L O N D O N, March 3.

YESTERDAY Theodore Gardelle, a Frenchman, was re-examined before John Fielding, Paul Valiant and Theodore Sydenham, Esqrs. at Mr. Fielding's House, touching the wilful Murder of Mrs. Anne King, late of Leicester Square, in whose House the said Gardelle was a Lodger, when during an Examination of many Hours, the said Gardelle persisted in denying the Fact with the most invincible Obstinacy; but Mr. Fielding having prior to the Examination, sent Officers with a Carpenter and Bricklayer to the House of the deceased, with Orders to examine every Part of it in order to find the Body; after some Time, received a Messenger from them acquainting him that they had found the Entrails of the Body in the Boghouse; which Message being delivered in the Presence of the Prisoner, soon occasioned his making a partial Confession of the horrid Crime, which was afterwards made in the fullest Manner in Warrants being issued against two of his Accomplices, who since appeared to be very innocent, and to the following Purport, viz. That on Thursday the 10th of February last, about seven in the Morning, he, Gardelle, having sent Mrs. King's Maid of a Message, and her Mistress not being up, agreed to wait in the Front Parlour till the Servant's return, in order to answer the Street Door; that Mrs. King lodged upon the same Floor, and the Maid's Absence was getting up and spoke to the Prisoner, whereupon he rushed into the Room, and attempted to force the Deceased, so that she struck him, whereupon he gave her a violent Blow, which stunned her by falling against the Bed Post; at seeing her thus injured, he took a Knife out of his Pocket and cut her Throat, then locked up the Room, and the same Day artfully discharged the Maid of the deceased without a Discovery, by which he got Possession of the whole House; he then dissected the Body, and divided it into many Parts; that he flung the Entrails down the Necessary, together with the Knife with which he committed the Murder; that he then made a Fire in the Garret, and there burnt the Head and most of her Bones Ashes, and concealed the Flesh at the Top of the House, between the Tiles and Roof, all which were found.

The said Gardelle is by Trade an Enamel Painter, and in the Course of the Examination, it appeared that he had robbed Mrs. King of a Gold Watch, two Diamond Rings, and about ten Guinea's in Money, which he having lodged in the hands of honest Persons, they produced them as evidences against him. It is said he has a Wife and two Children now in Paris. He is in the Cells Newgate, chained down to the Floor, and one of the Turnkeys is to sit up with him every Night to prevent his destroying himself. Gardelle, the horrid Assassin now in Newgate for the Murder of Mrs. King, has confessed his taking her Watch, but gives an odd Turn to that Circumstance; he says his Reason for doing so was, in order to countenance the Report he had spread of her being gone abroad for some Days. He very frankly owns the Murder, with all the dreadful Circumstances that followed it, but appears unwilling to confess any Design of Theft. Strange! that a Man, who could calmly and deliberately go through an Operation upon a Body of a Woman who had just murdered, should have such mistaken notions of Delicacy as to be ashamed of Theft. The Fact, with all its Circumstances considered, is, perhaps, the most foul that ever disgraced the Annals of Britain, who, it is hoped, will never give to such a Monster. The too common Plea of Liquor, or a disordered Mind, is not so much pleaded; the horrid Deed was committed in the morning as the unhappy Woman was rising from her Bed, and but half dressed; the Plea of Passion might have some Claim to Pity, did not the subsequent, calm, deliberate Scene of Villainy bar the

Gates of it; the Wretch is neither a Frenchman nor a Genoese, but was born in the City of Geneva, well known for its Situation on the Lake Lemman, near the Foot of the Alps; he is, as all the Natives of that City are, a Protestant, and is attended by a French Clergyman of that Persuasion.

March 14. Gardelle, now in Confinement for the Murder of Mrs. King, being, it is said, asked why he did not attempt making his Escape, after committing that shocking Fact, as he had so fair an Opportunity? answered, that he had often attempted it, but constantly imagined himself stopped at the Door by somebody holding him by the Collar of his Coat.

April 23. The Captain of the King George Packet spoke with the Blond Man of War off the Bar, who had taken the Grand Cyprus Privateer of Bayonne, of 18 Guns and 180 Men. The Packet was chased by a Privateer for several Hours. Yesterday Advice was received that a French Privateer of 22 Guns was taken off Flamborough-Head by the Aetion Frigate.

B O S T O N, June 15.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in London, dated April 11, 1761.

"When a Congress was proposed some Days ago, Mr. Pitt declared he would not enter on the Subject, till the French first agreed to give up all Pretensions to Canada and the Fishery: And by the Mail To-day, I am informed, they have agreed to the former, but struggle to keep the latter."

"Lord Chesterfield died this Morning." We hear from Newport, Rhode-Island, that last Week, two French Dutch Prizes were sent in there, one taken by Captain Sweet, in a Privateer belonging to that Place, viz. a Sloop bound from Old France to the Cape, laden with dry Goods, Wine, &c.—The other a large Sloop, bound from the Cape, laden with Sugar, Coffee and Indigo, taken by Capt. Hansen, in a Privateer belonging to the West-Indies, after a smart Engagement, in which several were killed on both Sides; Captain Hansen had also taken two other Prizes from the same Place, and sent them to New-York.

Friday Night last several Officers and Merchants came to Town from Portsmouth, at which Place they arrived last Week in eight Days from Halifax, by whom we learn, that all the Men of War, except two, were sailed from Halifax for the River St. Lawrence.

Yesterday an Officer came to Town in 20 Days from Montreal, who informs that all is well in that Quarter.

Last Tuesday Evening, one Jeremiah Dexter, of Walpole, a Trader, was detected in offering false and counterfeit Dollars in this Town; and being apprehended and examined, there were found upon him five of them, cast in a Mould; they were made of Pewter, or some base Metal, and want near three Pennyweight of the Weight of the genuine Ones.—He at first made very weak and evasive Answers to excuse himself; but being committed to Prison, he confessed next Morning with Tears, that they were of his own making, and that he had no more than those five; and said that he had no Accomplices. But we hear he has since accused one of being concerned with him, after whom a Warrant is issued.

The same Day Capt. Bartlett arrived at Marblehead from the West-Indies: On his Passage, near the Latitude of Bermuda, he was taken by a French Privateer, and ransomed his Vessel for 3000 Dollars.

N E W Y O R K, June 22.

Last Sunday Week sailed from the Hook, on a Cruise, his Majesty's Ship Penzance, Capt. Boyd: We hear she is to return to this Port again in August.

Wednesday a Schooner arrived here in about five Weeks from Teneriffe, by whom we learn, that the English Fleet there, having taken in their Lading of Wines, was ready to sail the first fair Wind.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, June 25.

Lost Night Captain Mitchell arrived here in six Weeks from Londonderry, by whom we have London Advices to the 30th of April; but, for Want of Time and Room, we can only insert this Week what follows, viz.

From the London Gazette Extraordinary.

Whitehall, April 30, 1761.

This Morning the Honourable Captain Barrington, Commander of his Majesty's Ship Achilles, arrived with the following Letters from Major General Hodgson, and the Honourable Commodore Keppel, to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Pitt.

Belleisle, 4 o'Clock in the Morning, April 23, 1761.

AS I have just had a Note from Commodore Keppel, to inform me that a Frigate will sail this Day for England, I have only Time to acquaint you, that his Majesty's Troops under my Command, landed Yesterday at Five: The Enemy's Attention was so distracted with our Attempts of landing at different Places, where there was the least Appearance of our being able to succeed, that it gave Brigadier Lambert an Opportunity of climbing up a Rock, with a Corps I had left with him for that Purpose, if practicable: The Difficulty of mounting had made the Enemy least attentive to that Part.—Beauchamp's Grenadiers, with their Captain Patterson, got up before they saw what was intended. They immediately marched a Body of 300 Men to attack him. The Grenadiers maintained their Ground till the rest of Brigadier Lambert's got up. We took three Brass Field Pieces, and some wounded Prisoners. It is impossible for me sufficiently to commend Mr. Lambert's Conduct and gallant Behaviour on the Occasion; and take the Liberty to beg you will recommend him to the King, as an Officer deserving his Majesty's Favour. Captain Patterson has lost his Arm. I believe our Loss is not above 30 killed. I am afraid you will not be able to read this Scrawl, as I write it in the Field, the Troops being on their March.

IHAD the Honour to write you a Letter by the Aetion Frigate, in which I gave but little Hopes; since which Time, the General and myself having considered, that by attempting a Place where the Mounting the Rocks was just possible, and where the Enemy were no other ways prepared, from the impracticable Appearance it had to them, than by a Corps of Troops to annoy the Boats in the Attempt, that it carried some Degree of Hopes with it, and by making a Disposition for the Attack of their intrenched Bays, and at Sauzon at the same Time, which the Arrival of the Transports with the Light Horse enabled me to do, we might possibly gain a Footing.

