**D**IVERS Persons, suspected of carrying on an illicit Correspondence abroad, having been taken up a few Days ago, and convicted of the Misdemeanour, the Government has thought fit to make an Example of them; and accordingly, one of them has been publicly beheaded; the others, as being less culpable, have suffered the Punishment of the Knute, and been banished into Siberia.

Warsaw, November 27. The last Advices from Dresden say, that the King intends to set out for this Kingdom in February next, the High Chancellor having wrote to him, that he judged nothing but his Majesty's Presence could effectually restore Peace between the Magistrates and Burghers of Dantzick.

Berlin, Dec. 7. The two Ships lately bought in England for the India Service, are now laden with all possible Expedition at Embden; the largest is called the King of Prussia, the other the Town of Embden.

Frankfurt, Dec. 9. Several Merchants of this City, who used to receive the English Merchandise by Way of Hamburgh and Bremen, have wrote to their Correspondents at London, that as soon as a free Port shall be established in Holland, they propose to make Use of this new Way of obtaining the Goods they shall want.

Madrid, Nov. 23. The 10th Instant a grand Council was held in the King's Presence, which, as we hear, partly turned on the Representations of the Hamburghers, and some are of Opinion, that the Edict lately issued against them will be, at least in part, repealed.

The same Day Mr. Keene had a very long Conference with the Marquis de l'Estenada, on Occasion of some Dispatches his Excellency received the preceding Day from London: But as we are ignorant of the Contents of those Dispatches and the Subject of the Conference, we will not repeat what has so often been said, i. e. that a definitive Convention is on the Point of being signed.

Leghorn, Nov. 26. The Emperor has sent Orders to augment the Marine of this State, in Consequence of which, a new Man of War is going to be built at Porto Ferraio, which will make the fifth, of which the Navy of Tuscany is composed.

Paris, Dec. 13. Letters from Genoa, of the 29th of last Month, advise, that on the 21st they had a Shock of an Earthquake almost all over that Republic: They give us no Particulars of the Damage done by it, but only say, that Abundance of Houses have been so terribly shaken, that they were propping them up as fast as possible. The Ships in the Harbour of Genoa felt this Earthquake, the Sea having been extremely agitated for a few Minutes; and the Centinels that were upon Duty on the Ramparts say, that just before the Shock they saw something like Flashes of Fire issuing out of the Earth.

The same Letters advise, in regard to the Affairs of Corsica, that the Senate has disapproved of the Conduct of M. Grimaldi, the Genoese Commissary General in that Island, and is actually concerting Measures for keeping all Things quiet there. In the mean Time several Memorials have appeared, some justifying the Conduct of M. Grimaldi, and some vindicating the Measures of the Marquis de Carley, the French General.

Paris, Dec. 10. This Week there was a general Infurrection of the Prisoners in Fort l'Eveque, who had almost effected their Escape, but were stopped at the outer Gate of the Prison by the Keepers and other Garrison, from which they have been double locked, and lodged in Dungeons.

Dusseldorf, Dec. 6. Within these few Days past several Barks full of People from Switzerland, passed by this City, upon the Rhine, in order to embark for Nova Scotia; and other English Colonies in America.

Dublin, Nov. 30. A Proclamation is published, offering a Reward of Fifty Pounds for discovering,

apprehending and convicting each of the five Persons concerned in inflicting George Brereton, Esq. High Sheriff of the County of Carlow, who was insulted by above Five Hundred Persons in the Town of Carlow, in the Execution of his Office, in the apprehending John Taaffe, a Popish Priest.

L O N D O N.

October 31. A Solid Treaty with the King of Poland has lately been concluded by the Maritime Powers; to which 480000  $\text{£}$ . is to be annually paid that Prince for six Years; for which he is to keep up a Body of Troops to be at the Disposal of those Powers.

In a circular Epistle from the yearly Meeting at London, to the quarterly Meetings of the Quakers in Great Britain, Ireland, and elsewhere, the Account of Sufferings for this Year (chiefly for Tithes and Church Rates), amount in England and Wales to upwards of 3025  $\text{£}$ . and in Ireland to upwards of 1700  $\text{£}$ . There are four Friends now remaining Prisoners, two of them, in Consequence of Process, in the Ecclesiastical Court.

Pursuant to the Directions of the yearly Meeting for Sufferings in London, and the Report of a Committee appointed by the said Meeting, to consider what Advice might be necessary to be given to Friends, in Relation to an Act made the last Session of Parliament for regulating the Commencement of the Year, and correcting the Calendar now in Use, this Meeting hath thought convenient to communicate to the quarterly and monthly Meetings of Friends, in Great Britain, Ireland, and America, the Opinion of the said Committee thereupon; which was, "That in all the Records and Writings of Friends, from and after the last Day of the tenth Month called December next, the Computation of Time established by the said Act, should be observed; and that accordingly the first Day of the eleventh Month, commonly called January, next, shall be reckoned and deemed, by Friends, the first Day of the first Month of the Year 1752; and that the twelfth Month, commonly called February, shall be the second Month; and so of the rest."

And whereas, for the more regular Computation of Time, the same Act of Parliament doth direct, that "The natural Day next immediately following the second Day of September in the Year 1752, shall be called, reckoned, and accounted to be the fourteenth Day of September; omitting for that Time only the eleven intermediate Days of the common Calendar." The Opinion of the said Committee, approved by the yearly Meeting, was, that Friends should be found in the Observance of this Direction, and omit the said eleven nominal Days accordingly.

In the London Magazine for October, 1751, was found the following Character of the late Prince of Orange, from the Hague; viz.

"The best Panegyric we can make on the deceased Prince, is, that he is regretted by all true Patriots; and indeed none of his Predecessors deserved it more; for if some of them did greater Things in the Eyes of the Vulgar, it was because the Conjectures favour'd them: They laboured for the Good of their Country, and so did our late Stadtholder, with a Zeal inferior to none. He possessed in an eminent Degree the Qualities which form the honest and the great Man. In the Duties of Religion he was strict and sincere, and free from all Superstition, giving an edifying Example of Piety to all about him. The Serenity of his Countenance was the Index of a virtuous Soul. To these principal Qualities he joined good Nature, Affability, and so much Attention to please and meet People half Way in their Sentiments and Requests, that none went away from his Presence dissatisfied. To a Mind cultivated by the most useful Arts and Sciences, he joined the Talent, so necessary in great Princes and Statesmen, of behaving with Dignity. Hearing every one patiently, he readily took their Thought, however prolix, concise, or obscure it might be; and answered them

with equal Gracefulness and Preciseness. Having been raised to the Stadtholdership in 1747, in crucial Conjunctions, from the Events produced by the Death of the Emperor Charles VI, his chief Study was to restore Peace to the Republic, that he might afterwards labour more successfully towards putting her domestic Affairs in better Order: The first Point having been gained by the Peace of Aix-la-Chapelle, he continued intent upon the reviving Trade, which he delivered to the States General before his late Journey to Aix-la-Chapelle, will be a lasting Monument, whether it be executed or not, of the Care he took of the public Good."

