DIRECTOR'S NOTES

"A Grand Night for Singing" is perhaps most recognizable as a rousing ensemble song from the film and stage versions of *State Fair*. Here, the song is borrowed and becomes a showcase of groundbreaking musical theatre pieces from the legendary team of Rodgers and Hammerstein. The music is a collection of tunes that most musical theatre lovers recognize as the gold standard of traditional musical theatre. That said, know that some of your favorites are not included. When I first researched this production, I thought surely it would include classics such as "Climb Every Mountain" and "Getting to Know You," just to name a few standards. Instead, this production includes songs from lesser known productions such as *Allegro, Pipe Dream* and *Me and Juliet*. Don't worry, though, there are some very well-known pieces included such as "If I Loved You," "This Nearly Was Mine" and "I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Out of My Hair."

There is, however, a catch. Many of these classics have been reimagined and removed from the context of the story that they served. In so doing, those who developed the original production deliver a collection that demonstrates the music of Rodgers and Hammerstein as both timely and timeless. This show is more than just a collection of restyled classics, however. It also chronicles the love and romance story we know all too well: The dating game, falling in love, unrequited love, marriage, fear of marriage, having children, the pain love sometimes brings and doing it all over again despite that pain.

This production is both artistic and academic as it serves as the final exam for students enrolled in MUSA 104, Musical Theatre Ensemble. This course is open to all students regardless of training and experience. We do our best to meet students where they are in terms of skill level and assign them performances that we hope will enhance their appreciation and desire with regard to musical theatre performance. It has been our pleasure to work with this group who have embraced this music as passionately as we on the production team have.

The pronoun "we" above recognizes that a live production happens because of many individuals. I am grateful for the collaboration with my friend and colleague Dr. William Folger who serves as musical director. His patience and creative insights are invaluable. I first met Katie Nuttall-Oakley while serving as stage manager for the James M. Bennett High School annual "Rock and Roll Revival" show. When I saw her work dance magic with dozens of high school students, I knew she was the choreographer I needed. This production marks her fourth as choreographer for this course. Speaking of stage managers, Senior Theatre Performance Major Eric McCladdie has quietly, but passionately, served in that capacity for this production. It has been my pleasure to have him as a part of the team.
