

MUSICIAN/ADVISER BIOGRAPHIES

Pianist, composer and conductor **Alexander Cooper** is a senior completing his Bachelor of Arts in music with emphasis in piano performance and pedagogy with Linda Cockey, conducting with William Folger and composition with Jerry Tabor. As a pianist from age six, he has a particular affinity for jazz and is an active performer in the Salisbury and D.C. Metropolitan area. Most recently, Alex shared the stage with internationally renowned drummer Donald Edwards while playing with the SU Jazz Ensemble. Additionally, Alex serves as the music director of First Baptist Church in Princess Anne, MD, for which he conducts and arranges for the choir and coordinates the music for Sunday services. As a music educator, Alex has been teaching piano privately for eight years and is currently active as a PRESTO piano instructor through Salisbury University. Upon graduation from Salisbury University, Alex will be getting married and continuing his education and training at Pennsylvania State University, where he will be pursuing a Master of Music in conducting under the supervision of Grammy award-winning conductor Dr. Christopher Kiver. Alex also will serve as a graduate teaching assistant in the Penn State School of Music.



Jerry Tabor composes experimental acoustic and electroacoustic music, as well as jazz, for various instrumental combinations. His music has been featured at many universities and in festivals across the United States and recently was featured at the Conservatorio Alfredo Casella in L'Aquila, Italy.

Having earned his doctorate in composition from the University of Maryland, Tabor's research is focused in the areas of composition theory and electroacoustic music. His dissertation focused on compositional approaches using chaos theory and computers. His book on a pioneering theorist and cognitive musicologist, titled *Otto Laske: Navigating New Musical Horizons*, was published by Greenwood Press in 1999.

Tabor is a professor of music in Salisbury University's Department of Music, Theatre and Dance and is Executive Director of Neuma Records & Publications, which is internationally recognized for its avant-garde and experimental recordings and scores.
