FSU Music Department Will Present First Faculty Showcase Recital

As part of its Faculty Artist Series, FSU's Department of Music will present a Faculty Showcase Recital on **Thursday, March 12**, at 7:30 p.m. in Pealer Recital Hall. This event is free and open to the public.

Trumpeter *Jacob Dalager* and pianist *Dr. Joseph Yungen* will kick off the program with "Four Miniatures" by Joseph Turrin, a collection of short movements that are all very distinct, yet tied together in various ways. The first movement, "Fanfare," mixes the elements of a trumpet fanfare with a more lyrical quality. "Intermezzo" is a waltz with running eighth notes in the piano over which the trumpet sings a long sensual melody. "Canto" is rather free in form with much dialogue between both instruments. "Tarantella" is a quick romp that brings the suite to a joyful conclusion.

Next up is "Allegro poco moderato" from "Sonata for Flute and Piano, H. 306" by Bohuslav Martinů, performed by flutist **Dr. Eftihia Arkoudis** and Yungen. Martinů composed the sonata in 1945 during his five years in the U.S. following his escape from occupied France. The inspiration for the theme of this third movement draws from Martinů's experience nursing an injured whippoorwill back to health in Cape Cod. The bird's song is recalled in the music.

Percussionist *Dr. Mackenzie LaMont* and hornist *Avery Pettigrew* will then play "Of Old Angkor" for French horn and marimba written by the Australian composer Helen Gifford in 1970.

"Shards of Bone" by LaMont will be performed by saxophonist *Dr. Brent Weber*, guitarist *Paul Zimmerman*, cellist *Dr. Karen Lau*, Yungen and LaMont. This composition is a study on how pieces of music can be put together. The first of the six movements presents four ideas that are explored individually in movements two through five. In movement six, the four ideas are put back together, but they have been transformed through their individual study.

Euphoniumist **Anthony Walker** and Yungen will next play "Harlequin" by Philip Sparke. The piece takes as its inspiration the happy and sad masks that symbolize the commedia dell'arte, which features Harlequin as one of its main characters, and consists of two movements, a slow ballad followed by a frenetic faster movement.

"Sonata for Horn, Trumpet and Trombone" by Francis Poulenc will be performed by trombonist *Anthony Walker*, Dalager and Pettigrew. Poulenc composed this piece of chamber music in 1922. The first movement is a series of dance episodes, the second a lullaby derived from motifs of the first movement and the third a rondo with more lighthearted dance music.

Yungen will play "Étude in A-flat Major, Op. 35, No. 8" by French composer Charles-Valentin Alkan. Despite Alkan's seclusion from society, the period after 1848 saw the composition and publication of many of his major piano works, including the collection of large-scale studies in all the major keys (Op. 35).

Baritone *Gregory Scott Stuart*, accompanied by Yungen, will sing "Sois immobile" from the French opera of 1829, "Guillaume Tell" by Gioachino Rossini. The piece is an anguished aria William Tell sings to his son Jemmy, instructing him to "stay completely still." Tell must shoot an arrow through an apple balanced on Jemmy's head. Should he refuse, both of them will die.

Pianist *Dr. Jay DeWire* will complete the program with "Preludio" from "Violin Partita No. 3" by Johann Sebastian Bach/Sergei Rachmaninoff. The partita for solo violin, composed around 1720 in the form of a dance suite, typical of the Baroque period, is the

last work in the set of Six Sonatas and Partitas. In 1933, Rachmaninoff transcribed the "Preludio" for piano and subsequently recorded it.

The performance will feature the world premiere of Nicole Piunno's latest work for Wind Ensemble, "Where Words Cannot Go," a piece written from a place of profound empathy for those who have experienced the loss of someone important in their lives.

Piunno will be in residence for the performance. She is a composer who views music as a vehicle for seeing and experiencing the realities of life. Her music often reflects the paradoxes in life and how these seeming opposites are connected as they often weave together.

The concert will be rounded out with winning works by women composers. Shaker, a lecturer in FSU's Department of Music and director of Bands at FSU, runs a competition for women's band compositions to promote women in the field. The Wind Ensemble will perform many of these works on **Friday, March 13**, at the Maryland Music Educators Association Conference. Dr. Jay DeWire and Violinist Heather Haughn in Faculty-Guest Artist Series Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present pianist *Dr. Jay DeWire* and violinist Heather Haughn in a Faculty-Guest Artist Series concert, "German (?) Violin Sonatas," on **Sunday, March 8**, at 3 p.m.

The program will include Johannes Brahms' "Violin Sonata No. 1 in G Major" and César Franck's "Violin Sonata."

As Brahms was composing his "Violin Sonata No. 1 in G Major," he was also engaged in a compositional debate over the destiny of the German musical tradition: would German music move into the future with Wagner's concept of "total art work" and the program music of Strauss and Liszt, or could the tradition of chamber music that originated with Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven continue to be relevant? Meanwhile, Franck spent most of his adult life as the champion of a newly resurgent French nationalist tradition of instrumental music, exemplified by his "Violin Sonata." There was just one problem – Franck's style was essentially German, hence the question mark in the concert title.

Brahms composed the "Violin Sonata No. 1 in G Major, Op. 78, 'Regensonate'" for violin and piano during 1878 and 1879. Each of the three movements of this sonata shares common thematic materials from the principal motif of Brahms' two songs "Regenlied" ("Rain Song") and "Nachklang" ("Echo"), and this is why this sonata is also called the "Rain Sonata" ("Regen-Sonate").

Franck's "Sonata in A Major for Violin and Piano" was written in 1886 as a wedding present for violinist Eugène Ysaÿe. It is one of his best-known compositions and is a mixture of his rich native harmonic language with the Classical traditions he valued highly, held together in a cyclic framework. The piece is notable for the difficulty of its piano part. Its technical problems include frequent extreme extended figures and virtuoso runs and leaps.

Vocal Studio Recitals to Be Held March 9 and 10

FSU's Department of Music will present two recitals by students from its vocal studios, both at 7:30 p.m. Vocal Studio Recital No. 1 will be held on **Monday, March 9**, and Vocal Studio No. 2 will be on **Tuesday, March 10**. The performers will be accompanied by pianist **Dr. Joseph Yungen**.

Each performance features music majors from the vocal studios of *Gregory Scott Stuart*, *Dr. Lori Sen* and *Francesca Aguado*. The students will perform a mix of art songs and selections from opera and musical theatre as well as popular songs.

The Monday evening program will be a Celebration of Female Composers in commemoration of Women's History Month. The Department of Music welcomes to the stage students from the FSU Women's Studies Program, who will provide brief biological sketches of the composers featured on the program.

Intended to address the all-too-frequent omission of musical works by women from the concert stage, this celebration will feature the following nine women composers:

- Clara Schumann (German Romantic composer, the wife of Robert Schumann)
- Jeanine Tesori (living American composer, a prolific and honored female musical theatre composer)
- Pauline Viardot (French Romantic composer of Spanish parentage)

The Tuesday evening program will be more wide-ranging and will include works by Franz Schubert, Gaetano Donizetti, Richard Strauss, Gabriel Fauré, Fernando Obradors and William Finn.


