Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

18 Majesty having been graciously pleased to honour me with his Commission, to be Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of this his Dominion of Virginia; I thought it my Duty to call you together, that we may jointly confider what we are impowered to do, for promoting his Majesty's Interest and the Prosperity of this Colony.

I have so just a Sense of the Importance of the Traft devolved upon me, and Solicitude to difcharge the same with Honour, as wholly prevents my Attention to those Arts, by which Persons con-scious of their great Abilities, or familiar to com-mand by long Habit, are enabled to grace a public

This Solicitude is increased by the Virtues of my Predecessor: But the my Ambition be disappointed by the Example I follow, yet Emulation will be animated; if less eminent, I may be more useful, by a steady Attention to the Good of this Dominion.

During the Time I may have the Honour to prefide, I very fincerely resolve and determine, that my constant Care shall be to support the Church of England, as by Law established, to en-courage Virtue, Piety, and Loyalty to his Sacred Majesty; and, with the utmost of my Power, to

discourage Vice and Immorality.

It shall further be my Inclination and Endeavour to cultivate those Virtues of a focial Nature, by keeping up a good and harmonious Correspondence with you in a private as well as a public Capaci-ty: And I shall always be ready, to the Extent of my Understanding, to assist you with my Advice, in any Matter that may occur.

Motive and Reward of Virtue, My Affection for you, Gentlemen, will be now gratified, by frequent Opportunities of expeding my Zeal for the Good of this Colony (now my Country), which will be a Spring of Pleasure in

It was with great Joy I landed here, invelled with Power of doing Good to a People, among whom I had formerly mingled in Scenes of dome-flic Felicity, and experienced the endearing Reciprocations of Friendship.

But I am very sensible, the most ardent Benevolence and most inviolable Fidelity are frequently insufficient to effect their own Purposes; but Error has perhaps produced as many public Calemitics as Indolence, Avarice, or Ambition. I shall therefore, Gentlemen of the Council, always receive your Advice with Pleasure; and, Gentlemen of your Advice with Pleafure; and, Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses, I shall rely with Considence on your Assistance.

Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,
That I might indulge the Impatience of my
Wishes, I have called you together to food after my Arrival, that we may concur in the gracious Defign of his Majefly, and to express my Duty and Gratitude to him in the most acceptable Manner, by becoming an Instrument of Happiness to my Fellow Subjects.

The Legislature should always be buly; there are Grievances to redress, Irregularities to reform, Defects to supply, and Exuberances to cut off: I

and probably others that want Amendment. I therefore most earnessly recommend to you the Profecution of this great Work with Diligence and Expedition. Consider what Bills may be proper and necessary for promoting the public Quiet, and common Interest, by more effectually securing Property, encouraging and extending Commerce, establishing the Peace, Safety, and Regularity of an equitable and well ordered Government. I will assist you, Gentlemen, to the utmost of my Power, in the Attainment of these desirable Purposes; and you may expect from me every Concession in your Favour, of which my Instituctions will admit.

There is one Thing I recommend to your parti-cular Regard, and that is the cultivating a good Correspondence with the neighbouring Nations of Indians. It is better they should love us, than that they should fear us; and one of the two is absolutely necessary. Fear is a flavish Passion, and the Mind is always struggling to throw it off. On the Mind is always truggling to throw it off. On the contrary, Love and Amity are propagated by Acts of Kindness, the very Exercise of which is Delight The Mind is happy under their Influence; and their Influence, for that Reason, is continually gaining new Strength: So that our European Neighbours, who are settled to the Southward and Northward of us, would never be able to inflame the Indians against us, if the Advantage of mutual Bounty, Gratingle, and public Faith, concleded Bounty, Gratitude, and public Faith, opposed their Attempts. They have been long endeavouring to spirit up the *Indians* that are in Amity with us, to the Breach of their Faith, with a View to possess and settle the interior Parts of America, the Back of our Frontier Settlements to the Westward. Your own good Senie will foon discover what bad Consequences such Settlements would be of to us, and our Posterity. But I have too high an Opinion of your Sagacity and Virtue, to think any surther Arguments are necessary to convince you this Measure is expedient, or to persuade you it is e-quitable. Naples, October 29. In the Afternoon of the Earthquake ; but our Apprehensions were abated by feveral Persons of Experience affirming it to be a Presage of Eruptions from Mount Vesuvius : Nor were they mistaken; for on the 25th, the Wind fhifting to N. W. a black and thick Smoke was fren to issue with great Rapidity from the Aperture of the Mountain; in the Evening, Flames were perceived, and to increase, so that the whole Cra-ter seemed in a Blaze. On the 26th, a Clest was perceived a little below the Summit, and a Stream of ignited Matter issuing from it like a River of Flame. Yesterday the Appearance of Vesuvius was quite tremendous; the inflamed Torrent, after making a Channel, had divided itself into two other Streams, which impetuously continued their Course among the Fields, Farms, and Vineyards, which lie betwixt the Mountain and the Sea. Oar Virtuofos fay, that the Torrent is now at it's Height, and that it will no fooner have reached the Sea, which will be this Day, than the Fire of the Mountain will gradually decrease to a total Extinction. It is certain, that from the Multitude of Observations made of late Years, on the Ebullitions of this Mountain, the Duration of most of them, unless very extraordinary, may be calculated within a few Hours. Princels Efterhafi, the Imperial Ambassadres, more intent upon the Causes, than frightened at the Effects of the Phanomenon, did not mis a Day going to that Part of the Mountain where the ignited Substance bent it's Course, taking with her some Persons of Learning for her Information; and from thence the came down along the Grounds, through which the Stream had taken it's Way to the Sea. The Channel which it has made is above 500 Feet in Breadth, and the Sediment left in it is of a fulphureous Substance, which dries into the Hardness of a Stone.