In the London Magazine for November, are the following pathetic Expressions, as a Conclusion of a History of the Stadtholdership; which was printed in the Westminster Journal, the 2d of November last.

"Alas! All Mankind have lost a Friend in this excellent Prince: Commerce seems expiring at his Tomb; while poor Batavia sinks beneath her cumbersome Load of Affliction! Nor can Britain be insensible of the Blow: It pierces home to her Heart; and brings fresh to her Soul the Memory of her Royal Favourite, the beloved Patron of Arts, and Encourager of Sciences."

Gosport, November 21. On Wednesday Evening was buried in Portsmouth Church yard, the Body of Mr. John Chambers, of Smock Alley, Fisherman. His Corpse was carried by six Great Grandsons, and his Pall supported by six Great Grand-daughters: and was followed by his Sons and Daughters, Grandsons and Grand-daughters, Great Grandsons and Great Grand-daughters, and their Children, two and two, amounting to 72 in Number. He wanted but six Months of being 100 Years old, and retained his Senses to the last. He was called Admiral of the Fishermen; and on the Day of his Interment all the Fishermen belonging to Smock Alley had Jack, Ensign, and Pennant, hoisted half Mast high, on board their Fishing-boats, as Mourning for their late worthy Admiral. He was a Man of a general good Character. All who attended his Funeral had Gloves, and most of the Children large Apples which were found in his Chest. A greater Number of People were to see the Funeral, than has been known in Portsmouth for many Years.

November 30. The Accident which occasioned his Royal Highness the Duke's Illness, was as follows:—He was hunting, and on full speed near Croydon in Surrey, on this Day Fortnight, when his Horse fell, and his Highness under him.—He was stunned for a few Minutes, but as he recovered himself, he told those about him he was not hurt; and came the same Day to Town, and went in the Evening to the Play.—He did not complain much on Sunday, but on Monday had very acute Pains in his Side, and was bled by his Surgeon, attended by his Physicians, who repeated the Bleedings several Times to the Quantity of about 40 Ounces.—He was likewise blistered.—On this Day Se'night he was much better, and last Sunday was thought to be out of Danger.

December 12. His Corpse was carried by six Great Grandsons, and his Pall supported by six Great Grand-daughters; and was followed by his Sons and Daughters, Grandsons and Grand-daughters, Great Grandsons and Great Grand-daughters, and their Children, two and two, amounting to 72 in Number. He wanted but six Months of being 100 Years old, and retained his Senses to the last. He was called Admiral of the Fishermen; and on the Day of his Interment all the Fishermen belonging to Smock Alley had Jack, Ensign, and Pendant, hoisted half Mast high, on board their Fishing-boats, as Mourning for their late worthy Admiral. He was a Man of a general good Character. All who attended his Funeral had Gloyes, and most of the Children large Apples which were found in his Chest. A greater Number of People were to see the Funeral, than has been known in Portsmouth for many Years.

November 30. The Accident which occasioned his Royal Highness the Duke's Illness, was as follows:—He was hunting, and on full speed near Croydon in Surry, on this Day Portnight, when his Horse fell, and his Highness under him.—He was stunned for a few Minutes, but as he recovered himself, he told those about him he was not hurt; and came the same Day to Town, and went in the Evening to the Play.—He did not complain much on Sunday, but on Monday had very acute Pains in his Side, and was bled by his Surgeon, attended by his Physicians, who repeated the Bleedings several Times to the Quantity of about 40 Ounces.—He was likewise blistered.—On this Day Se'nnight he was much better, and last Sunday was thought to be out of Danger.

December 12. *The SPEECH of the Honourable ROBERT DINWIDDIE, Esq; his Majesty's Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Colony and Dominion of Virginia, to the General Assembly of the said Colony, on Thursday the 27th Day of February, 1752.*

*Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,*

**H**IS Majesty having been graciously pleased to honour me with his Commission, to be Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of this his Dominion of Virginia; I thought it my Duty to call you together, that we may jointly consider what we are empowered to do, for promoting his Majesty's Interest and the Prosperity of this Colony.

I have so just a Sense of the Importance of the Trust devolved upon me, and Solicitude to discharge the same with Honour, as wholly prevents my Attention to those Arts, by which Persons conscious of their great Abilities, or familiar to command by long Habit, are enabled to grace a public Character.

This Solicitude is increased by the Virtues of my Predecessor: But tho' my Ambition be disappointed by the Example I follow, yet Emulation will be animated; if less eminent, I may be more useful, by a steady Attention to the Good of this Dominion.

During the Time I may have the Honour to preside, I very sincerely resolve and determine, that my constant Care shall be to support the Church of England, as by Law established, to encourage Virtue, Piety, and Loyalty to his Sacred Majesty; and, with the utmost of my Power, to discourage Vice and Immorality.

It shall further be my Inclination and Endeavour to cultivate those Virtues of a social Nature, by keeping up a good and harmonious Correspondence with you, in a private as well as a public Capacity: And I shall always be ready, to the Extent of my Understanding, to assist you with my Advice, in any Matter that may occur.

*Gentlemen,*

I can without Regret resign all Pretensions to Eminence or Distinction, as other Acquisitions are in my Power, which, if less envied, are yet allowed to be more valuable: Nor shall I be unactive, tho' the Desire of Fame may be suppressed. I am conscious of another Passion, which is at once the Motive and Reward of Virtue.

My Affection for you, Gentlemen, will be now gratified, by frequent Opportunities of expressing my Zeal for the Good of this Colony (now my Country); which will be a Spring of Pleasure in my Breast.

It was with great Joy I landed here, invested with Power of doing Good to a People, among whom I had formerly mingled in Scenes of domestic Felicity, and experienced the endearing Reciprocations of Friendship.

But I am very sensible, the most ardent Benevolence and most inviolable Fidelity are frequently insufficient to effect their own Purposes; but Error has perhaps produced as many public Calamities as Indolence, Avarice, or Ambition. I shall therefore, Gentlemen of the Council, always receive your Advice with Pleasure; and, Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses, I shall rely with Confidence on your Assistance.

*Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,*

That I might indulge the Impatience of my Wishes, I have called you together so soon after my Arrival, that we may concur in the gracious Design of his Majesty, and to express my Duty and Gratitude to him in the most acceptable Manner, by becoming an Instrument of Happiness to my Fellow Subjects.

