FSC Commended at Reaccreditation

The Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools has reaffirmed the accreditation of Frostburg State College.

According to Robert Kirkwood, executive director of commission, Frostburg State College was commended for the responsiveness of the report to the recommendations of the 1976 evaluation team that visited the college and for the quality of its overall master plan.

"Frostburg State College has made progress on many fronts in the last five years and it is to be commended for its forthrightness and broad perspective as it contemplates the future," Mr. Kirkwood said.

Cited as impressive by the commission were the college's academic master plan, its task force on marketing, procedures for faculty retrenchment (if necessary), the master plan for the division of student affairs, the creation of new undergraduate majors, and the implementation of five new master level programs.

Mr. Kirkwood also said the commission has praised Frostburg State College for its dedication to the community of which it is a part, "a dedication that is true, deep, extensive and extraordinary."

Mr. Kirkwood noted, however, that inadequacy of budgetary support for operational needs, underfunding relative to the state formula, and tightline-item control by state agencies remain as major areas of concern for the college. "Regrettably, the periodically review report indicates that this situation has not improved over the last five years, but, indeed, has worsened."

The Commission on Higher Education, however, is hopeful that recognition of the need for higher education to be funded at a greater level and for institutions to be permitted reasonable flexibility over management of funds, may emerge in the future.

The next full evaluation of Frostburg State College by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools will take place in the 1985-86 academic year.

Student Special Services

Are you aware of the special programs available to FSC students on this campus? One such organization currently operating is the Student Special Services—a federally funded program designed to help students succeed in college. The program has been a success since it began serving students in 1973, and there are currently over 250 SSS students annually.

The program's main goal is to help students academically by improving their study habits and skills, although SSS also provides access to social and cultural events which may not normally be available to economically limited students. The SSS has its own tutoring program, sponsors Mini Courses on such subjects as test taking (objective and essay), lecture note taking, preparing resumes and cover letters, and also holds workshops on how to apply for financial aid.

Recent cultural and social events which SSS students participated in include a trip to the Kennedy Center to see EVITA, a ski trip to WISP, and attending school drama productions such as "Tartuffe," "Night Must Fall," and the upcoming play "The Glass Menagerie."

SSS participants are eligible to use the Learning Center texts, slide tape programs, video tapes, etc., and the Professional SSS staff is always available to help students with the challenge of utilizing college resources and managing the college system.

The SSS staff is made up of 5 professional staff members and numerous students who all work together to create a cohesive and beneficial program for students. Sarah Donohue is the director of the SSS program and she is in charge of overseeing the whole operation. Ms. Donohue also works with the handicapped students on campus and helps them adjust to life on the Frostburg campus. Ruth Boyle, the academic development specialist, coordinates the Mini Courses and workshops. She finds the areas in which students need help and then tries to provide avenues through which they can work on their deficiencies. Charlie Nale, the personal development specialist, is in charge of providing access to various social

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Outlook Dim for Financial Aid at FSC

Everyone has been hearing a lot about the cuts in educational aid programs which the Reagan administration has proposed. But what effect will these proposed reductions have on FSC students? According to Ms. Kathy Kutler of the FSC Financial Aid Office, these cuts, if approved, would mean that the four major financial aid programs offered here would be seriously limited. Ms. Kutler noted that the reductions already approved for next year (1982-83) were small compared to those which have been proposed for the 1983-84 school year. These latter proposals are still being deliberated in Congress, and concerned students and educators are hoping that opposition will be strong enough to force the Reagan administration to compromise on these drastic 1983-84 reductions.

The largest financial aid program at FSC is the Pell Grant program. The budget cuts for 1982-83 have reduced the funds for this program by 7%, a significant but not an overwhelming reduction. The budget cut proposed for the 1983-84 year are more severe: the Reagan administration has suggested a 40% decrease in the funds for the Pell Grant program. At FSC, this reduction would mean a loss of \$308,000 in just one year.

The second largest program at FSC which will be affected is the National Direct Loan pro-

gram. This program allows students to borrow money from the college: the loans are interest-free until six months after college is completed, after which time interest accrues at the rate of 5%. In order to provide these loans, the financial aid office uses the money which is being repaid to them from past loans as well as the available government supplements. Of the funds used in the National Direct Loan program this year, 32% was supplied by the federal government. Next year, the funds contributed by the government will be reduced by 5%. For the 1983-1983-84 year, however, Reagan has proposed that the government supply no money at all to the colleges, thereby forcing them to rely on money being returned to them from past loans to support the program.

The third largest financial aid program at FSC is the College Work Study program. For the 1982-83 year, this program will operate with only 88% of the funding they currently receive. The Reagan administration's proposed cut for 1983-84 would provide the Financial Aid Office with only 72% of this year's total funding.

The last of the four-main programs to be affected by budget cuts is the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant program, which allows the FA Office to award monetary grants

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New Library Policies to Begin in August

On February 23rd, the Library Committee unanimously approved the rule changes recommended by a special subcommittee which was formed to review the policies concerning noise, smoking, food and drink in the library. The Library Committee has one representative from each academic dept. and three student reps.