If thy Estate be good, match near home and at Leisure; if weak, tar off and quickly. Enquire diligently of her Disposition, and how her Parents have been inclined in their Youth. Let her not be poor, how generous soever: For a Man can buy nothing in the Market with Gentility: Nor chuse a hase and uncomely Creature altogether for Weath; for it will cause Contempt in others, and Loathirg in thee. Neither make Choice of a Dwarf or a Fool; for by the one thou shalt beget a Race of Pyg-

thee. Neither make Choice of a Dwarf or a Fool; for by the one thou shalt beget a Race of Pyg-mies; and the other will be thy continual Difgrace; and it will hart thee to hear her talk: For thou shalt find it to thy Grief, there is nothing more fulsome than a She Fool.

And touching the Guiding of thy House, let thy Hospitality be moderate, and according to the Means of thy Estate, rather plentiful than sparing, not costly. For I never knew any Man grow poor by keeping an orderly Table. But some contume themselves through secret Vices, and their Hotpitality bears the blame. But banish swinish Drunkards out of thy House, which is a Vice impairing Health, consuming much, and makes no Shew.

I hever heard Praise ascribed to the Dronland, but for the well bearing his Drink; which is better Commendation for a Brewer's Horse or a Dray. man, than a Gentleman. Heware thou found nor above three Fourths of thy Revenue, nor above a third Part of that in thy House, for the other two Parts will do no more than defray thy Extraordinaries, which always furmount the Ordinaries by much; otherwife thou shale live like a rich Beg gar, in continual Want. And the needy Man can never live happily or contentedly; for every Di-fafter makes him ready to mortgage or fell; And that Gentleman who tells an Acre of Land fells an

Ounce of Credit; for Gentility is nothing elfe than entient Riches. So that if the Foundation should at any Time sink, the Building must needs follow.

It Bring thy Children up in Learning and Obedience, yet without outward Austerity. Praise them openly, reprehend them secretly. Give them good Countenance and convenient Maintainance, according to the Ability otherwise the Life will according to thy Ability, otherwife thy Life will feen their Bondage, and what Portion thou shalt leave them at thy Death, they will thank Death for, and not thee. I am perfuaded the foolish Cockering of some Paren's, and the over stern Carriage of others, causeth more Men and Women to take ill Courfes than their own vicious Inclina tions. Marry thy Daughters in time, left they marry themselves; and suffer not thy Sons to pass the Alps; for they shall learn nothing there but Price, Blasphemy, and Atheism. And if by Trashall profit them nothing more than to have one Meal serv'd in divers Diftes. Neither, by my Confent shall thou train them up in Wars ; for he that fe's up his Reft to live by that Profession, can hardly be an honest Man, or a good Christian; because it is a Science no longer in Request than Ufe ; for Soldiers in Peace are like Chimneys in

III. Live not in the Country without Corn and Cattle about thee; for he that putteth his Hand to the Purse for every Expence of Houshold, is like him that keepeth Water in a Sieve; and what Provision thou shalt want, learn to buy it at the bell hand, for there is one Penny faved in four, betwixt buying in thy Need, and when the Market and Sealons ferve fitteft for it. Be not ferved with Kinfmen or Friends; for they expect much and do little: Nor with such as are amorous, for their Heads are intoxicated; and keep rather too few than too many. Feed them well and pay with the most, and then thou mayest boldly require Service at their Hands.