The Legislature should always be busy; there are Grievances to redress, Irregularities to reform, Defects to supply, and Exuberances to cut off: I

presume there are some Laws that want Renewal, and probably others that want Amendment. I therefore most earnestly recommend to you the Prosecution of this great Work with Diligence and Expedition. Consider what Bills may be proper and necessary for promoting the public Quiet, and common Interest, by more effectually securing Property, encouraging and extending Commerce, establishing the Peace, Safety, and Regularity of an equitable and well ordered Government. I will assist you, Gentlemen, to the utmost of my Power, in the Attainment of these desirable Purposes; and you may expect from me every Concession in your Favour, of which my Instructions will admit.

I shall be glad if you can find out some Method to prevent Delays in the Courts of Justice, so very inconvenient to the People, and so much complained of in Britain, as well as here.

*Gentlemen of the Council, and House of Burgesses,*

There is one Thing I recommend to your particular Regard, and that is the cultivating a good Correspondence with the neighbouring Nations of Indians. It is better they should love us, than that they should fear us; and one of the two is absolutely necessary. Fear is a slavish Passion, and the Mind is always struggling to throw it off. On the contrary, Love and Amity are propagated by Acts of Kindness, the very Exercise of which is Delight. The Mind is happy under their Influence; and their Influence, for that Reason, is continually gaining new Strength: So that our European Neighbour, who are settled to the Southward and Northward of us, would never be able to inflame the Indians against us, if the Advantage of mutual Bounty, Gratitude, and public Faith, opposed their Attempts. They have been long endeavouring to spirit up the Indians that are in Amity with us, to the Breach of their Faith, with a View to possess and settle the interior Parts of America, the Back of our Frontier Settlements to the Westward. Your own good Sense will soon discover what bad Consequences such Settlements would be of to us, and our Posterity. But I have too high an Opinion of your Sagacity and Virtue, to think any further Arguments are necessary to convince you this Measure is expedient, or to persuade you it is equitable. The Means how it is to be effected, I would recommend as the Subject of your Deliberations.

I further sincerely recommend to you, Gentlemen, that both in your public and private Capacities, you will diffuse a Spirit of Benevolence and Unanimity, which are the vital Principles of public and private Happiness. By such Conduct you will approve yourselves good Christians, and good Subjects; you will then render my Administration honourable and easy; you will enjoy the Prayers and Blessings of the whole Colony; you will deserve the paternal Affection of his Majesty; and you will be intitled to the Favour of Almighty God, who, that we might consider each other as Brethren, has not disdained to be called the Father of us all.

*A Translation of the King of Spain's Declaration against the Republic of Hamburg.*

**T**HE pernicious Consequences resulting to the true Interest of my Crown and Vassals from the Treaty lately concluded, by the City of Hamburg with the Regency of Algiers, and the Consideration of the many Advantages the Hamburgers enjoy from the free Commerce with my Dominions, converted by this Treaty, in submitting to my Enemies the Succours, Stores and Ammunitions they want, in order to make War against me; the Dignity of my Crown, and the Care with which I watch for the Good of my People, do not permit me to sit silent, without shewing some Sign of my Displeasure at the Conduct of that City. Wherefore, I have resolved to prohibit, and do absolutely prohibit, all Commerce

between my Subjects and Dominions and the City of Hamburg, its Inhabitants, Dependents, and Subjects thereof: And I order, that fifty Days after the Publication of this Decree, there shall not be admitted, in any of my Ports and Dominions, any of their Subjects, entirely prohibiting all Sorts of Manufactures and Produce of her Territories; and that in the Term of three Months, all Agents, Consuls, and Subjects of the aforementioned City, residing in my said Dominions, shall and do quit, and get out of the same, permitting them during the said Term to settle their Affairs, and export their Effects, well understood, that at the Expiration thereof, all Confiscations and Forfeitures suitable in such Case shall be inflicted on the Transgressors; and let the Council of War take Notice thereof, for the due Execution, so far as it relates thereto. Dated at Lorenzo, the 19th Day of October, 1751. (Signed)

DON AUGUSTIN DE ORDINANA.

*Naples, October 29.* In the Afternoon of the 23d, we were alarmed with the slight Shock of an Earthquake; but our Apprehensions were abated by several Persons of Experience affirming it to be a Prefage of Eruptions from Mount Vesuvius: Nor were they mistaken; for on the 25th, the Wind shifting to N. W. a black and thick Smoke was seen to issue with great Rapidity from the Aperture of the Mountain; in the Evening, Flames were perceived, and to increase, so that the whole Crater seemed in a Blaze. On the 26th, a Cleft was perceived a little below the Summit, and a Stream of ignited Matter issuing from it like a River of Flame. Yesterday the Appearance of Vesuvius was quite tremendous; the inflamed Torrent, after making a Channel, had divided itself into two other Streams, which impetuously continued their Course among the Fields, Farms, and Vineyards, which lie betwixt the Mountain and the Sea. Our Virtuoso say, that the Torrent is now at its Height, and that it will no sooner have reached the Sea, which will be this Day, than the Fire of the Mountain will gradually decrease to a total Extinction. It is certain, that from the Multitude of Observations made of late Years, on the Ebullitions of this Mountain, the Duration of most of them, unless very extraordinary, may be calculated within a few Hours. Princess Esterhazy, the Imperial Ambassadress, more intent upon the Causes, than frightened at the Effects of the Phenomenon, did not miss a Day going to that Part of the Mountain where the ignited Substance bent its Course, taking with her some Persons of Learning for her Information; and from thence she came down along the Grounds, through which the Stream had taken its Way to the Sea. The Channel which it has made is above 500 Feet in Breadth, and the Sediment left in it is of a sulphureous Substance, which dries into the Hardness of a Stone.

And by an Account from Naples, of the 9th of November, we are told, "That a new Opening appeared on the East Side of this Mountain, from whence issued a Torrent of Fire, which extended itself to Bosco Real; which is about five Miles.—This caused an incredible Damage to the Towns, Villages, and Houses thereabouts; and has so frighten'd the Inhabitants of the neighbouring Places, that they have all left their Dwellings.—The Queen went to Portici, to take a nearer View of the Eruption of this Mountain."

*The SPEECH of the Honourable ROBERT DINWIDDIE, Esq; his Majesty's Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Colony and Dominion of Virginia, to the General Assembly of the said Colony, on Thursday the 27th Day of February, 1752.*

*Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,*

**H**IS Majesty having been graciously pleased to honour me with his Commission, to be Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of this his Dominion of Virginia; I thought it my Duty to call you together, that we may jointly consider what we are empowered to do, for promoting his Majesty's Interest and the Prosperity of this Colony.

I have so full a Sense of the Importance of the Trust devolved upon me, and Solicitude to discharge the same with Honour, as wholly prevents my Attention to those Arts, by which Persons conscious of their great Abilities, or familiar to command by long Habit, are enabled to grace a public Character.

