stated, is by no means an inattentive observer of these and other similar proceedings in the north. An immense military force is certainly collected on the frontiers of that empire, and the number of troops now ready to act, in case of necessity, is stated to exceed 200,000.

At a late hour last night, we received a variety of extracts from the Paris journals to the 26th ult. We find by these, that the minister of marine has returned to Paris from the coast, which he appears to have very minutely inspected. It was reported that the first consul proposed to set out once more from the capital on the 25th, while other accounts said that his departure would be further delayed for two or three weeks. On the 22d a deputation of the legislative body did homage to Buonaparte and his lady, after which the consul reviewed the troops, and presented colours to some Italian and other regiments. Some of the former have marched for the coasts for the purpose of being employed in the expedition against England. From Brest and the other ports, there is no news worthy of notice.

Dispatches were yesterday received at the admiralty-office from admiral Cornwallis, off Brest, dated the 8th instant, at which time he had just been joined by the *Minotaur*, of 74 guns, and the *San Josef*, of 112 guns, all well.

We are extremely sorry to state that his majesty's indisposition has not yet taken a favourable turn. The bulletin given out yesterday, for the satisfaction of the numerous inquirers of all ranks was—

"His majesty is to-day much the same as he was yesterday."

Yesterday, there was a consultation of the most eminent physicians on his majesty's case.—Nothing has transpired of the issue of their deliberations. Of the nature of his majesty's complaint very little is known. The general report is that it is dropical, attended at present by a fever.

Yesterday the answers to the inquirers after the prince of Wales's health were—"His royal highness is better, but very weak."

Another Hamburg mail arrived yesterday, but it is not so late as that arrived on Tuesday, and contains no news of importance. We find no mention of the new levy of 80,000 men, said in letters from Stockholm to have been ordered by the emperor of Russia.

We have great satisfaction in laying before our reader the bulletin of this morning, which imparts a ray of hope that his majesty's disorder may take a favourable turn.

"His majesty has had several hours sleep, and appears refreshed by it."

The statement which we made yesterday, we have every reason to believe to have been perfectly correct. Some of the papers of this day presume to contradict one part of it, but when they become better informed, they will find that we were right, and that they are wrong.

His majesty's legs, it is added, has become so swelled, that they underwent the operation of scarification. We are led to hope that it has contributed to ameliorate his majesty's situation.

A letter from a naval officer belonging to one of our cruisers off the Dutch coast states, that on Sunday last a hundred and fifty sail of gun boats were distinctly counted in the port of Flushing; and that, according to the information derived from some fishermen, the troops in the neighbourhood of that place amounted to about 50,000, numbers of whom daily embarked on board the boats and transports by way of exercise; but in these manœuvres the flotilla never ventured beyond the reach of the land batteries. Several of the Dutch towns are crowded with Frenchmen, who are employed as spies upon the conduct of the unfortunate inhabitants; and other advices which reached town yesterday, state, that the latter are obliged to purchase permission to pass certain prescribed boundaries, while the former are under no restraint whatever.

We are happy to say, the report of the prince of Wales's health yesterday was, "his royal highness is perfectly recovered."

Mr. Fox, we understand, has been with the prince of Wales every day since Monday last.

A general opinion seems to prevail, that when Buonaparte hears of the calamity with which this country is afflicted in the serious indisposition of its revered monarch, he will judge it a proper time to make his long threatened attempt at invasion. The conjecture is certainly not an improbable one; but if he does make the attempt of this we are confident that every man in the kingdom will feel an additional stimulus, if one were necessary, from the very circumstance of our common calamity, to unite hand and heart in the national defence. Every volunteer would be found at his post, and every man capable of bearing arms would rush forward in defence of a beloved sovereign, endeared to his people by every tie and every feeling that can touch and interest the human heart.

February 18.

The bulletin was not delivered out quite so early this day as yesterday, and the crowd of nobility and gentry, waiting with anxiety at St. James's, to learn the state of his majesty's health, was, if possible, greater than on any preceding day since his indisposition.

It must rejoice every loyal heart to be informed, that our beloved sovereign is now considered to be in no danger. We may therefore indulge a fond hope that in a few days his majesty will be restored to his wonted health. No language can describe the general joy which was manifested by the numerous inquirers this morning, when shewn the following
