FSU's 115th Commencement

The 115th commencement ceremonies of Frostburg State University will be Saturday, Dec. 18, in the Harold J. Cordts Center Main Arena on the FSU campus.

Two exercises will be held during the day. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will confer degrees beginning at 10 a.m. and the College of Business and the College of Education will start at 2 p.m. FSU President Catherine R. Gira will confer both graduate and undergraduate degrees during the ceremonies.

In addition to Dr. Gira, alumni speaker Donald Hutchinson will address the graduates. A 1967 graduate of FSU, Hutchinson is president of the Greater Baltimore Committee, one of Maryland's most prominent organizations of business and civic leaders. Prior to this 1993 appointment, he served in the Maryland House of Delegates and Maryland Senate before being elected to two terms as Baltimore County Executive. He subsequently served as president of Maryland Economic Growth Associates, Inc., a private-sector statewide economic development organization, from 1986 to

1991. When MEGA and the Maryland Chamber of Commerce merged in 1991, he became president of the combined organization, the Maryland Business Council, where he served until appointment to his present position.

Student speakers at the winter commencement include Jodi Elise Smith for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, David L. Hanna, II, for the College of Business and Scott Raba, the College of Education.

Smith graduates with a Bachelor's of Science degree in social work. She is a member of Phi Alpha Social Work Honor Society and has served as president of the Sociology/Social Work Club.

When he graduates with a degree in economics and business administration, Hanna will apply his newly-attained skills and education to PHD Enterprises, a stock trading partnership that he owns with two other FSU graduates.

Raba, a Health, Physical Education and Recreation major, has been a student athletic trainer, an FSU baseball player and a teacher during his time at FSU.

WFWM to Ring in the New Year Big Band Style

WFWM, the public radio station at FSU, will air a special show Friday, Dec. 31, to help Tri-State area listeners bid a fond farewell to the 1990s and welcome in the year 2000, big band style.

Engineering Students Demonstrate Designs

First-year engineering students at FSU have spent this semester gaining hands-on experience in product design. They have been working in teams to design, manufacture, assemble, and test their own centrifugal water pumps. The students will be presenting their projects on Monday, Dec. 13, at 5 p.m. in 335 Tawes Hall. This event is open to the public and the pumps will be on display at that time.

This project was part of the Introduction to Engineering Design class, a requirement for all incoming engineering students. It is offered as the first course in the engineering curriculum, to expose the students to fundamentals of design and manufacturing in a typical engineering environment.

Their competency was judged on the national beginner teacher standards known as INTASC. After dinner, a calibration on the standards was led by Dr. Thomas Palardy, Director of the Office of Field Experiences. Assessors were divided into teams. Each team interviewed and assessed four interns. All the data was compiled by graduate assistants Bonnie Barr and John San Giovani. The information will be used for NCATE. assessor of the process. Her preliminary





SWIMMINGPOOLPASSES:

University faculty and staff must have a pool pass for admittance to all scheduled swims. This pass can be obtained at the Athletic Secretary's Office in the Physical Education Center Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

All Frostburg State University students (undergraduate & graduate) must have a validated student I.D. card for the pool.

Guest passes must be obtained from the Facilities Coordinator or the Athletic Department Secretary for any guest of a student or staff member. One guest per person or per family. Guests are only permitted one visit per academic year.

LOCKER REGISTRATION: Rental Fees - Faculty/Staff - Assigned Lockers: \$10.00 per year.

RENTAL POLICIES: Physical education swim classes are assigned a locker by the instructor. Fall athletic teams are assigned a locker by their head coach. Majors (Physical Education and Recreation ONLY) are assigned a locker during activity class.

All faculty/staff wishing a locker must pay the rental fee at the Business Office and bring the paid receipt to the Equipment Room in the Physical Education Center between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday in order to be assigned a locker.

The Physical Education Department will not be renting lockers to students. All lockers are needed for activity classes.

Holiday Safety Tips

Smoke Detectors: Wipe away dust, dirt and grease and test the batteries. If the batteries fail, replace immediately. Weekly



testing ensures that the smooke detector is working properly.

Natural Christmas Trees: Fresh cut trees are not allowed on campus at any time of the year. When using a fresh cut tree at home, cut its end one to two inches above the original cut. Place the tree in a sturdy, stable holder. Set your tree up a good distance from any heat source and away from exits. Remove the tree when needles begin to fall off in large quantities. Use only UL approved lights.

Holiday Traveling/Driving: Do not drink alcohol and drive. Buckle up before starting your vehicle. Plan your trip, scheduling rest stops. Be sure wipers are in good shape and that you have window washing fluid. Carry a winter survival kid with first-aid supplies, blankets, a compass, a flashlight with extra batteries, flares/triangles, a shovel and quickenergy snacks such as dried fruits and nuts. Also, carry a bag of salt, sand or cat litter for traction. Let someone at your destination know when you are leaving and when you will be expected to arrive. Check weather conditions.