I have now the greatest Pleasure in acquainting you, that his Majesty's Troops have made good a Landing on the Rocks near Point Lomaria; and cannot sufficiently commend the Spirit and good Behaviour of the Troops in the Attempt; and the Judgment, with which Sir Thomas Stanhope, and the rest of the Captains of the King's Ships, directed their Fire upon the Hills.

Captain Barrington having been employed in many of the Operations on this Service, I have sent him Home with this Letter; and beg, Sir, to refer you to him for the Particulars. I have the Honour to be, &c.

Valiant, 1 Midshipman, 8 Seamen, killed; Lieut. Gregory, 2 Midshipmen, and 20 Seamen, wounded; 1 Midshipman, and 18 Seamen, missing. Vespucius, 5 Seamen killed; 7 Ditto wounded. Etna, Lieut. Jarratt killed. A. KEPPEL.

Whitehall, April 24. His Majesty was this Day pleased to name the Right Hon. Charles Wyndham, Earl of Egremont; the Right Hon. David Lord Viscount Stormont, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the King and Republic of Poland; and the Hon. Lieut. Gen. Sir Joseph Yorke, Knight of the most Hon. Order of the Bath, His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Provinces; His Ministers Plenipotentiary at the Congress which is soon to be opened at the Imperial City of Augsborg. His most Christian Majesty has made Choice of the Count of Choiseul, at present his Ambassador at the Court of Vienna, to be his Minister Plenipotentiary at the said Congress.

The King of Prussia has named Baron Plötho, at present his Minister at the Diet at Ratisbon, and M. Haefler, his Ministers Plenipotentiary at the said Congress.

LONDON, April 30. By AUTHORITY, we can assure the Public, That Belleisle is actually taken; and that immediately on the Arrival of the Reinforcements, Colonel Crawford, in Conjunction with the Gentlemen abovementioned, made a brisk Attack upon the Citadel, on which the French surrendered.

We hear that two Persons of Distinction are named to be reciprocally sent by the British and French Courts, to facilitate the Negotiations for accomplishing the great and salutary Work of PEACE.

The principal Matters to be insisted on by our Plenipotentiaries, it is said, are these; that Guadaloupe, with America, be ceded to us; that no Satisfaction be given to the French for any Ships taken previous to the Declaration of War; that no Suspension of Arms shall take Place during the Sitting of the Congress; that the giving up the Island of Minorca shall not be looked upon or taken as an Equivalent for the Islands of Senegal and Goree; and that this Congress may continue three Calendar Months, from the Day of their first Meeting.

ANNAPOLIS, July 2. Friday Night last Died, at his Plantation in Prince-George's County, aged 86 Years, Colonel JOSEPH BELT, whose Death is supposed to be occasioned by Grief for the Death of his Son a few Weeks before.

We hear from Kent County, that the Woman who was suspected of throwing her Ballard Child down a Well (as mentioned some Time ago) has been Tried at a Special Court held there, and Condemned. She is a married Woman, and says it was Still-Born. It is certain her Husband had no Concern in the Affair, as he has not been in the Country for a long Time.

Three Negroes were lately Condemned in Calvert County, for murdering Mrs. Smith, their Mistress, by Poison, some Years ago; but by some Mistake in the Jury Proceedings, it seems they are to have another Trial.

Early this Morning, the Honourable DANIEL DULANY, Esq; attended by a Number of Gentlemen, left Town, in order to embark for London, in the Ship *Willson*, Capt. William Johnson, now in *Patuxent*. The only Son of the late Governor OGLE, and Mr. DULANY's eldest Son, are gone with him.



BERLIN, April 7.

THE Court hath published the following Account of an Action on the 2d Instant, near Saalfeld, between a Body of Forces under Major-Generals Schenckendorff and Sybourg, and a Body of Austrians, and of the Troops of the Empire.

On the first of April, Major-General Schenckendorff marched with his Troops from Gera, where he had his Winter-Quarters, and the same Day advanced towards Neudorf, on the Orla. Being joined there by the Corps under Major-General Sybourg, he proceeded, on the 2d, straight to Saalfeld, where his Vanguard, composed of some Squadrons of the Hussars, commanded by Major Hundt, attacked, on the Heights behind the Village of Gornsdorf, the Austrians and Troops of the Empire under Major-General Kleist. Our People were saluted by a brisk Discharge of Cannon; nevertheless the brave Major Hundt did not relinquish his post; he climbed up the Heights with two of his Squadrons, and whilst the three others filed off through Saalfeld, he fell so briskly, sword in hand, on the Enemy's right flank, that he broke their Infantry, made great Slaughter, and took four Pieces of Cannon, twelve Pounders, with two Air of Colours. Twenty Officers, and 800 private Men, were on this Occasion made Prisoners.

On the other Hand, Major Pittwitz, who led the Van of Major-General Sybourg's Brigade, and who had marched by Rudolstadt, attacked two of the Enemy's Battalions in the Village of Schwarte, who made vain Efforts to defend that important Post. The Battalion of Lottow's Grenadiers, and Luderitz's independent Battalion, carrying the Field Artillery to the Heights beyond the Village, pointed them so well, that on the 5th Discharge the Enemy abandoned that important Post; which Major Pittwitz perceiving, he pushed the Rivulet of Schwarte with his Hussars, pursued the Enemy, took three Colours, the same Number of Cannon, and made one whole Battalion Prisoners.

This Affair, the Honour of which chiefly belongs to Zieten's Hussars, cost the Enemy seven Pieces of Cannon, six Colours, five covered Waggon with Powder, and several baggage Waggon, among which were those of Major-General Kleist. We also took 32 Officers, of which Number was one Colonel, 2 Majors, and 8 Captains, and 1100 private Men.

Dresden, April 2. The King of Prussia's Camp is surrounded with impregnable Works. One would imagine his Majesty intended to stay in it all the Summer.

Hagen, April 21. We hear that the Troops of his Prussian Majesty have gained another Advantage over Part of the Army of the Empire. On the 6th Instant a Detachment of the former attacked the Corps under General Guasco near Hagen, in the Voigtland, took one Colonel, 8 other Officers, with about 150 Men, and 4 Pieces of Cannon, and all their baggage. The Prussians lost, on this Occasion, only Major Hundt of Zieten's Hussars, a Lieutenant, and 30 Men.

LONDON, April 16. Yesterday Morning Major-General Douglas set out for Travelling, in order to embark a large Body of Cavalry for Germany.

By a Letter from the East-Indies, by Way of Constantinople, there is Advice, that the Crew of the Denham Indian, after having burnt her, retired into Fort Marlborough, and defended the Place with great Bravery; but being overpowered by Numbers, were obliged to surrender. However, they were so fortunate as to have removed great Part of their best Effects up into the Country, and some they had put on board Dutch Ships, and sent to Batavia.

The Bristol Packet, Bartlett, is arrived at Bristol from London in 23 Days.

The Argument fitted out under the Command of Commodore Keppel is, in respect to Land Forces, the greatest that has been out this War.

We hear the French Frigate lately taken by the Albany Ship, Capt. Brograve, is 24 Feet longer, a much stronger Ship than the Albany, and is capable of making a fine 22 Gun Ship for his Majesty's Service. It reflects Honour on the Nation in general, and on our Sea Officers and Sailors in particular, when we see the Enemy afraid of engaging with an inferior Force, and throwing their Guns overboard, in Hopes of escaping by ignominious Flight.

April 18. Wednesday, about Five in the Afternoon, died suddenly in his Chair, of an Apoplectic Fit, Archibald Campbell, Duke of Argyle, Lord-Lieutenant of Argyleshire and Admiral of the Western Isles, Keeper of the Great Seal, Justice General, an Extraordinary Lord of Session, Hereditary Master of the King's Household in Scotland, Hereditary Keeper of Dunstaffnage and Carrick, Chancellor of Aberdeen, and one of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

April 21. A fresh Contract for Transports has taken Place, to about the Number of Thirty.

The Express arrived from Commodore Keppel, off Belleisle, on Sunday Noon, was brought by Capt. Ellis, of the Fleet, who put into Portland; and is said to bring an Account, that our Ships had silenced the Battery next the Sea Side, but on attempting to land their Men on Belleisle, they found the shore stuck full of sharp Iron Spikes; and on the Tide's sinking, the flat-bottomed Boats being loaded with Men, &c. were so fast upon the Spikes, that they could not get off; which the French perceiving, unmasked their

Batteries, and killed and took Prisoners near 500 of our Men, besides the Loss of 30 Boats.

We hear an Express is arrived with the Dutch Mail, and has brought Advice of the King of Prussia's routing a Detachment of the Austrian Army near Dresden, consisting of 10,000 Men, and the Loss of the Austrians, in killed and Prisoners, is said to be 4000.

The Berlin Ship of War, taken by the Hero and Venus, is a new Ship, burthen 1632 Tons, Length of her Keel 135 Feet, her Breadth on her main Deck 44 Feet Nine Inches, Depth of her Hold 20 Feet, and eight Feet high between Decks. It is thought she will make one of the finest Men of War ever brought to England.