IV. Let thy Kindred and Allies be welcome at thy House and Table. Grace them with thy Countenance, and further them in all honest Actions; for by this Means thou shalt fo double the Band of Nature as thou shalt find them so many Advocates to plead an Apology for thee behind fites, and Sycophants, who will feed and fawn up on thee in the Summer of Prosperity, but in an adverse Storm, they will shelter thee no more than an Arbour in Winter.

V. Beware of thy Suretyship for thy best Friends He that payeth another Man's Debts, feeketh his own Decay. But if thou can'ft not otherwise chuse, rather lend thy Money thyself upon good Bonds, although thou borrow it, fo shalt thou fecure thyfelf and pleafure thy Friend: Neither borrow Money of a Neighbour or a Friend, but of a Stranger, where paying for it thou shalt hear no more of it, otherwise thou shalt eclipse thy Credit, lose thy Freedom, and yet pay as dear as to ano ther. But in borrowing of Money be precious of thy Word, for he that hath Care of Days of Pay-

ment is Lord of another Man's Purie.
VI. VIII. Towards thy Superiors be humble, yet penerous; with thine Equals familiar, yet respectful. Towards thy Instriors shew much Humanity, and some Familiarity. The first prepares the Way

to Advancement, the second makes ther known for a Man well bred; the third goins a good Report, which once got is entity kept: For right Humanity takes such deep Koot in the Minds of the Multitude, that they are more entity gained by unprefitable Courteres, than by charlish Baneius. Yet I advise thee not to affect Popularity too much, seek not to be Effect, thun to be Raleigh.

1X. Trust not any Man with thy kile, Credit, of Estate; for it is mere Folly for a Man to enthrall himself to his Friend, as though, Occasion being offered, he should not dare to become the Enemy.

X. Be not scarrilous in Conversation, nor fatirical in thy Jest; the one will make thee unwelcome to all Company; the other draw on Quarrels, and get the Hatred of thy best Friends: For suspicious Jests, when any of them savour of Truth, leave a Bitterness in the Minds of those who are touched. And though I have already pointed at this inclusively, yet I think it necessary to leave it thee inclusively, yet I think it necessary to leave it thee as a special Caution; because I have seen so many prone to quip and gird, that they would rather lose their Friend than their Jest I and if by Chance their boiling Brains yield a quaint Scoff, they will travail to be delivered of it as a Woman with Child; fuch rimble Fancies are but the Froth of Wit.

N Confequence of the Peace which Commodore Keppel has renewed here, between the King of Great Britain and this Regency, the Dey has wrote a Letter to his Britannic Majesty, the Purport of which is as follows:

To the most August and Invincible Monarch and Emperor of the British Nation.

"With the fincerest Joy we have seen the most Sage and Honourable Keppel, Commandant of your Majesty's Ships, arrive here. He imparted to us your Majesty's Intention to renew the Peace and Friendship between you and our Regency. This Affair having been proposed in our laudable and enlighten'd Divan, all the Members thereof were unanimously of Opinion, that it was good and expedient to renew this Peace, because the English being antient Friends of this State, it was fit to give them Proofs of our reciprocal Inclination to cement Friendship with them. Thus the our Captains, charged to maintain the Glory of our Flag, to treat as Friends all the Ships of the British Nation which they shall meet with; to abflain especially from giving them any Trouble of Uneafiness, and to be very careful of not flopping or detaining them without a Cause, after the said Ships shall have duly complied with what is required by Treaties, in such Cases as when our Ships, being in quelt of our Enemies, meet with Vessels belonging to Nations in Friendship with us. It is our unleigned Defire to perform ingenuoully, and without Refervation, the Word and Promife we give to our Friends, particularly to such whose Friendship is so antient as your Majesty's. We will be sedulous to preserve and increase that Friendship. thip, and be diligent in removing all Obfiacles thereto: For it is with the firiclest Regard to Truth that we lay these Affurances before your Majesty's Throne, that they may be a Guarance and certain Proof of our real and irrevocable Sentiments, &c."

Tunis, Off., 6.
