PROGRAM

Bembe.....Arr. Ted Nichols

Bembe is a critical component of Afro-Cuban folkloric culture and is part of the Yoruba musical system. The common thread is that this style accompanies songs for the orishas, or the Yoruba deities in the religion known as "la regla de ocha."

Music for Pieces of Wood (1973).....Steve Reich (b. 1936)

Steve Reich is an American composer associated with the minimalist movement in music. In *Music for Pieces of Wood*, a pulsing time-keeper begins and a pattern emerges. Three remaining players enter, each building their own patterns in relation to the original and creating a complex, interwoven texture akin to a canon. *Program note by Exic Shuster*.


Kassa.....Mamady Keita, Arr. Ted Nichols

Kassa (Cassa) is a harvest-dance of the Malinke people in East Guinea. The word means granary. During harvest-time the farmers go to the fields, sometimes far away from the village. A camp is made for as long as needed. Some women come to prepare the meals (and to sing). During the day, the drummers play Kassa to support the workers in the field. When the harvest is completed, there is a big party in the village, called Kassalodon.

Homunculus C.F. (1960-1).......Julia Perry (1924-1979)

Elizabeth Huston, harp

Julia Perry was an African-American composer who studied with Italian composer Luigi Dallapiccola. According to Helen Walker-Hill in her book From *Spirituals to Symphonies: African-American Women Composers and Their Music*: "[Perry] drew on the strengths and musical traditions of her African-American heritage, competed



successfully in the white mainstream musical world, and gained an international reputation as a composer of undisputed talent and skill in an eclectic twentieth-century musical language." Perry composed *Homuculus* C. F. while living in Akron, OH, above her father's medical office. In the liner notes to her recording on CRI, she explained: "These clinical surroundings evoked memories of the medieval laboratory [in Goethe's Fargure Wagner, youthful apprentice to *Faust*, made a successful alchemy experiment, fashioning and bringing to life a creature he called homunculus. Having selected percussion instruments for my formulae, then maneuvering and distilling them by means of the Chord of the Fifteenth (C.F.), this musical test tube baby was brought to life." *Program note by Eric Shuster*.

Sorsornet......Arr. Ted Nichols

The Sorsornet is a rhythm of the Baga people. The song that goes with it here expresses a young girl's gratitude to her mother. It's supposed to be sung in the moonlight: "Thank you mother, for giving me personality / Don't worry; I will soon join my husband now."

Music for Mallet Instruments, Voices and Organ (1973).....Steve Reich

Jeremiah Copeland, Maggie Jones and Justin Kriger, voice

Composed for a similar ensemble as Reich's masterpiece *Drumming* (1970-1), *Music for Mallet Instruments*, *Voices and Organ* incorporates signature elements of Reich's "process music." In the manner of *Pieces of Wood*, a solo marimba, glockenspiel and voice each emerge from the dense pattern of activity as the organ and chorus of two singers drone longer and then shorter through four different tonal environments. *Program note by Eric Shuster*.

Mombasa......Arr. Ted Nichols

This piece is inspired from the African rhythm and blues from Germany in the 1970s. Mombasa was a European band with African musicians, put together by American jazz trombonist Lou Blackburn in 1973, who was living in Germany since 1970,



after a long-lasting stay in Africa. The music of Mombasa, a mixture of rhythm'n'blues, jazz, African folklore, spirituals and work songs, was heard all over Europe where he toured successfully up to his death in 1990. The final section of the song is inspired from the Hans Zimmer's soundtrack to the movie *Inception*.