April 28. The French Accounts join the Marshal d'Etrees and the Marquis de Bussy to the Count de Choiseul, as Ministers Plenipotentiaries at the ensuing Congress.

By Letters from Vienna there is Advice, that the Court has not been able to raise Cash to furnish Russia for the last six Months Pay of their Troops.

It is reported, that the Day for the first Meeting of the Congress is appointed for Monday, the 24th of May, at Augsburg.

The Baggage of the Plenipotentiaries, we are told, is gone down the River, to be embarked on board the Fubbs Yacht.

We hear the Coronation is now certainly fixed for the 5th of October next.

It is reported that some Naval Assistance is soliciting from our Court, in Favour of the Maltese.

Private Letters from Vienna assure us, that tho' the Express had consented to the holding a Congress, she will send no Ministers to it till after some decisive Blow is struck.

It is now said for certain that the second Expedition, which was to sail in a few Days, is countermanded.

By the last Cartel Ship from France, which lately brought over two of the King's Officers, taken in the Ajax, it appears that the whole Number of English Prisoners including Dinant, Breil, Bayonne, and elsewhere in Europe, does not exceed 1000 Men; and it is well known, that on their Part the Prisoners with us are near 25,000; a Disparity which evidently shews the Destruction made among their Privateers and Trade.

We hear that Orders are given for building two or three more Line of Battle Ships down the River; and that in Consequence of these Orders they are to lay the Keels forthwith.

The following are the Letters which were received on the 19th Instant, by the Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Pitt, from Major-General Hodgson, and the Honourable Commodore Keppel, relative to the first Attempt against the Island of Belleisle.

On board the Valiant, off Belleisle, April 12, 1761.

SIR,

IHAVE the Honour to acquaint you, that his Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Commodore Keppel, and the Transports with his Majesty's Forces on board, came to an Anchor in this Road on Tuesday, the 7th Instant, about 12 o'Clock. Soon after their Arrival, I went with the Commodore to take a View of the Coast, and we agreed, at our Return, that the Port of St. Andro appeared to us to be the best Place to make a Descent, and it was settled that Sir Thomas Stanhope, with some of his Majesty's Ships, and the Transports with Stuart's and Grey's Battalions, and Marines on board, should make a Feint at Sauson, at the same time that we made a real Attack at St. Andro. Then it was too late in the Day to do more than give the necessary Orders for the Troops destined to land first, to be ready to embark, early in the Morning, in the flat bottomed Boats, that I might attempt a Landing as soon as the Ships had silenced a Gun Battery, which commanded the Entrance of the Bay: This was soon done by the Achilles, after she took her Station. No time was then lost to go in with the Boats with the Grenadiers and Regiments, ordered for this Service; but when we entered the Bay, we found the Enemy so strongly entrenched on each Side of the Hill, which was so excessively steep, and the Foot of it so steeply away, that it was impossible to get up to the Breast-work. After several unsuccessful Efforts, seeing it was impracticable to force the Enemy from their Lines, I thought it advisable to desist. Major-General Crauford, and Brigadier Carleton, exerted themselves as much as possible on the Occasion; the latter is wounded in the Thigh, but in a good way of doing well. The Loss we suffered in our Retreat is very inconsiderable, as the Fire of the Ships covered it. The Weather has been so bad ever since the 8th, that I have not been able to get Returns from the several Corps, so I cannot ascertain our Loss, but I believe near 500 Killed, Wounded, & Prisoners. I shall desire Mr. Keppel to go with me to reconnoitre the Island once more; and if we can discover any Part where an Attempt can be made with the least Probability of Success, we shall take a second Trial. I cannot help observing to you, that the whole Island is a Fortification, and that the little Nature had left undone to make it such, has been amply supplied by Art, the Enemy having been at Work upon it ever since Sir Edward Hawke appeared before it last Winter.

I have the Honour to inform you, the greatest Harmony has subsisted between the two Services; and I should not do Justice to the Commander and Officers of his Majesty's Fleet, if I did not at the same Time inform you, that they have assisted me to the utmost of my Willes, in carrying on the Operations, pursuant to his Majesty's Instructions. I have the Honour to be, &c.

Valiant, in the great Road of Belleisle, April 13, 1761.

SIR,

IHAD the Honour of writing to you the 29th of March, when I left Spithead; it was from that Time to the 6th Instant before the Wind came to the Westward, to enable the Fleet to steer in with the Coast of France; and that Evening I detached six Frigates, in Hopes they might in the Night get so stationed as to cut off the Enemy's Communication with the main Land. The next Morning the Fleet passed the South End of Belleisle, close along the Shore; and at one of the Bays by Point Lomaria, the General and myself thought a Descent might be tried, but as the Wind was southerly, it could not possibly be attempted at this Time. At 12 o'Clock the whole Fleet anchored in the great Road, when I immediately went with General Hodgson to the northern Part of the Island, to be as well informed of the Strength of the Enemy's Works there as the Time would admit; and while we were upon this necessary Service, the Ships of War in the Road were preparing the flat Boats for the Reception of the Troops; but by the Time we got back, it was too late in the Day to make any Trial.

The 8th, the Wind North-easterly, the Boats being ready for the Reception of the Troops, the Signal was made very early in the Morning, for them to assemble at the Rendezvous; and three Ships with two Bomb Vessels were ordered to proceed round the Point of Lomaria, at the S. E. Part of the Island, and attack the Fort and other Works in the Sandy-Bay, round the before-mentioned Point, the Place the General and myself had agreed to have attacked. Captain Barrington, in the Achilles, got placed first, and soon silenced the Fire from the Fort, and from the Shore; and then, as he was directed, made the Signal for his having done so, when the Troops in the Boats were pushed to the Landing with great Briskness and spirited Behaviour, at three different Places near each other, by Captain Baston, who I ordered to command the Boats; but the Difficulty of getting Footing, and the Enemy being strongly entrenched on the Heights, and in the little Fort, the Troops soon met with such a Repulse, that it became necessary, as well as prudent, to desist from the Attempt for the present, and retire with the flat Boats, in which they were well covered by the Ships and Bombs. One of the flat Boats landed sixty of Erskine's Grenadiers, who got up a very difficult Place to the Top of the Hills, where they formed with great Skill, but were so immediately routed by a much more numerous Body of the Enemy, that all Attempts to succour them was ineffectual, any further than the Boats bringing from the Rocks about twenty of them.

While all this was transacting, Sir Thomas Stanhope, with 4 Ships of War, the Battalion of Grey's and Stuart's, with 400 Marines in Transports, were opposite Sauson, and the northern Part of the Island: These Troops were embarked in the Boats, if possible to divert the Enemy from the principal Object.

A Gale of Wind coming on very quick after the retiring from the Shore, has occasioned so much Damage among the Transports, by Loss of Anchors and Flat Boats, that it takes up a very considerable Time to put Things in a way to attempt what further may be thought practicable. The Loss of Flat Boats in the Gale is 22, which will render the Force of Landing much inferior to what it was first attempted with.

While the repairing and adjusting of these Defects is in Hand, I hope some Spot may be agreed upon, where we may be more successful in the Attempt than we were on the 8th; but if not so, I hope his Majesty will believe I have had nothing more at Heart, than the exerting the Force entrusted to me, in a Manner most conducive to the Honour of his Arms. I have the Honour to be, &c.

May 2. They write from Portsmouth, that the Artificers there work with as great Diligence as at the Beginning of the War.

A great Embarkation of Infantry is shortly expected to be made for Germany, some Horse Transports having been lately fitted up off the Red-house, near Deptford, for Foot Forces.

Orders are given for Draughts to be immediately made out of the marching Regiments now in England, to complete the Battalions of the Guards which are at Home.

The Government has contracted for building several Frigates, from 30 to 36 Guns, in private Yards.

A French Privateer, of eight Carriage and four Swivel Guns, is taken by the Milford Man of War, and sent into Bristol. The said Privateer had taken the Edinburgh, from South-Carolina to Cowes, and a Vessel from Boston to Bilbao, with Fish.

By the last Accounts received from his Prussian Majesty's Head-Quarters at Meissen, the Troops were all quitting their Winter-Quarters, and going into those of Cantonment, in order to be ready to take the Field upon the first Notice.

Letters from Paderborn say, that it was expected the Allied Army and that of the French, would take the Field about the Middle of this Month, the Powers at War not seeming at present much inclined to agree to a Suspension of Arms.

Notwithstanding a magnificent Hotel is fitting up at Augsburg, for the holding of a Congress, and that Apartments are already taken for the Austrian, Russian, and French Plenipotentiaries; yet 'tis the general Opinion at the Hague, that it will be the Beginning of July before every Thing can be got ready for opening the Conference.

According to Letters from the Lower Silles, great Defection prevails amongst the Austrians.

St. JOHN'S (in Antigua) May 20.

