# Dr. LesCallette Receives Doctorate

The great amount of work required for this degree includes a thesis and examinations, in his case on various fields of history, which are concluded by an oral examination on the thesis itself. 

### Easter Assembly Presented

The Easter Assembly of April 17, 1962 was opened by Jack Nerlinger, President of the Christian Association, with a welcome on behalf of the Student Christian Association. This organization annually sponsors and in conjunction with Dr. Jessie Fleming plans the program for the Easter Assembly.

A hymn "Crown Him With Many Crowns" was sung by the audience with the chorus standing en masse to supplement the singing. The invocation was given by the guest speaker, the Reverend Augustus Hackmann. This was followed by a solo "O Divine Redeemer" by Gounod sung by Miss Joan O'Conner. The Bible reading, Isaiah 53:2-7, was given by Maurice Howard. Miss Charlotte Simmons then sang "He Was Despised and Rejected" from Handel's "Messiah." Both soloists were accompanied by Dr. Jessie Fleming.

Jack Nerlinger introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Hackmann, pastor of the Second English Lutheran Church. Dr. Hackmann graduated from City College in Baltimore in 1927 and from Maryland State Normal School (now Towson) in 1929. He taught for five years in the Baltimore Public Schools and then entered the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg from which he graduated in 1937 and from which he received the Doctorate of Divinity in 1960. He held pastorates in Baltimore and Charleston, S. C., before becoming pastor of Second English Lutheran Church in 1957.

Dr. Hackmann's subject was on gambling. He began with a contrast between the two types of gambling using as examples the gambling of the soldiers for Christ's robe and Christ's gamble with his life "for a world redeemed." He defined gambling as the "perversion of a divinely implaned impulse in man." It is a great risk for noble causes, which God himself took when he gave man a free wili.

Dr. Hickmann said that with all the risks involved in living we must live by faith. But the spirit of high adventure is lacking in the modern world; there is a depreci-ation of ideals. There is too much emphasis upon comfort and security. Caution is necessary but should not be our chief and pri-mary concern. The explanation of the Parable of the Talents is that "there can be no real security without gambling for high stakes."

Jesus was gambling on "the indestructability of truth and right-eousness," that "all men are one family in God, equal before each other," that "love is the most compelling force in all the world," that it is possible "for human nature to be transformed and redeemed," and that men "are intended to be the eternal children of the eternal

The desire for security is paradoxically accompanied today by the spending of money on trivial gambling due to spiritual starvation. It is a sin not only because there is an intention to give less than one receives but because it idays.

# Law Day - U.S.A.

Masses of red streamers fly through the air. Bright flags of Russia and posters and banners of the country's historic leaders wave. Colorful fireworks light the sky. Bugles play, announcing Moscow's speakers. The endless parade begins. It consists of the army, navy and air forces with their tanks, guns, ships, planes and rockets. Yes, this is the scene of the typical holiday in Communist Russia on May 1 known as May Day, International Labor Day or "Den' Internatzionala". This excitement of parades, speeches and displays is the Communists' way of showing her strength to the world.

To counter the Communists'

stress on force as power, as illustrated by their annual May Day celebration, the American Bar Association, approximately five years ago, appropriately claimed May 1 as Law Day, U.S.A. This association emphasizes law as power, an idea inherit in American thought. Both the United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights, the basis of American law, advocate the "right of trial by jury, protection against illegal imprisonment, and a guarantee that no person be deprived of life, liberty or pro-perty." Thus, as using both of thesedocuments as sources of American law, the Americans have an entirely different view of laws than the Communists. Hence, the American Bar Association hopes to oppose the Communist idea of maintaining order through military strength.

On April 7, 1962 the United States Congress officially declared May 1 as Law Day, U.S.A. President Kennedy promptly issued a proclamation to the people of the U. S. His message, in essence, stated, " . . . One of the great challenges of our age is man's struggle to sustain individual freedom, human dignity, and justice for all, and . . . one of the vital bulwarks in the struggle is the rule of law which underlies our whole social, economic and governmental structure, and through which we strive constantly broaden and secure for all our citizens the rights and opportunities guaranteed by the Constitution and the Bill of Rrights." He, furthermore said it was his purpose to "call upon the American people to rededicate themselves to under law in their relations with having to do with maintenance each other as well the ideals of equality and justice each other as well as with other nations' and to cultivate' that respect for law that is so vital to the democratic way of life." He especially urged that the schools, civic and service organizations, public bodies, the legal professions . . participate in this worthy ed-

ucational undertaking."
