Administration is defined as the guidance, leadership, and control of efforts of individuals towards some goal.

He attempts to define the processes of administration as:

- 1. Planning determining what is to be accomplished
- 2. Organizing the grouping of activities necessary to carry out the plans into administrative units and defining relationships among the members of each unit
- 3. Assembling Resources obtaining for the organization the executive personnel, capital, facilities, and other things needed to execute plans
- 4. Directing issuing instructions. day to day relationships between superior and subordinates
- 5. Controlling seeing that actual performance conforms as nearly as possible to the plans