Since our last his Majesty's Sloop *Guadalupe*, Captain Wilkies, arrived at English Harbour from a Cruise, in which, we are informed, she has taken the following Prizes, viz. A very large Sloop of 16 Guns, and 125 Men, bound from St. Eustatia to Martinique with Provisions, &c. a French Privateer of 8 Guns and 75 Men; a Dutch Schooner of 4 Guns; a Sugar loaded Ship bound from St. Eustatia to Europe; and has retaken a Ship from Boston.

A Fleet from Maryland, and another from this Port for *Guadalupe*, have lately been taken near the Island.

June 3. The *new Mary Ann*, from London for Bermuda, worth 10,000 l. Sterling, was taken by a Martinique Privateer of 12 Guns, commanded by Capt. Laragay, the 16th of May, in Lat. 23 North, Long. 50, 30: West, from London, after a long Chase of 30 Hours, great Part of the Time within Pistol shot. The Privateer had taken three Prizes before to the Northward of Bermuda, and was three Days before taking the *Mary Ann* in sight thereof. It is said many Privateers are already sailed from Martinique, and many yet to sail from thence, to cruise in the Lat. of Bermuda, and in the Coast of North America.

BASSE TERRE (in St. Christopher) May 2.

Yesterday Morning arrived a Schooner, laden with Coffee, bound to St. Eustatia from Martinique, taken by his Majesty's Ship *Griffin*, Thomas Taylor, Esq; Commander.

Yesterday in the Afternoon arrived a Schooner, laden with Peas, Beans, and Dry Goods, bound to Martinique from St. Eustatia, taken by his Majesty's Ship *Emerald*, Charles Middleton, Esq; Commander.

Capt. Middleton received his first Command on this Station the 10th Day of March, 1757, and between that Day and the 1st of May, 1761, he has taken 50 Prizes, 13 of which were Privateers, three Letters of Marque, 25 Merchant Vessels, and two English Privateers taken from the Enemy. Thirty-two of which Prizes he brought into the Road of Basseterre in St. Kitts.

On Saturday last was brought into the Road of Basseterre, by Capt. Joseph Small, Commander of the Sloop *Tyrrel*, a large French Brig, mounting 10 Guns, with 36 Men, taken off *Croco*, and laden with 111 Hogheads of best white Cape Sugar, 5000 lb. of Indigo (valued at about 6 or 700 l. Current) and some other Goods unknown.

May 16. Upon the 14th Instant arrived in the Road of Basseterre, a Schooner loaded with Provisions and Dry Goods, bound to Martinique from St. Eustatia, taken by his Majesty's Ship *Emerald*, Charles Middleton, Esq; Commander.

Yesterday arrived in the Road of Basseterre, a Sloop of 12 Guns and 42 Men, laden with Provisions and Dry Goods, bound to Martinique from St. Eustatia, taken by his Majesty's Ship *Griffin*, Thomas Taylor, Esq; Commander, and his Majesty's Ship *Antigua*, John Nutt, Esq; Commander.

May 20. Upon the 16th Instant arrived in the Road of Basseterre, a large French Sloop, mounted with six Guns, six Privateers, and 31 Men, and a Commission, bound to Bourdeaux from Martinique, laden with Sugar, Coffee, Cotton, and Cassia, and taken by his Majesty's Ship *Emerald's* Tender *Experiment*, commanded by Mr. William Lowe. The French fought the Tender three Quarters of an Hour, but struck as soon as Mr. Lowe got close, and they found he was going to board her.

June 3. Upon the 1st Instant his Majesty's Sloop *Antigua*, John N. P. Nutt, Esq; Commander, brought into the Road of Basseterre, a French Privateer Sloop of 12 Guns and 57 Men, belonging to Martinique, and commanded by Brun. The Privateer is loaded with Wine, Peas, and Dry Goods, and was bound to Martinique from Croco.

NEW-PORT, Rhode-Island, June 23.

Capt. Pierce, who left Holmes's Hole on Friday last, acquaints us, That a Whaling Sloop, belonging to Nantucket, arrived the Evening preceding at the same Place. She was taken in Lat. 39, between this Port and the Capes of Delaware, by a French Privateer Sloop, mounting 14 Guns. The above Privateer had before taken another Whaler, which they burnt. After detaining all the Indians belonging to both Vessels, and informing, that there were four other French Privateers on the Coast (one of which was commanded by Mons. Chateau) they permitted the others to return in the above Vessel.

NEW-YORK, June 25.

By Captain Deverton from London, we hear, that the Mail for New-York, was designed to be sent down to Falmouth, about the 25th of April.

Last Night Capt. M'Affee arrived here in 21 Days from Jamaica, by whom we hear that the Cork Fleet, consisting of upwards of 20 Sail, bound to the West-Indies, under Convoy of an English Frigate, had been met with by a French 4 Gun Ship, who took sixteen of them: And as the Convoy was unable to cope with the Frenchman, he made the best of his Way to Jamaica, and informed Admiral Holmes, who thereupon immediately made Sail, in Hopes to meet some of them on the Coast of Cape Francois.

June 29. Since the Caution given in this Gazette of the 8th Instant, about the New-Jersey SIX POUND Bills, dated April 10, 1759; and That in our last Monday's, about Ten Pound Bills passing amongst us; there have been discovered false Jersey Bills of other Denominations, bearing different Dates, viz.

Twelve Shilling Bills made out of One Shilling ditto, dated April 12, 1760.

Three Pound Bills made out of Three Shilling ditto, dated June 14, 1757; and it is thought there are Numbers of the like dispersed abroad.

The New-York false Ten Pound Bills, also appear to be of various Dates; and are all altered after the same Manner as described in our last, by having

ing the proper Words, Figures and Devices erased out, and others passed on in Lieu thereof: The same has been done on both Sides, with Regard to the Jersey Bills.

Some of the New-York Bills, that are rendered false, are printed on thin, others on thick, Paper:—To discover those of the First, hold it against the Light, when the Fallhood will appear very perceptible; To discover those of the latter, bend the Bill back direct across the Word TEN, and the Letters will instantly scale off more or less at Top and Bottom; as will also all the other Alterations.—The like is to be observed with the Jersey Bills.

It appears that there has been 5 or 6 Men concerned in this very base and villainous Affair:—Three of whom were committed on Tuesday last to Goal, on Suspicion of altering and uttering the Bills, viz. Achelles Lewis, (Tavern-keeper, near the White-hall,) who made a very large Confession of the Fact soon after he was detected in uttering them,—Ichabod Higgins, and Richard Cooley.—On the Confession of Lewis, one John Higgins, Brother to Ichabod, appeared to be concerned, and that he was gone towards Philadelphia: Warrants being immediately issued, he was apprehended on Wednesday last, on his Return to New-York, between Bordentown and Amboy Ferry; carried to Amboy Goal, fetter'd there for a Night, and was brought hand-cuff'd last Friday to this City, is now lodged separate from his Accomplices in the New Goal, and there is no doubt made but that they will meet with the Reward due to their Demerits.

It is said that John Higgins, when taken, had a large Sum of Half Johannes's about him, which he had gathered by changing the false Money thro' the Jerseys and Pennsylvania.

PHILADELPHIA, July 2.

We have Advice from Antigua, that the Men of War and Transports, which sailed lately from New-York, are arrived at Guadalupe; and that before they got there, Commodore Douglas had taken some Mortars on board, but what designed for, not known.

From Martinico we learn, that some Time ago a 74 Gun Ship, and 3 Frigates, got in there from Old France, and brought with them a Supply of Men (the Number not known, but supposed to be about 3000) Cannon, and all Sorts of Military Stores: That they expected to be attacked by the English, and were making all the necessary Preparations to receive them, by building additional Forts, &c. That they had Provisions of all Kinds in great Plenty: And that they had about 70 Privateers at Sea, some of which were daily sending in Prizes.

The following Captains were taken, and carried into Martinico, from the 20th of March to the 15th of May last, viz.

From Piscataqua. Captains Pickering, Rust, Meserve, Sherburn, Purcell, Meade, Clarke, Warner, Hixon, Baker, and Seaward.

From the same Port. Captain Langdon taken, but cast away on Barbuda; and Captains Warner and Martin taken, but retaken.

From Boston. Captains Hayes, Foard, Gillespie and Simpson. (Gillespie retaken.)

From Virginia. Captains White and Bruce.

From Maryland. Captains Hewit and Banning.

From Philadelphia. Captains Hardcastle, Long and Hyghu. (Hardcastle retaken.)

From the Coast of Guiney. Captains Nicholls and Hoggon.

From Liverpool. Captain Worrell, in a Ship, and two Sloops.

From Whitehaven. Captain Prince.

From Bristol. Captain Shorbridge.

From Cork. Captains Roach, Harper and Blake; and a Snow, Name unknown.

From Antigua. Captain Tanner.

A Schooner taken near Guadalupe.

The Gentleman, from whom we had the above List, says, there were a great many more taken, but could not get their Names: And that there were above 300 English Prisoners in Martinico, when he left it; most of whom very sickly, owing chiefly to the bad Usage they met with, and want of proper Assistance when taken ill.