This Solicitude is increased by the Virtues of my Predecessor: But tho' my Ambition be disappointed by the Example I follow, yet Emulation will be animated; if less eminent, I may be more useful, by a steady Attention to the Good of this Dominion.

During the Time I may have the Honour to preside, I very sincerely resolve and determine, that my constant Care shall be to support the Church of England, as by Law established, to encourage Virtue, Piety, and Loyalty to his Sacred Majesty; and, with the utmost of my Power, to discourage Vice and Immorality.

It shall further be my Inclination and Endeavour to cultivate those Virtues of a social Nature, by keeping up a good and harmonious Correspondence with you, in a private as well as a public Capacity: And I shall always be ready, to the Extent of my Understanding, to assist you with my Advice, in any Matter that may occur.

*Gentlemen,*  
I can without Regret resign all Pretensions to Eminence or Distinction, as other Acquisitions are in my Power, which, if less envied, are yet allowed to be more valuable: Nor shall I be inactive, tho' the Desire of Fame may be suppressed. I am conscious of another Passion, which is at once the Motive and Reward of Virtue.

My Affection for you, Gentlemen, will be now gratified, by frequent Opportunities of expressing my Zeal for the Good of this Colony (now my Country); which will be a Spring of Pleasure in my Breast.

It was with great Joy I landed here, invested with Power of doing Good to a People, among whom I had formerly mingled in Scenes of domestic Felicity, and experienced the endearing Reciprocations of Friendship.

But I am very sensible, the most ardent Benevolence and most inviolable Fidelity are frequently insufficient to effect their own Purposes; but Error has perhaps produced as many public Calamities as Indolence, Avarice, or Ambition. I shall therefore, Gentlemen of the Council, always receive your Advice with Pleasure; and, Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses, I shall rely with Confidence on your Assistance.

*Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,*

That I might indulge the Impatience of my Wishes, I have called you together so soon after my Arrival, that we may meet in the gracious Design of his Majesty, and to express my Duty and Gratitude to him in the most acceptable Manner, by becoming an Instrument of Happiness to my Fellow Subjects.

The Legislature should always be busy; there are Ordinances to redress, Irregularities to reform, Defects to supply, and Exuberances to cut off. I

presume there are some Laws that want Renewal, and probably others that want Amendment. I therefore most earnestly recommend to you the Prosecution of this great Work with Diligence and Expedition. Consider what Bills may be proper and necessary for promoting the public Quiet, and common Interest, by more effectually securing Property, encouraging and extending Commerce, establishing the Peace, Safety, and Regularity of an equitable and well ordered Government. I will assist you, Gentlemen, to the utmost of my Power, in the Attainment of these desirable Purposes; and you may expect from me every Concession in your Favour, of which my Instructions will admit.

I shall be glad if you can find out some Method to prevent Delays in the Courts of Justice, so very inconvenient to the People, and so much complained of in Britain, as well as here.

*Gentlemen of the Council, and House of Burgesses,*

There is one Thing I recommend to your particular Regard, and that is the cultivating a good Correspondence with the neighbouring Nations of Indians. It is better they should love us, than that they should fear us; and one of the two is absolutely necessary. Fear is a slavish Passion, and the Mind is always struggling to throw it off. On the contrary, Love and Amity are propagated by Acts of Kindness, the very Exercise of which is Delight. The Mind is happy under their Influence; and their Influence, for that Reason, is continually gaining new Strength: So that our European Neighbours, who are settled to the Southward and Northward of us, would never be able to inflame the Indians against us, if the Advantage of mutual Bosony, Gratitude, and public Faith, opposed their Attempts. They have been long endeavouring to spirit up the Indians that are in Amity with us, to the Breach of their Faith; with a View to possess and settle the interior Parts of America, the Back of our Frontier Settlements to the Westward. Your own good Sense will soon discover what bad Consequences such Settlements would be of to us, and our Posterity. But I have too high an Opinion of your Sagacity and Virtue, to think any further Arguments are necessary to convince you this Measure is expedient, or to persuade you it is equitable. The Means how it is to be effected, I would recommend as the Subject of your Deliberations.

I further sincerely recommend to you, Gentlemen, that both in your public and private Capacities, you will diffuse a Spirit of Benevolence and Unanimity, which are the vital Principles of public and private Happiness. By such Conduct you will approve yourselves good Christians, and good Subjects; you will then render my Administration honourable and easy; you will enjoy the Prayers and Blessings of the whole Colony; you will deserve the paternal Affection of his Majesty; and you will be intitled to the Favour of Almighty God, who, that we might consider each other as Brethren, has not disdained to be called the Father of us all.

*A Translation of the King of Spain's Declaration against the Republic of Hamburg.*

**T**HE pernicious Consequences resulting to the true Interest of my Crown and Vassals from the Treaty lately concluded, by the City of Hamburg with the Regency of Algiers, and the Consideration of the many Advantages the Hamburgers enjoy from the free Commerce with my Dominions, converted by this Treaty, in submitting to my Enemies the Succours, Stores and Ammunition they want, in order to make War against me; the Dignity of my Crown, and the Care with which I watch for the Good of my People, do not permit me to sit silent, without showing some Sign of my Displeasure at the Conduct of that City. Wherefore, I have resolved to prohibit, and do absolutely prohibit, all Commerce

between my Subjects and Dominions and the City of Hamburg, its Inhabitants, Dependents, and Subjects thereof: And I order, that fifty Days after the Publication of this Decree, there shall not be admitted, in any of my Ports and Dominions, any of their Subjects, entirely prohibiting all Sorts of Manufactures and Produce of her Territories; and that in the Term of three Months, all Agents, Consuls, and Subjects of the aforementioned City, residing in my said Dominions, shall and do quit, and get out of the same, permitting them during the said Term to settle their Affairs, and export their Effects, well understood, that at the Expiration thereof, all Confiscations and Forfeitures suitable in such Case shall be inflicted on the Transgressors; and let the Council of War take Notice thereof, for the due Execution, so far as it relates thereto. Dated at Lorenzo, the 19th Day of October, 1751.