The library director, Mr. John Zimmerman, has decided to implement the new code in August of 1982. Therefore, FSC students should anticipate the following changes when they return to campus in August:

1. No food or drinks are allowed in the Library. The Lane Center should be used when food or drinks are consumed. Smoking is permitted only in the 3rd floor lounge.

2. Group study rooms may be reserved at the Circulation Desk. I.D. cards will be exchanged for access. Group studying will be allowed in these rooms from 8:30 a.m.-10:00 pm weekdays.

3. Excessive noise is prohibited. Loud conversation, yelling, etc. must cease at the entrance to the Library.

4. Typing is allowed in two rooms on Floor 4. Ask Reserve Attendant for help.

These new policies were enacted in response to complaints by students and faculty. The Library Staff hopes that the changes will help to make the library a quiet study environment.

Budget Cuts

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ranging from \$200 to \$1000. By the 1982-83 year, the funds for this program will be reduced by 25%; for the 1983-84 year, Reagan has proposed that the program be eliminated all together.

Currently, about 200 students at FSC receive these grants; the elimination of the Supplemental Grant program could mean that these students will have difficulty completing their educations.

According to Ms Kutler, "the bottom line is that if these proposals are approved, probably 30% of FSC students who receive financial aid will lose it."

This fall, about 1000 FSC students received federal money; the proposed cuts for 1983-84 could force up to 400 of these students to quit school.

Ms Kutler noted that one form of financial aid which is not directly controlled by the FA Office, the Guaranteed Loan program, will also be affected by

the Reagan administration's budget changes. Under this program, students obtain loans from commercial banks; these loans are guaranteed by the govern-

ment. The loans usually carry a 9% interest rate, and are paid back to the bank after school is completed. Formerly, students did not have to prove financial need in order to obtain these loans. As of last October, however, students whose family income exceeds \$30,000 must meet certain eligibility requirements.

One effect of the severe budget cuts, if they are approved, will be to decrease enrollment in U.S. colleges, including FSC. Ms.

Kutler stated, however, that reductions in educational aid may force students who presently attend more expensive private institutions to enroll at state schools. Ms Kutler believes that the good academic reputation of FSC will help to alleviate the decreased enrollment problem here.

The individual student who faces a reduction or elimination of his financial aid will have few recourses available. The Md State Scholarship program, which supplies Senatorial and General Stae scholarships, will

be unlikely to compensate for other cuts. As it is, this program is trying to stay even—no increase are likely. Further, some students may be affected by the budget cuts in Social

Security benefits for those whose parents are disabled or deceased. These benefits are now being provided for only 8

months instead of 12, and the amount of their benefits will be reduced by 25% each year so that by 1985, the students will receive no benefits at all.

Fortunately, the most severe reductions in financial aid have yet to be approved by Congress. If students join the opposition

by writing to their U.S. senators and representatives, they may be able to help force a compromise solution to this problem. Mary-

land's U.S. senators are Charles McC Mathias and Paul Sarbaines. Names of U.S. representatives can be obtained by contacting the SGA office at X4304. All students are urged to participate in the nationwide effort to curb reductions in aid for higher education.

There are three ways to qualify for SSS: meeting federal guidelines based on family size and income; or meeting operational definition of first-generation college student (neither parent has completed a bachelor's degree); or meeting legislative descriptions of physical disability. Lecture on French Art Planned

On Friday April 2nd, the Department of Art and Art Education will sponsor a lecture featuring Jean-jacques Passera, a French Fulbright scholar. Passera, a painter from the Center Georges Pompidou in Paris, will be lecturing on three decades of French Art: 1960's, 1970's and 1980's. The lecture will be held in the Fine Arts Building, room 205, from 10 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

This lecture was made possible by the International Faculty Lecture Bureau of the Institute of International Education, of which FSC is newly a member. It is an excellent program which informs participating colleges about international scholars who are presently visiting the U. S. For a small stipend, the scholars visit various colleges throughout the States, giving lectures and participating in symposiums. This is Frostburgs first year in the program, and it already promises to be well worth the \$35.00 membership fee. The 5 departments currently active in the program are the Art Dept., the Modern Foreign Language Dept., the Phys. Ed. Dept., the Education Dept., and the Geography Dept. This does not limit the areas which speakers must come from, as visiting scholars in English, Physical Science, and Drama are also available.

The Week of March 22-28

With the moon nearby absent from this week's evening sky, it's a good time to survey the early spring star groups climbing into the eastern sky. Most prominent is the Big Dipper, upside down high in the northeast. The two top stars of the Dipper's bowl point to the North Star on the left, while the two other bowl stars point to Leo's starry sickle to the right. By making an arc with the Big Dipper's handle and continuing to the right (eastward), you'll come to Arcturus, a bright orange tinted

star, Arcturus is the brightest star in Bootes, a kite shaped star group. The moon is new on Thursday and this weekend will begin a return appearance in the western dusk. Thursday is also the feast of the Annunciation, March 25, a date that marked the beginning of the year in England until 1752.

"Heavenly Music Concert" continues at the Frostburg State College Planetarium with free public showings on Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. and on Sunday afternoons at 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. The Planetarium is in the front lobby of Tawes Hall.