Tuesday last Captain Clarke arrived here from St. Christopher. In Lat. 36, he saw a new Brig taken by a Privateer Sloop of 10 or 12 Guns; the Brig failed with Captain Clarke, and thought to be designed for Virginia.

The same Day arrived here, Passenger with Captain Henderson, from Fyall, Captain Sneed, of this Port, who, off of that Place, on his Passage up the Streights, was taken by a French Privateer

ANNAPOLIS, July 9.

The General Assembly of this Province, which stood Prorogued to the 3d Day of August, is further Prorogued to the 3d Day of October next.

Some Days ago, the Body of a young Lad about 15 Years of Age, was found in the Crotch of a Tree in Queen-Anne's County: It is supposed, that as he was getting some Arrows, he fell, and was catch'd in the Crotch of the Tree between the Head and Shoulders, where he Perish'd, his Body being much Eaten by the Turkey-Buzzards before he was found.

The Ship —, Capt. Johnson, one of the Fleet, is safe arrived in Patowmack.

With Capt. Johnson, came Passenger, George PLATER, Esq; of St. Mary's County.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in New-Province, to one now in this Province, dated June 11, 1761.

"I will not longer delay the Pleasure of letting you know, we had an Alarm by Six this Morning, which was occasioned by Capt. Benjamin Cuffey, in the Snow General Shirley, with a York Sloop, with 90 Hogheads of Sugar; Capt. Groundell, in a Ship of 350 Hogheads; and a Schooner with 160 Ditto. The Ship mounts 16 Nine Pounders, 12 Swivels, and 55 Men, but struck on Firing one Broadside, tho' seem'd determined to fight on being hailed."

His Excellency Governor SHARPE, has been desired by WILLIAM NORTON, Esq; Captain and Commander of his Majesty's Ship ASSISTANCE, to give the Public Notice in this Gazette, That he will be ready in Hampton-Road, to grant the Benefit of his Convoy, to all such Ships as shall be bound to Europe, and join him there on or before the 20th of September next; on which Day, Wind and Weather permitting, he will certainly sail. [Our Fleet last Year wanted assistance, as they were almost all taken by the Enemy.]

H A G U E, April 10.

THEY write from Cologne of the 6th Instant, that Count Konigsfegg, Great Dean of the Chapter, was unanimously chosen Elector of Cologne that Morning.

Berlin, April 7. The Elbe has risen six Inches higher than in 1736, and overflowed Pretsch, Torgau, Wittemberg, and Meissen: Three Streets in the last mentioned Town, and one of its Suburbs, are intirely under Water. Two Bridges in the Mulda, near Wurtzen, are broken by the Torrent. The Desolation of the Country cannot be expressed.

Hannau, April 10. According to the last Letters from Cassel, that Capital has suffered considerably by the late Siege. The magnificent Inclosure near the Gate of Moulin, and that of Anneberg, are intirely ruined; and in the City there are several streets and Quarters, where a single House is scarcely to be found that has not been damaged by the Cannon or the Bombs.

L O N D O N.

Extrait of a Letter from Frankfurt on the Oder, March 30.

"We have been so often amused with Rumours of Peace, that we are now cautious how we give Credit even to the strongest Appearances of it. The Convention, which you no doubt have heard of, is religiously observed, and both Russians and Prussians live in perfect Amity, and seem to forget that they were so lately cutting each others Throats; but whatever the Soldiers may do, the poor Inhabitants of Pomerania will long remember the Russian Visit; Families, who, from easy Circumstances, are reduced to Beggary; Fathers and Husbands butchered by the inhuman Cossacks; Infants sacrificed to their brutal Lust; Houses plundered, and the little Money found in them carried away, and their valuable Moveables sold to the best Bidder; Corn trodden under Foot, or when green, as Provender for their Horses; and some of the Calamities which that unhappy Country groans under, and which a Peace of 20 years will hardly remove. The misfortunes of a Country have indeed been alleviated by charitable Contributions from abroad, particularly from England; that generous and humane People, tho' hardly sensible of the Horrors of War, as to themselves, have a tender Feeling for the Misery of their Fellow-Creatures; and a Remittance from thence of between 4 and 500 l. Sterling, having lately sailed thro' Hamburg for that Purpose.—Could we see this horrid Picture with their own Eyes, there is no doubt but, remembering the Divine Precept of loving their Neighbours as themselves, they would quickly be induced to sheath the sword."

The following Declaration, in the Name, and on the Part of her Majesty the Empress Apostolic Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, was made and signed at Paris the 26th of March 1761, by her Minister at that Court, the Count of Stahrenberg, and was delivered at London the 31st of March, by Prince Galitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of all the Russias.

THE Dispositions for Peace, very agreeable to the sentiments of all the Parties engaged in the War, which the Kings of England and Prussia threw last Year, having met with Difficulties, that prevented their Success, the Courts of Vienna, Petersburg, France, Stockholm, and Warsaw, are unanimously agreed to invite those of London and Berlin to resume a Negotiation so salutary for the Happiness of the World, and which must interest the Humanity of all the Powers at War.

In this View, and in order to their being able to proceed to the Re-establishment of Peace, they propose the assembling of a Congress, to which

they think it may be proper to admit only the Plenipotentiaries of the principal belligerent Parties, with those of their Allies. If the Kings of England and Prussia adopt this Method, her Majesty the Empress Queen, the Empress of Russia, the Most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, propose the City of Augsbourg for the Place of a Congress, observing, that their Majesties point out Augsbourg no otherwise than as a Town within Distance of all the Parties concerned, which, from its Situation, appears to suit with the Convenience of all the States; and that they will not reject the Choice of another City in Germany, if their Britannic and Prussian Majesties may deem it more convenient.

The Empress Queen, the Empress of Russia, the Most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, declare, moreover, that they have chosen the Plenipotentiaries, who will be intrusted with the Care of their Interests at the Congress, in Hopes that the King of England, the King of Prussia, and their Allies, will, on their Part, speedily make Choice of their respective Ministers, that the Negotiation may not be deferred.

The Simplicity of this Declaration, which, for the general Welfare, the Courts of Vienna, Petersburg, France, Stockholm and Warsaw, have determined to make to the Courts of London and Berlin, gives them Hopes, that their Britannic and Prussian Majesties will be pleased, by a speedy Answer, to make their Sentiments known, upon an Object so essential to the Repose and Happiness of Europe.

Done at Paris, the 26th of March, 1761, by Order, and in the Name, of her Imperial, Royal, and Apostolic Majesty.

C O U N T S T A H R E M B E R G.

N. B. A like Declaration with this, in the Name, and on the Part of their Majesties the Empress of all the Russias, the Most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, has been made and signed on the same Day as this; to wit, That of the Empress of Russia, by Prince D. P. Galitzin; that of the Most Christian King, by the Duc de Choiseul; that of the King of Sweden, by the Baron de Cresser; and that of the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, by M. de Fontenay: And they were all delivered at London at the same Time, that is to say, on the 31st of March, by Pr. Galitzin.

The following Counter-Declaration was signed at London the 3d of April Instant, and was delivered on the same Day to Prince Galitzin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Empress of all the Russias, to be transmitted by him to Paris.

THE Dispositions of their Britannic and Prussian Majesties for the Re-establishment of the general Tranquility of Europe, having been steady and sincere, could not have undergone any Alteration through the Space of Time which has elapsed since their Declaration of the 25th of November, 1759.

Their Majesties therefore, with Satisfaction, accept the offer of the assembling of a Congress at Augsbourg, contained in the five Declarations made at Paris the 26th of March last, and delivered at London the 31st of the same Month, in the Name, and on the Part of their Majesties, the Empress Queen, the Empress of all the Russias, the most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony.

The Courts of London and Berlin equally acquiesce in the Clause of this Declaration, which relates to the Rule that is proposed to be laid down, in regard to the Admission of the Plenipotentiaries, who shall have a Right to be received at this Congress.

For the Rest, as their Zeal for the Advancement of the salutary Work of a general Pacification, perfectly corresponds with that which appears to

animate the Courts of Vienna, Petersburg, Versailles, Stockholm and Warsaw, their Britannic and Prussian Majesties will not delay to name instantly their Plenipotentiaries, being disposed to concur, with one and the same Pace, in every Thing that may accelerate the Opening of the Congress, which has been offered to them.

In the Name, and by Order of the King, London, April 3, 1761.

B U T E.

N. B. The same Counter-Declaration as this, for the Empress of Russia, the Most Christian King, the King of Sweden, and the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, was made and signed the same Day as this; and they were all delivered at the same Time to Prince Galitzin, to be transmitted by him to Paris.

A Letter from a Gentleman on board the Lennox, off Fort St. David's, dated the 26th of May, says, "After a Passage of seven Months, we were obliged to stay upon the Coromandel Coast during the Time of the Monsoons, a Thing so dangerous, that Ships seldom attempt it, and the Shalldbury, by which this comes, is the first Ship that has been upon the Coast bound for England, during which Time Mr. Cornish having the Command, was not idle; for he sent the Marines, and what Seamen he could spare, on Shore, took Karikal, a Place mounting 135 Pieces of Cannon; from thence he went and took Chillingburg, a small Place, but of great Consequence to the French; by which, and burning the Haerlem, a French 64 Gun Ship, in Pondicherry Road, he has gained great Honour."