*Naples, October 29.* In the Afternoon of the 23d, we were alarmed with the slight Shock of an Earthquake; but our Apprehensions were abated by several Persons of Experience affirming it to be a Preface of Eruptions from Mount Vesuvius: Nor were they mistaken; for on the 25th, the Wind shifting to N. W. a black and thick Smoke was seen to issue with great Rapidity from the Aperture of the Mountain; in the Evening, Flames were perceived, and to increase, so that the whole Crater seemed in a Blaze. On the 26th, a Cleft was perceived a little below the Summit, and a Stream of ignited Matter issuing from it like a River of Flame. Yesterday the Appearance of Vesuvius was quite tremendous; the inflamed Torrent, after making a Channel, had divided itself into two other Streams, which impetuously continued their Course among the Fields, Farms, and Vineyards, which lie betwixt the Mountain and the Sea. Our Virtuosi say, that the Torrent is now at it's Height, and that it will no sooner have reached the Sea, which will be this Day, than the Fire of the Mountain will gradually decrease to a total Extinction. It is certain, that from the Multitude of Observations made of late Years, on the Eruptions of this Mountain, the Duration of most of them, unless very extraordinary, may be calculated within a few Hours. Prioceli Escherbach, the Imperial Ambassador, more intent upon the Cause, than frightened at the Effects of the Phenomenon, did not miss a Day going to that Part of the Mountain where the ignited Substance burst it's Course, taking with her some Persons of Learning for her Information; and from thence she came down along the Grounds, through which the Stream had taken it's Way to the Sea. The Channel which it has made is above 500 Feet in Breadth, and the Sediment left in it is of a sulphureous Substance, which dries into the Hardness of a Stone.

And by an Account from Naples, of the 9th of November, we are told, "That a new Opening appeared on the East Side of this Mountain, from whence issued a Torrent of Fire, which extended itself to Bosco Real; which is about five Miles.— This caused an incredible Damage to the Town, Villages, and Houses thereabouts; and has so frightened the Inhabitants of the neighbouring Places, that they have all left their Dwellings.— The Queen went to Portici, to take a nearer View of the Eruption of this Mountain."

*Madrid, October 26.* The King having determined to act with Vigour against the Corsairs, has ordered Letters of Marque to be issued to all his Subjects for fitting out Cruisers against the Turks and Moors: Both the Prizes and Slaves are to be the Property of the Captors; with an extraordinary Reward of 25 Piasters for each Turk, and 15 for each Moor.

*Paris, November 12.* On the 8th, being the Day before that of the Marriages of the poor Maidens, on Account of the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy,



gundy, the Bridegroom and Brides resorted to the Churches of their respective Parishes, where the Ceremony of their Betrothing was performed; all the Bells ringing in every Parish. Early the next Morning this ever memorable Day was usher'd in with a Discharge of the City Cannon: At 9 the Parties again resorted to their respective Churches, which were hung with Tapestry, and illuminated with Wax-Lights; a Mass was solemnly sung, at which assisted a Magistrate in his Robes, and the two Churchwardens of the Parishes, who held the Pall over the Couples; who, after the Ceremony (which was declared by a second Discharge), were carried in Coaches, which were sent by the Gentry of each Parish, to the Places appointed for the Feasts. The Pairs of St. Sulpice and St. Roche's Parishes had the Honour to be served at Table by Princes, and Persons of the highest Distinction; who, to that Cendescension, at the Close of the Entertainment, added considerable Tokens of their Generosity. About 6 in the Evening, the newly-married Folks were carried to their Homes in the same Coaches, which had taken them in the Morning to the Churches. There was in all the Churches a Composure and Devotion, which spoke their Sense of what they were about; and at the Feasts, a decent Cheerfulness becoming the Occasion: Tears of Humanity were seen to stand in many of the Spectator's Eyes, and every Thing was transacted with all possible Regularity. A Detachment of the City Guards was stationed in every Church, and in the Evening the Town House and Churches were finely illuminated. The Number of Marriages amounted to 600.

Paris, November 29. The Firework which is to be played off at Versailles, on Account of the Duke of Burgundy's Birth and the Dauphiness's Recovery, is 4200 Feet in Front, and 200 Feet in Height. The Decorations are most superb. Their Majesties will sup in State; and there is to be a Drawing Room three Days successively, during which their Majesties will also sup in State every Night.

Hague, Novem. 6. The Deputies of the Merchants at Dort, after the Example of those of Amsterdam and Rotterdam, have deputed seven of their Body to wait on her Royal Highness the Governante, with their Thanks for the Project proposed by the late Prince her Consort, for causing Commerce to flourish in these Provinces. They at the same Time recommended that Affair to the Attention of her Royal Highness, who received them in the most gracious Manner, and assured them, "That she would make it a Law to herself, to exactly follow the Ideas of the late Prince her Consort, in Respect to the Execution of the Projects which his serene Highness had not Time to bring to Perfection; that she would use all her Endeavours to procure the Success of the Regulations, made for promoting the Interest of Commerce, and should always have the Advancement and Prosperity of it at Heart."

Paris, November 29. The Deputies of the Parliament having been sent for to Versailles the 21st Instant, to be informed of the King's Intentions, the Account of what passed there has been entered in their Register as follows:

"This Day, November 27, the King having, in Consequence of the Arret of his Council of the 20th of this Month, ordered the first President of the Parliament of Paris to repair to him with the two eldest Presidents of the Parliament that might be in Town, and the Advocates General and Attorney General, to receive his Orders, and to bring his Majesty the Minutes of the two Resolutions voted in Parliament the 20th of July last, about the Declarations of the 24th of March preceding, containing a Regulation for the Administration of the General Hospital of Paris, as also the Minutes of the two Resolutions of the 5th and 20th of August, and the Minutes of another Resolution of the 7th of September last, with the Registers in which the said Arret and Resolutions have been entered; and in Case the said Arret and Resolutions should not have been registered, to bring the last Register of the Arrets and Resolutions of the Parliament: Upon the Report made to his Majesty by the first President, that none of the said Arrets and Resolutions had yet been entered in the Registers, the last Register of Ordonnances ending the 31st of May 1738, and the last Register of the Secret Council ending the 6th of October 1741, the Minutes were by him delivered to his Majesty, who has kept them, in order to their being suppressed, pursuant to the Arret of his Council of the 20th of this present Month, which has been transcribed in the present Register, by Order and in Presence of his Majesty, and also in Presence of the said Presidents, Advocates, and

"Attorney General of the Parliament of Paris: I, Counsellor of the King in all his Councils, Minister and Secretary of State of his Commands and Finances, being likewise present." Then the King said to the first President, "You are to give an Account to my Parliament of what has been transacted in my Presence; and likewise tell them, that I forbid all Deliberations and all Meetings on this Subject, about which I will receive no Remonstrances nor Representations." To which the first President made Answer, "That though it was impossible for him to express the Grief of the Parliament at such Treatment, he could assure his Majesty, that every Member of that Body was ready to make a Sacrifice of his Life and Fortune for the King's Service."

The Deputies being returned to Paris, and having made a Report of the whole Transaction to the Parliament, the Dean, or eldest Member of the Assembly, said to the first President, "The Assembly declare to you, that they think the Prohibition to deliberate being an Interdiction of all Functions, they neither can nor will continue to do any Service." All the Members were of the same Opinion, and the Parliament suspended its Functions: The Advocates also immediately shut their Chambers, and all Business was at a Stand.

