Keynote speaker Dr. Lea Williams will participate in a series of workshops, discussions groups and other activities at FSU on April 15 through 17 as part of a three-day residency in

leadership, non-violence and African American Studies.

Williams, executive director of the Women's Leadership Institute at Bennett College in Greensboro, N.C., and former vice president for Educational Services at the United Negro College Fund in New York. A scholar and writer, she is author of "Servants of the People: The 1960's Legacy of African American Leadership."

Describing herself as "an educator by

training and experience, a teacher by temperament and a writer by passion," Williams has received the Kentucky State University Distinguished Service Award, the Hilda A. Davis Award for Educational Leadership of the National Association for Women in Education and the Paducah Black Historian Achievement Award in Education. Her article "Missing, Presumed Lost: Teachers of Color in the Nation's Classrooms," published in Black Collegian, won the 1989 Unity Award in Media for education reporting.

As part of FSU's Scholar-in-Residence Program, Williams will meet with student leaders for a discussion and dinner on Monday, April 15. The sponsors for this event are the Department of Student and Community Involvement, the Communication Studies Program and the Leadership Studies Minor.

On Tuesday, April 16, she will present a lecture/discussion, "African American Leaders, Then and Now," from 3:30 to 5 p.m. in the Lane University Center. This presentation, which is free and open to the public, will focus on African American leaders of the Civil Rights movement, their legacy for minority leadership and the role of campuses in emerging paradigms of minority leadership in the 21st century. A reception will immediately follow the program.

Tuesday evening, the MLK Speak Out Program will take place from 7 to 9 p.m. in the LUC Loft. Students, faculty, staff and the public are invited to this celebration of the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Participants will perform live musical selections, engage in creative readings and short stories and display artwork. Norma Blacke Bourdeau, a professor of African American Studies, English and Philosophy at FSU, will serve as the program facilitator.

On Wednesday, April 17, a Community Service Project is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in the FSU Arboretum. 20th Spring Festival of Children's Literature

The FSU's 20th Annual Spring Festival of Children's Literature is slated for Friday and Saturday, April 26 and 27 in the FSU Lane University Center. Embracing the theme "A Patchwork of Story: Celebrating 20 years of Children's Literature," the weekend event will feature the award-winning authors and illustrators Peter Catalanotto, Floyd Cooper, Patricia Reilly Giff and Martin Waddell.

Catalanotto, an author/illustrator, started his career at the Pratt Institute in New York City. According to Catalanotto, he tries to write and illustrate his books in a way that encourages the reader to think.

His book "The Painter" is a "delightful work of art that deserves a place in every collection," notes The School Library Journal. In addition, Catalanotto has illustrated works by well-known authors including Cynthia Rylant and George Ella Lyon.

Cooper, an award-winning children's book author/illustrator, began illustrating as a way of complementing his advertising career. His first book, "Grandpa's Face," is an American Library Association Notable Book. He was also chosen to illustrate books that deal with discrimination such as "Eddie Lee," the story of a young boy with Down's Syndrome.

"I feel children are at the frontline in improving society," Cooper states. "This might sound a bit heavy, but it's true. I feel children's picture books play a role in counteracting all the violence and other negative images conveyed in the media."

Because it is "like breathing to me," Giff begins each day by writing. The award-winning author taught for 20 years before deciding to write for children.

"I want the children to bubble up with laughter or to cry over my books," says Giff. She has written more than 60 books including the Newberry Honor Book "Lily's Crossing." Giff is also the author of the book series "Kids of the Polk Street School." Her novel, "Nory Ryan's Song," was awarded the American Library Association's Best Book for Young Adults.

Northern Ireland native and resident Waddell's life was forever changed when

he was injured by a 1969 Belfast bomb explosion. "I became Mr. Mom," he states. "What I didn't know was that I was sitting on the richest vein of ideas."

Waddell's first work "Can't You Sleep, Little Bear?" became the first of this award-winning author's Big and Little Bear stories.

In addition to having written over 100 books for children and young adults, Waddell has worked with outstanding illustrators including Helen Oxenbury.

Throughout its history, the FSU Festival of Children's Literature has welcomed a "packed house" of librarians, educators, parents and students who travel to Western Maryland to share their love of children's literature and learn more about the successful ways to share that love with children.

This year's agenda includes small group sessions and large group presentations offered in topics ranging from using children's literature as bibliotherapy, to using brown bags to help integrate children's literature into students' homes. Participants will have the opportunity to mingle with fellow educators and exchange ideas, purchase books and learn from the wisdom and experience that the visiting authors share.

In addition to the numerous workshops, the Festival includes the R. Margaret Hamilton Children's Hour for children ages 4 to 13, Friday, April 26, beginning at 4 p.m. in the Lane University Center. Agespecific programs by the guest authors offer an opportunity for them to share their works with children and to offer guidance in the process of writing, illustrating and enjoyment of literature. 
Davidson will graduate with a BFA and a certificate in graphic design, along with an art history minor. His focus has been graphic design, photography and painting.

- If you borrow a script, or clips from copyrighted productions, include the authors' name and production title on the entry form.