"The only News I have to tell you is, that Part of our Squadron have blocked up, in Pondicherry Road, a 36 Gun Frigate, two Indiamen, and two Country Ships, which we shall attempt burning in a few Days, Fireships being ready for that Purpose; and that Colonel Coote is making all Expedition to begin the Siege of Pondicherry, being in the Possession of all the Country round; and our Fleet, consisting of eleven Sail, in Sight of the Place, it must inevitably fall, unless their Fleet, of which there is little Danger, should relieve it."

The Ocean Man of War, launched the 21st Instant at Chatham, is look'd upon as one of the best built Ships in the Navy; she has a Figure Head, representing Old Ocean, the God of the Seas and Rivers, with an Urn in his Hands, out of which he is pouring the Rivers into the Sea, attended by young Neptune, Nereids, Tritons, &c. most beautifully carved, painted, and finished in a masterly Manner.

The following is an exact Account of the Articles consumed at Dinner only, by the Voters of a small Borough on the Day of Electing their Members, independent of Veal, Mutton, Poultry, &c. and a preparatory Breakfast, which last alone amounted to 750 l. Consumption at Dinner, 980 Stone of Beef, 315 Dozen of Wine, and 72 Pipes of Ale, and 365 Gallons of Spirits converted into Punch.

Some large Transports, supposed for the East-Indies, are coming out of Dock, and are to be fitted for Sea with all Expedition.

Letters from Leghorn of the 21st ult. advise, That by a Ragusan Ship from Tripoli they had an Account, that two Polaccas of 18 Guns each, a Frigate of 22 Guns, a Tartan of 6 Guns and two Xebecs of 18 and 8 Guns, sailed from that Port to cruise against the Christians.

By the Dutch Mail, which arrived this Morning, we are informed, that the Prussians are every where in Motion; and that their Troops had gained several small Advantages over the Austrians, in Saxony.

April 6. Saturday Morning at eight o'Clock, Theodore Gardelle, convicted for the Murder of the late Mrs. King, of Leicester-Fields, being in the Chapel of Newgate, after Prayers made an ample Confession of his Guilt, and the shocking Manner

Manner of perpetrating it: He seemed very penitent and regretful; and notwithstanding his former Vow, that he should meet Death without Terror, on his Irons being taken off he seemed greatly daunted, and changed Countenance, talked a good deal to his Friends in his Mother Tongue (speaking little of the English) and seemed most affected with the Thoughts of being hanged in Chains; for it is said he flattered himself that his Body, after Inflection, through Interest, would have been buried. Upon his getting into the Cart, some of the People forgot their Christian Profession, some by hallowing, and others by lifting the miserable guilty Wretch, which he seemed to despise. He was carried in a Cart down the Old Bailey, through Fleet-Street, and the Strand, to Leicester Square, opposite the House where he committed the Murder, there it stopt for two or three Minutes, and the Prisoner just looked up at the Building, the Mob thereupon gave a shout and Huzza of Contempt; after which they proceeded to the Gallows erected in the Haymarket, when the Prisoner helped to fix the Knot; and drew it tight; then the Ordinary prayed with him for near an Hour, during which he trembled greatly; about Ten he was turn'd off, and when dead was hung in Chains on Finchley Common.

BOSTON, June 29.

We learn from New-London, that a Letter is transmitted there from Cape-François, which gives an Account, that about the Middle of May, a French 74 Gun Ship had taken an English Frigate, and 8 or 10 Merchantmen, off the Bite of Leoganne. They were bound from England to Jamaica.

NEW-YORK, July 2.

Captain Lyell, from Fyal, informs us, That about the 23d of April they had a Shock of an Earthquake at those Islands, in which a Vulcano in the Island-Tercera broke out with a fiery Eruption, from whence issued a Stream or River of burning Matter, which ran, in about 20 Days, upwards of a Mile, overturning and destroying every Thing in its Way, to the utter Ruin of several valuable Plantations.

He also acquaints us, that a new Providence, or Commercial Judge of these Islands, had lately arrived at Fyal from Lisbon, who takes every Method possible to distress the English; and if a Vessel only happens to touch there, upon any Account whatsoever, he compels them to unload, and to pay the King's Duties; and if they do not dispose of their Cargo, he compels them to pay a farther Duty for the Privilege of taking their own Goods on board again.

July 6. Tuesday Evening last, Capt. Bassett arrived here from Jamaica, in 21 Days, and says, that a Vessel arrived at St. Lucia in said Island, in a short Passage from Gibraltar, the 8th of June, and reported, that a Fleet from England for Gibraltar, with their Convoy, a Ship of 20 Guns, were all lately taken by some French Men of War in the Channel; and that it was currently reported at Gibraltar, that three or four French Men of War had lately been taken in the Mediterranean, by the English Fleet on that Station.

Last Monday off Sandy-Hook, Captain Bassett was chased by a Ship, which he imagined wanted to speak with him, but as soon as a Pilot stood out to meet her, she tacked and put out to Sea directly. Next Day the same Ship appeared off the Hook, and gave Chase to the Ship Grace, Captain Chambers, and Capt. Sheldon, both outward bound.

The same Ship was again seen off the Hook on Wednesday, and 'tis supposed is an Enemy.

Friday Evening last, Samuel Hindshaw, late Master of the Brig Columbine, of this Port, came to Town from Rhode-Island, in Company with Captain Messenger, late of a Ship belonging to London, and from the former we have the following Account, viz. That he sailed from New-Providence the 6th of June last, and on the 16th of the same Month, in Lat. 37, and Lon. 74, in 25 Fathom Water, was taken by a French Privateer Sloop of 16 Guns, and 120 Men, from Martinico, Monsieur Duett, Commander; that on the 14th (two Days before Capt Hindshaw was taken) they took Captain Messenger, above-mentioned, in a Ship from the Isle of Man, for Virginia, of 10 Guns and 15 Men, after an Engagement of an Hour, in which several Frenchmen were killed, and Capt. Messenger slightly, and his Mate mortally wounded; that the latter was taken on board the Privateer, for the Benefit of a Doctor, and after they had put Capt. Messenger's Guns on board Capt. Hindshaw's Brig, and fitted her out

as a Tender, they sunk the Ship, with all her Cargo (Salt) on board; that they afterwards took a Whaler, which the Captain ransomed for 400 Dollars, took all the English Prisoners on board, and with them arrived safe at Rhode-Island. When Capt. Hindshaw left the Privateer, she was in Chase of six Sail, steering S. S. E.

A few Days before the Privateer took the above-mentioned Vessels, she fell in with a Letter of Marque Brig from the Continent, that engaged her for several Hours, killed five of her Men, wounded many of her Officers, and got clear off.

Whilst Captain Hindshaw was on board the Privateer, he learnt that there were two other Privateers from Martinico, supposed to be on the Coast by this Time.

PHILADELPHIA, July 9.

A Captain of a Vessel arrived at New-York from St. Croix, reports, That when Lord Rollo appeared off of Dominico (one of the Neutral Islands) the Commandant came on board, to know what Terms he would give him; but that soon after a Message was sent from the Merchants, and other Inhabitants, acquainting him, they would agree to none; upon which his Lordship detained the Commandant, made good his Landing, with the Loss of only seven Men, and obliged the Fort to surrender.

Yesterday a Sloop arrived here from Quebec, out above five Weeks—No Men of War had got up when this Vessel sailed.—The Garrison very healthy.

ANNAPOLIS, July 16.

The Ship *Wifon*, Captain *Johnson*, with whom went Passenger the Hon. DANIEL DULANY, Esq; for London, was met in the Bay below the Mouth of Rappahannock on Tuesday last.

One Day last Week, as Mrs. *Hearn*, who liv'd in Worcester County, was standing near the Chimney of her House, in the Time of a Thunder Gust, making Punch for some Reapers, a Flash of Lightning came down the Chimney and struck her instantaneously Dead.

Last Wednesday the Ship *Fishbourne*, Captain *Ethringen*, lying in Patuxent, was struck with Lightning. The Main-top gallant Mast was tore to Pieces, the Main-top Mast meck Split, and the Mainmast wounded in 6 or 8 Places, and three of the Men stunn'd, but they soon recovered.

It grows very much like the Ginseng, inasmuch that I have often mistook the one for the other. What is commonly known by the Name of Sassa-parilla down here, is a Creeper, grows in low Grounds, has a bitter Taste, and no way a-kin to the true Sassa-parilla.

B R E S T, April 14.

WE are no longer in Fear for Marti-
nico. A certain Power, to whom
the King has promised at the Peace
Liberty of Commerce on the Coast
of that Island, has engaged to
introduce 3000 Men, with Provision and Ammu-
nition, for its Defence.