Yesterday an Order from the King was brought to every Counsellor, importing, that they must this Day assemble in the Chambers they belong to, and administer Justice, on Pain of Disobedience.

Paris, Dec. 3. Pursuant to the Order above-mentioned, the Counsellors of the Parliament repaired to their respective Chambers the 29th of last Month; but no Cause were heard, nor was any public Business done, on Account of the Absence of the Advocates, who were not summon'd to attend; so that the Chambers soon broke up, and, in all Probability, will not meet again, 'till forced to it by fresh Orders from the King.—For the Sake of such as may not be well acquainted with the Constitution of the Parliament of Paris, it is proper to observe here, that it is divided into several Chambers or Courts, in which their Counsellors sit as Judges, and their Advocates act in the same Capacity as our Counsellors.

#### L O N D O N.

September 24. An Order came for confining every Person on board the Adriatic, and two other Ships laden with Fruit from Zant, arrived off Ratcliff Cross, for performing their Quarantine according to the late Proclamation.

Orders were issued for augmenting the Fortifications of Carlisle, and several Towns in North Britain.

October 2. A Man, for a Wager of 20 Guineas, walked from Shoreditch Church, to the 20 Mile Stone near Ware, and back again, in seven Hours.

This Day died Thomas Matthews, Esq; Admiral, and late Commander of the Fleet in the Mediterranean, of undoubted Bravery; Member of Parliament for Carmarthen, and an Elder Brother of the Trinity House.

October 6. The Court went into a Week's Mourning for the late Electress Dowager of Bavaria; and the late Prince, second Son of the Duke of Modena.

October 11. It was notified from the Privy Council, that whereas an Order was issued on the 4th of September, for Ships arriving from the Levant to perform a Quarantine of 40 Days in Stangate Creek, and as Doubts may arise about the Extent of the Levant, that it must be understood in this Case, as formerly on like Occasions, to extend Eastward from the Isle of Corfu on the Borders of Greece, and from Cape Rufata on the Coast of Africa.

October 27. Died her Grace, Catharine, Duchess Dowager of Rutland; she was second Daughter of William Lord Russell, and Sister of Wriothely, Father of the present Duke of Bedford: She was married to the late Duke of Rutland in 1692, by whom she left the present Duke; Catharine, married to the Hon. Henry Pelham, Esq; Frances, married to Richard Arundel, Esq; and Elizabeth, married to Lord Galway.

November 1. Died the Hon. Col. Thomas Lascelles, late Surveyor General of the Ordnance, in the 82d Year of his Age.—He was also Chief Engineer of Great Britain, and Deputy Quarter-Master General of all his Majesty's Forces.—He had been 65 Years in the Service of his King and Country; was at the glorious Battle of the Boyne; and was dangerously wounded at Hochster.—He underwent the Fatigue of 21 Campaigns, and was present in 36 Engagements.

December 3. We are assured, that a Gentleman is soon to take Possession of a large Estate in Houses near Bond Street, which comes to him by the Expiration of a Lease that was made for 99 Years, and wants but a small Time of being fulfilled. The Ground was let when that Part of the Town was an entire Field, and the Estate returns to the Owner surprisingly improved. It is said the Estate is now 3000 l. a Year, and could not have been let out at above 20.

The Reason of placing the 66 Gun Ships before the 70, is, that they are of the French Establishment; and also such of our own as have been cut down from Three Deckers, and are much superior in the Weight of Metal, Tonnage, and Number of Men, to the 70 Gun Ships.

There is an Account from Dunkirk, that last Week four Ships were lost near Boulogne, one of which was a French Ship, and it is said M. le Moins, Proprietor of the Chien Savant, perished in her.

The Elizabeth, Capt. Jarvis Hurt, from London for Jamaica, was lost November the 28th, near Barleur, on the Coast of France. The Captain, and twenty of the Crew and Passengers were drowned, and only three People saved, which was upon Pieces of the Wreck. It is imagined that some more Vessels are also lost on the said Coast.

*Whitehall, Dec. 10.* Additional Article to the ancient Treaties subsisting between his Majesty and the Dey and Government of Algiers, agreed to by the present Dey, Mahomet, and his Majesty's Plenipotentiaries the Honourable Augustus Keppel, and Ambrose Stansford, Esq; his Majesty's Agent and Consul General at Algiers.

"That all Packets or Express Boats, bearing his Britannic Majesty's Commission, which shall be met by any of the Cruisers of Algiers, shall be treated with the same Respect as his Majesty's Ships of War, and all due Respect shall be paid to his Majesty's Commission; and both at Meeting and Parting, they shall be treated as Friends: And if any of the Algerine Cruisers commit the least Fault or Violence against them, the Captains or Raizes so offending, shall on their Arrival at Algiers, and proper Complaint being made of them, be most severely punished, without admitting of their Excuses. Dated at Algiers the 3d Day of June 1751, and in the Year of Hegeira 1164, the 20th Day of the Moon Regil.

*Newport, Rhode Island, January 25.*

We learn from Hispaniola, that there has been several most severe Earthquakes, and that the Town of Port of Prince on that Island, which consisted of Three or Four Hundred Houses, is laid in Ruins, save 3 or 4 Houses, and many People killed; and the Damage sustained in divers other Places on the Island, is very considerable.

*NEW-YORK, February 27.*

A private Letter from Halifax, of the 21st of December last, represents that Place as in a very wretched and doleful Condition; chiefly for want of Money; which occasions such a Plenty of Law-Suits there, that the Letter Writer believes there are more Writs issued there than in the whole Province of New York.—Provisions are excessive dear, and not one Person in ten has got any Wood to burn.—That, if it was not for the King's Bounty of Provisions, great Part of the Inhabitants must starve, or plunder their Neighbours.—He observes, that tho' there are a Number of New-Yorkers there, in Quality of King David's Soldiers, yet they all came off so bare as to be unable to carry on any Fishery, except one only, that went full-handed; and he advises, that if any more should go, they would follow his Example, or else they must remain private Centinels all their Days, for aught he can see.—The whole Place would be under the most dismal Apprehensions, was it not for a Report that strongly prevails there, that a Number of Merchants in London had entered into a Company, and subscribed 100,000 Pounds to carry on the Fishery; and the Money or Effects was expected over in the Spring, which, it was hoped would revive the Place again.

By a Gentleman living on Long Island, who passed through this City from Jamaica, via Philadelphia, last Week, we hear the Spaniards have lately taken four English Vessels in the Windward Passage, bound from Jamaica to the Northward; one of which was the Sloop Diamond, Captain Lawrence, of this Port, bound to South-Carolina, who had a large Sum of Money on board, in which Vessel the said Gentleman was coming, when taken; one of the said Vessels belonged to Boston, and another to Philadelphia, but the Particulars we could not learn. (This is the old Trade of these treacherous People, and for aught we can see, always will be, whilst we continue tamely their Dupes).