L O N D O N, May 2.

It is said the French are so willing to see an End
put to the War, that if the Empress Queen refuses
to concur in some advantageous Proposals which the
Court of France proposes soon to make to England,
they will agree to a separate Peace, allowing us full
Liberty to assist the King of Prussia in whatever
Manner we shall think proper.

May 6. Yesterday an Express arrived from Bel-
leisle, and we hear has brought Advice, that the
landed Troops had been five Days in great Want
of Provisions, occasioned by hard Gales at South-
west, that prevented their being supplied from the
Fleet; but when the Express set sail, all Things
were in a good Way, and our Batteries were soon
to begin to play on the Citadel of Palais, where
the French, to the Number of 3500 Men, were,
and have Plenty of Provisions and Ammunition,
and it was thought would make a very vigorous
Defence.

Our Court, it is said, are so fully satisfied of the
great Utility of our being Masters of Belleisle, that
the second Expedition now fitting out is ordered
either with a Reinforcement of five or six com-
plete Regiments, and some Battalions.

The *Isis*, Capt. Wheeler, has taken and carried
into Gibraltar the *Orislamme*, of 50 Guns, and
400 Men: In the Action Capt. Wheeler was killed.

The Truth of the Affair at Belleisle, as far as it
relates to Capt. Osborne, is, that that Gentleman,
with 70 of Erskine's Grenadiers, got upon a Rock,
and defended themselves against 400 French till
they were reduced to 19 and their Captain. After
they had laid down their Arms, a French Captain
came up and killed our brave English Officer,
which a Grenadier observing, told him he was a
Scoundrel, and then laying him dead on the Spot,
jumped down the Rock, and got safe on board.

By a private Letter from Belleisle we are inform-
ed, that our Troops had marched seven Miles from
the Place of Landing, without Opposition, when
Gen. Hodgson's Dispatches were sent away; the
Number of the French Troops on the Island were
judged to be about 5000, all of whom, with the
Inhabitants, had retired with their Effects into the
only fortified Town; and that as soon as our heavy
Cannon should come up, our Forces would imme-
diately besiege the Place in Form.

The Dutch Papers by Monday's Mail say, that
a Cessation of Arms betwixt the Allied and French
Armies was to commence the first of May for six
Months.

It is assured, that it has been unanimously
agreed, that a Suspension of Arms should not take
Place, to prevent any Chicanery in any of the
Courts concerned in the present War.

Upwards of 20,000 Ounces of Plate is ordered
to be got ready for the Plenipotentiaries that are to
go to the Congress.

The Surrender of Guadaloupe, or any of our
Acquisitions on the Continent of America, is ab-
solutely denied.

It is also said, that one Article will be (should
the present Treaty take Place) that Ostend and
Burgos shall be ceded to the Crown of France.

A Letter from Augsbourg, dated the 23d ult. says,
"The Ambassadors of the Seven Crowns, which
are to form the approaching Congress, will arrive
here between the 1st and 7th of July."

It is said the French Court have proposed to sur-
render up the Island of Minorca, in Lieu of Sene-
gal and Goree; but this, it is said, occasions some
Objections.

A Letter from Paris, dated April 21, says,
"The Exploits of M. Broglio, and the Reception
the British Fleet met with at Belleisle, from M. de
St. Croix, seem to have revived the Spirits of the
Nation, and make it forget the Distress to which it
was reduced by the War. We forget the Congress,
and the Suspension of Arms, which a Week ago
was looked upon as a Point settled with the Court
of London; and talk of nothing but the Laurels
which M. Broglio is to reap, by making a Con-
quest of Hanover, which hath been resolved on
in Council. It is to facilitate the Execution of
this Project, and to oblige the Enemy to evacuate
the Bishoprics of Munster, Hildesheim, &c. that
M. de Soubise is gone to Frankfort to confer with
M. Broglio. They propose to reduce Prince Fer-
dinand to the Condition in which the Duke of
Cumberland found himself, when he signed the
Convention of Closterseven. Mean while the News
which the Court has just received, may possibly
retard the Execution of these Plans. M. de Cas-
tillas, Governor of Wesel, has dispatched an Ex-
press with the melancholy News that our famous
Magazine in that Place had taken Fire, and was
intirely consumed, with upwards of 1250,000 Ra-
tions of Hay. The Loss is computed at Two Mil-
lions of Livres. Thirty three Soldiers perished in
the Flames, and when the Post left Wesel, the
Danger was not over; and it was feared the Flames
would reach another Magazine above the Town.
As we depended on this Magazine for the Subsist-
ence of Soubise's Troops, that Army will not act
so soon as was expected.

Letters from Saxony say, that after the Prussians
had defeated the Austrians near Egra, they pene-
trated thro' that Pass into Bohemia.

Part of the Baggage and Equipages of the Earl
of Egremont, and the Hon. General Yorke, ap-
pointed by his Majesty Plenipotentiaries at the en-
suing Congress, are embarked on board one of the
King's Yachts.

It is said that the Expence of the Plenipotenti-
aries for the several Powers at the last Congress at
Aix-la-Chapelle, amounted to 1,000,000 of
Pounds Sterling.

A Commander of a Ship in Town, who was
taken and carried to Denain, says, when he left
that Place, it was currently reported, that the En-
glish must in less than 24 Hours be in Possession of
Belleisle; and that never had hotter firing been
heard than for 48 Hours.

May 7. There is Advice that a large Magazine,
established by the French at Wesel, valued at
120,000 l. accidentally took Fire, and was entire-
ly destroyed.

By the Dutch Mails which arrived this Day, we
learn, that neither the Prussians nor the Austrians
have as yet done any Thing worth mentioning in
Saxony: That it was thought the King would open
the Campaign with the Siege of Dresden: And
that M. Daun had received an Express from the
Empress Queen, to acquaint him, "That, moved
with Compassion for the Sufferings of Germany,
she had consented to the holding of a Congress at
Augsbourg; but that he was, nevertheless, to fol-
low the Plan settled at Vienna, and to endeavour
to terminate a War so prejudicial to her People by
some important Enterprise."

It is said that the Fishery on the Banks of New-
foundland, last Year, when the French were ex-
cluded, produced to Great-Britain, 14,000 l. Ster-
ling.

The *Orislamme*, of 50 Guns, taken by his Ma-
jesty's Ship *Isis*, sailed from Toulon, and had nar-
rowly escaped this War, being twice taken; the
first Time when under the Command of Monf. Du
Quense, when that Commander was defeated by
Admiral Osborne, and afterwards in the Squadron
belonging to De la Clue, vanquished by Admiral
Boscawen. She is said to have a considerable
Quantity of Money on board, for the Use of the
French Colonies. There were near 50 killed and

wounded on board the French Ship, and only three
on board the *Isis*, by the unfortunate Shot that
proved the Death of Capt. Wheeler. The *Isis*
mounted only 44 Guns, at the taking of the *Ori-
flamme*.

His Majesty's Ship *Tamer*, Captain Lee, is ar-
rived at Portsmouth from New-York; she came
out the 6th of April.

The Report of one of our Men of War, be-
longing to the Expedition Fleet, being stranded
near Belleisle, by running too near Shore, is
groundless.

The Prince Frederick Packet-boat, Captain
Copeland, from Falmouth to Lisbon, was drove
ashore near Vigo, by a French Man of War of 64
Guns, and beat to Pieces. The Crew were saved,
as also the Mail.

There are three of his Majesty's Yachts now fit-
ted, or fitting up at Deptford, for the Use of his
Majesty's Ministers appointed to attend the in-
tended Congress, at the Imperial City of Augs-
bourg, to settle the Preliminary Articles for settling
a general Peace.

Yesterday Morning a Match of 100 Guineas was
rode for on the Essex Road from Colchester to
Whitechapel, being 51 Miles, by two Gentlemen
of Acton, Middlesex. One of the Gentlemen
rode a sized Mare, which performed it in three
Hours and two Minutes; the other rode a Powney,
which performed it in three Hours and twelve Mi-
nutes. The Powney, it was thought, was beat
through the Unskillfulness of the Rider. The first
20 Miles was performed in an Hour and three Mi-
nutes, and there was not a Horse Length Diffe-
rence until they came within eight Miles of White-
chapel.

The French King has written a Letter to the
Archbishop of Paris, desiring him to order *Te De-
um* to be sung in all the Churches of his Diocese
for the Advantages gained by his Army under Mar-
shal Broglio, which Letter concludes thus: "It is
to the God of Armies we are to return Thanks
for the Advantages he has deigned to dispense to
us. Let us join thereto the most fervent Prayers,
that he may touch the Hearts of our Enemies
with the Calamities occasioned by the Scourge
of War, and dispose them to listen to Proposi-
tions of Peace; wherein I shall be ever ready to
acquiesce, for the Good of Mankind, and of
the People whom I govern. In writing this
Letter, my Intention is that you cause *Te Deum*,
&c." At Versailles the 3d of April, 1761.