We also hear, that Capt. Ross, in a Brig of this Port, which has been for some Time a missing Vessel, is taken by the Spaniards.

The Sloop Dolphin, Thomas Swan, Master, of Boston, from the Bay, but last from South Carolina, was cast away in a Storm, the End of December last, on Barnagar, and all the Men froze to Death, except one.

## ANNAPOLIS.

Last Tuesday se'night Capt. Adams Spencer arrived in *Patuxent*, from London, which he left the 6th of January. He has brought an Account of the Death of the Queen of Denmark, one of the Daughters of his present Majesty King George II.

Last Week arrived in *Patuxent*, from Scotland, after a long Passage, the *Newall*, Capt. Walter Smith, with whom came Passenger, Mr. Robert Swan, Merchant, of this City.

Yesterday se'night ended the so much talk'd of Baltimore County Election, at which there were as many People as ever appeared at any one Election in this Province: There were 992 Voters, and on closing the Poll it stood thus:

And the Sheriff declared the four first-named Gentlemen to be duly elected.

Monday last was found Part of a Man's Body, in the Woods at Elk Ridge; which was discovered by a Bush bringing in her Mouth, to a House, a Leg and Foot with a Stocking and Shoe on. By the Cloathing it was found to be the Body of one Joseph Crumwell, who ran away from his Master in November last, and is supposed to have perished as he lay down by a Tree; but his Body was dragged away to a considerable Distance, terribly disfigured and pulled to Pieces by Beasts of Prey.

Friday Night last, died at his House at Herring Bay, Capt. John West, one of the Magistrates of this County: He went well to Bed about Ten o'Clock, and was taken with an Apoplectic Fit as soon as he laid down, and died in a short Time, without speaking a Word. This was his third Fit of that Sort, and all within a Year.

Yesterday his Excellency our Governor was pleased, in Council, to prorogue the General Assembly of this Province (which stood prorogued to the first Tuesday in April) to Tuesday the twelfth Day of May next; when they will meet for the Dispatch of the public Business.

By a Letter from London we have an Account of the Death of Sir William Gooch, Bart. late Lieutenant Governor of Virginia.

On Monday last a little Girl about 18 Months old, a Daughter of Mr. Dair's at Herring Bay was burnt to Death, by her Callico Frock catching Fire; no Body being near enough to preserve her.

Yesterday Morning died of an Apoplectic Fit, near Lower Marlborough, on his Return from St. Mary's County, William Cumming, Esq; one of the Aldermen of this City, and for many Years a Practitioner of the Law in our Courts.

But when thou findest Sensibility of Heart, join'd with Softness of Manners; an accomplish'd Mind, with a Form agreeable to thy Fancy; take her home to thy House, she is worthy to be thy Friend, thy Companion in Life, the Wife of thy Bosom.

O cherish her as a Blessing, sent thee from Heaven; let the Kindness of thy Behaviour endear thee to her Heart.

She is the Mistress of thy House; treat her therefore with Respect, that thy Servants may obey her.

Oppose not her Inclination without Cause; she is the Partner of thy Cares, make her also the Companion of thy Pleasures.

Reprove her Faults with Gentleness, exact not her Obedience with Rigour.

Trust thy Secrets in her Breast, her Counsels are sincere, thou shalt not be deceived.

Be faithful to her Bed; for she is the Mother of thy Children.

When Pain and Sickness assault her, let thy Tenderness sooth her Affliction: A Look from thee of Pity and Love, shall alleviate her Grief, or mitigate her Pains; and be of more Avail than ten Physicians.

Consider the Delicacy of her Sex, the Tenderness of her Frame; and be not severe to her Weakness, but remember thine own Imperfections.

Teach him Obedience, and he shall bless thee; teach him Modesty, and he shall not be ashamed.

Teach him Gratitude, and he shall receive Benefits; teach him Charity, and he shall gain Love.

Teach him Temperance, and he shall have Health; teach him Prudence, and Fortune shall attend him.

Teach him Justice, and he shall be honoured by the World; teach him Sincerity, and his own Heart shall not reproach him.

Teach him Diligence, and his Wealth shall increase; teach him Benevolence, and his Mind shall be exalted.

Teach him Science, and his Life shall be useful; teach him Religion, and his Death shall be happy.

From the Creatures of God let Man learn Wisdom; and apply to himself the Instruction they give.

Hear the Words of his Mouth, for they are spoken for thy Good; give Ear to his Admonition, for it proceedeth from Love.

He hath watched for thy Welfare, he hath toiled for thy Ease; do honour therefore to his Age, and let not his grey Hairs be treated with Irreverence.

Think on thy helpless Infancy, and the Forwardness of thy Youth; and indulge the Infirmitates of thy aged Parents, assist and support them in the Decline of Life.

So shall their hoary Heads go down to the Grave in Peace: And thine own Children, in Reverence of thy Example, shall repay thy Piety with filial Love.

### B R O T H E R S.

Ye are the Children of one Father, provided for by his Care; and the Breast of one Mother hath given you Suck.

Let the Bonds of Affection, therefore, unite thee with thy Brothers, that Peace and Happiness may dwell in thy Father's House.

If thy Estate be good, match near home and at Leisure; if weak, far off and quickly. Enquire diligently of her Disposition, and how her Parents have been inclined in their Youth. Let her not be poor, how generous soever: For a Man can buy nothing in the Market with Gentility: Nor chuse a base and uncomely Creature altogether for Wealth; for it will cause Contempt in others, and Loathing in thee. Neither make Choice of a Dwarf or a Fool; for by the one thou shalt beget a Race of Pygmies; and the other will be thy continual Disgrace; and it will hurt thee to hear her talk: For thou shalt find it to thy Grief, there is nothing more fullsome than a She Fool.

And touching the Guiding of thy House, let thy Hospitality be moderate, and according to the Means of thy Estate, rather plentiful than sparing, nor costly. For I never knew any Man grow poor by keeping an orderly Table. But some consume themselves through secret Vices, and their Hospitality bears the blame. But banish swinish Drunkenness out of thy House, which is a Vice impairing Health, consuming much, and makes no Shew.

December 19. On Tuesday last died at *Spinham-Land*, in his Road from *Bath to Hampton*, in the 76th Year of his Age, *Sir William Gooch, Bart.* (formerly Lieutenant Governor of Virginia). His Title and Estate devolves to the Right Rev. *Dr. Gooch, Bishop of Ely*.