By a Letter from Cadiz we have Advice that the
Lady of Assumption, bound from thence to Ma-
jorca, met with an Algerine Corsair; which, after
an obstinate Engagement of three Hours and a
Half, blew up; the Spaniards took up only ten
Men and three Boys, whom they made Prisoners.
This Corsair was commanded by Alonso Mendoza,
a Portuguese Renegade, who was killed the second
Broadside; the Ship mounted ten Carriage Guns,
and had 80 Men. They had taken two Portu-
guese and one Spanish Vessel the Day before. The
Lady of Assumption mounted only six Nine-Poun-
ders, with 30 Men and two Boys. The Spaniards
had five Men killed, and eight wounded.

They write from Cologne that two Impostors
lately came to that City, who gave out that they
were each 700 Years old; they say they came
from Damascus, from whence they passed through
Cracovia, and from thence thither. They are
barefoot, badly clothed, and live on Bread and
Water only; they fortell nothing but ill News,
Wars, Inundations, and Conflagrations, and that
the World will have an End in 1773; they talk
Latin, Greek, Hebrew and Chaldean; they were
at first imprisoned, and the common People report-
ed they had broke their Chains. They have been
banished that City and its Territories, and are now
shaping their Way towards Rome.

The King of Denmark is endeavouring to promote the exclusive Sale of Tobacco, manufactured in his own Kingdom, by assigning very large Premiums to Mr. Borre, who is at the Head of this Project, as well as to the several Dealers who shall vend it. Counsellor Godsfeld also, the first who formed the Scheme, has had a Pension of 1000 Crowns a Year settled on him during Life. Thus are the Danes endeavouring to vie with us in one of the most valuable Branches of Commerce; and from the Measures taken by his Majesty to encourage every Thing that can be produced in his own Kingdoms, of which the late Edict against importing Aquafortis is a singular Instance, we may soon expect to see them shine as a trading Power.

BOSTON, July 6.

Notwithstanding a Paragraph in the London Prints, of April 30, which says, "That by Authority we can assure the Public that Belleisle is taken, &c." yet a Print of the 7th of May says, "Our last Advices from our Forces at Belleisle, which arrived here on Tuesday last, are, That the English Troops had landed most of their Artillery. — That the French, to the Number of 3500 Men, were retired to the Citadel, where they have Plenty of Provisions and Ammunition, and 'twas thought they would make a vigorous Defence. — On receiving this Intelligence, two Battalions were immediately ordered to embark forthwith, in order to reinforce the Army at Belleisle. — Several Officers of Distinction have already been slain at Belleisle, among whom are Sir William Peere, Major M'Therson, Major Percell, Captain O'Harne, &c. Sir William was shot dead by a Musket Ball, as he was reconnoitring too near the Citadel. The Report of Lord Pulney being killed, is entirely groundless.

Notwithstanding a Congress is appointed to be held in a short Time at Augsborg, by the Belligerent Powers at War, for settling a general Peace, a very large Fleet is fitting out at Portsmouth, and the greatest Preparations making to continue the War the ensuing Summer with the greatest Vigour.

Captain Folger left Portsmouth in Company with three Mast-ships for Piscataqua, and 8 or 10 other Vessels for different Parts, under Convoy of the Chelmsfield Man of War, who was to proceed with the Mast-ships to Piscataqua. Captain Folger informs, that there had been no Advices from Belleisle for near a Fortnight before he sailed, occasioned by the long Run of Northerly Winds, but that it was not doubted the whole Island was in our Possession. That the Packet for New-York was to sail about the Middle of May; and that Capt. Diamond, in a Ship for this Place, was to sail in about three Weeks after him.

By Captain Bennett, who was taken on his Passage from the West-Indies for this Place, and carried into Cape François, and who came to Town last Saturday, we learn, that a Vessel was arrived at the Cape from Bourdeaux, which she left the 8th of May, and gave an Account that the whole Island of Belleisle was in the Possession of the English.

NEW-YORK, July 9.

Monday last arrived at the Hook his Majesty's Ship Assistance, of 50 Guns, William Norton, Esq; Commander. She sailed from Spithead the latter End of April, as Convoy to the Virginia and Maryland Fleets, and having seen them safe into the Capes, she proceeded to Sandy-Hook. We hear she has brought upwards of 30,000 Pounds Sterling, being Part of the Parliamentary Grant for the Use of these Northern Colonies. It is said 25,000*l.* of it is for this Government.

Captain Whitmarsh, of the Sloop Endeavour, who arrived here last Tuesday from Cape-Fear, informs us, that several Vessels came in there just before he sailed, with Advice, that four Sail of Privateers, viz. a Brig, two Sloops, and a Schooner, had been seen cruising between the Capes of Virginia and Delaware, and had taken several Vessels in their Sight, some of which were from England; and that those Vessels who brought the News (being Whalemens) narrowly escaped being taken.

We have Advice from several Parts of East-New-Jersey, that the late hot Weather had much blasted many Fields of Wheat, to the great Disappointment of the poor Farmers Hopes.

We hear that on Monday last a Man and a Woman in this City, expired with the violent Heat of the Weather.

By Captain M'Dougall, who arrived here on Monday last in 30 Days from Santa Croix, we hear, that Commodore Douglas had attacked and taken the Island of DOMINICA, possessed chiefly by Indians mixed with French: That there was Advice at Santa Croix, that one of the Transport

Ships that sailed from this Port the 2d of May last, with a Party of the Royal Welch Volunteers on board, supposed to be bound for Guadaloupe, was taken by a French Privateer, and carried into Martinico: And that another of those Transports had been boarded by a French Privateer, who had been obliged to steer off, and leave most of her Men behind, who were all cut off, but with the Loss of an English Officer, and one other Man in the Fray.

Sunday last came in here a Sloop, late Captain belonging to Virginia, which had been taken by a French Privateer Sloop from the Mississippi, and ordered to that Place; but on the 6th of last Month was met with by Captain James Creighton, of a Letter of Marque Sloop belonging to this Port, who altered her Course, by retaking her and sending her in here. The Privateer had also taken a Vessel belonging to Philadelphia, which she had sent to Mississippi.

July 13. Friday last Capt. Cleague arrived here in nine Weeks from Madeira. Fourteen Days ago he spoke with Captain Macnamara, in a Snow from Liverpool, for North Carolina, who had been just 7 Weeks out, and informed him, That the English Fleet, under the Command of Commodore Keppel, had taken the Island of Belleisle, on the Coast of France; that they had lost a great Number of Men in the Landing; and that most of the Men of War were gone to Quiberon Bay.

Three Days before Capt. Cleague spoke with Capt. Macnamara, he fell in with Captain Lilley, from St. Kitts for Boston, who acquainted him, That certain Advice was received at St. Kitts, that three Privateers, and a King's Frigate, were fitting out at Martinico for the Coast of North-America; and that the Privateers were a Brig and two Sloops.

Saturday last Captain Hibbs, in a Sloop, arrived here in 14 Days from St. Kitts: Two Days before he left that Island, Captain Read, in the Oliver Cromwell, of that Place, carried in there 2 French Privateers, one of which mounted 14 Guns, and the other to; that a Letter of Marque Ship was just arrived at St. Kitts, from South-Carolina, that had been taken the Day after she sailed over Charles-Town Bar, by a French Privateer Sloop, after an obstinate Engagement, the Ship having expended all her Ammunition, but was afterwards ranfomed.

Capt. Hibbs touched at St. Martins, and was acquainted there by the Captains of some French Privateers, just chased in by an English Man of War, that no less than 12 or 14 French Privateers were fitted out at Martinico for the Coast of America. Captain Hibbs confirms the Account above-mentioned, of the taking of Dominica.

The Ship we mentioned in our last, to have chased the Captains Chambers and Sheldon off Sandy-Hook, and supposed an Enemy, was his Majesty's Ship the Penzance, Captain Doake.

Two Weeks ago we acquainted the Publick of five Sail of the Cork Fleet, bound to Jamaica, being taken and carried into Port Louis, on Hispaniola, by a French Man of War; we can now assure them for certain, that said Account was true; that three of the Ships belonged to London, and one Ship and a Brig to Liverpool; and that Capt. M'Alpine, from South Carolina for Jamaica, and a Snow from Coracoa for this Port were carried in there also; that there was great Plenty of Provisions at Port Louis, inasmuch that the best of Irish Beef was at one Pistole a Barrel, and Flour a perfect Drug.

PHILADELPHIA, July 16.

The Betty, Captain Robeson, of this Port, but last from South-Carolina for London, was taken in Sight of the Ships at Spithead, by a Cutter Privateer belonging to Calais, but was afterwards lost going into Cherbourg, and very little of the Cargo saved.

ANNAPOLIS, July 23.

By Capt. Porteus, who arrived here on Monday last, in the *Bolling*, from *Glasgow*, in Nine Weeks, we are informed, that they had News there of the Island of Belleisle being actually in the Possession of the English.