Dec. 21. Yesterday an Express arrived at *St. James's*, with the melancholy Account of the Death of her Majesty *Louisa Queen of Denmark*, youngest Daughter of our most gracious Sovereign *King George the Second*: Her Majesty was far advanced in her Pregnancy, and her Death is said to have been caused by her hastily stooping, whereby she was instantly sensible of having hurt herself. She was born Dec. 7, 1724, and was married to *Frederick*, the present King of Denmark, Nov. 30, 1743. And has left issue one Prince and three Princesses;

1. Princess *Sophia Magdalen*, born July 3, 1746.

2. Princess *Wilhelmina Carolina*, born July 10, 1747.

3. Prince *Christian*, born January 29, 1748.

4. Princess *Louisa*, born January 30, 1749.

*Charles Town, in South Carolina, December 13.*

Last Night arrived here the Sloop *Kingston*, Capt. *Whitefield*, bound from *Jamaica* for *Philadelphia*, but drove in the late Hurricane out of *Black River* to Sea, and obliged to put into *Havana*, which Place she left 16 Days ago. By this Vessel we have Advice, that several English Vessels were lost in that Hurricane on Cuba; and that his Majesty's Ship *Prince Henry*, of 40 Guns, Capt. *Jasper*, bound from *Jamaica* for *England*, had put into the *Havana*, having in the said Hurricane lost her Masts, and received other Damage; till whose Arrival, all the Englishmen belonging to the Vessels cast away, were by the kind Spaniards imprisoned in their Forts and Goals.

January 10. On the 3d Instant, put into this Port, in Distress, the Brig *Swallow*, Capt. *Riorden*, of and for *Boston*, from the Bay of *Honduras*.

February 1. The Master of a Vessel arrived here Yesterday from *Jamaica*, informs us, That he was taken in the Windward Passage by two Spanish Guarda Costas, who searched him, but finding no Money, dismissed him again: He heard they had cruized there some Time, had already taken several Vessels, and have Orders to seize every English Vessel that has to the Value of ten Dollars in Spanish Coin on board. [It is observable, That whenever any Searches or Seizures have been made by the Spaniards, of any Vessel belonging to the Dutch, the Governors of their Colonies in America, immediately grant Letters of Marque and Reprieve to the Injured, who thereby are enabled to obtain Restitution, without going through the numerous Forms, and exposing themselves to as numerous Difficulties and Disappointments, that attend Complaints on such Occasions, to the Court of Madrid.]

Newport, in Rhode-Island, February 14.

Last Saturday arrived here Capt. *Campbell*, in 13 Weeks from *London*. On the 22d of December last, he met with a Wreck at Sea, the Captain of which, whose Name is *Patrick Galtay*, informs, That on the 17th of December, in his Passage from *Virginia* to *Montross* in *Scotland*, in a violent Gale of Wind, the Vessel broach'd too, shipped a Sea, stove down her Quarter Deck, laid the Vessel upon her Broadside, so that they were obliged to cut away her Main mast, wash'd all the Men off the Deck, being 4 in Number, and when Capt. *Campbell* left her, she had 4 Feet Water in her Hold. The rest of the People, being the Captain, one Man, and two Boys, are brought into this Port.

**B O S T O N .**

January 6. We hear that a few Days ago, a Vessel arrived at *Marblehead* from *Malaga*, in *Spain*, and that all the Hands are froze but one.

January 13. About ten Days ago, a Brig from *Barbadoes*, a Sloop from *Antigua*, and three other Vessels, came out of *Cape Cod Harbour*, all bound hither; but the Wind coming out at N. E. and blowing hard, with Snow, they were all cast away. The *Antigua* Sloop went ashore near *Marshfield*, and 'tis thought will be got off; three others are ashore near *Plymouth*, one of which is bilged, but the *Barbadoes* Brig not being heard of, it is thought she was cast away behind the Monument, and that the People are lost. Several of the Men belonging to the Vessels on shore, are said to be very much froze, having been up to their Necks in Water.

**N E W - Y O R K .**

February 3. Last Friday Night arrived here Capt. *Lawrence* from *St. Augustine*, in whom is come Passenger Capt. *Shourt* and his Mate, late of

the Sloop *Success* of this Port, from the Bay, of whom we have the following Account, viz. That they sailed from the Bay the 19th of August last, and a few Days after, met with a violent Gale of Wind, which held them some Time, at the End of which, they found themselves in the Bay of *Mexico*; from whence they were near three Weeks beating up to *Cuba*, the Vessel leaking all the while, so as to keep one Pump continually going. About the Middle of September, they were off the *Matanzas*, when another violent Gale took them, split their Mainfall to Pieces, and obliged them to go under their bare Poles; and after running thro' very imminent Danger, the Sea washing over them, and both Pumps going, they struck on a small Key near *Cape Florida*; they then took to their Boats, where they continued two Days without Water, rowing along thro' several Keys, to the Eastward: After being above two Weeks among the Keys, they got to the *Mariters*, where they were surrounded by 7 or 8 Canoes full of Indians, who took them all Prisoners, and would have sacrificed them, but were prevented by their King, till happily a Spanish Sloop coming there, the Captain, Mate, and one Man more, were rescued by them, and carried to *St. Augustine*. In the same Gale, a Ship from *Jamaica* for *London*, loaded with Rum and Sugar, was cast away on one of the Keys, and the Indians kept the remaining five of Capt. *Shourt's* Men to help to unload that Ship. He says the Indians were often so eager to kill them, notwithstanding their King's Orders, that they were frequently obliged to fly into the Bushes for Safety; the Indians looking on them as worse than so many Dogs.

**P H I L A D E L P H I A .**

February 11. Saturday last one *William Kerr* was committed to the Jail of this City, on Suspicion of having counterfeited the Mill'd Pieces of Eight. There were several bad Ones found upon him, and a Receipt for the mixing of Metals. He pretends to be a Weaver, and says he lives at *Bethlehem*, in the *Jerseys*, with one *William M'Cracken*. The Pieces are cast in Sand, and are filed upon the Milling; they look very rough, are more of a Lead than Silver Colour, and sound like Brass.

March 3. Last Week arrived here Capt. *Marshall*, from *Antigua*, who, in Latitude 35 30 North, Longitude 65 20 West, spoke with Capt. *Sprout*, in a Sloop belonging to *Norfolk*, in *Virginia*, in great Distress; he had been 48 Days from *St. Christophers* for *Norfolk*, most of which Time beating upon this Coast, under very hard Gales of Wind, which laid him twice on the Carcen, by which his Loading shifted, and his Sails were tore to Pieces; his Hands mostly sick, and very short of Provisions. Capt. *Marshall* would have taken the People on board his Vessel, if the Weather would have permitted, but as it would not, he threw as much Beef, Bread, Candles, Twine, &c. into the Sloop, as would carry her to *Bermuda*, for which they made the best of their Way, having a Piece of a spare Jib for a Forefall.
